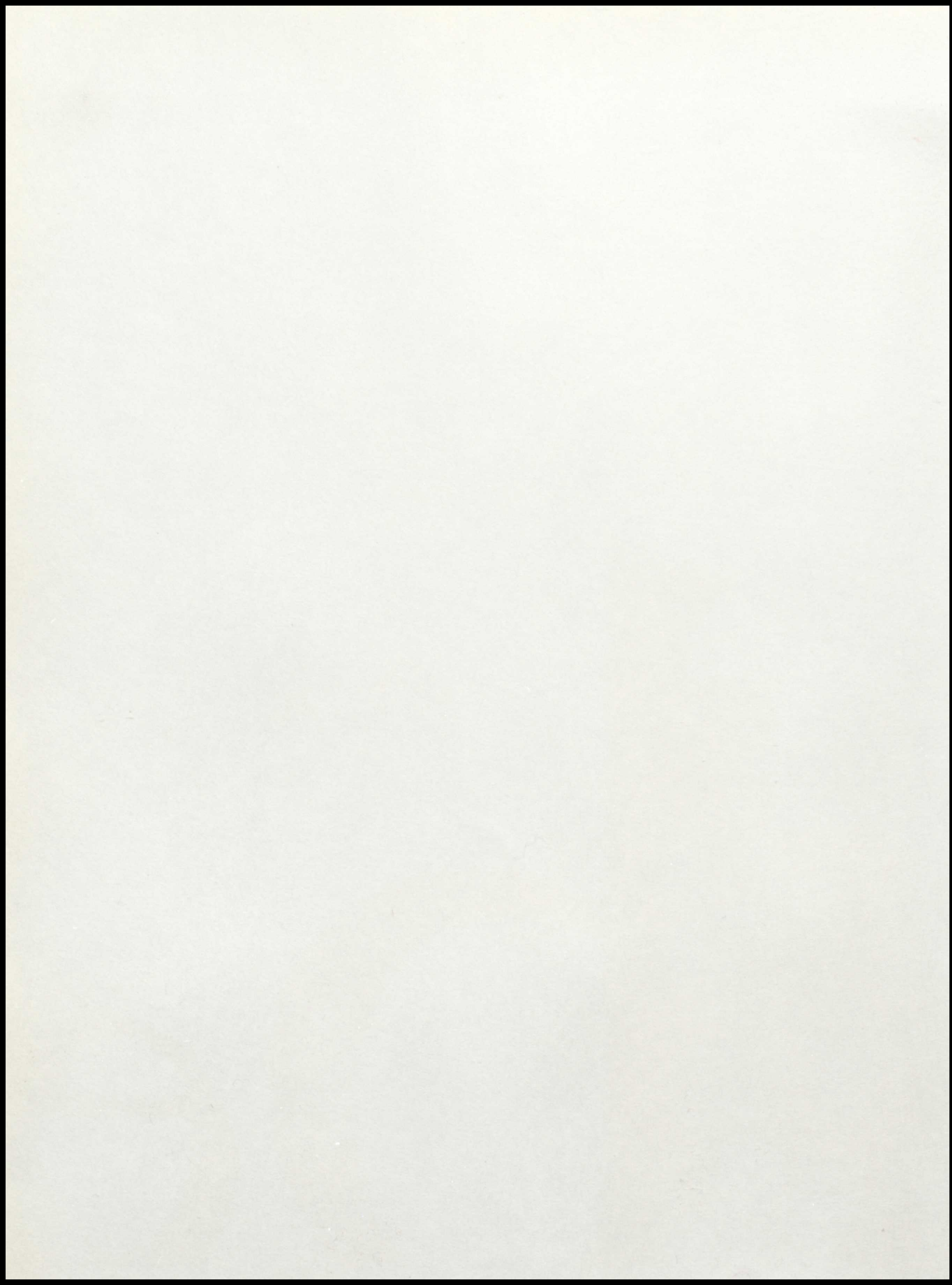

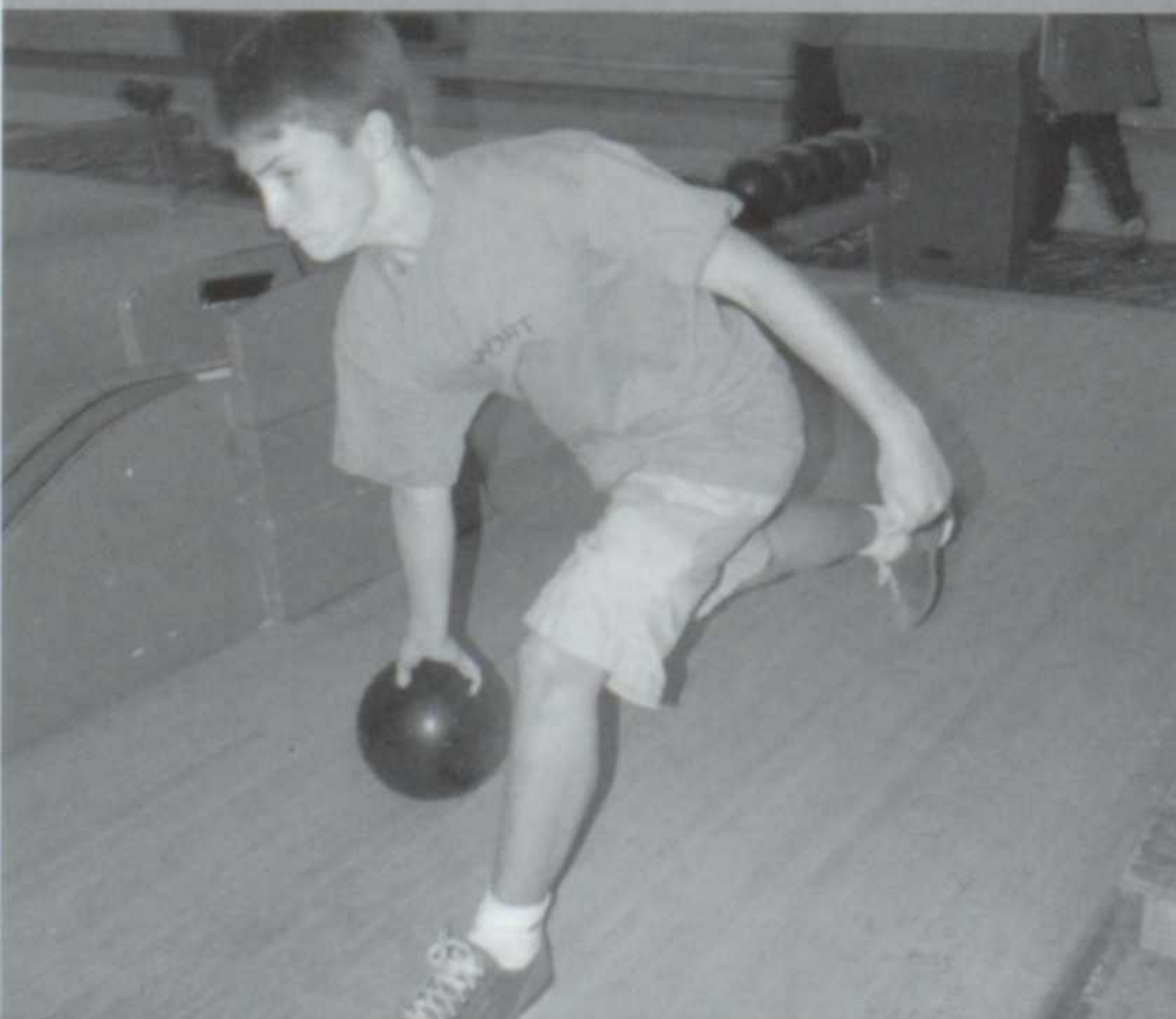

The marching season featured a missing director and Rockette adviser. Because of illness, both Mr. Ed Berry and Mrs. Katie Lufkin missed games at the end of the season. The ensembles, led by Mr. Dan Alt and Ms. Sarah Groff, demonstrated that the show could go on as a result of two months of intense preparation. From the first day of marching band camp on August 2 to the last SWC football game ever on October 29, the band never lost their enthusiasm, spirit, or drive despite setbacks.

