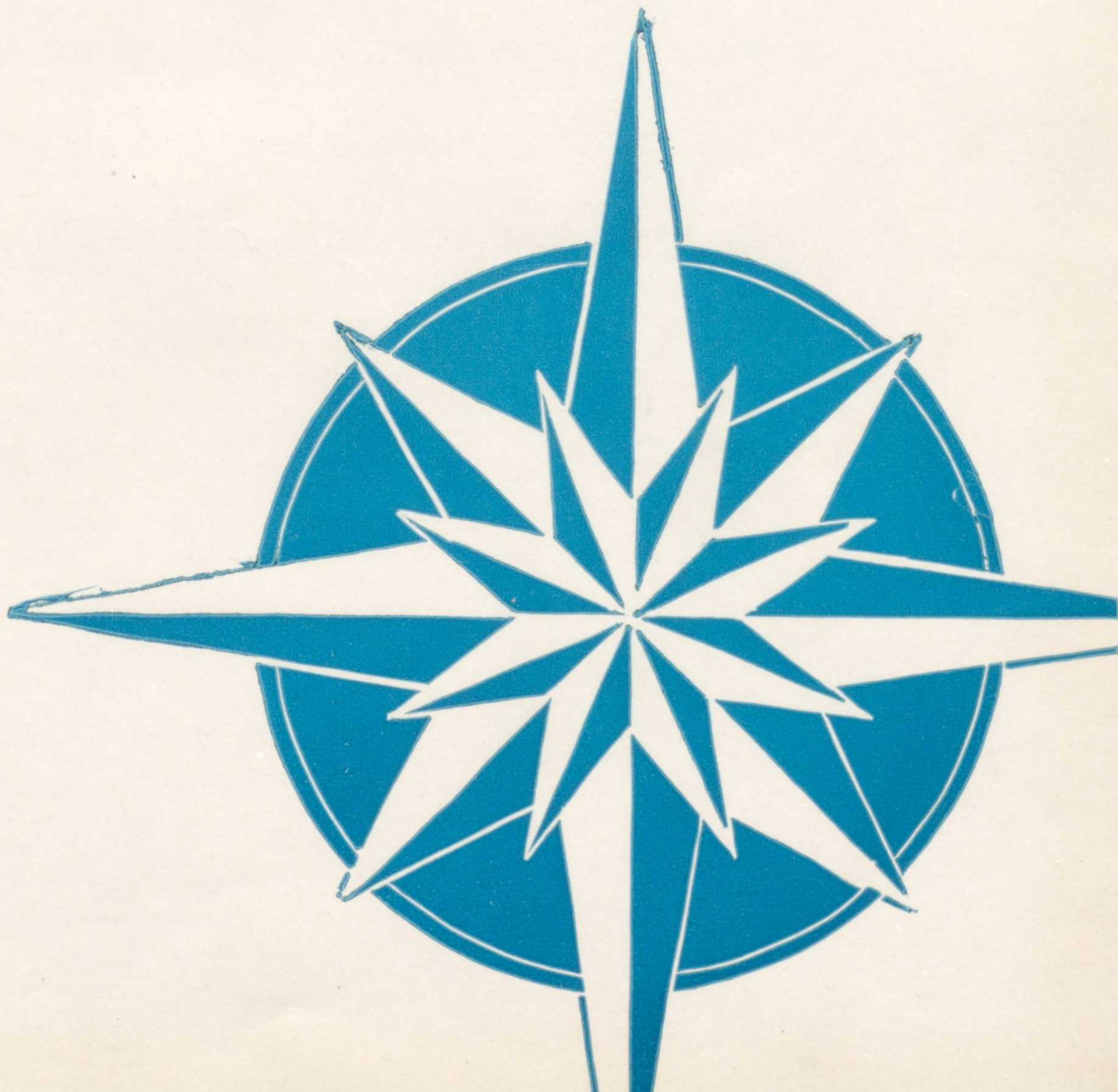

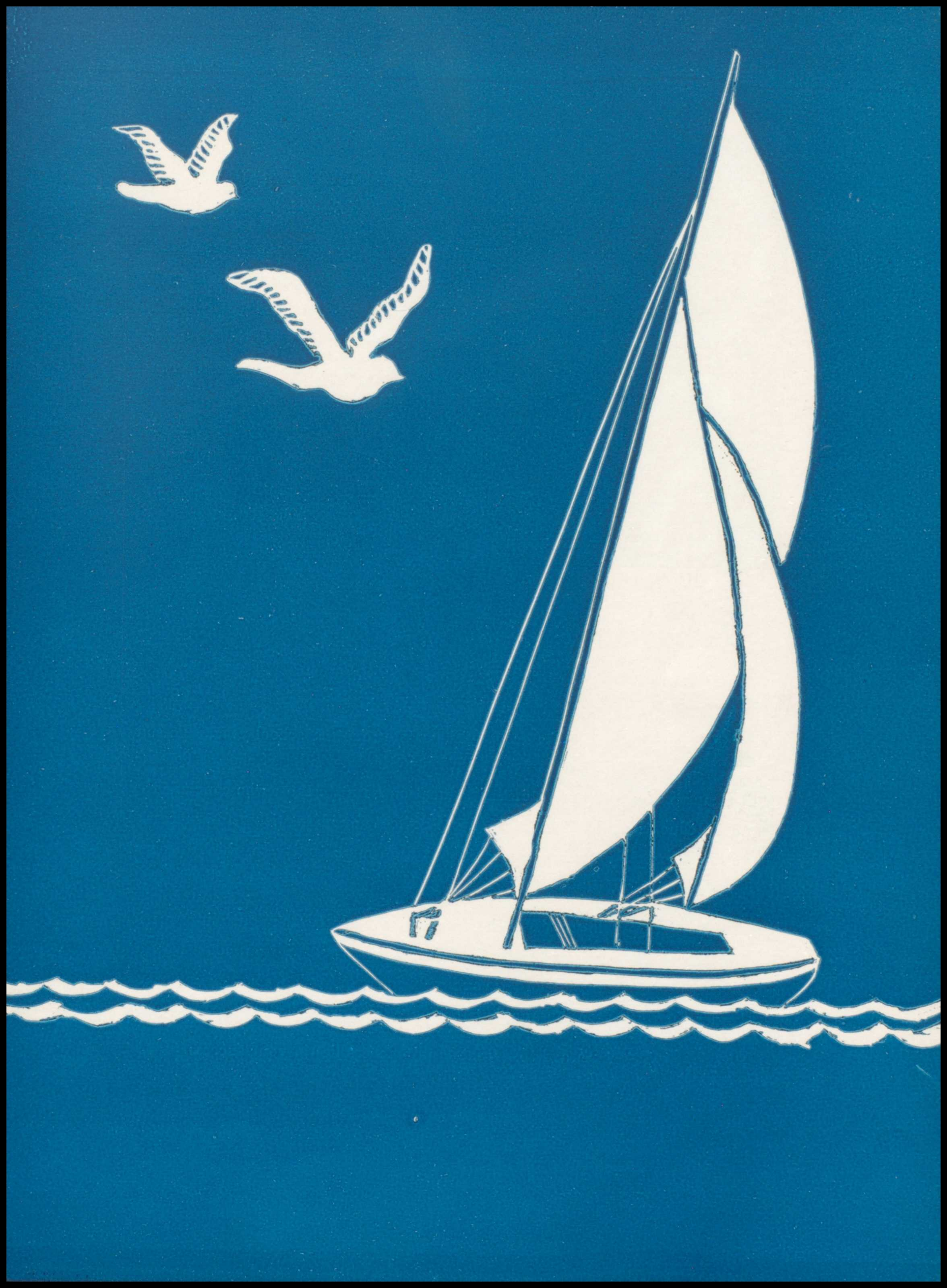

To the members of the class of 1941 go my heartiest good wishes for future success, whether it be in furthering their education or making a place for themselves in the world of industry.

