Junior marshalls ushered the seniors into the stadium and then led the graduates out into the 21st century.

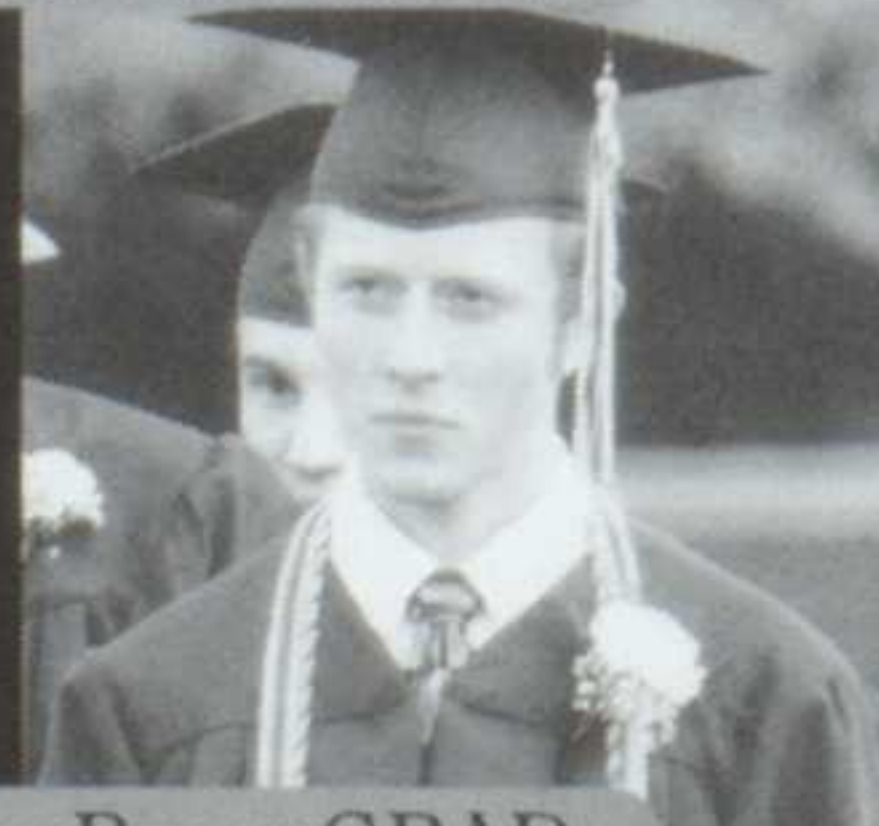

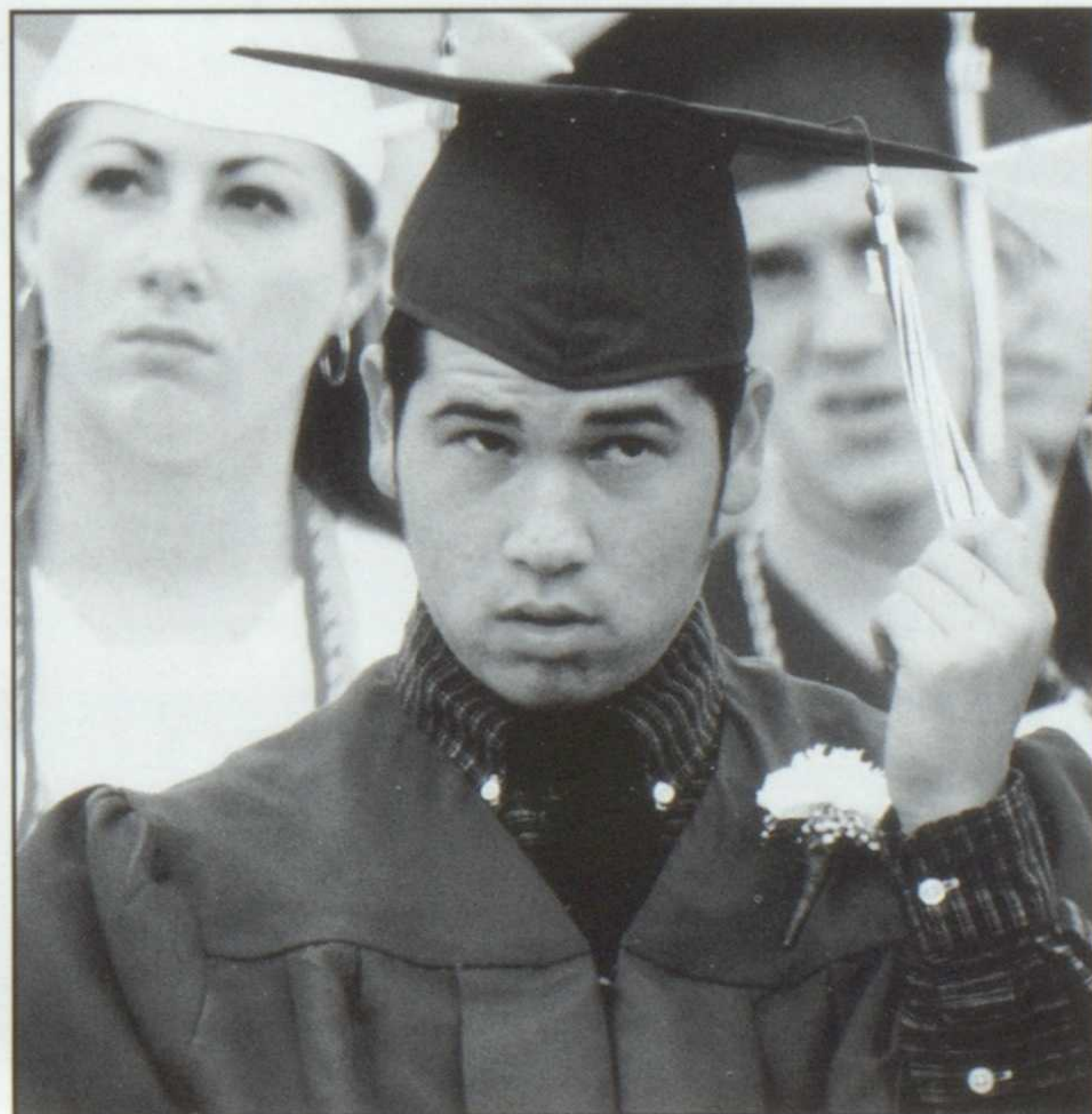

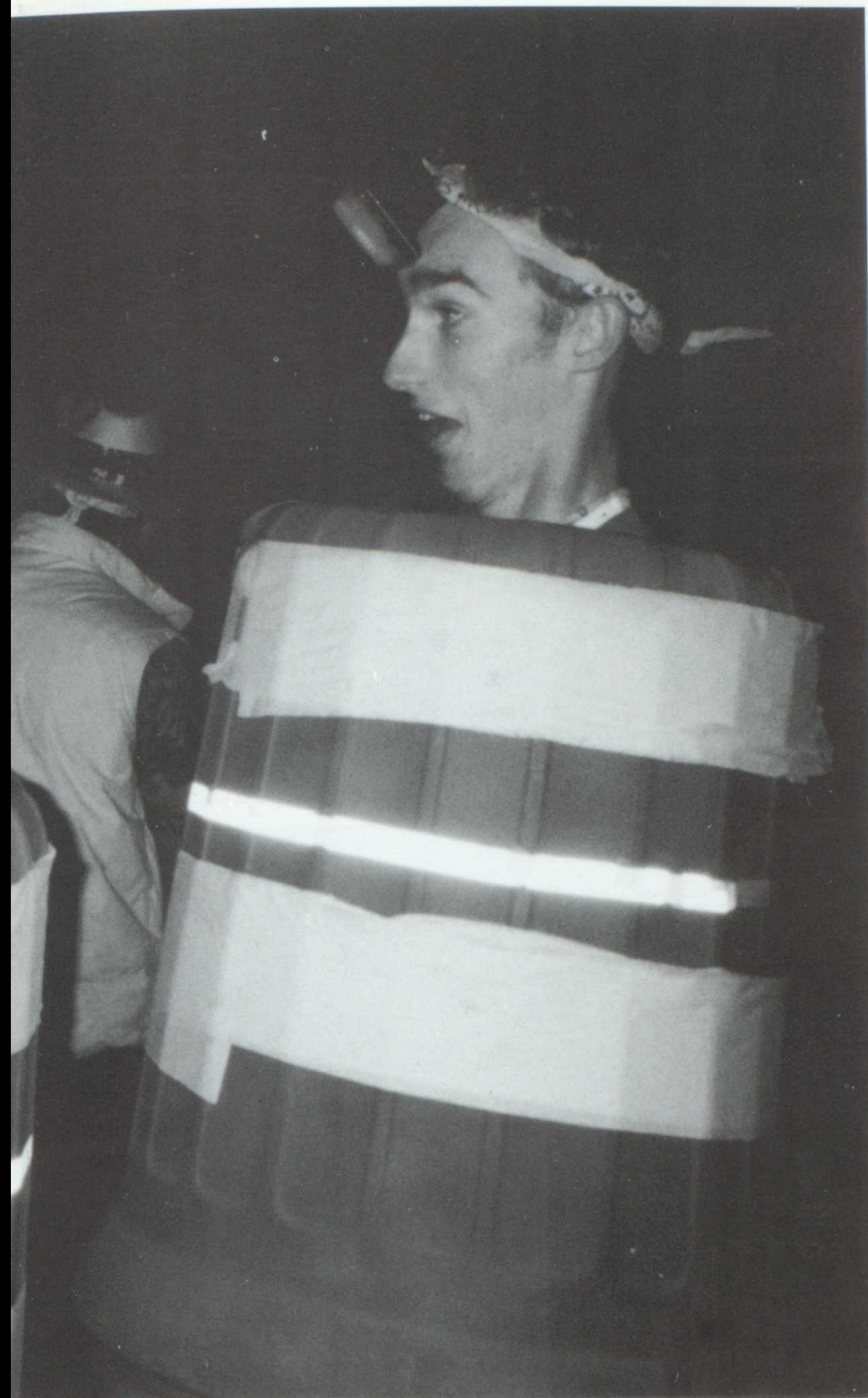

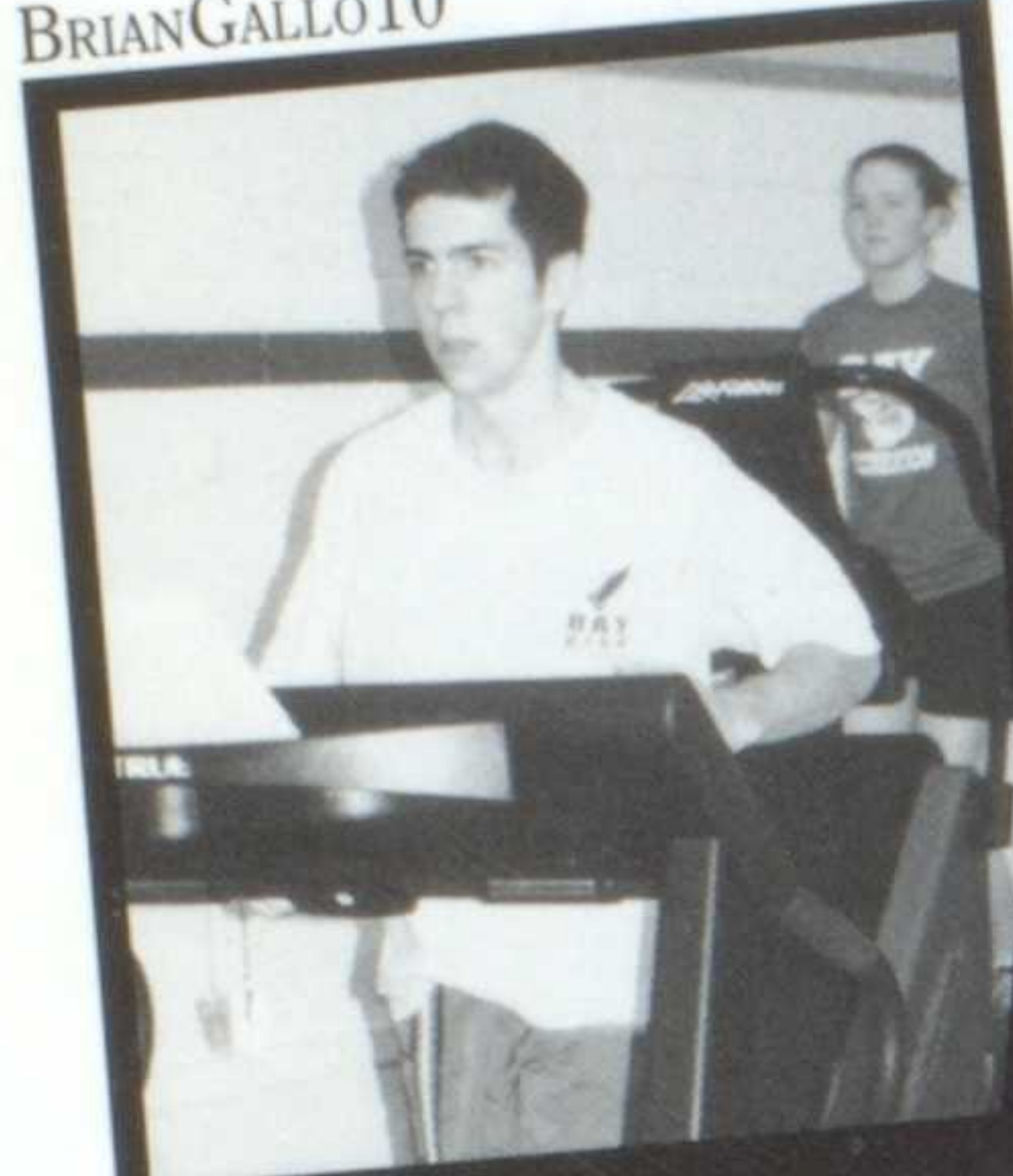

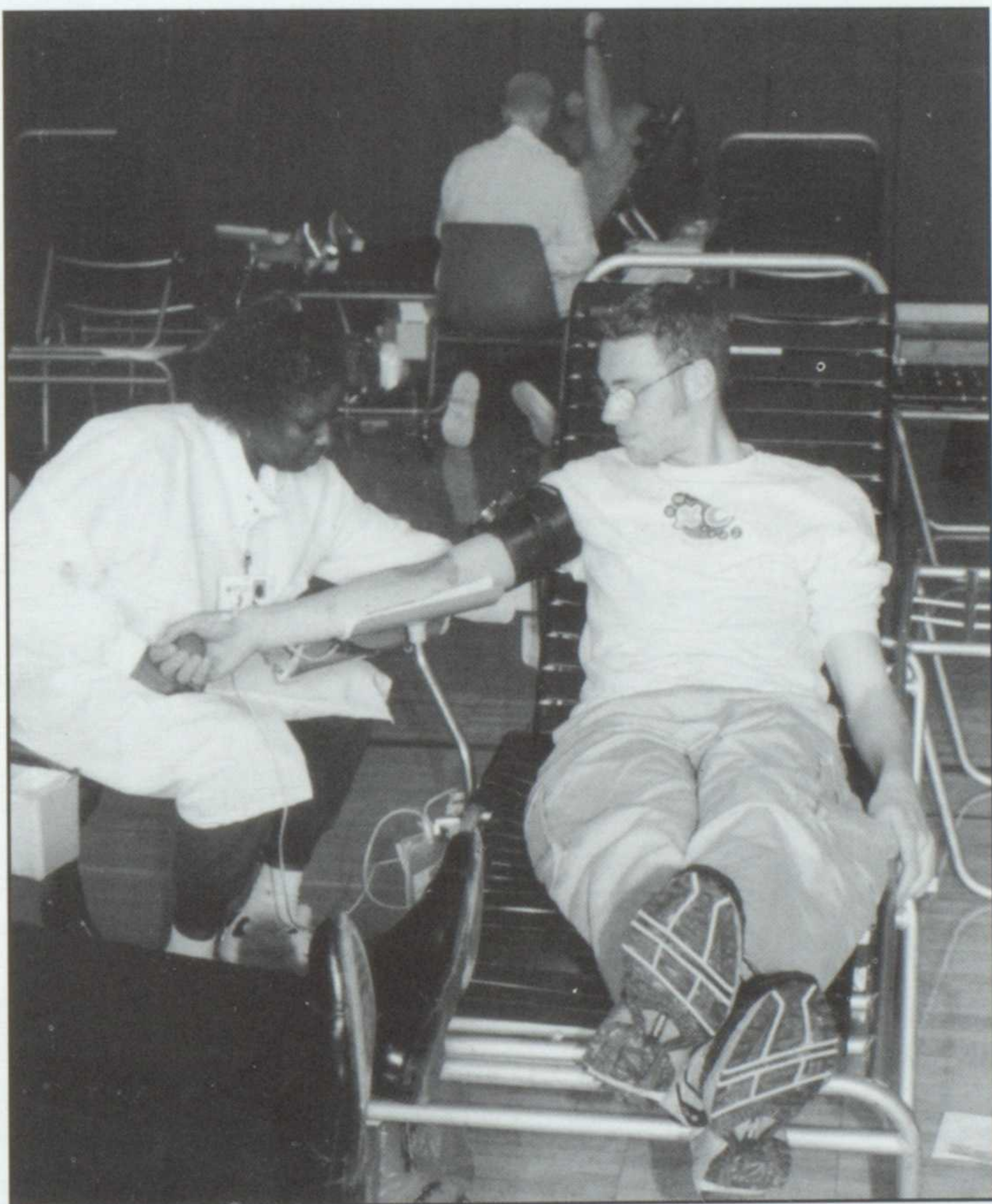

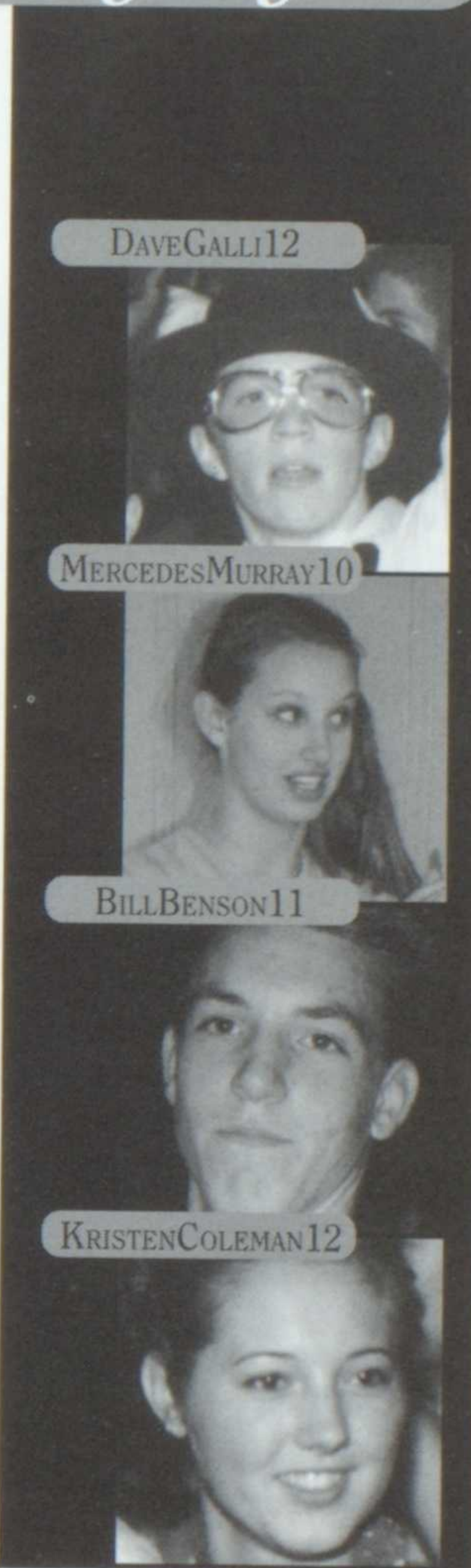

Besides clothes, hair trends were apparent. Male students sported the longer or curlier haircuts and just let their locks go wild.

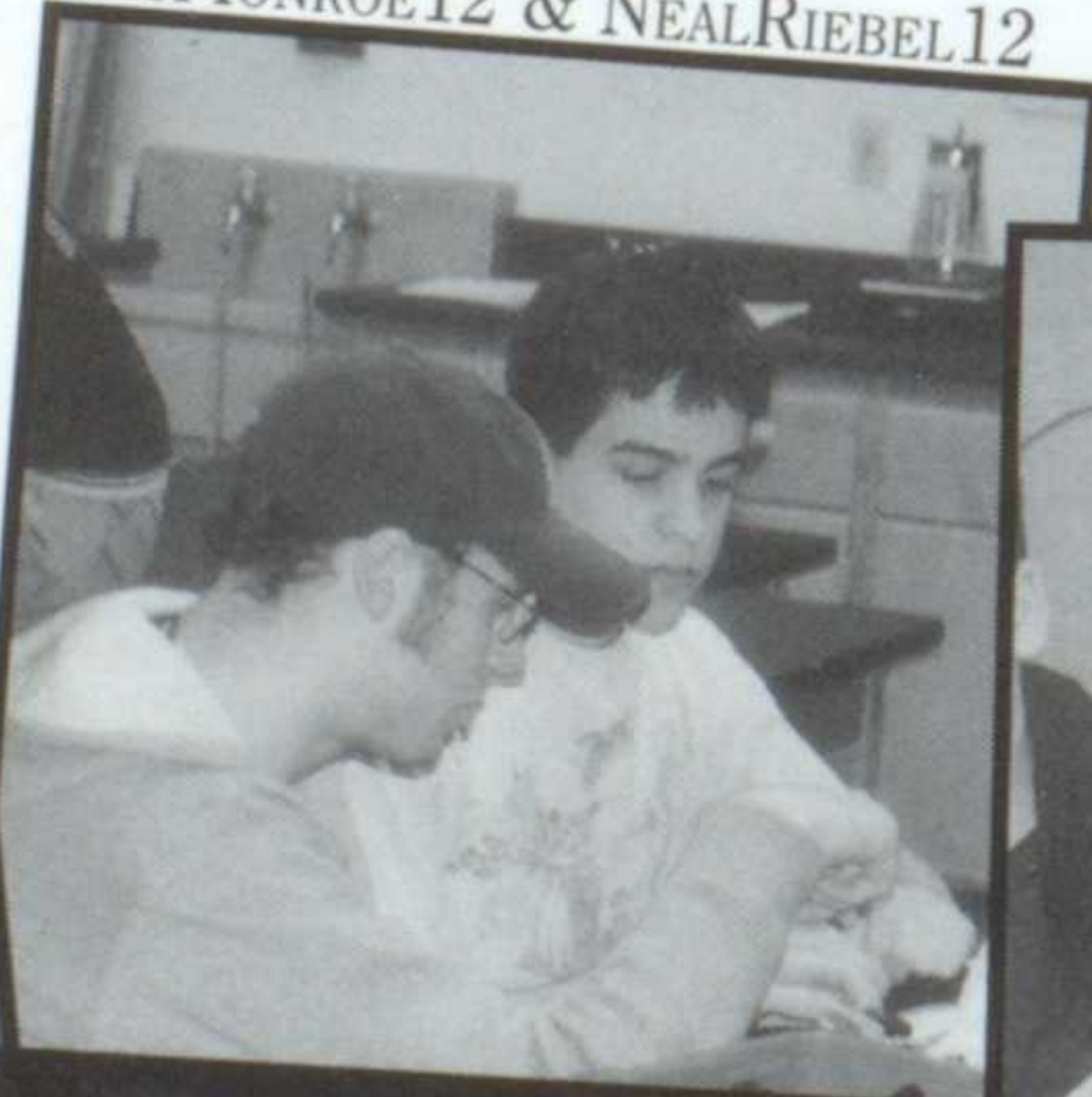

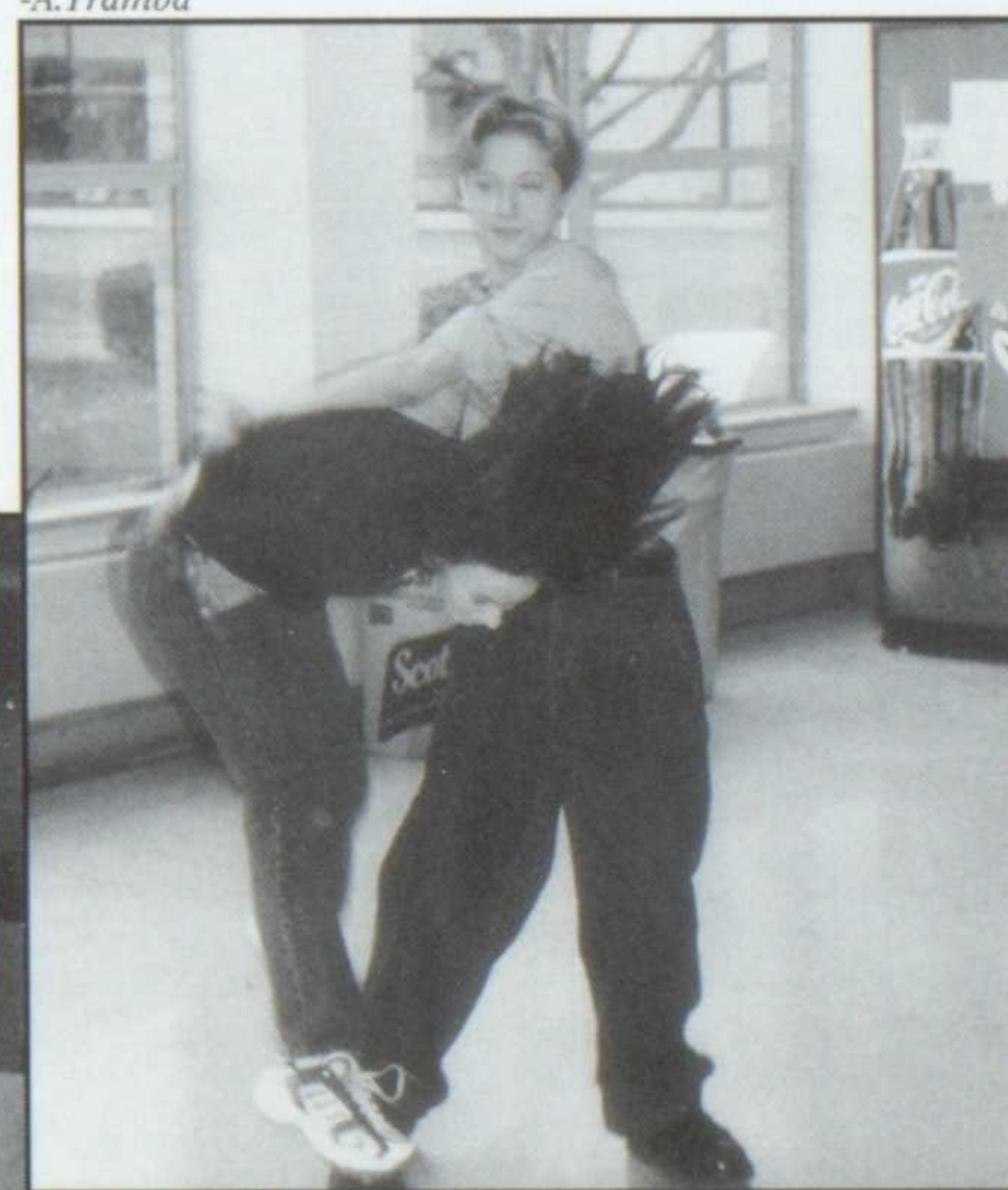

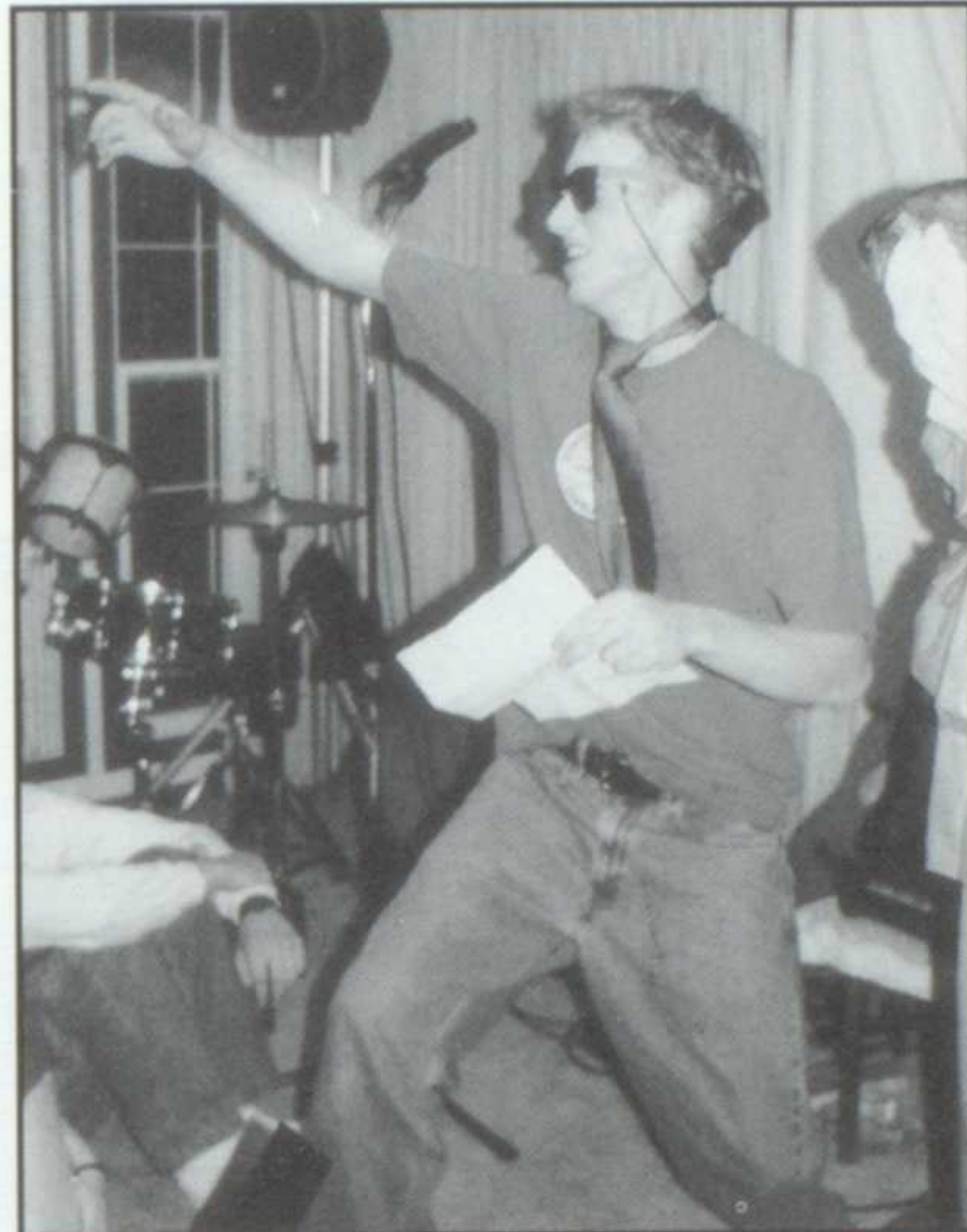

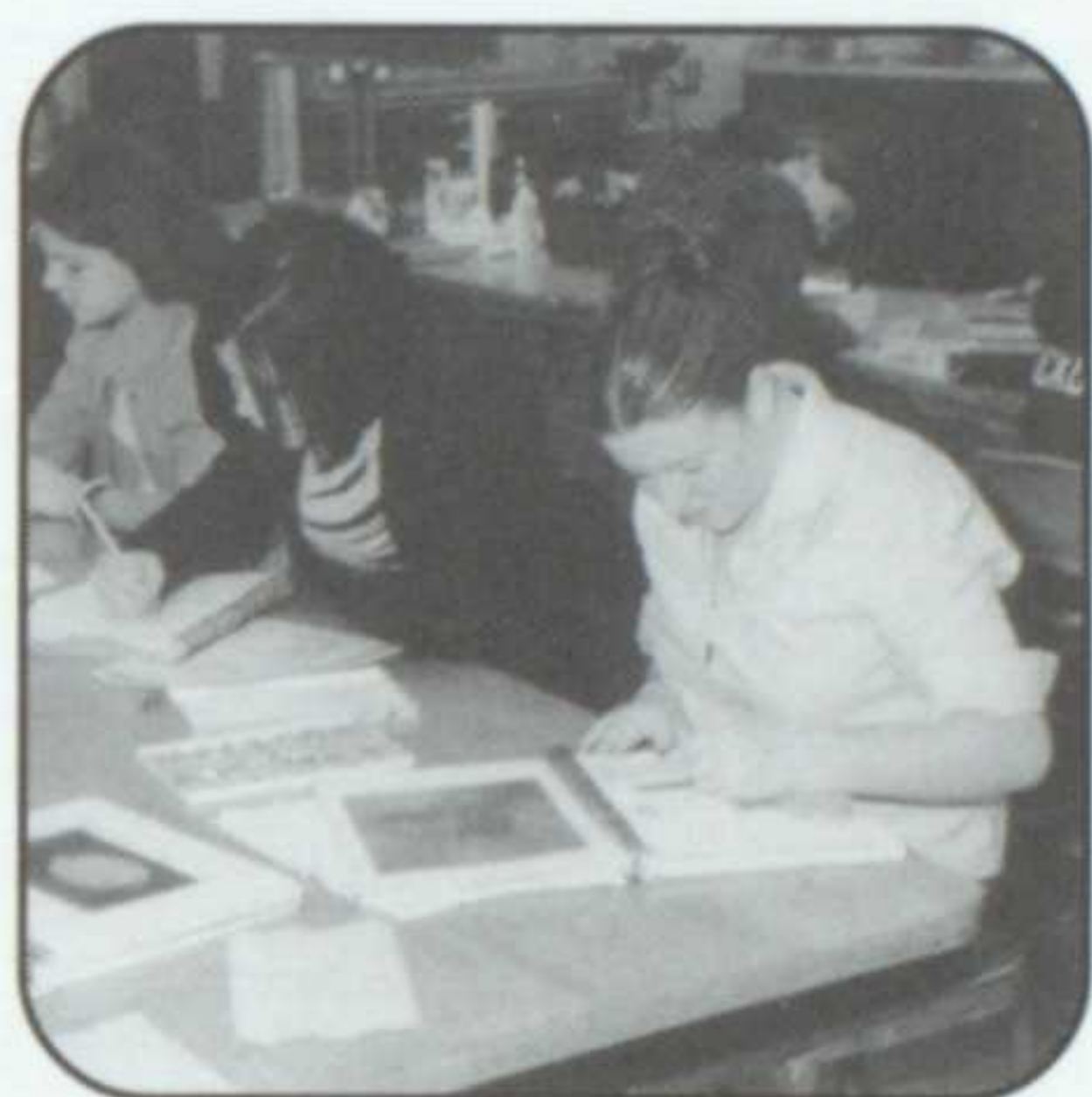

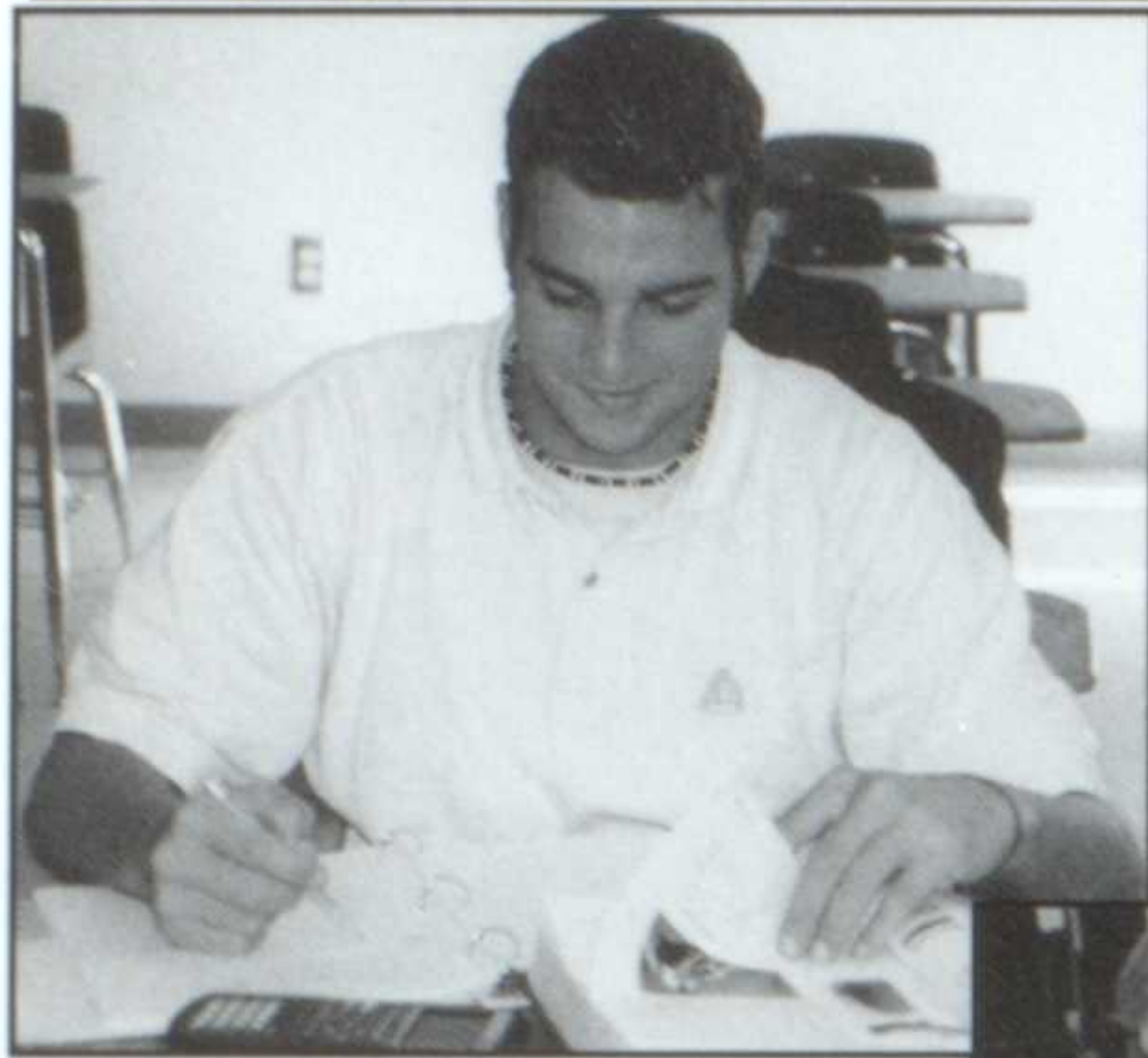

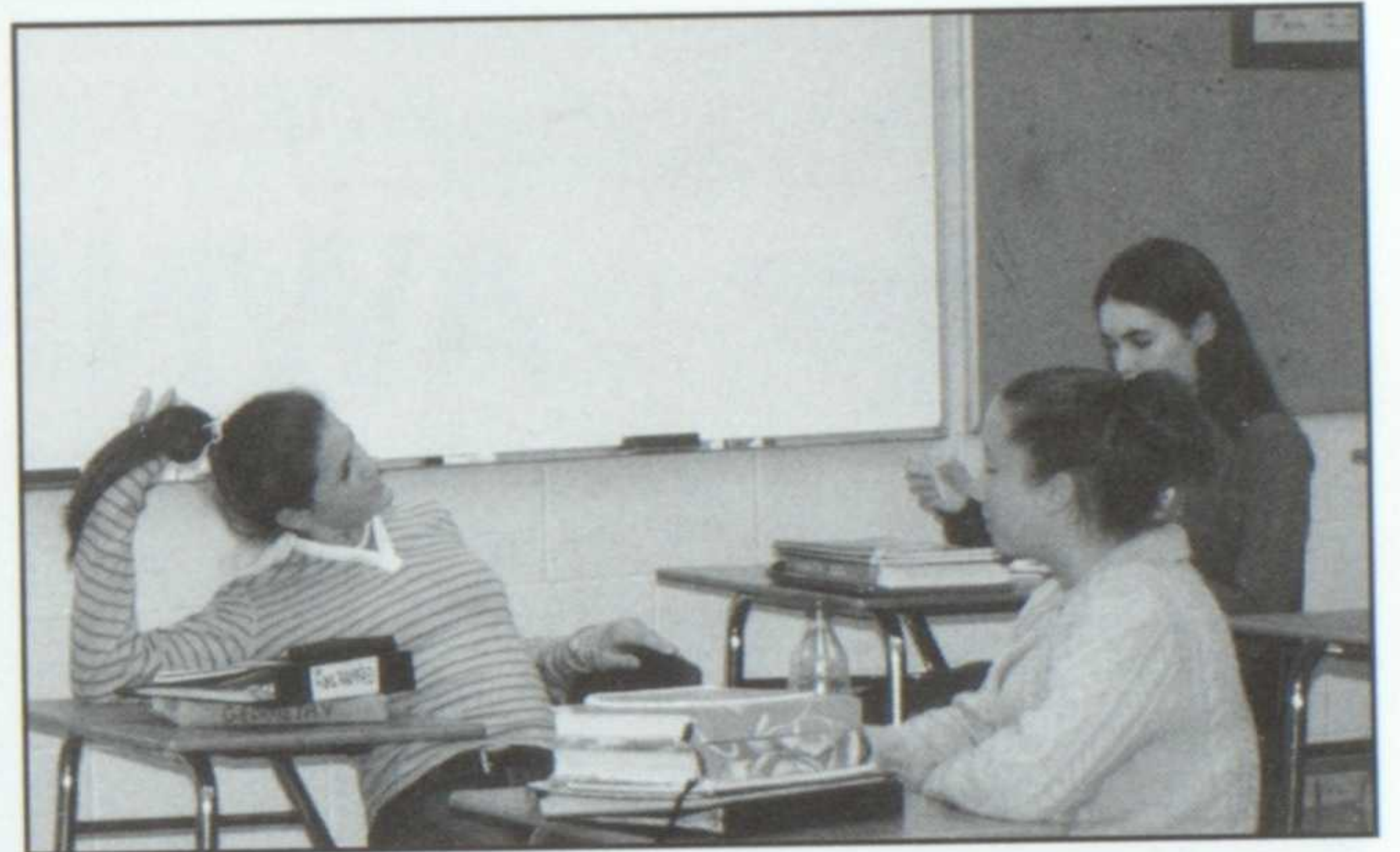

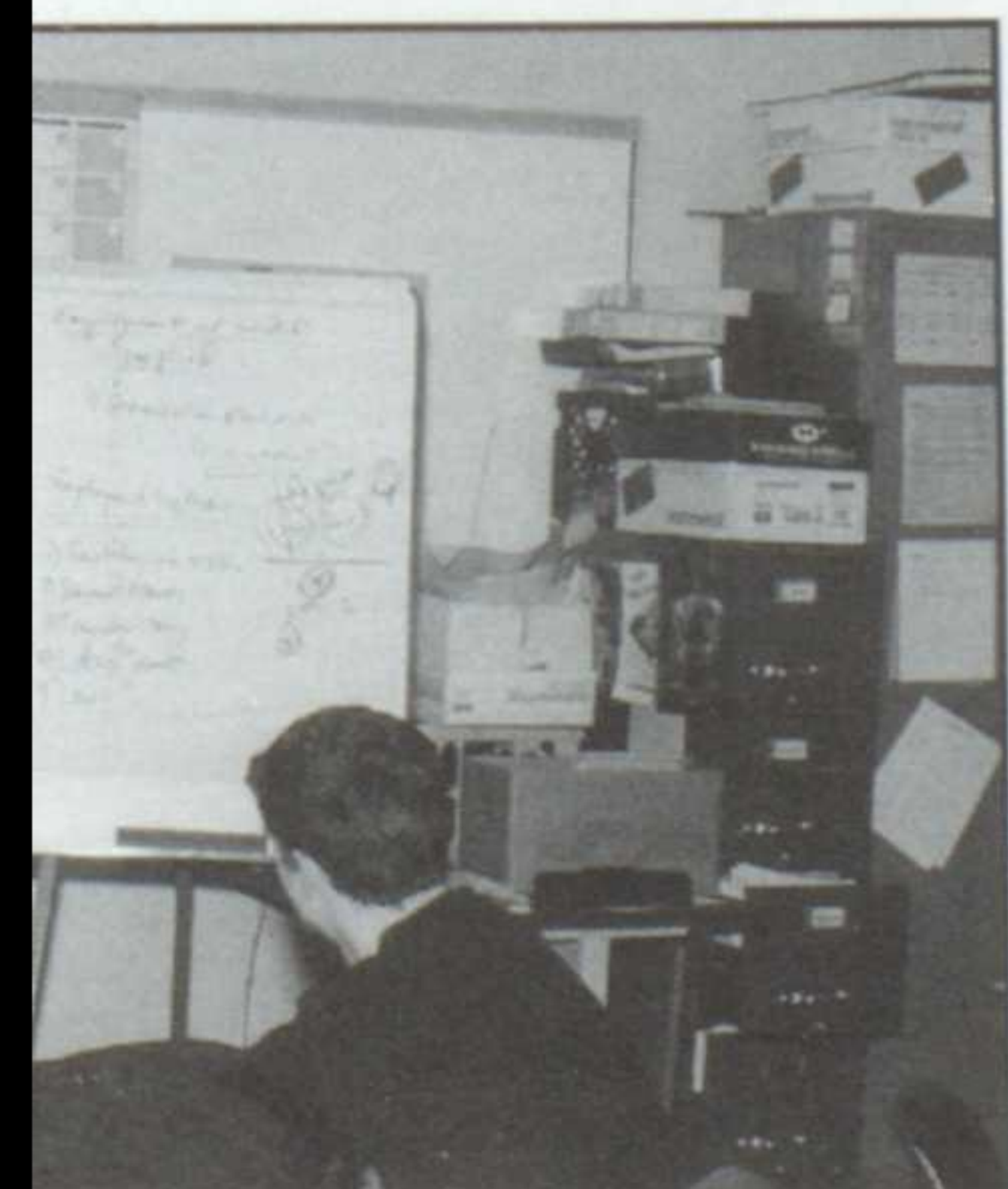

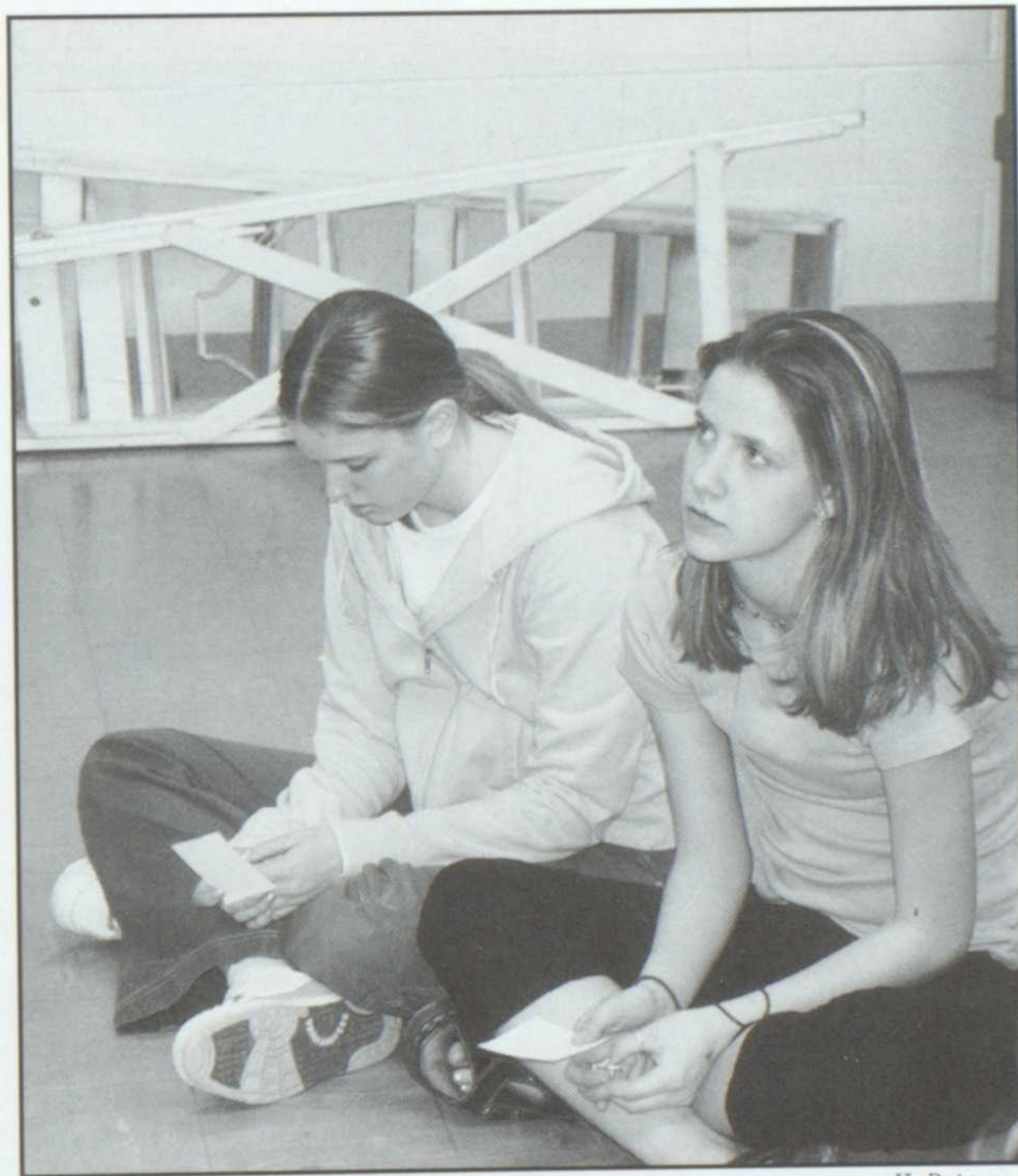
THE BEST THING ABOUT MY 3C BLOCK CLASS WAS...

