Senior Class History

Early one morning in September, 1943 some one hundred and twenty adoring mothers sent their five-year-old sons and daughters, dressed in new clothes and wearing smiles on their freshly-scrubbed faces, off to kindergarten. This was the beginning of the Class of 1956. Not all of these students started their school years at Bay; they joined the class at various points along the road to commencement, until they all combined to make up the largest graduating class in Bay High's history.

It was a comparatively large class to begin with, so Mrs. Ranney was forced to teach two classes in kindergarten days. What is now the Bay Way used to be part of the school, where the morning and afternoon sessions were held. Jimmy Hill, who loved to talk, exhausted Mrs. Ranney's patience to the extent that she taped his mouth shut. In those days, the kindergartners were anxious to get to class — such enthusiasm does not exit today — but there was a time when Tommy Groth, who in his haste to get off of the school bus, climbed over the seats, causing an uproar. As punishment, his legs were tied together, thus hindering his antics. Kay Nichols, a delinquent at the age of five, was responsible for the breaking of a window in a local real estate office.

In first grade, the class, feeling quite grown up, was soon restored to normalcy by Miss Loomis and Mrs. Eaton, who taught the class to read such informative books as "Happy Days."

In second grade, Mrs. Harrison, Mrs. Swaim, and Miss Herriff took over the unhappy chores of teaching the growing class simple arithmetic equations, which proved very puzzling to Larry Houk.

The third grade apparently was a dull year. About the only thing the class can claim notoriety for was Tom Brennen's hitting Lester Varney over the head with a snow shovel.

In 1947, Glenview opened. Don Bott gained a first for '56 when he carved on a

desk; he paid for the damage from his hard-earned savings. Poor Gary Korsgaard just couldn't make the teachers pronounce his last name correctly, and invariably he was called "Coast Guard." Bob Ford found an easy way to "polish the apple" when he started supplying the teachers and principal with legal-sized yellow paper tablets. About this time, the class was found to have some good female athletes attending Forestview. Some examples cited by Mrs. Gibb were: Nancylee Chappell, a champion sprinter, who also delighted in catching grasshoppers and putting them in inkwells; Sue Marshall, an excellent broad-jumper; Jan Borgia, of Army-Navy game fame; and Nancy Topping, who was a "pro" at baseball. Nancy, however, had already proved her inability to stay on a bicycle, when she fell head first over the handlebars, chipping her two front teeth in the process. Jim Mackner disgraced the class by falling asleep during English. Ed Schaefer contributed to the growing list of "firsts" when he had his appendix removed. Eddie Leetch, adopting some of the high school students' tactics, employed Judy Morrison as a tutor, thereby passing fourth grade.

Mrs. Lutz at Forestview and Miss Byrd at Glenview took the fifth graders in tow and introduced something new — morning exercises. Jean Disbrow brought honor to the class by winning a "Weekly Reader" poetry prize.

Sixth grade found the class divided into three divisions — two at Forestview and one at Glenview. The fad of the day was movie books, which were traded back and forth. The opening of the shopping center caused much excitement.

A street dance, which was a girls' bid affair, provided the social activities of the year, as the girls rushed to be the first to ask curly-haired Paul Patterson. Mr. Gervason, one of the teachers at Forestview, was called out of the class one day, never suspecting that all of the students knew that his wife had had a baby. They had

taken up a collection and bought a blue blanket for the new member of the Gervason family, a boy. Miss Rowbotham, the music teacher, had the class form a line, and the one closest to the blushing Mr. Gervason presented him with the gift. Sixth grade arithmetic was highlighted at Forestview by many home-baked cakes, which were eagerly devoured while the class was learning to multiply and divide fractions. Jim Hill became known as an elementary authority on baseball that year; and Miss Perkinson 'met up' with George Hooper, who persisted in saying, "Miss Perkinson, that's not the way we did it in Wilmington, Delaware." Tony Dindia, already built like a fullback, proved an able captain of the Glenview Safety Patrol. The class got a glimpse of high school life as the Glenview division appeared in the Christmas program for the PTA, and the Forestview classes appeared in pastel dresses and suits for the spring concert. Marty Schuller became a Rembrandt, as his fellow classmates strove to duplicate his artistic masterpieces. The "senior year" of grade school was drawn to a close with much jubilation, with one of the main events of the year being the last of the Army-Navy games. The Forestview girls, strengthened by strong-armed Jan Borgia, defeated the Glenview girls, led by Peggy Sterling. Glenview fared better in the boys' division, however; and the game almost stopped when Jimmy Dudley showed up to watch his son, Doug, help bring a victory to Glenview.

