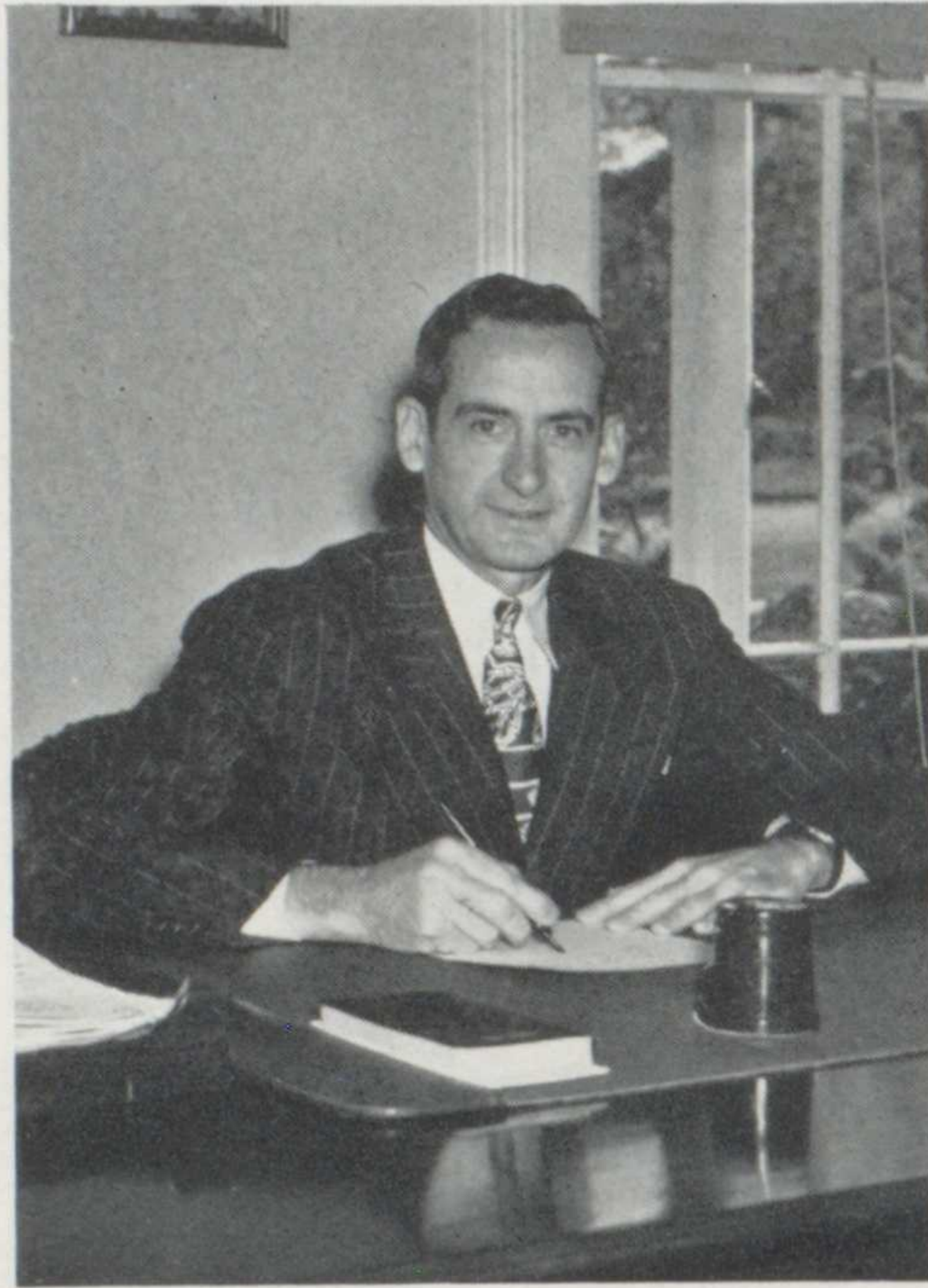


## BAY VILLAGE SCHOOLS

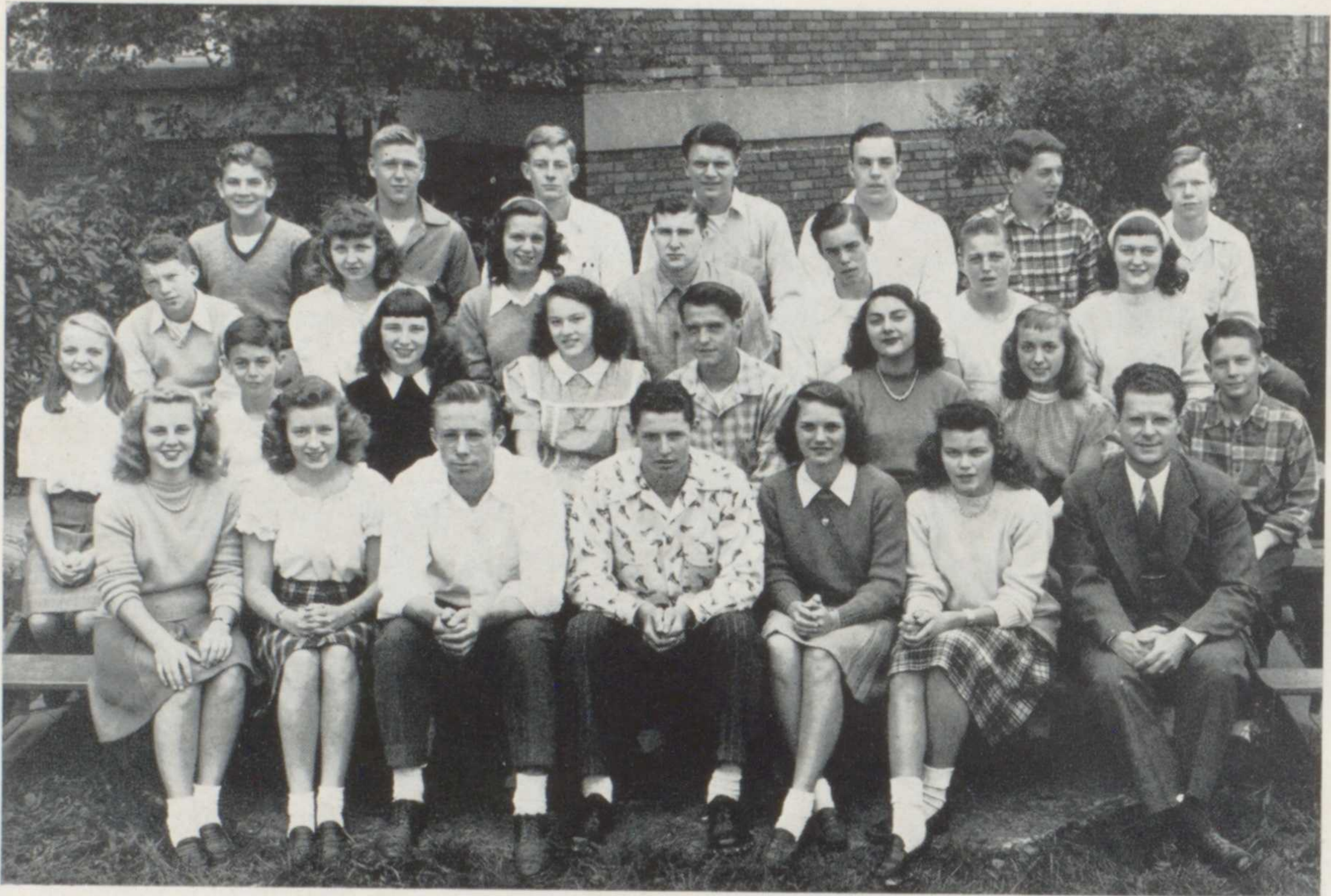

