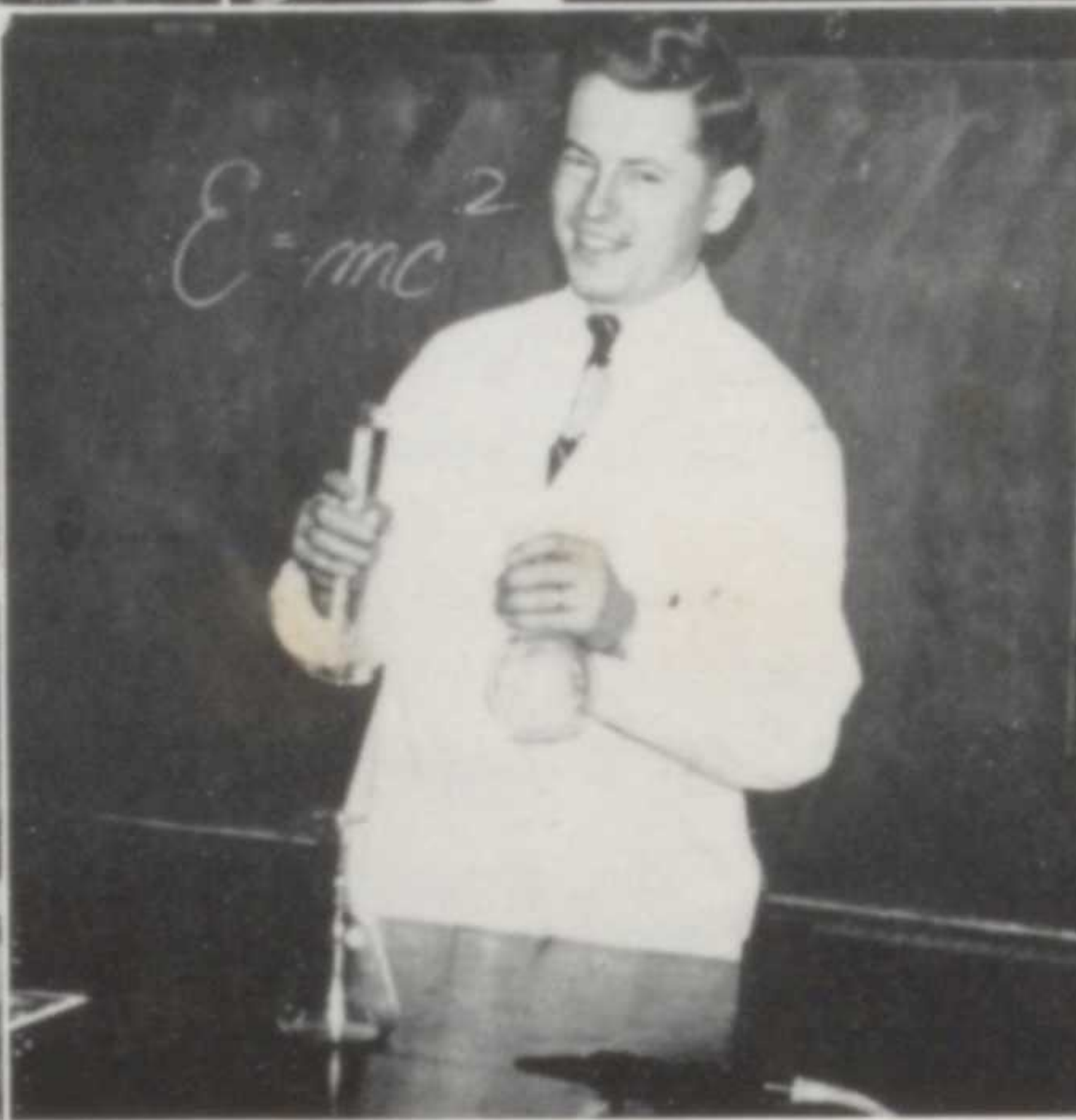
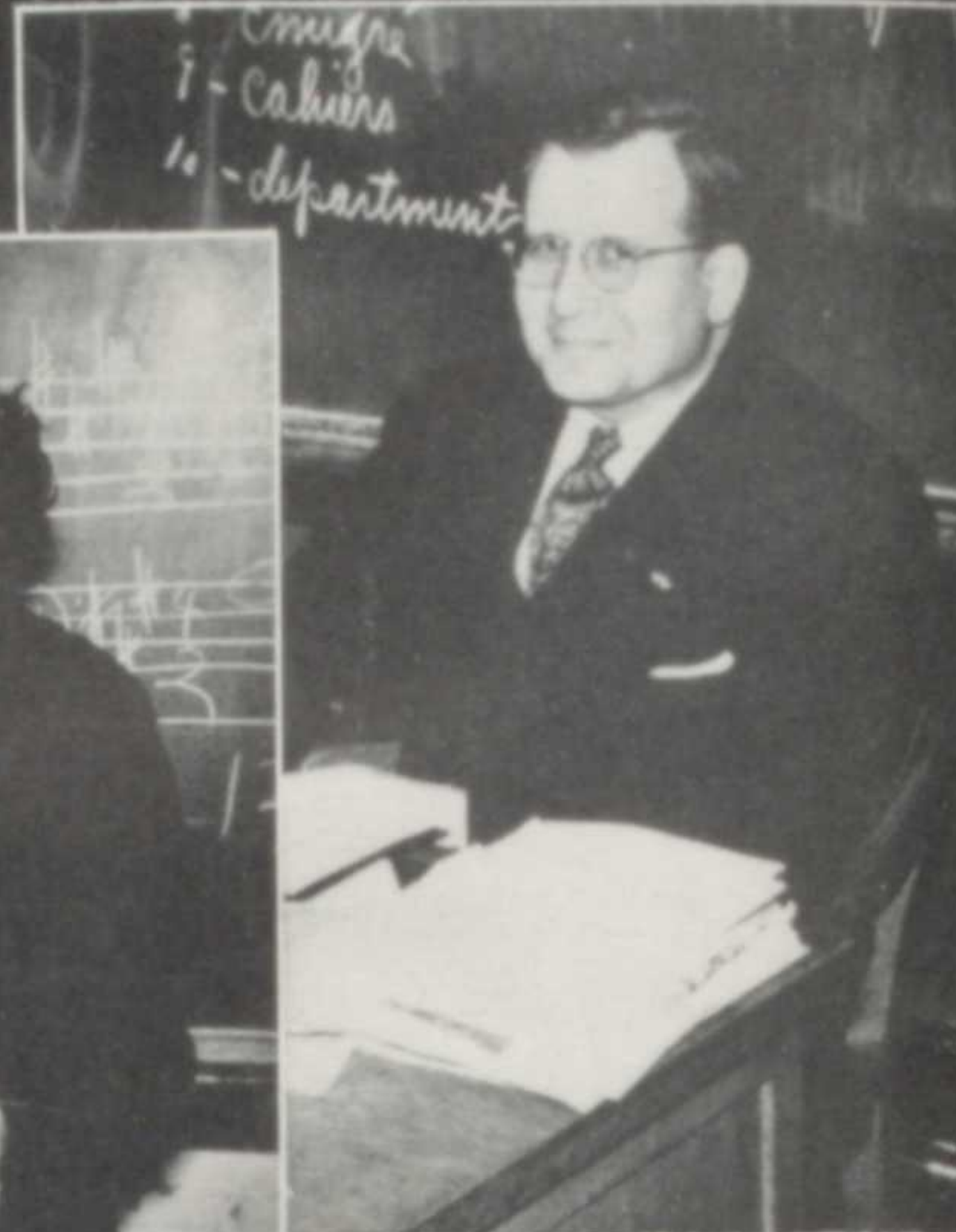
MR. Charles M. Patterson came to Bay Village in 1938. He is a graduate of James Millikin University, and he later obtained his M.A. degree at Ohio State University.