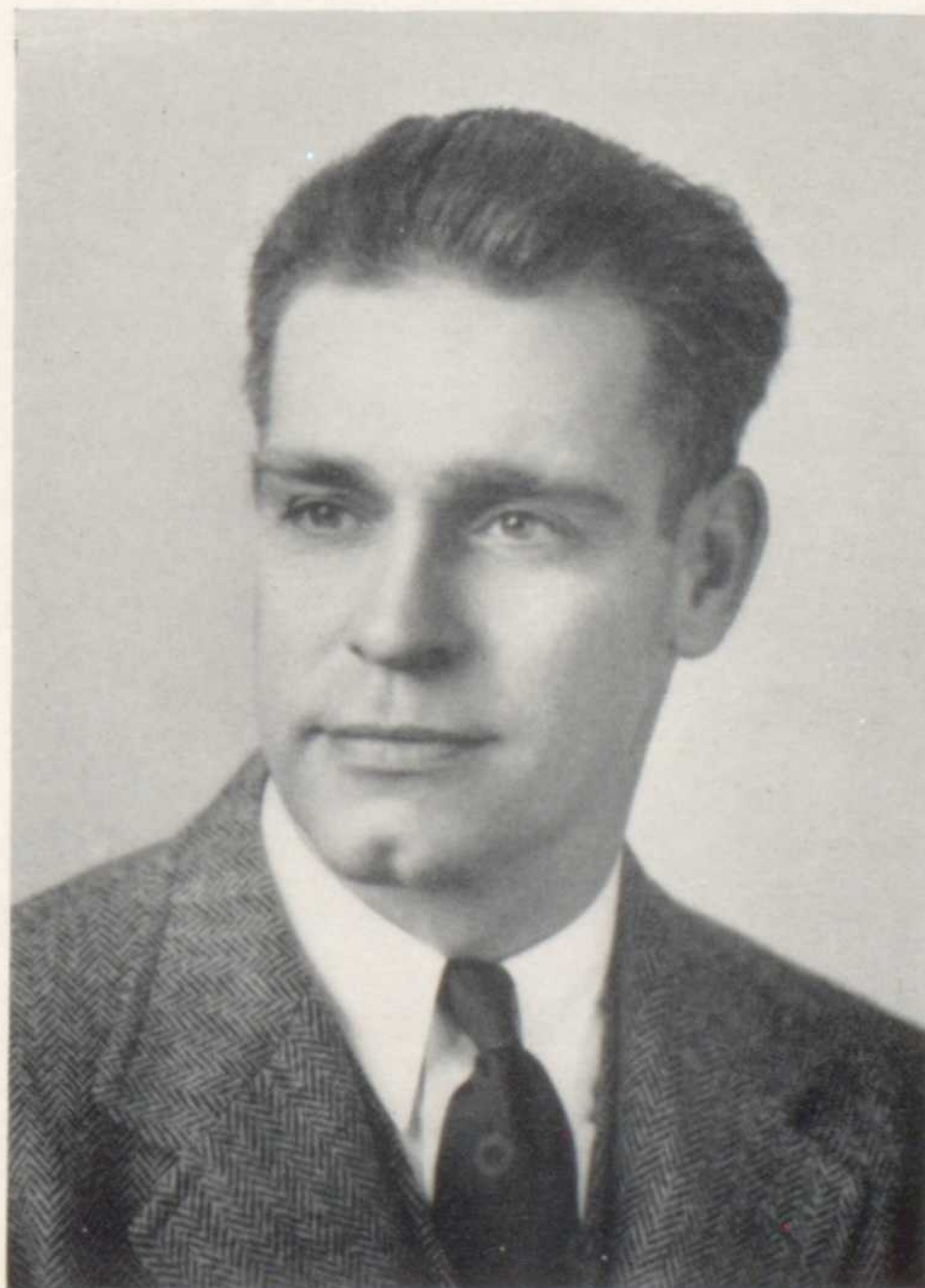
H. R. SECRIST

Student Council . . .

The student council is composed of representatives elected from all homeroom and school organizations.

A tribunal composed of four members of the council and one member elected from the student body acts as a disciplinary court.

A huge football rally, held on the evening of October 30, prior to the Dover game, was one of the projects of the council this year.

The council had charge of the concessions at the football games during the season. And during the basketball season it awarded the concessions and dances to respective classes and organizations.

A monitor system, again sponsored by the council, showed improvement over the previous ones.

Each year it is the custom of the council to award to one girl and one boy of the senior class, a citizenship cup award. A definite set of rules for the choosing of these students was set up by the council. The final decision was left to a committee composed of: the student council adviser, the senior class adviser, and the principal. This year the student chosen was Ortrud Schluembach. She received her award at the recognition assembly on April 29.

All work and no play, however, is not the motto of the council. They gave a Chinese dinner during the winter, and in order to create the proper Chinese atmosphere they even had a Chinese boy come to serve it.

The main duties of the council throughout the year have been to try to better conditions throughout the school and to promote student government.

The officers for the year were: President, Jack Wismar; Vice-President, Howard Smith; Secretary, Gladys Massey; Treasurer, Nancy Ashcraft. The faculty adviser is Mr. C. M. Patterson.

