Mr. Springer

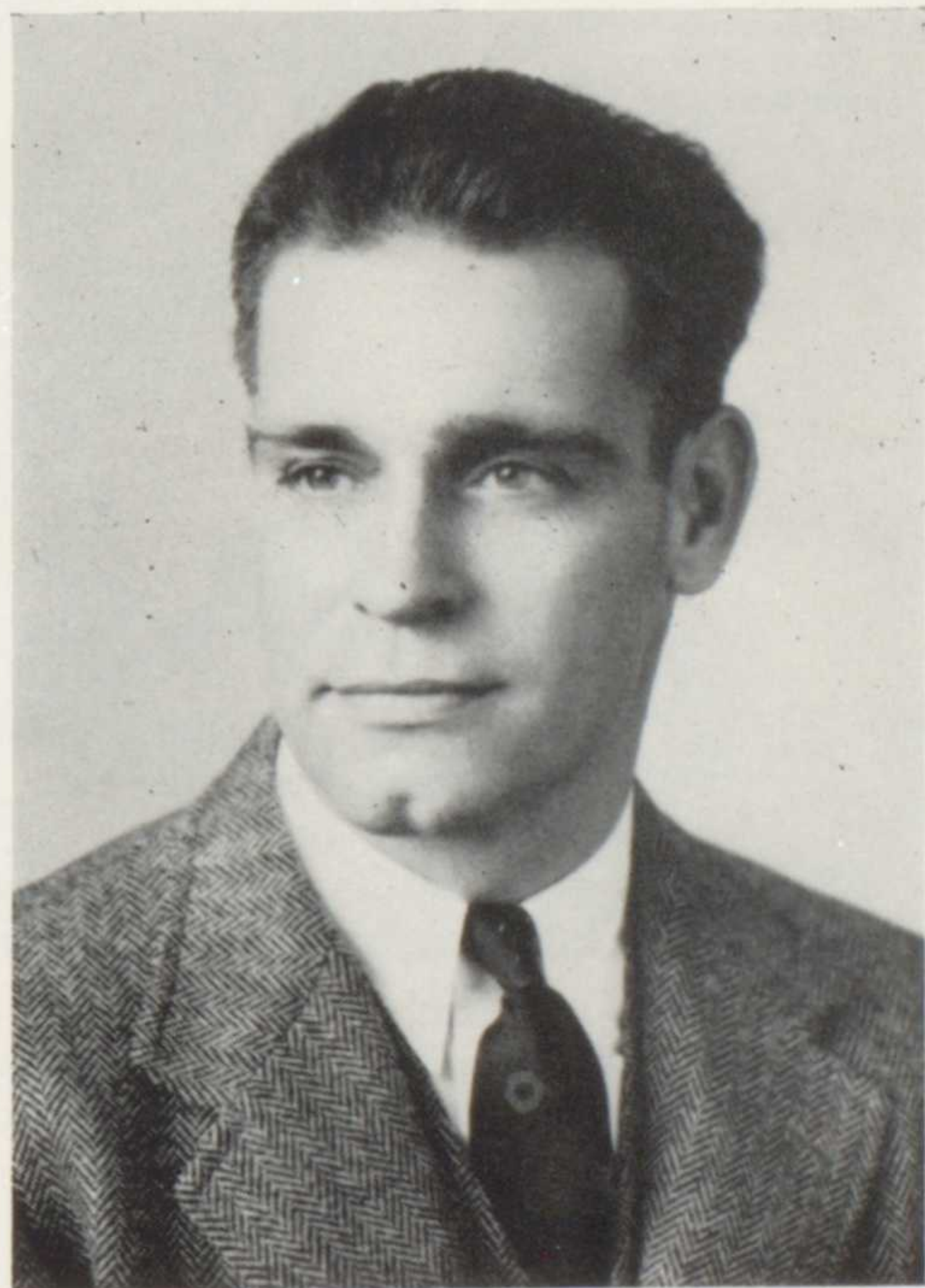
Mr. W. J. Springer came under our "Big Top" in the year 1940. He had acquired his Bachelor of Science degree at Mount Union College and later had served at Harvard University as an instructor and received his Master of Education degree.

The Bay Village schools are proud to claim him as superintendent. Mr. Springer has successfully carried through plans for our two schools; nevertheless, there are still many plans for the future that will, with his help, make the Bay Village school system one of the foremost in the country.

