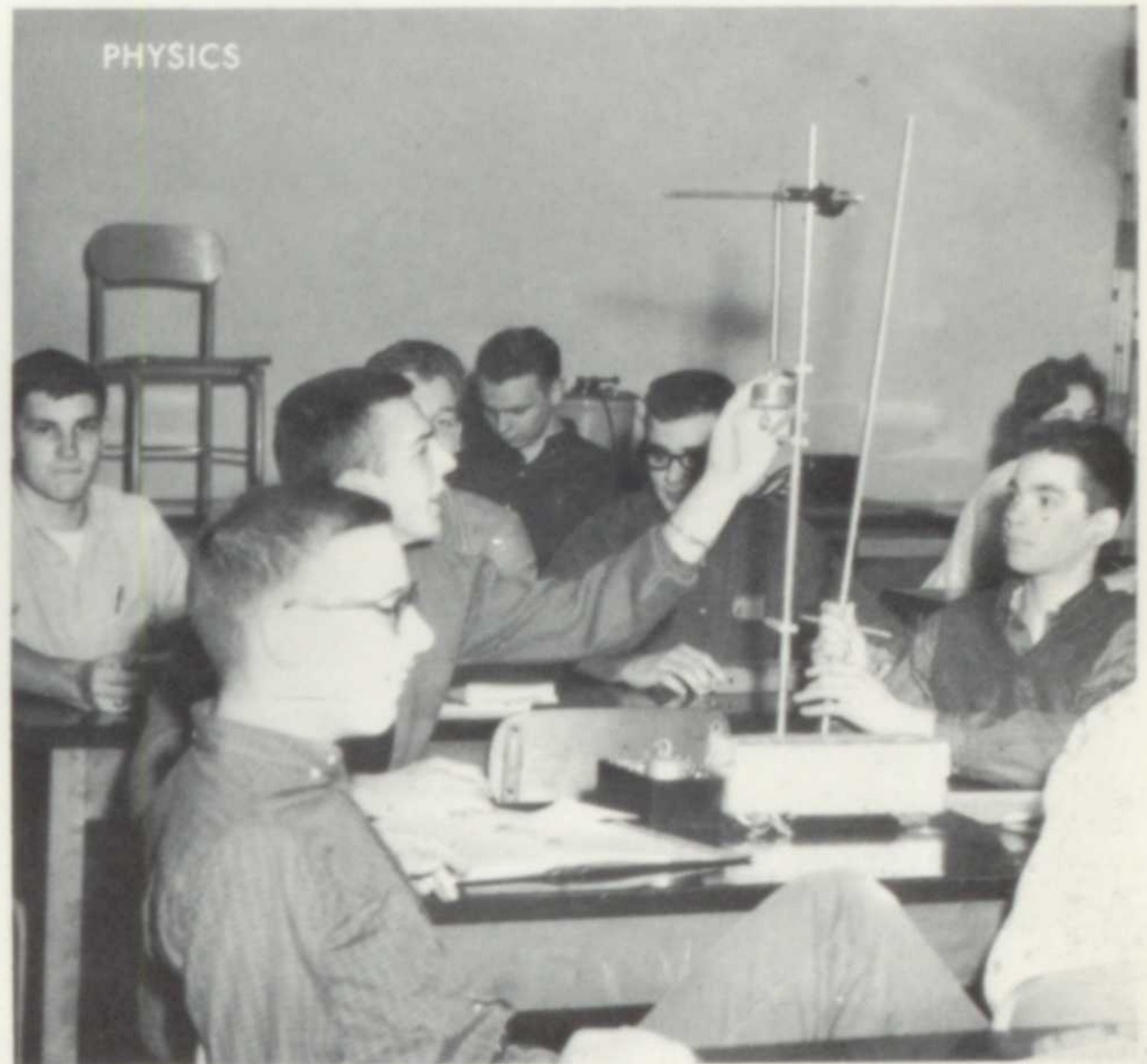


SENIORS IN ACTION

ACTIVITIES

The Bay High School Chapter of the National Honor Society inducted 17 seniors and 11 juniors in a school-wide assembly on February 26. The nine senior members who were inducted into the society as juniors last year conducted the program. Ten Bay students received recognition for their dramatic talents when they were selected December 18 as Thespians. On December 7, they received invitations to an informal induction that was held at 7:30 at the high school. Nineteen seniors and four juniors were inducted into Quill and Scroll on March 20, at 7:30 in room 115. Bay High now has a new library, modern in design and able to hold twice the number of volumes and quadruple the number of students that the old library could accommodate. This new library is located where the old auditorium used to be. The Bay High Choir performed their annual spring program on May 16 and 17, by presenting the operetta *L'll Abner*. The Bay High Band journeyed to Pittsburg, Pennsylvania for the Midwest Band Clinic, on Monday April 8, 1963. For the first time, the Student Council put on the Sweetheart Ball. Because Bay Players did not wish to sponsor this dance, Student Council decided to carry on the tradition of a Sweetheart Ball. The dance took place on Saturday February 16, at the Junior High cafeteria, from 9:30 to 12:00. The annual Y-Teens Snow-Ball on Saturday January 19th at Normandy School had for its theme an ice palace. This dance lasted from 9:00 to 12:00. "Onions in the Stew," a play featuring comedy, but also showing moral insight, went on stage at 8:00 on November 16 and 17 in the Bay High auditorium. It was directed by Miss Diane Hahn.

SPORTS

Bay won its first conference basketball game at home over Westlake, 55-50. Bay Village completed its most prosperous weekend in Basketball by routing Fairview 65-49 January 11, and by nipping Berea 67-64 on January 12. Bay faculty had a chance to prove their outstanding basketball skill when they met the WHK Radio 1-Ders in a "grudge" game at Bay High Wednesday at 8 p.m. The purpose of the Radio 1-Ders Games is to raise money for various charity organizations. In this case the ticket sale proceeds went to the Bay High P.T.A. Wrestling has been a major sport at Bay High for three years. The first year found Bay last in wrestling in the conference and the second year, fourth. This year Bay High reached the acme of wrestling in the Southwestern Conference. Bay lost to Westlake in the Football finale. The defeat was no fluke as it was two years ago. An inspired Westlake team, led by a tremendous defense, downed the Rockets.

The defeat made Bay settle for a tri-championship in the Conference with Rocky River and Westlake. Congratulations went to Coach Jack Llwellyn, who had been named "Coach of the Year" for the district of Cuyahoga County. He was one of four candidates chosen by the Greater Cleveland Board of Directors out of 120 schools and their representative coaches.

Helmut Peroutka, a tall, blond boy from Austria, arrived in Bay last September, ready for his year in America as a foreign exchange student. He came here with the financial support of the Bay chapter of the American Field Service. Senior Jerry Meyer distinguished himself as one of the finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Test. He shared this honor with 11,000 top seniors all over the country. Senior Jean Callihan was selected as the Bay High winner in this year's Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Awards were awarded to Linda Korsgaard, Barb Aker, and the Bay Window Staff for their outstanding contributions to the success of the 1962 United Appeal Drive. Spirit and determination to win paid off for three seniors, for they received the top awards at the Fall Sports Assembly. They are Jack Rekstis, Al Keiser, and Mike Henneberry. Quarterback Mike Henneberry received the Bay Men's Club Award for the football player with the highest scholastic average. Tackle Al Keiser received the Outstanding Lineman Award and halfback Jack Rekstis the Outstanding Back Award.