Practice began on August 2 from 9:00 a.m. to noon. For two weeks the day was expanded to include afternoons, 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. When school started, 182 students, including 3 field commanders and 44 Rockettes, learned new music and charts for the Friday night games in 3B. Since in-school rehearsals were not enough to put everything together, practices were also held Wednesday (6-7:30) and Thursday (7-9). Wednesday night was used to learn the show; Thursday music checks were held to make sure everyone knew their music. Afterwards, everyone headed out to the varsity field to put the polishing touches on the show under the lights.

On Friday nights, the band performed both pregame and halftime shows. During the game, they entertained the crowd by playing cheers and participating in the cheerleaders' chants. Ending with a bang, the Varsity Concert, held in the auditorium on November 1, 2004, featured every piece the band performed during the season, as well as a few bonus features like *Pirates of the Caribbean*.

Between 7:00 p.m. and 9:30 p.m., cheerleaders and Rockettes were literally "on-stage." They were motivators and entertainers who directed the crowd's focus in a well-coordinated effort.

Starting the last week in July, the Rockettes traveled to Olmsted Falls to attend a preseason camp. Here the Senior Rockettes learned kick routines and hip hop dances. The Junior Rockettes perfected moves needed to control their flags, including an eight-count toss. Beginning in August, both groups joined the marching band to begin practicing half time routines. In order to polish their performances, Practicing Monday evenings alone, as well as Wednesdays and Thursdays with the band, added eight hours to their already crammed schedules. After October 29, however, only three rehearsals were scheduled before the two home basketball games where they performed during half time.

