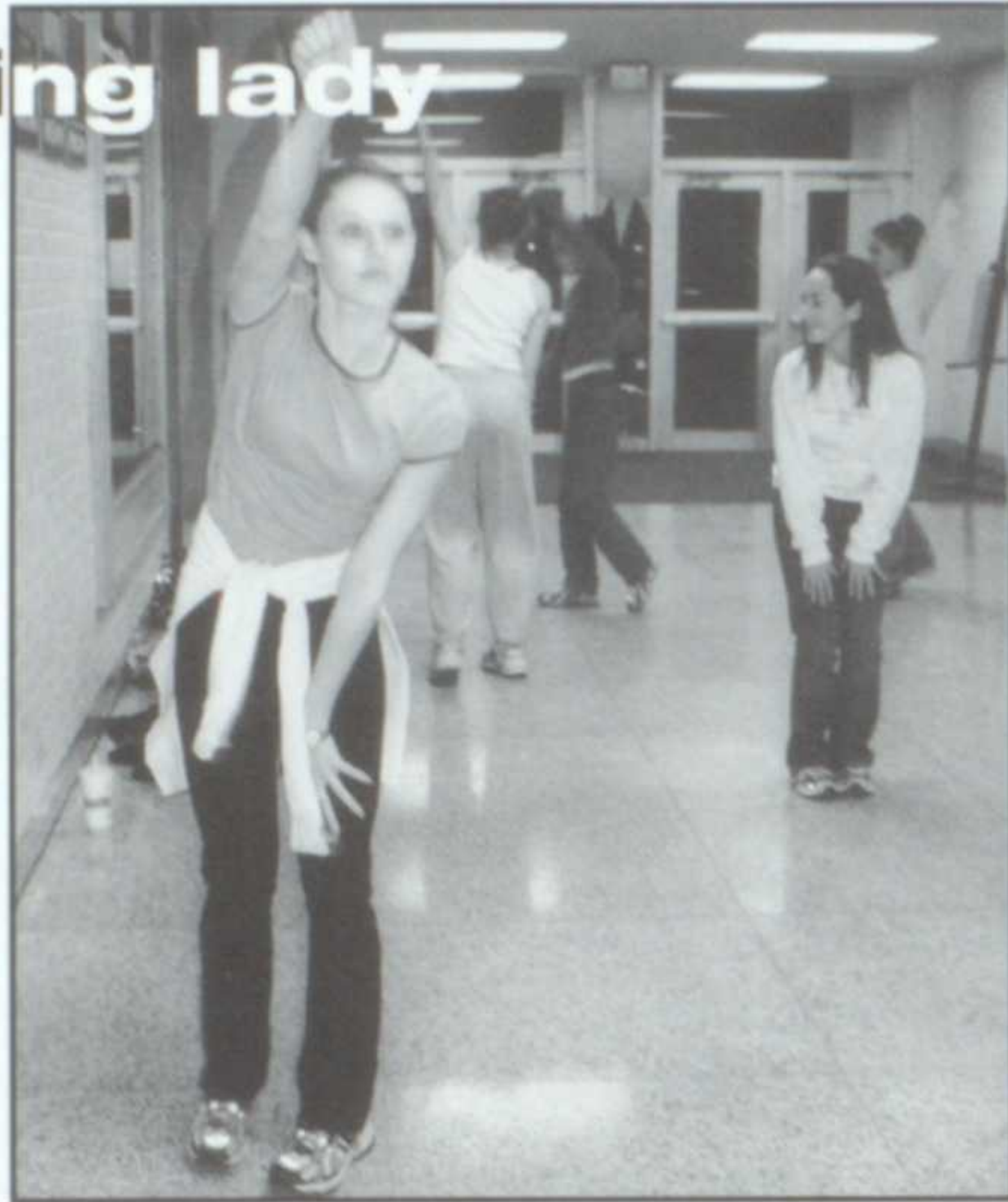
*Students make use of their time outside of the classroom to display their talents*

