MR. WILBUR J. SPRINGER

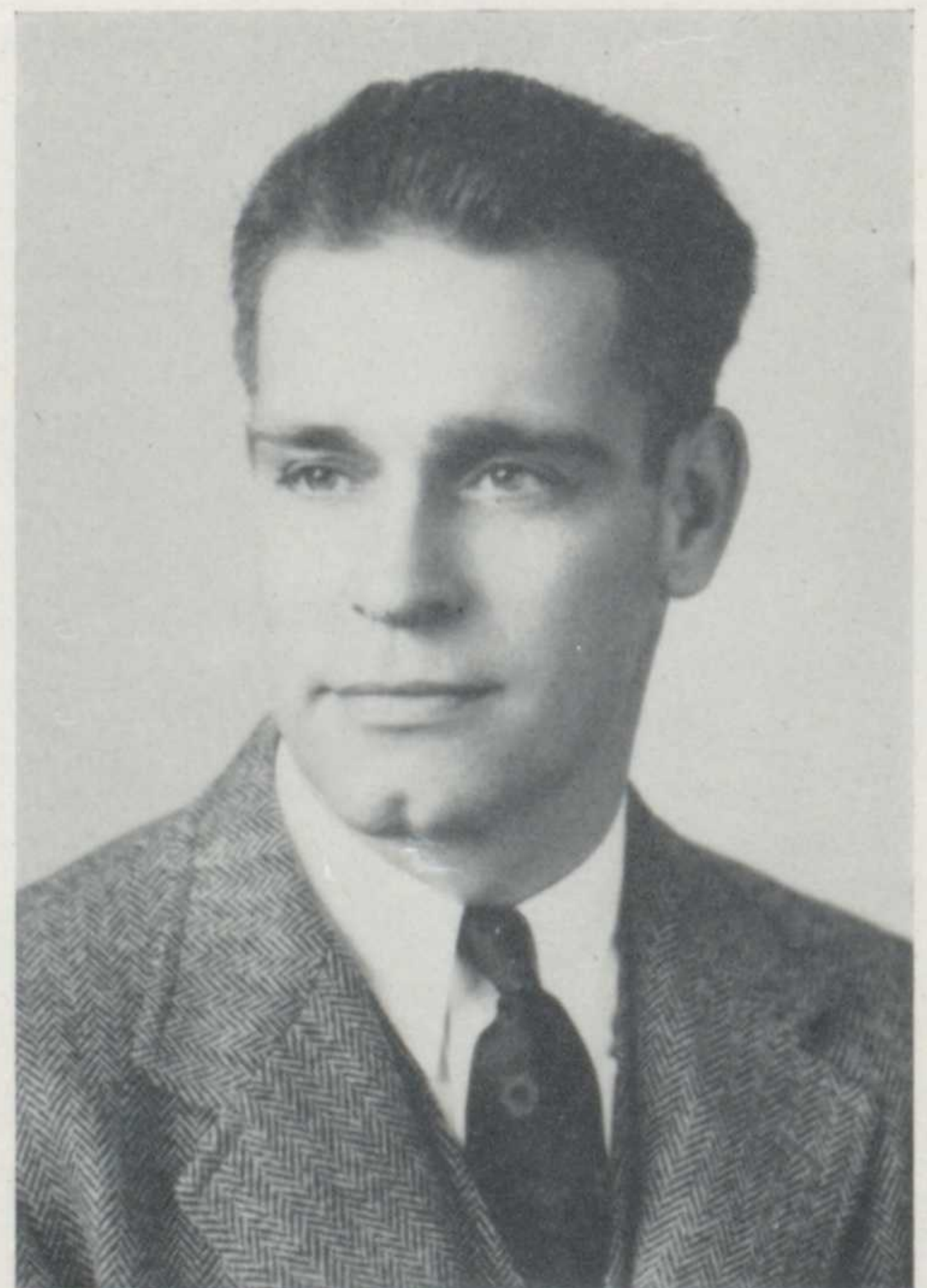

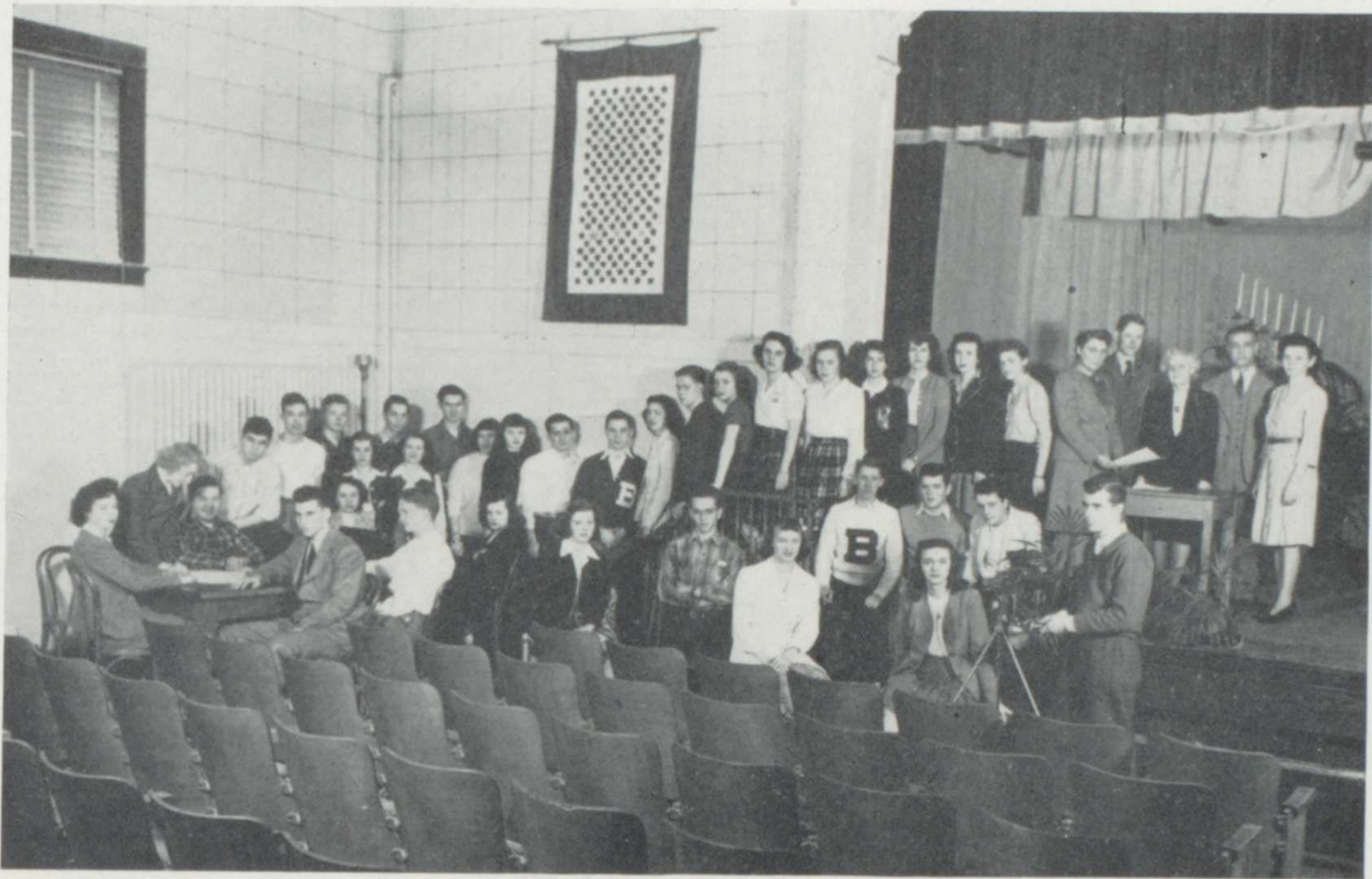
The Bay window has made definite advances this year. The biggest step was the reconversion from mimeographed issues to printed issues.