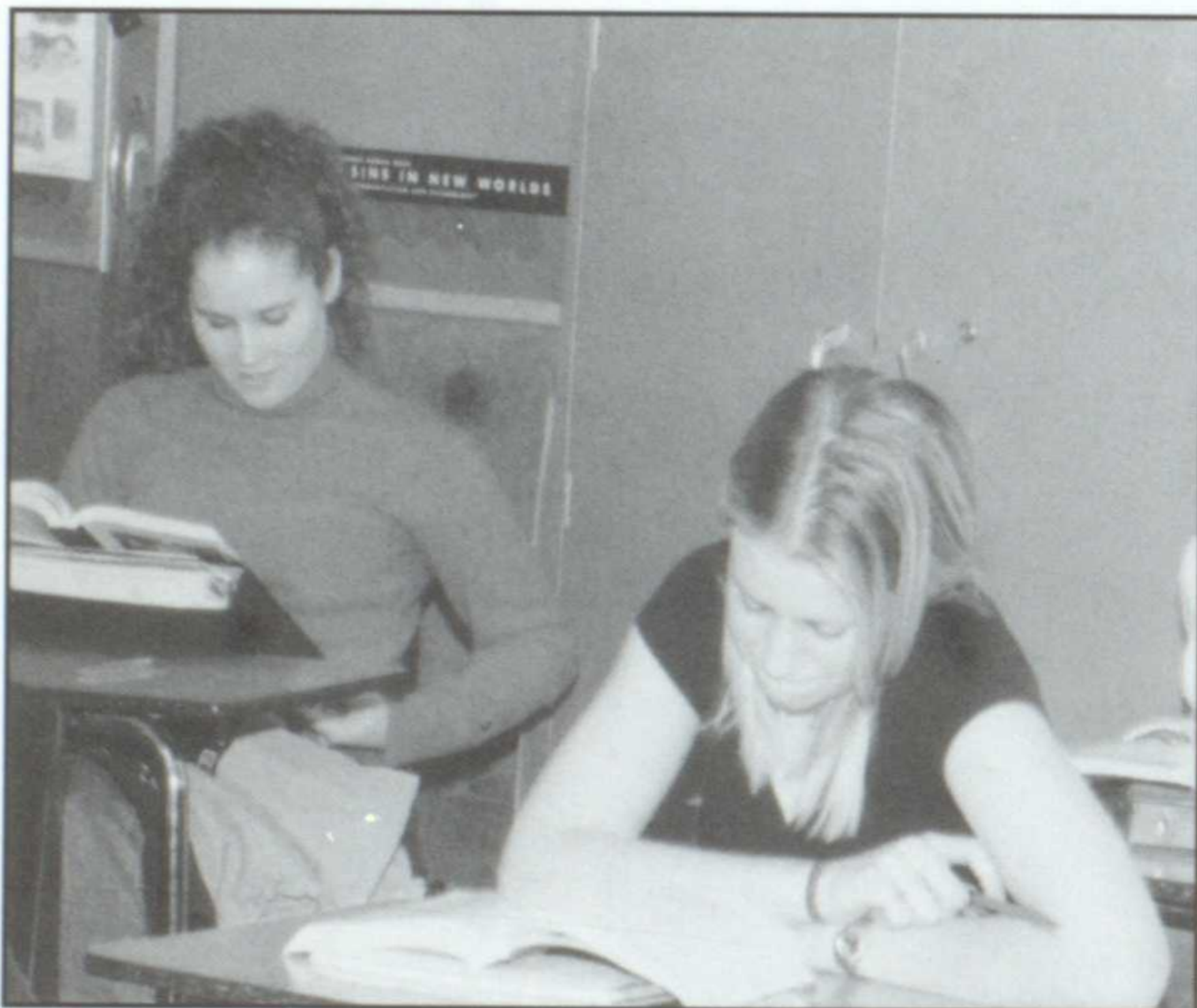

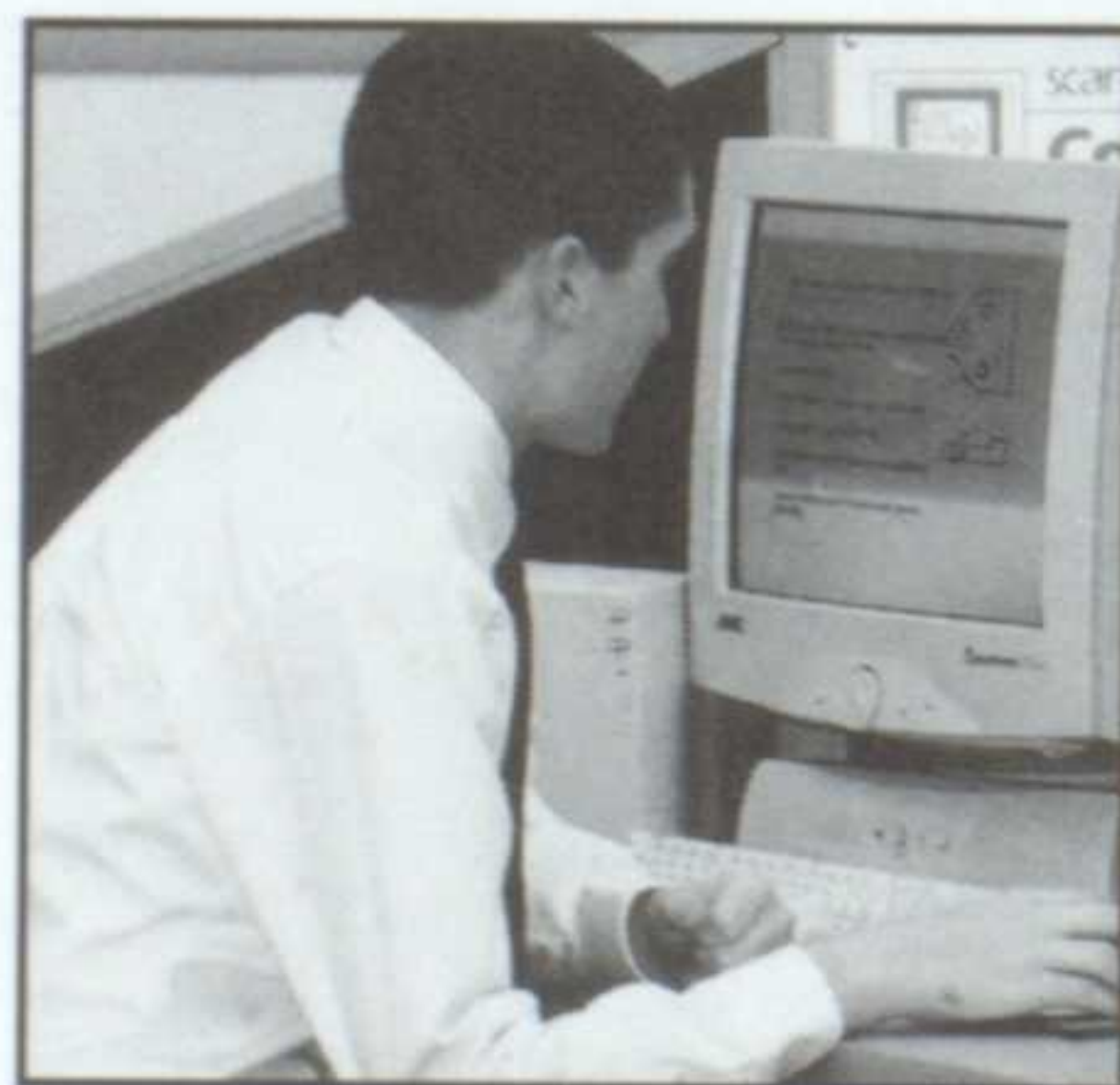

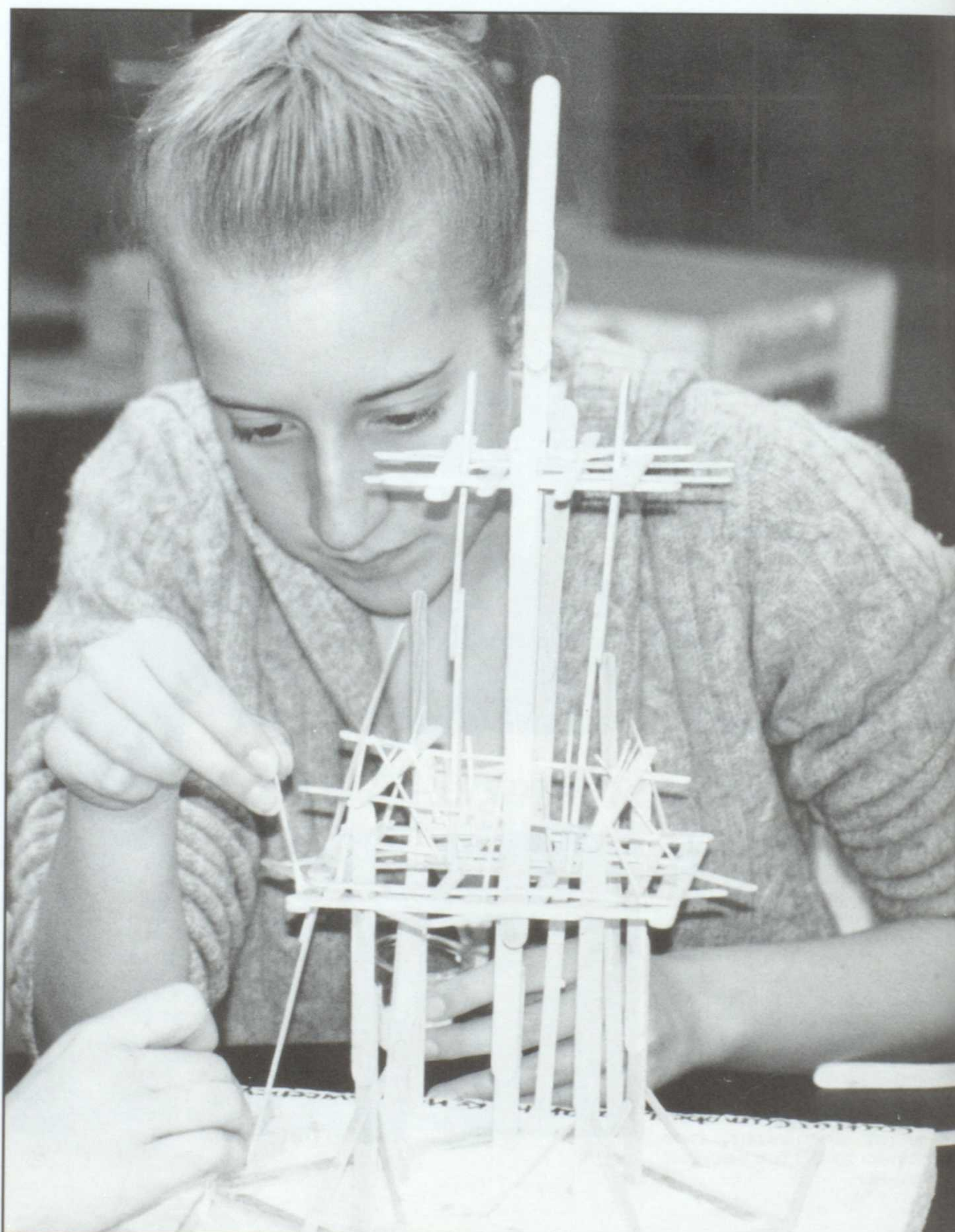

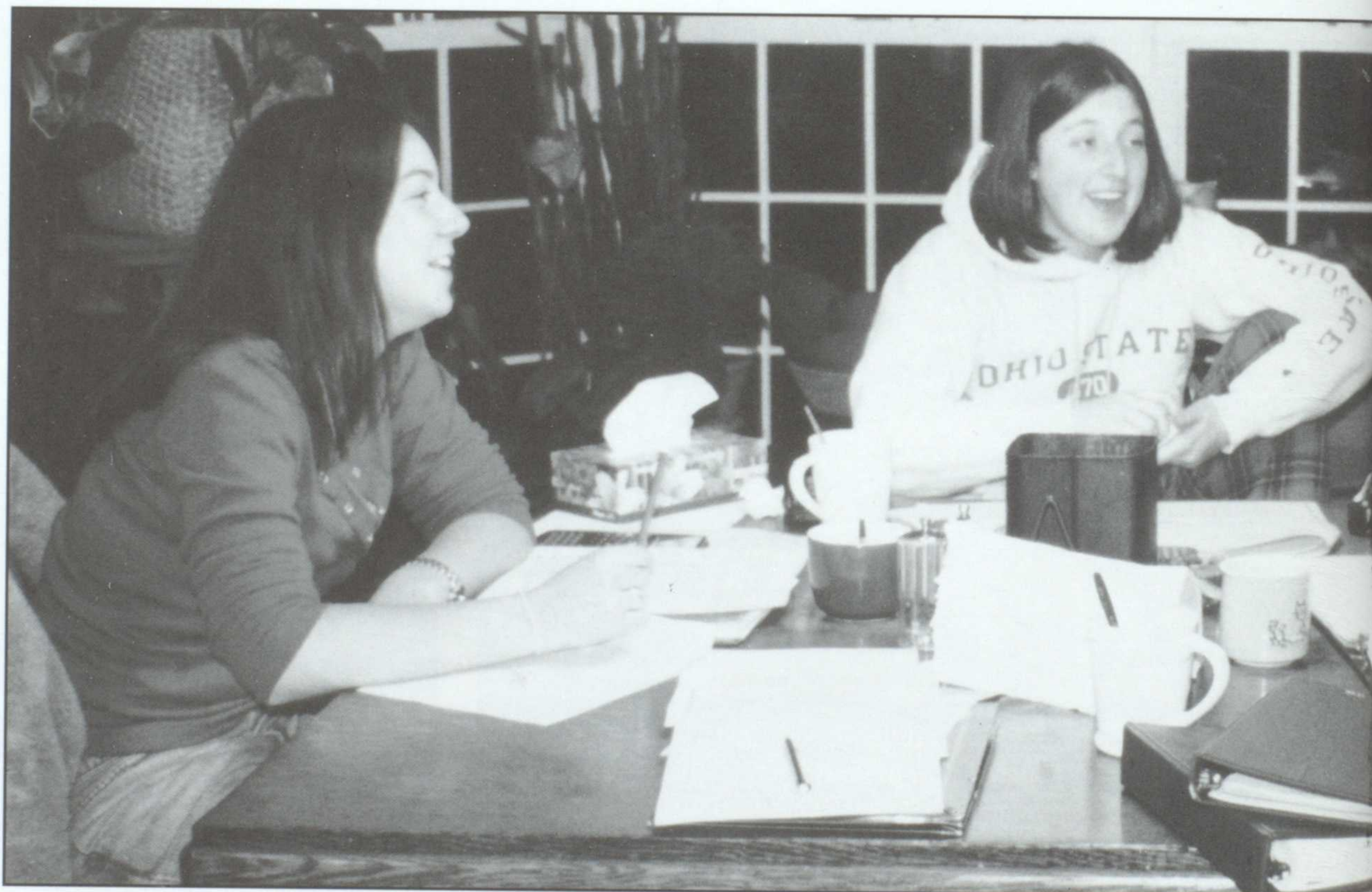
THE BEST PART OF LEAVING SCHOOL IS...

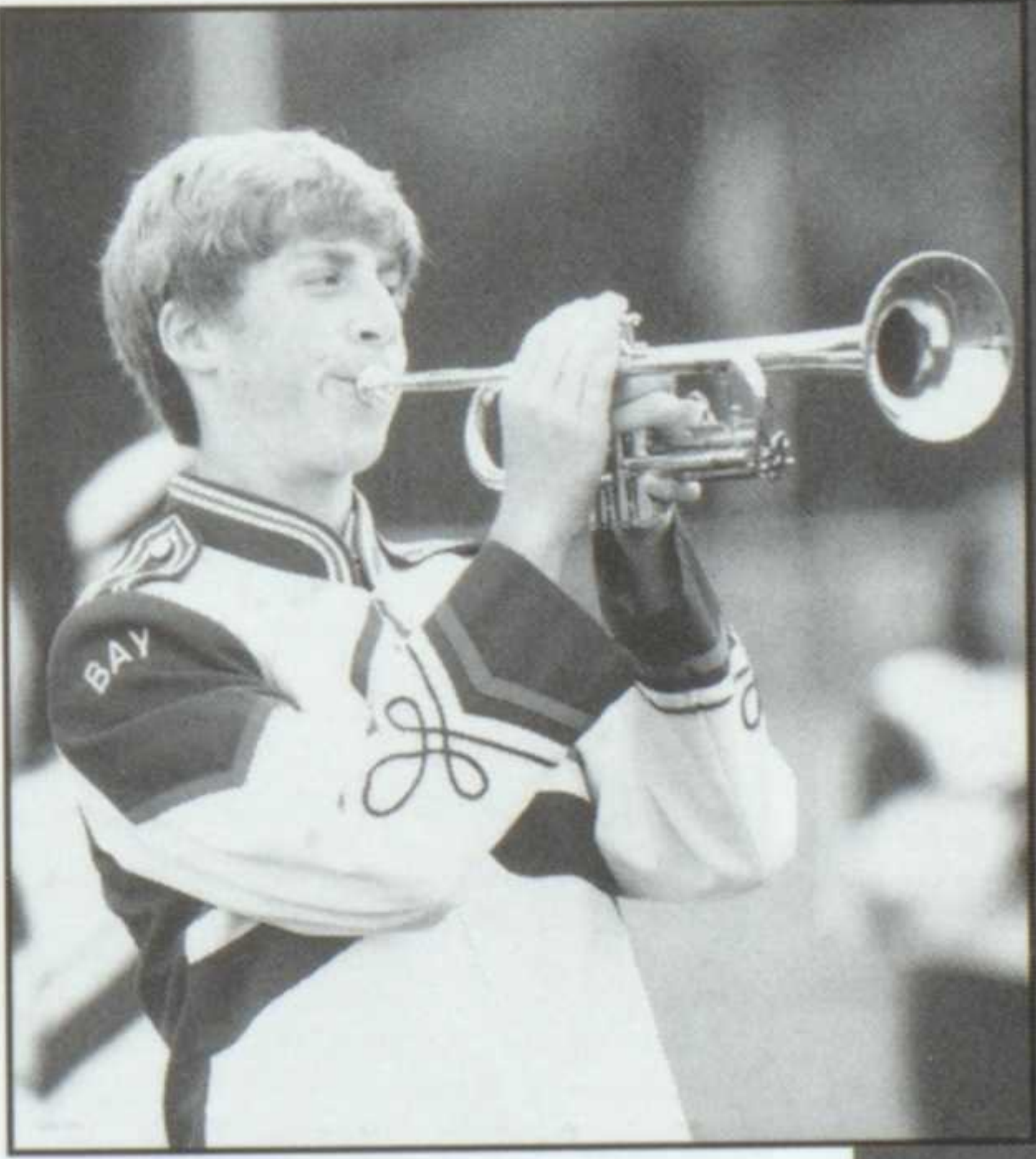

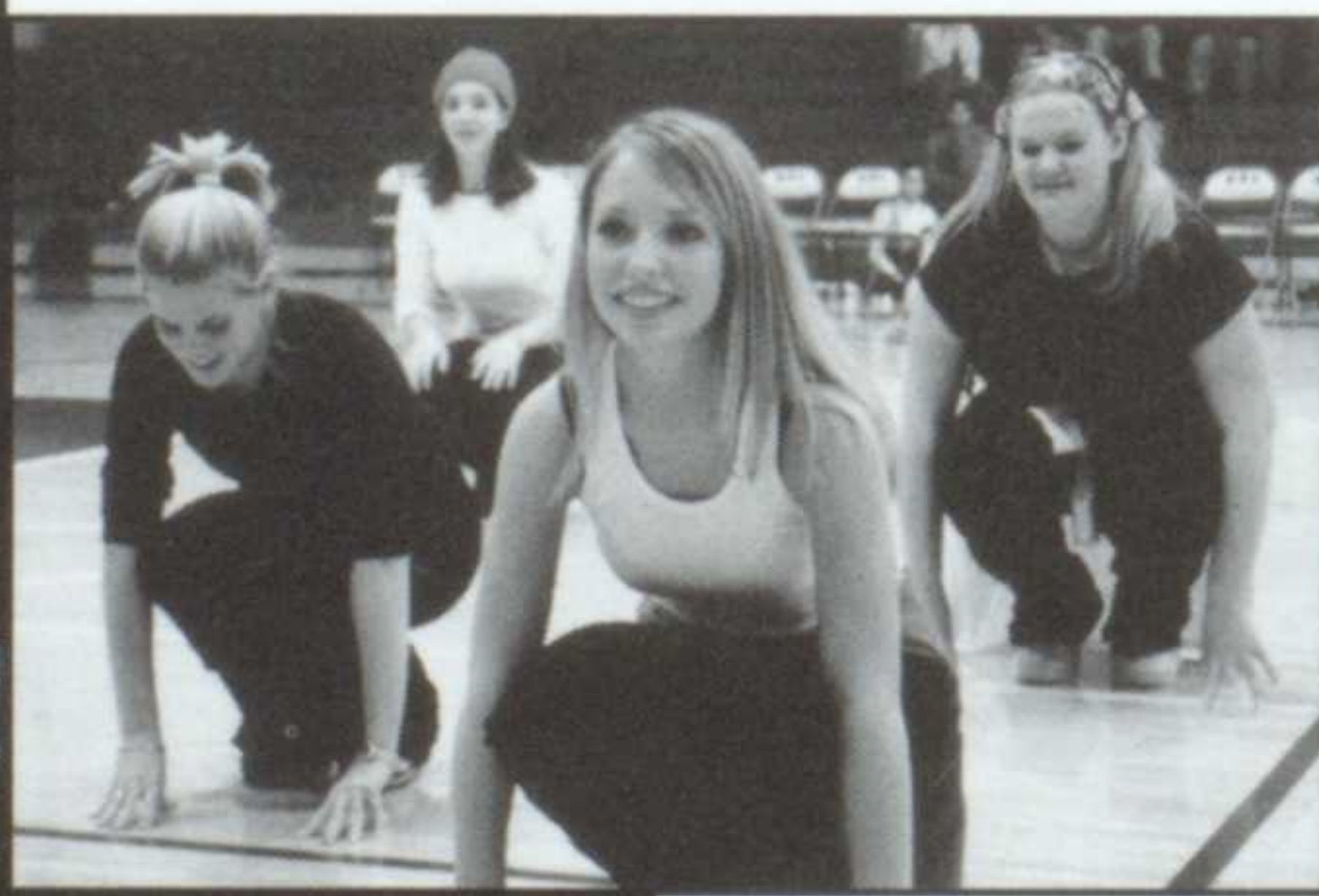

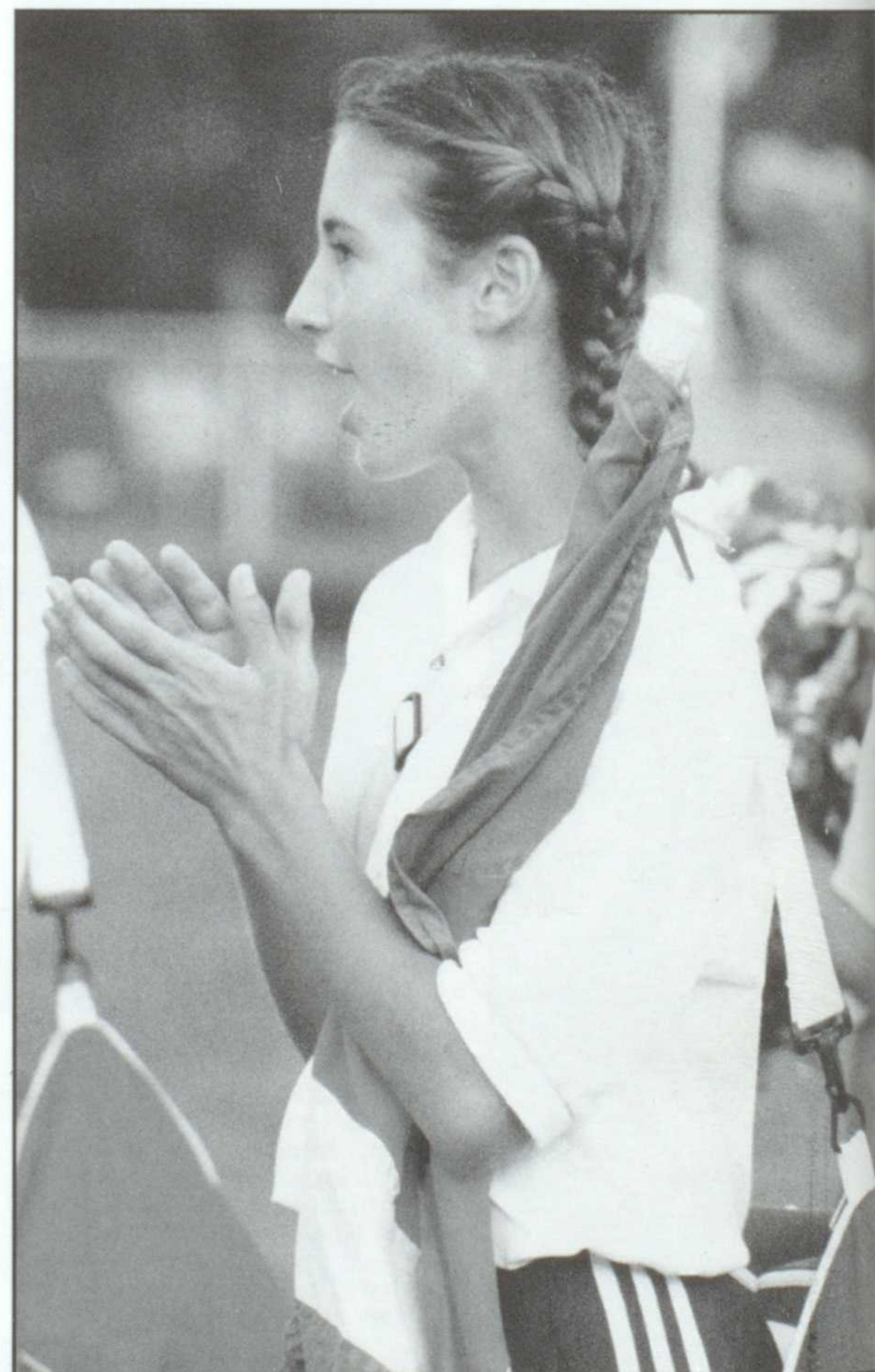

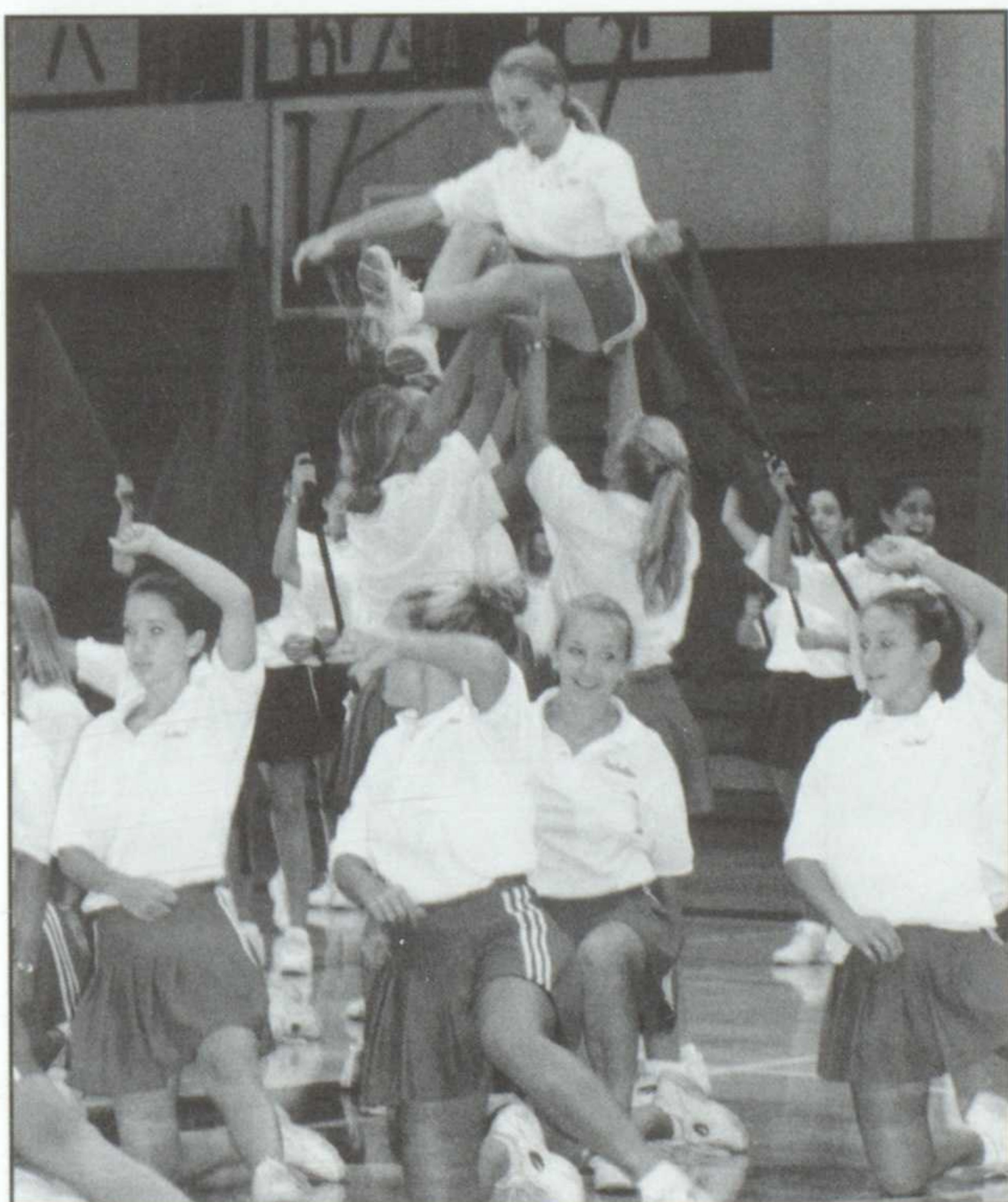

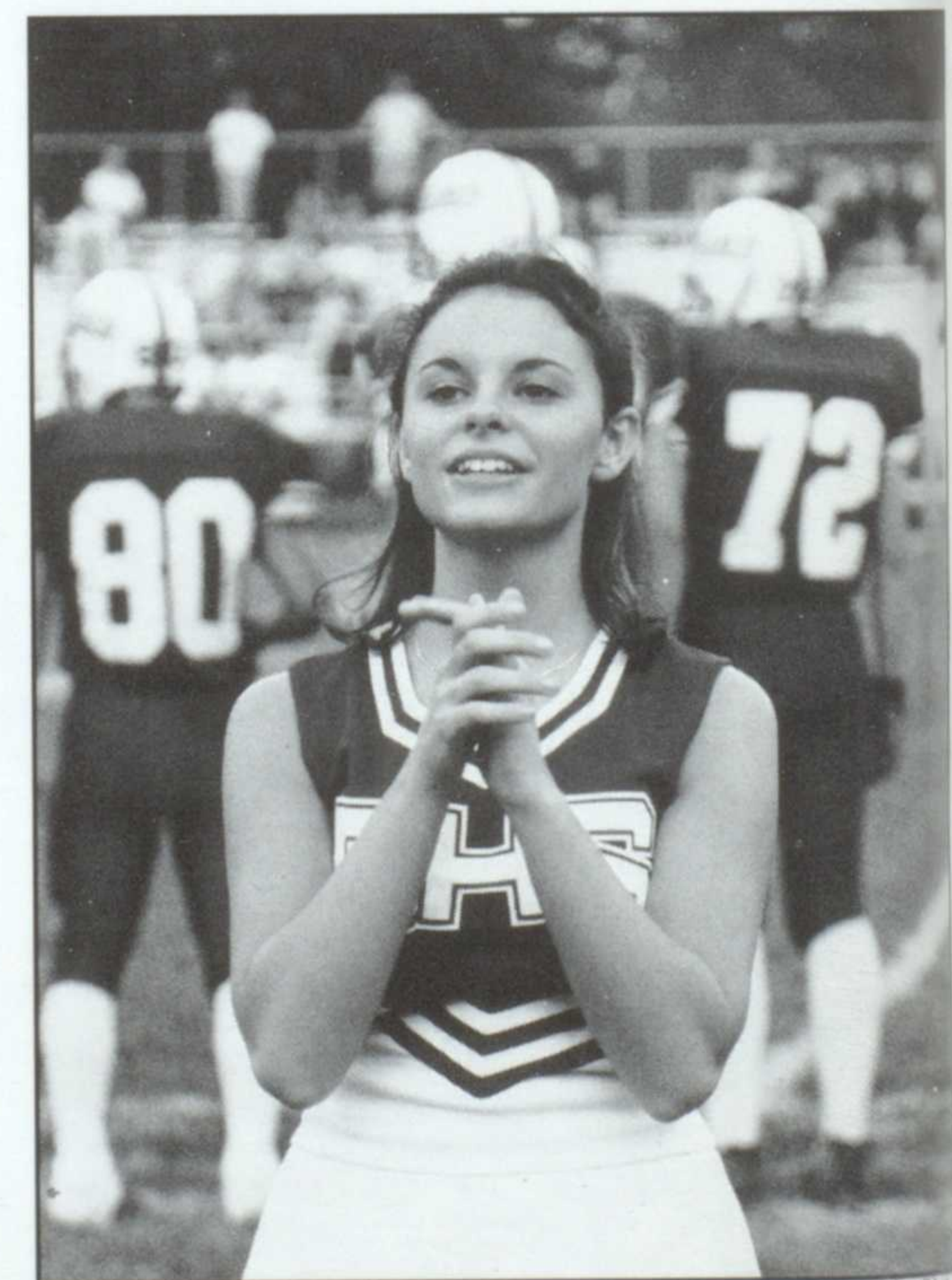
Twenty new girls on the squad

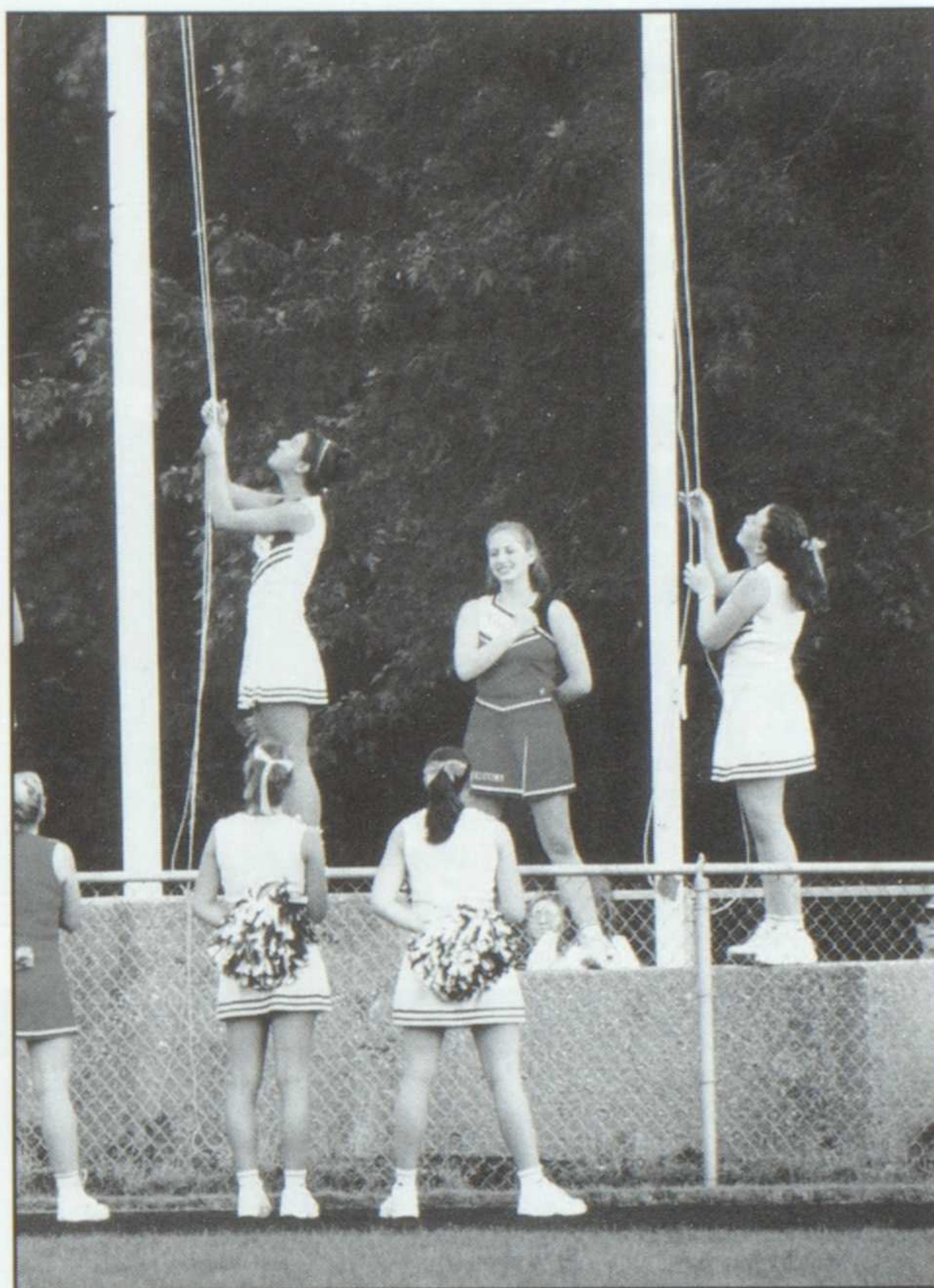

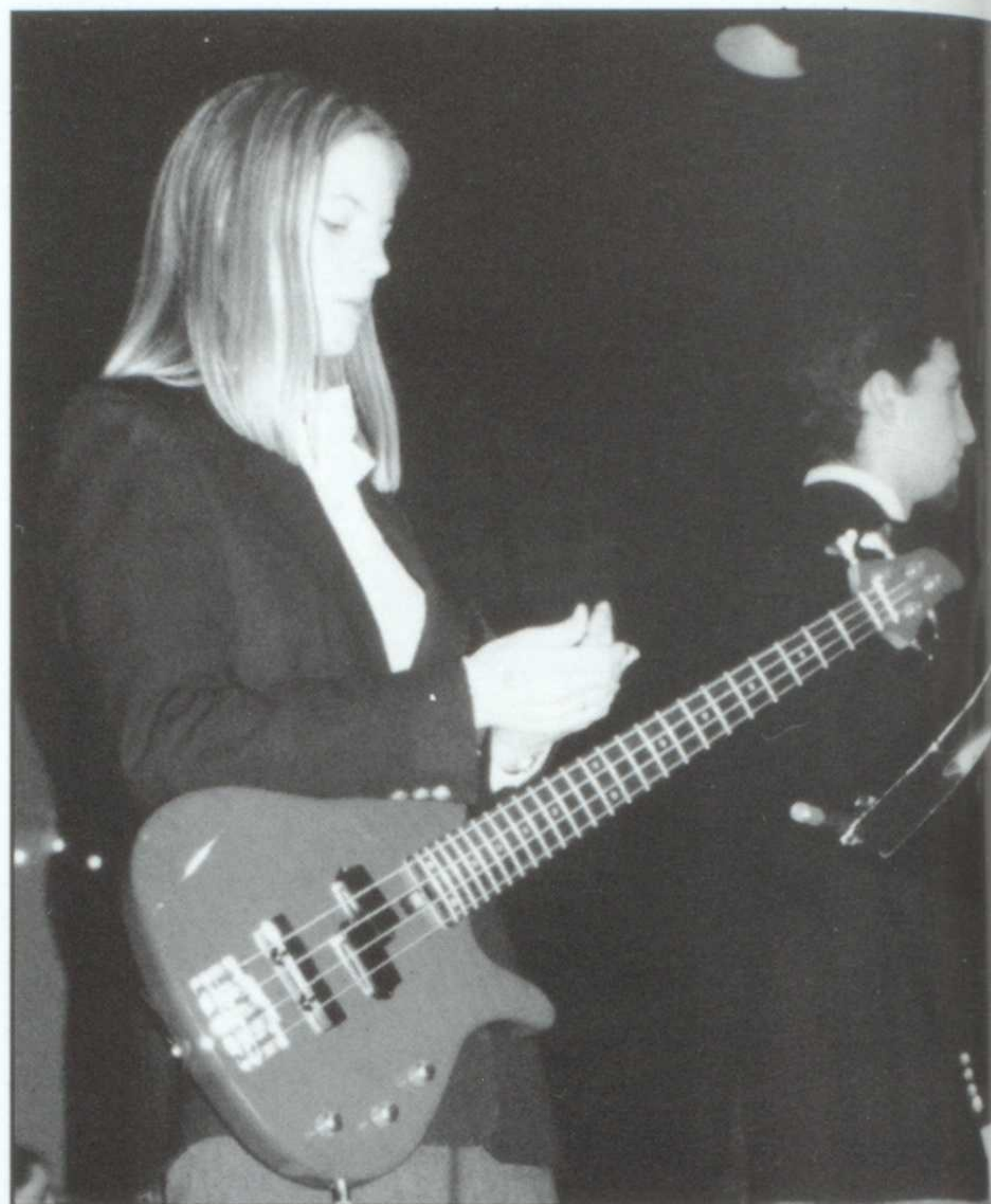

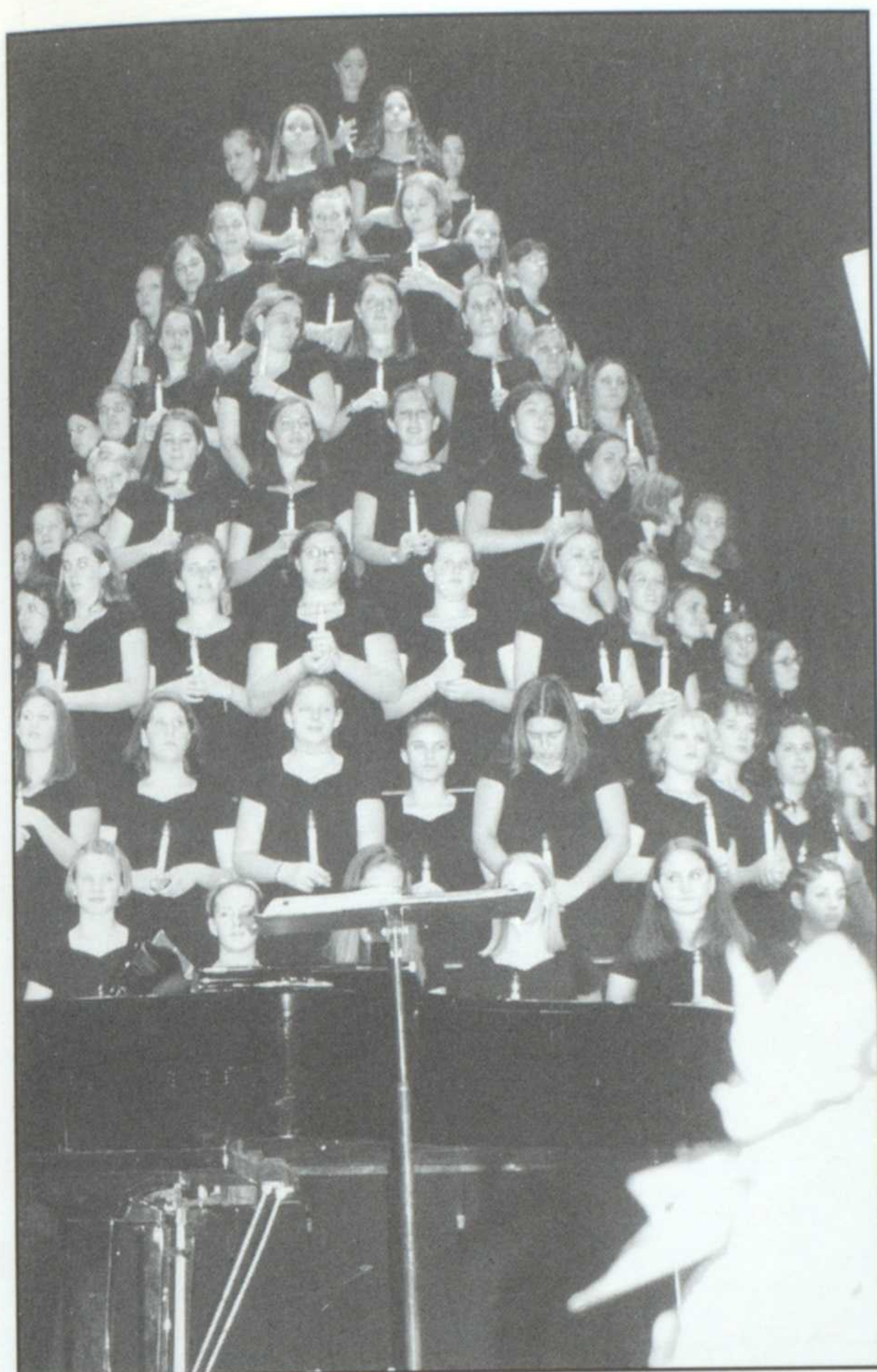

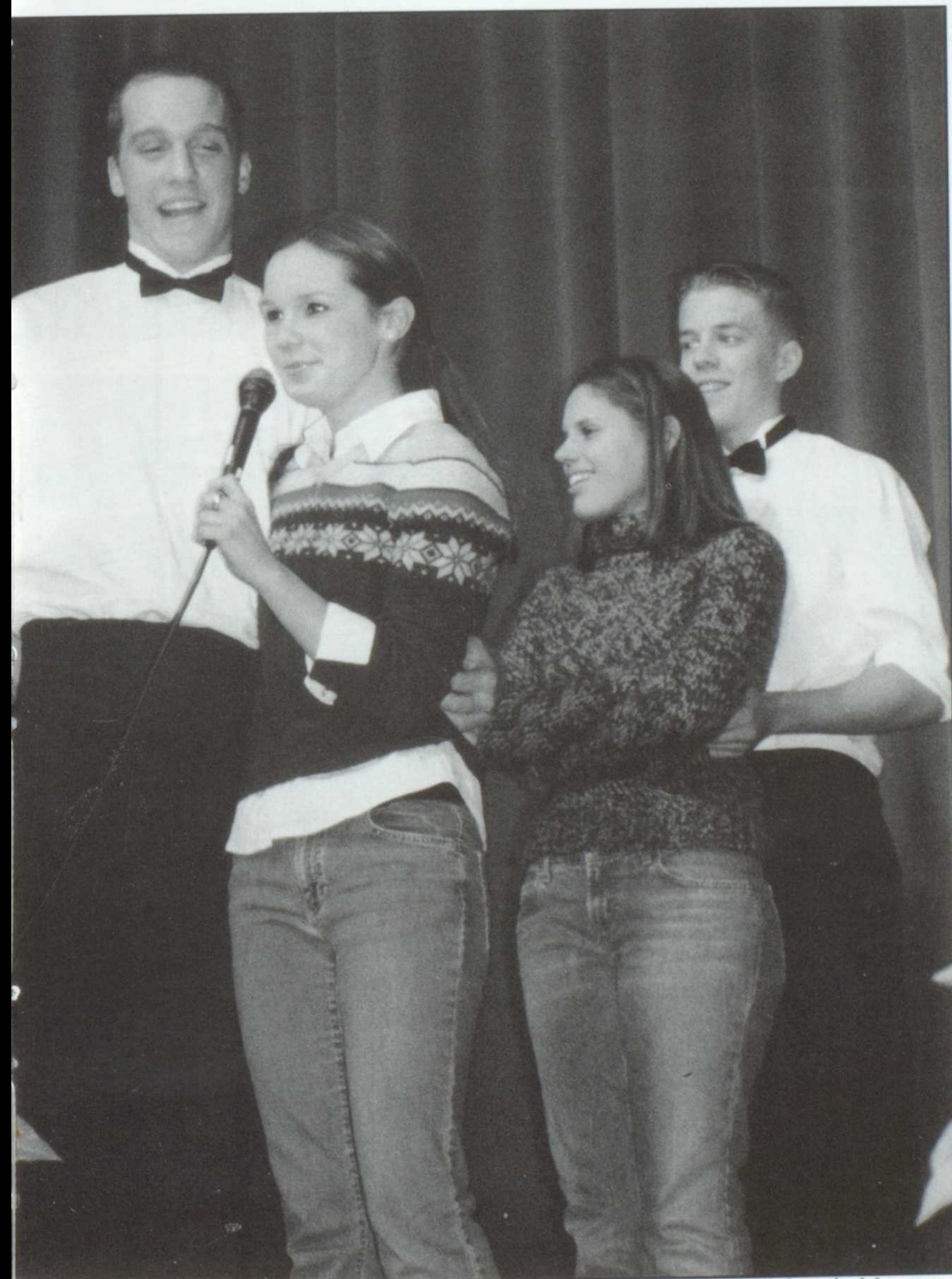
Flying Solo!