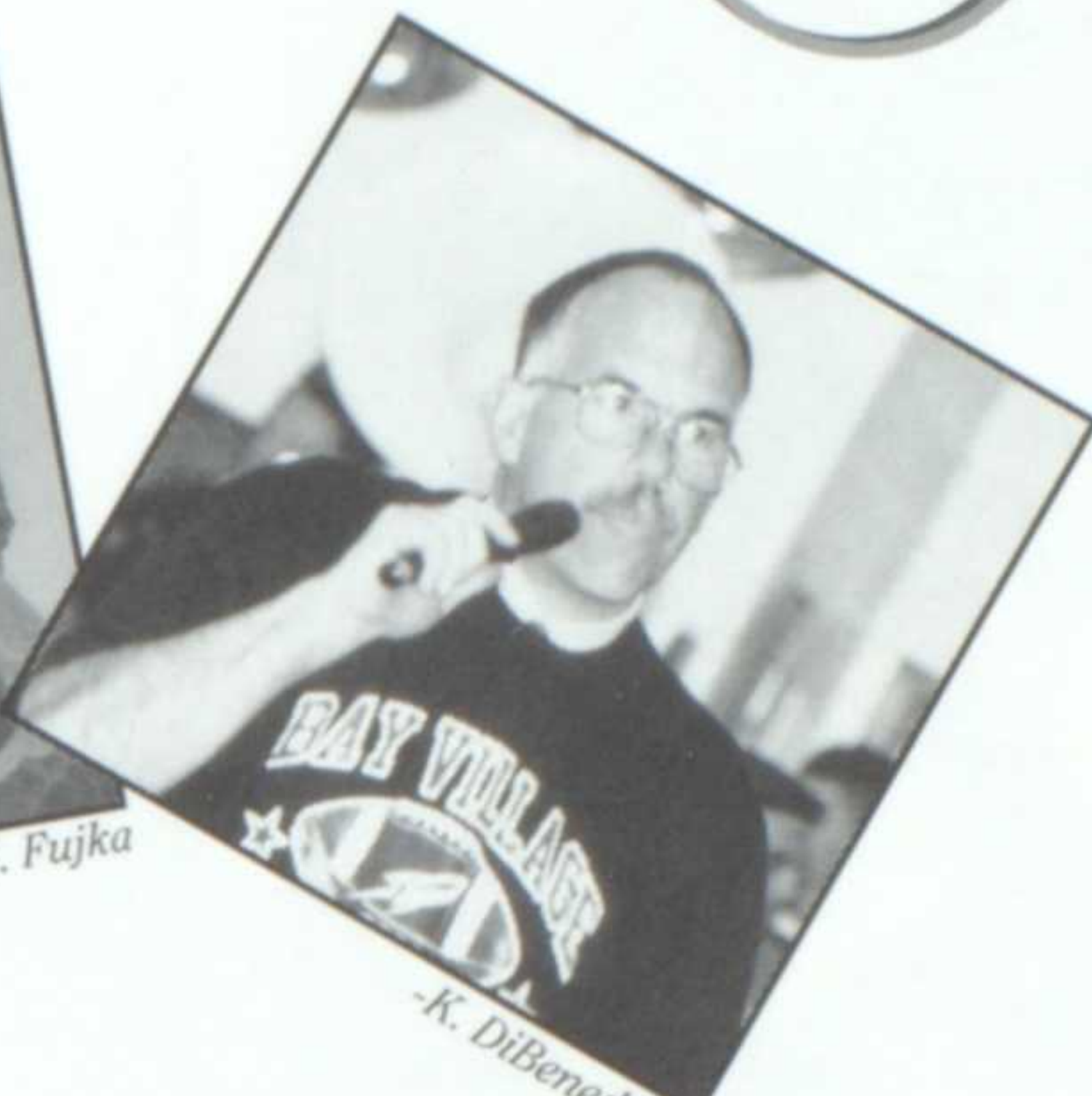

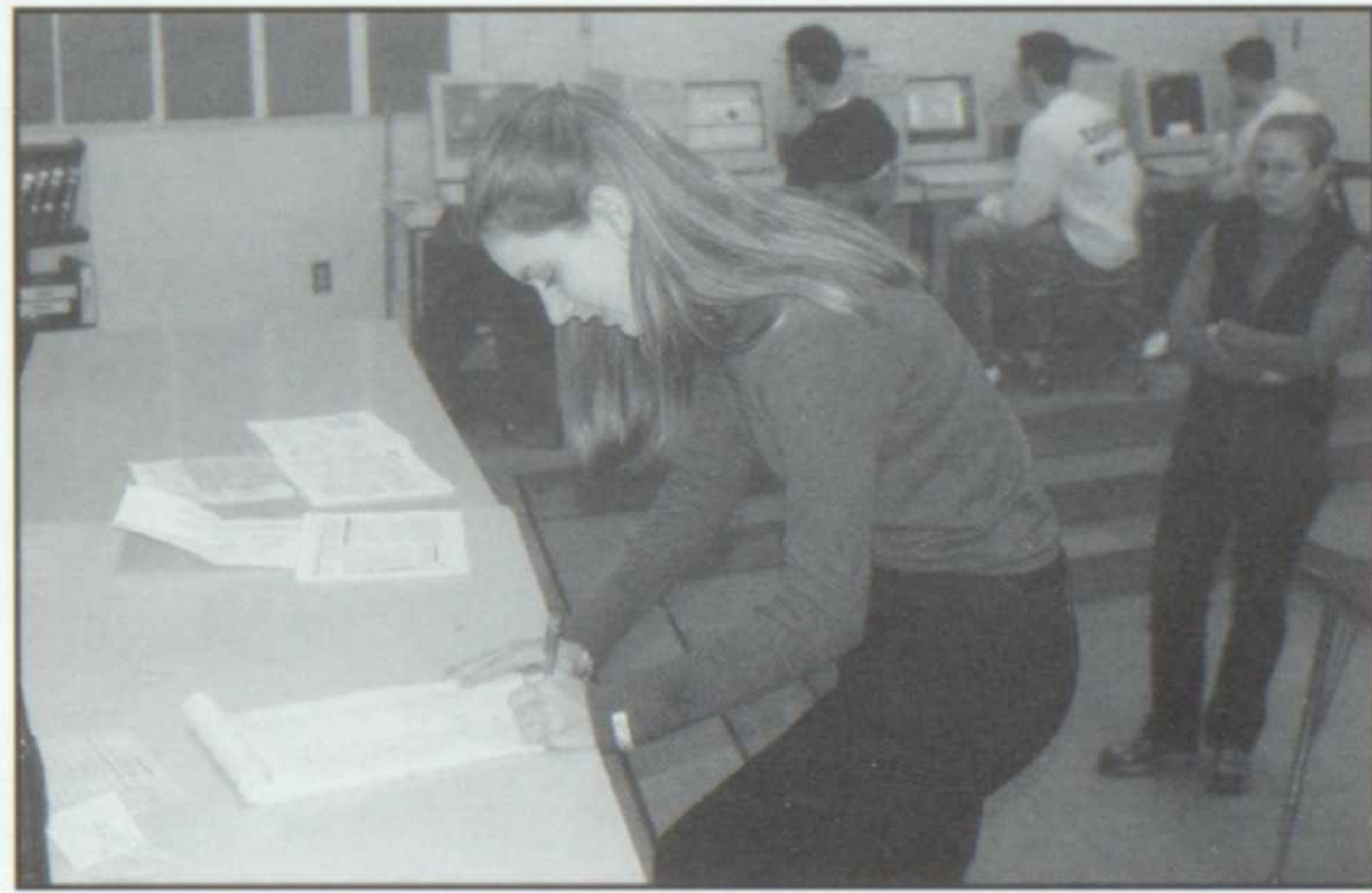

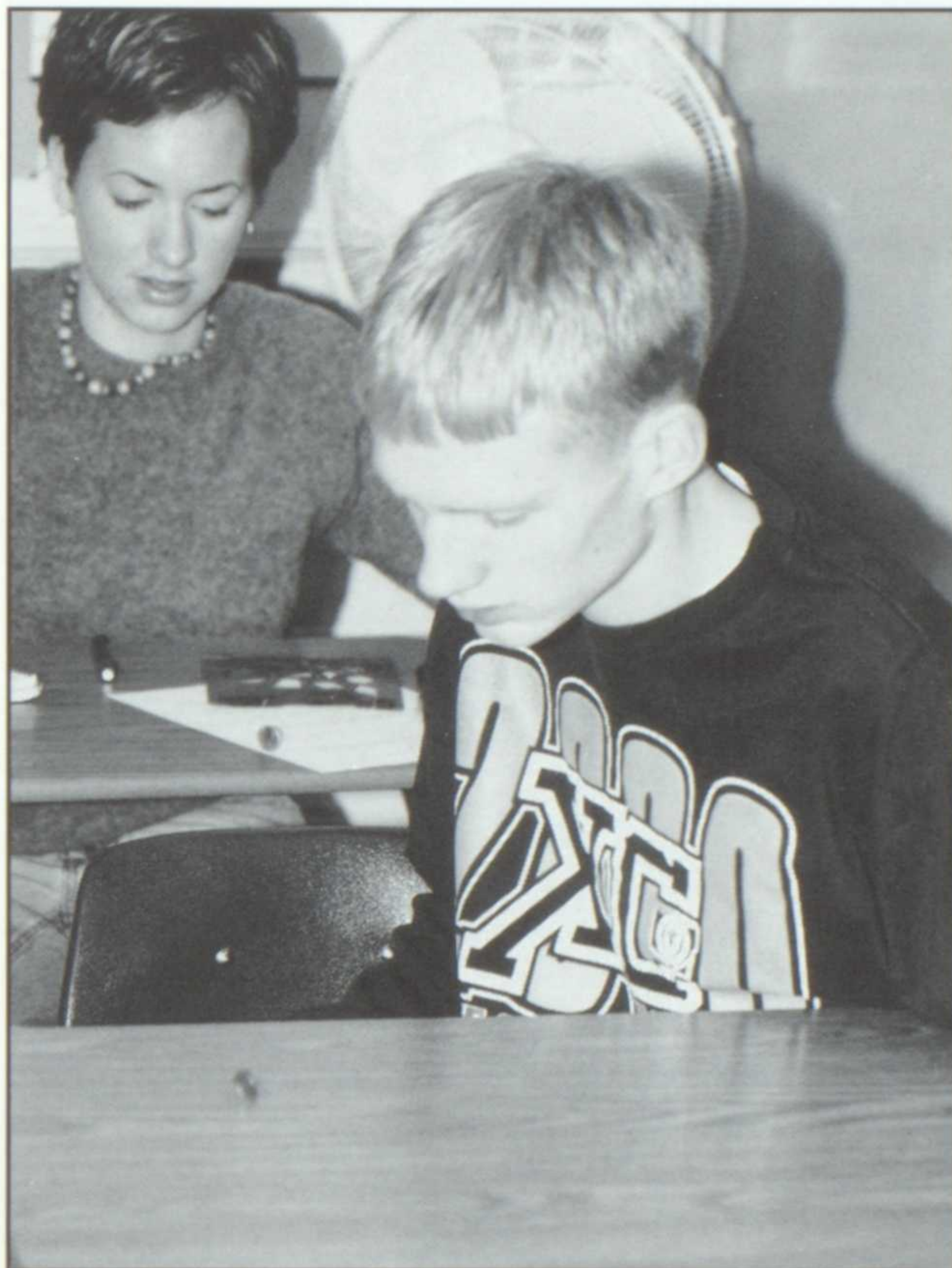

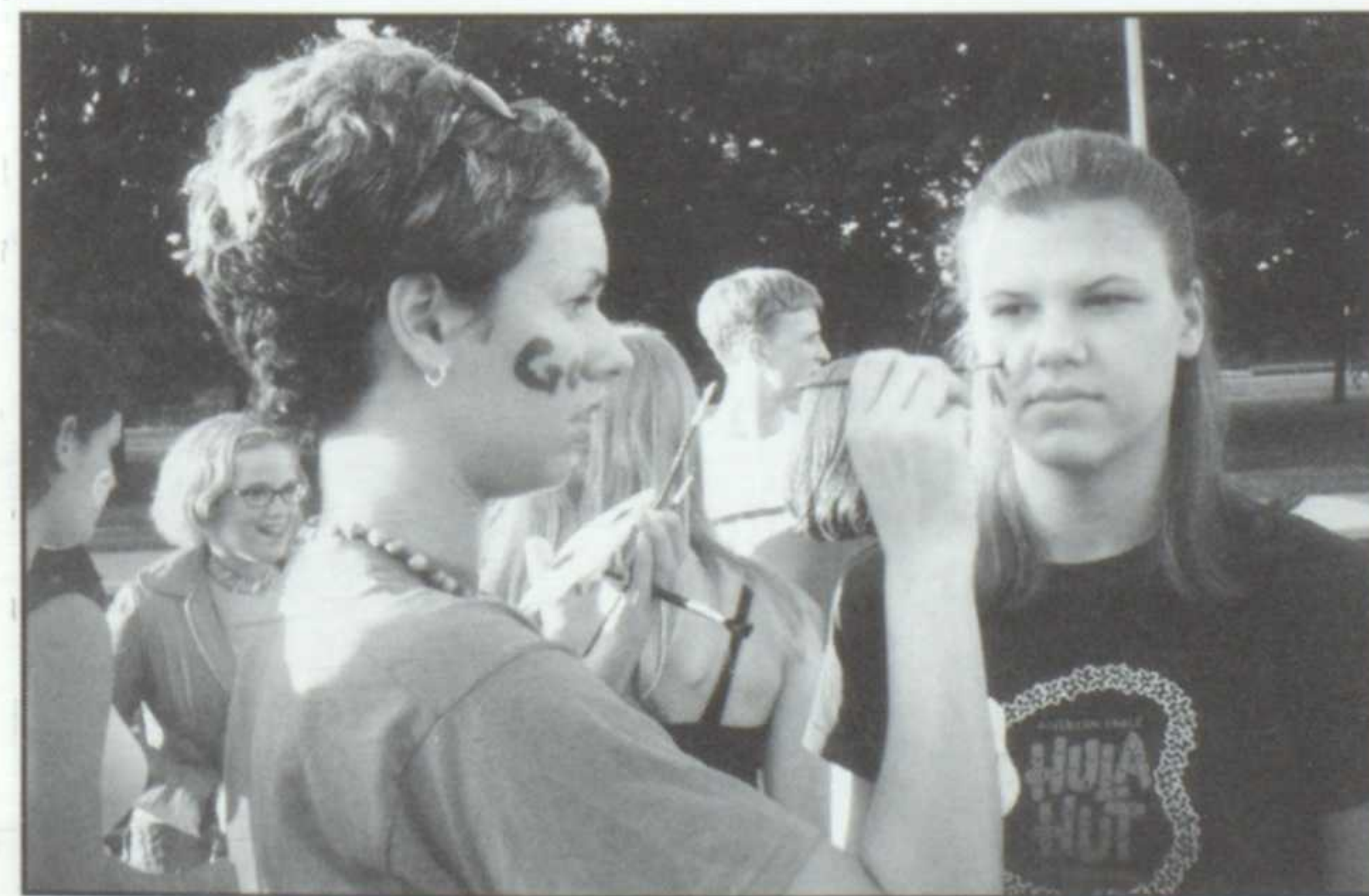

