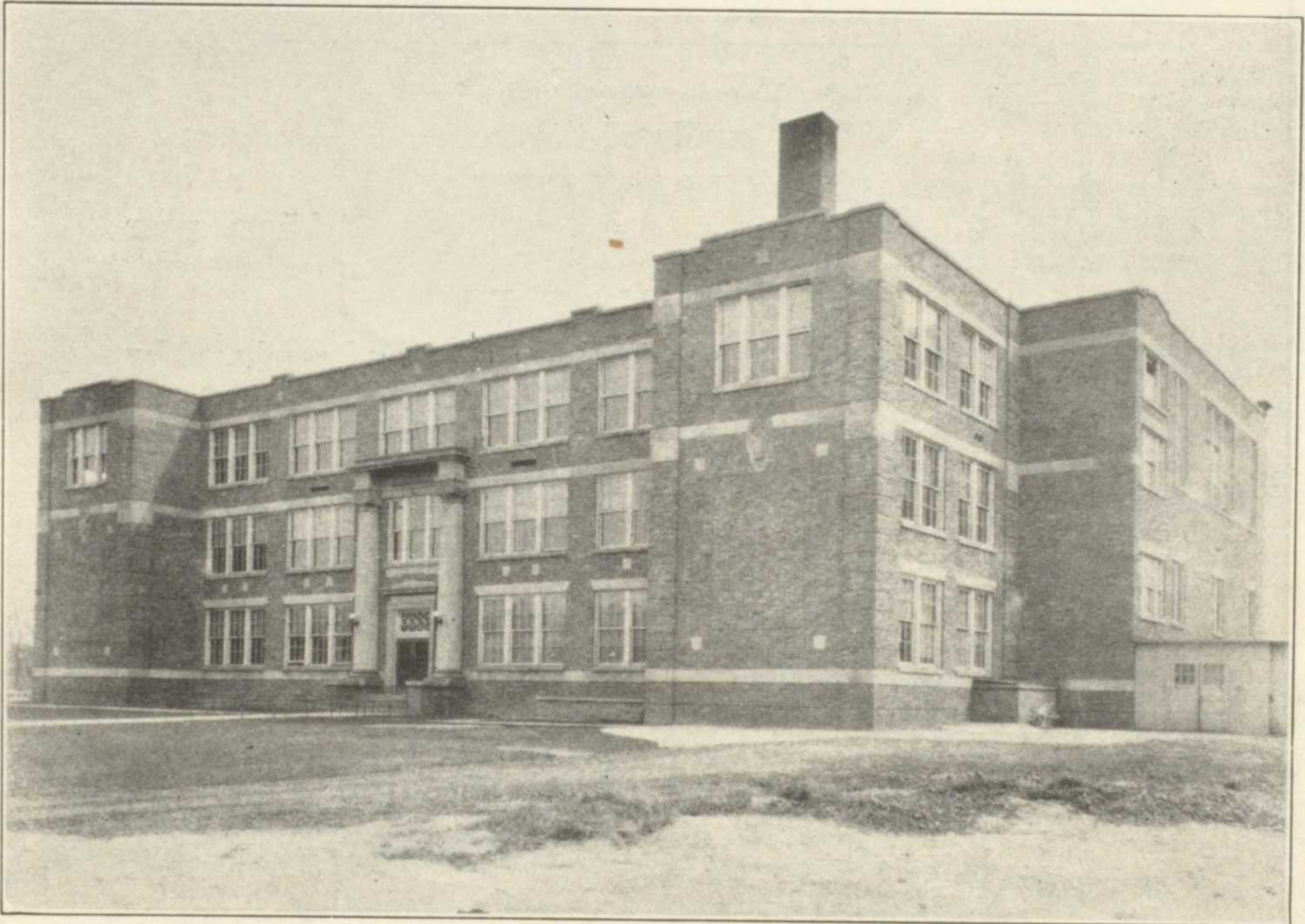

## PARKVIEW SCHOOL

### OUR TWO SCHOOLS

Parkview and Forestview, the two schools of Bay Village, are changing externally and internally. The recent landscaping causes the one; the equipment added produces the other.