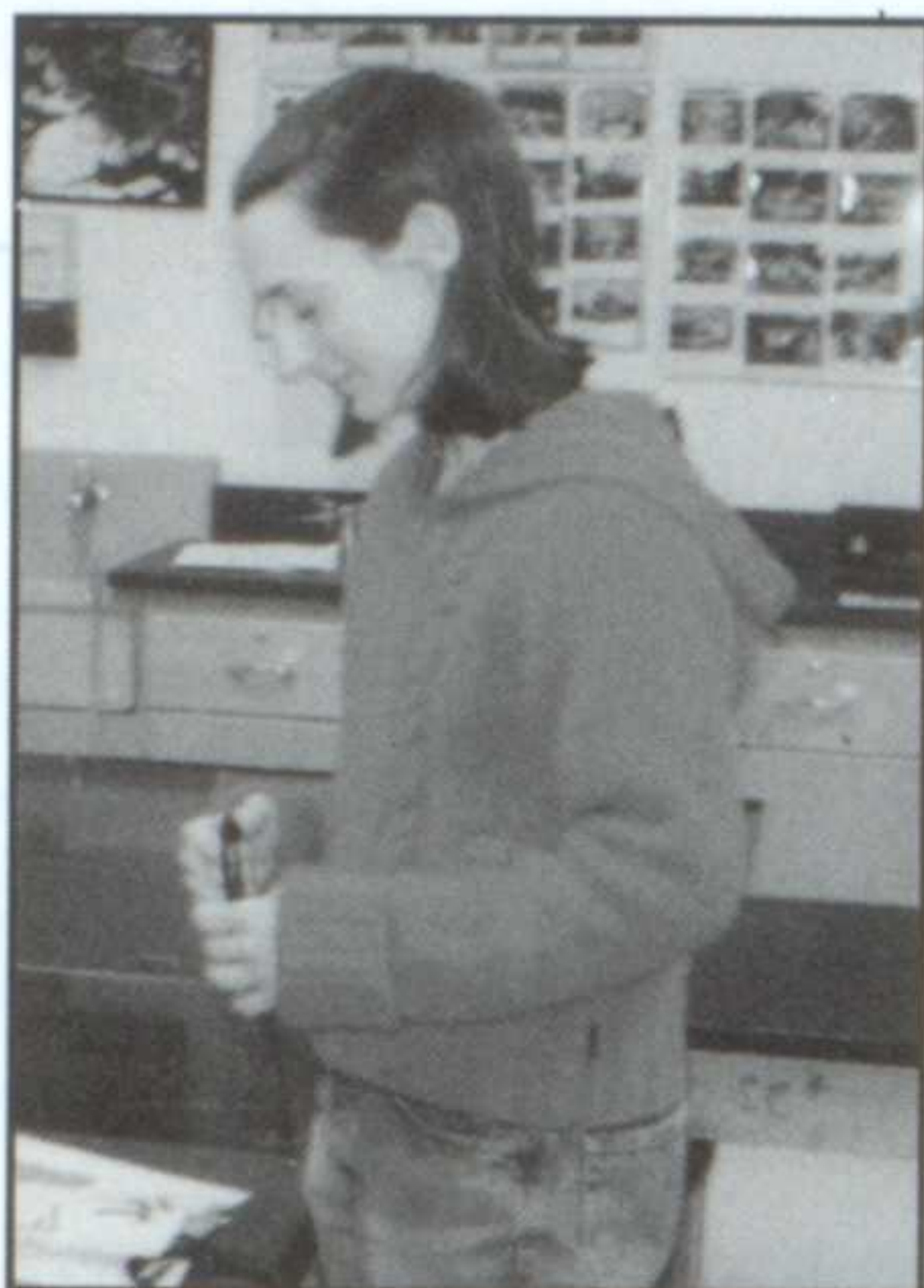

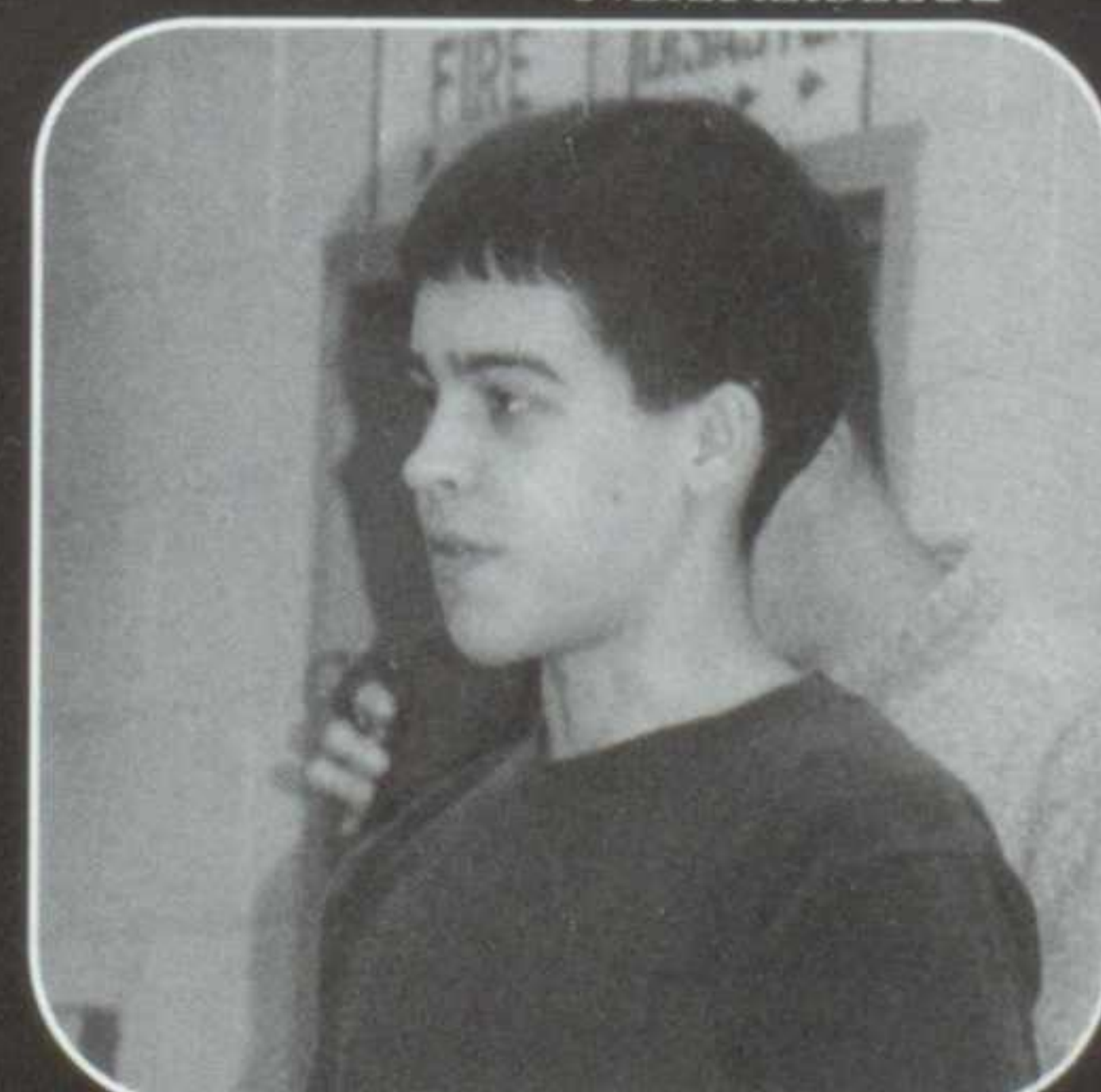

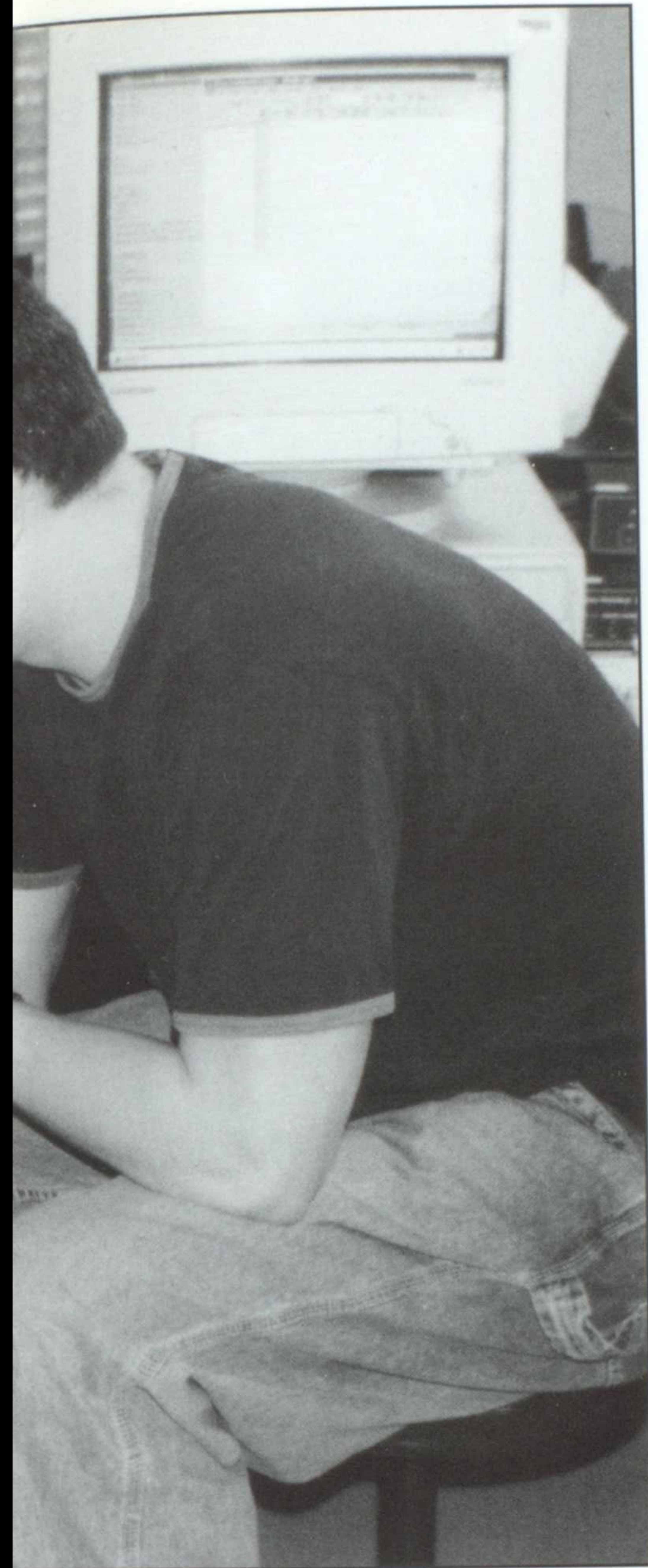

Simulating the United Nations, Model UN participants chose to represent a country and argue on behalf of the needs of that nation. Each year, they attended a conference in Ashtabula county.

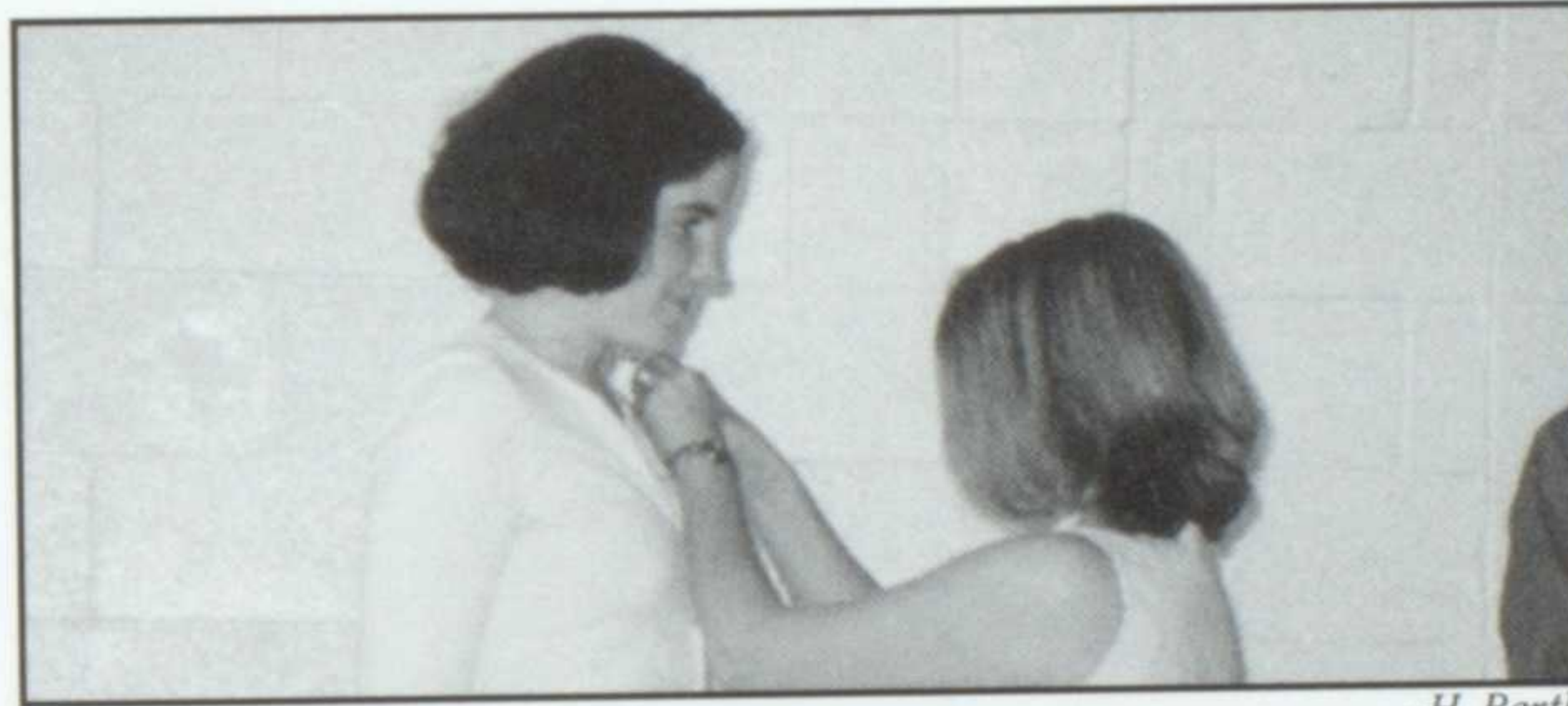

Does anyone really know what HERO or HUDDLE stand for?

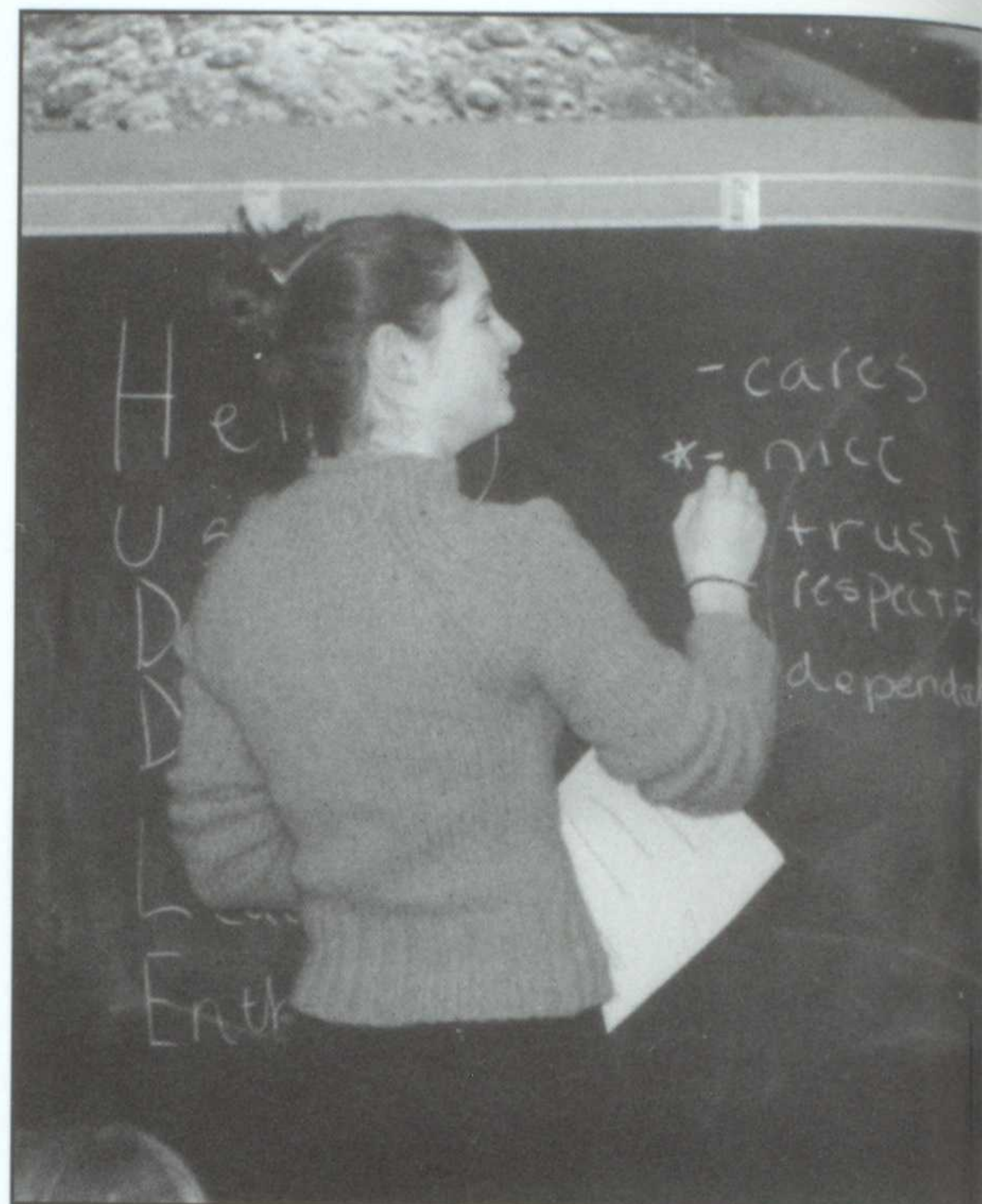

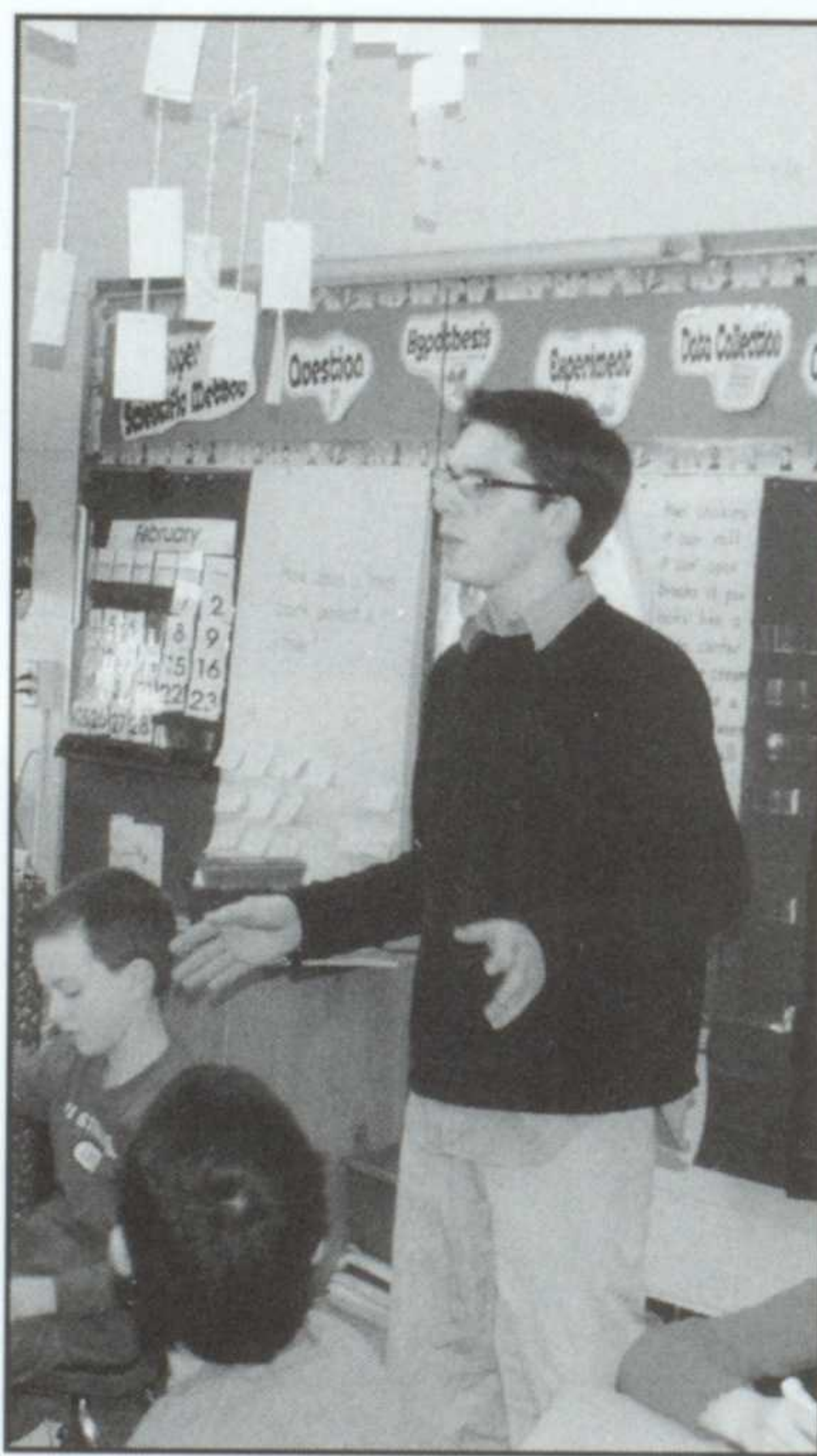

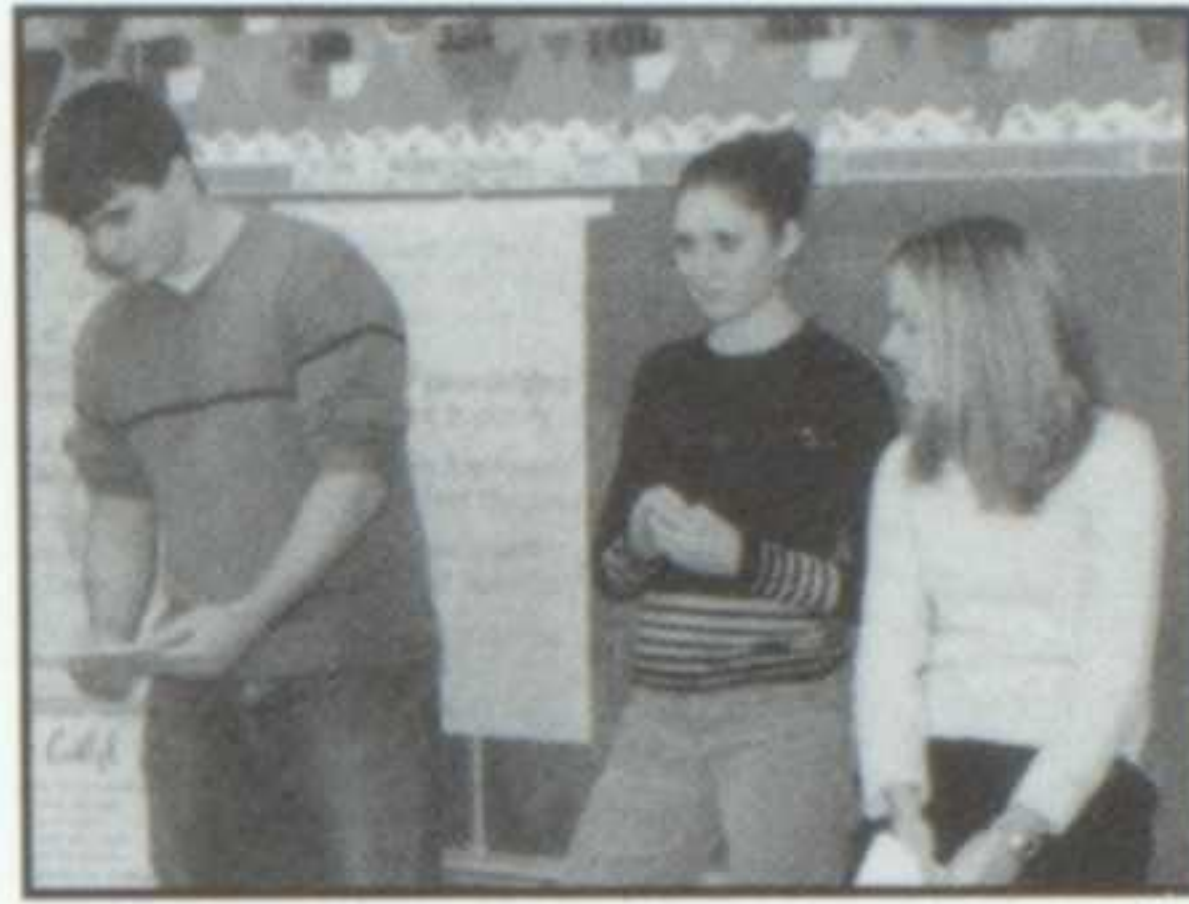

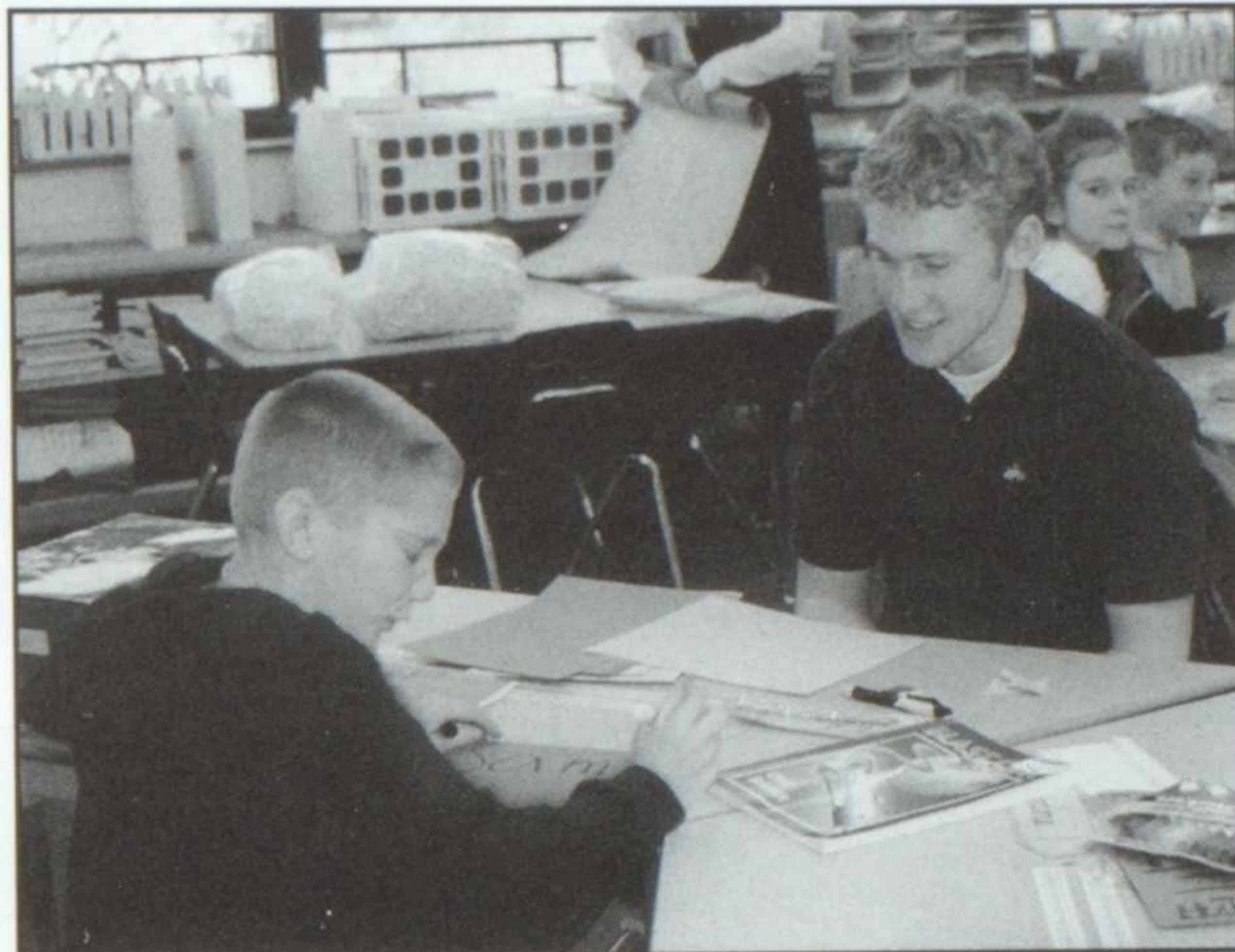

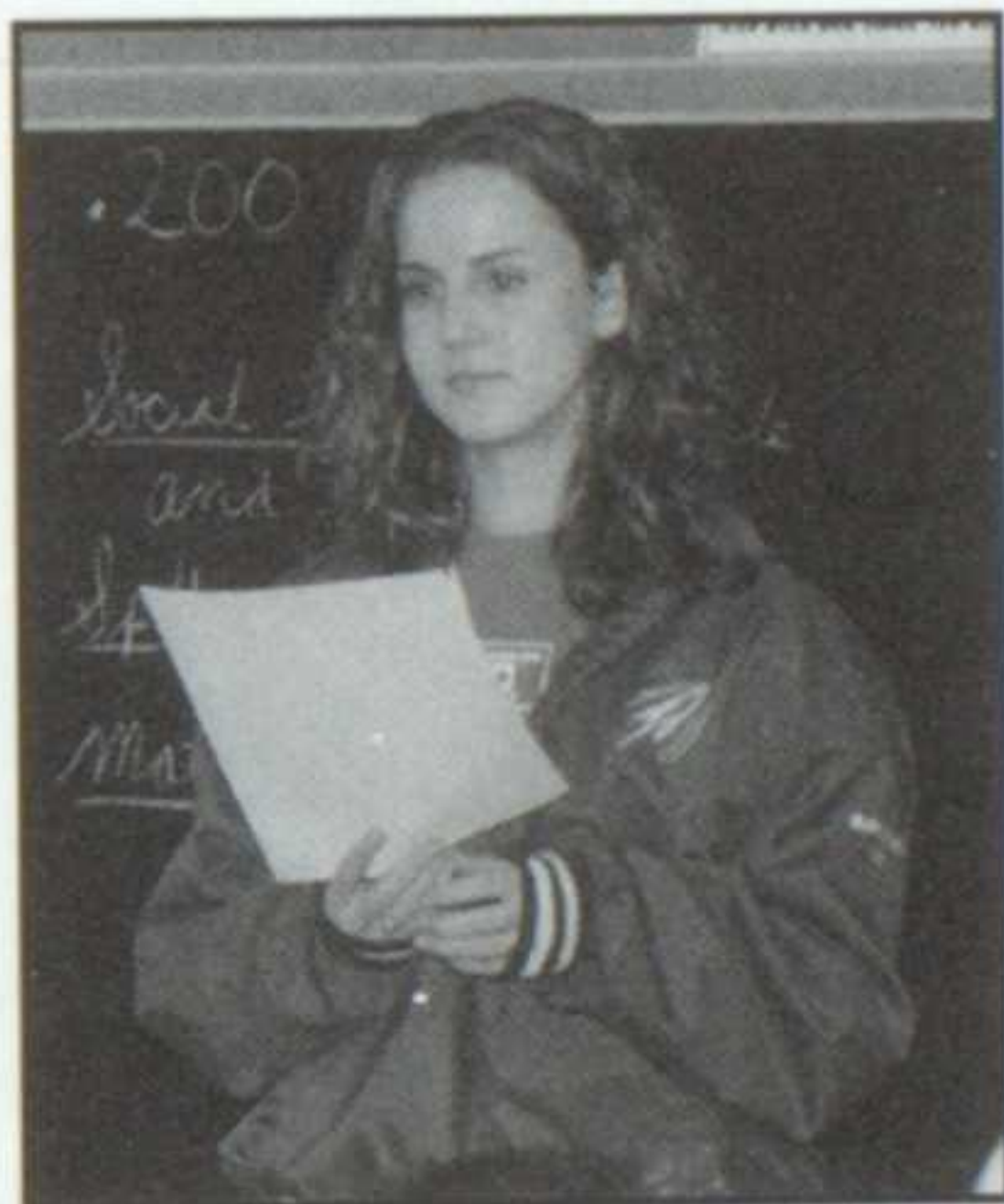

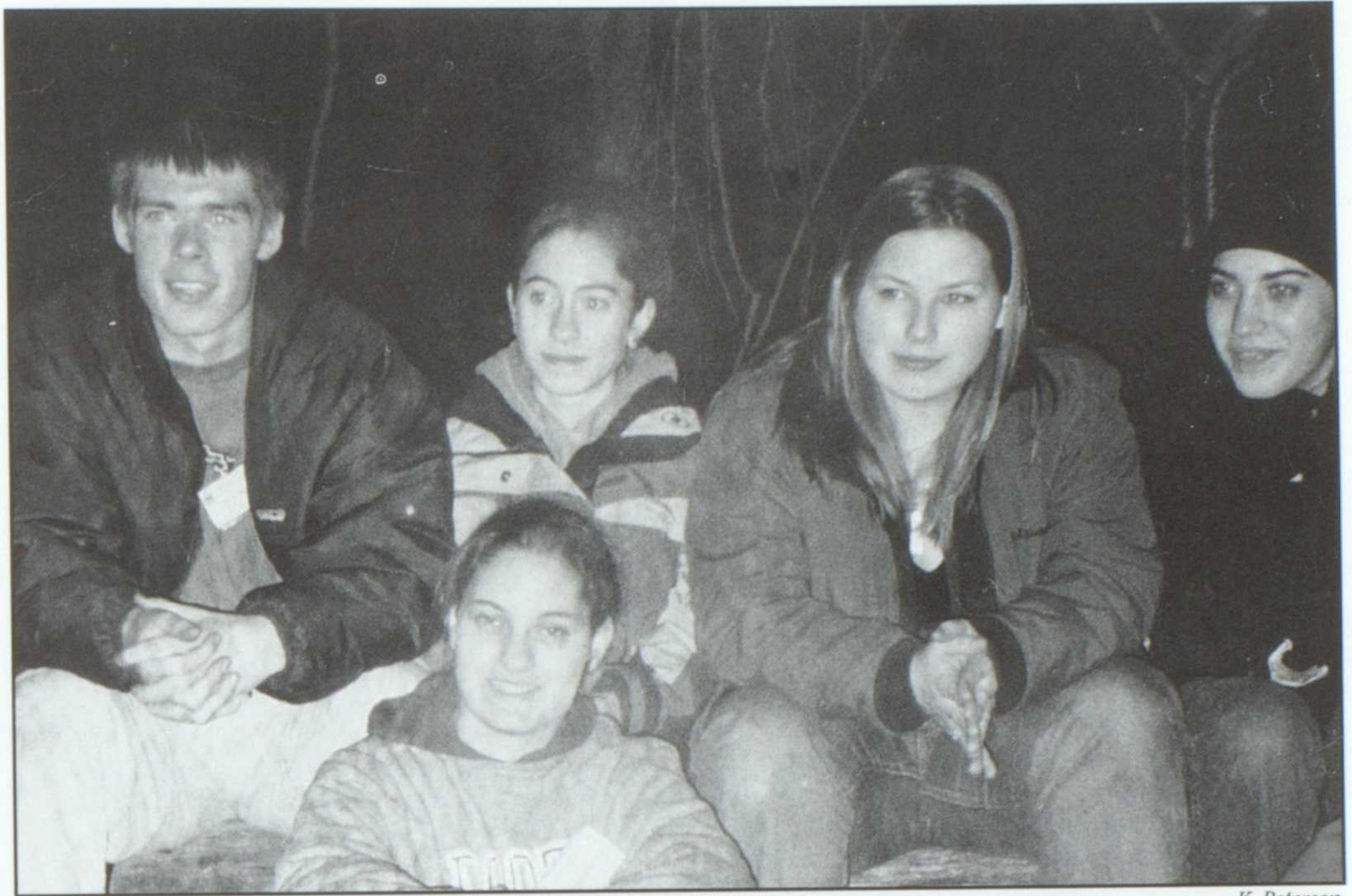

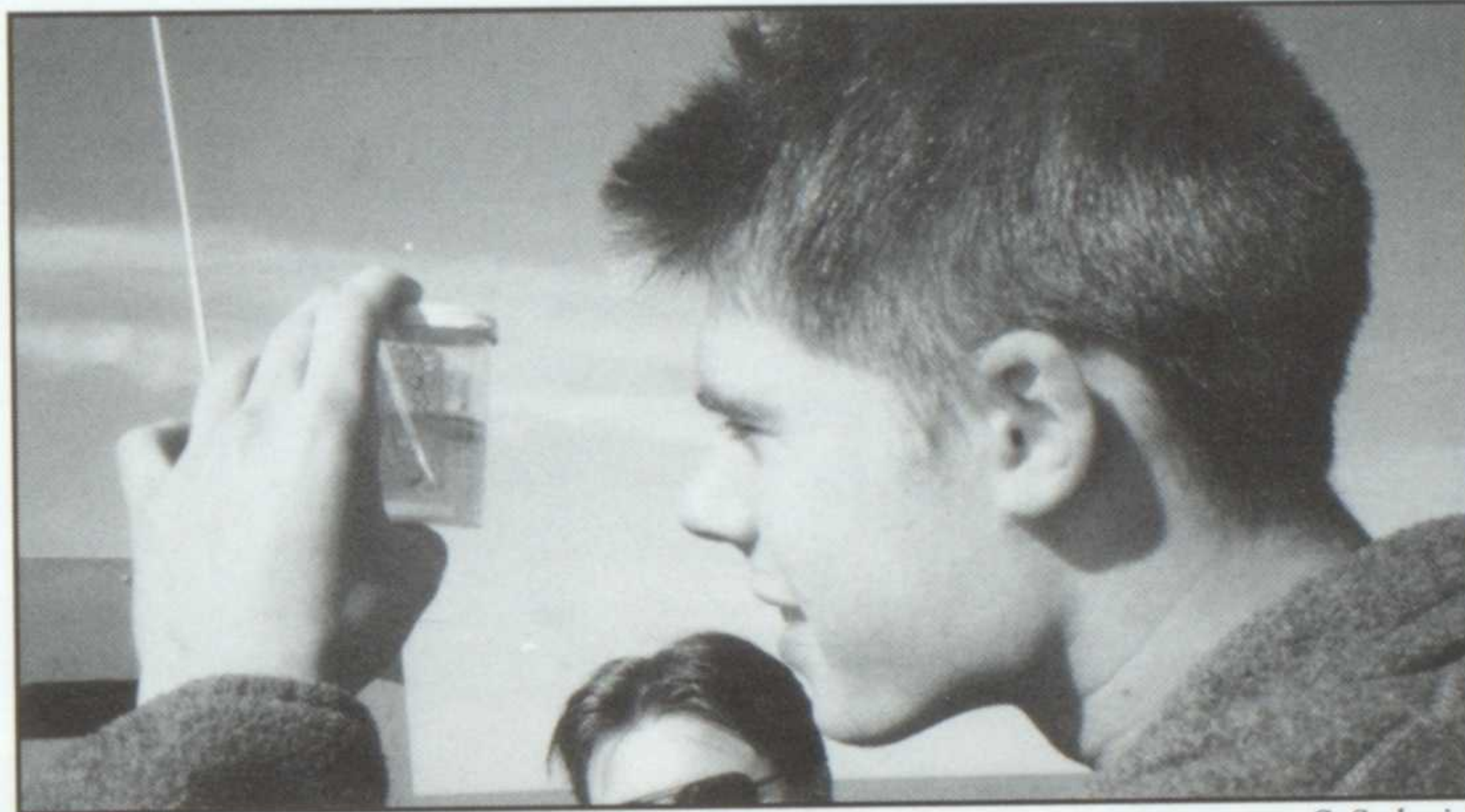

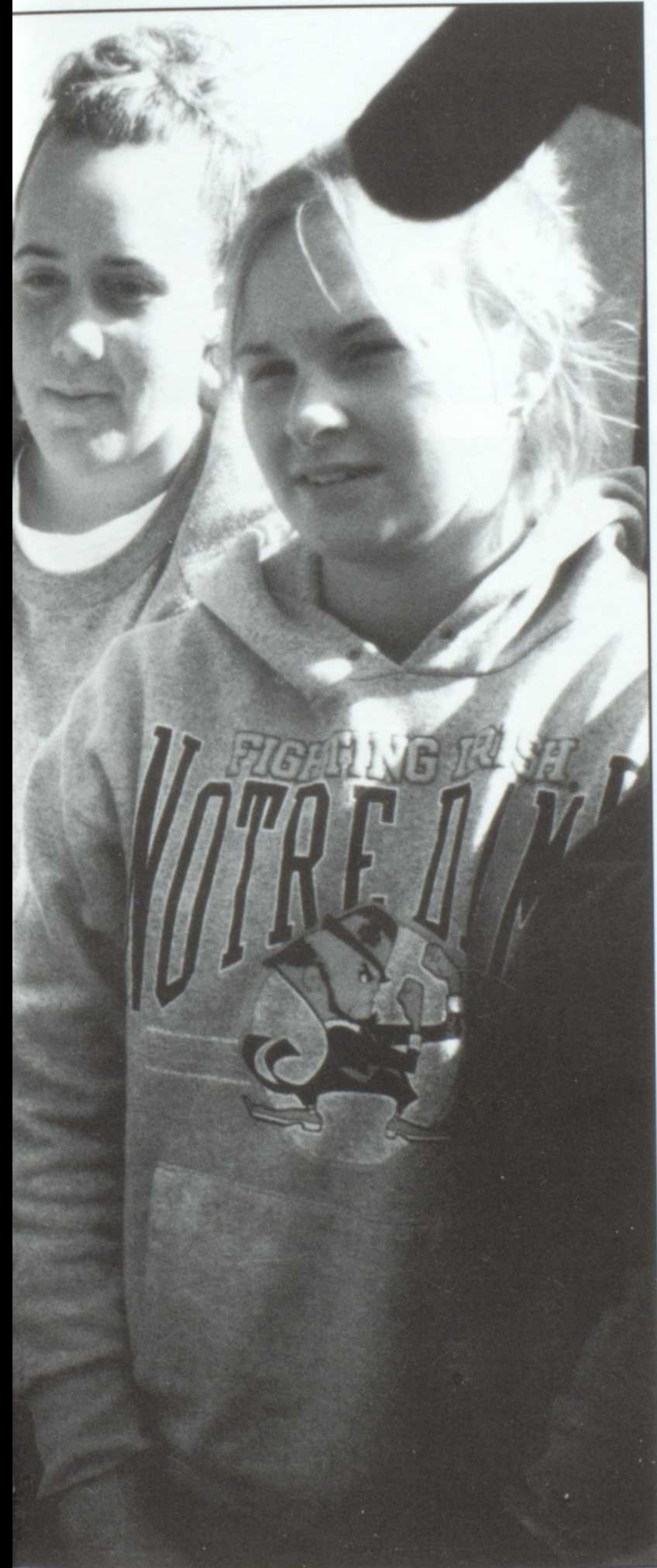
Breaking Bubbles? *Students Help Raise Awareness*