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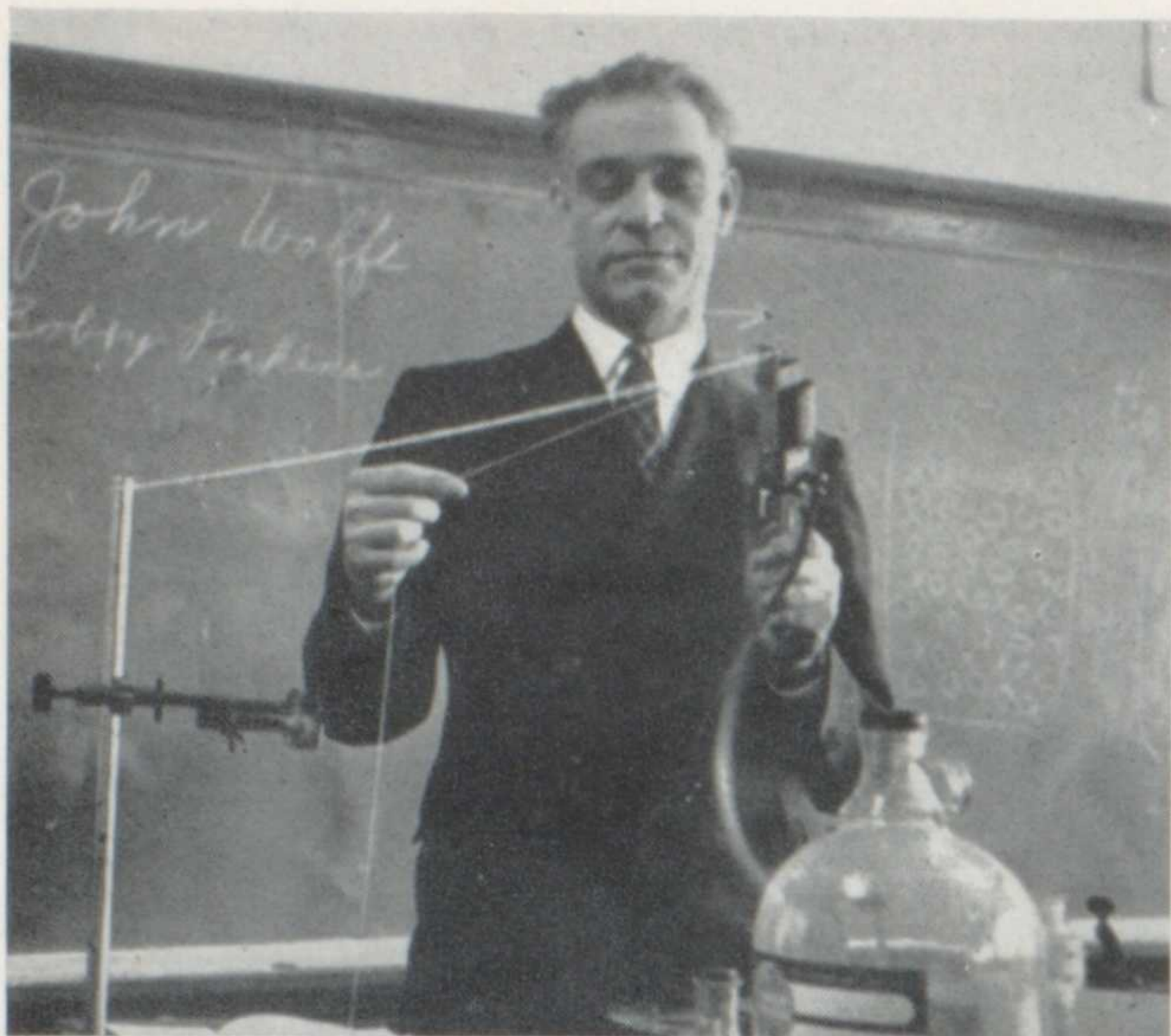