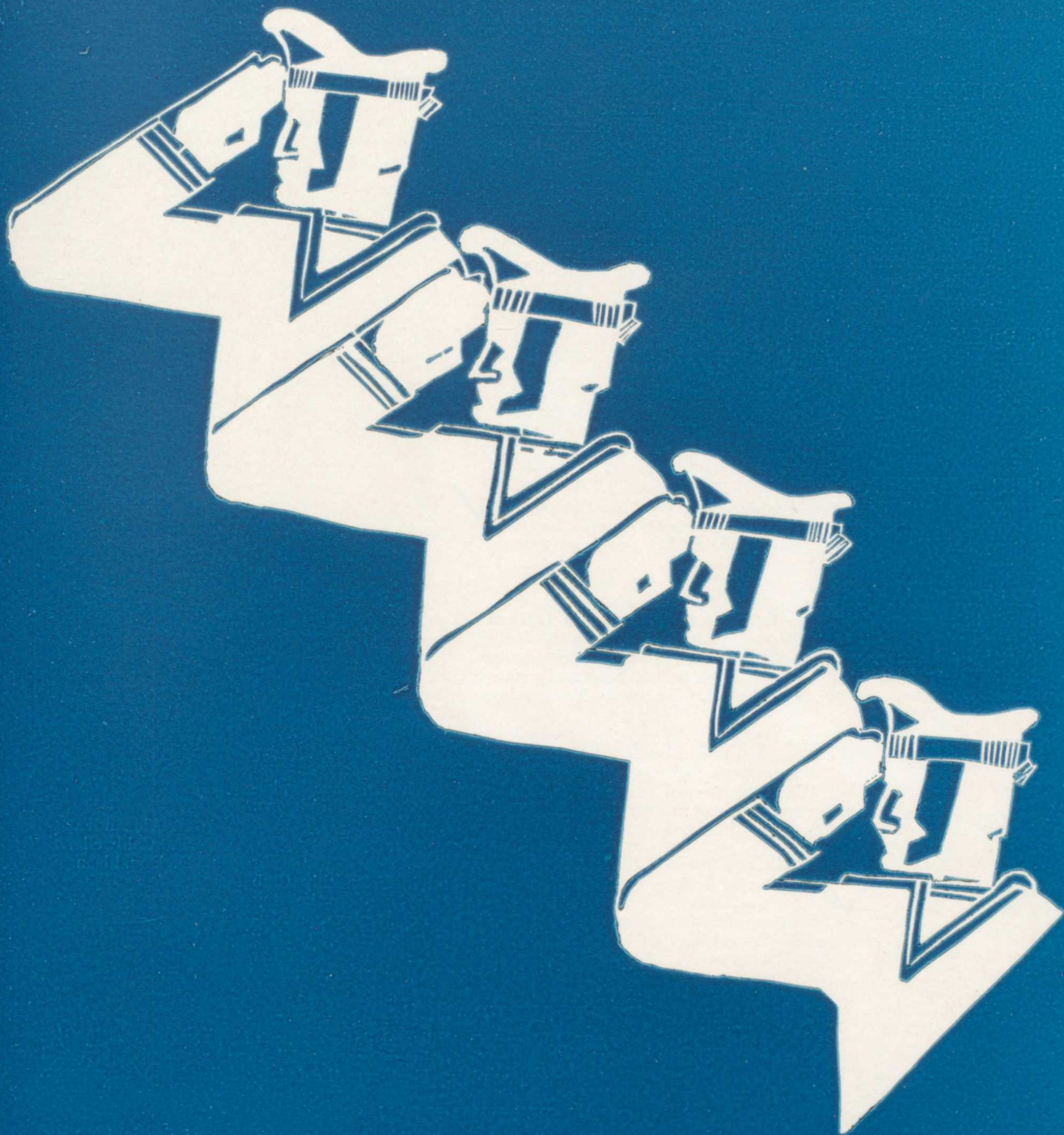

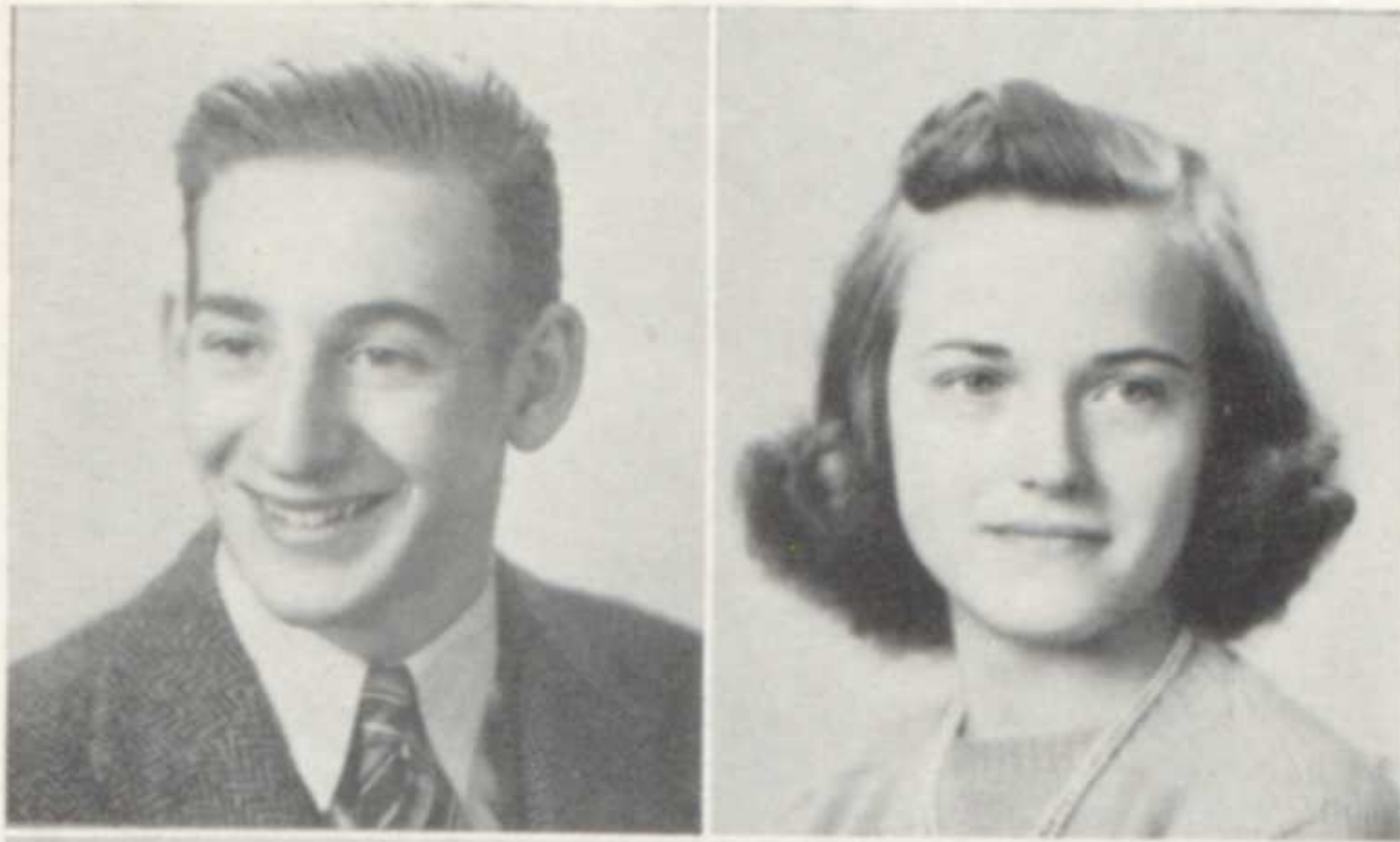

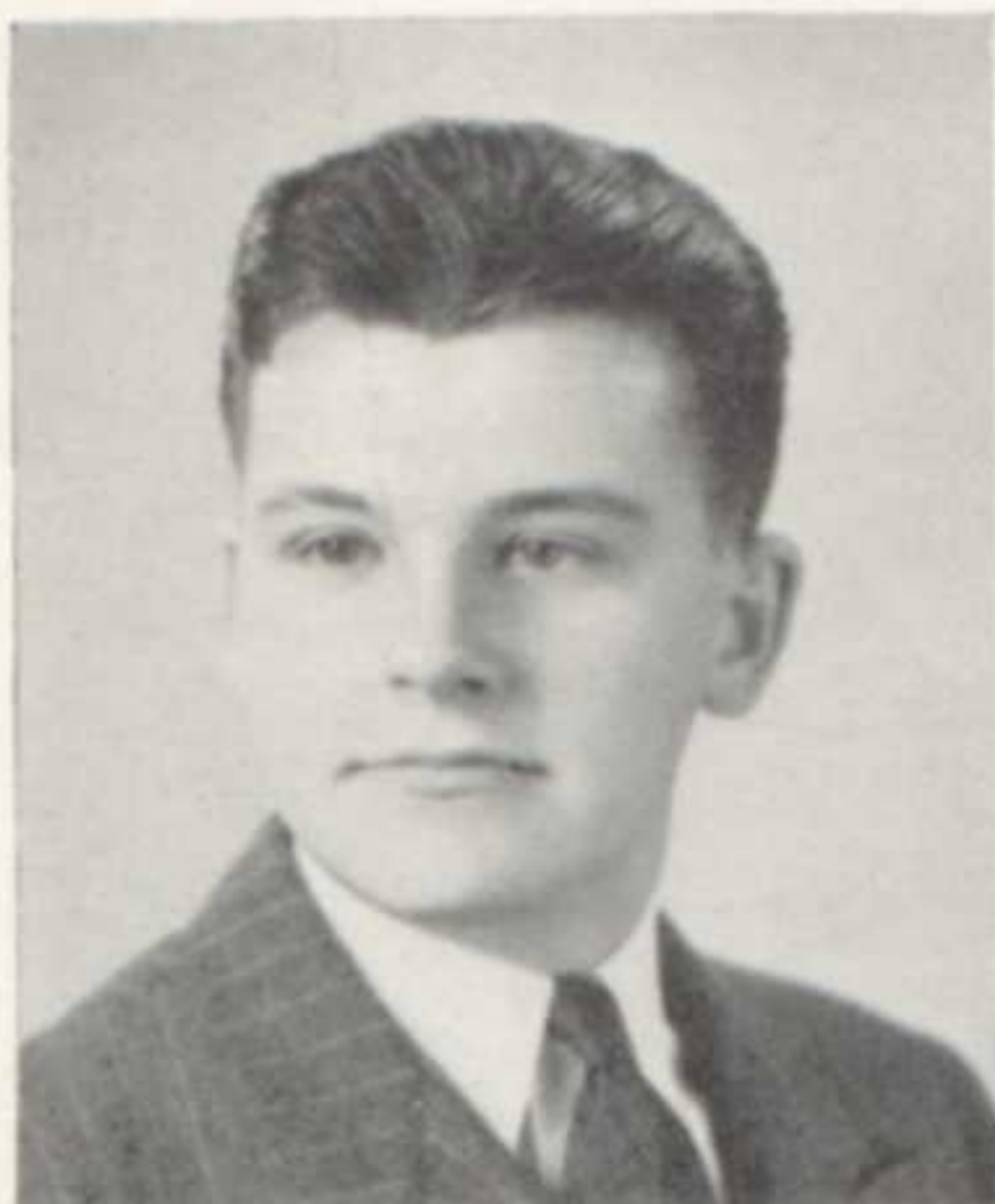
ORTRUD SCHLUEMBACH

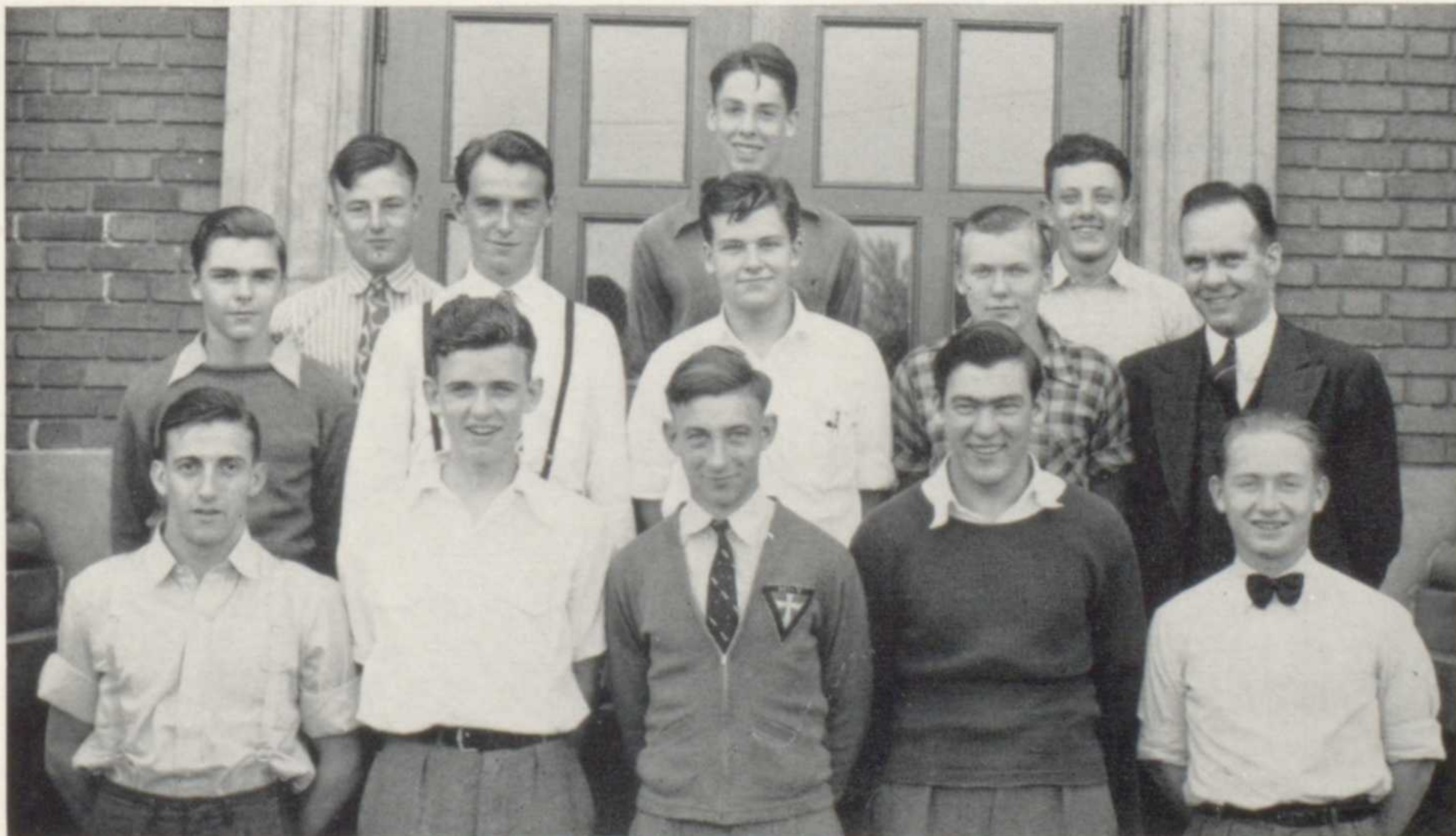

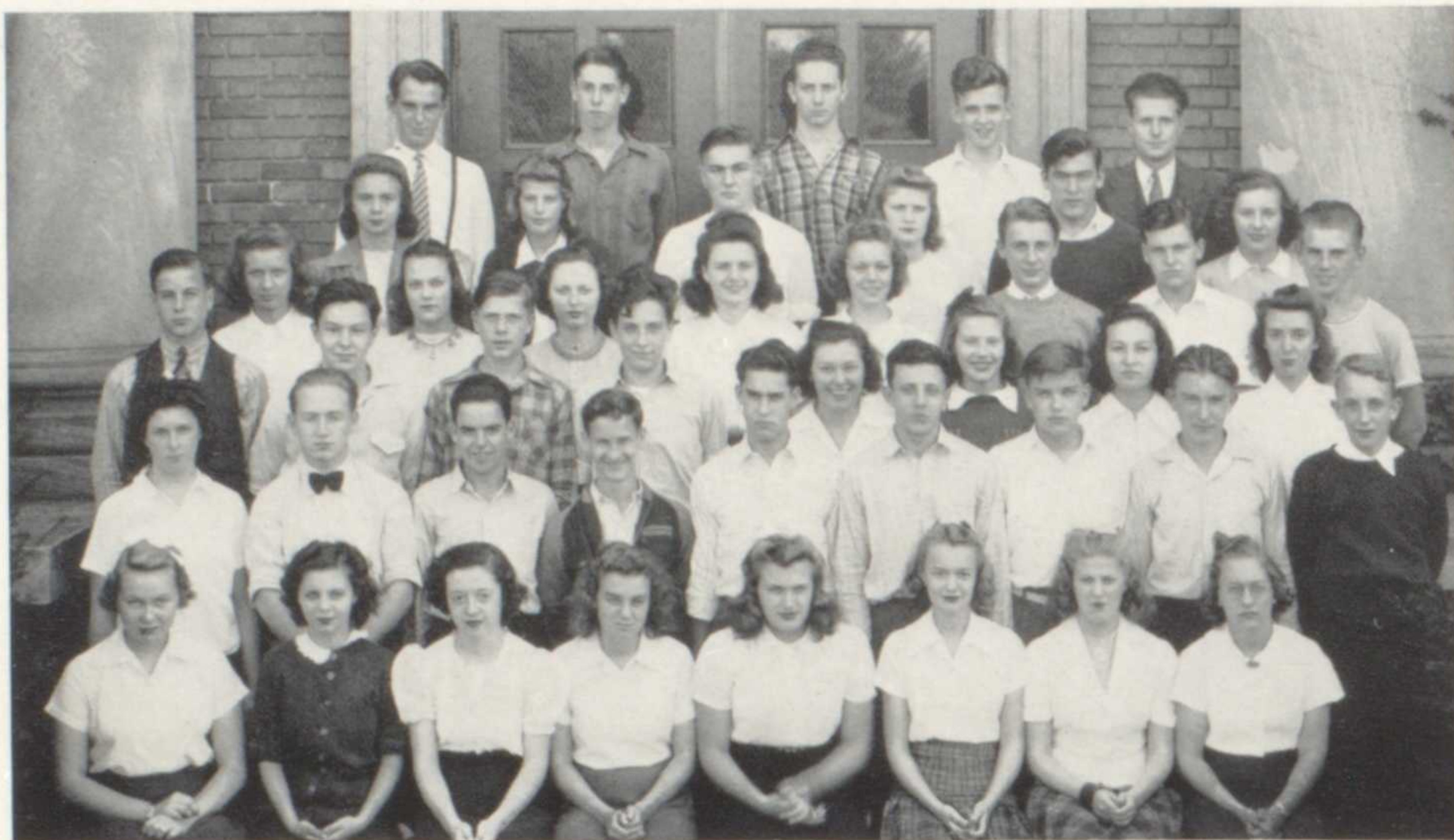

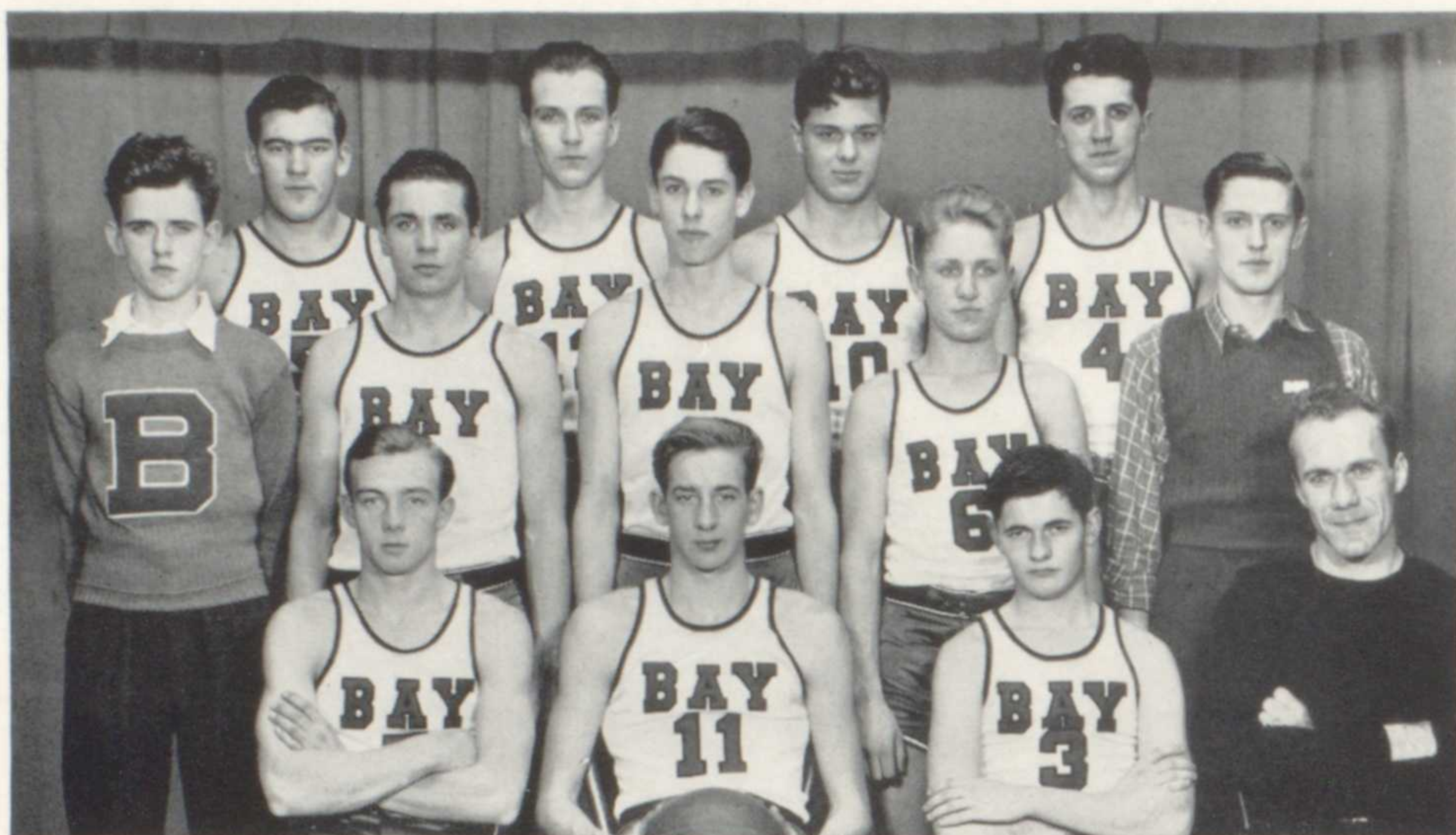

Bay Village basketball team, coached by John W. Shollenberger, enjoyed the most successful season in the history of the school. In spite of the fact that only one player was held over from last year's varsity squad, Bay's team completed a schedule of sixteen games undefeated, and has the distinction of being the only team out of forty-four schools in Greater Cleveland to have a perfect record for the season.

Bay's team compiled a total of 717 points in 17 games, an average of over 42 points per game, while our opponents scored 469 points for an average of 27 points per game. The team made good over 50 per cent of their fouls.