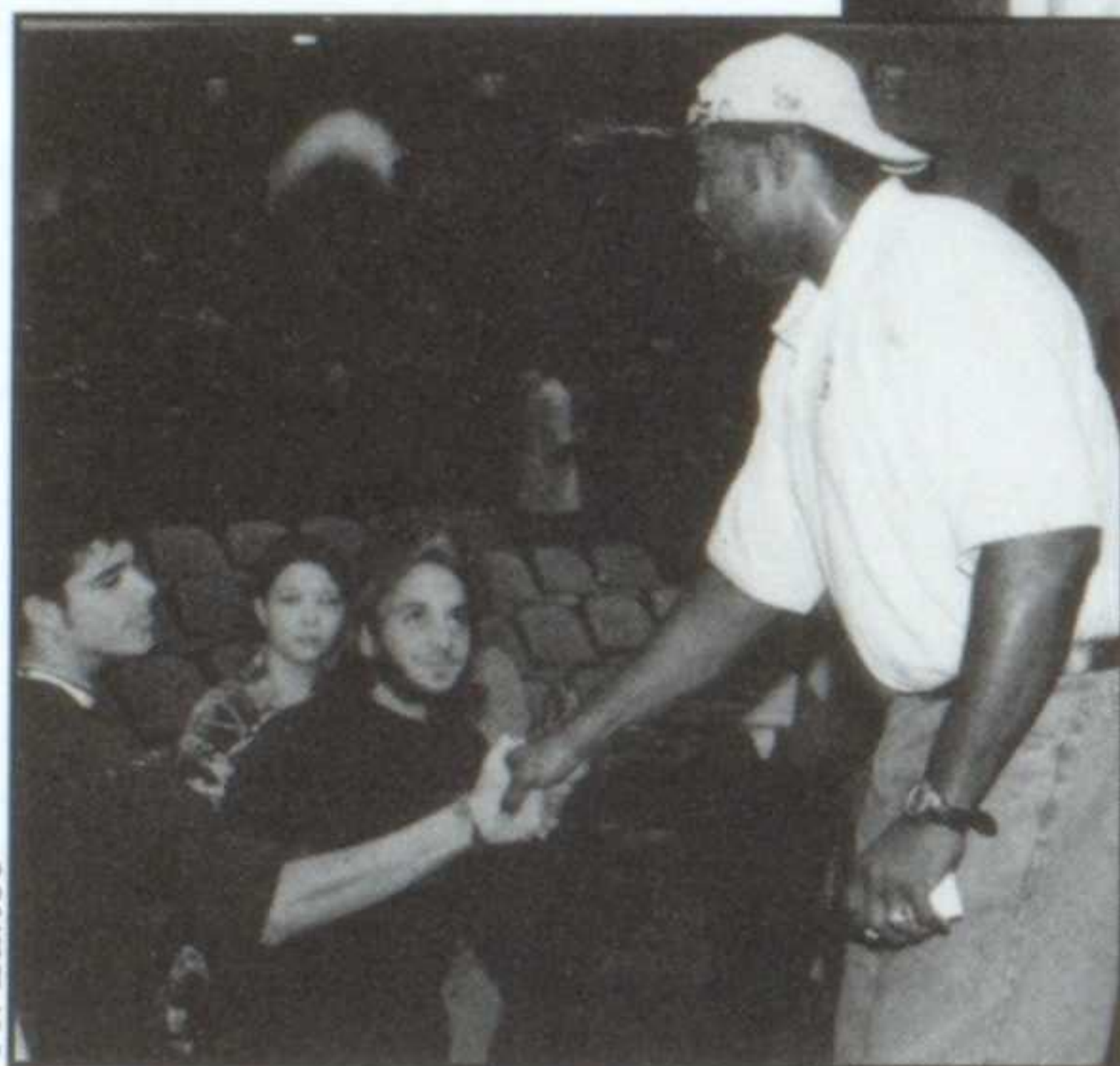

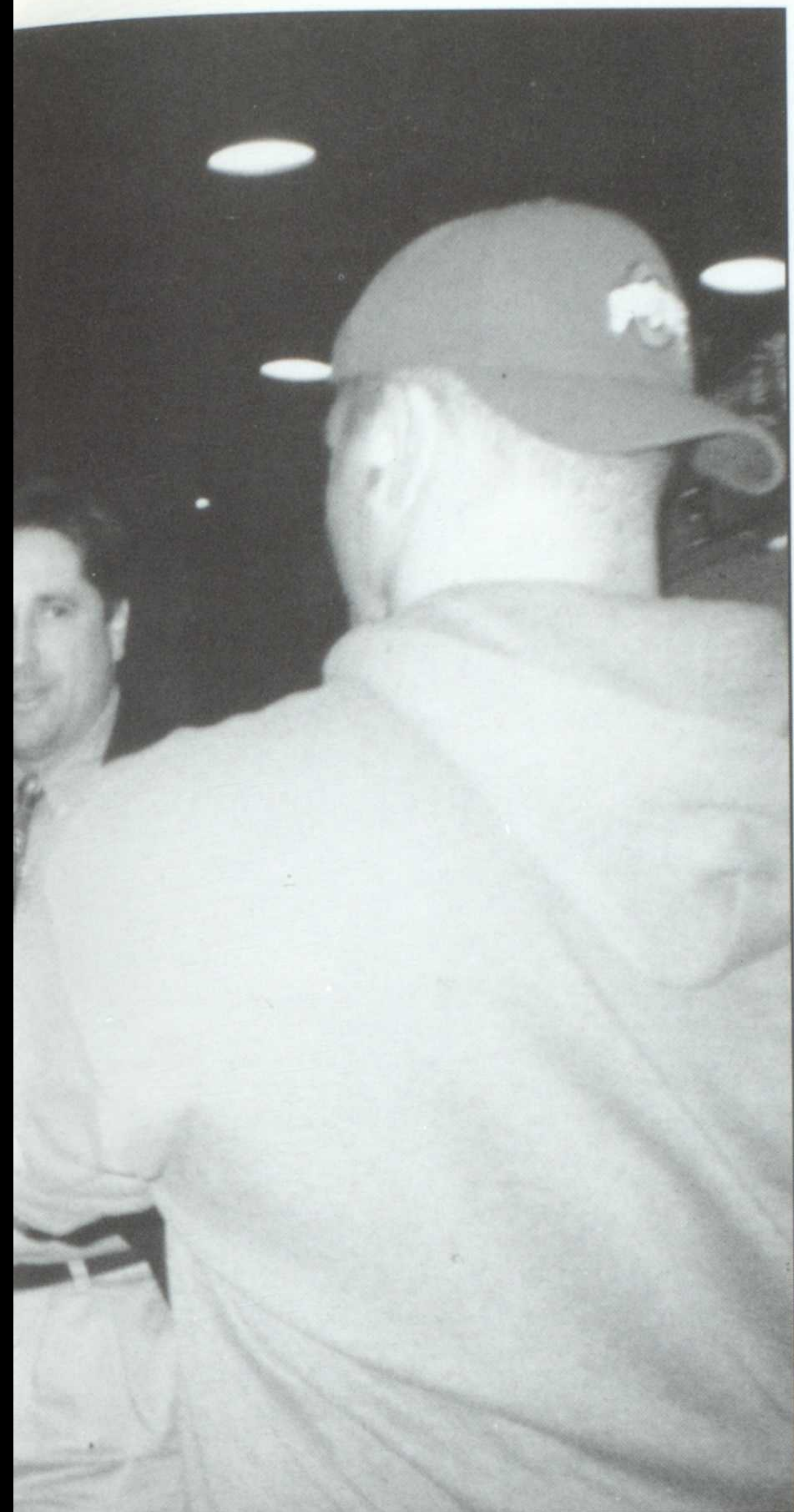

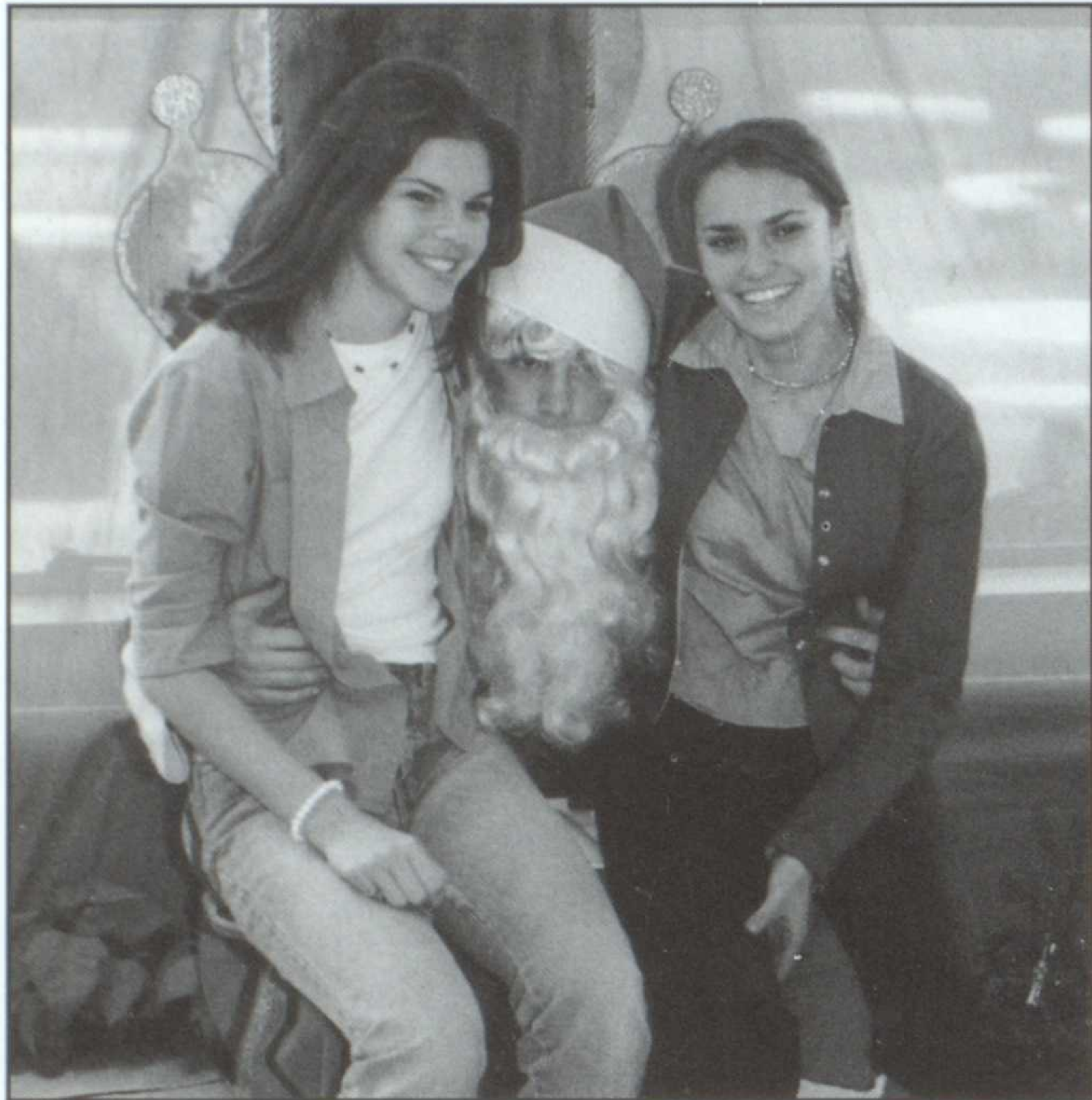

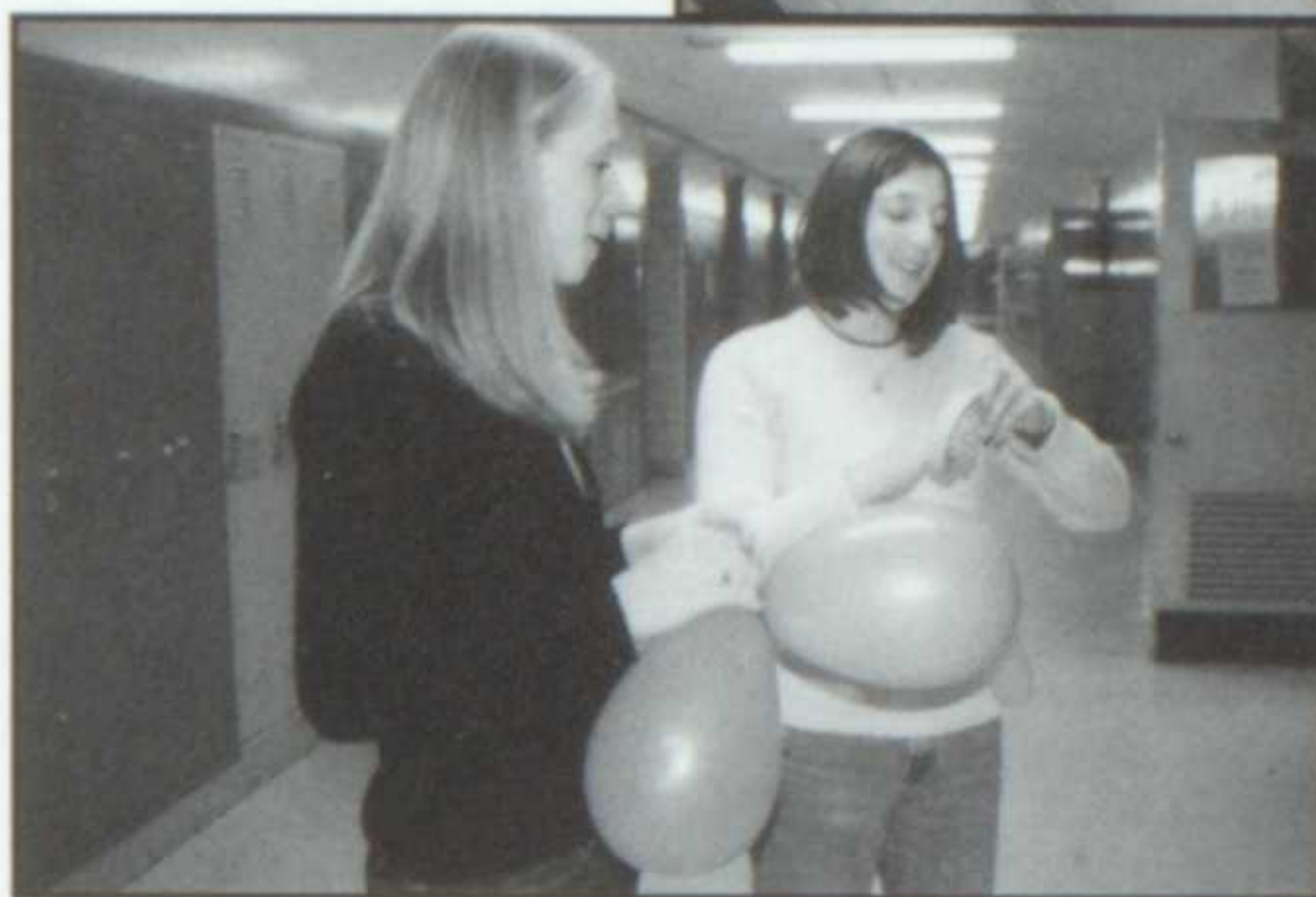

strong and experienced team for the upcoming seasons.

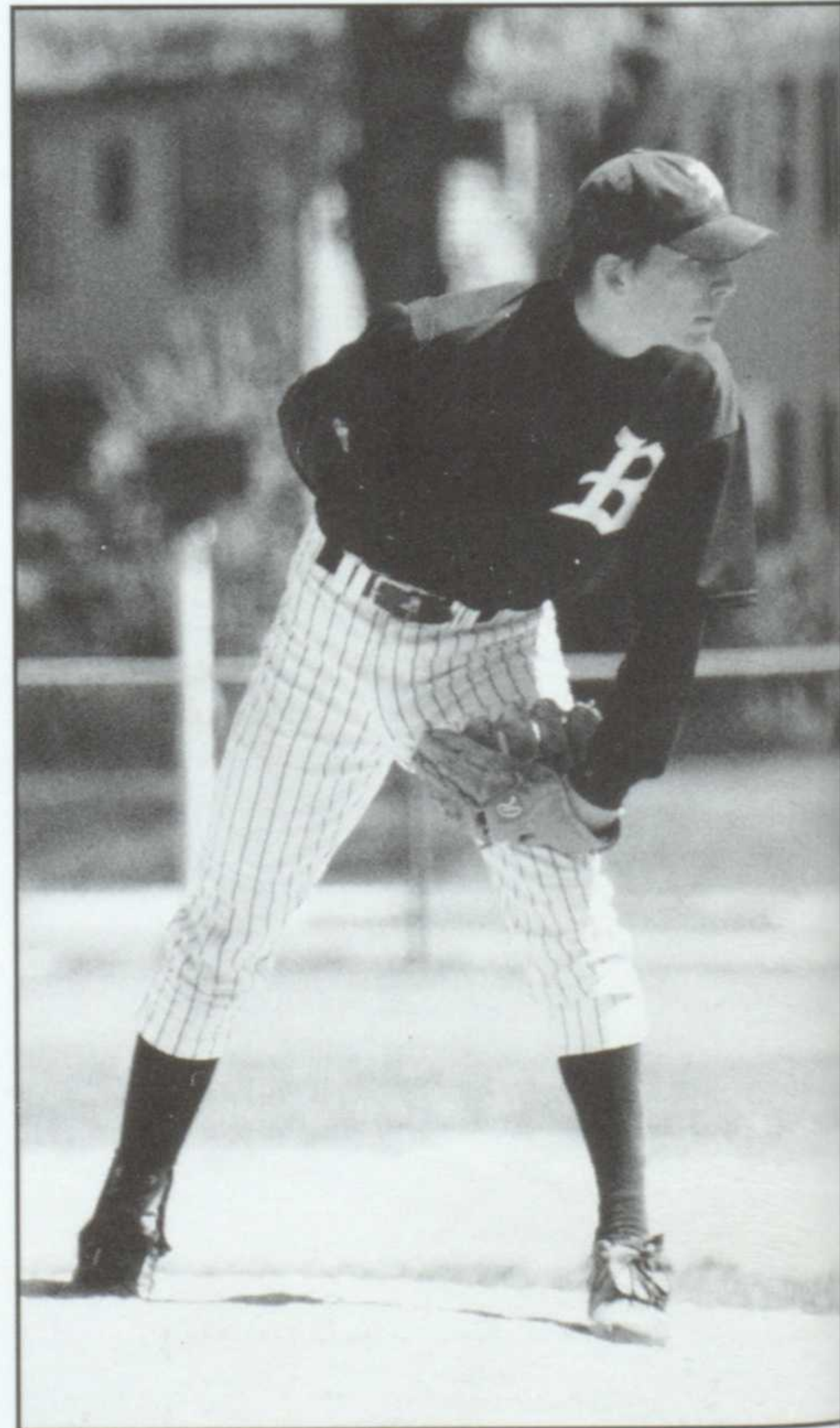
"With a returning lineup of seven seniors, our team has a solid strong base. We hope to win the SWC title in 2002," said senior Mike DiBenedetto.

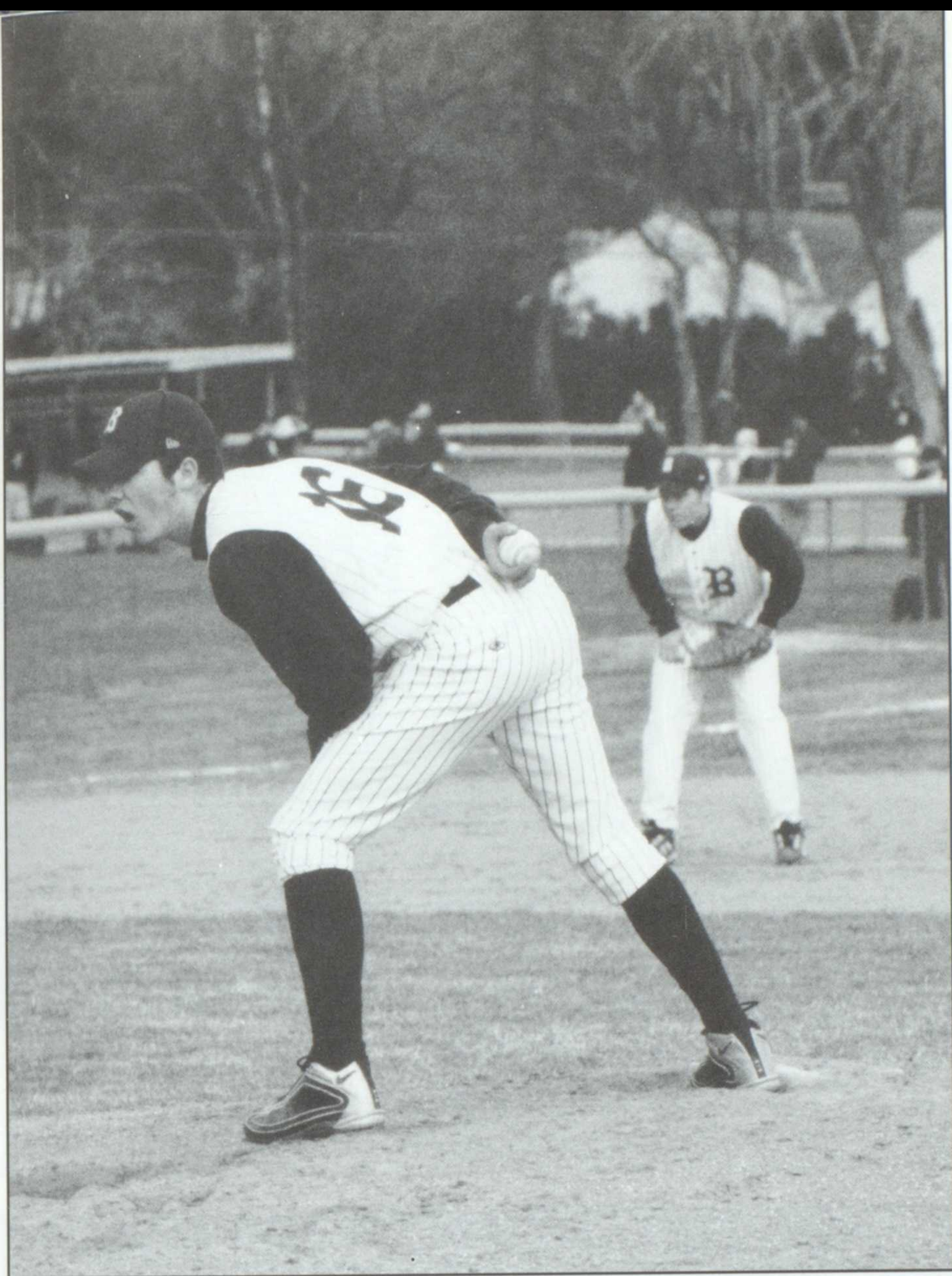

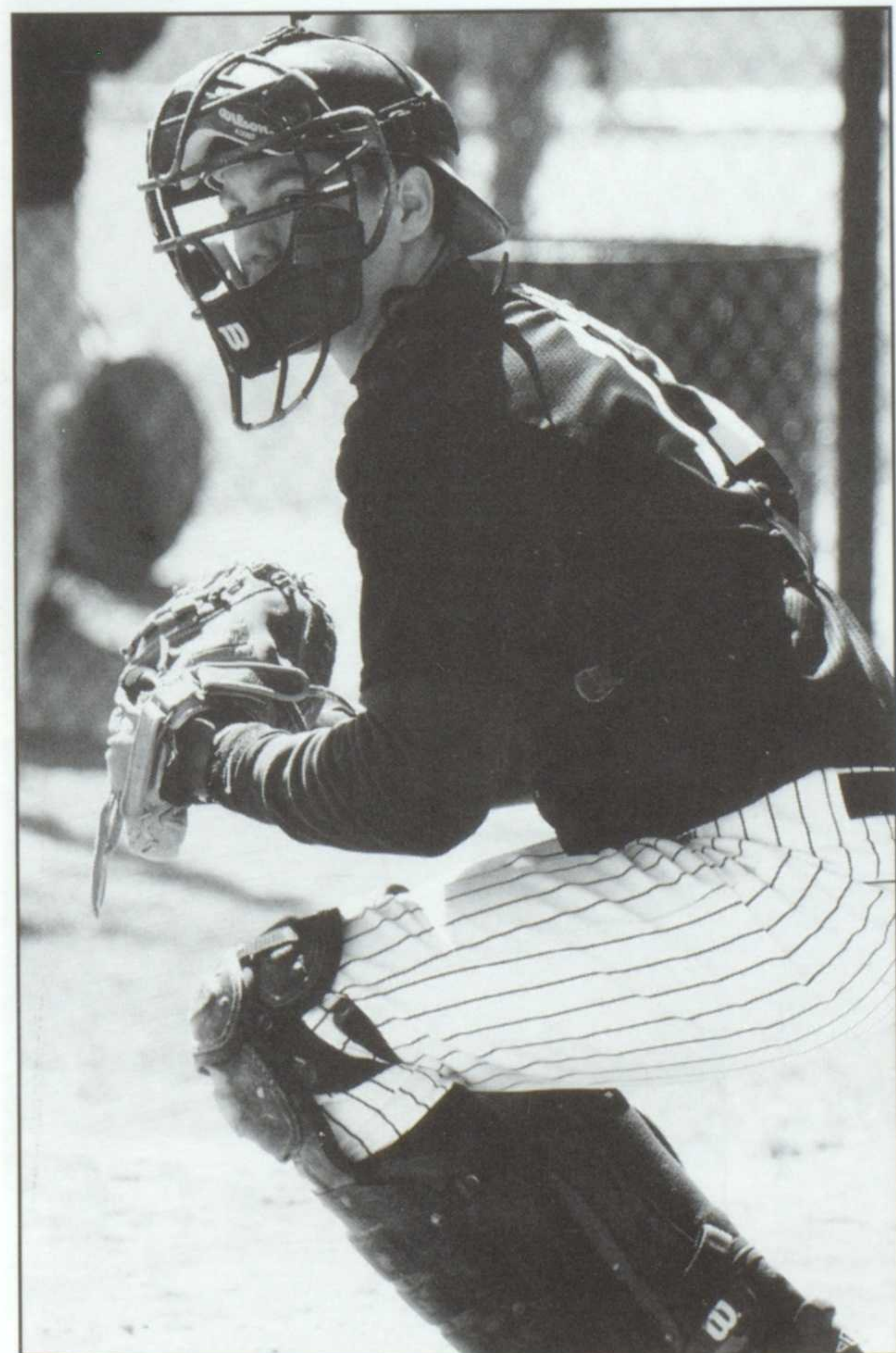

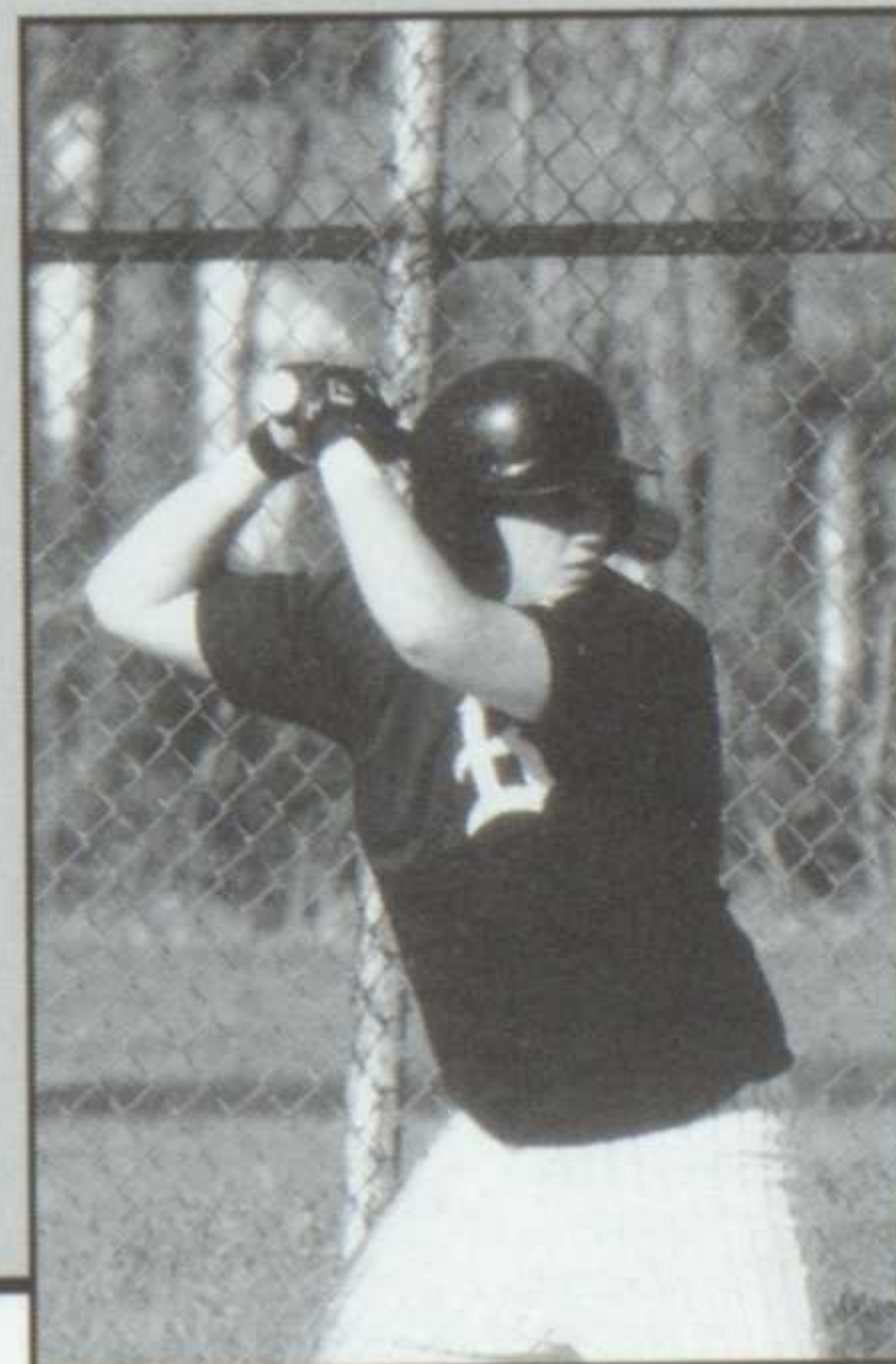

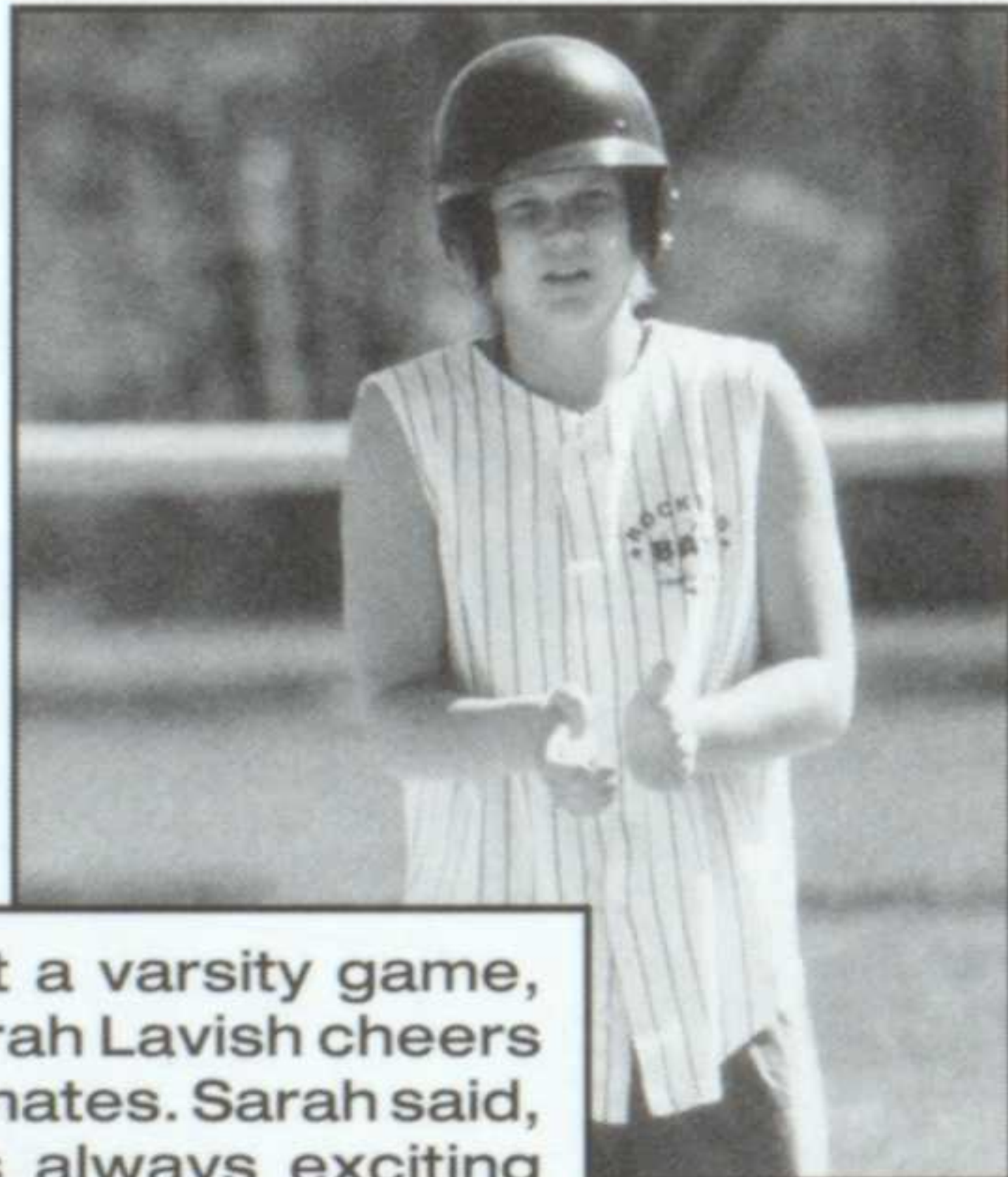
Besides playing games during the week, they competed in tournaments on the weekends, placing second in the Bay tournament.