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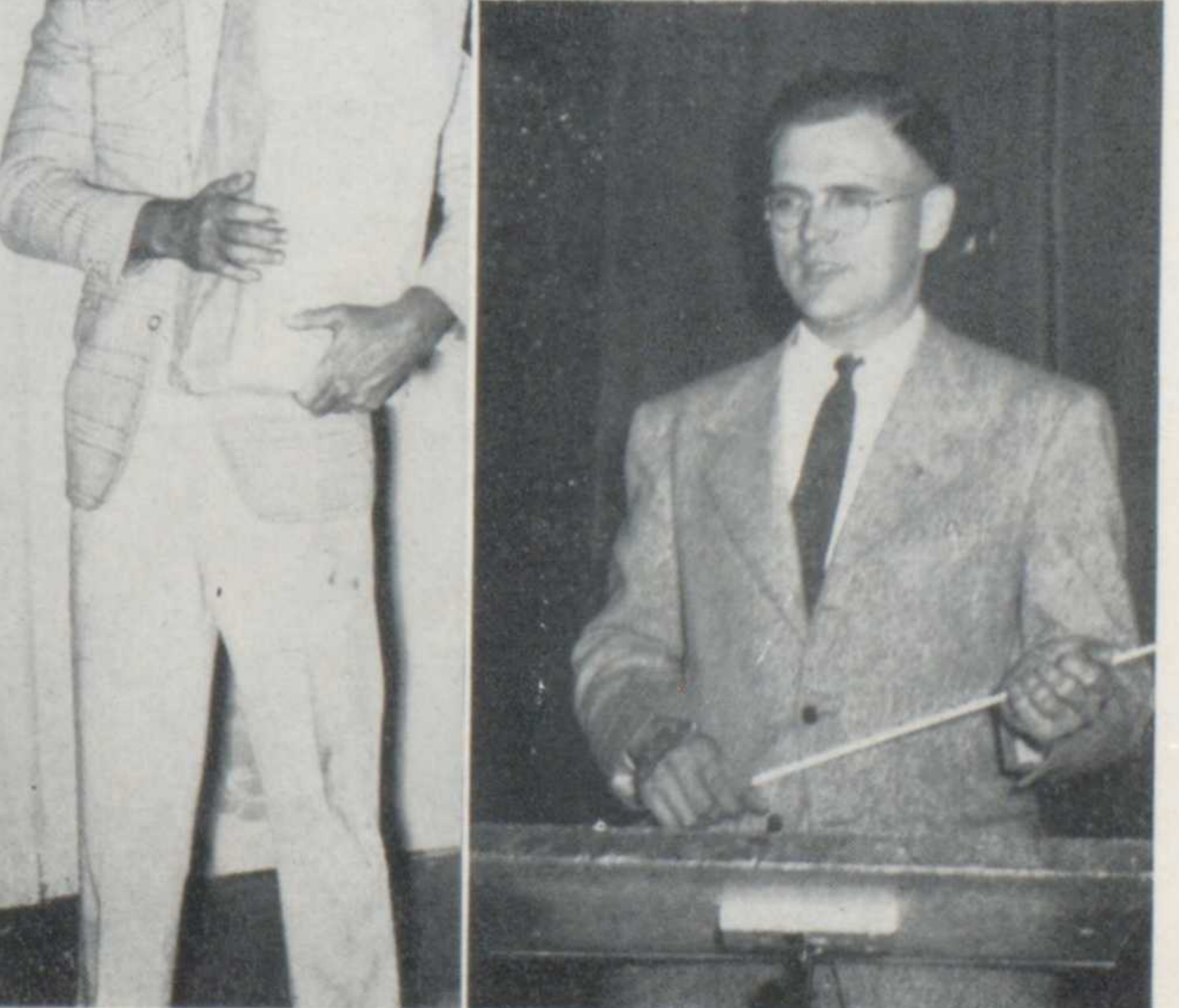
## CALENDAR

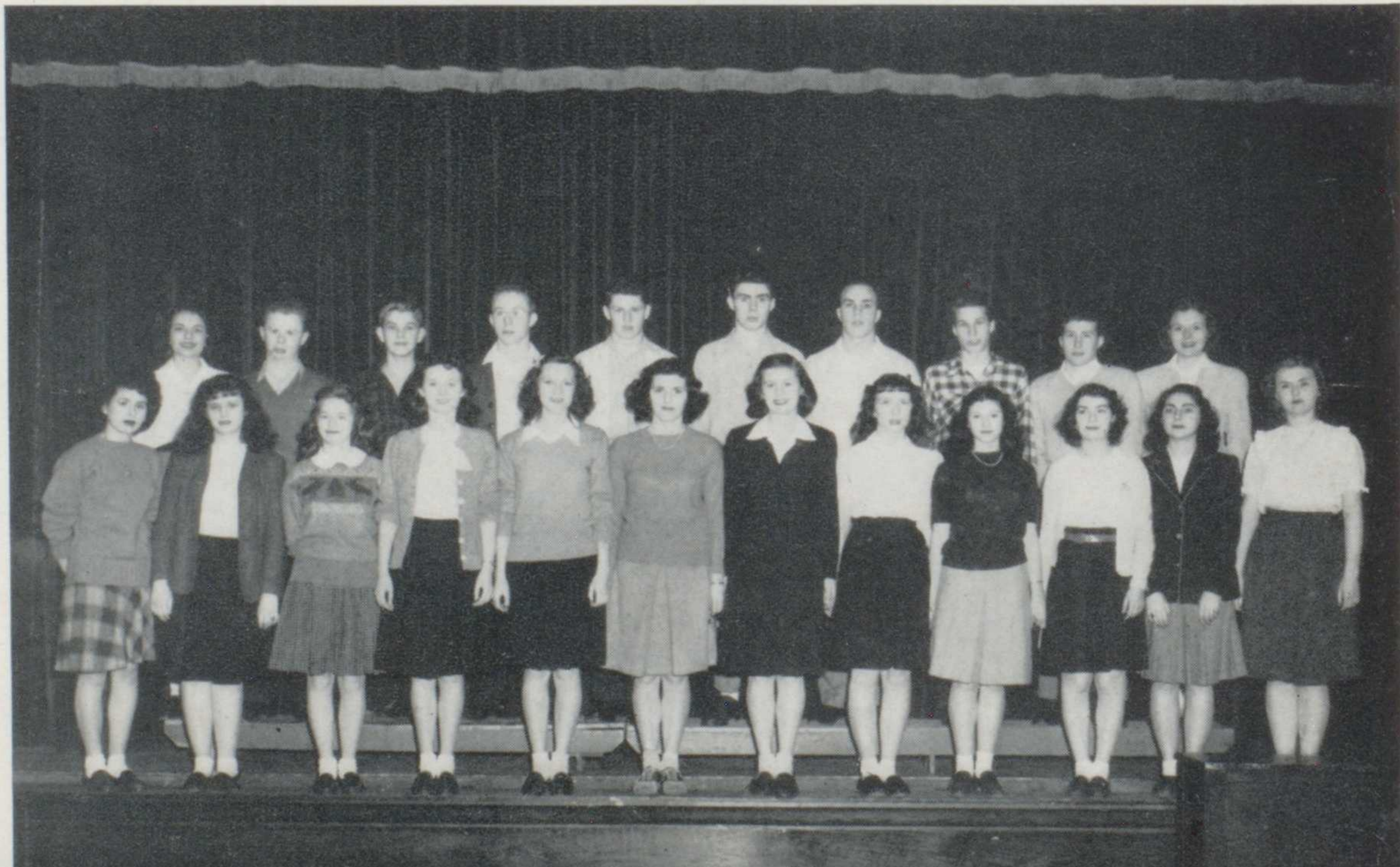

At the beginning of the football season, Bay's team washed the slate clean, promising themselves that whatever success or failure had occurred in the past was to be used only as means of inspiration and determination.