Before becoming principal of Bay High School, he taught American history and government and conducted the vocational guidance program.

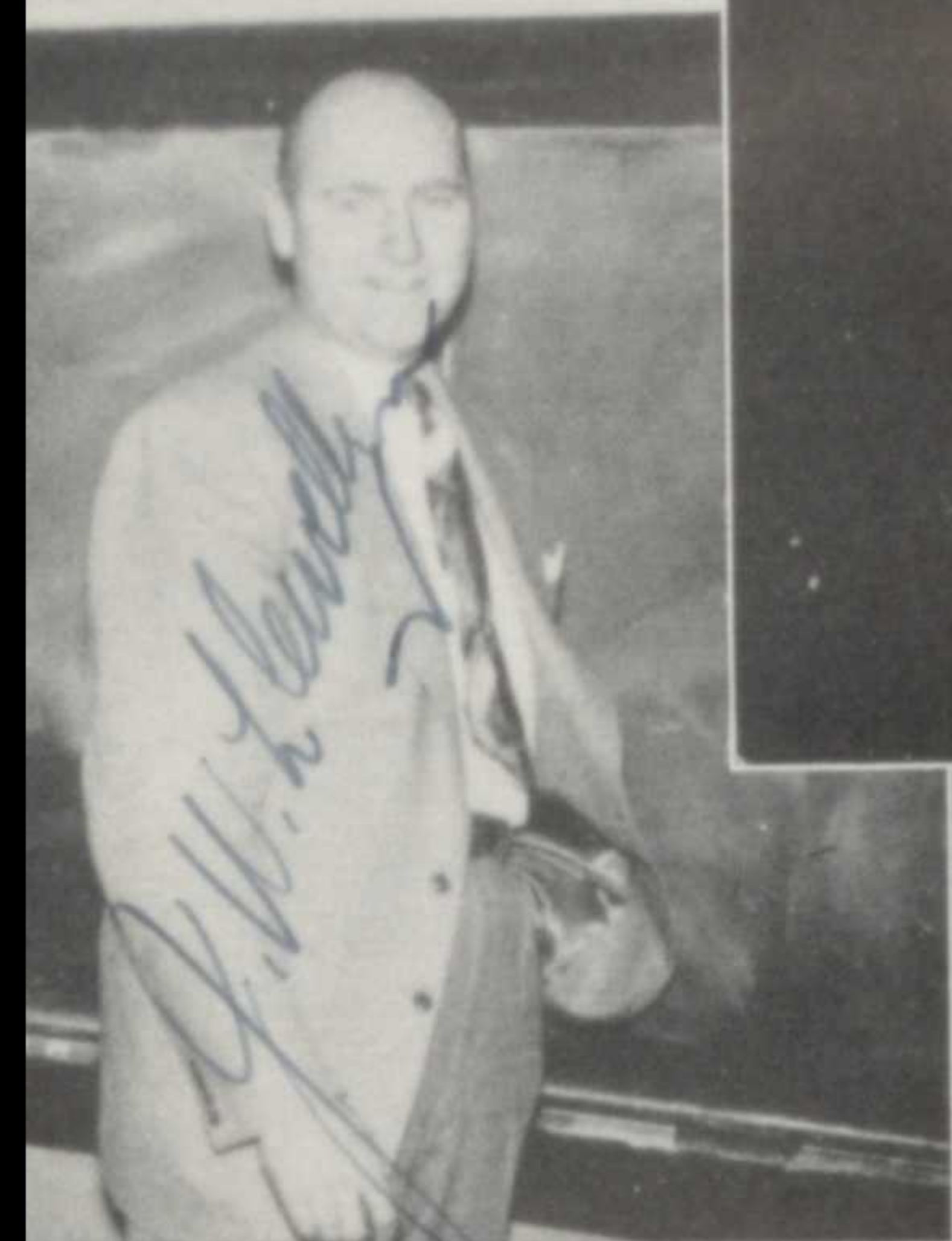
Along with his duties as principal, he is a part-time instructor at Western Reserve University, where he does work in vocational guidance.