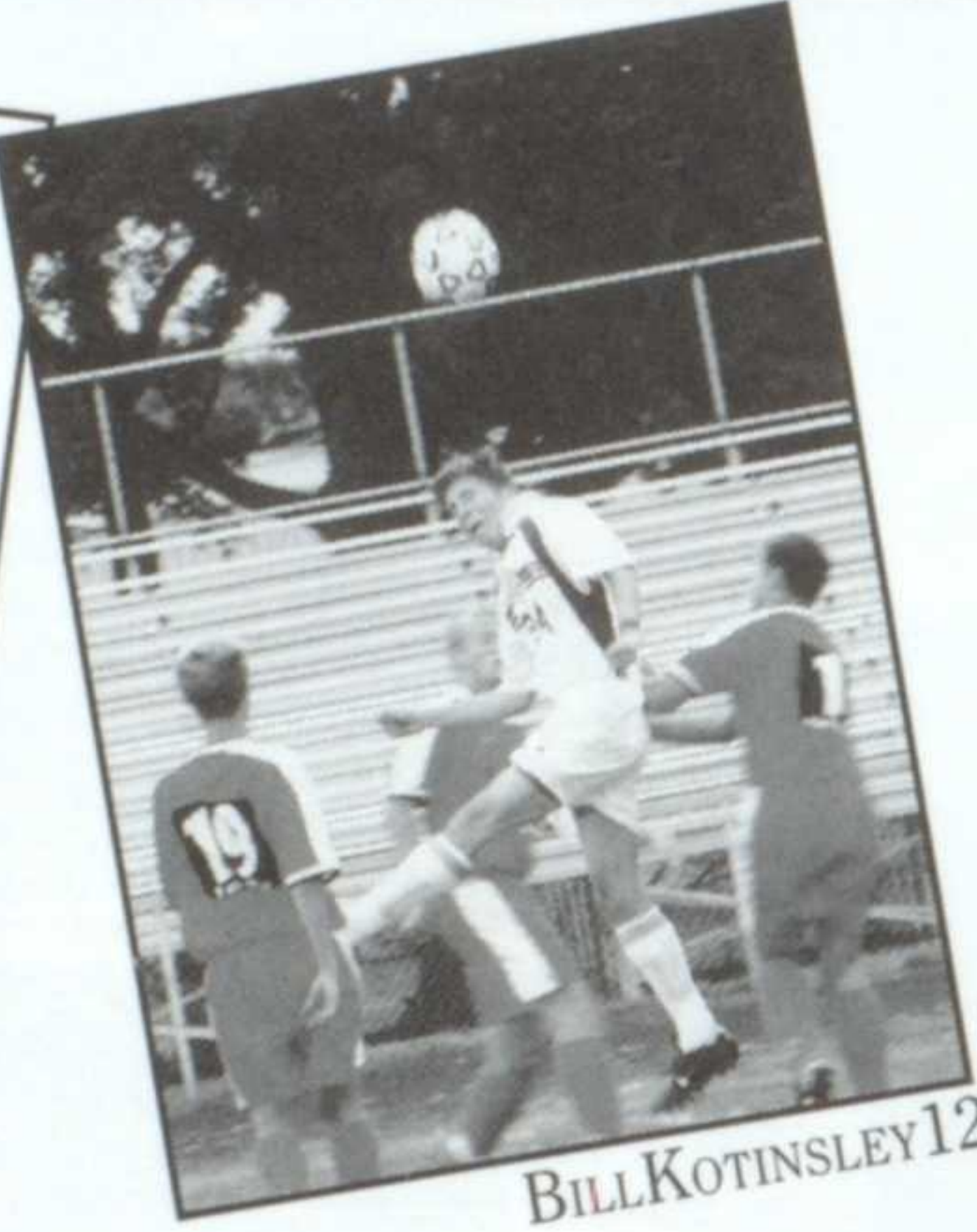

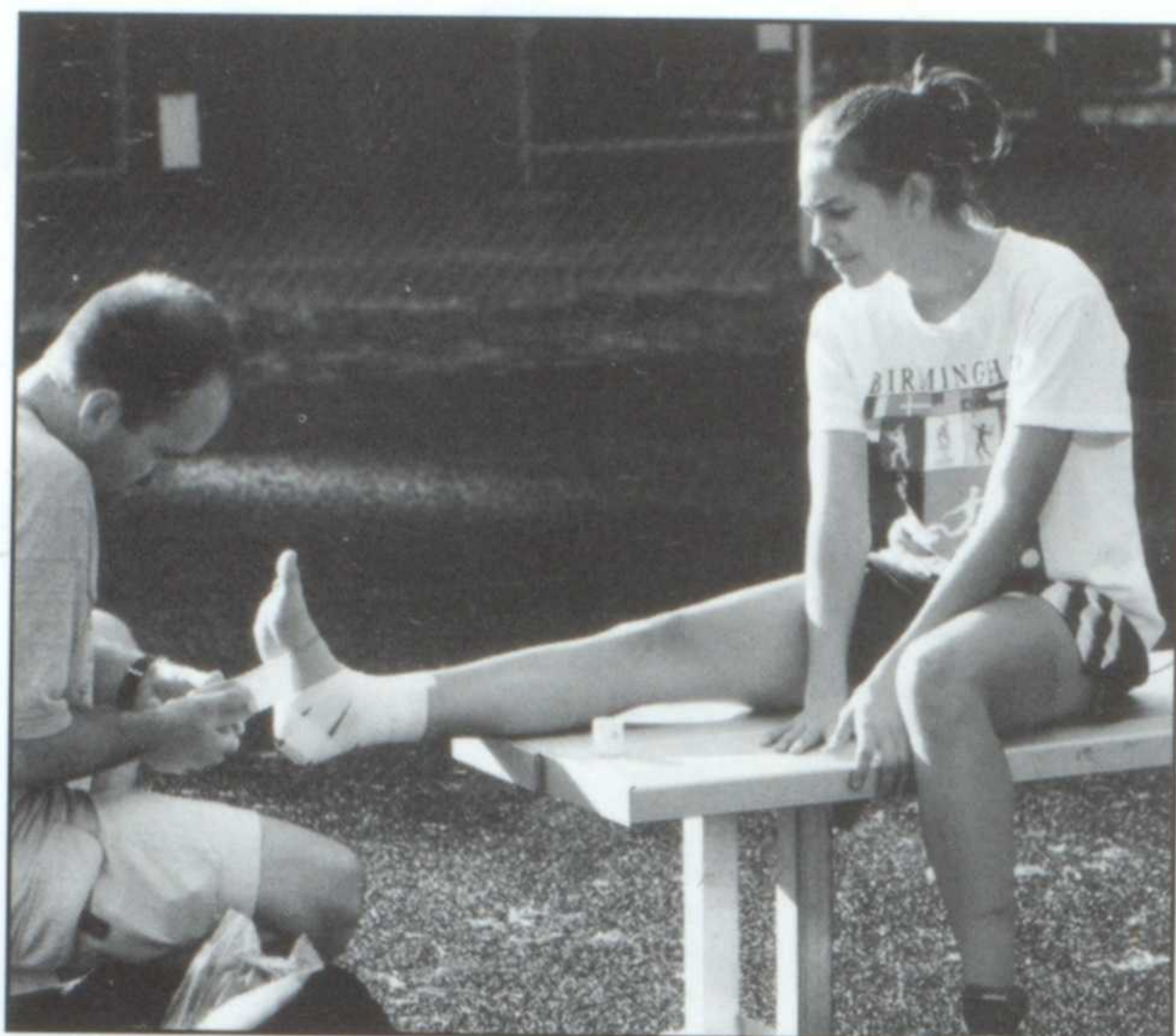

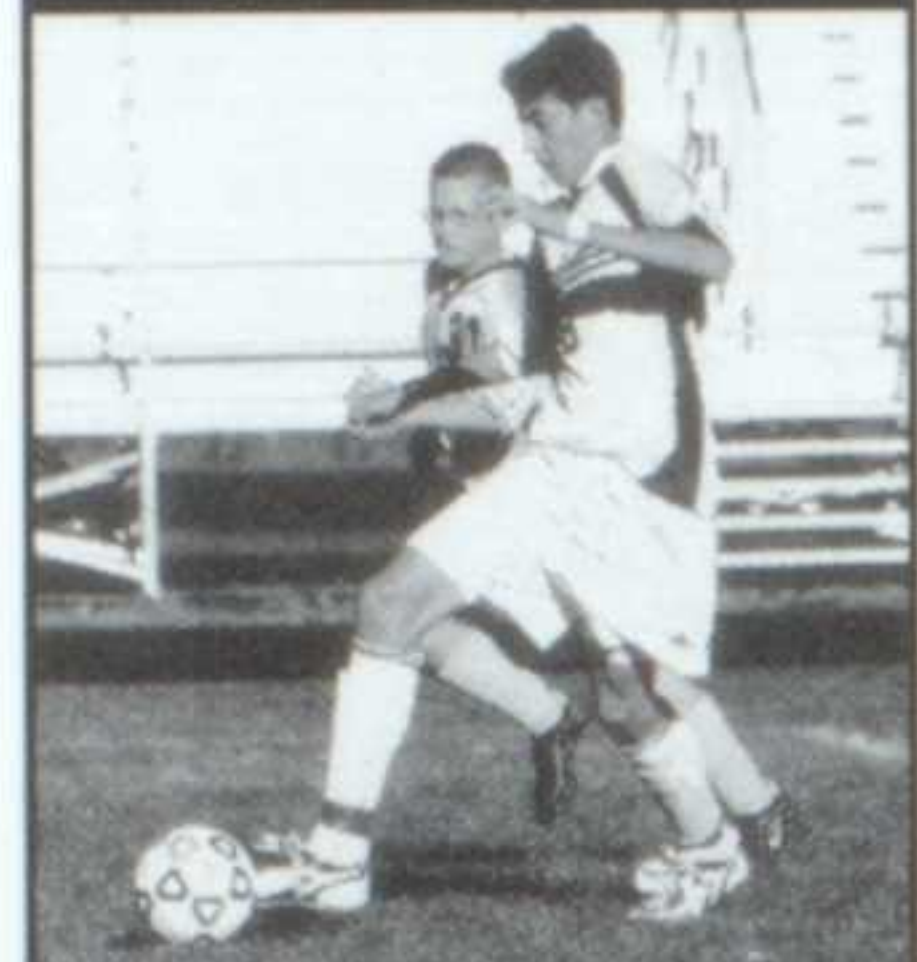

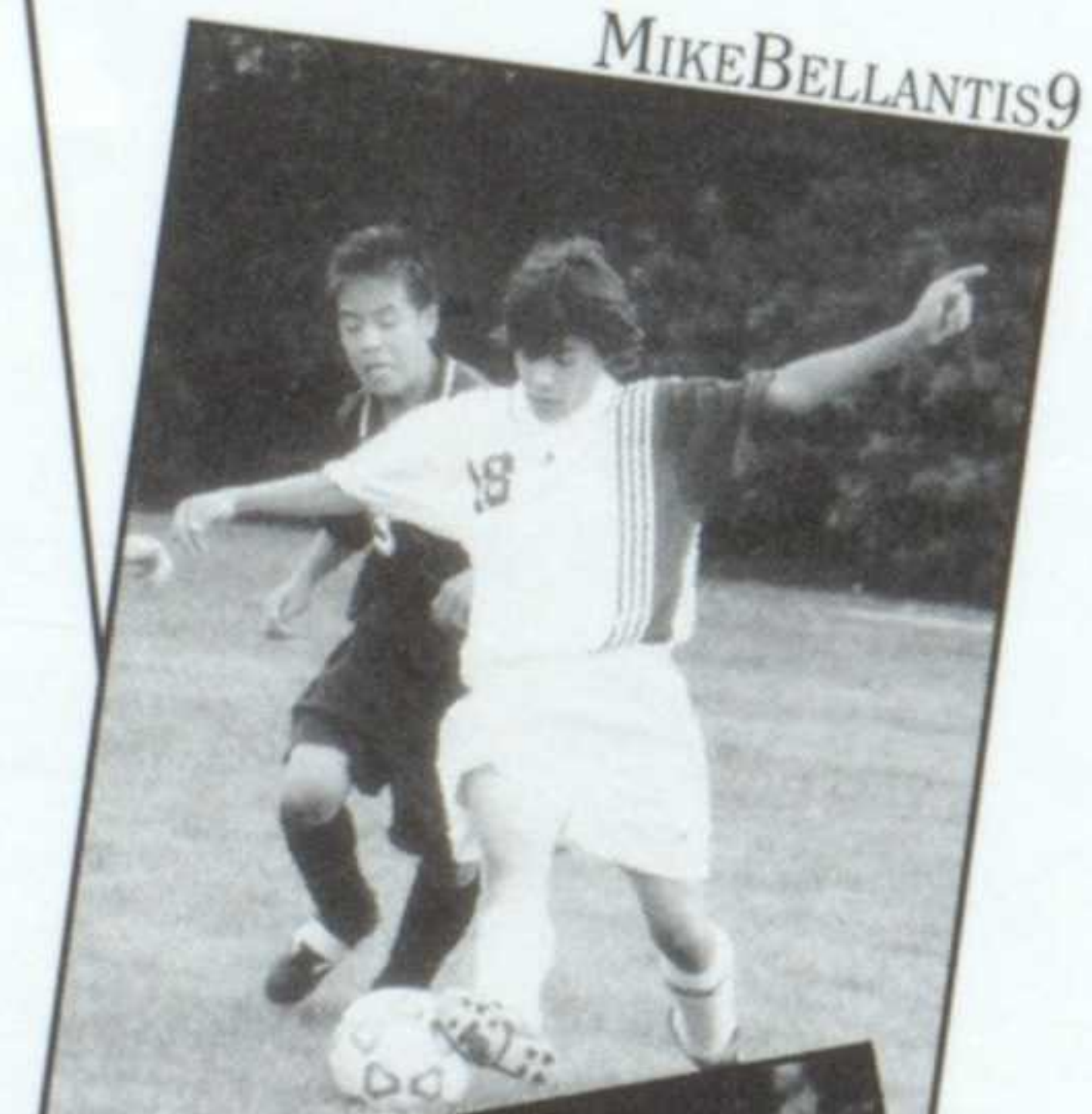

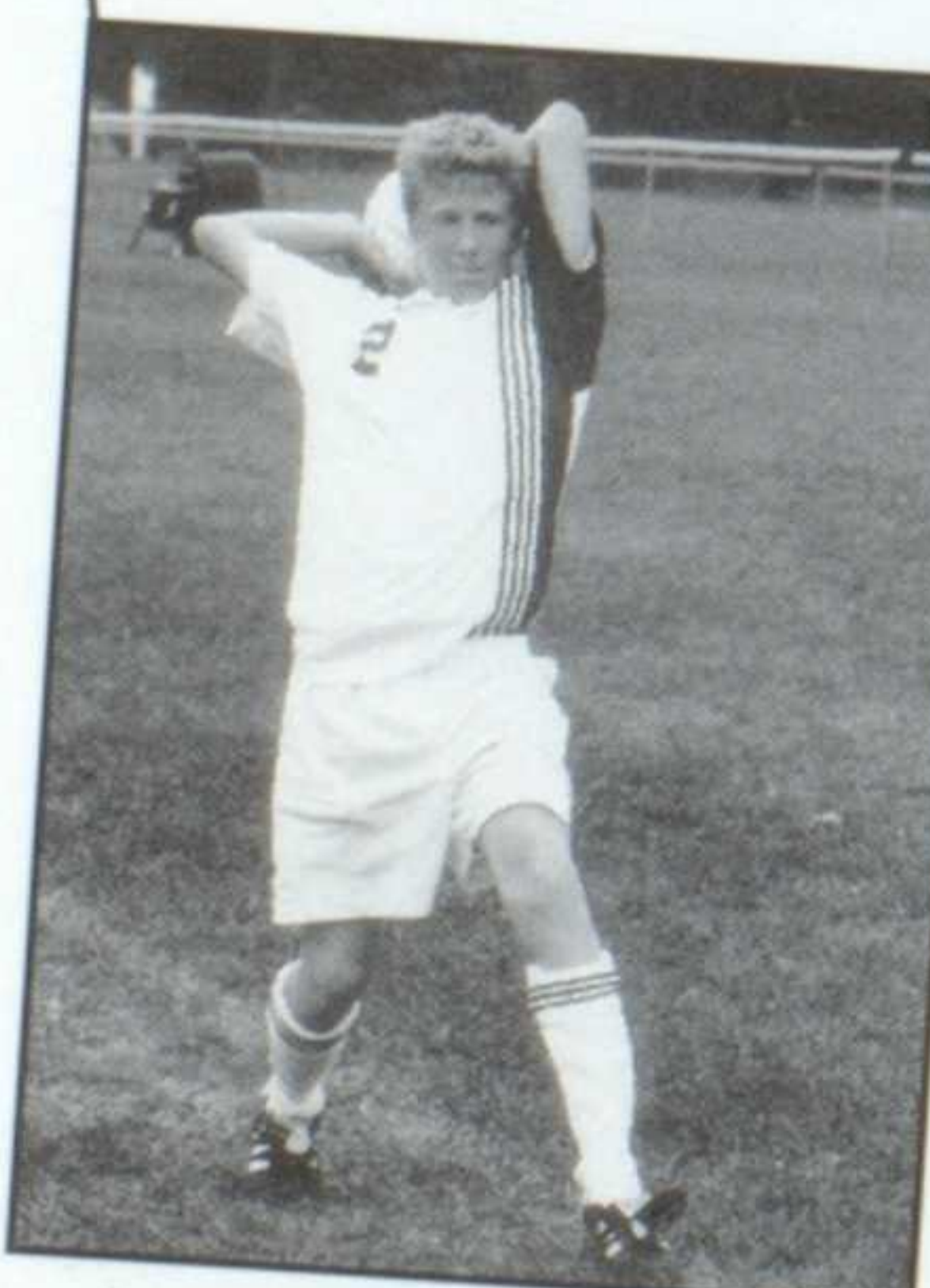

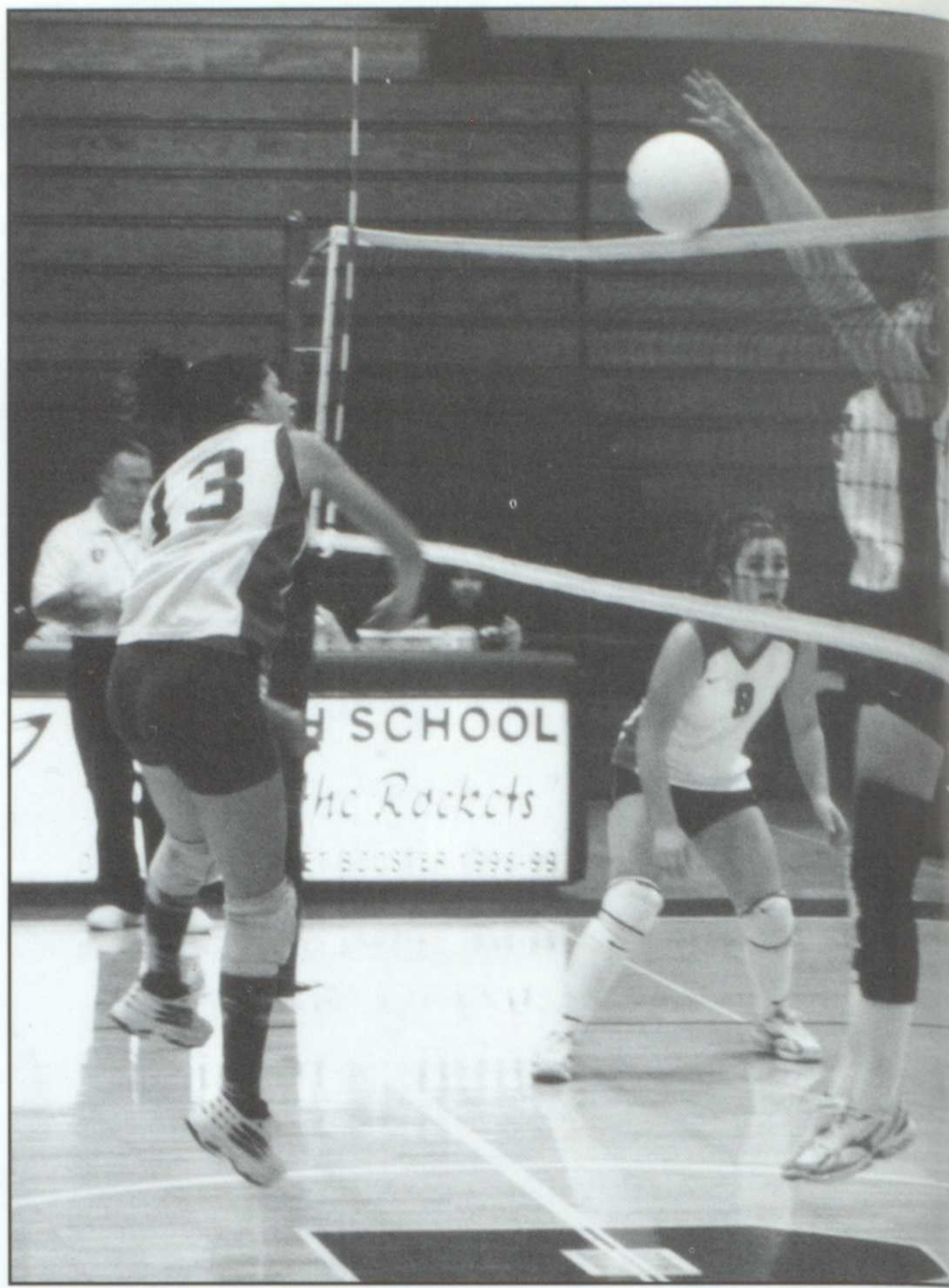
"Our records may not show it, but all the volleyball teams really improved," said JV player, sophomore Emily Woodhall.

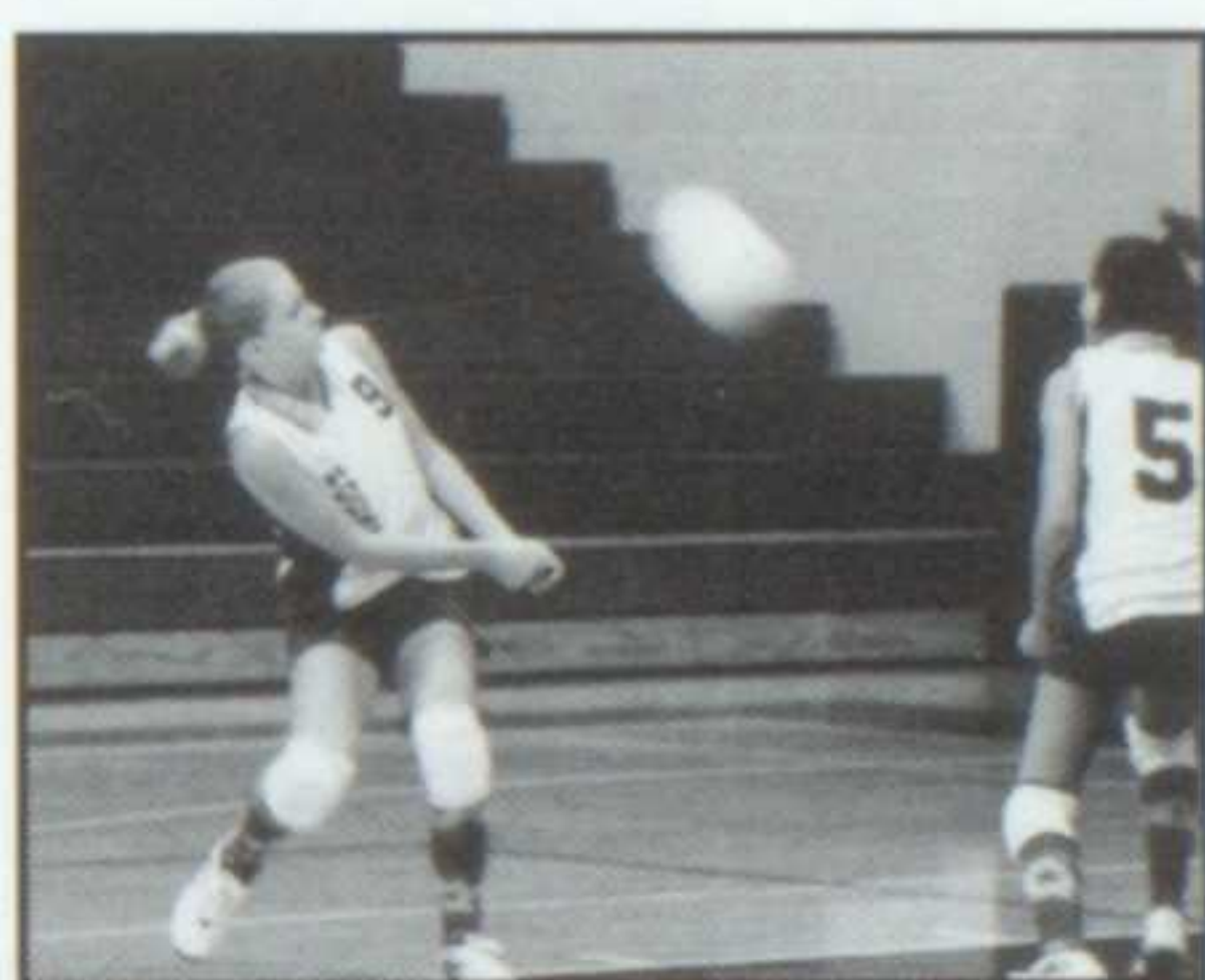

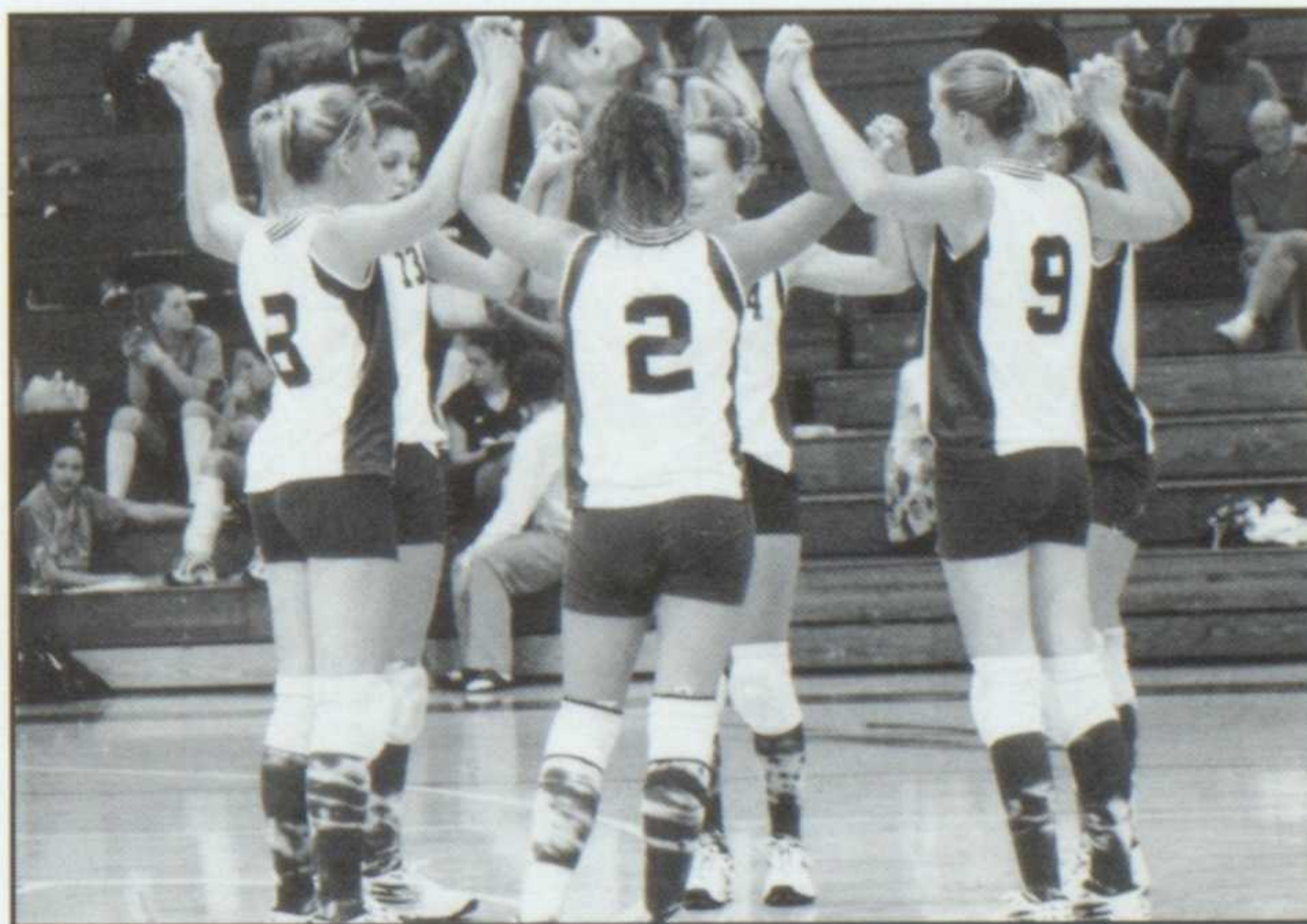

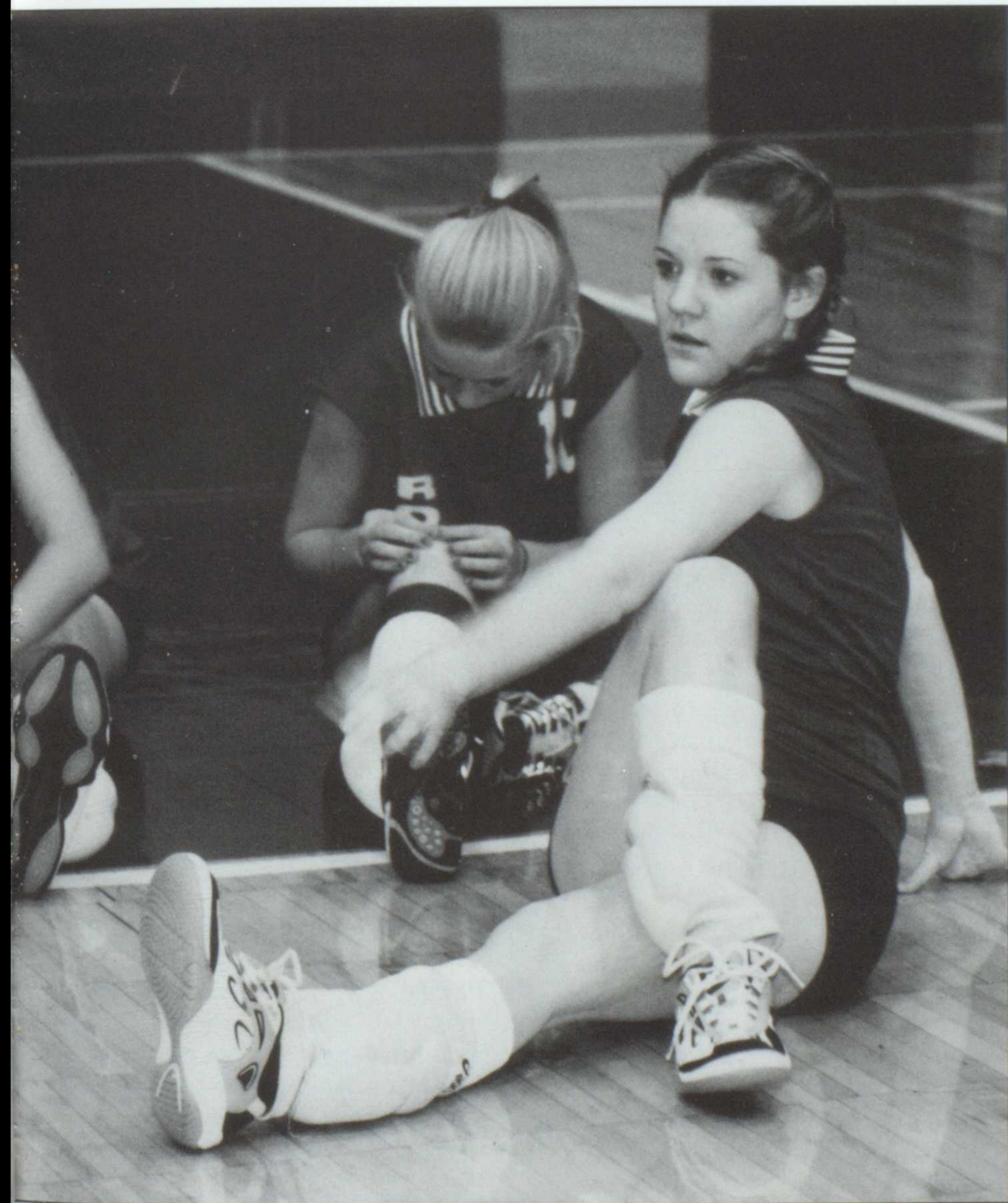

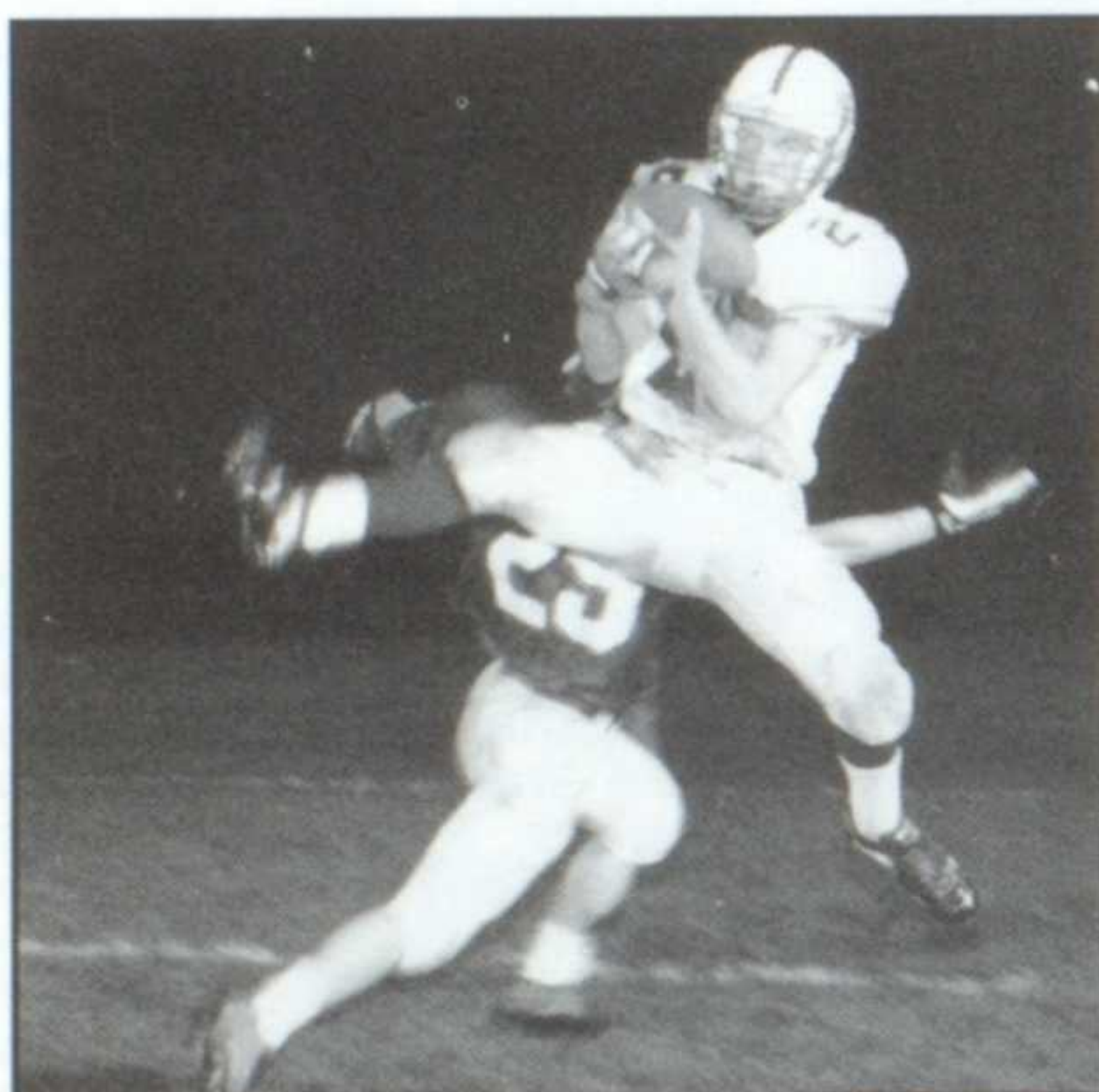

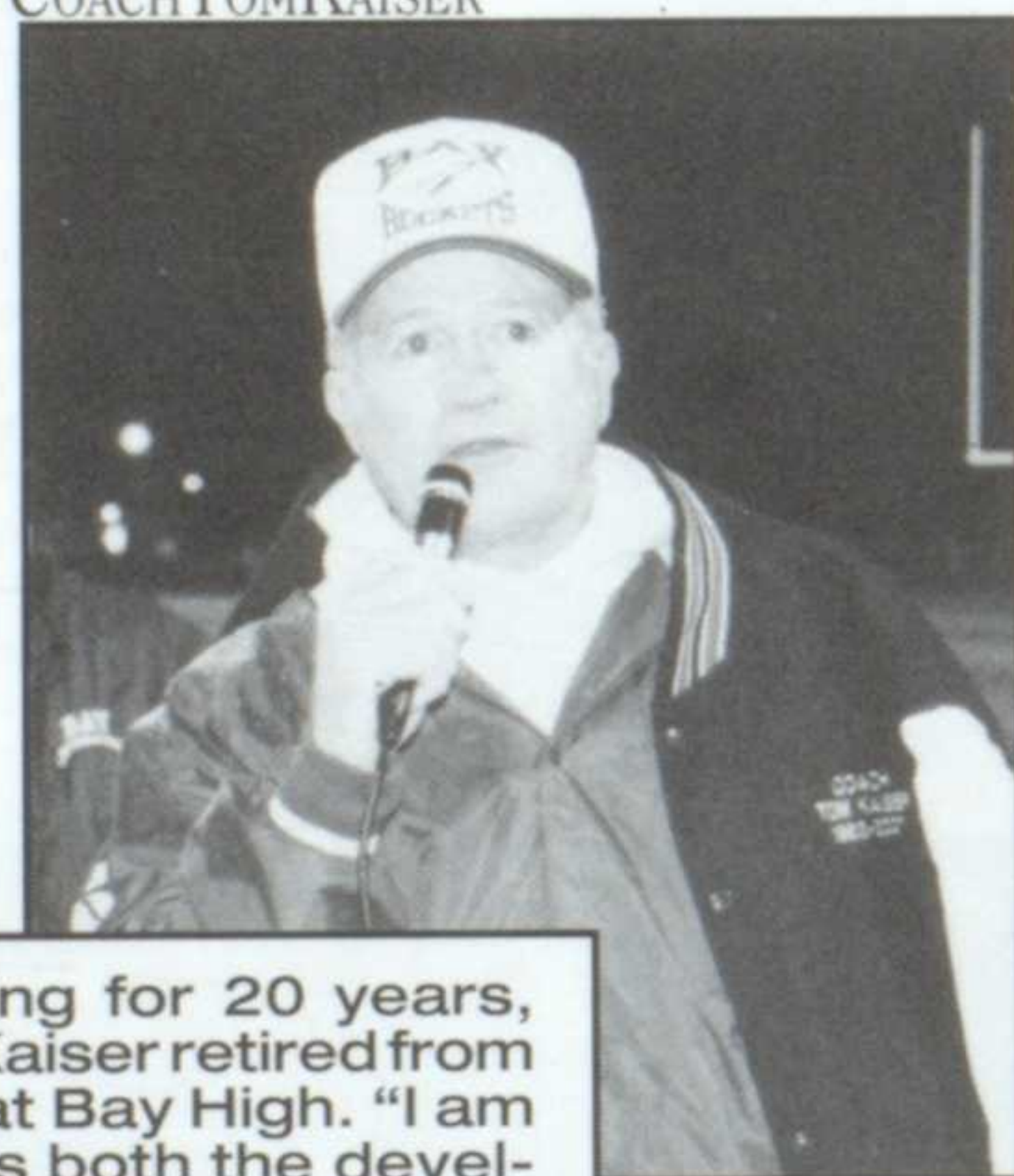

The varsity then shut-out Firelands, but ended up coming up short against North Ridgeville in overtime. After completing their first three games, they were ready to start conference play.

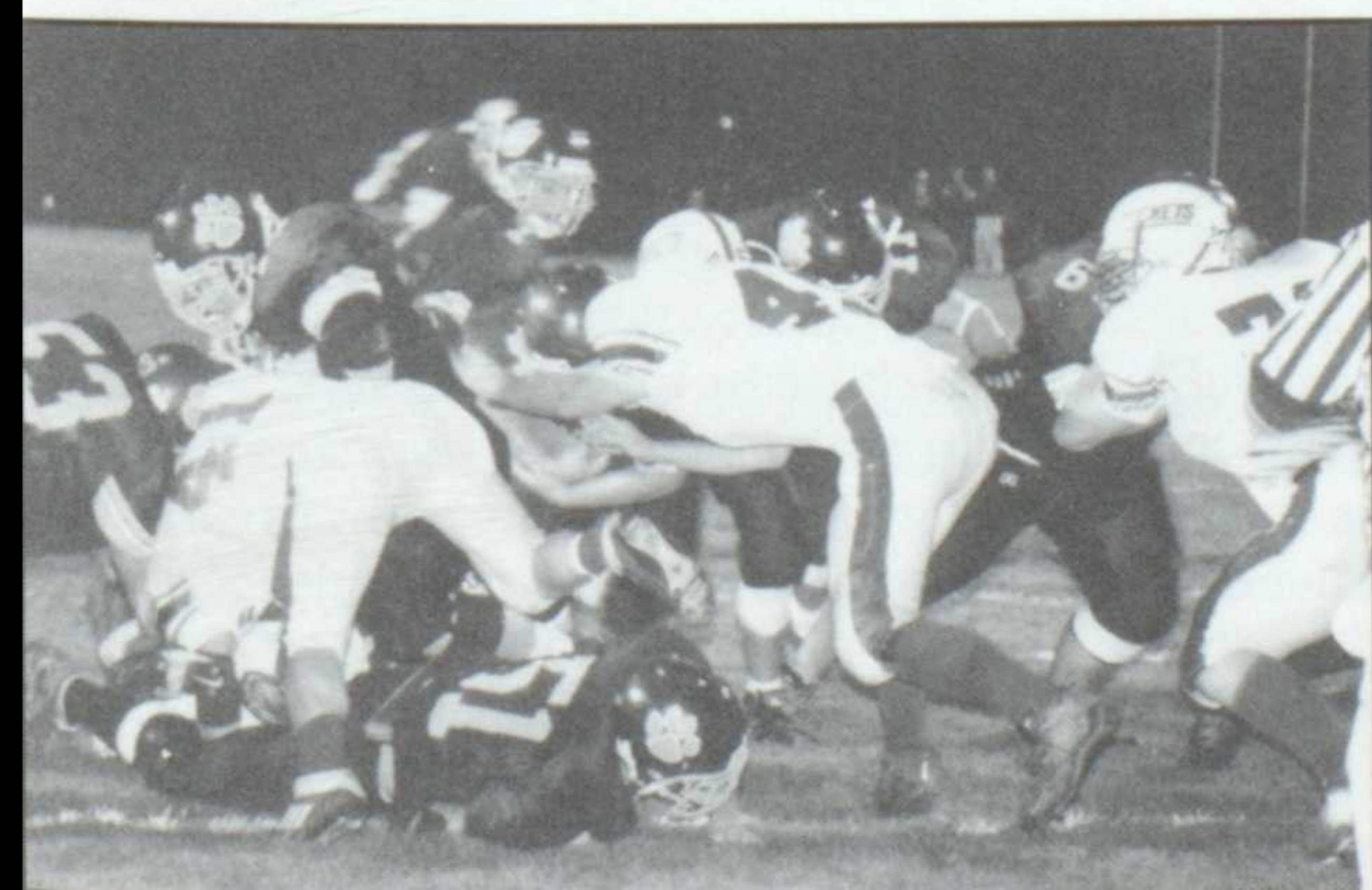
The Olmsted Falls game was difficult and the team looked ahead to Rocky River. Enter-

Although the team had higher expectations for the season they still played with respect and never gave up.