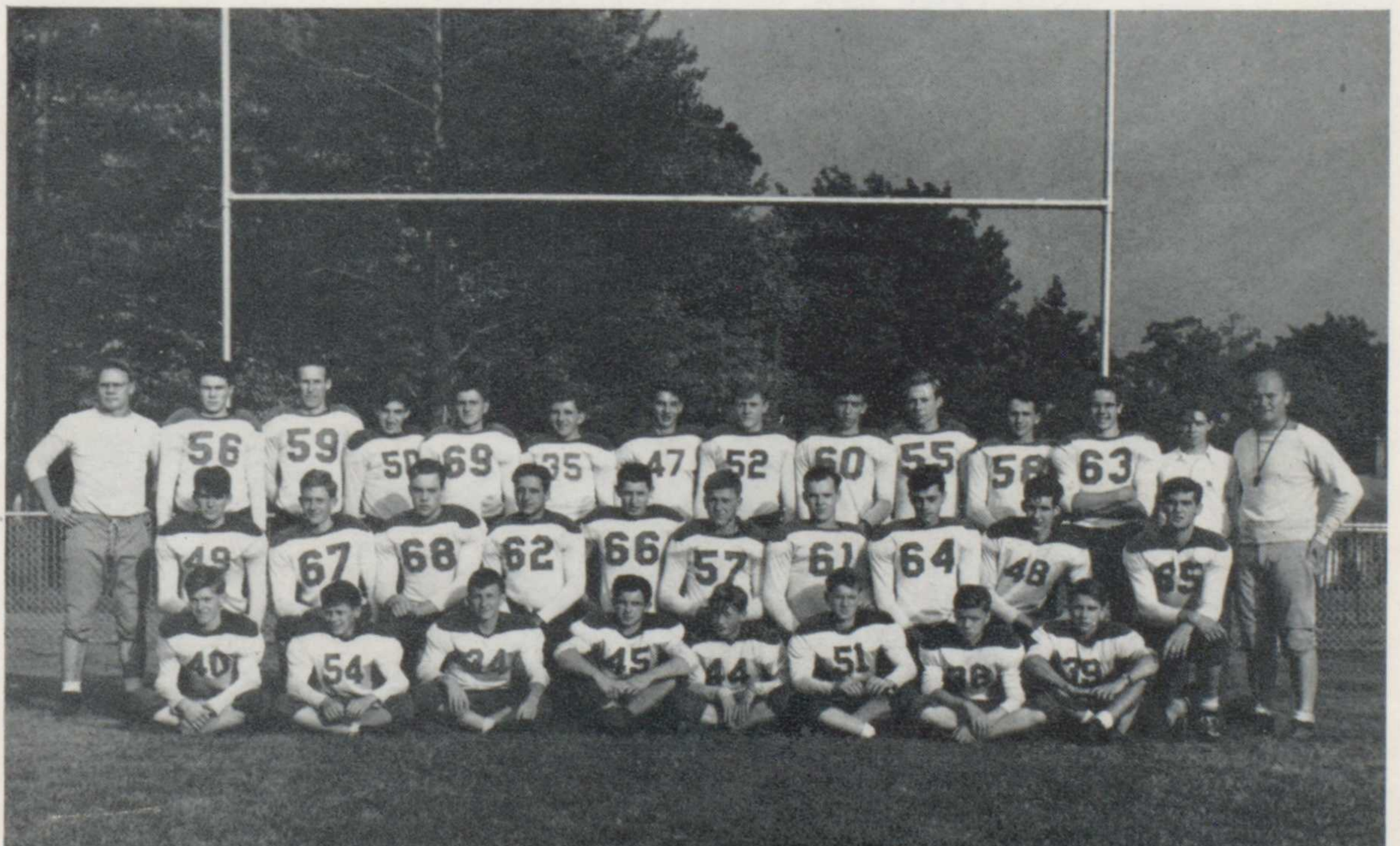
By its work and diligence, the team gave the school, village, and county one of the finest teams in a long while.