Changes have also come to the occupants of these two buildings. Not only the regular curriculum is responsible for these, but also the extra-curricular work which is fostering a co-operative school spirit.

In this Arc-light we endeavor to cite a few of the influences of the past year that have helped to form a background for future endeavors.

### CHARTER

A First Class charter was granted by the State Department of Education to the Bay Village grade schools this spring. This chartering and classifying of grade schools by the state was initiated by the present State Superintendent of Public Instruction, John L. Clifton.

The North Central Association and the State Department of Education feel that high grade work in high schools is bound to be compromised unless there is a corresponding high grade of work done and rich opportunities offered in the elementary schools.

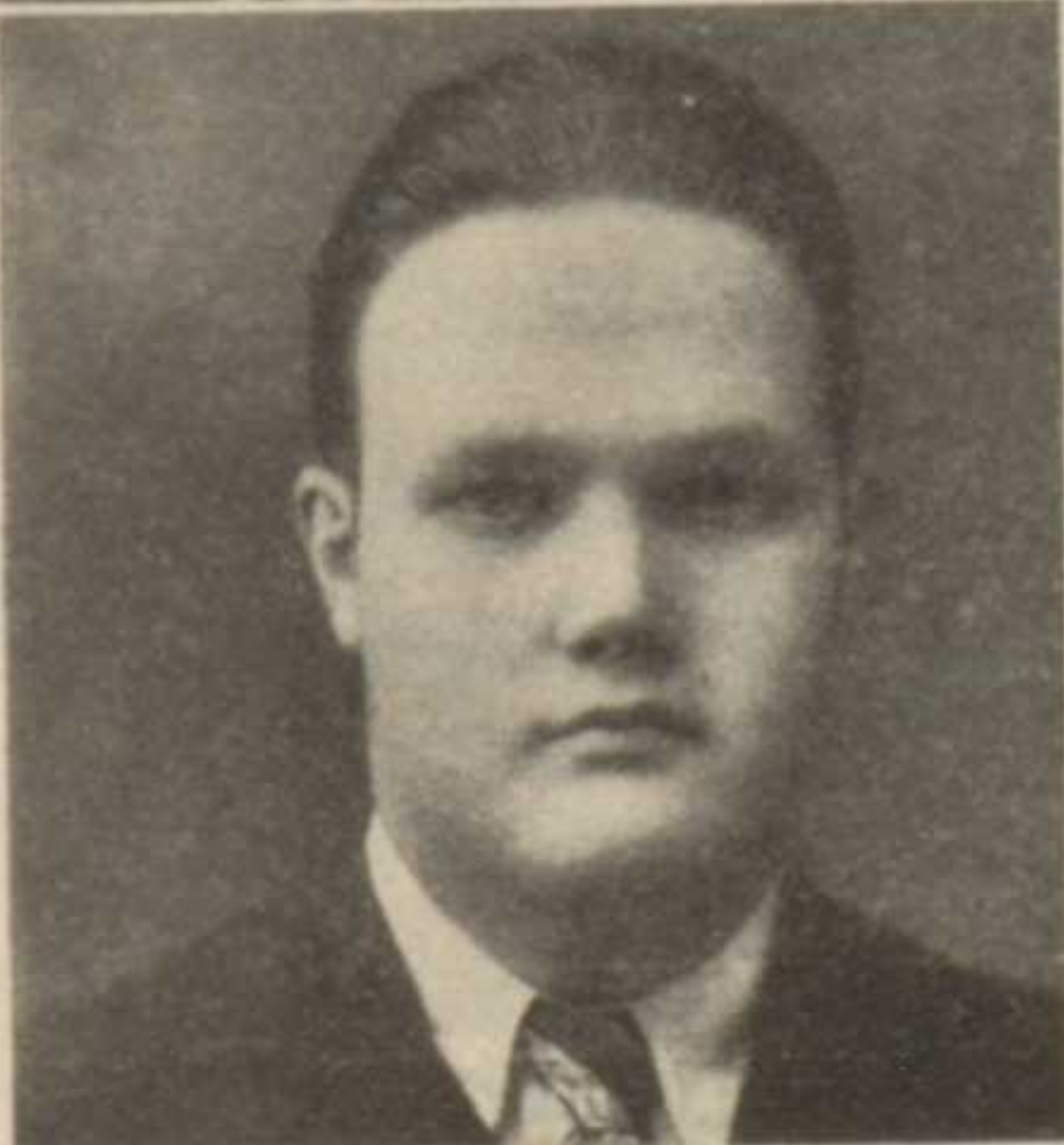

At the same time the affirmative team, coached by Miss Florence Rozelle, met teams from Royalton, Solon, and Berea.

A large loving cup was awarded the champion school and was officially presented at the debater's banquet held in the Parkview school gymnasium, January 22. Besides receiving the permanent championship trophy, the champions were also awarded the temporary trophy to be kept until some other school succeeds in winning the Cuyahoga County championship.

## CURRICULUM

The high school subjects available to ninth grade students for the coming year are:

Required: English and General Science.

Elective: Algebra, Latin, Manual Training and Domestic Science.

All pupils who have college ambitions should select English, General Science, Algebra, and Latin. Most colleges demand at least two units of foreign language and two units of mathematics as entrance requirements.

## SOCIAL PROBLEMS CLUB

Last November this club held discussions concerning the issues of the election, after which a mock election was held. The club considered some school problems.

## BIRD CLUB

### LIBRARY

Sixty-five volumes have been added to the high school library during this school year. In addition to this a new encyclopedia, "The Americana" (30 volumes), and a new set of Compton's "Picture Encyclopedia" (10 volumes) were purchased.

Part of the above purchases was made possible when the Bay Village Women's Club voted to give \$100 per year (for a period of five years) to the high school for reference books.

### TYPING

A course in typewriting was introduced this past year. The school now has fifteen typewriters available for class use. The course will be open to Juniors this next school year.