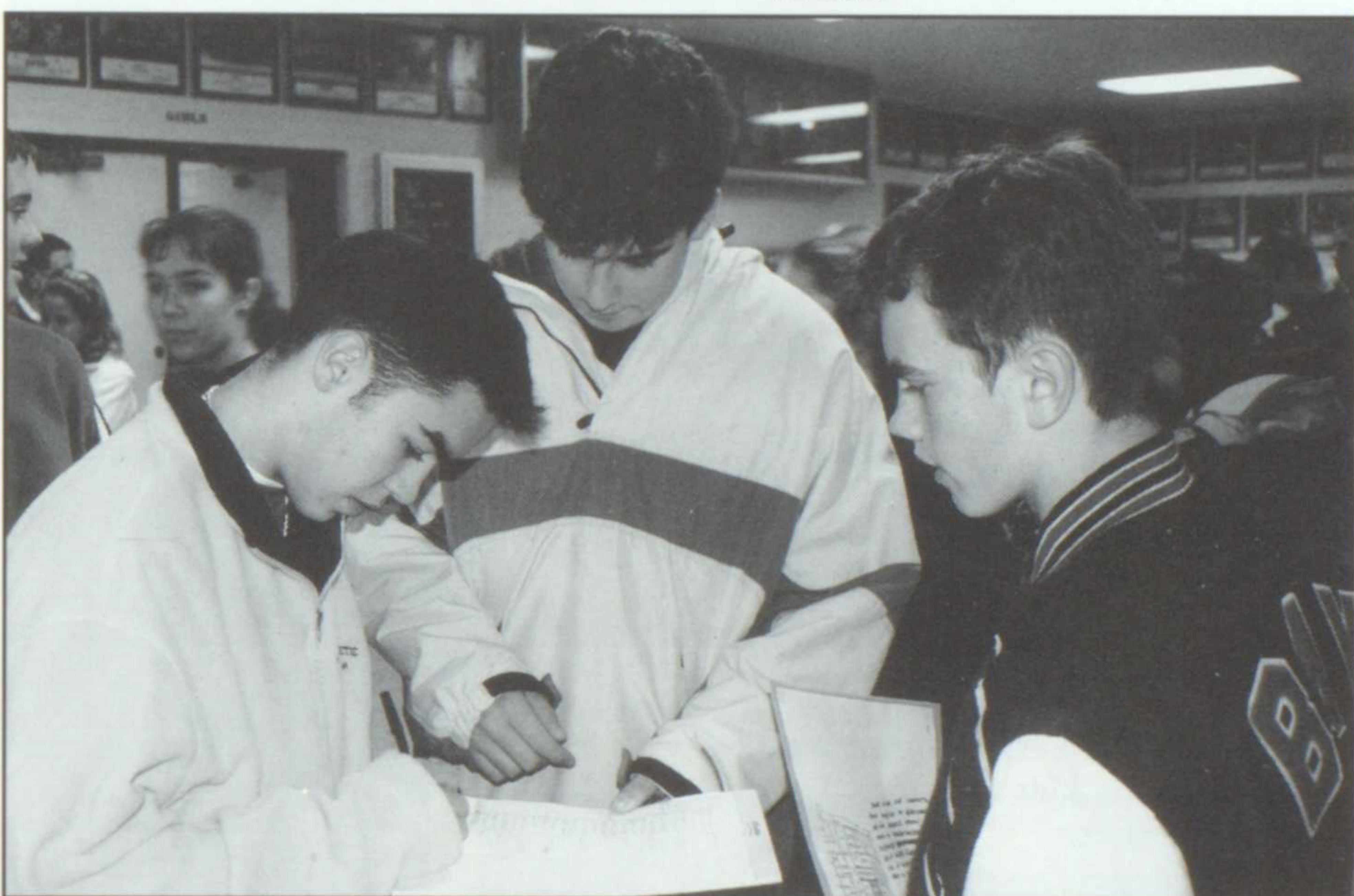

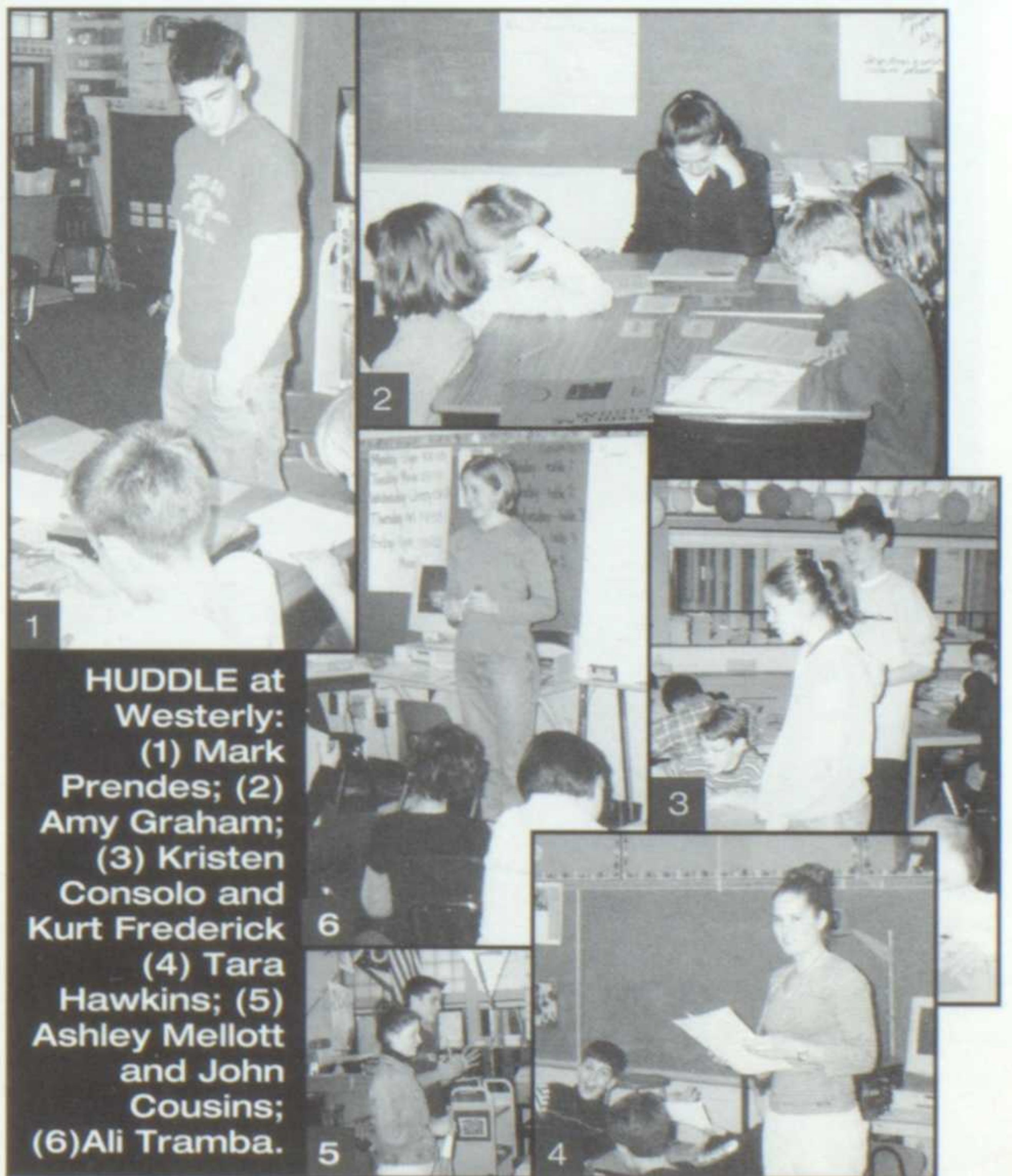

Noise prevails in & out of school in classes, COR, Young Life