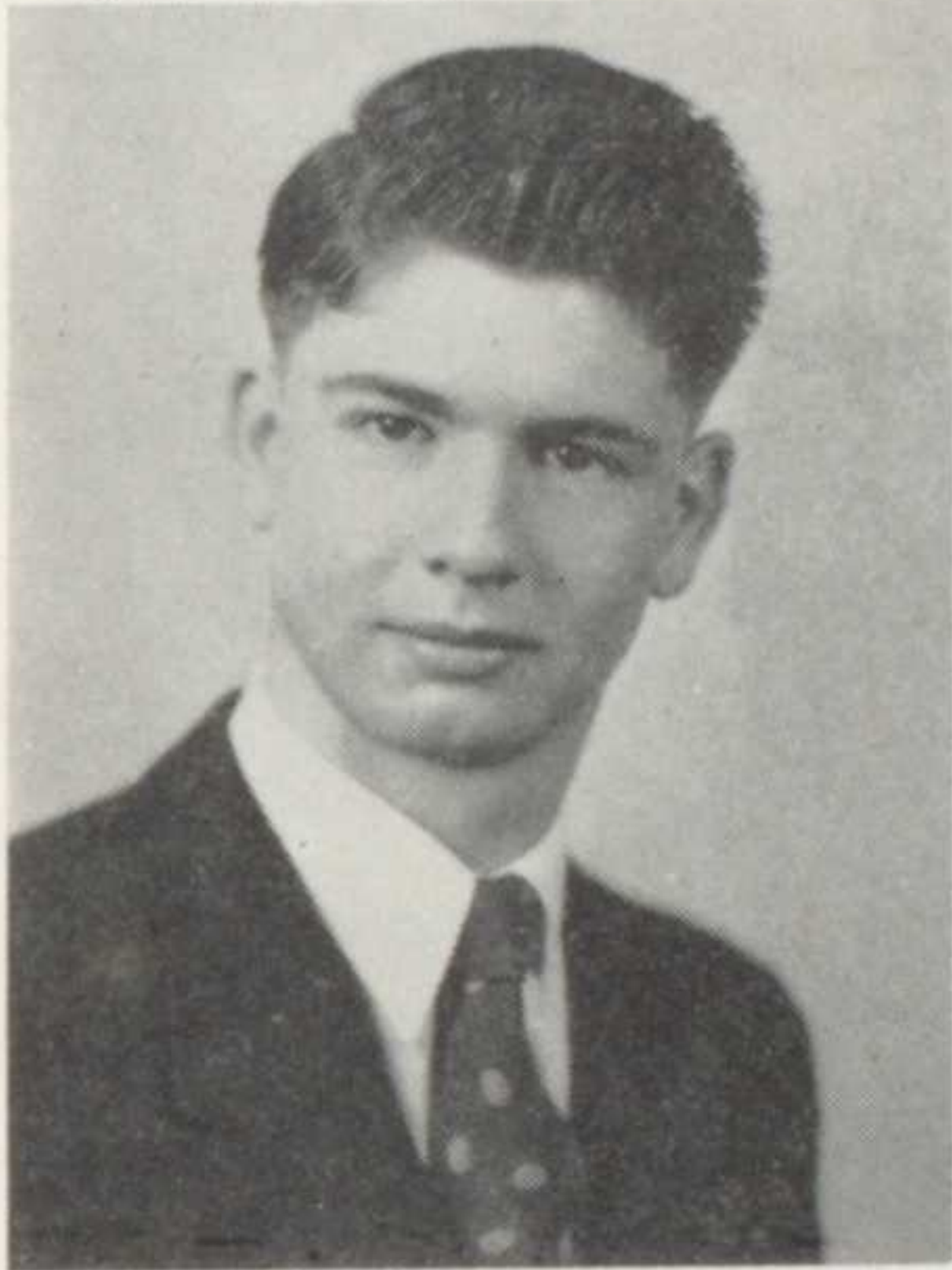

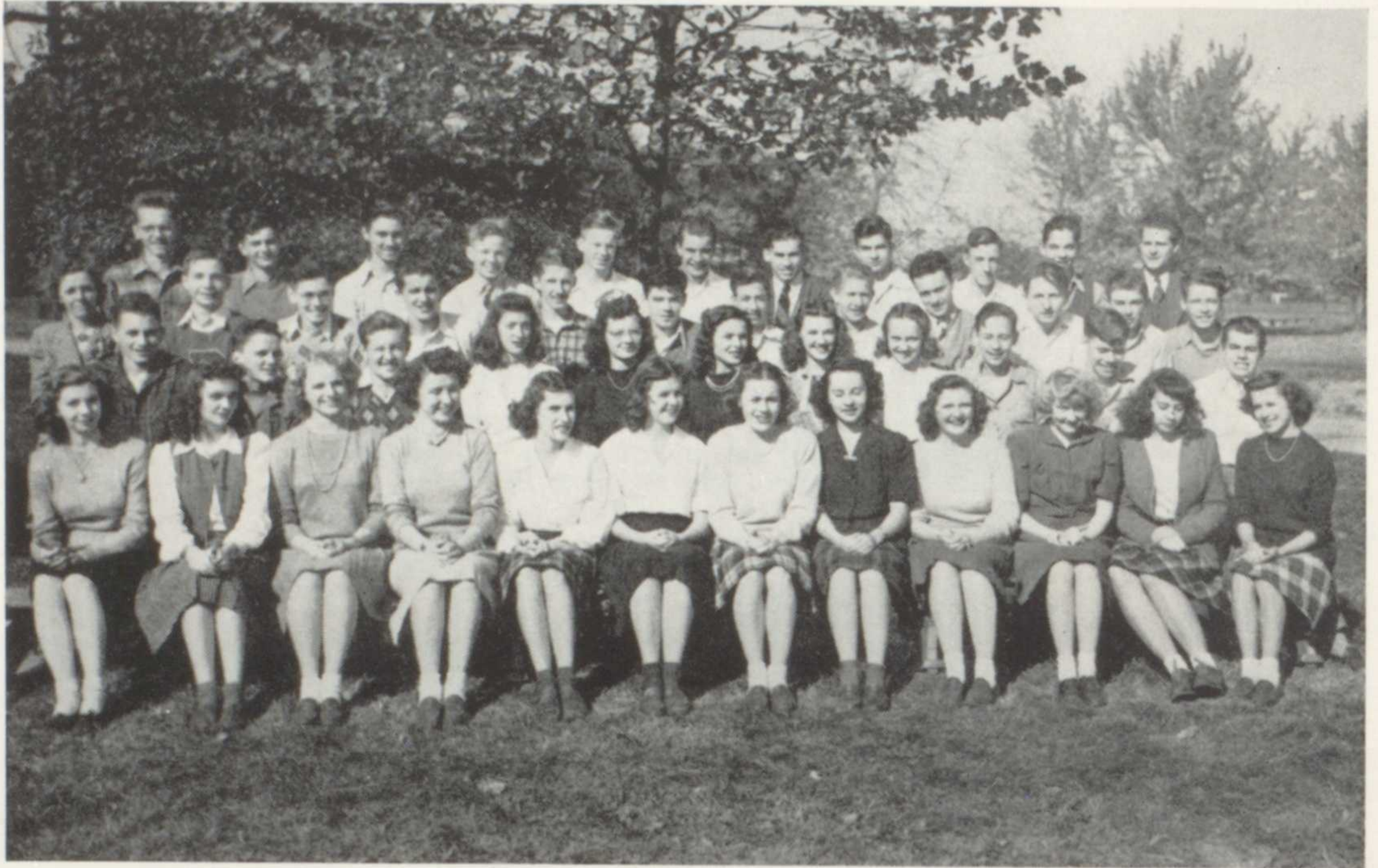

Every circus has its own publicity and advertising department. This Bay Village "Big Top" circus is no exception; and so it, likewise, has the Bay Window as its publicity paper. The staff which includes the seventh to the twelfth grades is chosen after careful consideration of their journalistic abilities.

The Bay Window is published by the students, mimeographed twice a month, and distributed to the students free of charge. Each issue is exchanged with other high schools of Cuyahoga County, and these other papers are put on display in the school library.

A list of articles is made for each edition, and a reporter is assigned to each article. The staff then collects, edits, and publishes the news.