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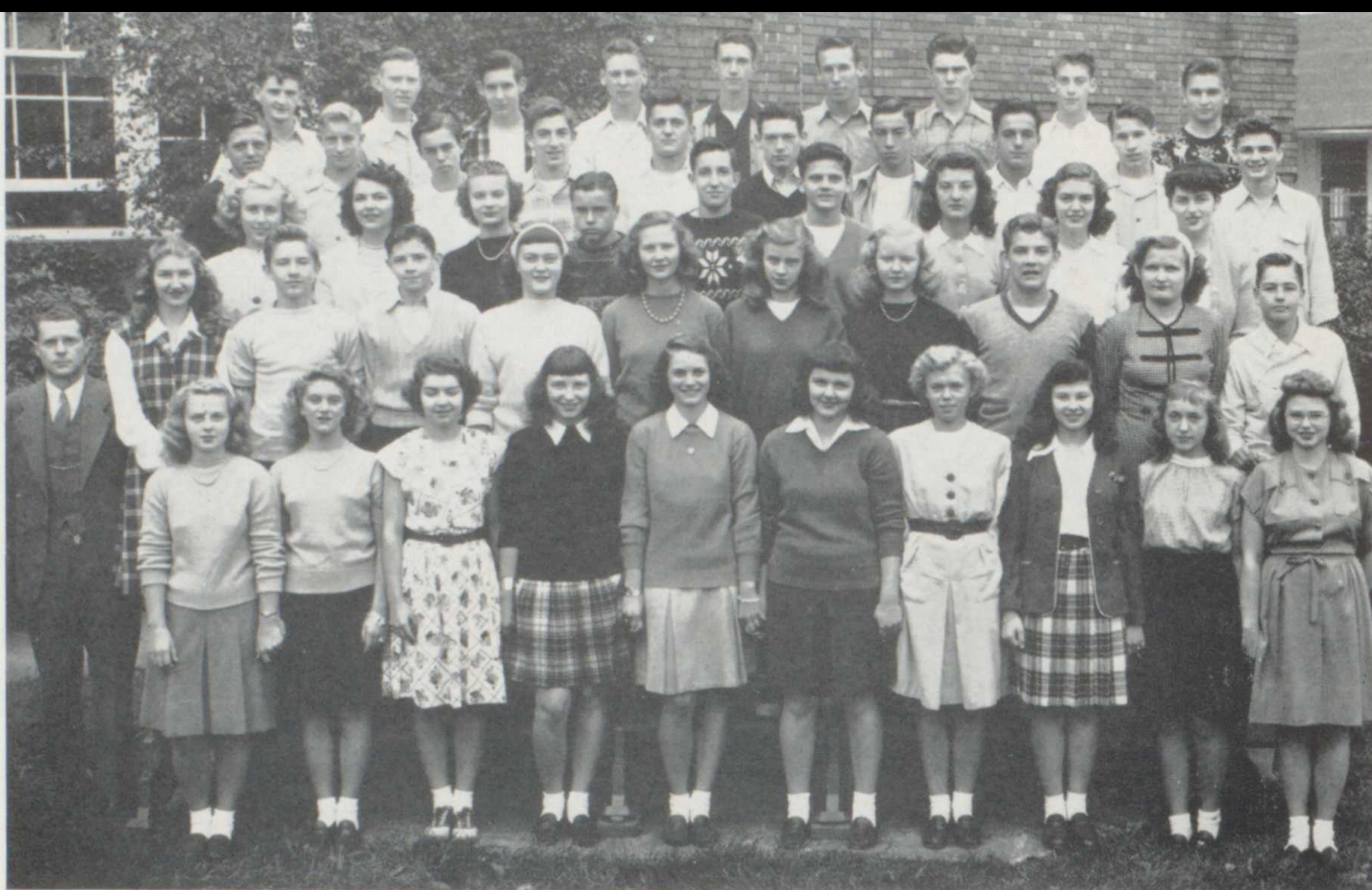

The picture now blending with the newly decorated walls of the Park-view library is a gift from this class.