In years to come there may be better plays produced in Bay, but the production of "What a Life" will long be remembered.

Forest View with a series of Japanese plays. Aboard the S. S. Parkview, plays were given for the mothers under the direction of Miss Esme Riley.

Crossing the gangplank of the S. S. Forest View were Gayle Martin, from Lakewood, and Elmer Orvis from Cleveland.

The passengers on the S. S. Parkview joined the passengers of the S. S. Forest View under the direction of Mrs. Levering and Miss Florence Dietz. Elmer Funke boarded the ship that year from Cleveland.

With many privileges and much fun the passengers spent the last year aboard the S. S. Forest View with Miss Florence Dietz as leader. To enjoy the last year came Lenore Kick and Leona Januska from Bedford and Holy Trinity respectively.

The fathers at last were privileged to see their offspring perform in the "Introduction of Potato Into England" at P. T. A. on Fathers' Night.

For some it was a return and for others it was a new experience to come aboard the S. S. Parkview with Miss Margaret Schaeffer in charge. There were many good times including a Hallowe'en party where the members came incognito.

New passengers being initiated were: Norma and Bill Dymont, Ralph Gilmore, and Jack Wismar from Lakewood. From Cleveland came Bonnie Stewart.

The girls with Mrs. M. Mink welcomed Marilyn Ritter and the boys with Mr. Clifford Wertz welcomed Dick Alexander, both from Lakewood.

"Be a Little Cuckoo" was given by the girls in an assembly program.

Sailing together again under Mr. Glenn L. Ganyard, the boys and girls had class parties and many good times in the ninth grade. Those new on the promenade deck were: Dorothy Hagedorn and Geraldine Albers, Lutheran School, Westlake; Elizabeth Poteat, Raleigh, North Carolina; Lila Morris, Tippicanoe City, Ohio; Lois Beck, St. Paul's Lutheran School; and Bob Mersbach, Rocky River.