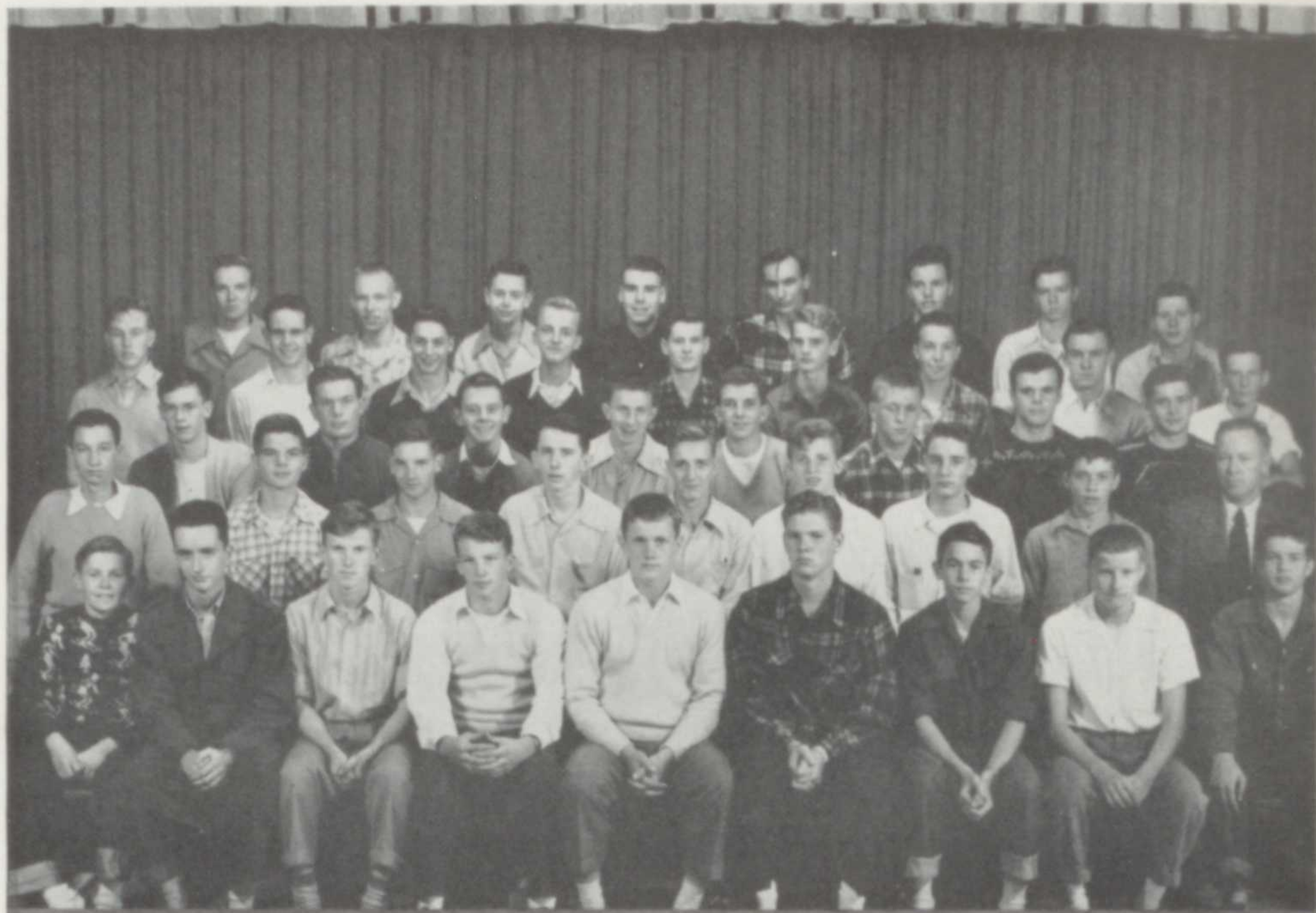
Assembly Committee

Y-Teen Club

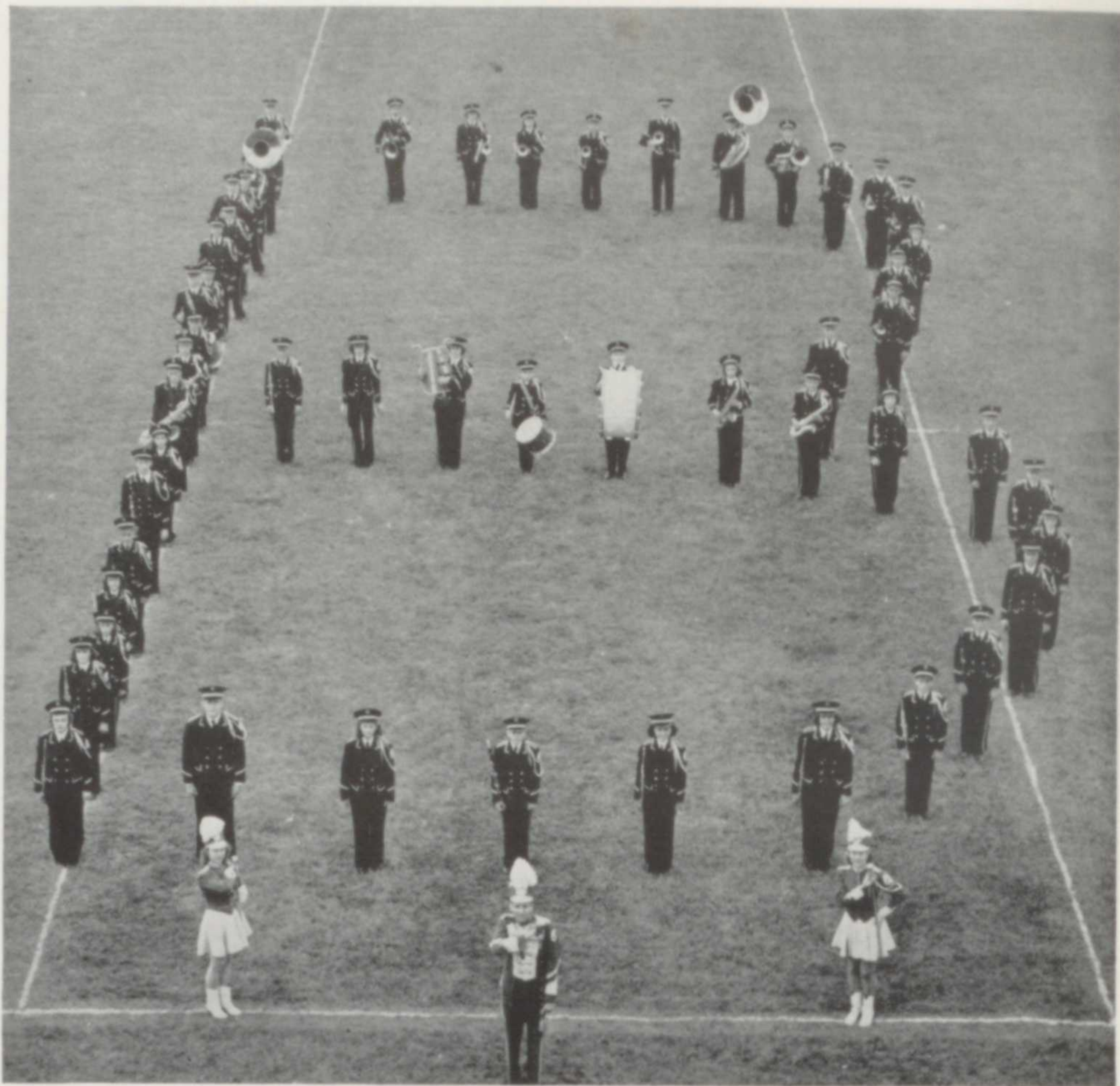

All their activities this year were under the capable direction of Mrs. Georgia Williams, Director of Girls’ Athletics.