### LANDSCAPING

Co-operating with the local Parent-Teachers' organization, the school children and teachers contributed fifty dollars toward the landscaping of the school grounds at Forestview and Parkview.

### PORTABLE

During the latter part of April, the large portable school building located at Stop 30 was moved to the Forestview school grounds where it will be used as a cafeteria. The building was ordered moved early last fall, but numerous complications held up the execution of the order.

### ARBOR DAY

Both schools had programs on April 26. Gov. Cooper's Arbor Day message was read to all the classes assembled on the lawn. Music, readings, and the presentation by the various classes of trees, bushes, and vines for the beautifying of the two school grounds constituted the programs.

### EXHIBITS

In classrooms and hallways at various times throughout this year have been displayed work done by students in Art, Manual Training, and Sewing.

### DRAMATICS

The Ninth Grade produced in an evening performance "Ghosts," by Booth Tarkington. This was made possible by Mrs. L. Ferster, who was elected director by the Freshmen.

Students of Parkview participated in another play of Tarkington's, "Station Y-Y-Y." Miss Florence Rozelle acted as director.

### MUSIC

Under the leadership of Miss Eva Lee Sackett, the Girls' Glee Club experienced a very busy and successful year. Not only did the club sing at school functions, but accepted invitations to sing before several of the village clubs and at the churches. They met the following out-of-town engagements: Nov. 11, Methodist Sunday School and Presbyterian Church services; Dec. 5, Methodist Ladies' Aid meeting; Jan. 17, P.-T.-A. meeting; Feb. 17, Bay Presbyterian Church service; May 2, Community Club.

The Music Memory Team was composed of twenty from the Senior and Junior High School. The contest was held April 17 at the Masonic Auditorium under the auspices of the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra.

Rhythm Orchestras have been organized in the two first grades. They have once appeared before the public.

### ATHLETICS

Due to the loss of eleven athletes, the athletic record for 1928-29 was below par. Only the basketball team had any success in the percentage column.

The football team won but one battle in six and tied one game.

Although the basketball squad was low in the county standing, the team showed a record of eight wins and five defeats.

The track team has not as yet been successful in winning a meet; but many good individual records have been established.