Seventh grade brought new horizons. The class was oriented to the fact that upperclassmen were given preference, no matter what, as eighth grade girls introduced the feminine portion of the class to "Dink Day." Toward the end of the year, Miss Rowbotham discovered potential qualities in Rita Wetzel's voice; and Rita started on her road to a musical career.

In eighth grade some of the girls decided that all female members of the class should wear colored socks to school — something which they had not done since

grade school days. This attempt ended in failure, however, and by noon the only ones seen sporting colored socks were those who neglected to bring along a pair of white ones. "Evangeline" notebooks were the big projects of the year, although the teachers noted similarities in many. The girls gained modeling experience as they appeared in Mrs. Chandler's style show that spring.

Ninth grade proved to be the first of four golden years of high school, as the class sought to decline Latin nouns while memorizing "Friends, Romans, Countrymen!" Some of the girls just had to see a J-V football game in September so badly that they called two Westlake cabs, which delivered them on the doorstep of Rocky River Junior High School in record time. Marilyn Alexander captained a winning softball team to victory during the summer, while Jean Disbrow and Lindsay Chichester were outstanding in Junior Olympics participation. Lindsay set an unofficial record of 4 feet 3 inches in the high jump, and later tried to better this, which proved to be her downfall as she wound up in the hospital.

The boys of the class found a new friend in Barry Fox, a bedridden rheumatic fever patient who moved to Bay from Toledo in ninth grade. Barry was later able to attend Bay High classes; but to the disappointment of his fellow classmates, he moved from Bay Village a year later. Before leaving, however, he donated a beautiful map to the school.

The class took on a landscaping project as a part of their general science course, under the guidance of Mr. "D.," as they endeavored to transform the village dump, since filled, into a beauty spot in one day. While the boys dug holes and planted trees and shrubs, the girls planted grass seed. Conservation reports soon followed, which were the toughest projects yet, as far as the freshmen were concerned.

Sandy Bently, a girl who has lived practically everywhere in the village, was taken