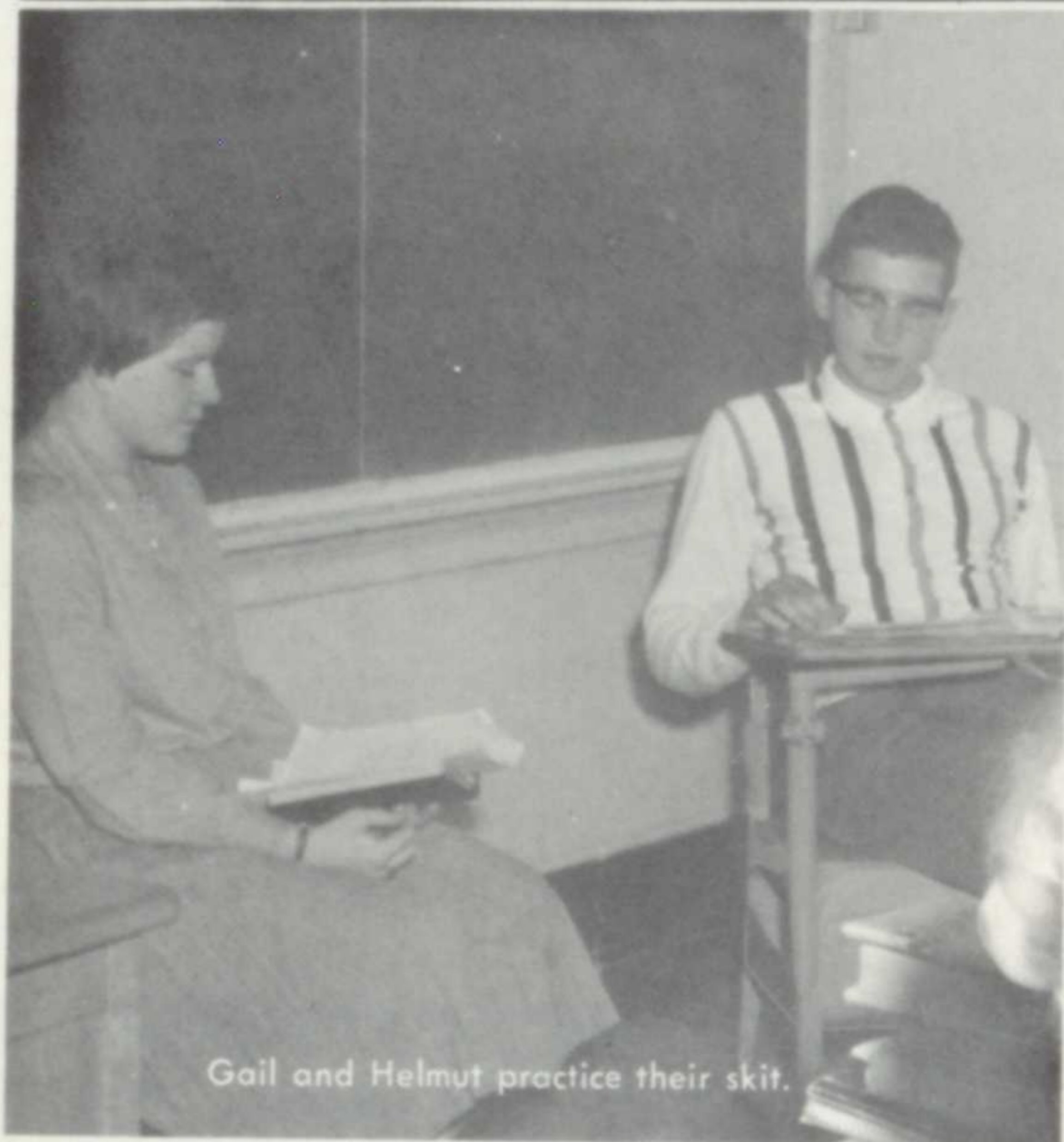

The American Field Service promotes better world feelings by improved understanding. Members worked diligently to acquire enough money to obtain these goals. Our A.F.S. worked in cooperation with the Adult Club. Together they succeeded in bringing a European student to Bay this year. Helmut Peroutka of Austria arrived in August to spend the entire school year living with a Bay family and going to school here. Helmut carried a regular schedule of classes and met the students in outside activities also. This year the organization sponsored a post game dance, sold underclass pictures as well as sportsman show tickets to raise money to bring another student to Bay in 1964. The second goal of A.F.S. was to send a Bay student to a foreign country for the 1964 school year. This year a number of juniors filled out applications for a year abroad. These applications were thoroughly processed by the Adult Club and followed by an interview of each applicant. The applicants were then limited to a small number. These names were forwarded to the national A.F.S. headquarters in New York. Here the information was carefully checked, possible locations were considered and if a good location is found, a Bay student may go abroad next year. In the last two years A.F.S. has achieved only one of its goals; this year, however, the club hoped to fill both of their goals.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

National Honor Society represents the highest honor which is given to the students of Bay High. The members are selected for their qualities of character, service, leadership and scholarship. Character is indicated by a good reputation tempered by high morals. Service is shown by the student's willingness to help others at school and in the community. Leadership is denoted not by holding an office but rather by the personal responsibility shown in all the student's undertakings. Scholarship requires a three point average of each member and a true love of learning. According to national rules, ten percent of the senior class and five percent of the junior class are initiated each year. On February 26, 1963 seventeen seniors and eleven juniors were announced as new members of the organization. During the formal induction ceremony Gail Sigmund spoke on scholarship, Larry Luchini, spoke on service, Norm Nelson spoke on leadership and Pat Pecoy spoke on character. During the informal evening initiation new members performed skits for the pleasure of the previous N.H.S. members and the faculty.