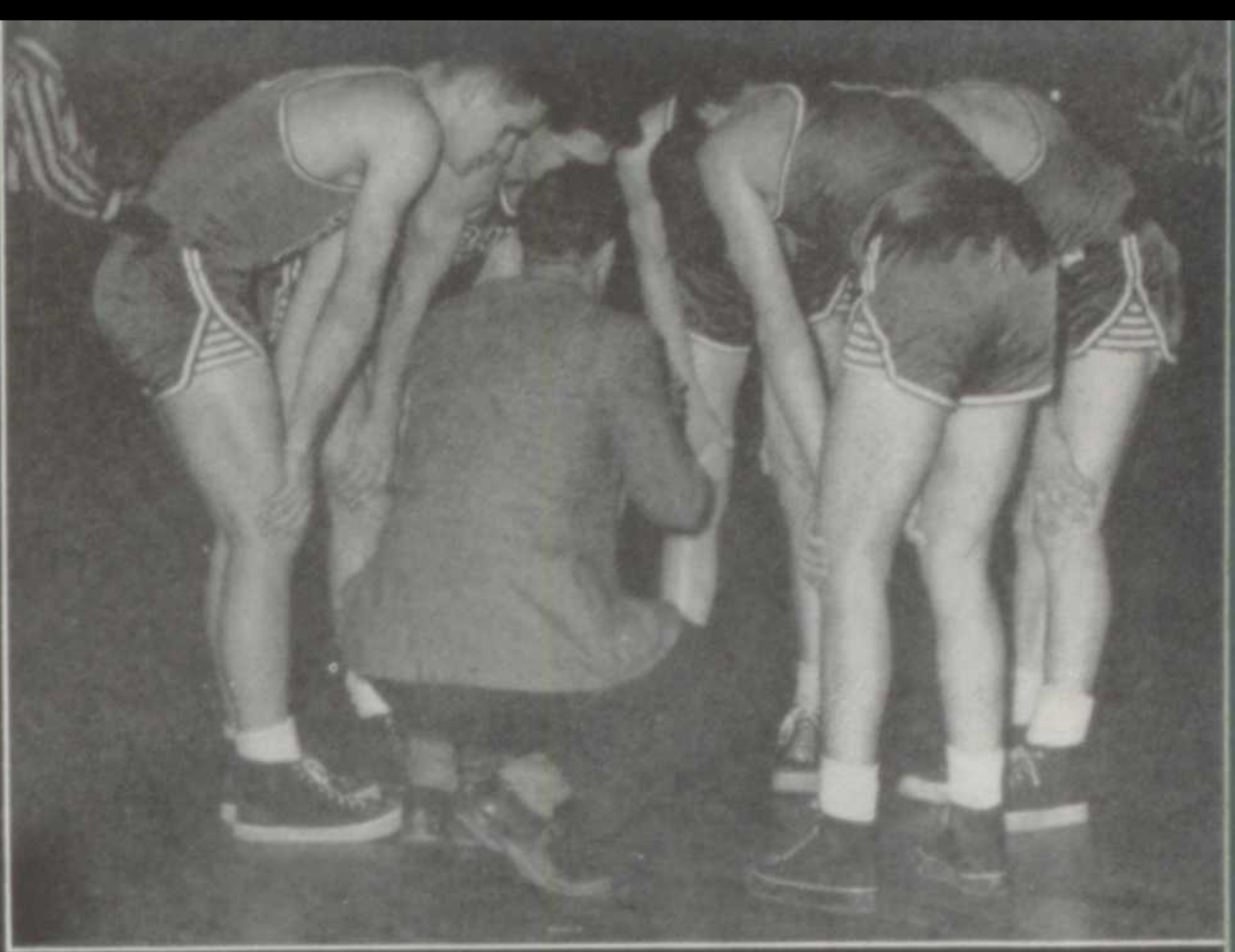

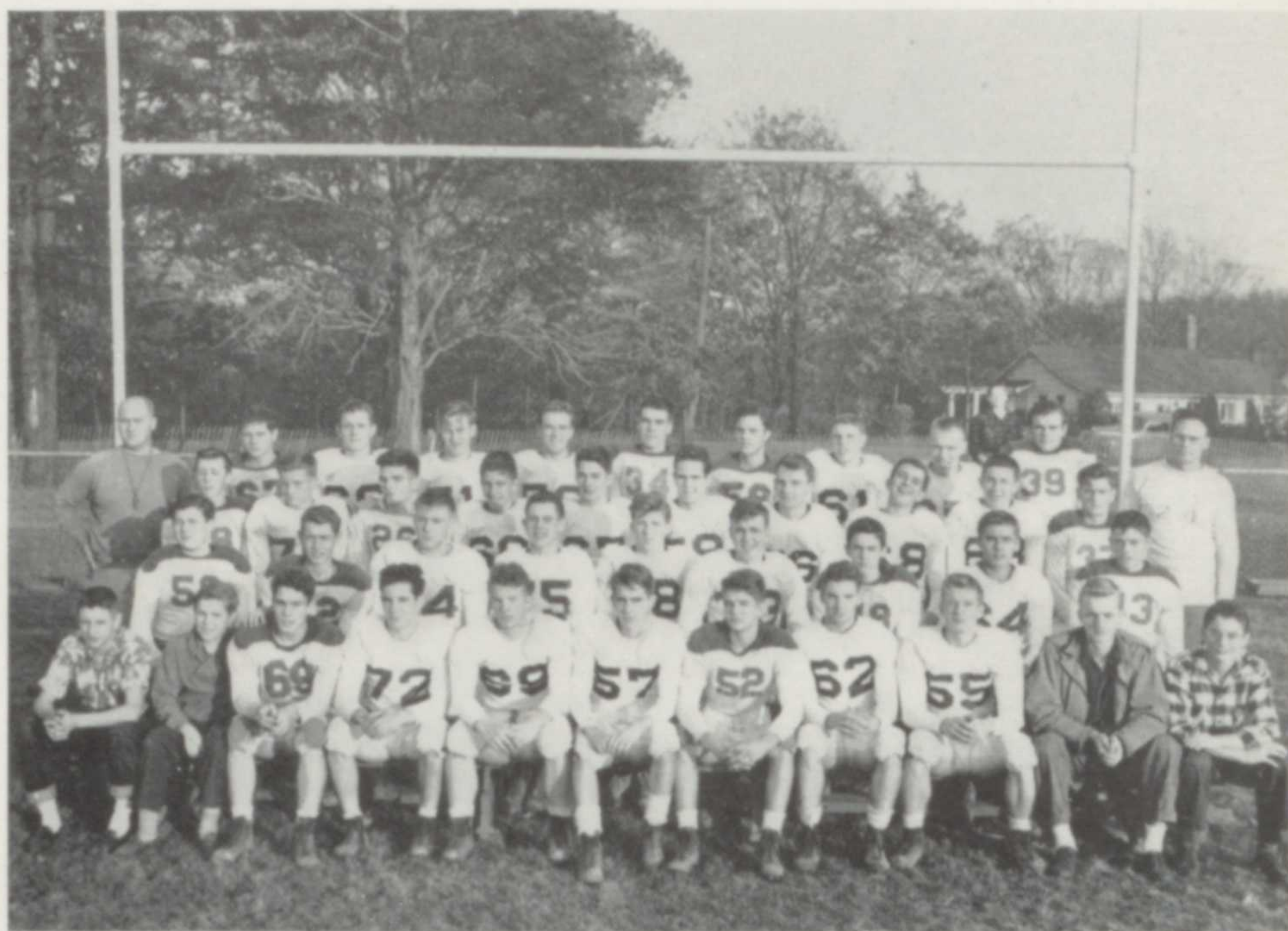

Football Season—1948

WHEN the 1948 football season began, Coaches Jack Llewellyn and Robert Kitzerow didn't dream they'd turn out a team of champions. Knowing that the boys had a lot of spirit and determination, they went to work and produced a team that Bay Village followed with pride.

After playing the Round Robin game at Cuyahoga Heights, it was found that the boys lacked correct blocking knowledge. With this discovery the coaches were able to familiarize the boys with the technique they lacked.

Bay suffered a defeat at the hands of Rocky River in the first game of the season, but they bounded back the next week to defeat Brunswick. After these games, several sophomores and juniors proved themselves capable of playing good football, and Bay was able to have an offensive and defensive unit.

It was found that the seniors on the squad showed unusual ability in organizing a squad that co-operated fully with the coaches. When Bay played Strongsville, last year's champs, they played an almost perfect game. The team went on winning, and the next

week they defeated North Olmsted 27 to 12. During the next two games, the excellent team-spirit was shown and proved. John Springer became ill; Dick Ryan and Jim Norton filled in. These boys did not let the team down; they worked very hard; and, as a result, Bay defeated both North Royalton and Brooklyn.