Like the Rockettes, the cheerleaders attended "summer school" at B.G.S.U. to learn cheers, chants, and jumps. Because the squad consisted of nine seniors and one freshman, no cheerleaders attended JV games on Saturday mornings. In addition to their school responsibilities, the cheerleaders were given two chances to perform at Cleveland Browns' stadium, once in August, where they danced in a preseason half time show, as well as a regular season game in November where they cheered on the sidelines. In order to keep up with their busy schedule, practices were held twice a week all year long to learn new cheers and improve the old ones.

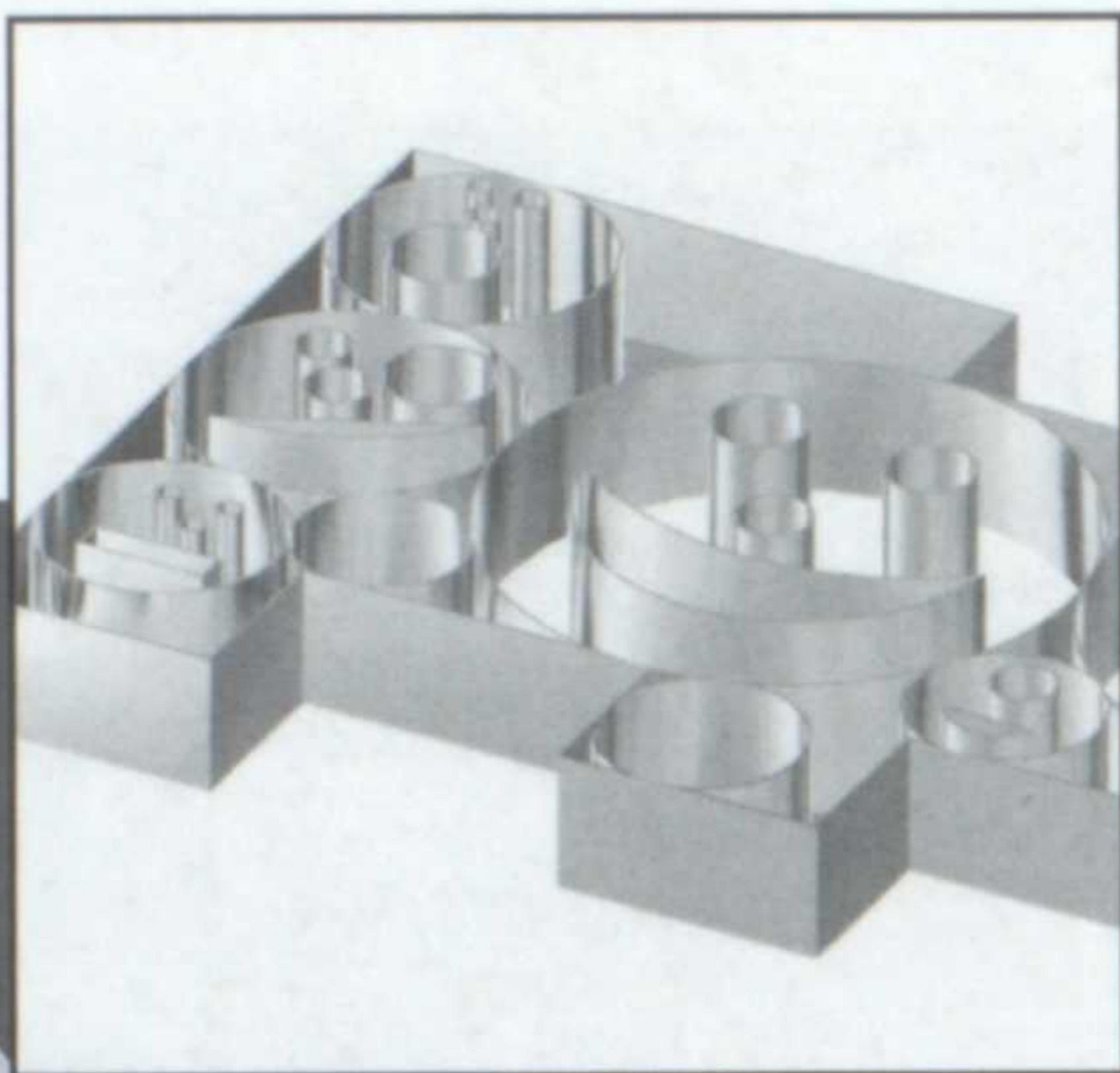

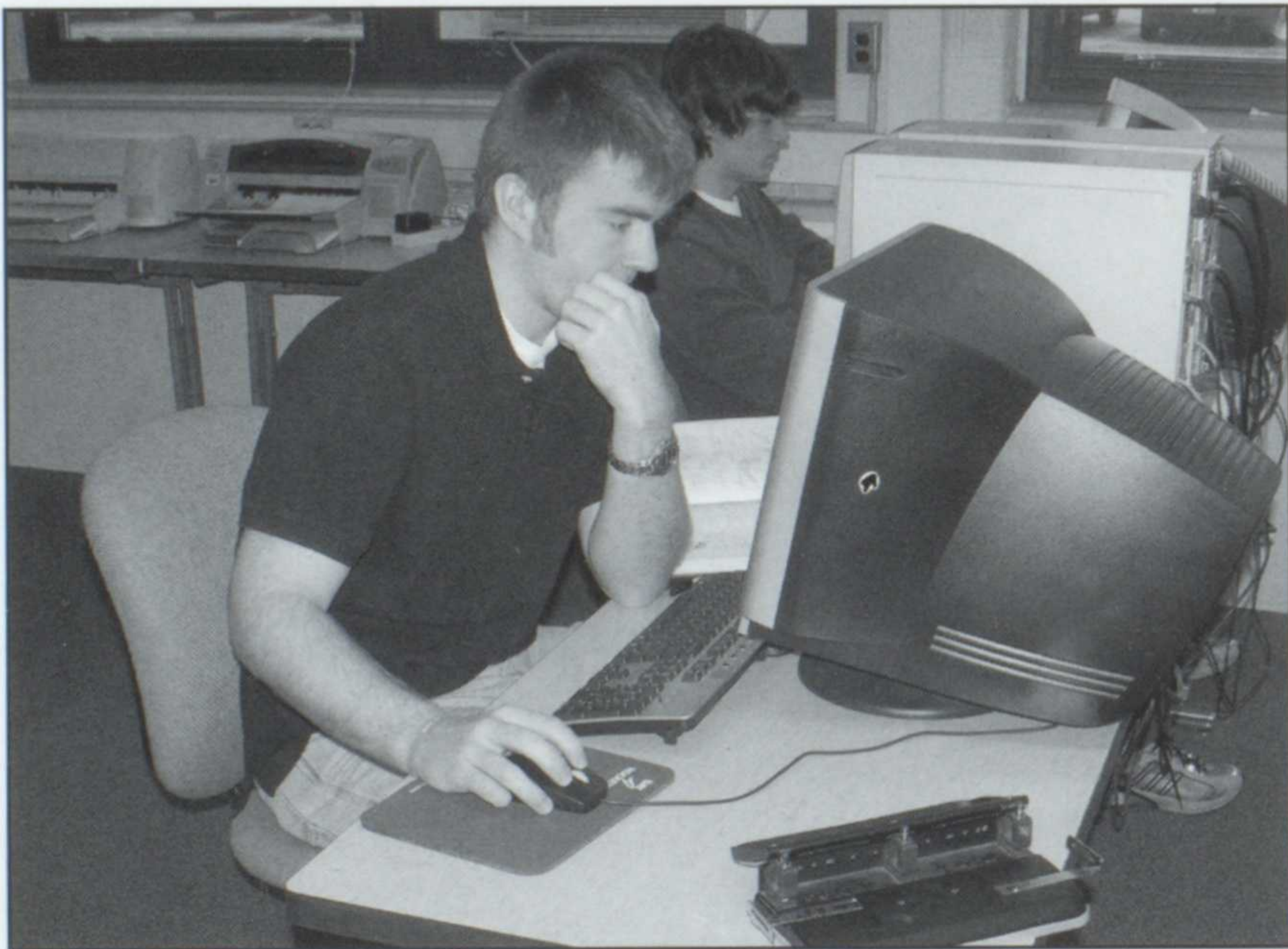

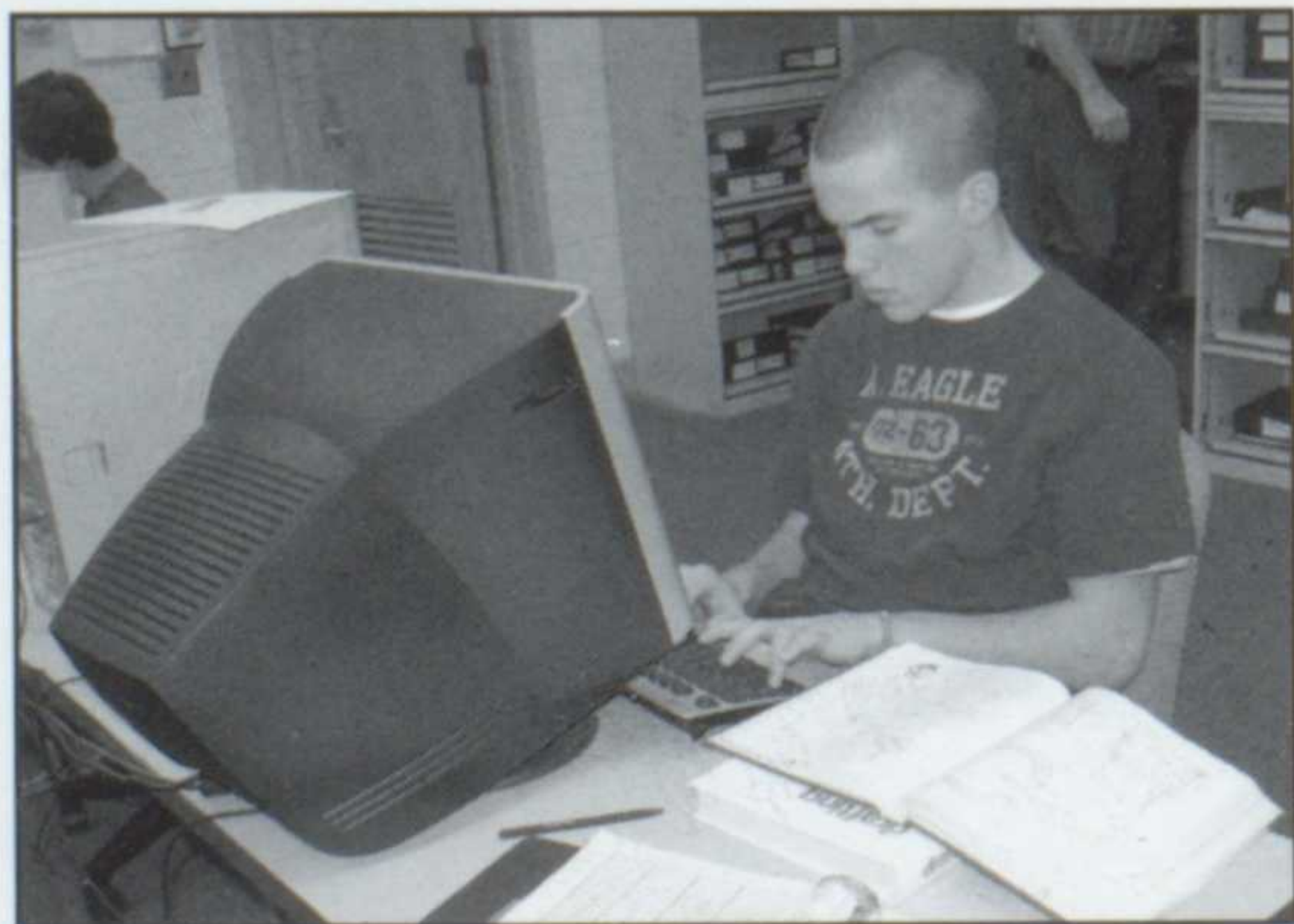

Whether students wanted to explore technology, draw on the computer, or simply to learn how to use a PC more efficiently, there was more than one option available. Without any prerequisite required, *Exploring Technology* was offered to everyone as an elective during both first and second semester. *Exploring Technology* offered a variety of stations, including navigation, digital sound, and the CAD program. Fifteen 20-hour stations and ten 30-hour stations allowed students the time they needed to go in-depth into computer technology.

While the *Exploring Technology* students were putting together computers and tearing them apart, *CAD and Drafting for Industry* students spent their time in front of the computer screen creating 21st century masterpieces. Using the 2004 Computer Aided Drawing program, *Introduction to Engineering Drawing* students learned the basic components of the program to create a foundation for the next level of CAD, *Drafting for Industry*, where dimensional drawings were created.