The hopes for a very successful season in 1929-30 are high. Only three varsity men are seniors and some of the other athletes will be eligible in the fall.

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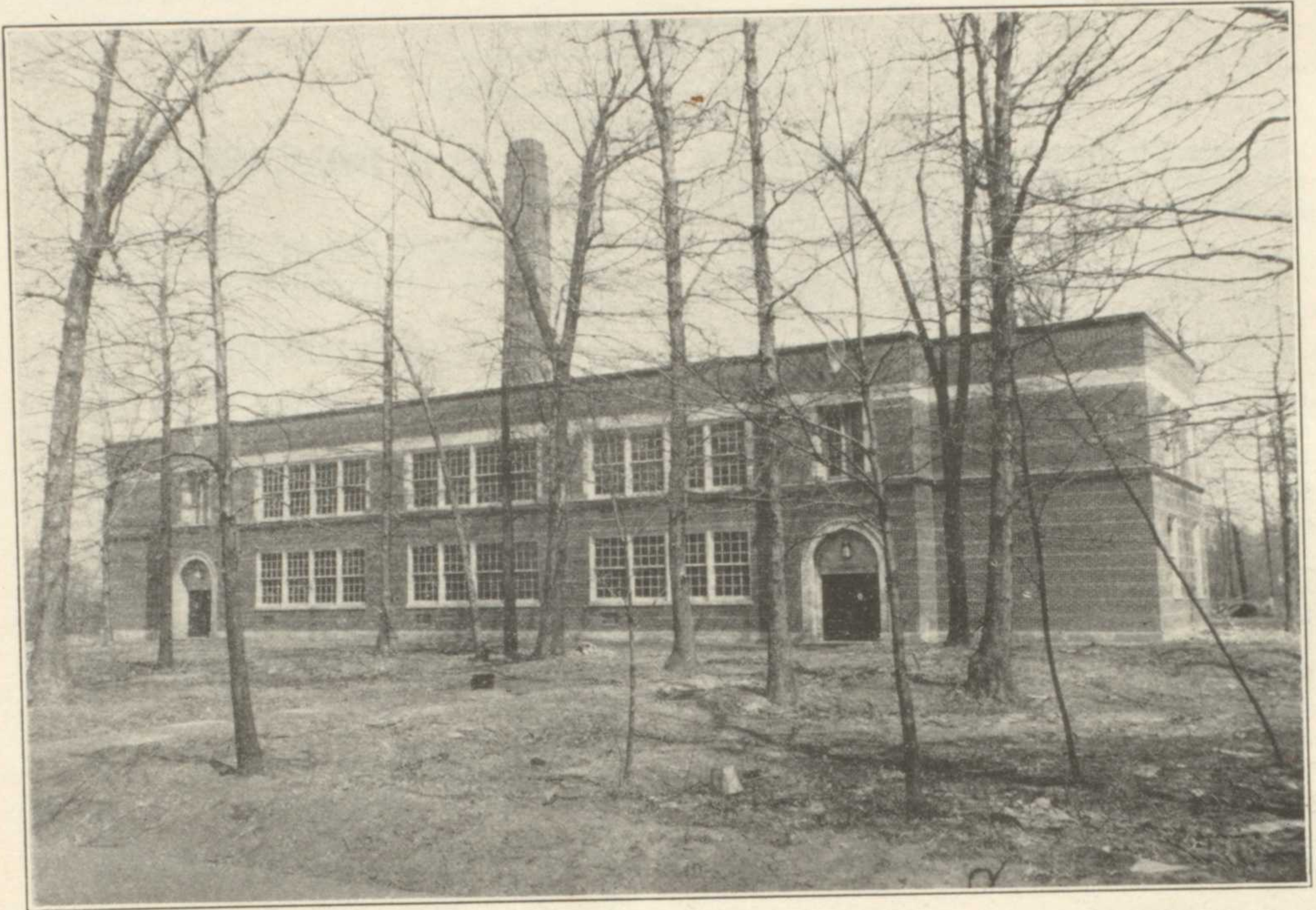
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