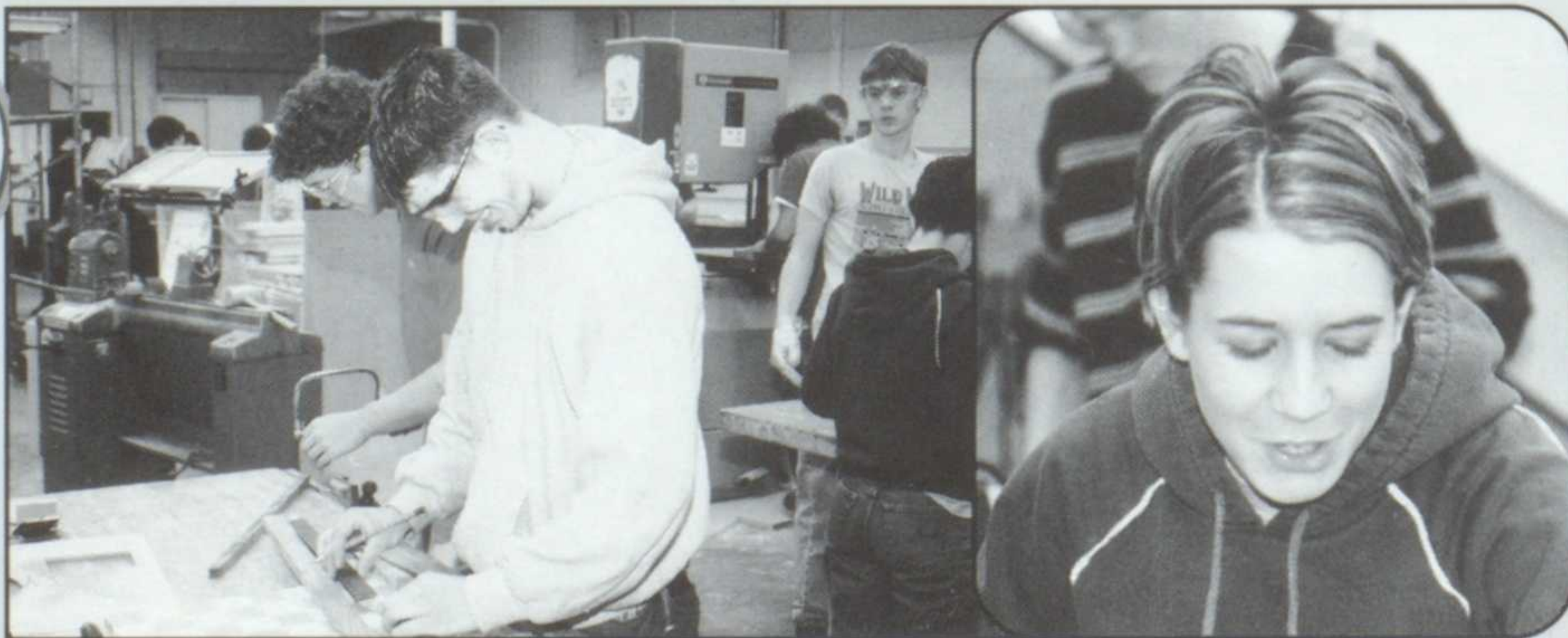

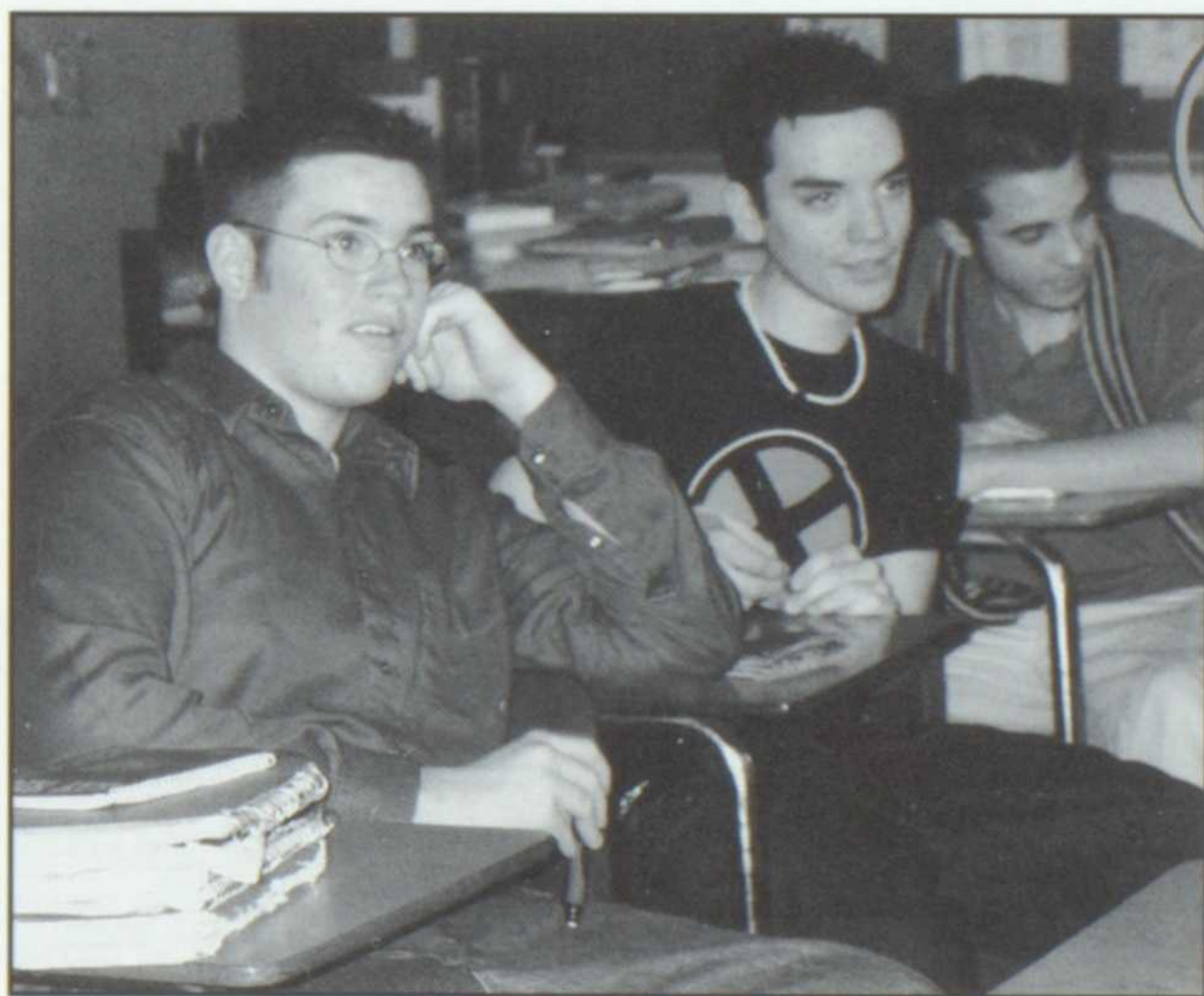

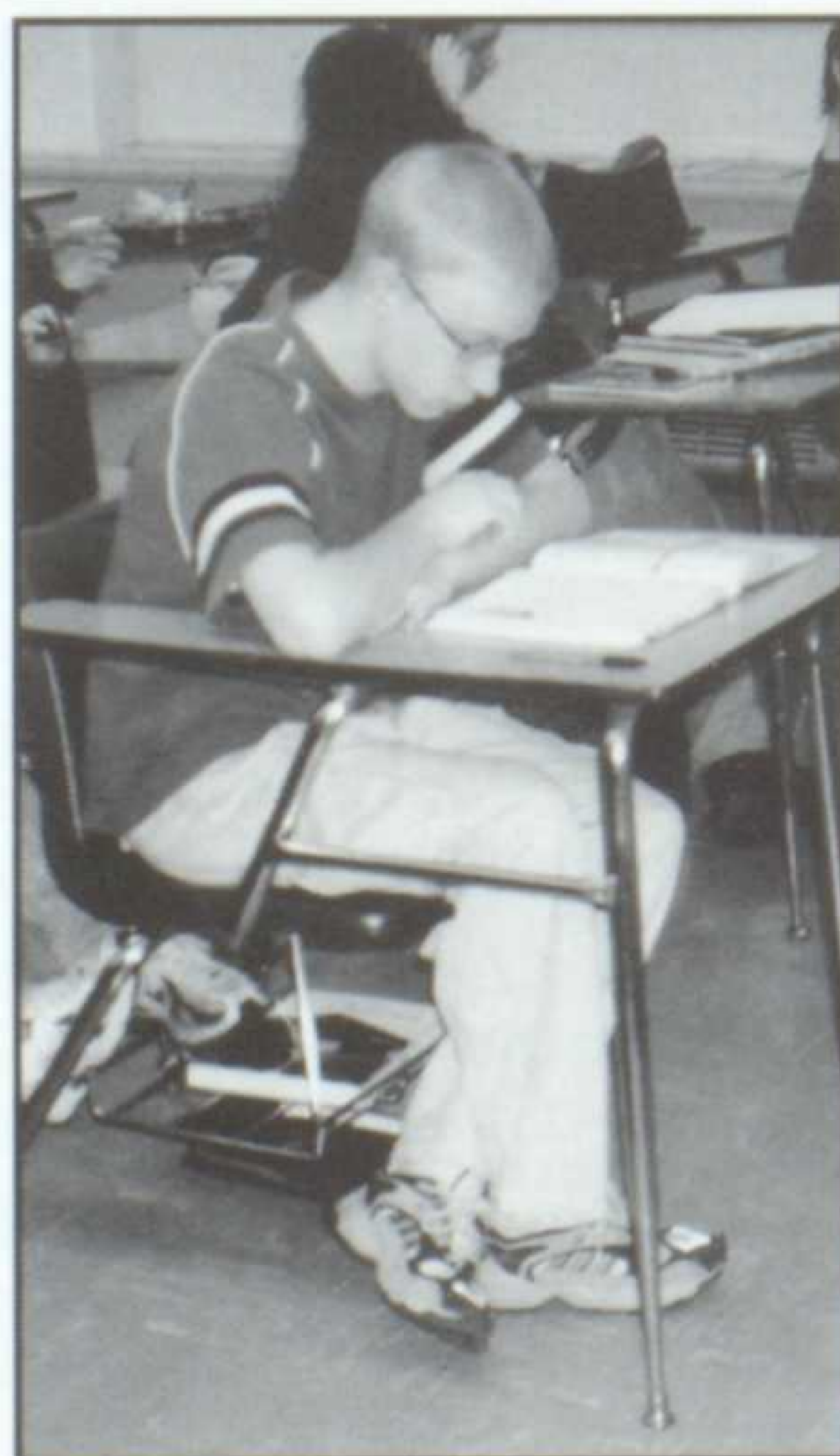
All students participated in Human History II and III, as well as embarked on a bus trip at some point in their high school careers. Optional activities included Model United Nations, Metal Shop, and French.