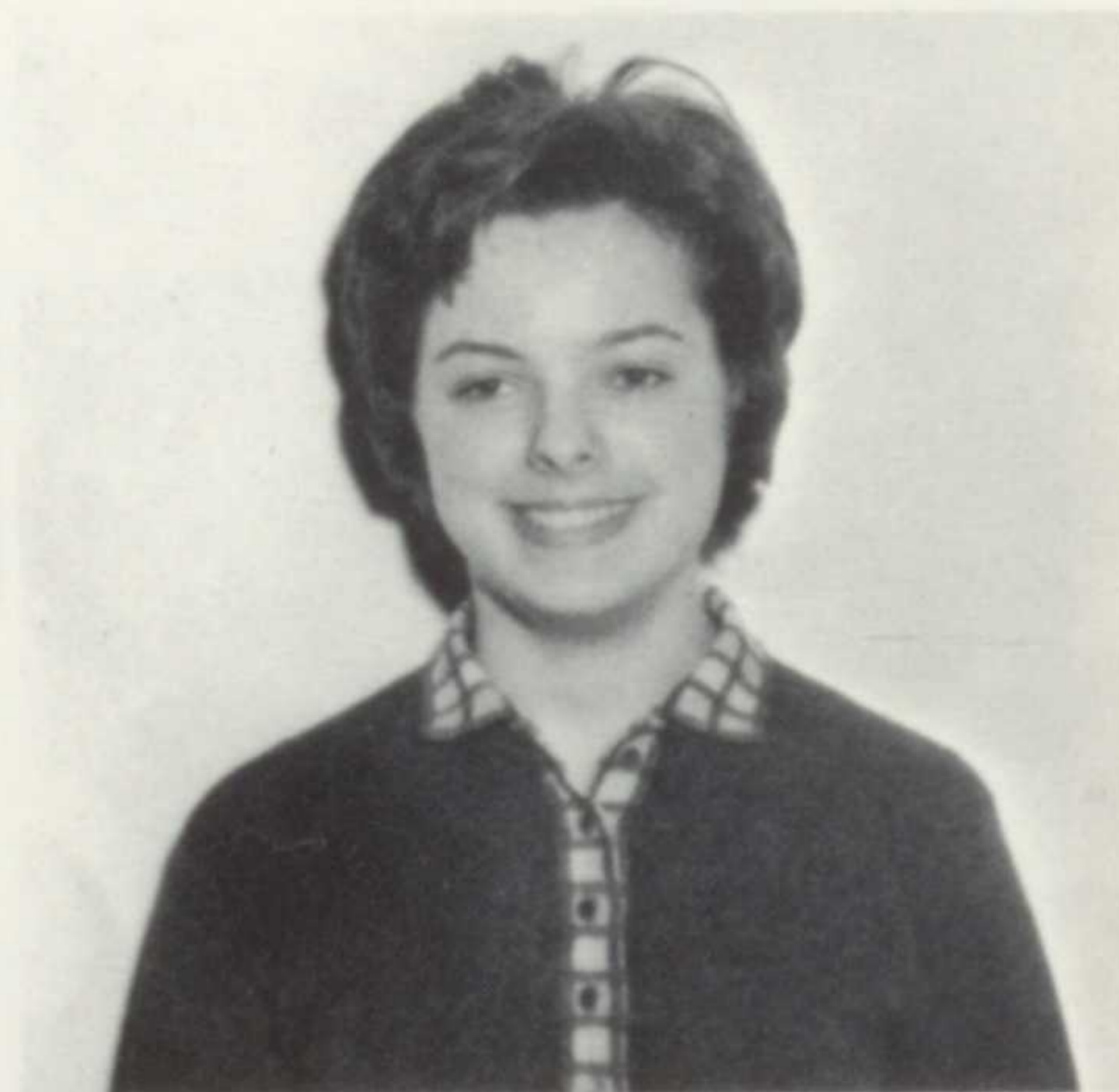