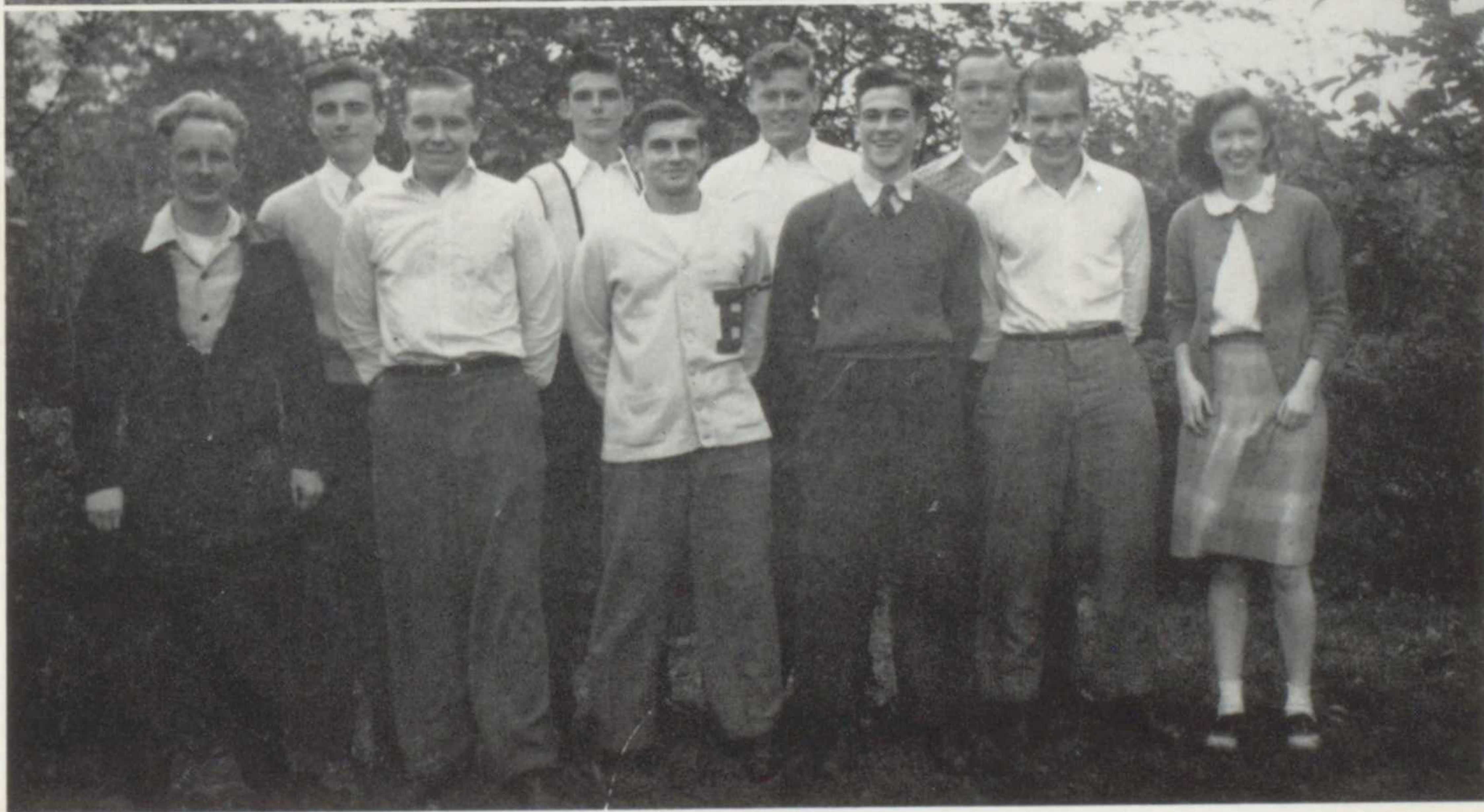

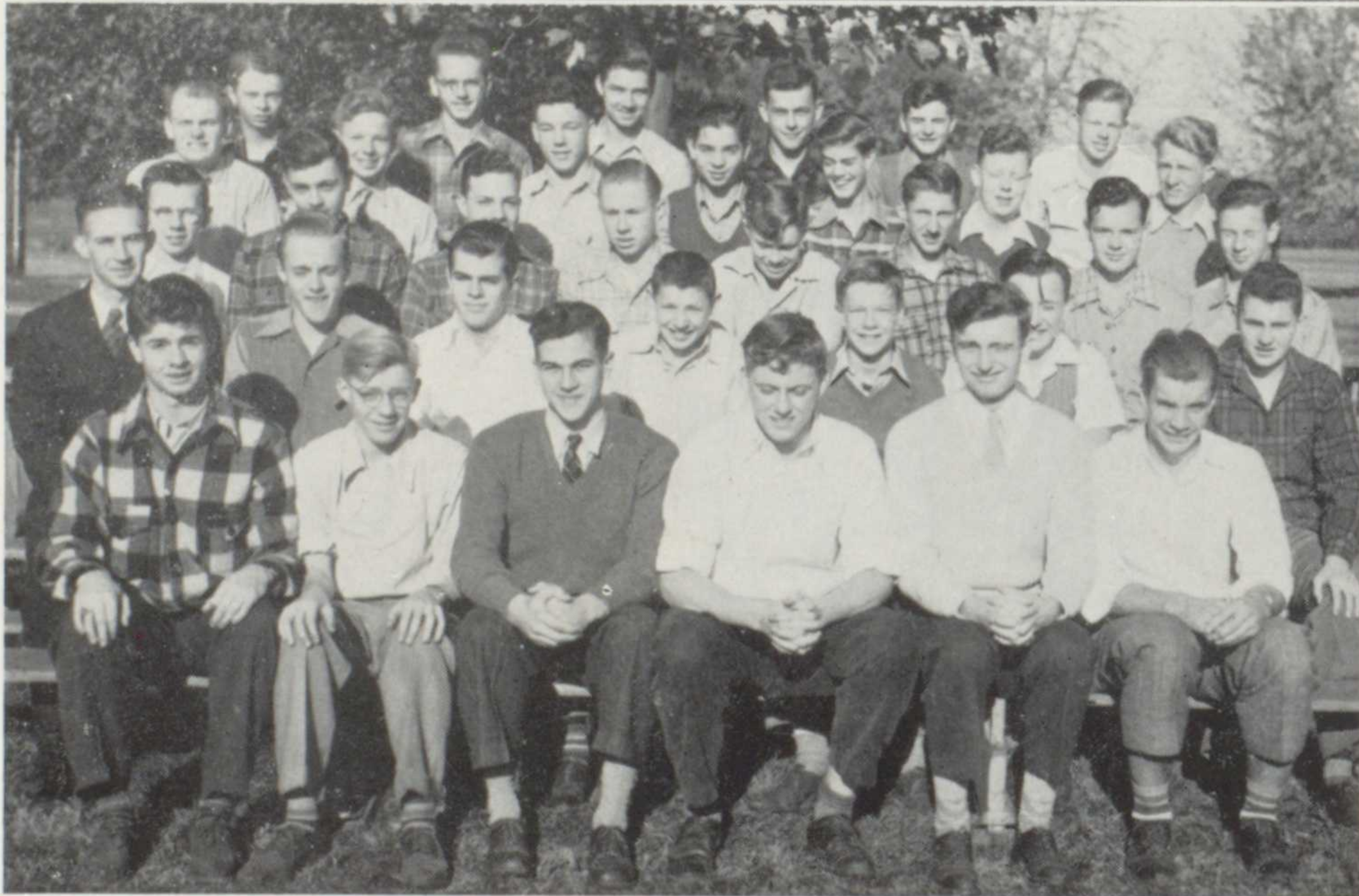

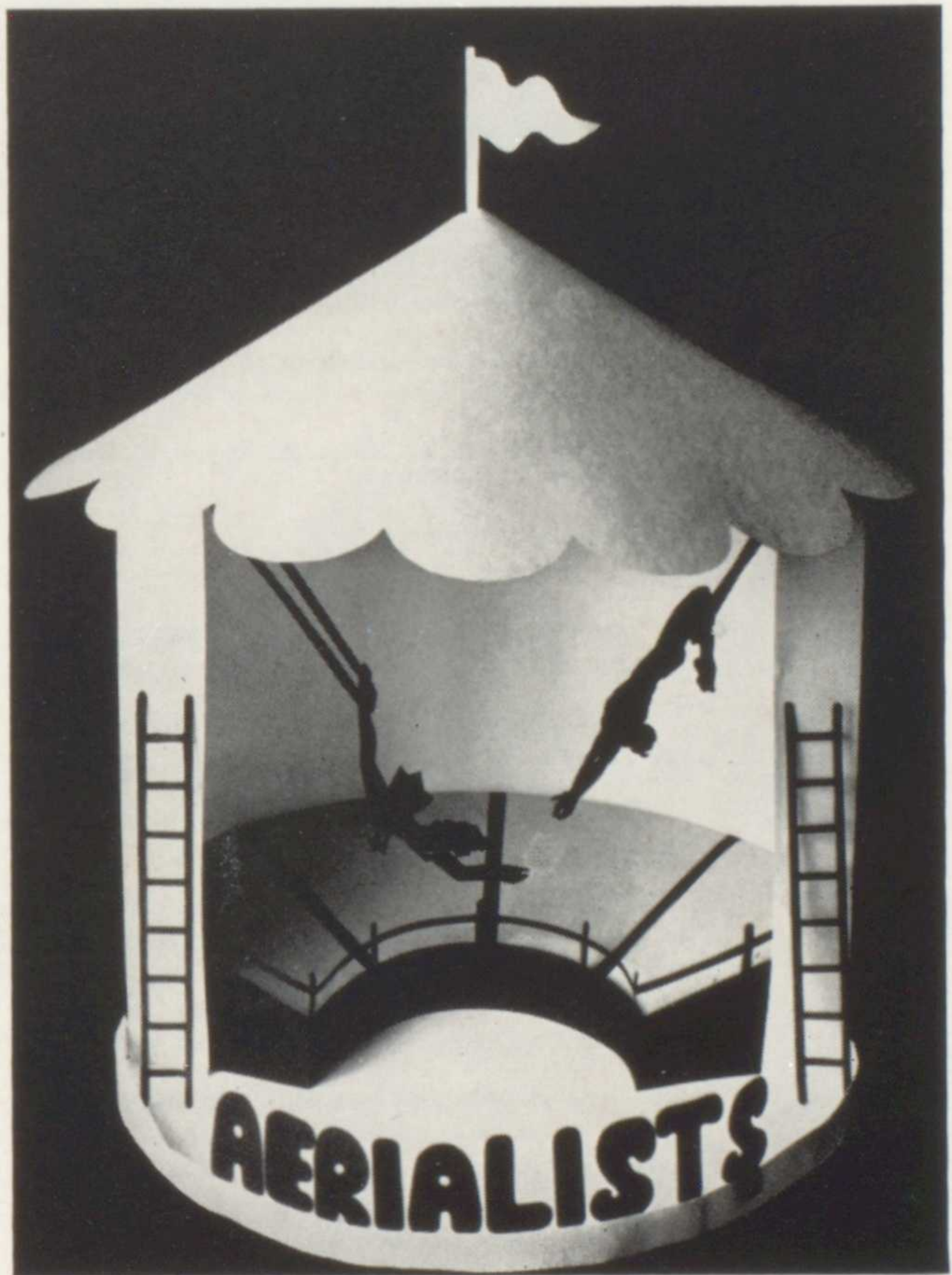

Early last fall, forty-eight prospective candidates for football, along with six lettermen returning from the previous year, reported to the new football coach, Michael DePaola.