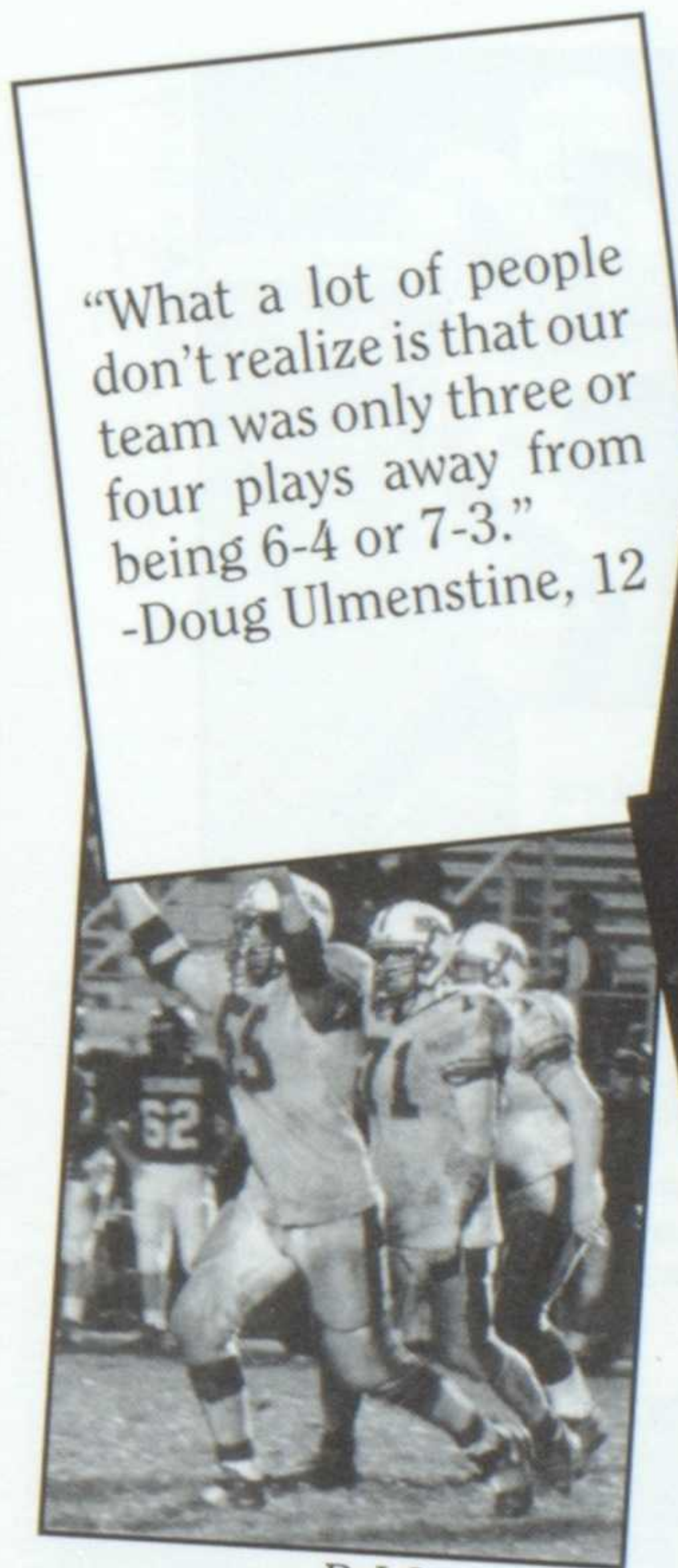

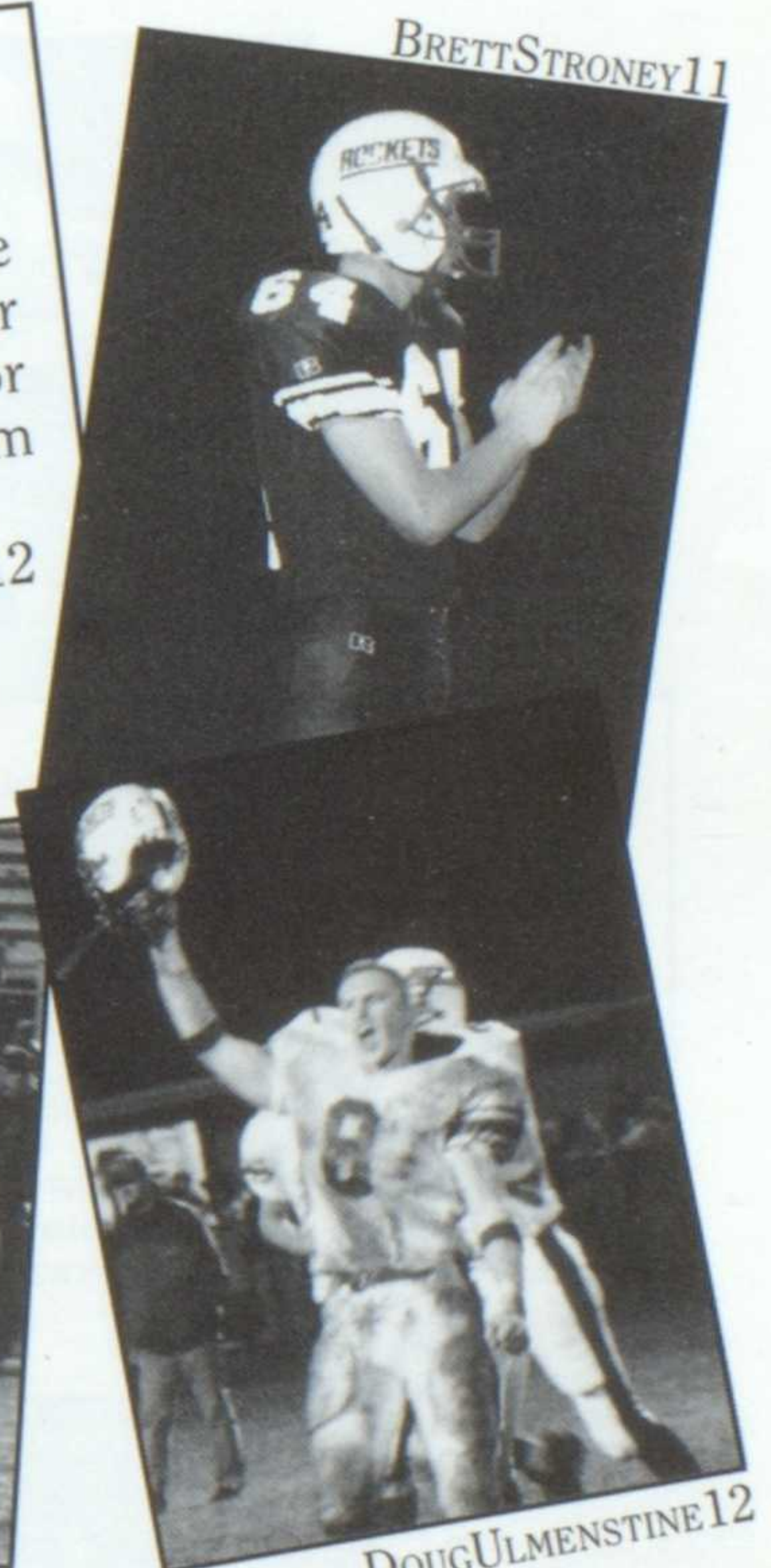

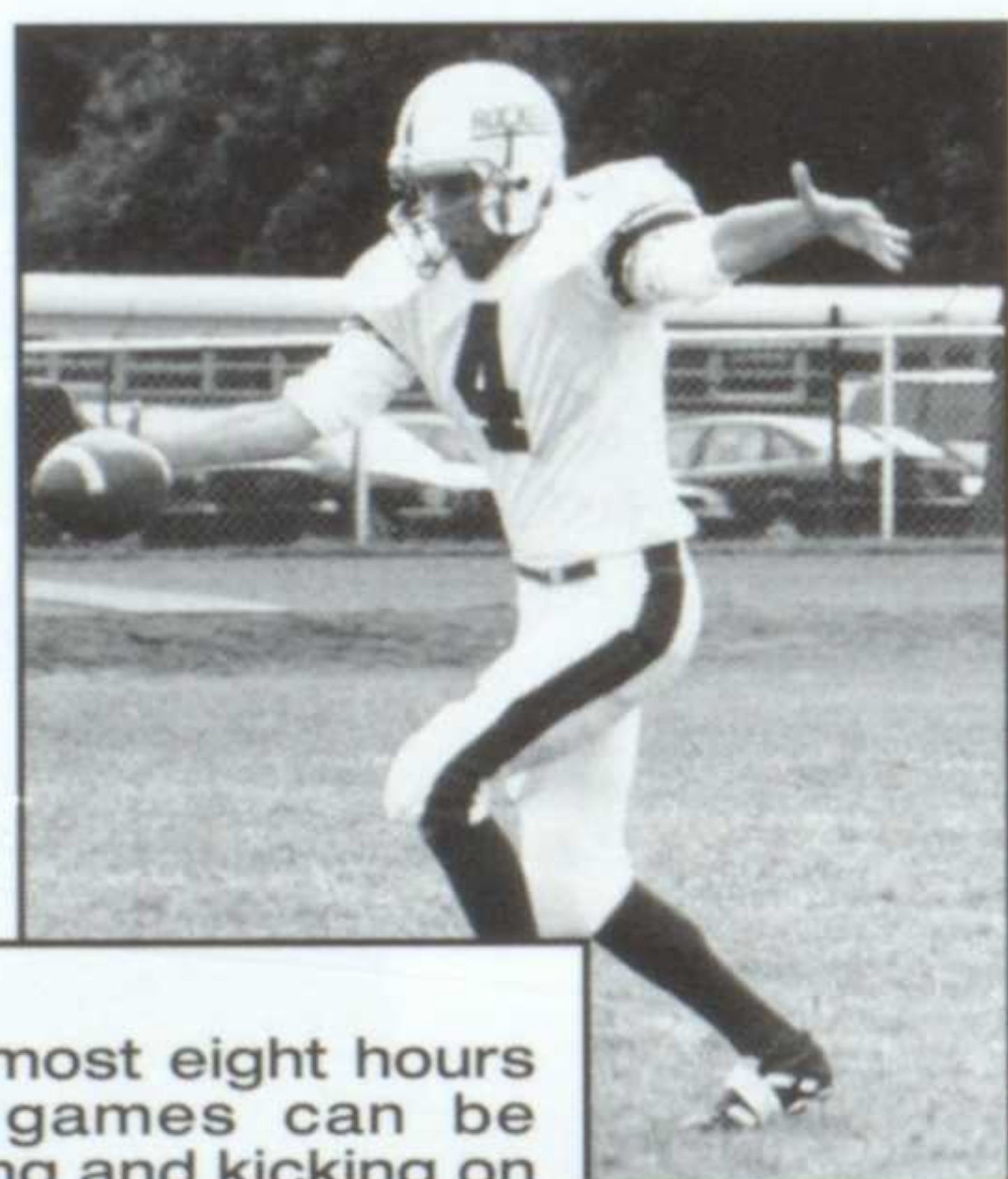

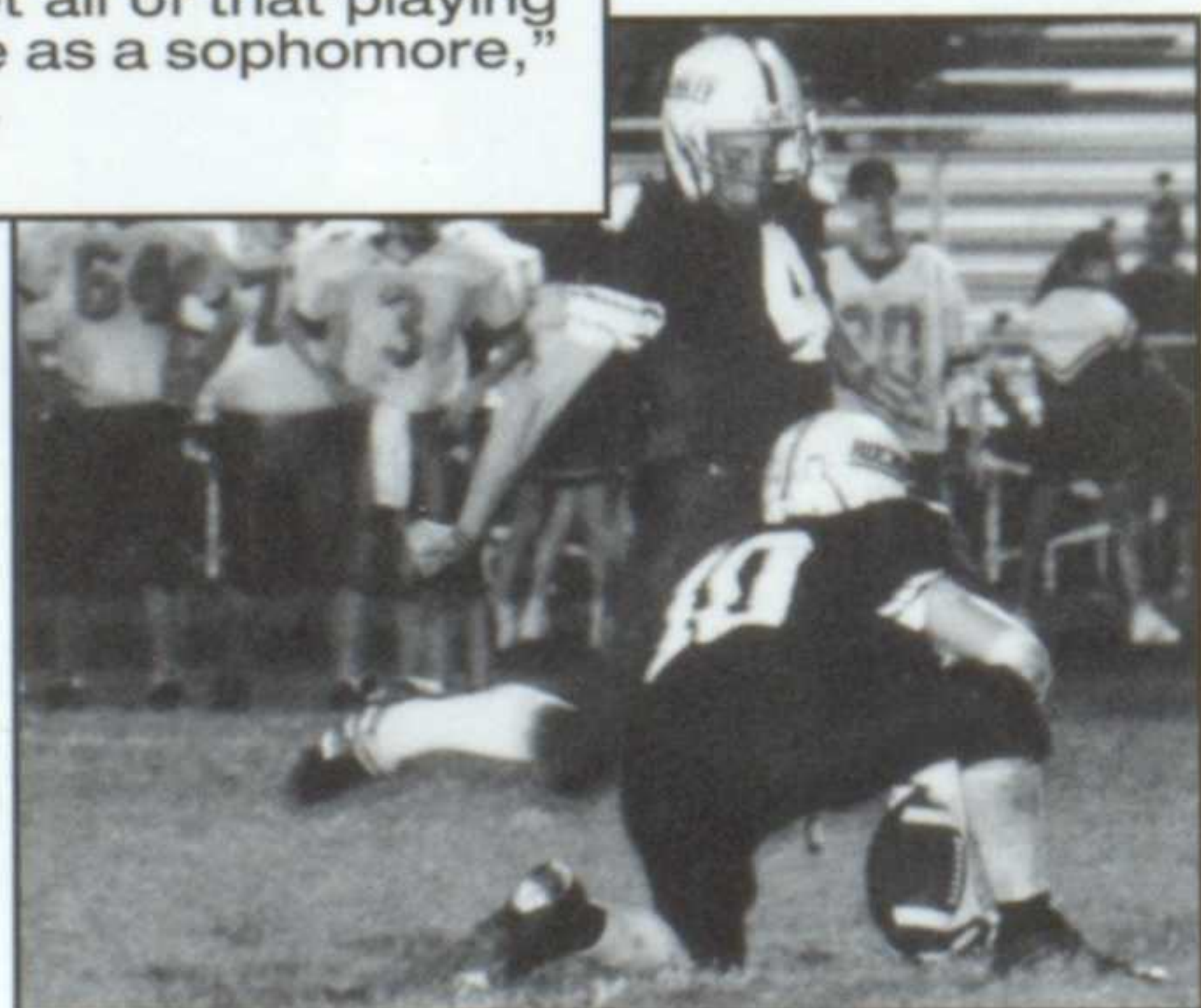

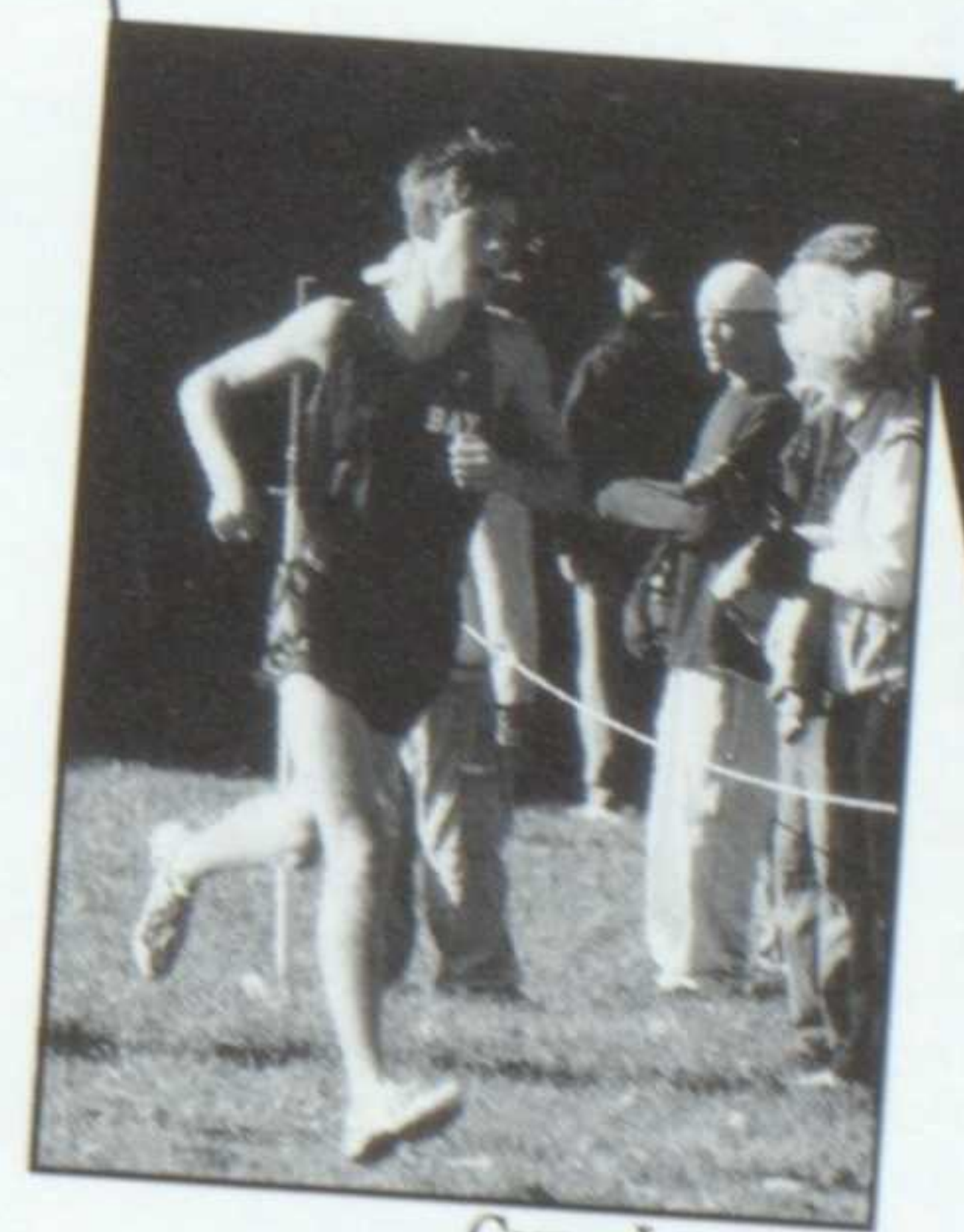

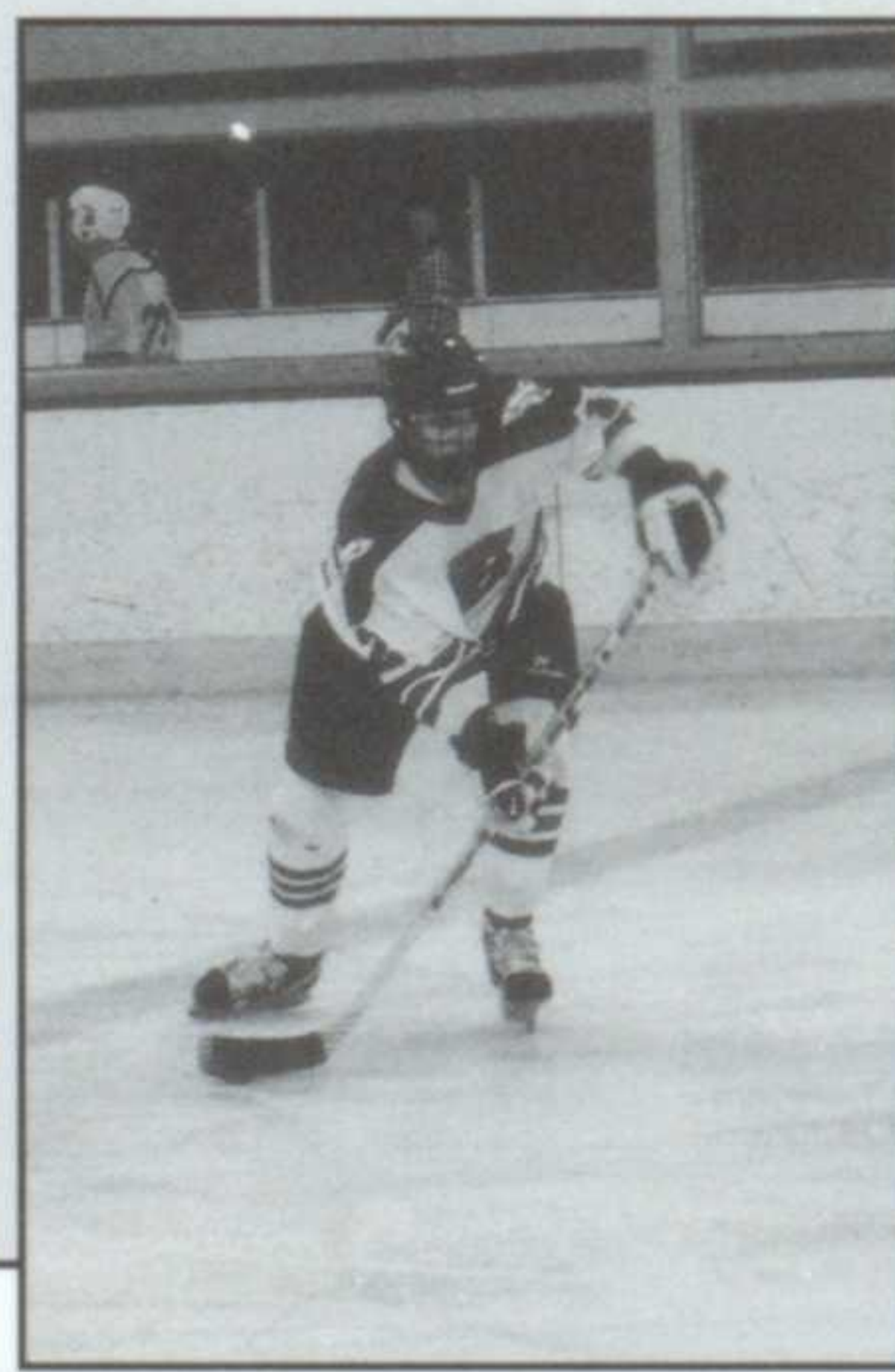

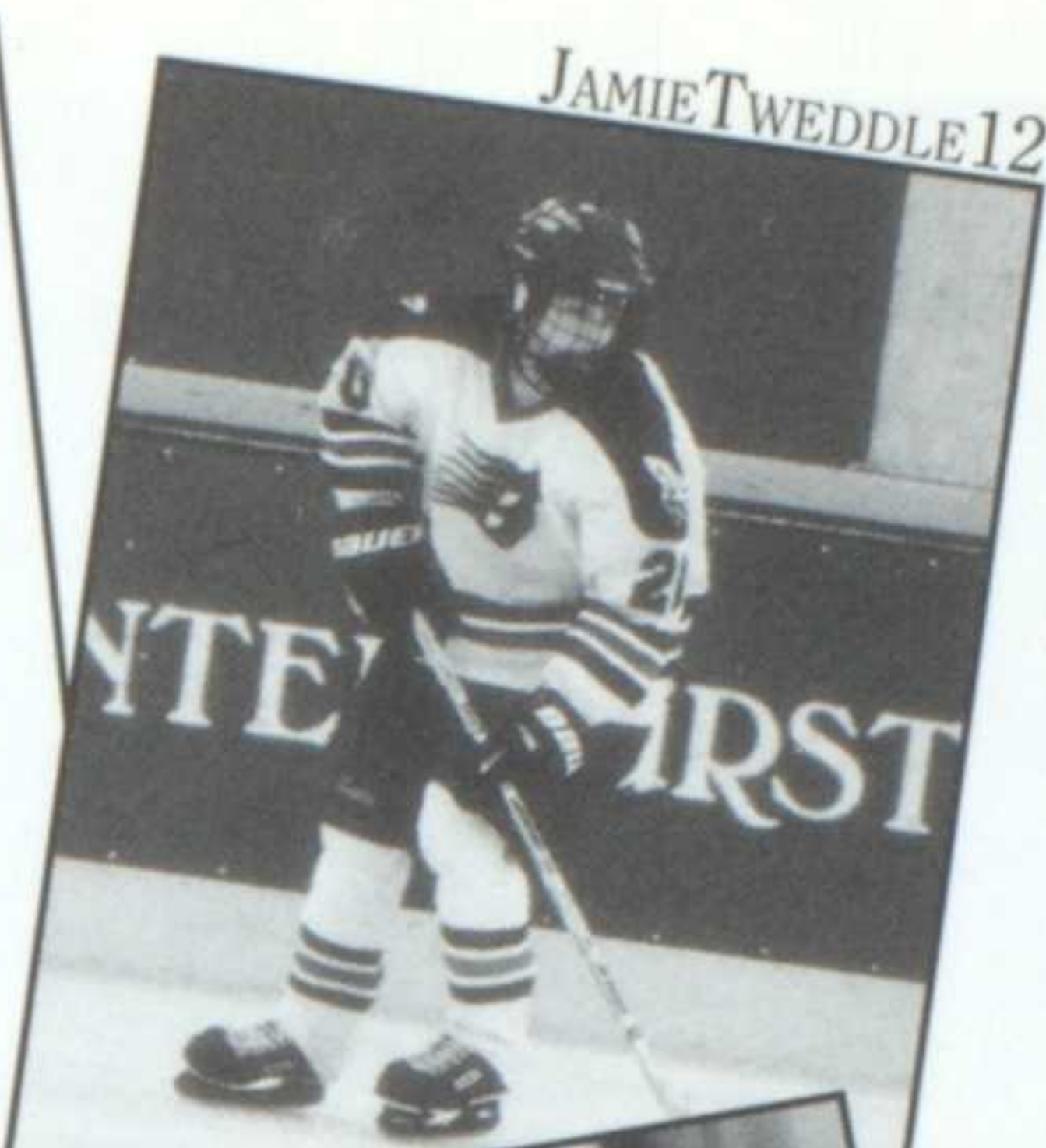

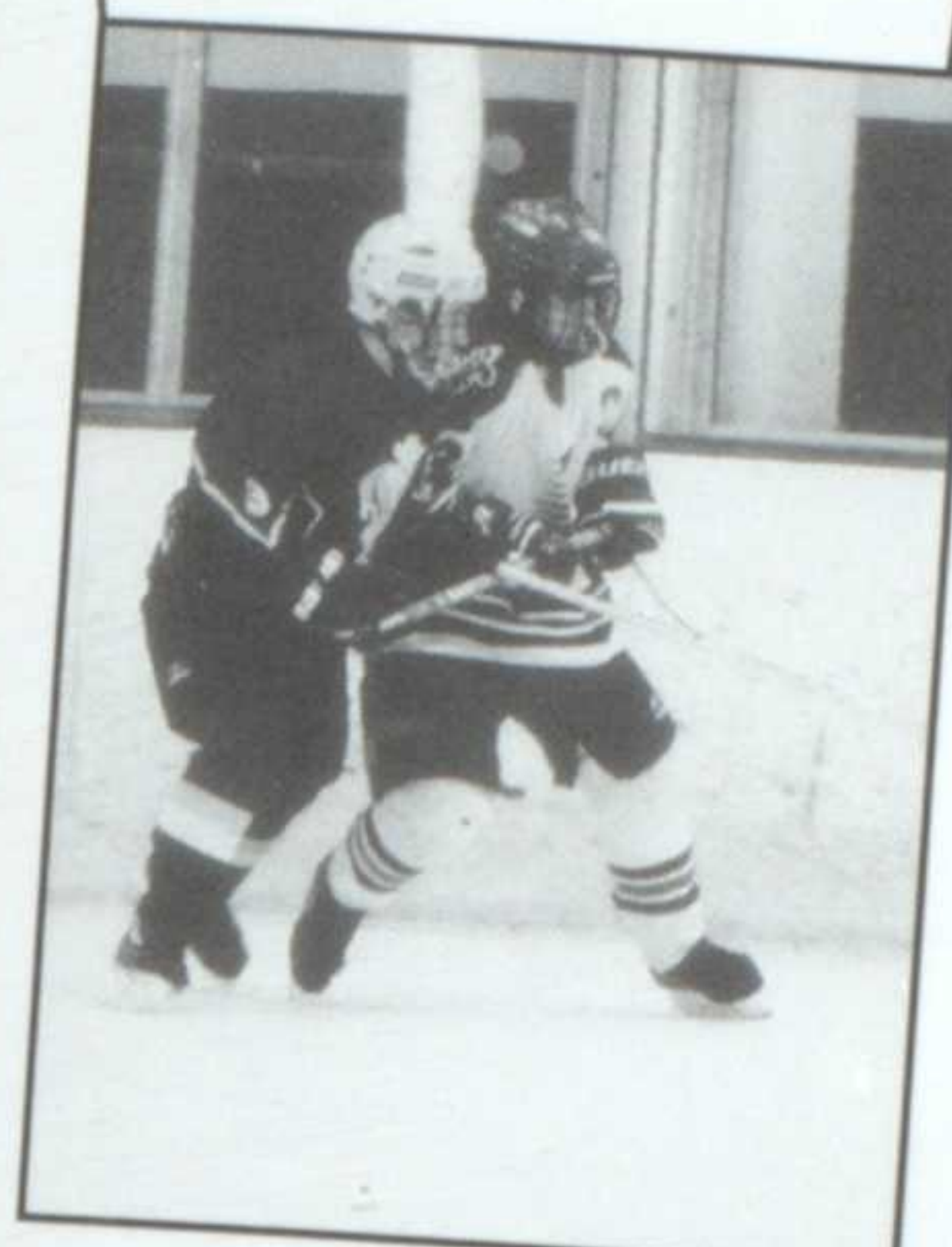

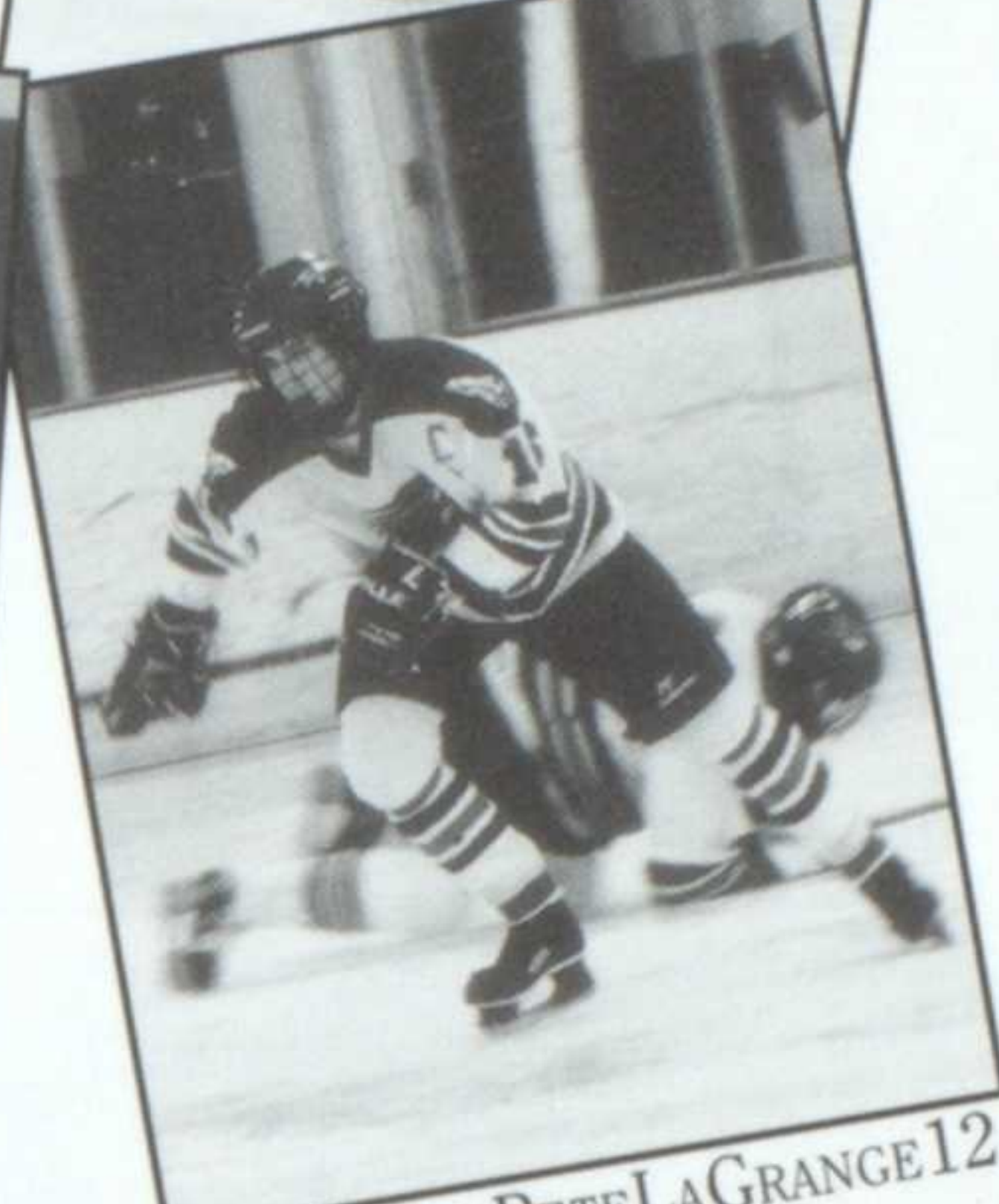

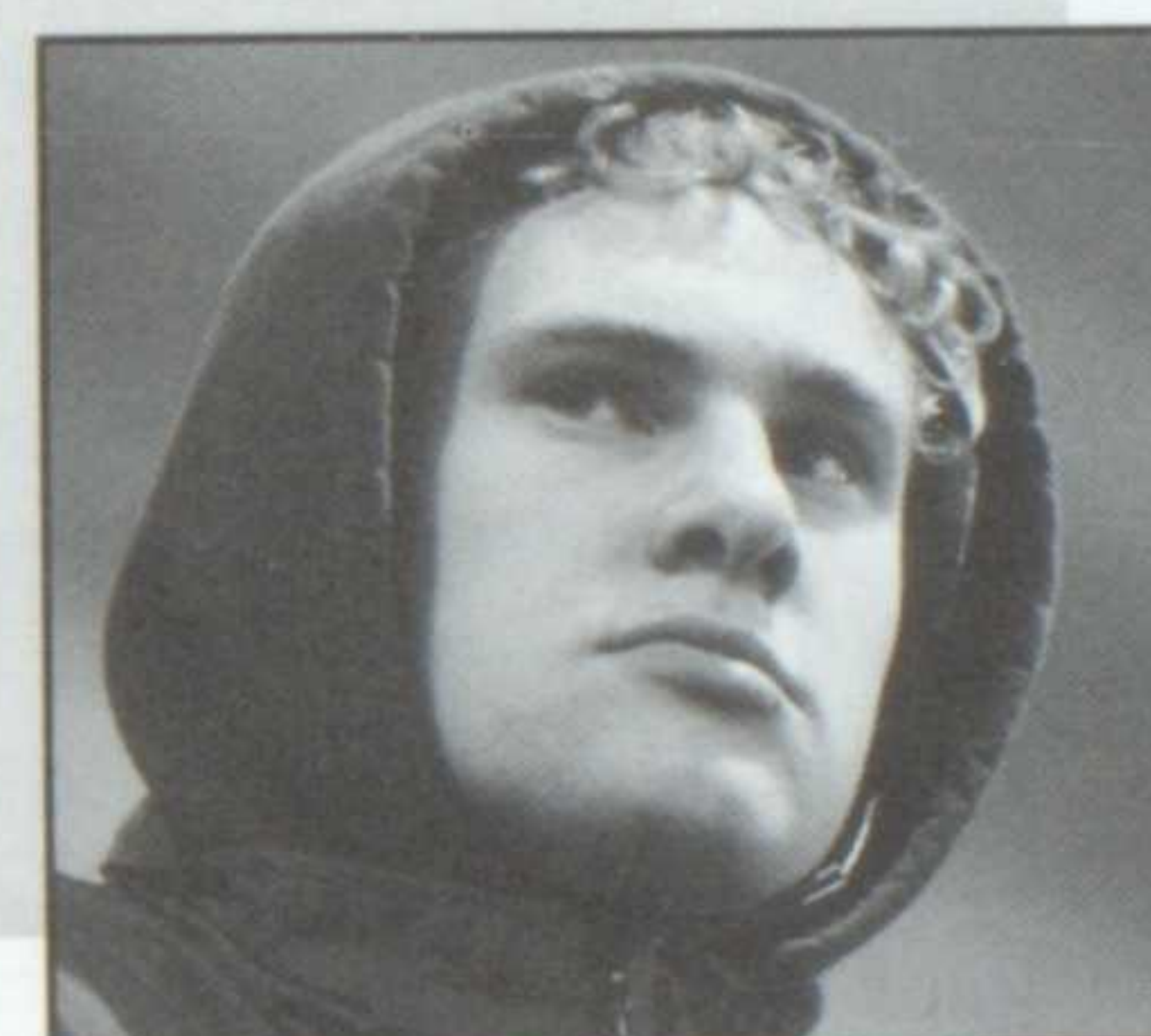

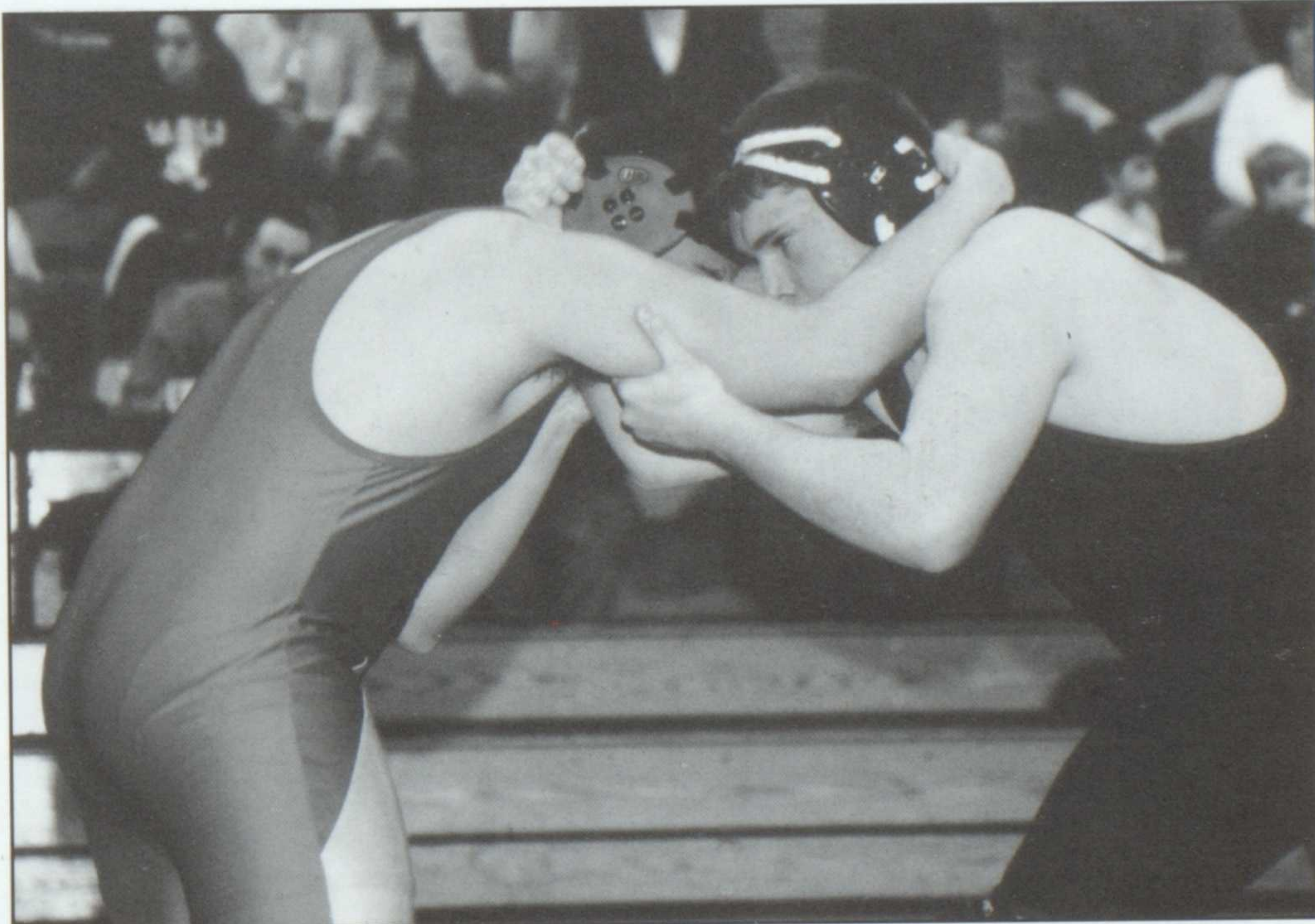

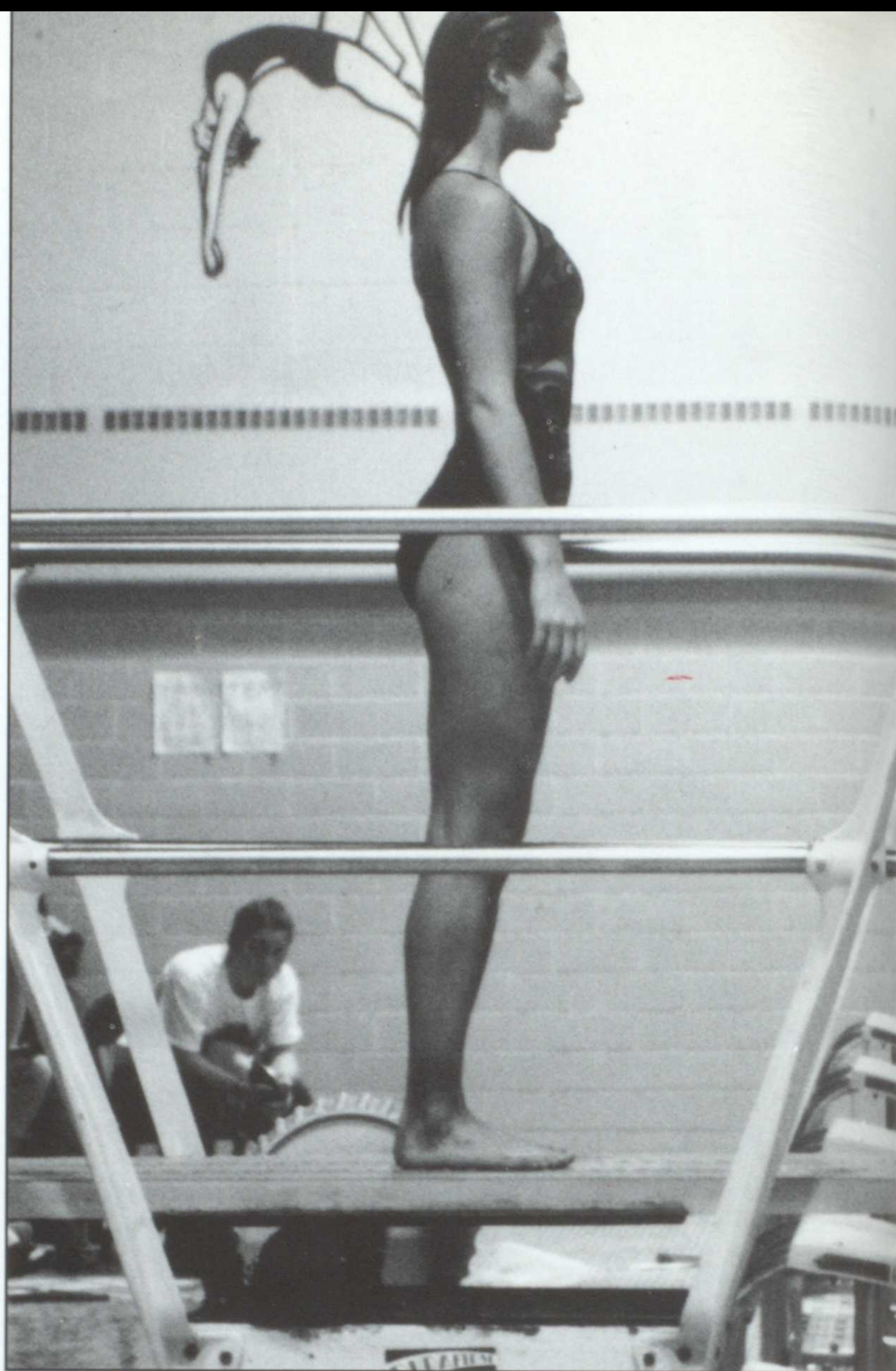

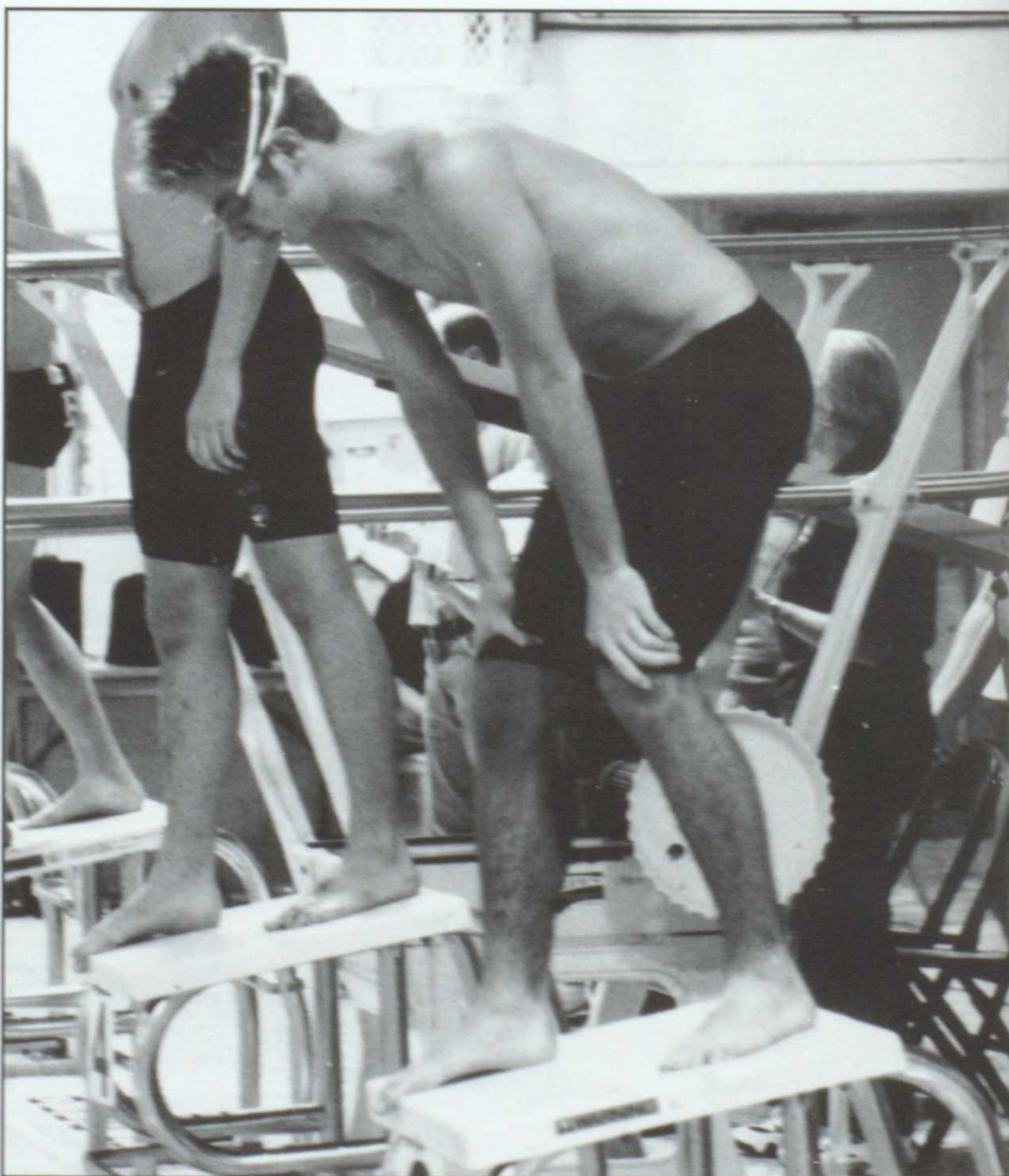

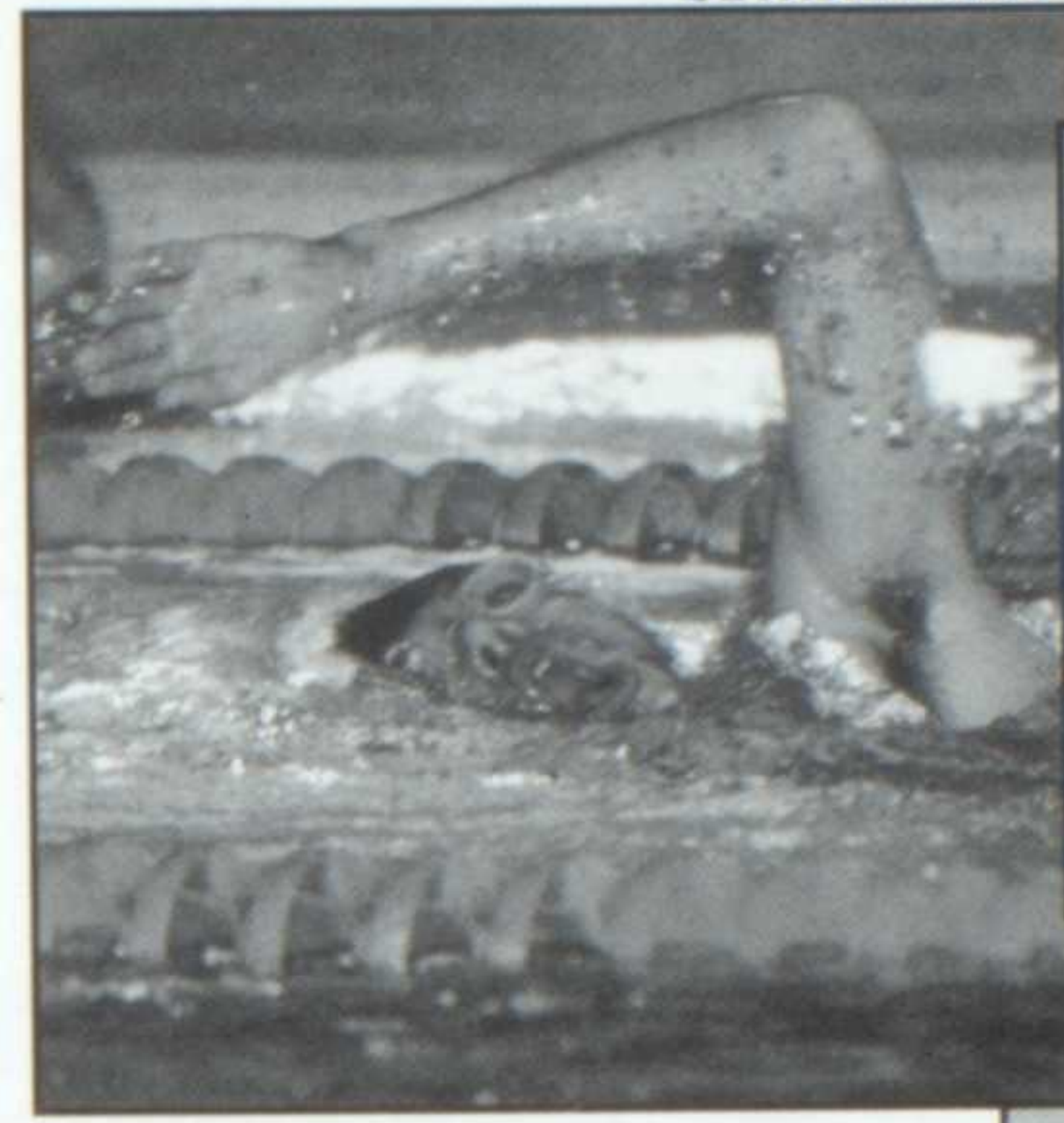

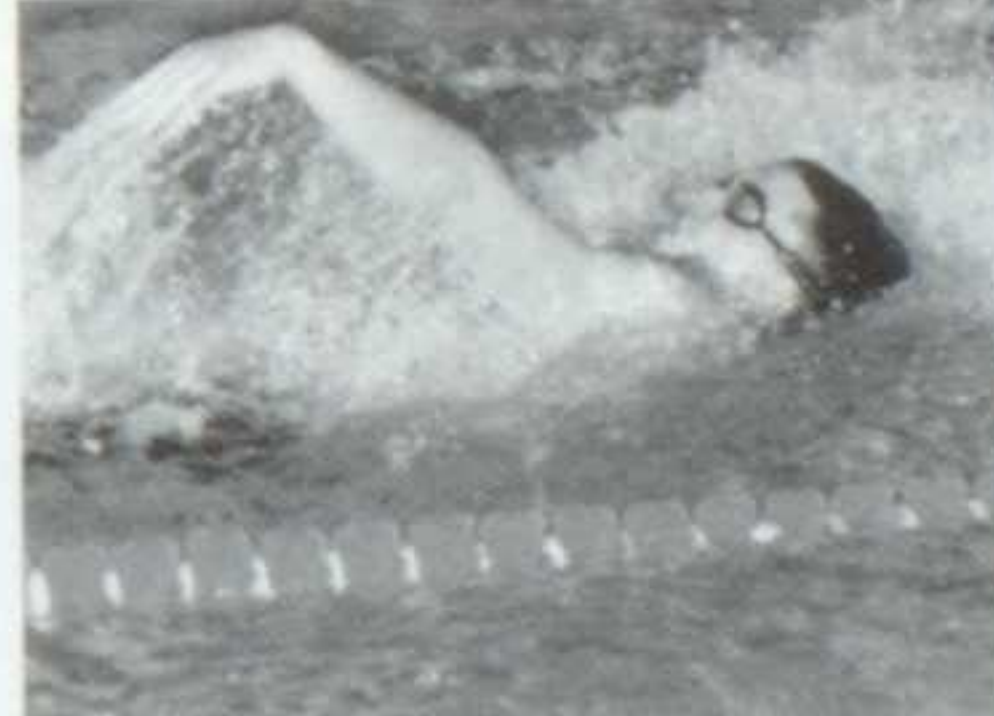

The team's final record was 4-16, losing three games in overtime, four in the last half of the game and two in the last few minutes.