Mr. Ganyard was again in charge of the class in the tenth grade. Jack Caldwell, Charles Freeman, and Allen Barker from Lakewood, Don Shaw and Bob Hartman from Rocky River were added to the roll call.

In the junior year, Miss Marvel Sebert had charge. Jack Wismar, the class president, brought in two deck chairs which were occupied by June Holroyd from Cleveland and Andy Fryxell from Lakewood. Many unforgettable things occurred that year. First came the blue and gold class jackets; then the rings. In the spring the class play, "Captain Applejack," was presented. It was directed by Mr. C. M. Patterson. Those passengers who were inducted into the National Honor Society in the last semester were: Ortrud Schluembach, John Sturges, Elizabeth Poteat, Elmer Orvis, Laurel Ernstmeyer, Martha Hanushek, Lila Morris, Allen Barker, Dorothy Hagedorn, Eva Proeschel, and Miriam Jacklitch. The year was finished by giving a Junior-Senior Dinner-Dance at the Community House.

Now the last year of the voyage has been completed. During this past year, under the direction of Mrs. Hannah K. Bortz, Martha Zeiser from Ashley Hall, South Carolina, Jack Vutech of Rocky River, and Don Knowles of Lakewood crossed the gangplank. This past year has been filled with many pleasant memories. The first senior dinner and the senior play "What a Life," directed by Mrs. Mink, will never be forgotten. Gayle Martin and Lois Beck were elected to the cheering section of the passengers.

But few felt like cheering after the last one grasped his passport on the evening of June 4, held firmly to his luggage, and waited for the gangplank to be placed. The final parties, Junior-Senior Dinner-Dance, exchanging of pictures, and hurried goodbyes were over. The S. S. Parkview had docked. Something new, something often anticipated waited around the corner.