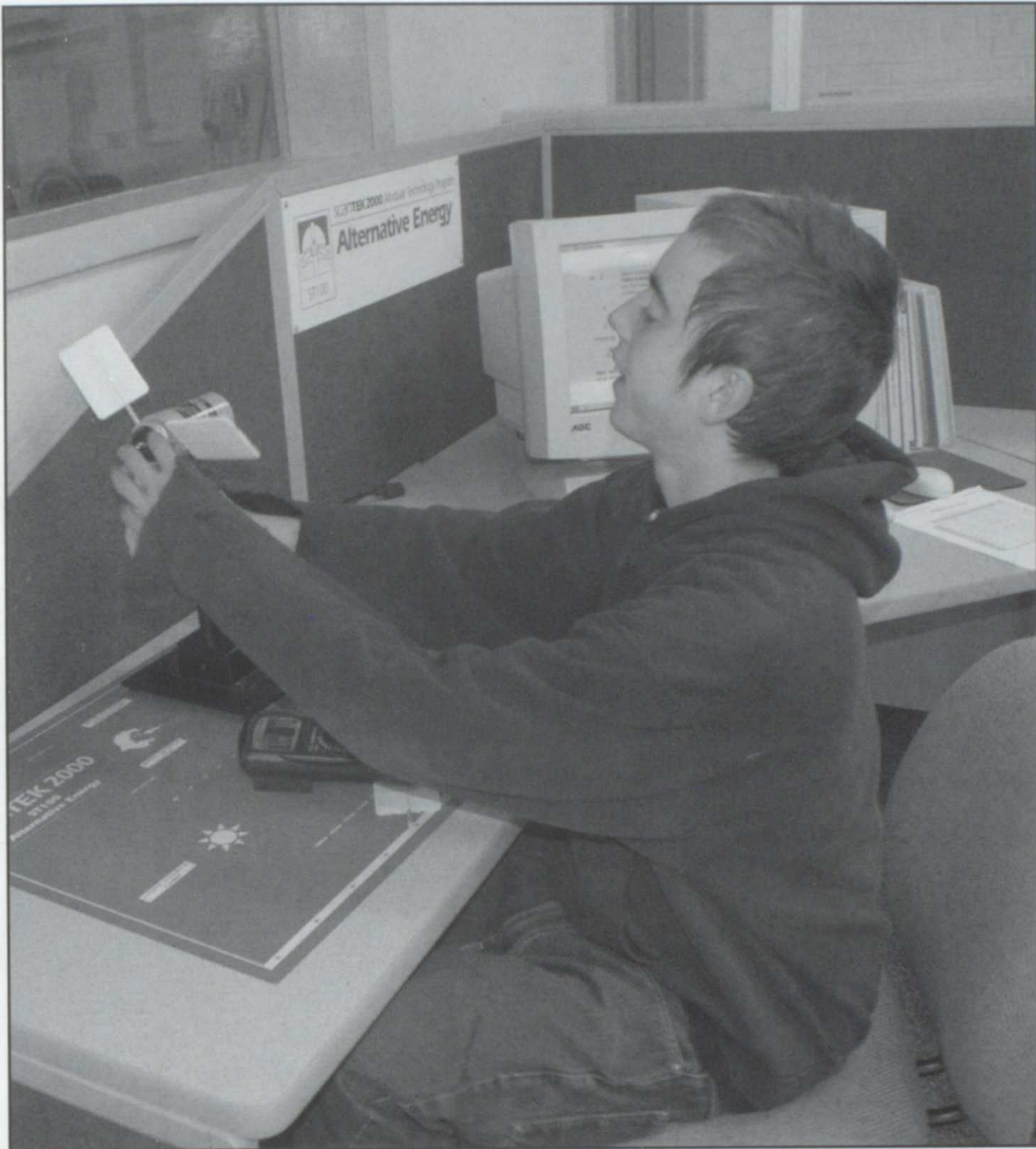
Computers and technology could be difficult to understand, but with the right course, the fine points of hardware and software became clearer. *Basic, Intermediate, and Advanced Computer Applications* attracted students who wanted to fine tune their skills. Learning to use basic programs like PowerPoint, Microsoft Word and the Excel programs taught students important skills needed for college and business.