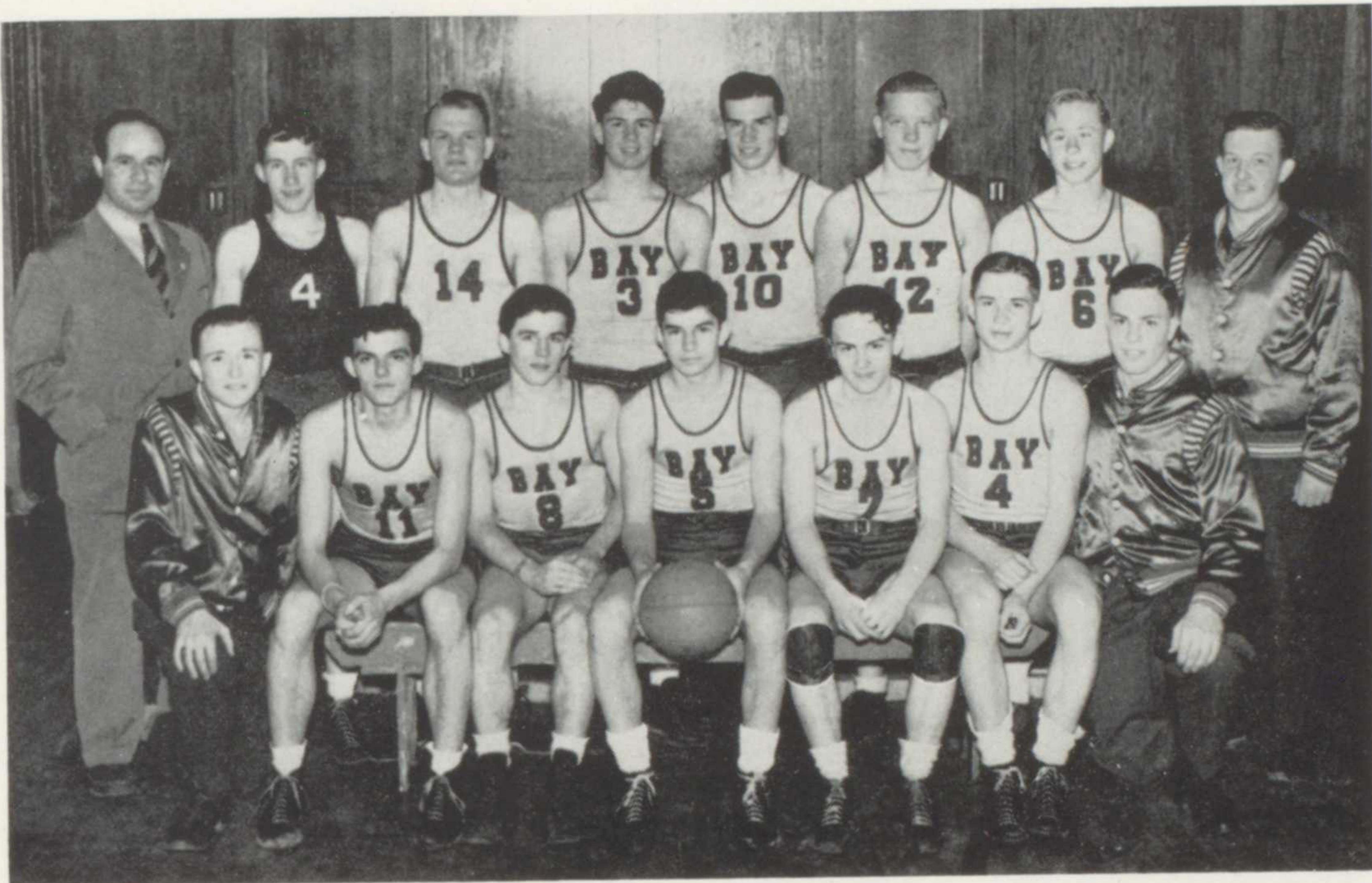
The highlight of the season came when the team went to a camp in Chagrin Falls a week before the start of school to go through an extensive football training program.