The most unusual game ever played by the team, or witnessed by the spectators as well as the players, was the Olmsted Falls game which was played in a pea-soup fog. This was a game that was won by the team's desire to win; for with three minutes to play—Bay trailing 6 to 0—Harry Hawks blocked a punt and recovered the ball. Bob Milliken threw a touchdown pass to Tom Redinger, and John Springer converted for the extra point that was needed for winning.

The excitement rose high in the student body as the biggest game of the year loomed ahead. Bay had not been defeated—and neither had Westlake. Bay's team worked hard in order to be in the best of shape for playing this game which would decide the champion of the West Side Cuyahoga

Basketball Season — 1948-49

BAY'S Rockets showed real championship caliber by winning their last three league games in seven days to become undisputed western Cuyahoga basketball champions.

Bay and Westlake were tied for league honor—with each having nine victories and two defeats—as the two neighboring rivals went into the final league game at Bay to decide the championship. Before a record-breaking crowd of 700 people, the Bay sharpshooters thrilled the home fans by defeating their Westlake Demons 47-38.

This year's basketball team, coached by Mr. John Shollenberger, continued to bring honor to our school.

Worthy of mention is the fact that since December 14, 1947, no visiting team has defeated Bay at home. Twenty-one consecutive teams have gone home tasting defeat. Worthy of mention, too, is the fact that Bob Milliken broke Bay's individual scoring record twice by scoring 36 points in the Strongsville game and 37 points in the North Olmsted game. He ended the season with an average of 17.4 points per game.

At the end of the season Bob Milliken and Roland Leavens were honored by being placed on the County all-star team.