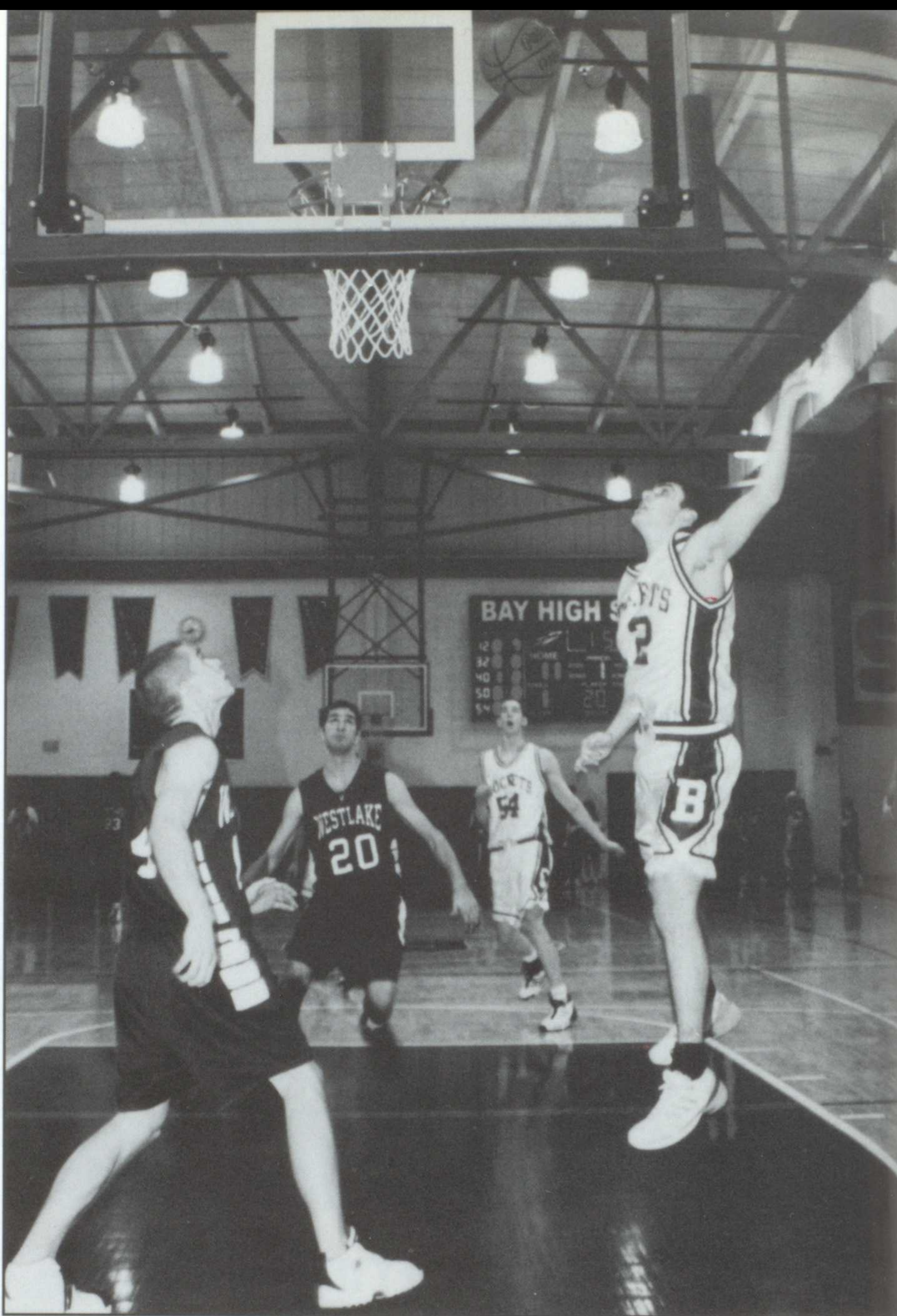
The team improved on their defense in all their

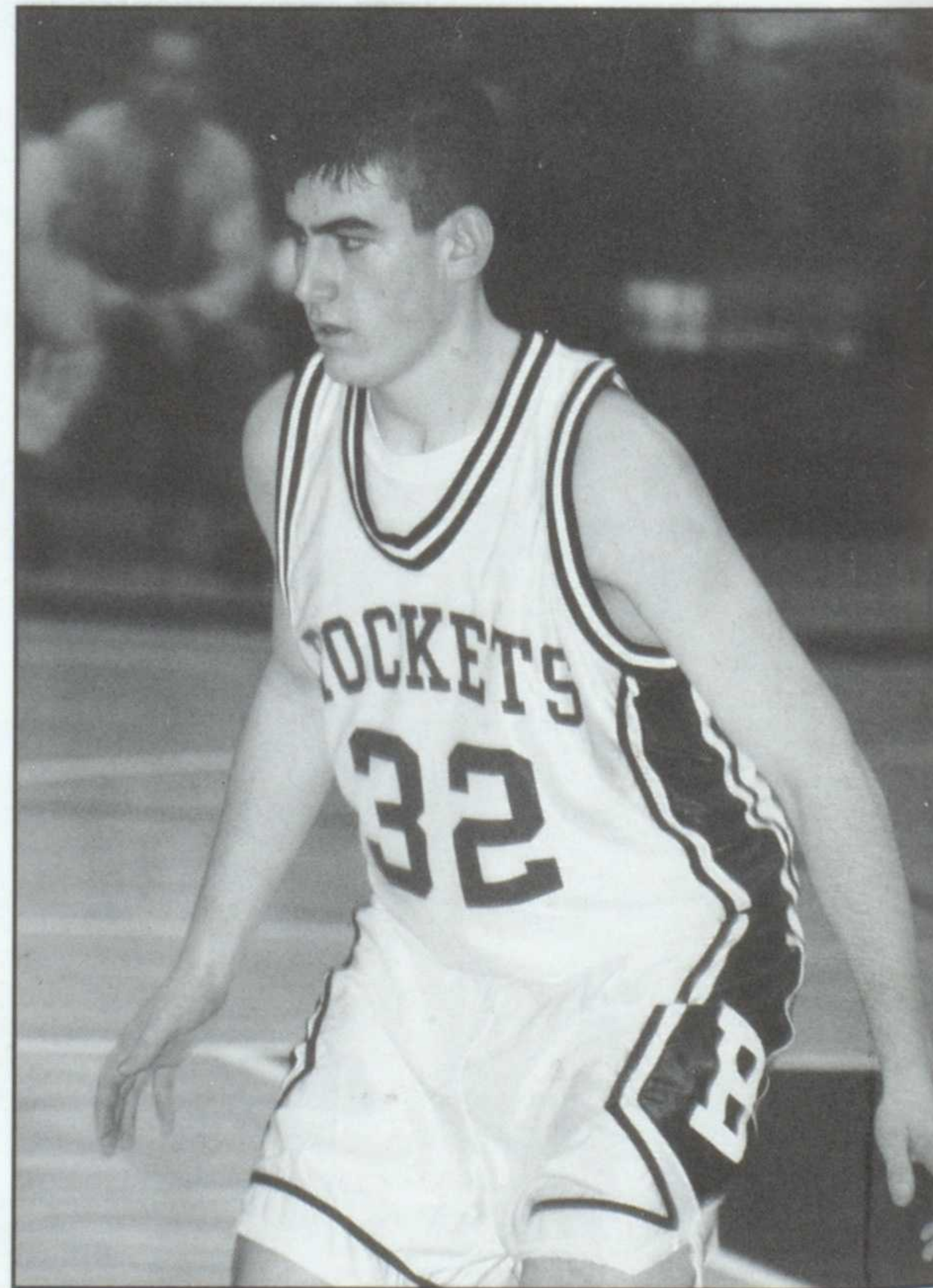

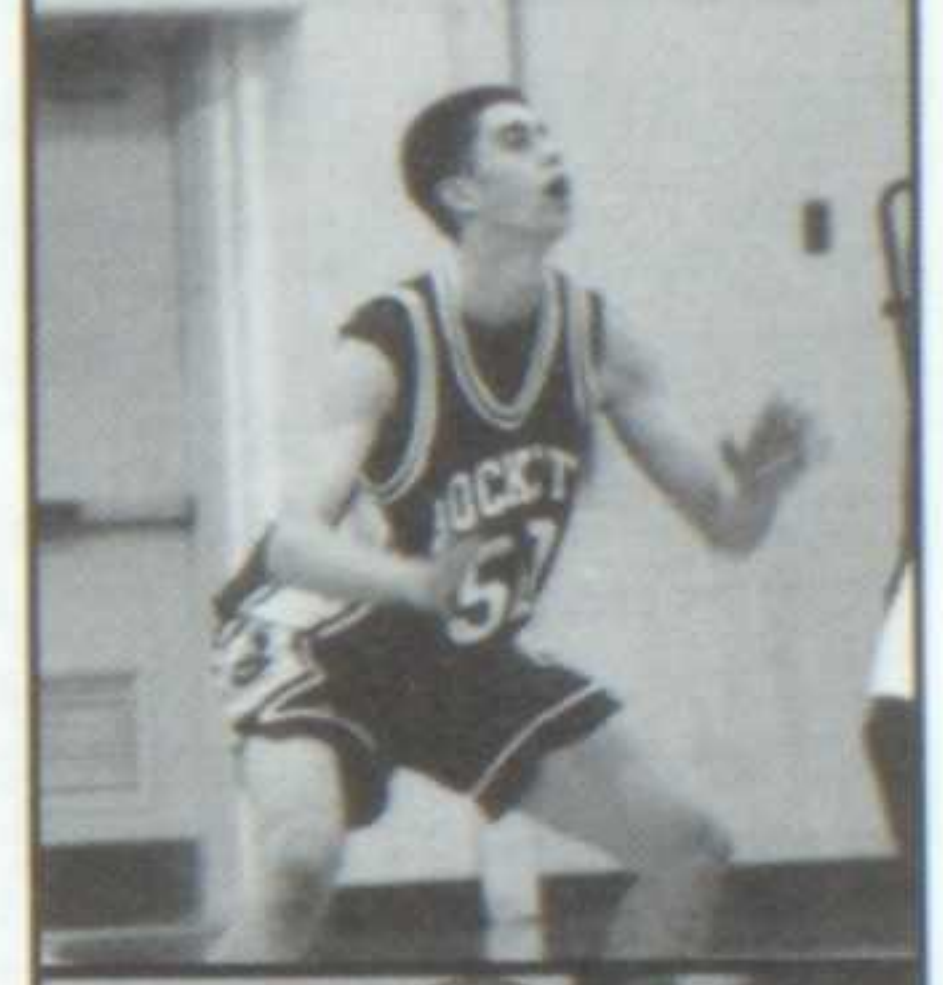

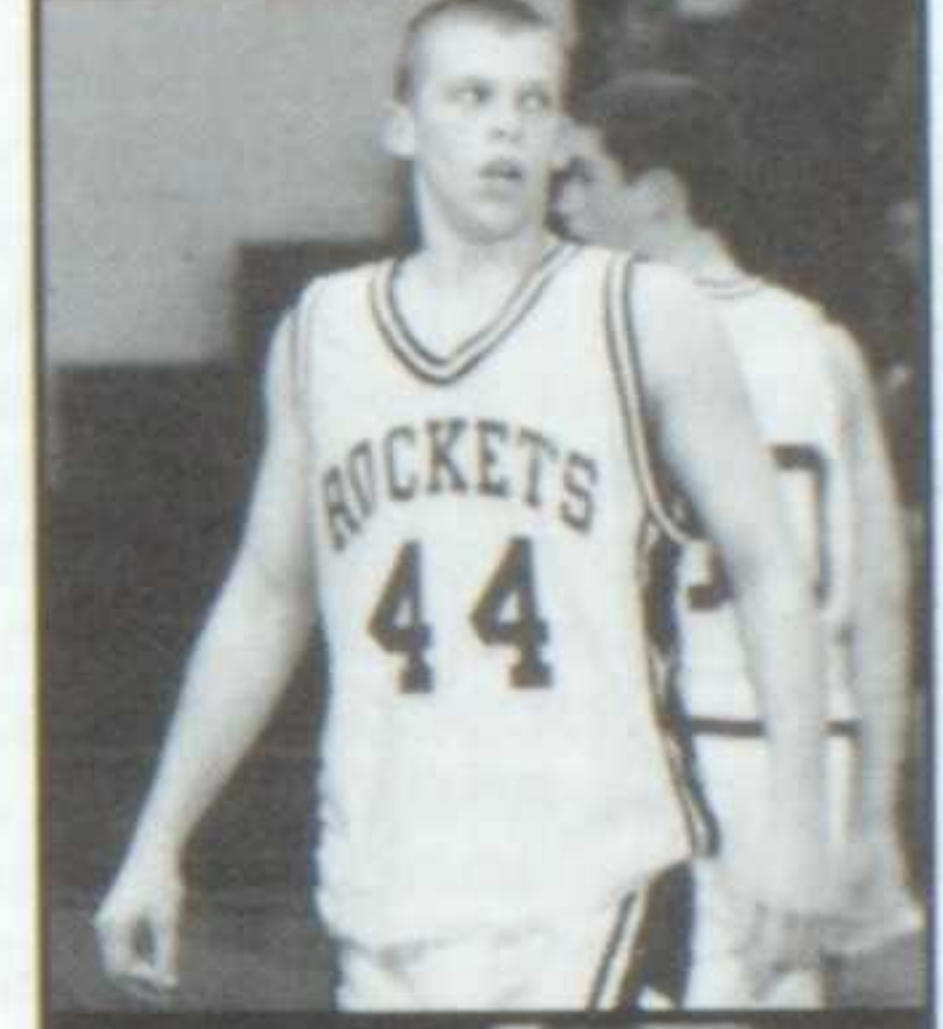

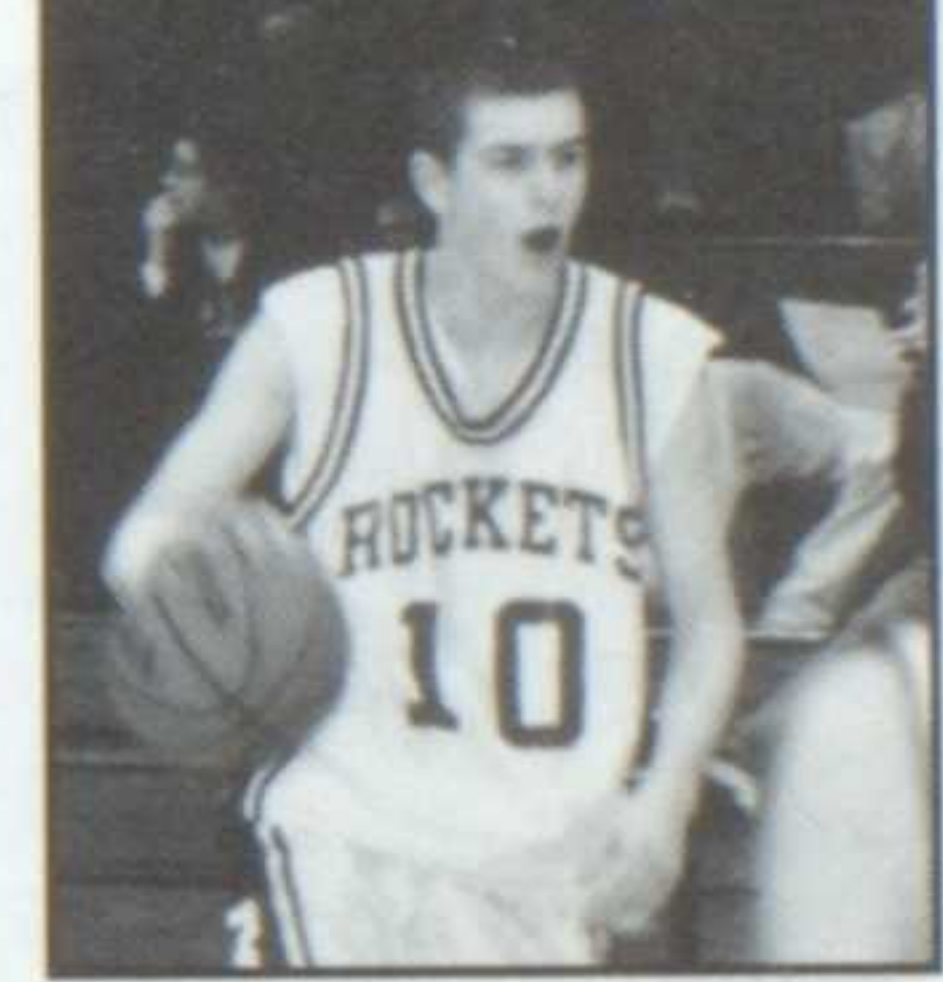

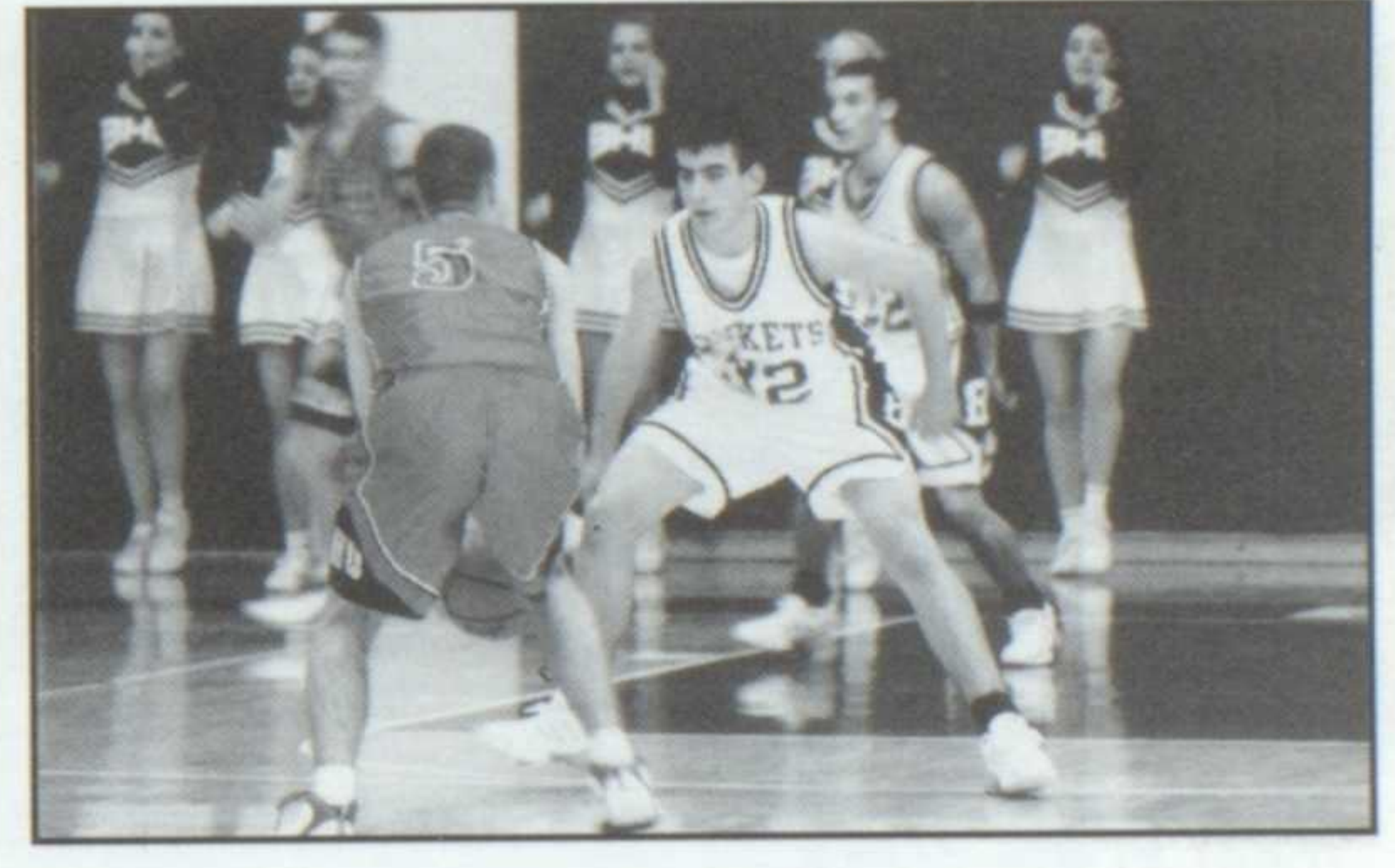

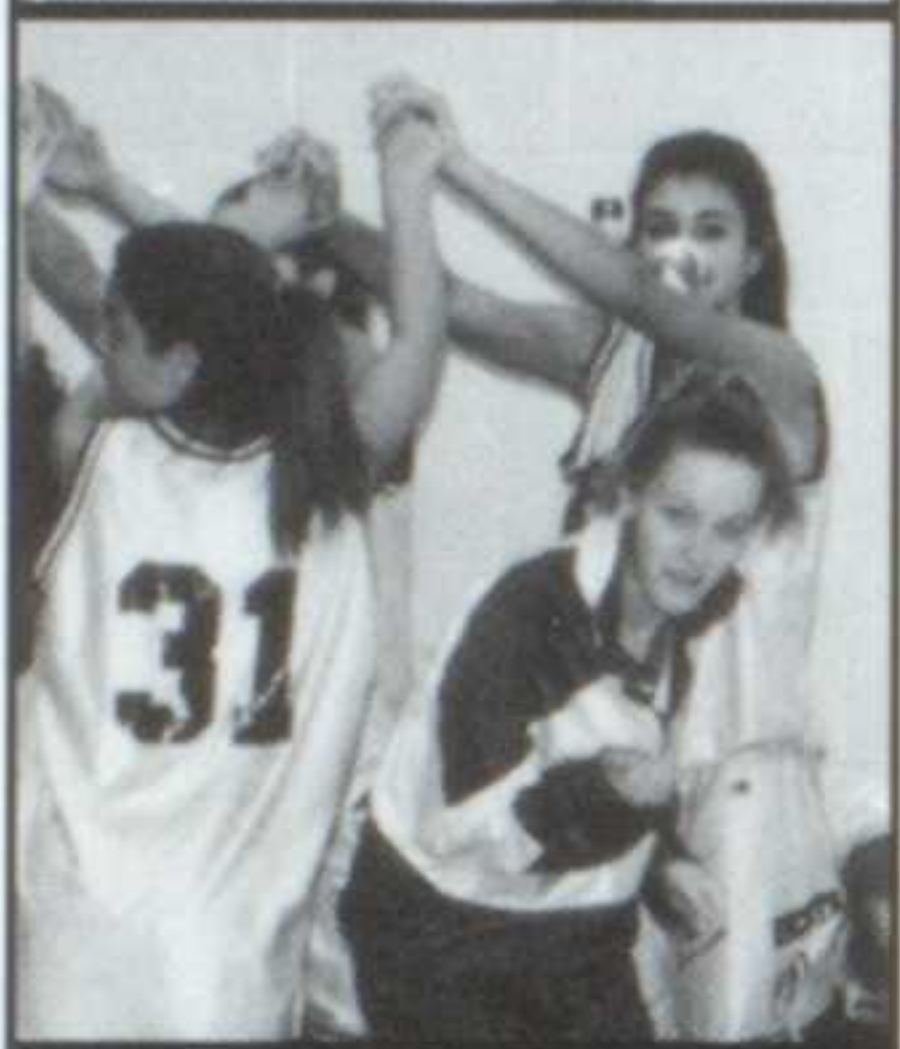

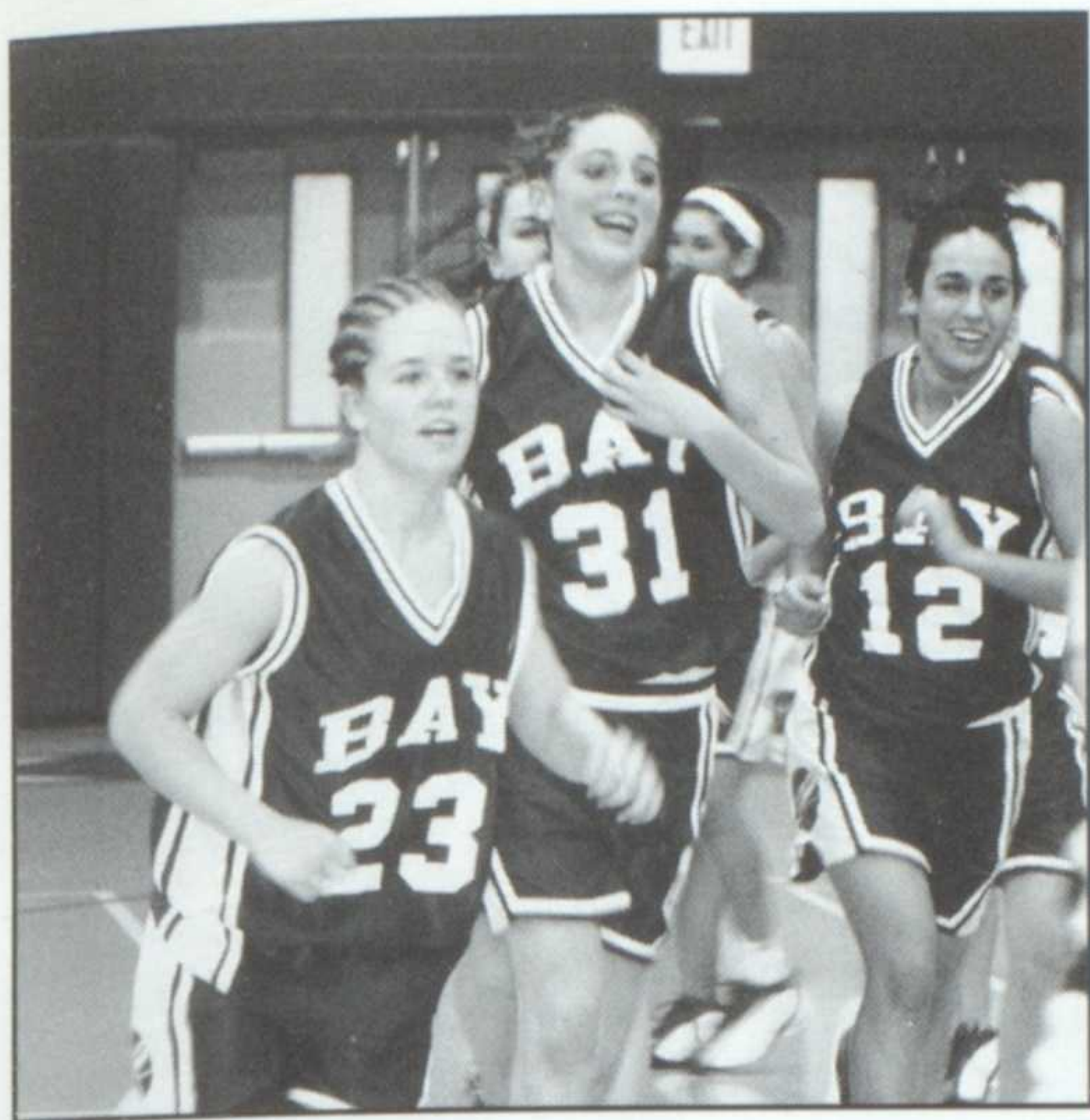

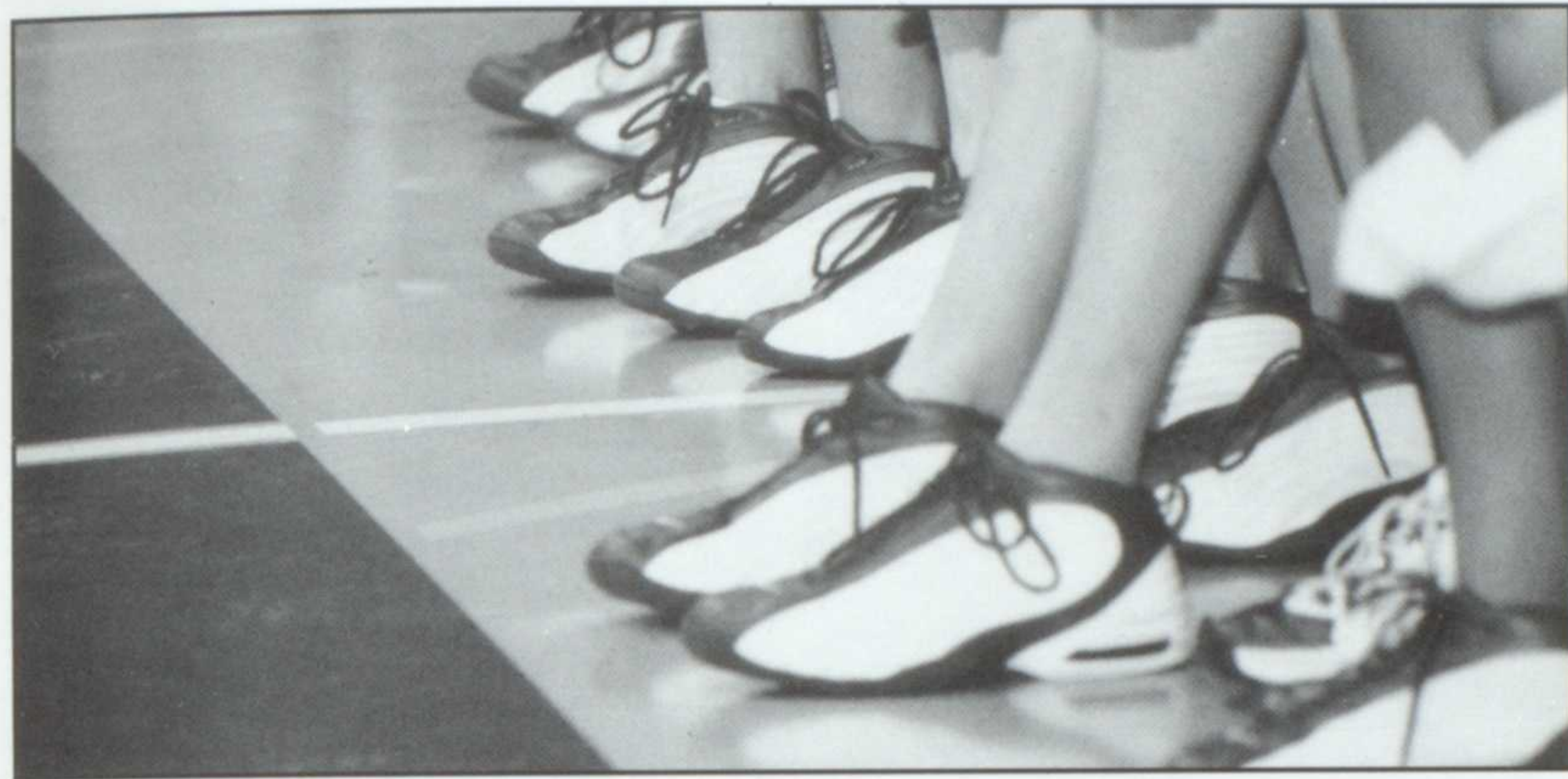

Before the season started, the team went to three different bas-

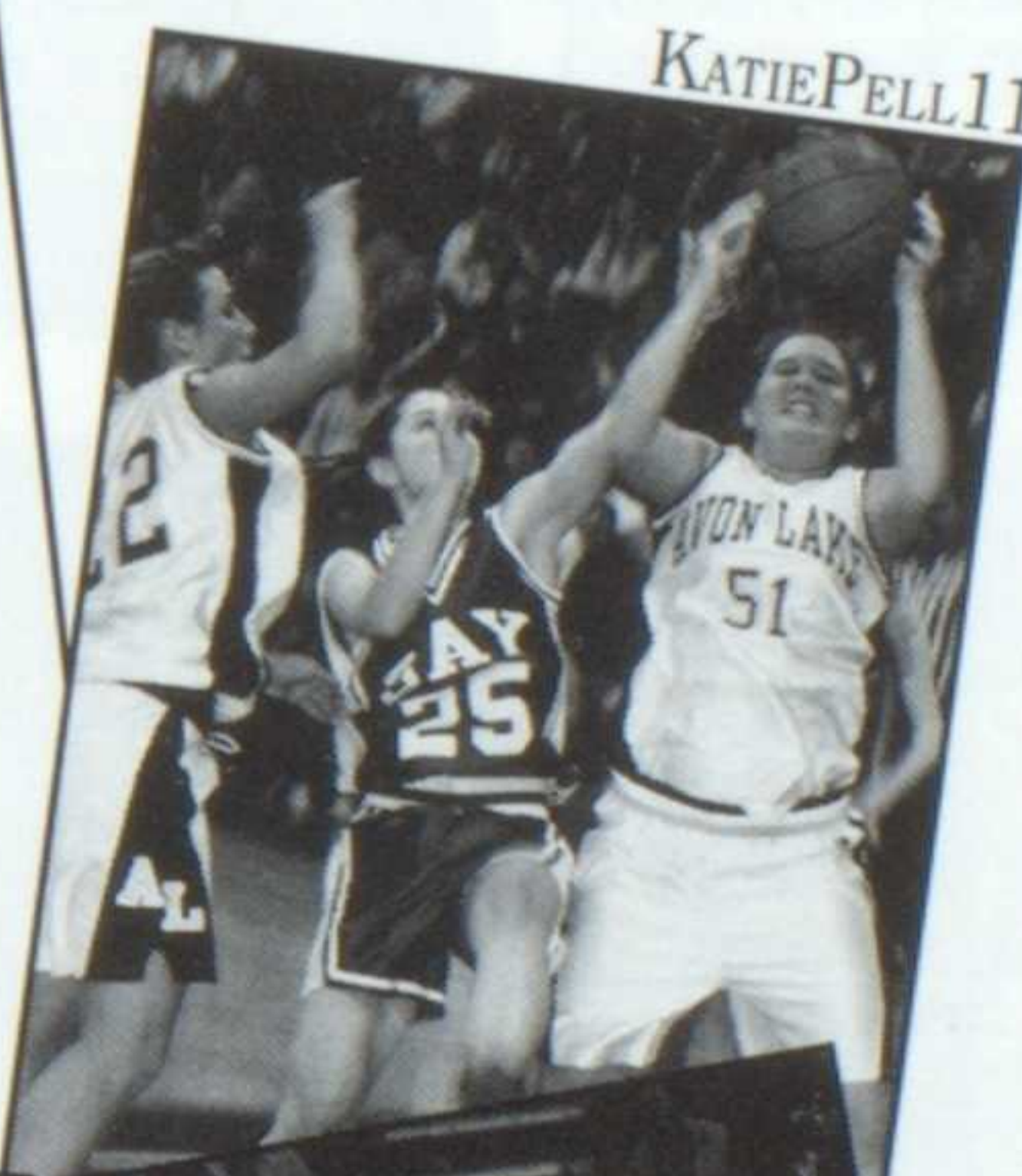
ketball camps at Ohio University, Findlay University, and the University of California in Pennsylvania.

"You could tell that our defense really got better throughout the season because teams began to score less and less against us towards

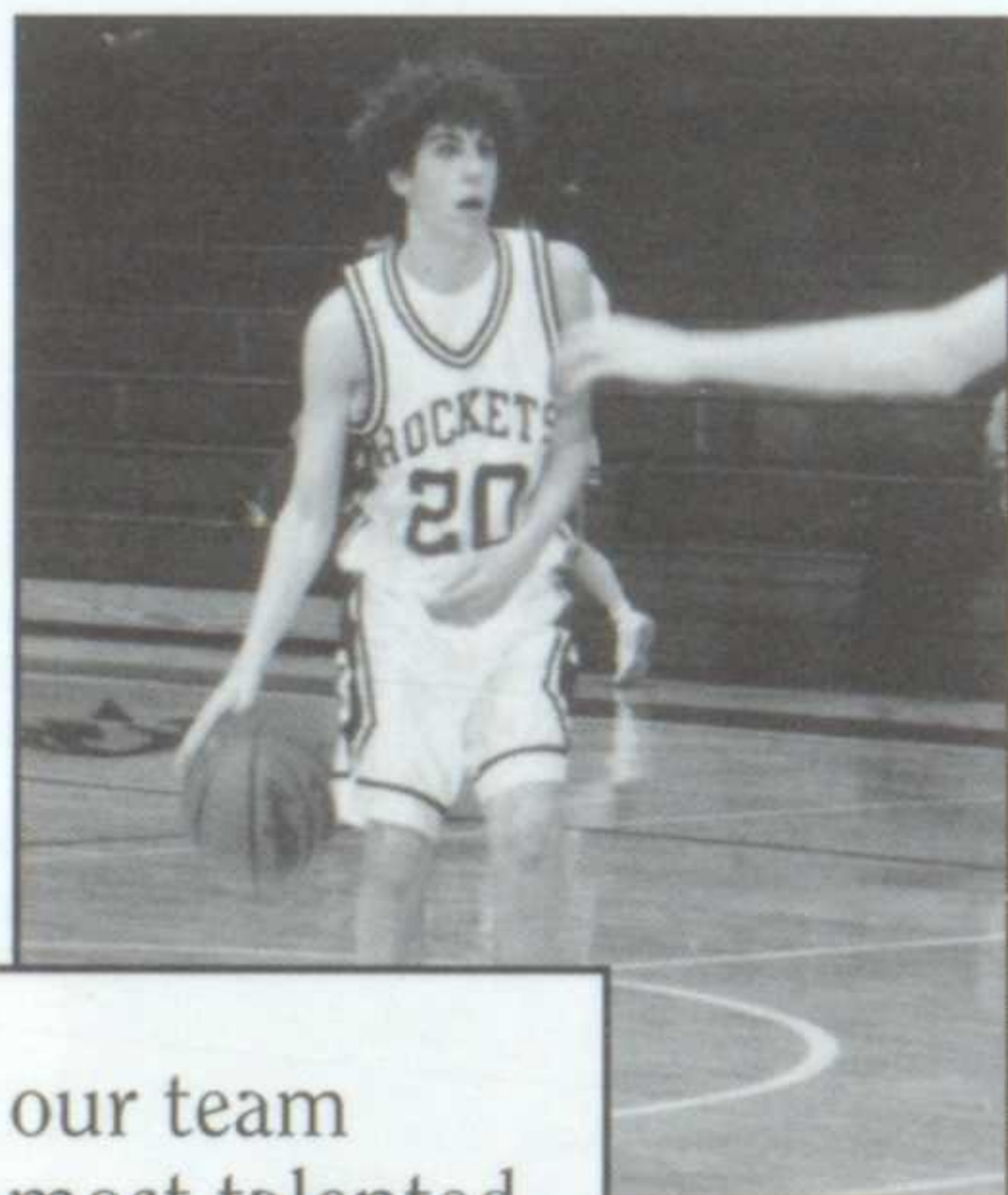
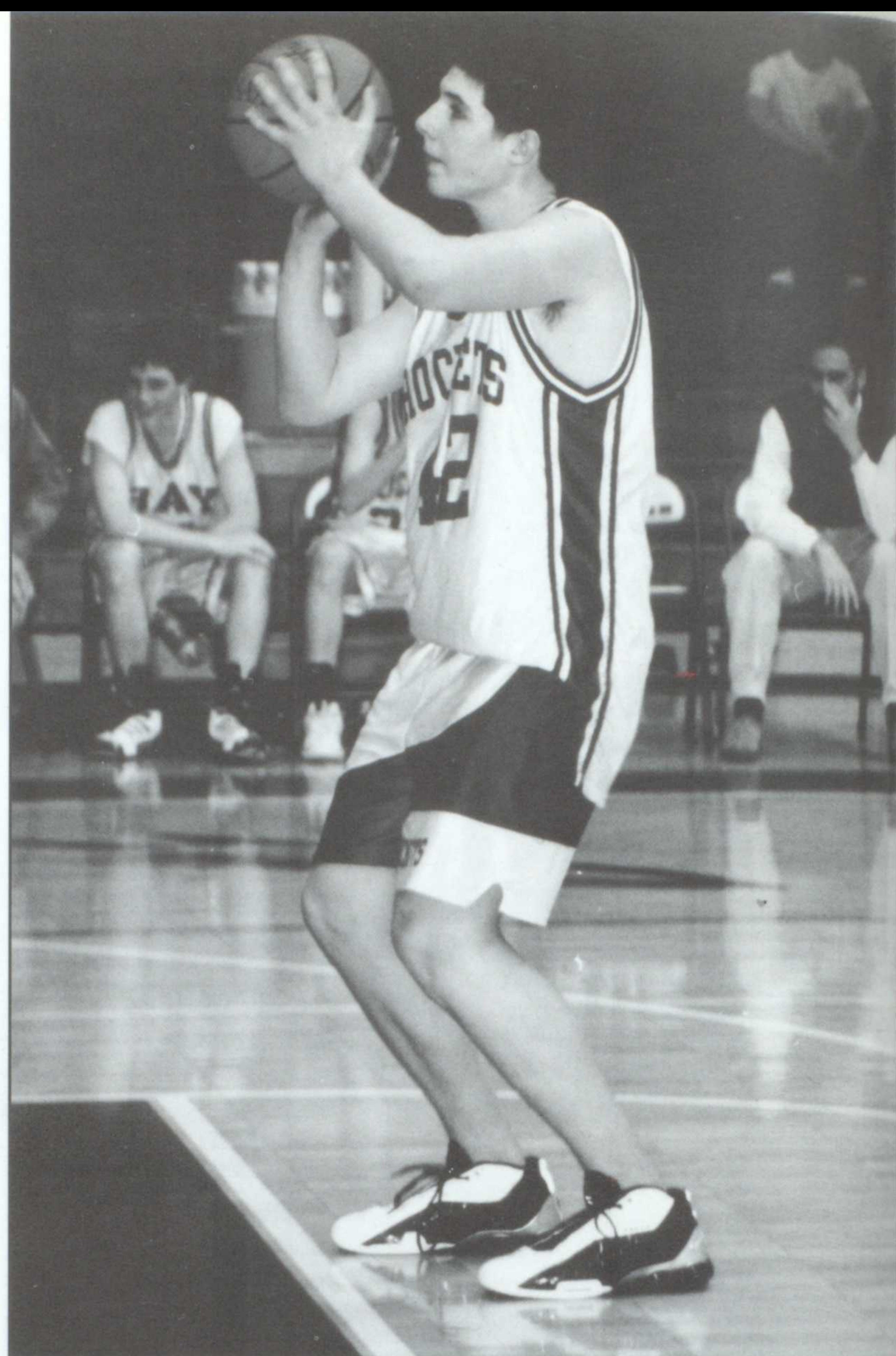
the end," said freshman Kelley Moore. Although the freshman team went 0-14, they almost beat Amherst with a score of 25-24.