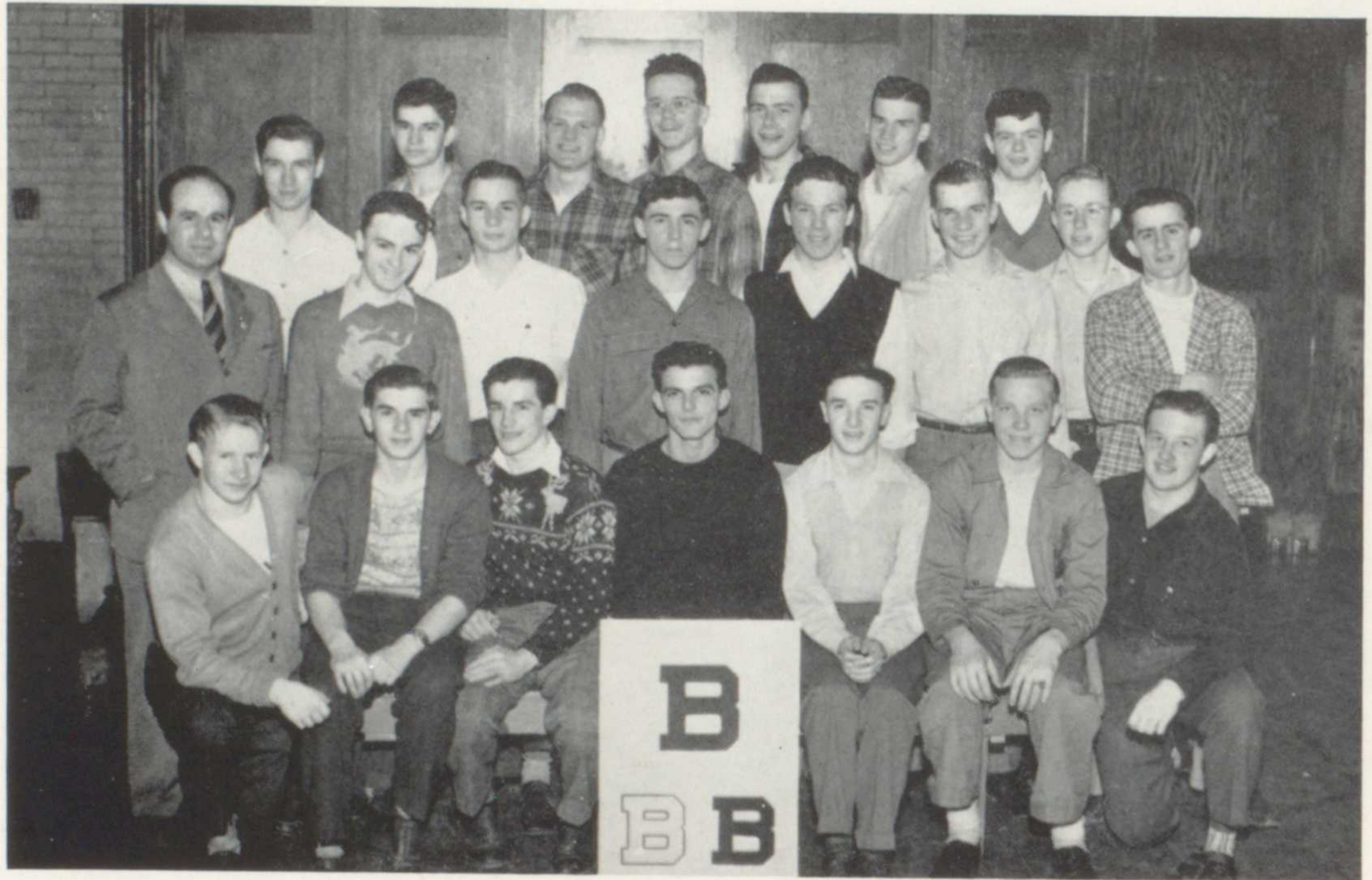

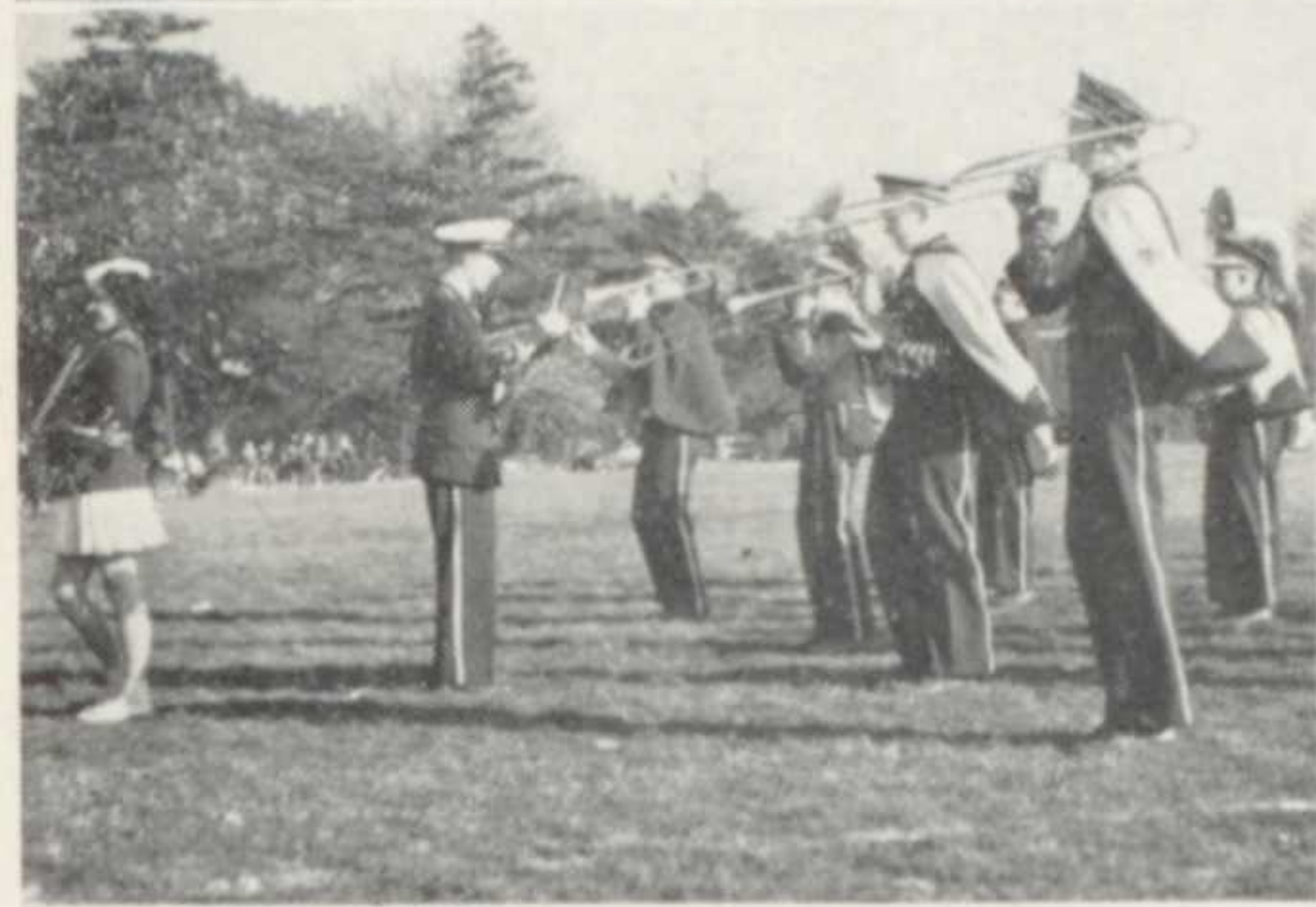

1933—Two circuses were started. The Forestview had as manager Miss Loomis, and Helen Brueggemann, Harry Buehler, Elizabeth Chandler, Dick Eaton, Harriette Grimes, Bill Krukemeyer, and Jean Rose as stockholders, and the Parkview Brothers, under management of Miss Bonsey, with Don Dunham and Beverley Price holding shares. The play "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" was presented by Forestview for the parents.

1934—Forestview employed Steve Mintos from Brecksville, an artist of the high wire, to add thrills to the show.

1935—A group of trained acrobats teamed up with the show—Marcia McDonough from Shaker Heights; Rita Walsh and Don Kenat from Cleveland; Jack Schwing from a side show in Westlake; and also the well-known strong man, Ed Brown from Lakewood, who courted his girls by leaving chewing gum and flowery notes in their desks. In their free time the performers liked to indulge in a game or two of "boys catch the girls."

1936—This year all the performers were starred in "Sunny of Sunnyside," an operetta, as a chorus of cooks. Many will never forget when, upon their cue, only the second line went on. The rest felt so bad the whole performance had to be given over again. Douglas Burke entered the ground crew.

1937—Popcorn, peanuts, crackerjack, chewing gum, a-n-d cotton candy. The famed peanut vendor, Howard Rankin of Lakewood, joined the circus along with the thin man, Fred Mersback from Rocky River, and Ruth Bohland, a snake charmer (well,—charmer, anyhow) from Westlake's side show. A big event occurred this year when Parkview Brothers merged with Forestview. Naturally love sprang up between the boys and the beautiful queens of the trapeze. In fact, there were so many lovely girls that Don Dunham and Jack Schwing had to keep lists in order to recall whom they liked best.

1938—Bill Bowles, and his group of trained seals, joined Parkview Brothers and Forestview. Several trips were made to improve the mind this year. They visited the Cleveland Press, the Museum of Natural History, and also made a trip to the circus (to get some pointers, of course). Marcia McDonough had one class party; for another everyone went skating at City Ice and Fuel; and for a third party, all went coasting on the "nutcracker," behind the Library, imbibing hot cocoa afterwards. Howard Rankin was the "Sinatra" of the class with his "swoonderful" version of "Deep Purple" and (tsk, tsk) several boys got "U" in citizenship for smoking in the woods.