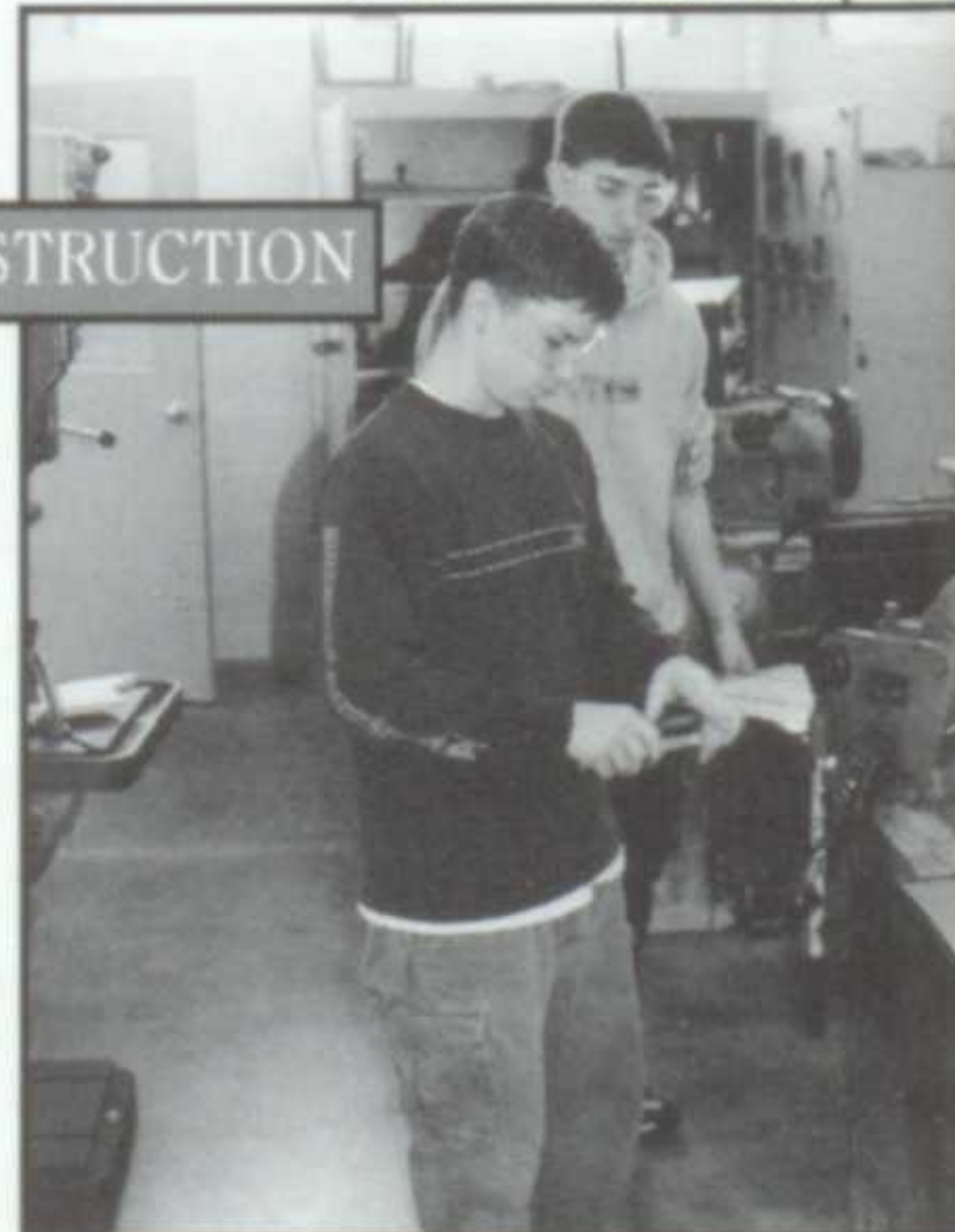

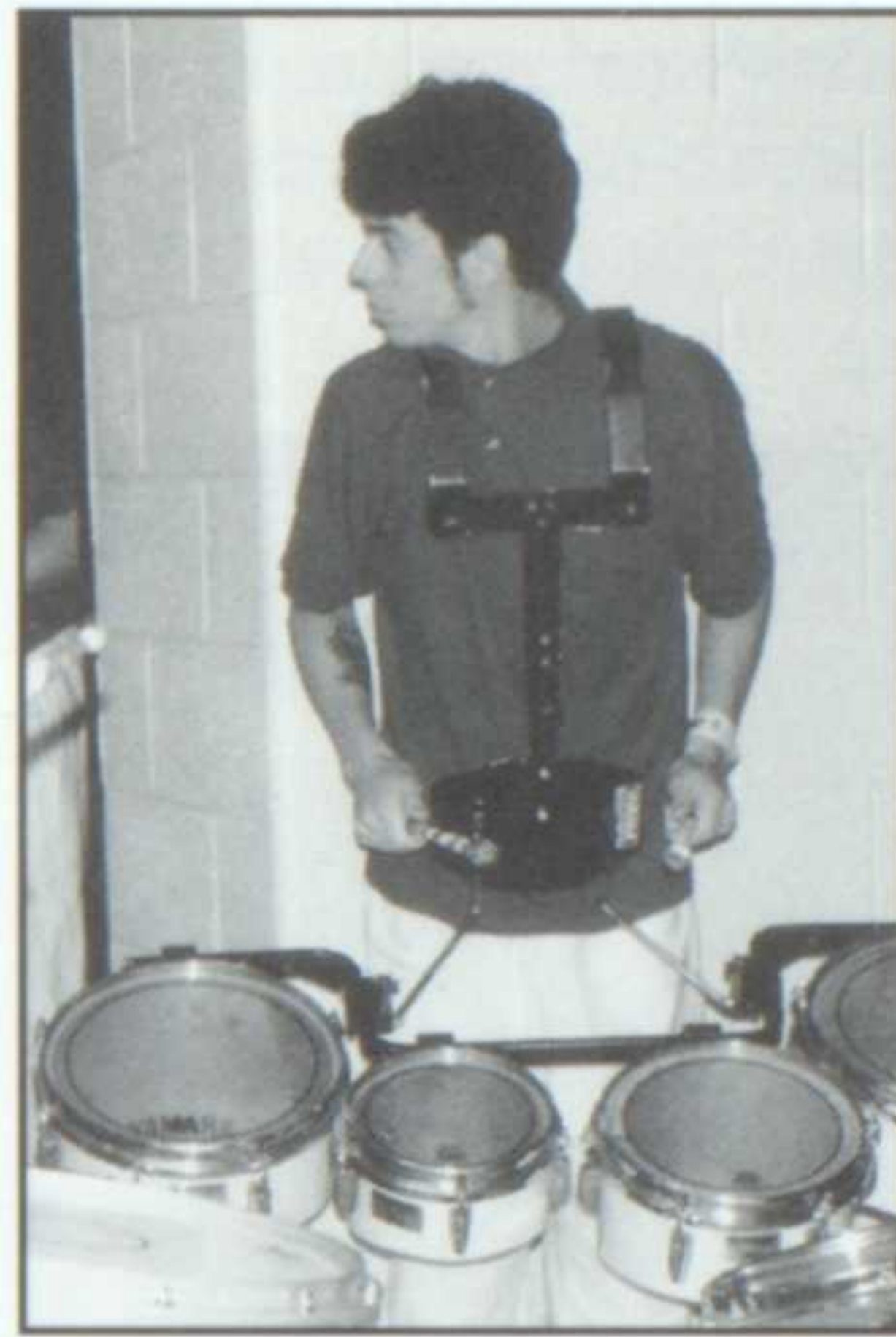

- "By the end of the day, I was ready to go home. It certainly forced me to work on my patience," said senior Jenny Groff.