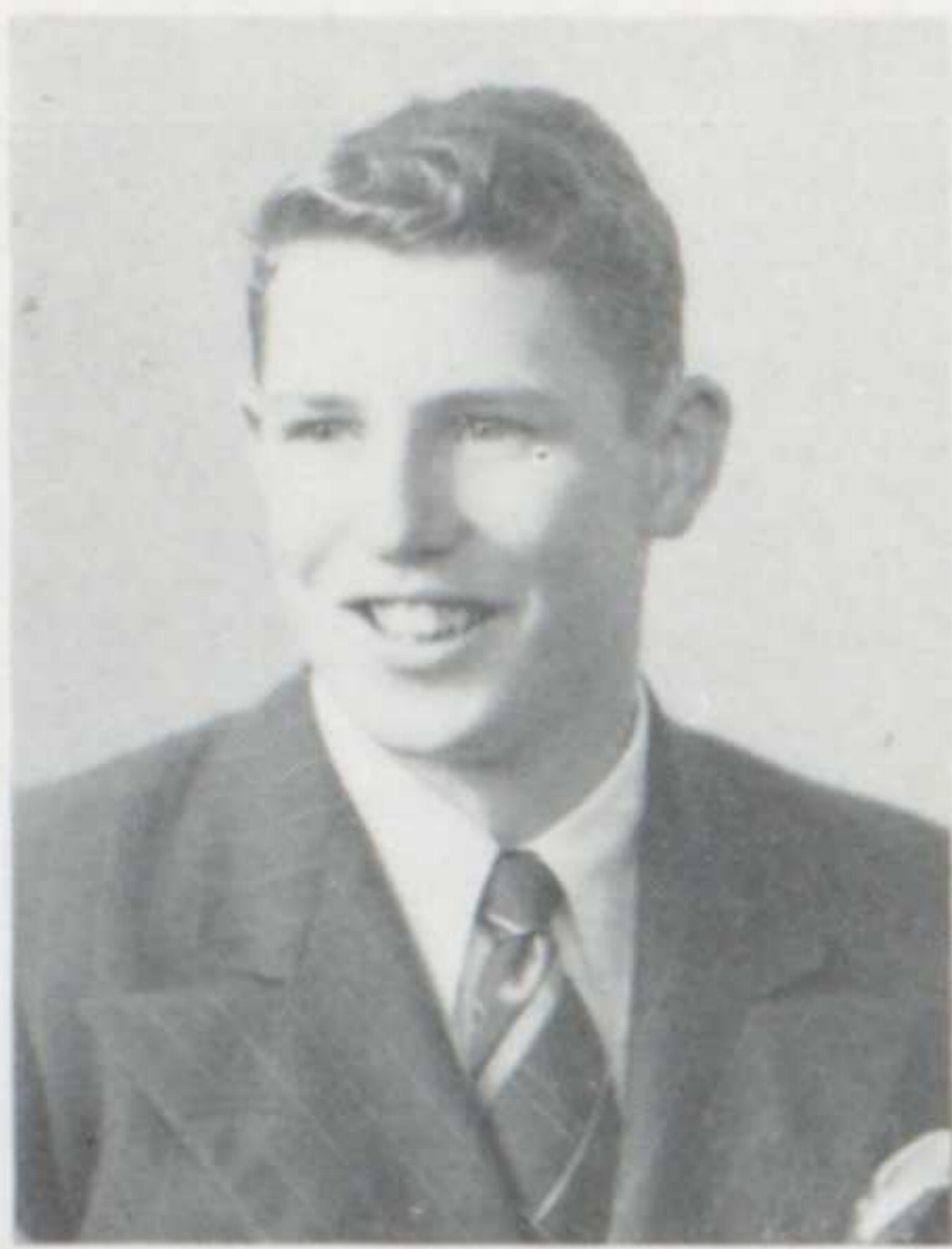

- June 6 — It makes no difference to us; but to the rest of the population of Bay High, school closes officially for three whole months.



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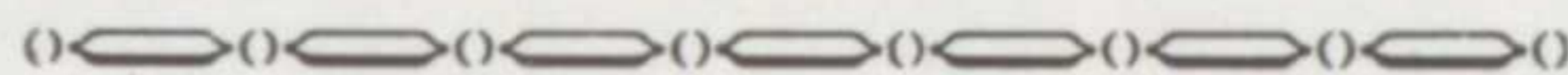