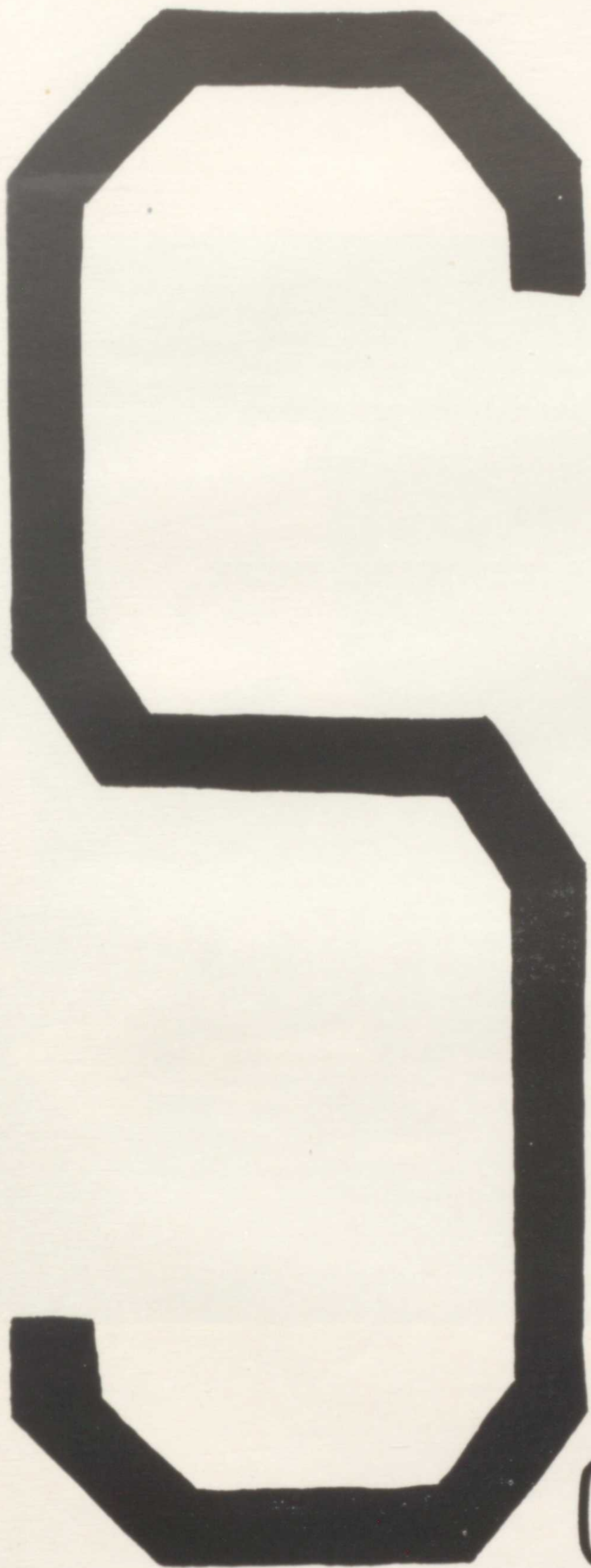

aback when she found a street light in front of the door — and Sandy Spang's friends found they had no trouble in finding her driveway—they just looked for the "Bump" sign. Dexter Jacobson was responsible for a siege of peroxide blondes when it was rumored that he bleached his hair. The class was privileged in having four girls lead the band majorettes. Pat Kessler, Cornelia Korney, Melvina Meether, and Helene Pirnat were so honored; and the following year Cornelia became head majorette. Six ambitious girls formed the Choralettes, a singing group, in the ninth grade; and one of Jan Sandrock's talents — her ability to play the violin — was discovered the same year. Spring vacation proved to be a bad time, as Jean Disbrow and Al Bruscano broke their wrists, while Tom Henry came down with an acute case of appendicitis. Nancy Reese accidentally -on-purpose dumped Ivory soap flakes in a dishwasher in home economics class, producing dishes that were 99 44/100% pure.

Tenth grade found the fellows gaining interest and yards in sports as Alex Bruscano, Lanny Dey, Doug Dudley, Stan Feeley, Tom Henry, Larry Houk, Dexter Jacobson, Paul Patterson, Dave Hinz, and Dud Weider received their first letters in varsity football. Dud Weider proved his athletic skill as he skated his way to fame among the country's top ten of the speed skating world. The girls got into the swing of things, too, as thirty-seven tried out in the cheering contest. After what seemed like weeks of waiting, the fortunate three were announced: Kay Nichols, Janet Sandrock, and Sally Wheeler. Gwen Hughes reluctantly moved to Toledo only to return a month later with the glad tidings

that her father had been transferred back to Cleveland again.

The junior year found the Class of '56 gleefully taking advantage of the fact that they were upperclassmen. Carl Roth was one of the first of the boys who bought cars of their own, which they "souped up" with dual pipes, Hollywood mufflers, etc. Dave Nemec returned from Florida, and he proved a valuable addition to the football, basketball and baseball teams. The class ordered rings and jackets; and then eagerly awaited their delivery. Jerry Pflieger, selling \$418 worth of magazine subscriptions in the yearly drive, was awarded a Smith-Corona typewriter, thus proving the merits of his Fuller Brush training. Football glory went to "Autograph" Jacobson's head; while "Pizza" Dindia, "Smiley" Maxfield, Doug Dudley, and Susanne Graham were among those who performed at the dinner-dance party at Lakewood Country Club, celebrating Bay's championship in its first year in the Southwestern Conference. Liz Gustason, who has aspirations of being a nurse, didn't get off to a good start. She suffered a slight brain concussion when she fainted after taking a blood test at Bay View Hospital. Demonstration speeches in public speaking classes reached a climax when Nancy Lee Chappell washed the little bit of hair that Matt Clark had for a demonstration of "Pink Shampoo." John Rix, one of the inventors of the class, rigged up a motor-gadget on a pencil sharpener, which gave some girls quite a shock when they tried to sharpen their pencils. Myrna Whiteman became the subject of all first year typing classes when she typed sixty-five words a minute without error — this immediately discouraged the students, rather than encouraged them. Sue La-

Londe took her shoes off once too often in typing class, and they were next seen in the hall, courtesy of Mrs. Oelschlager. Russ Carson was awarded the Kitzerow gold star (a great honor) when he came to class equipped with both paper and pencil. The theme, "Paradise on Earth," was unveiled to the guests; and a chicken dinner was served preceding dancing in the beautifully transformed gymnasium. Parties at Sally Lease's, Jan Keller's, and Al Bruscinio's homes were held afterward until six o'clock in the morning. There was also dancing on the tennis courts.

The senior year got off with a bang, as many parties were given. Some outstand-

ing ones were: Bob Perkin's Rock and Roll Party, at which Mr. Colbert hypnotized Gail Maddock; Lindsay Chichester's surprise birthday party for Rosemary Bunt; and Nancy Reese's, which was "marred" by the fact that Cornelia Korney smashed her left thumb in Ray Colombo's car door. The senior play, "Arsenic and Old Lace," was successfully presented on the night of November 18th, with Sue Fritz and Carol Matz co-starring. During spring vacation the seniors visited Washington, D.C., as part of their education; and they were guests at a prom given in their honor by the junior class.

On June 7, 1956, as the seniors walked down the aisle to the strains of "Pomp and Circumstance," they thought of the past thirteen years, years which have passed, and can never be recovered, but which are only happy memories. And then they thought ahead to future years — college, working, military service, or marriage.