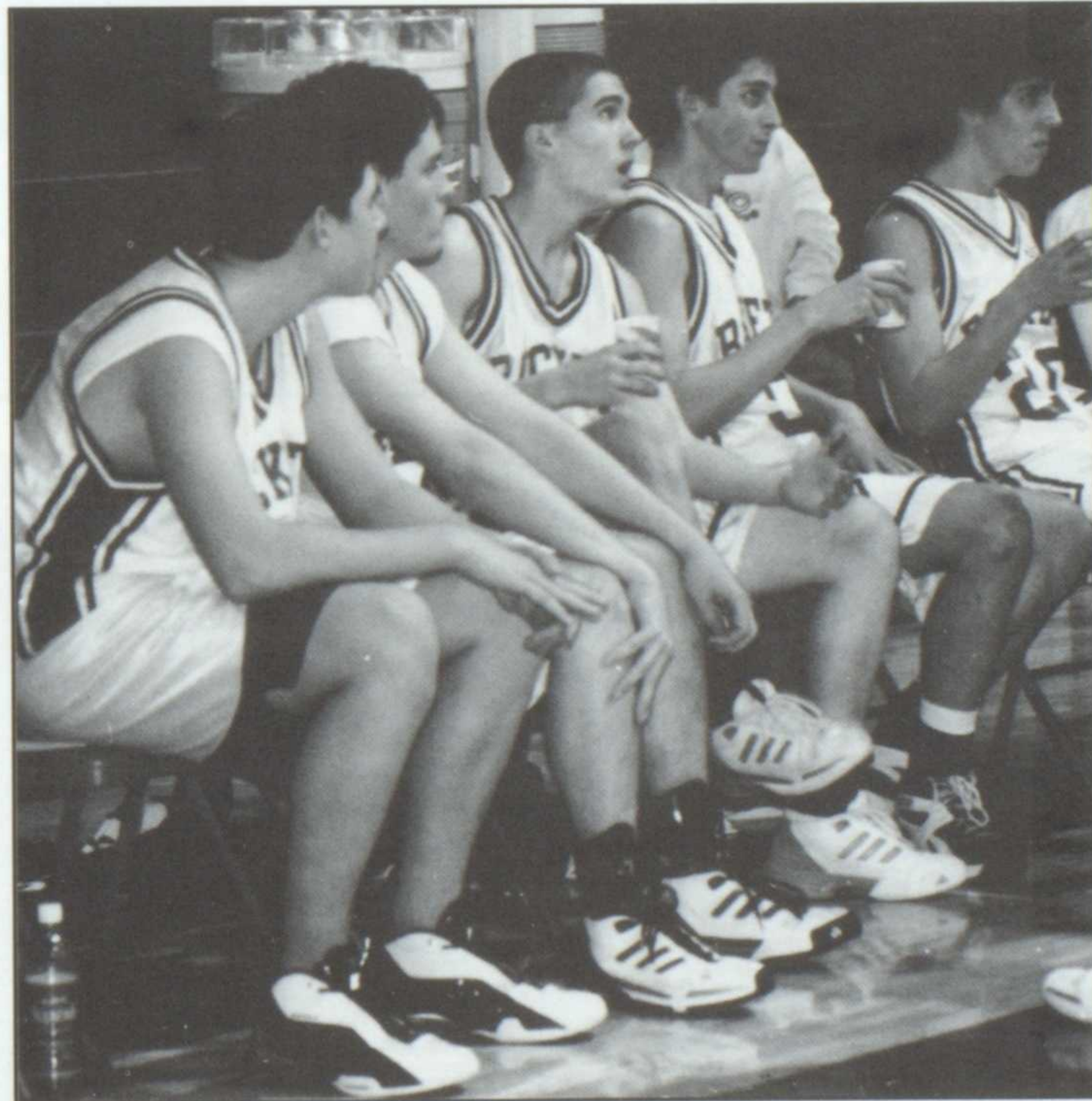

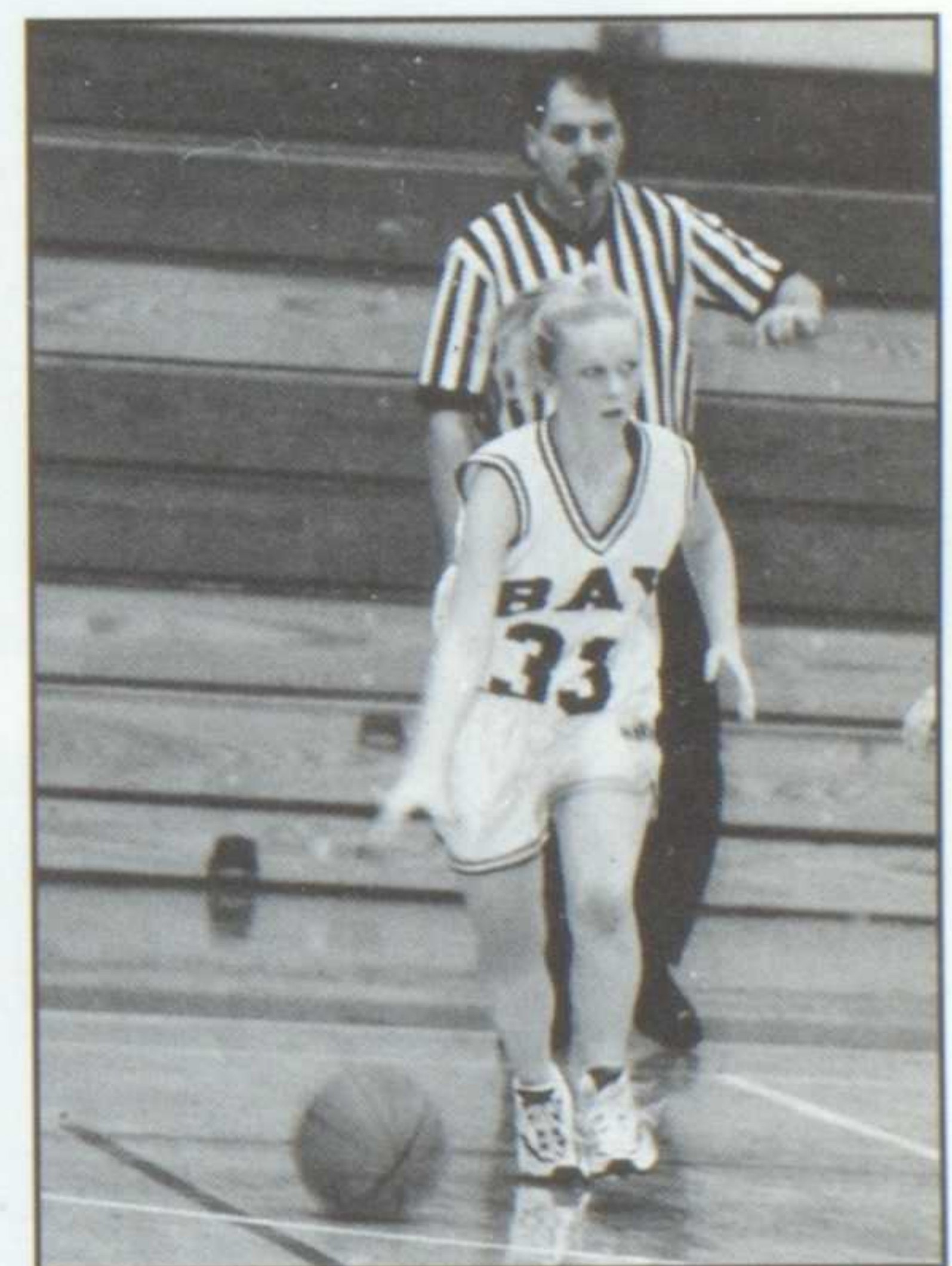

Golf team scores, sending Javor to state competition

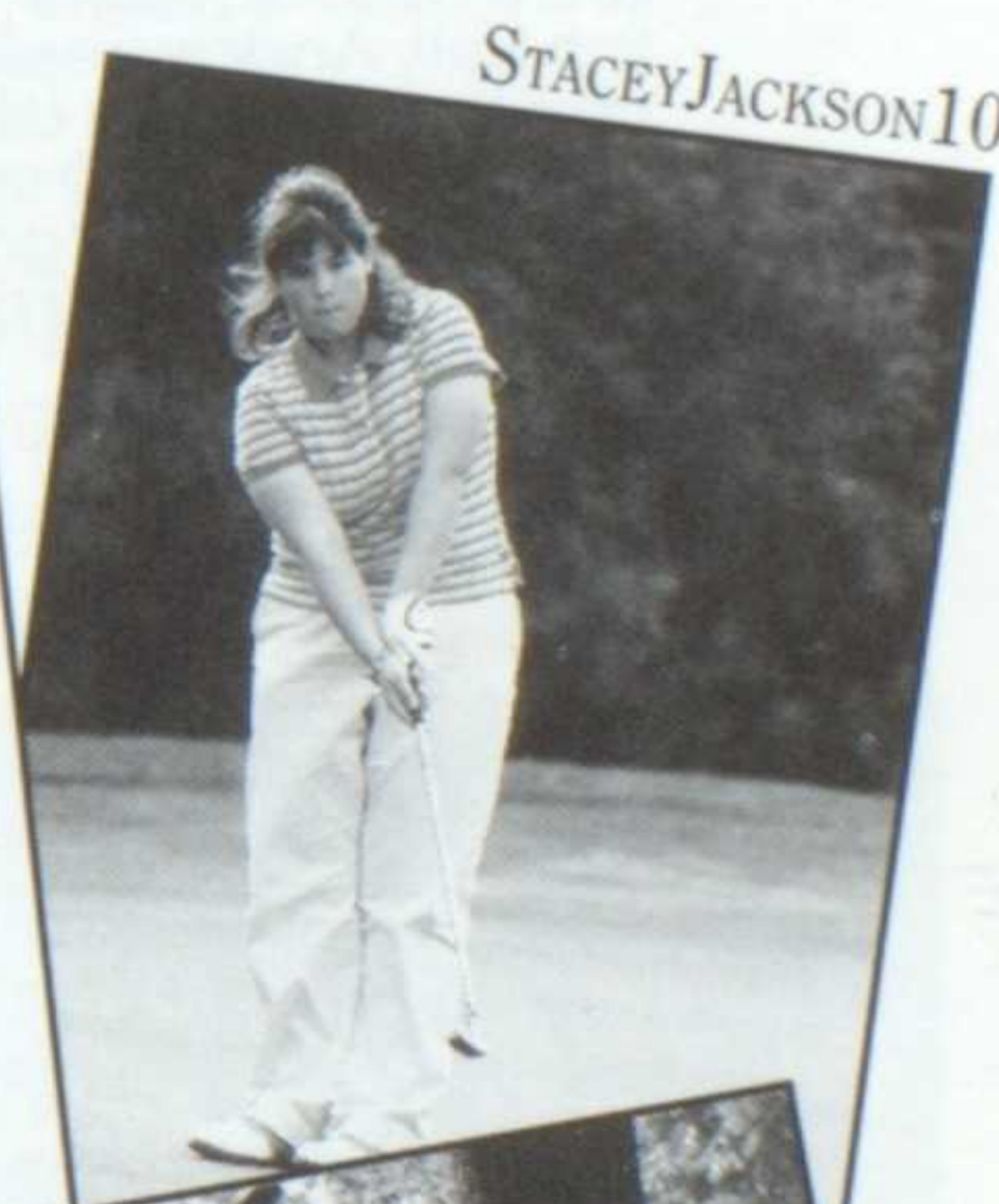

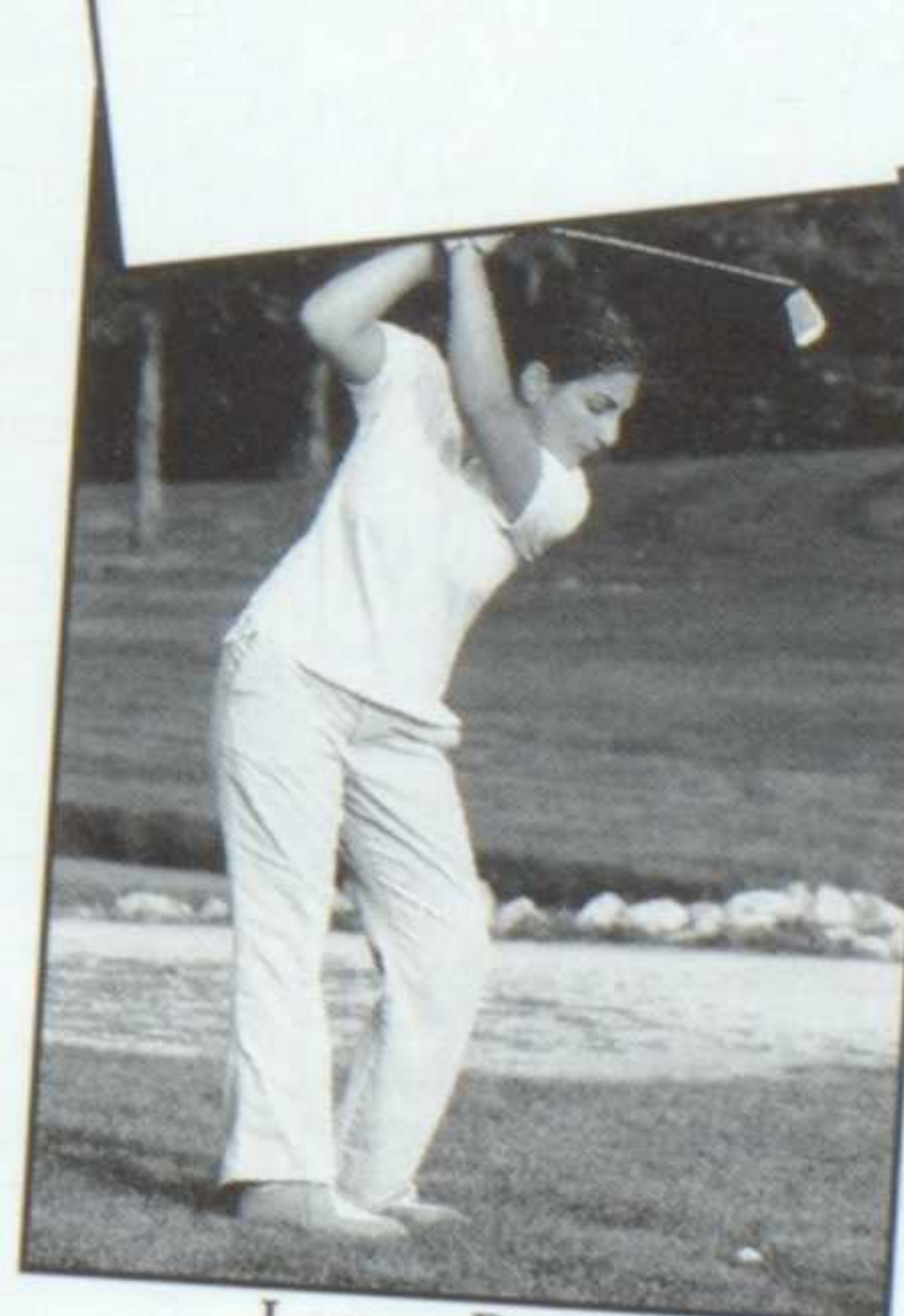

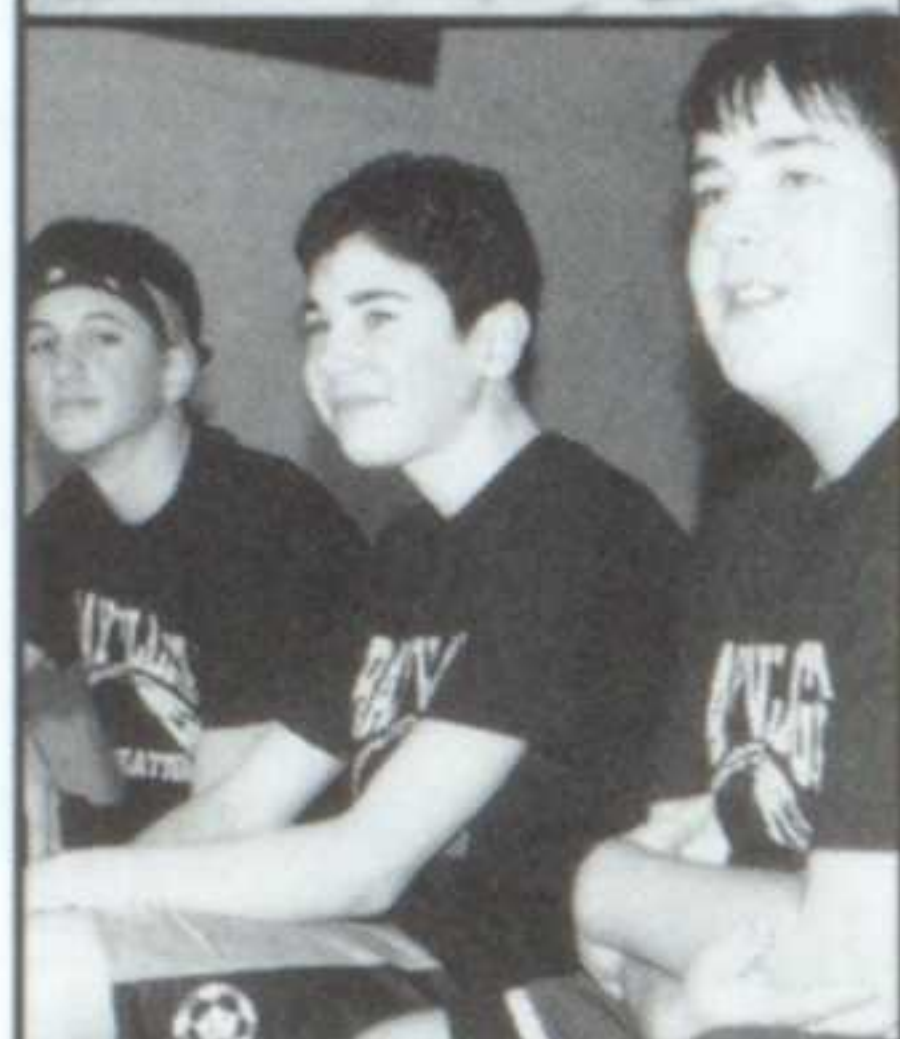

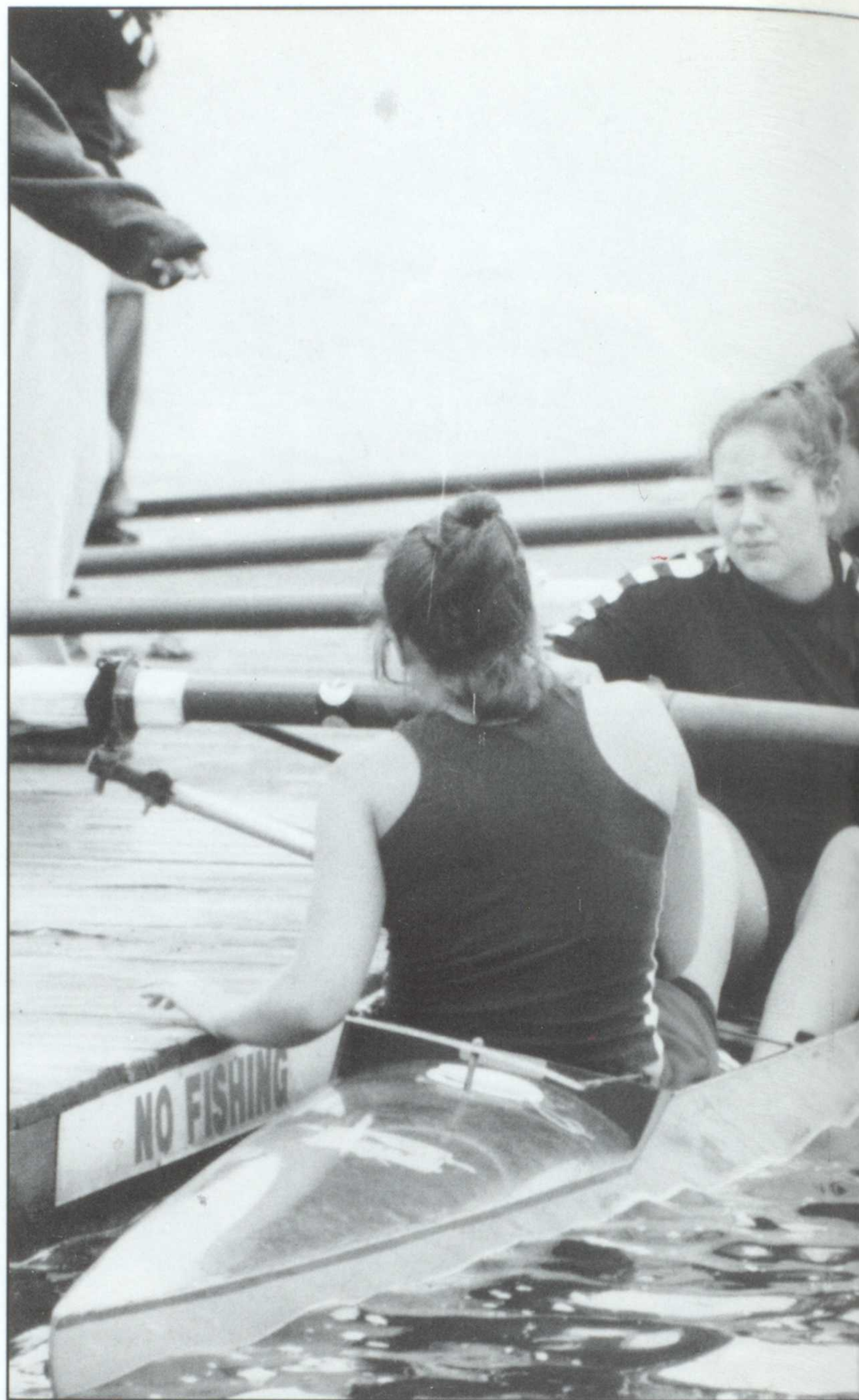

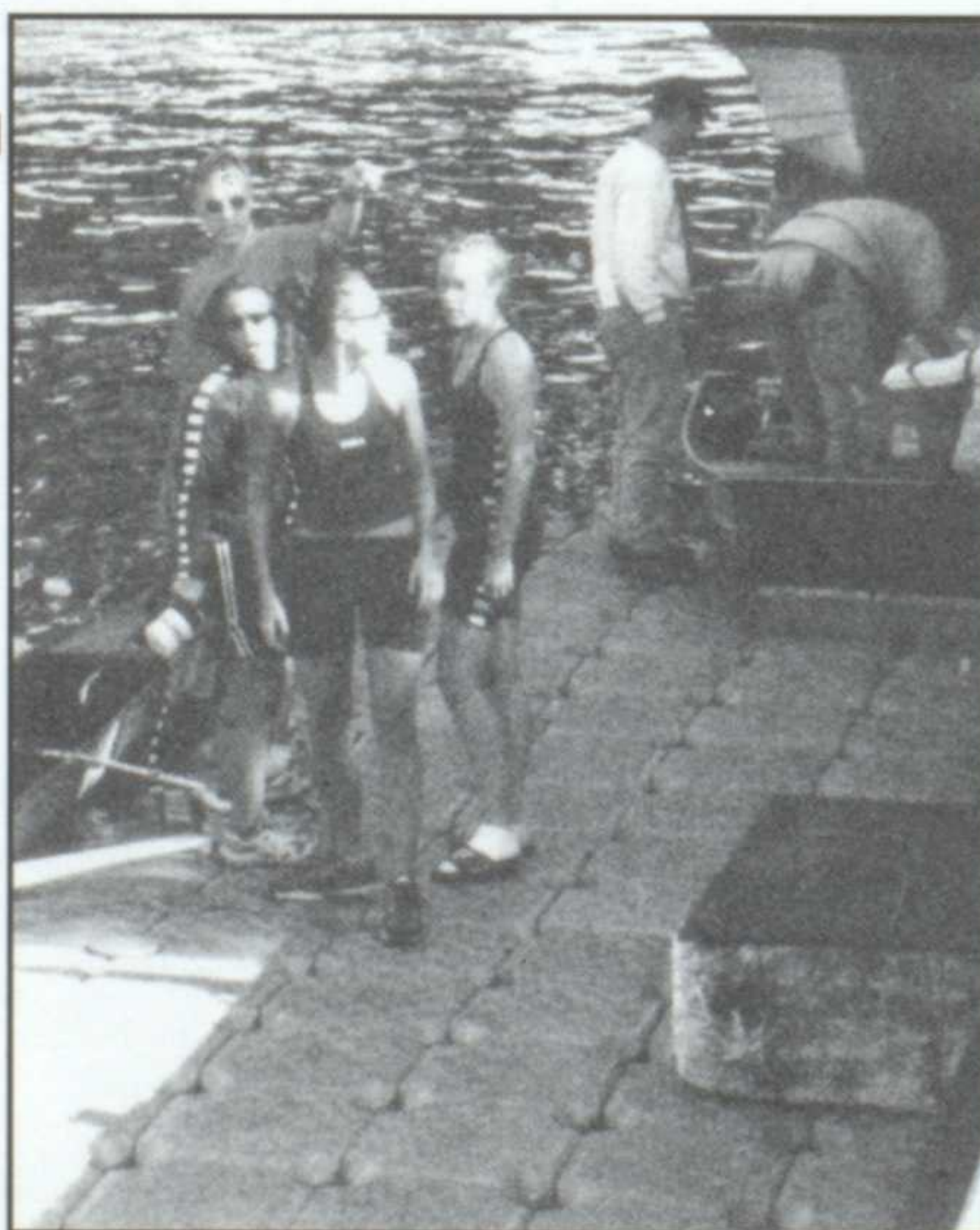

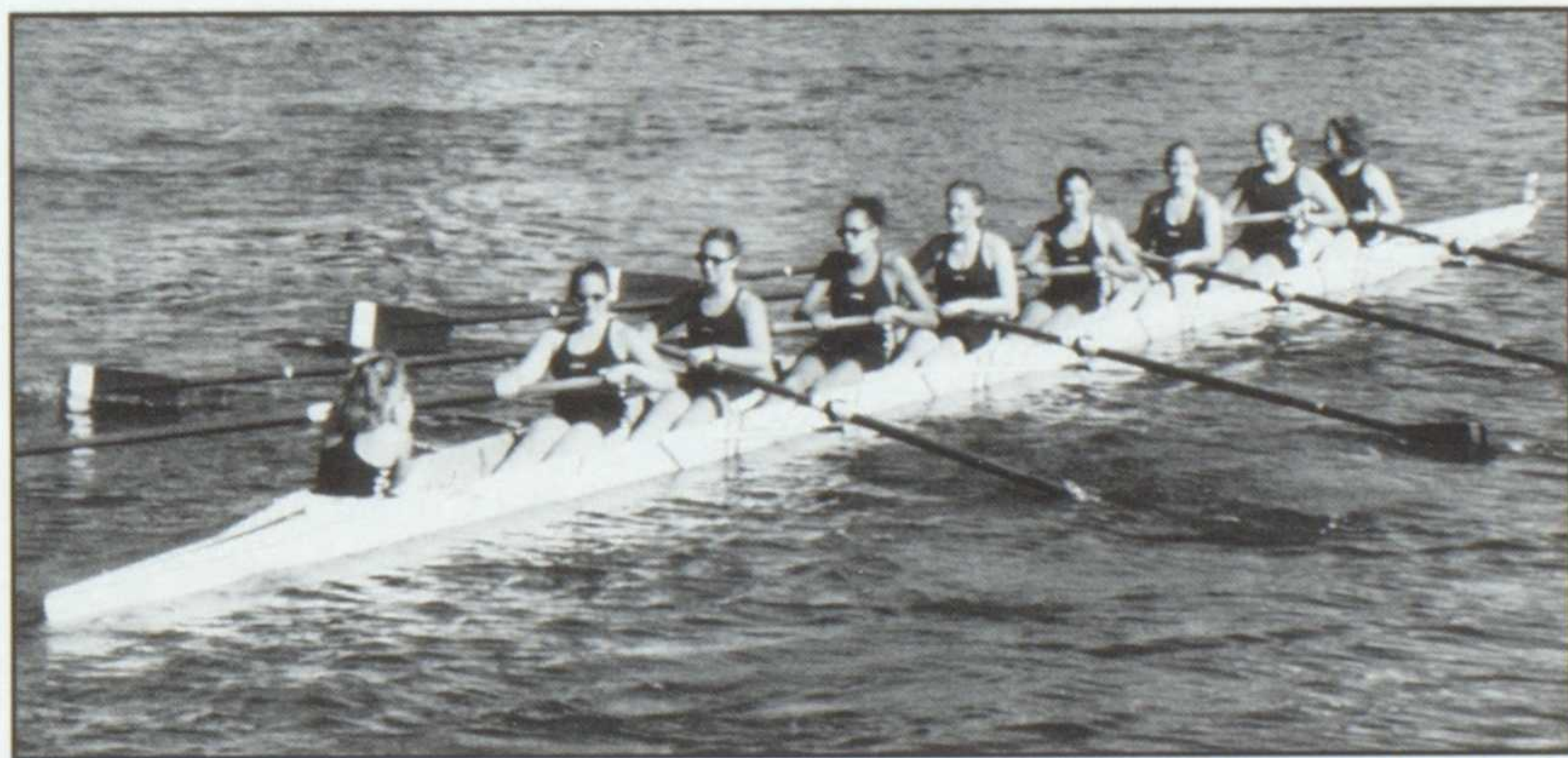
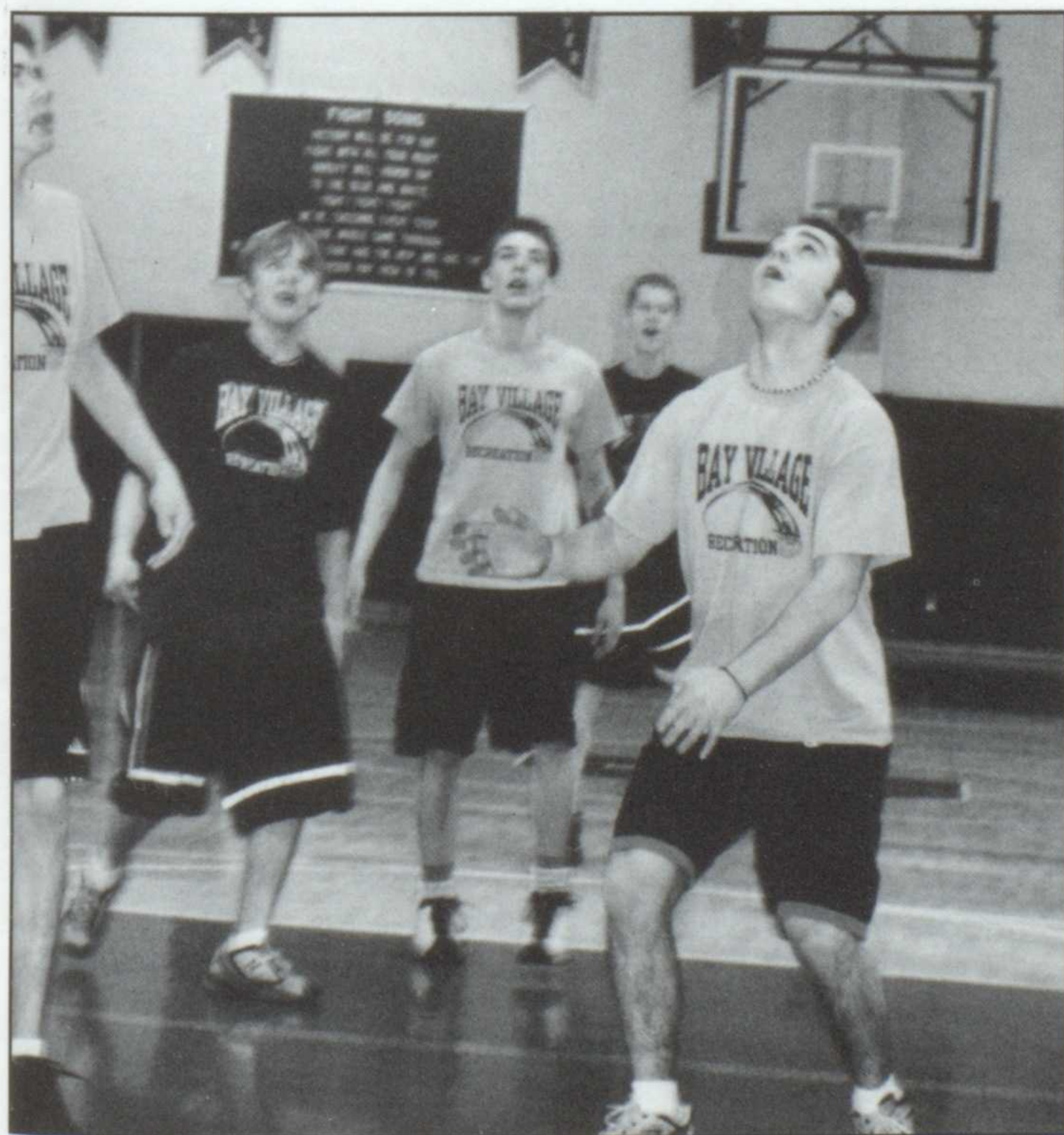

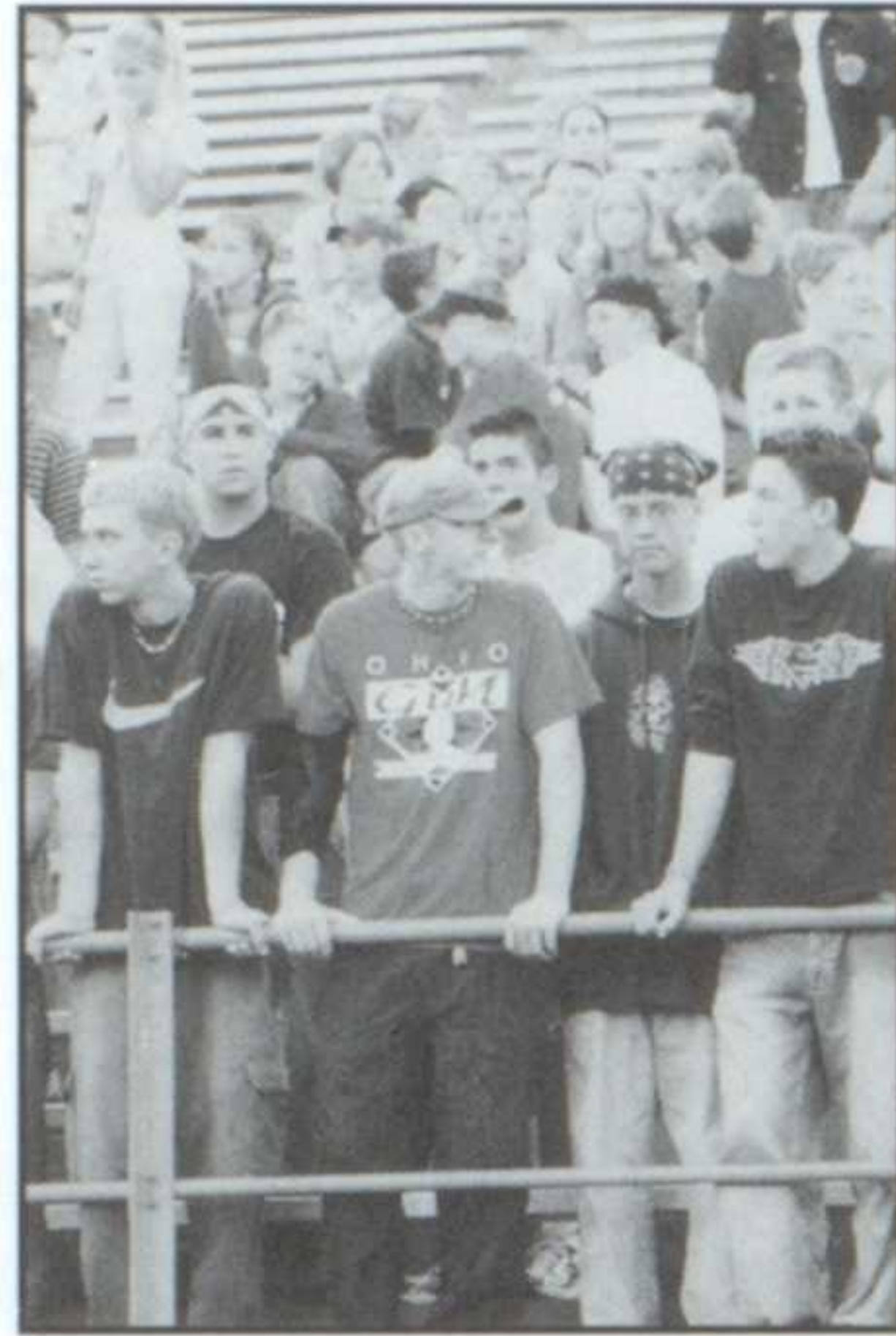

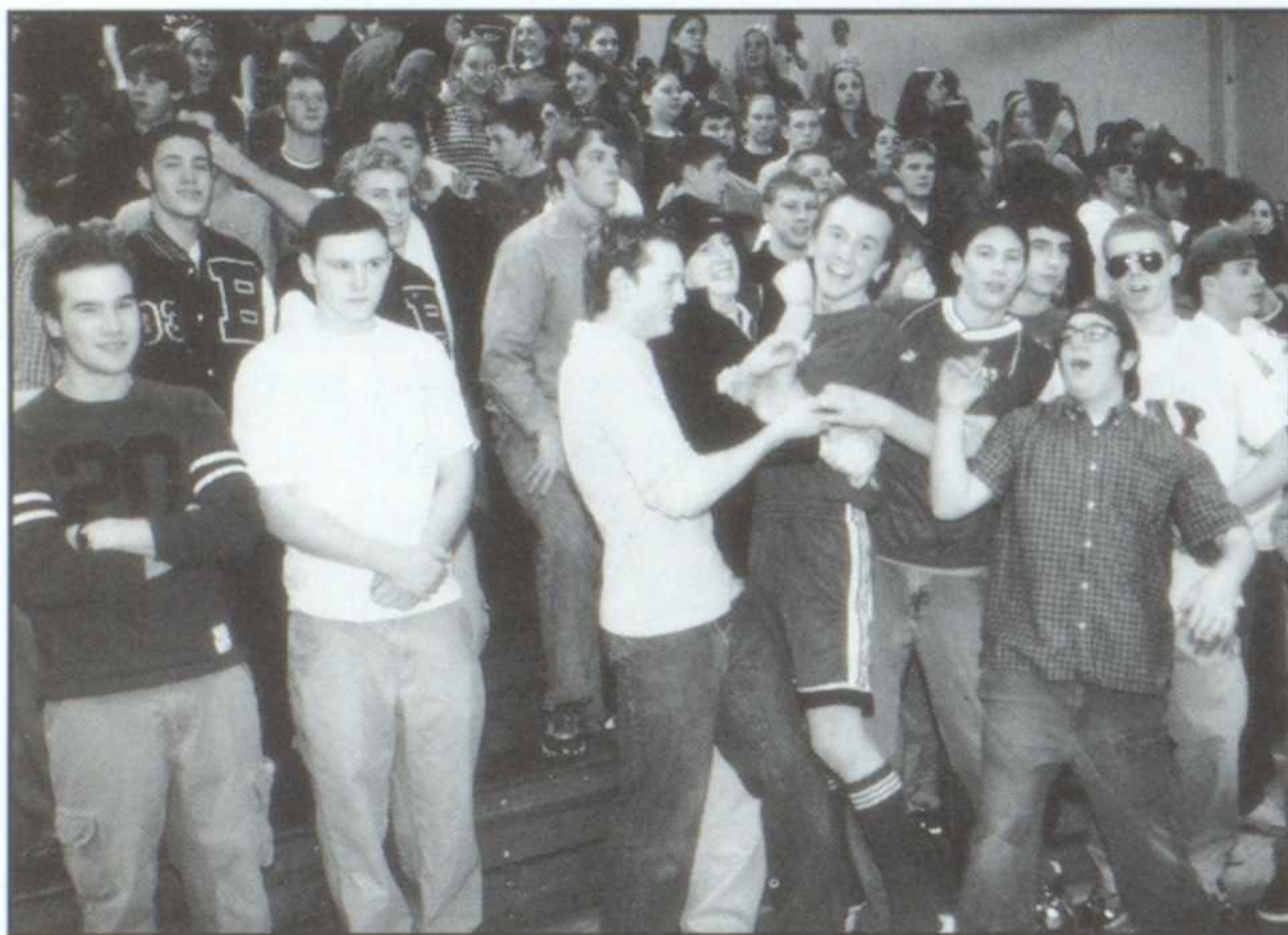

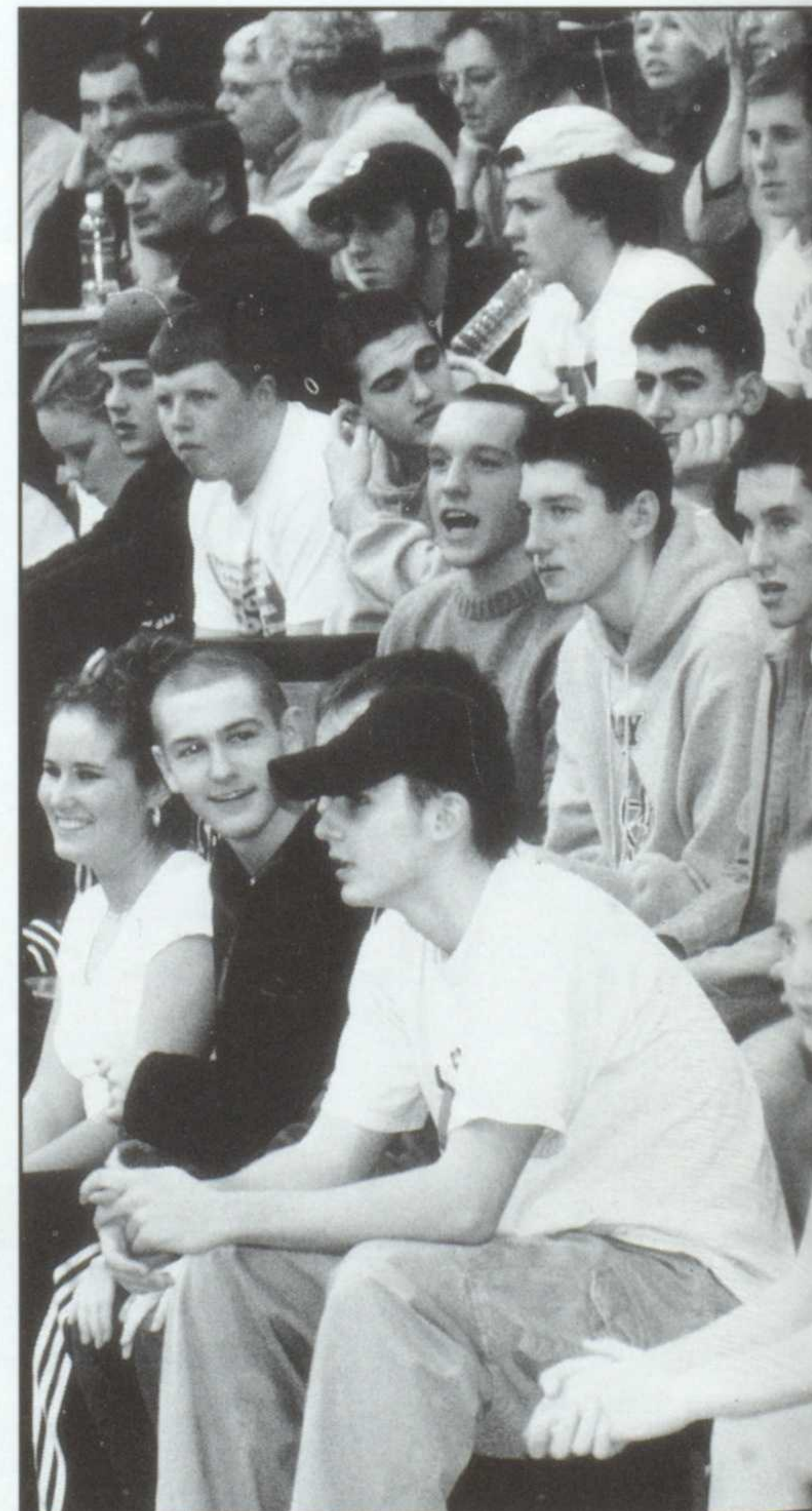

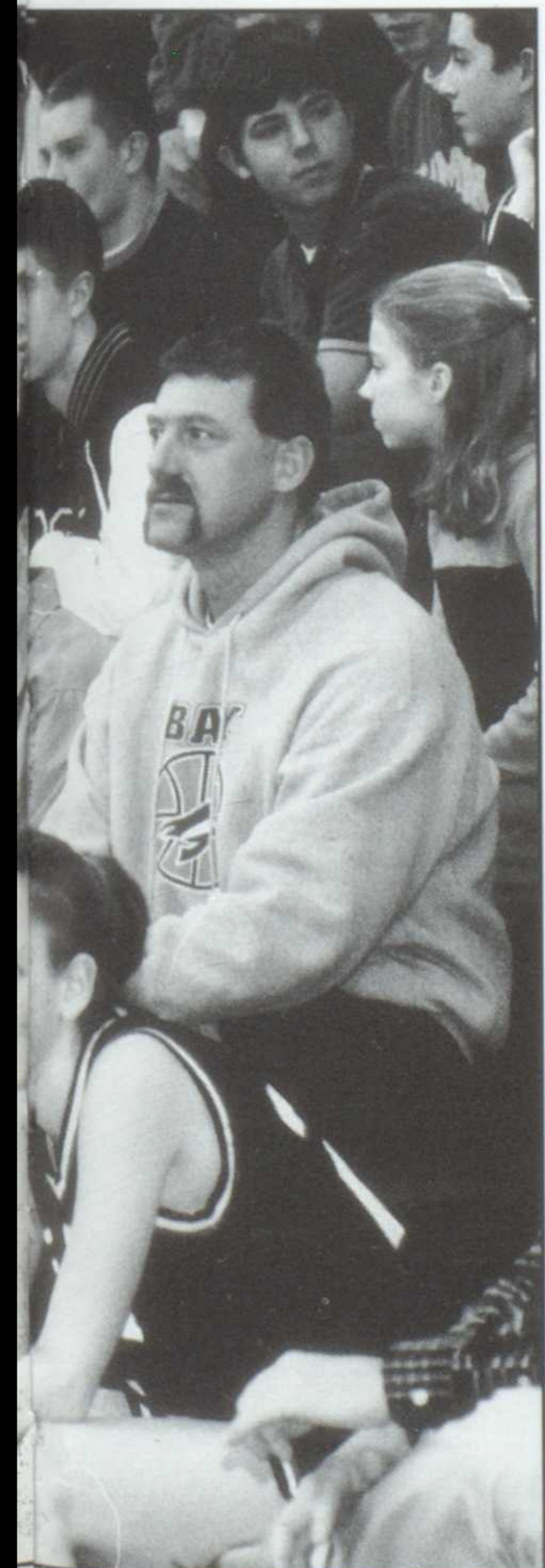

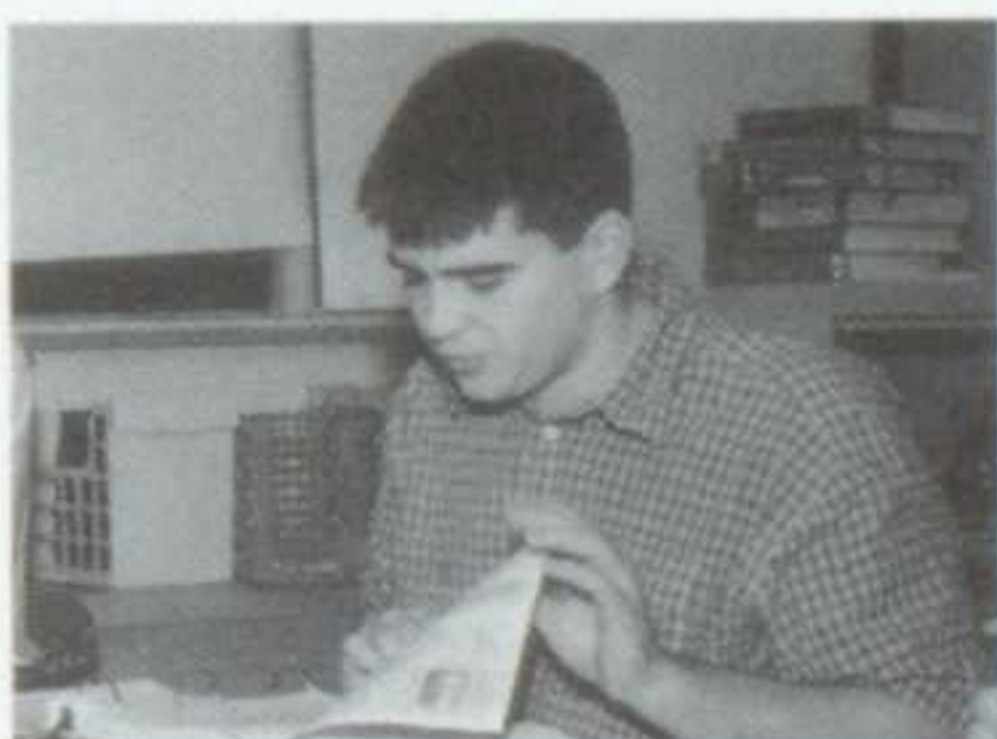

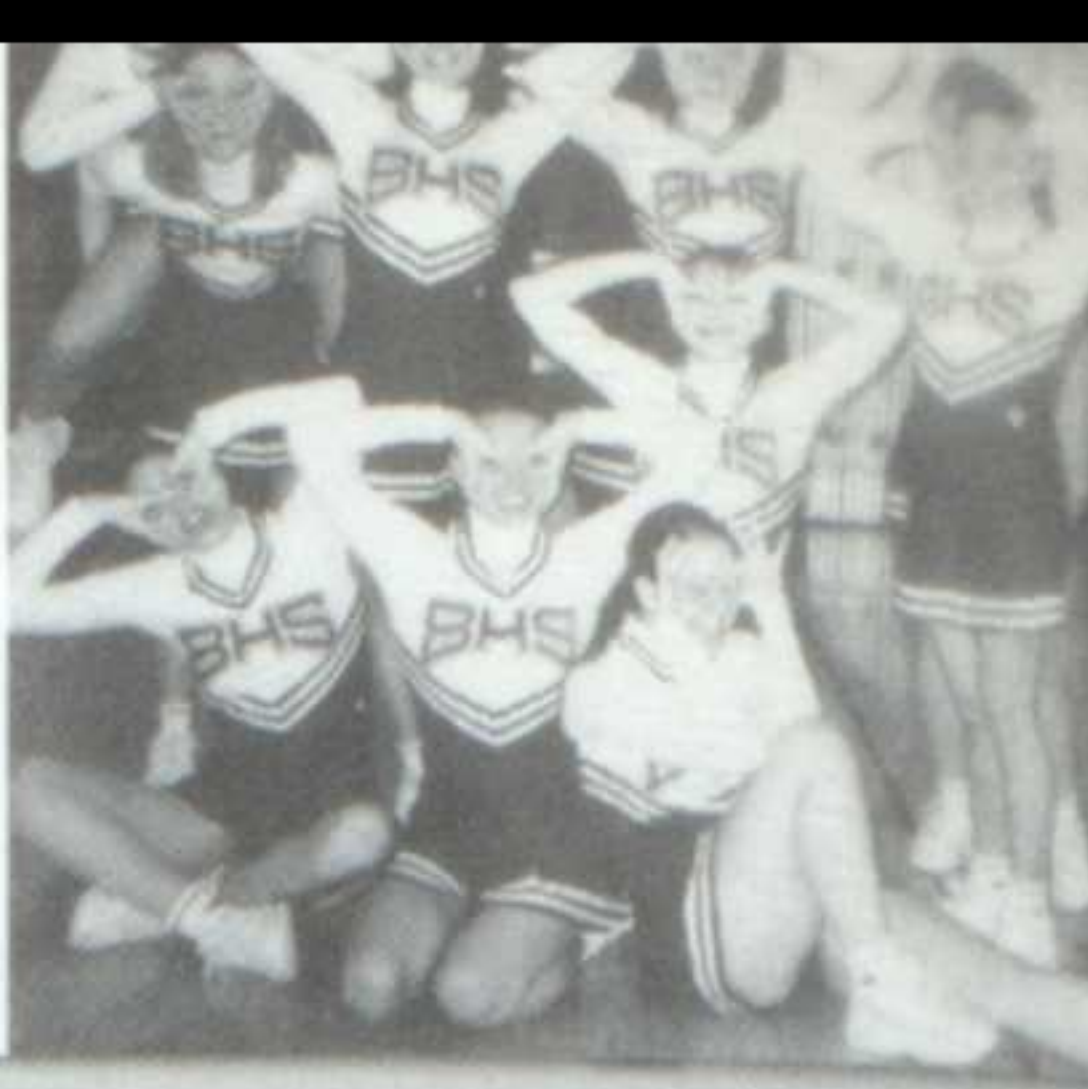

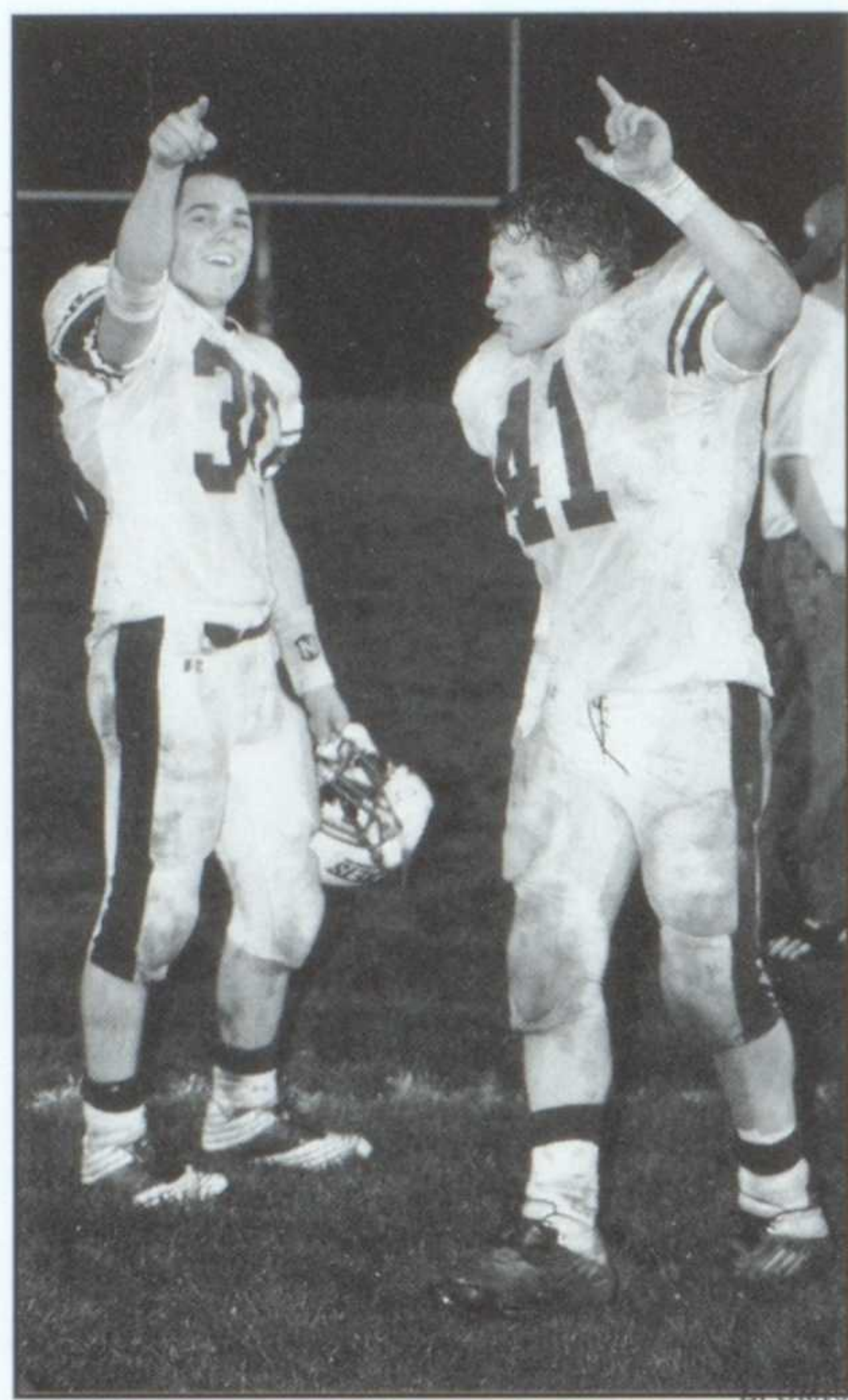