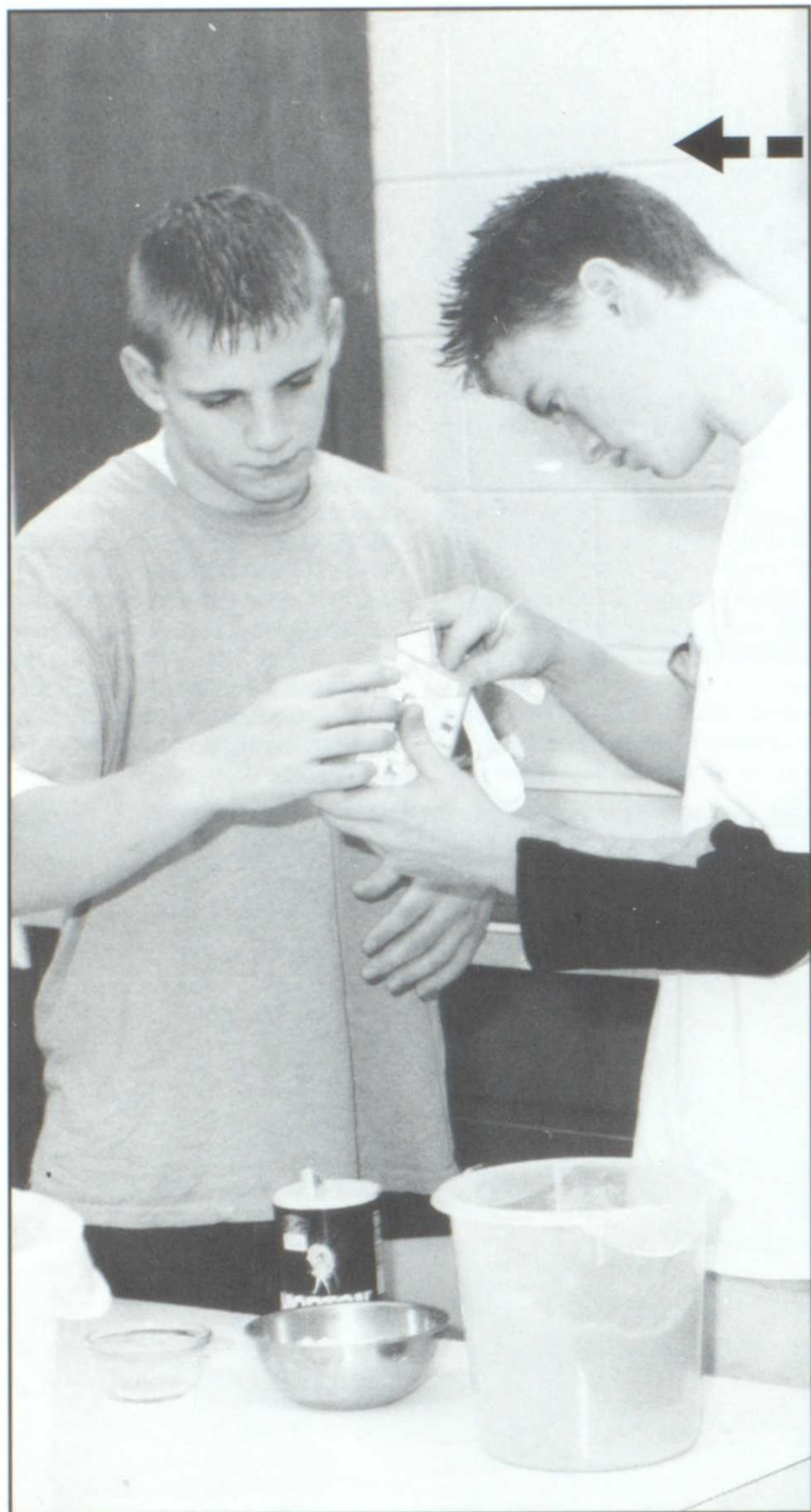

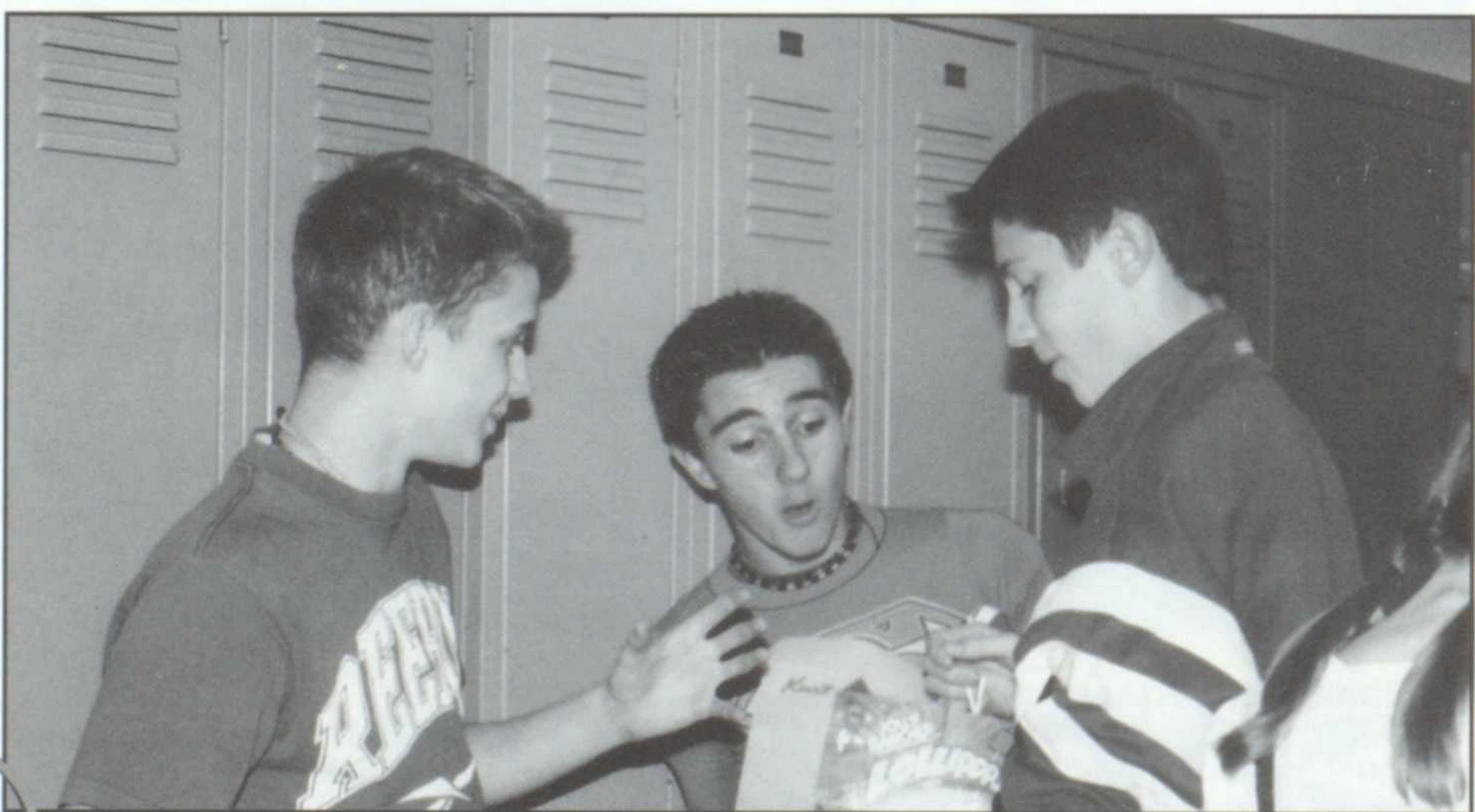

Students possessed the uncanny ability to have fun and be social regardless of the environment.