1939—Nancy Norton, from Lorain, and Lucy Reep, from Sheffield Lake—two lovely ladies of the trapeze—joined just in time for initiation. Everyone had a flare for baseball, and even the class party was a baseball game.

1940—A bevy of beautiful bareback riders secured a position with the circus this year: Donna Knowles, Marty Reiner, and Lois Martin from Lakewood, and Joan Messenger and Shirley Sedlon from Cleveland. Two fierce wolves were also acquired: one named Dale Dombey, and the other named Bob Bellan. How much older were the actors this year! They could initiate the seventh graders. The girls cooked the dinner for the class party. Pictures of the group were taken and even used by the Cleveland Press.

1941—Three clowns: Bill Schaible from Rocky River;, Norman Albers

from Westlake, and Ernie Hanmer from Cleveland; joined. Also came a fat lady, Ruth Hagedorn (who's kidding?) from Westlake. The male performers took the girls to lunch, and the girls took the boys, at the suggestion of Miss Johnson. The class party was a beach party at Woodson's beach.

1942—An outstanding party was given at the clubhouse for the parents, teachers, and the pupils. Bob Christofferson left for the Coast Guard which brought the war closer to home. Eileen Clark and Laverne Ross, Siamese twins (well, they do stick together) joined the troupe. Also Ned Rogers, from Lakewood, became a barker for the side show.

1943—"Nick of the Woods" or "Telie the Renegade's Daughter" was the junior play in which Howard Rankin, in the act of being "tetotatiously explunctified," broke his arm. Jean Martin, from Lakewood, brought her team of elephants for the elephant dance. The annual Junior-Senior Prom was a big success and enjoyed by all. Harry Buehler left for the Navy; Douglas Burke left for Bullis School, in Silver Springs, Maryland; and Bob Woodson left for Florida Military Academy, St. Petersburg, Florida.

1944—The senior year was a glorious one and the grand finale was on May thirty-first. With many a tear, the performers left the rings for larger fields in the world, fields exacting even more dexterity and true artistry.