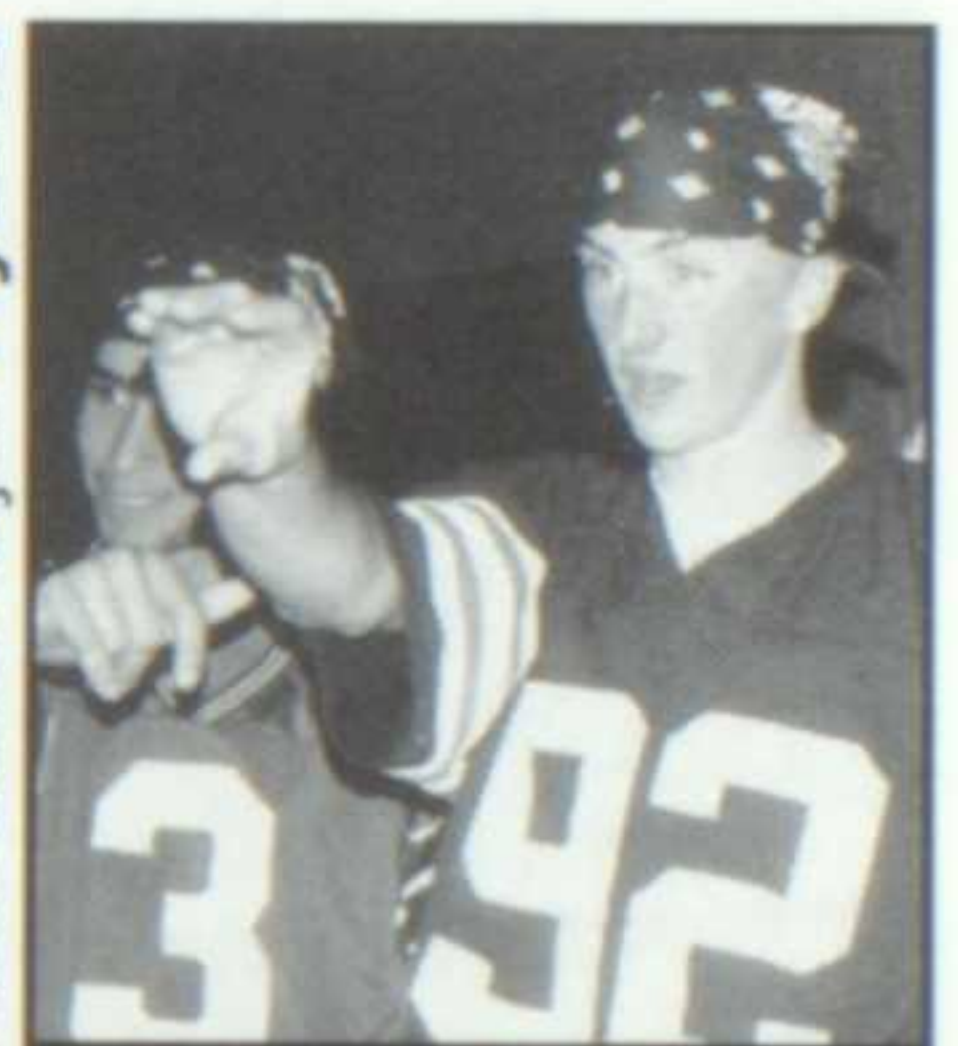

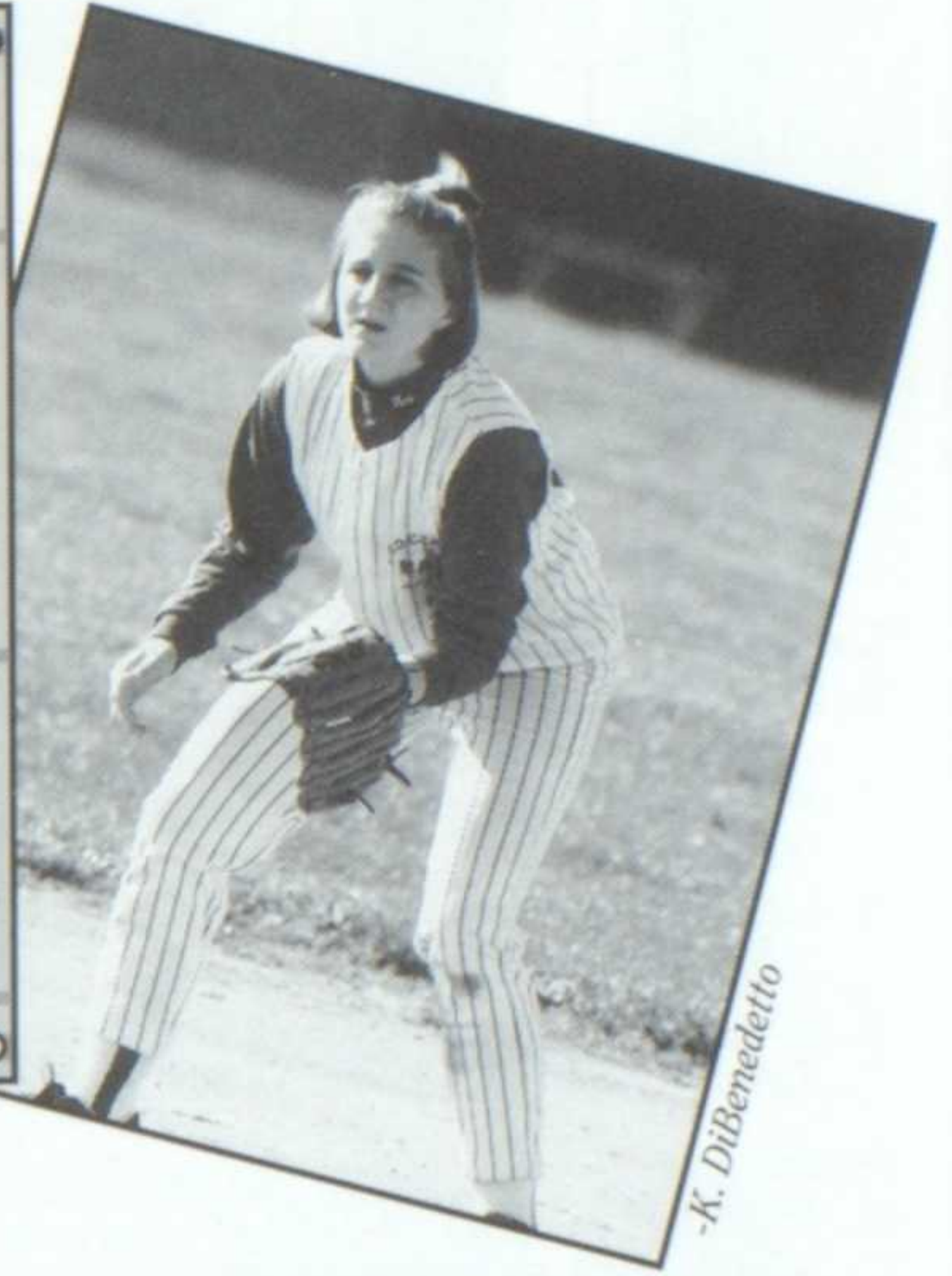

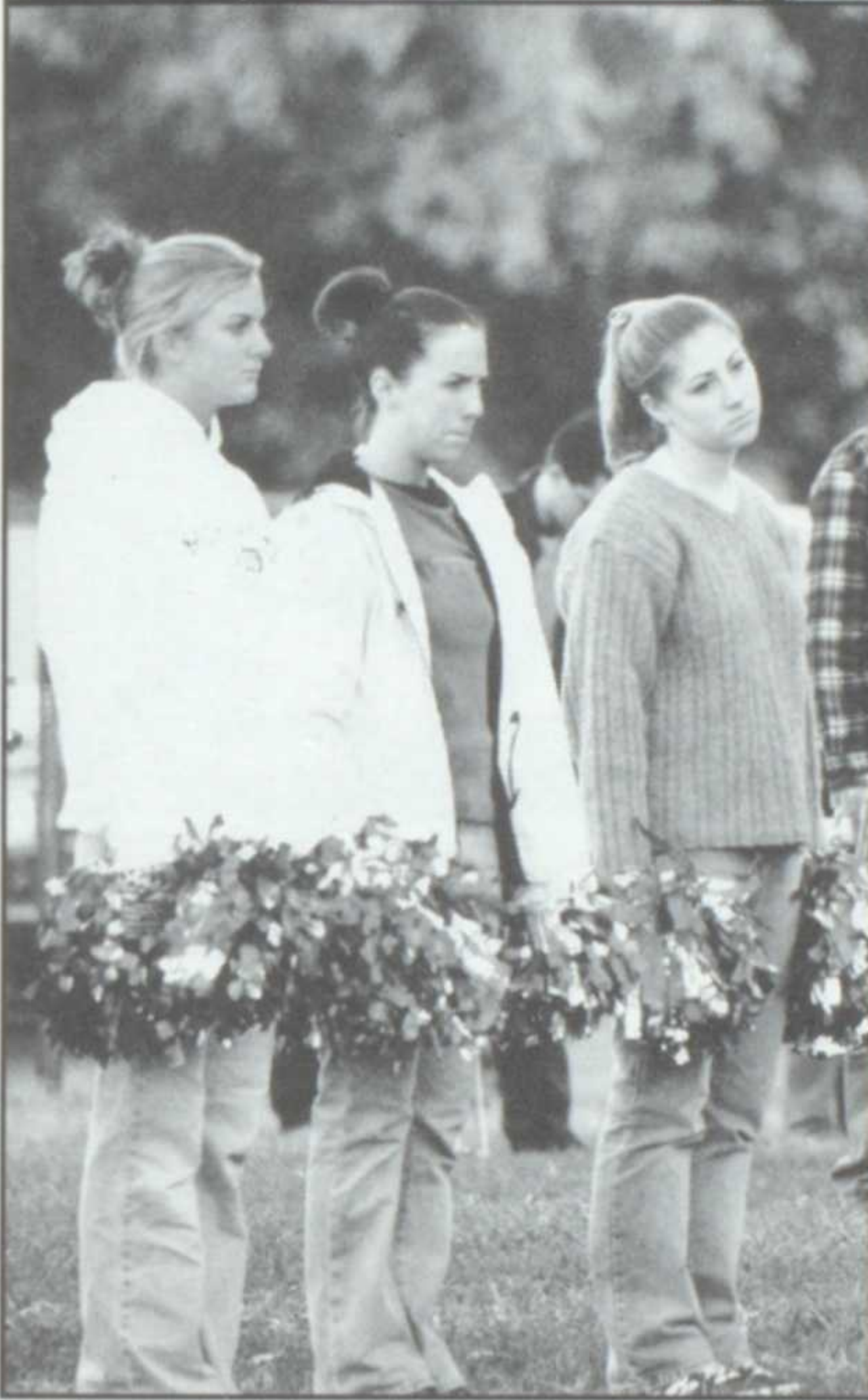