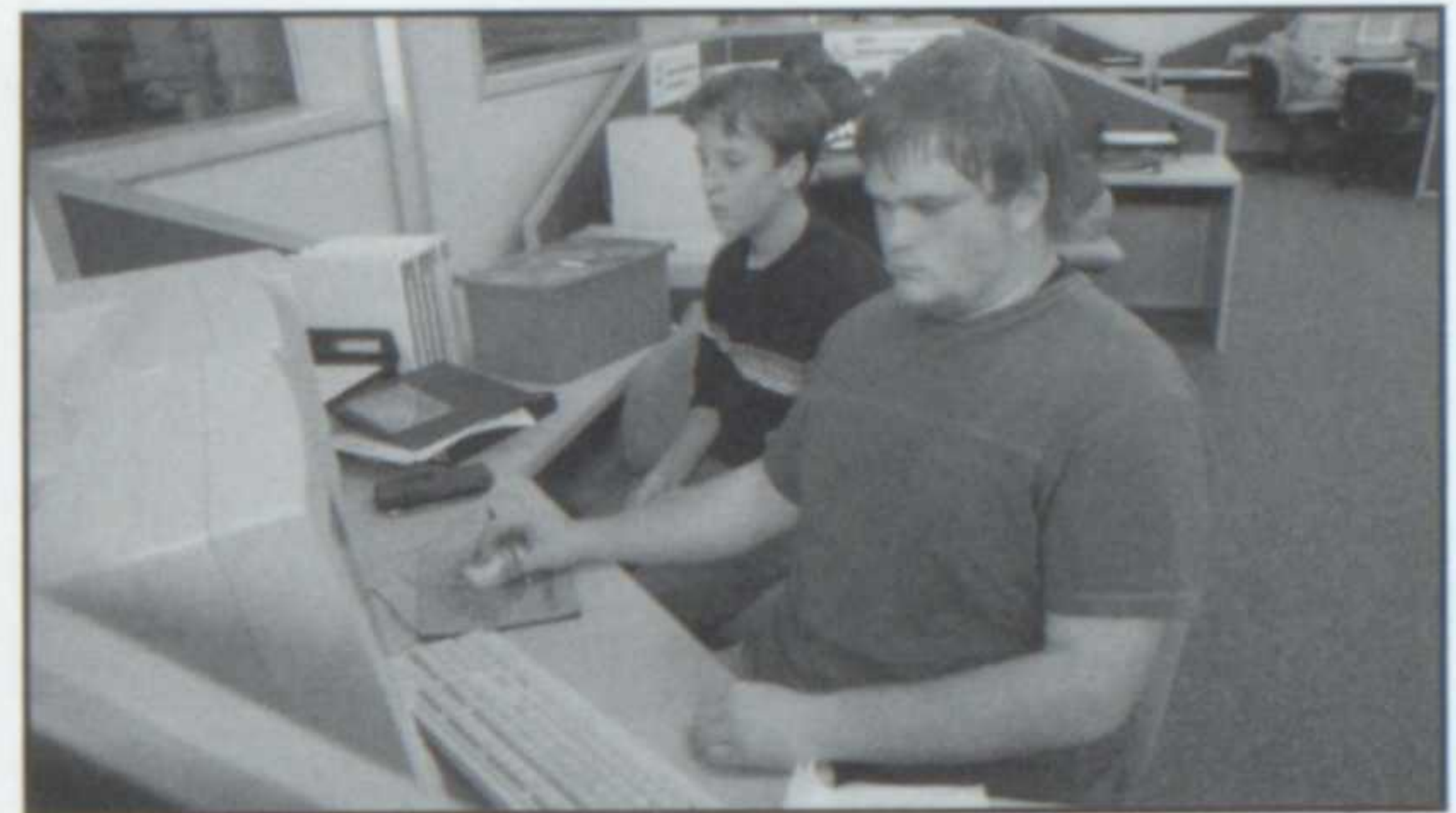

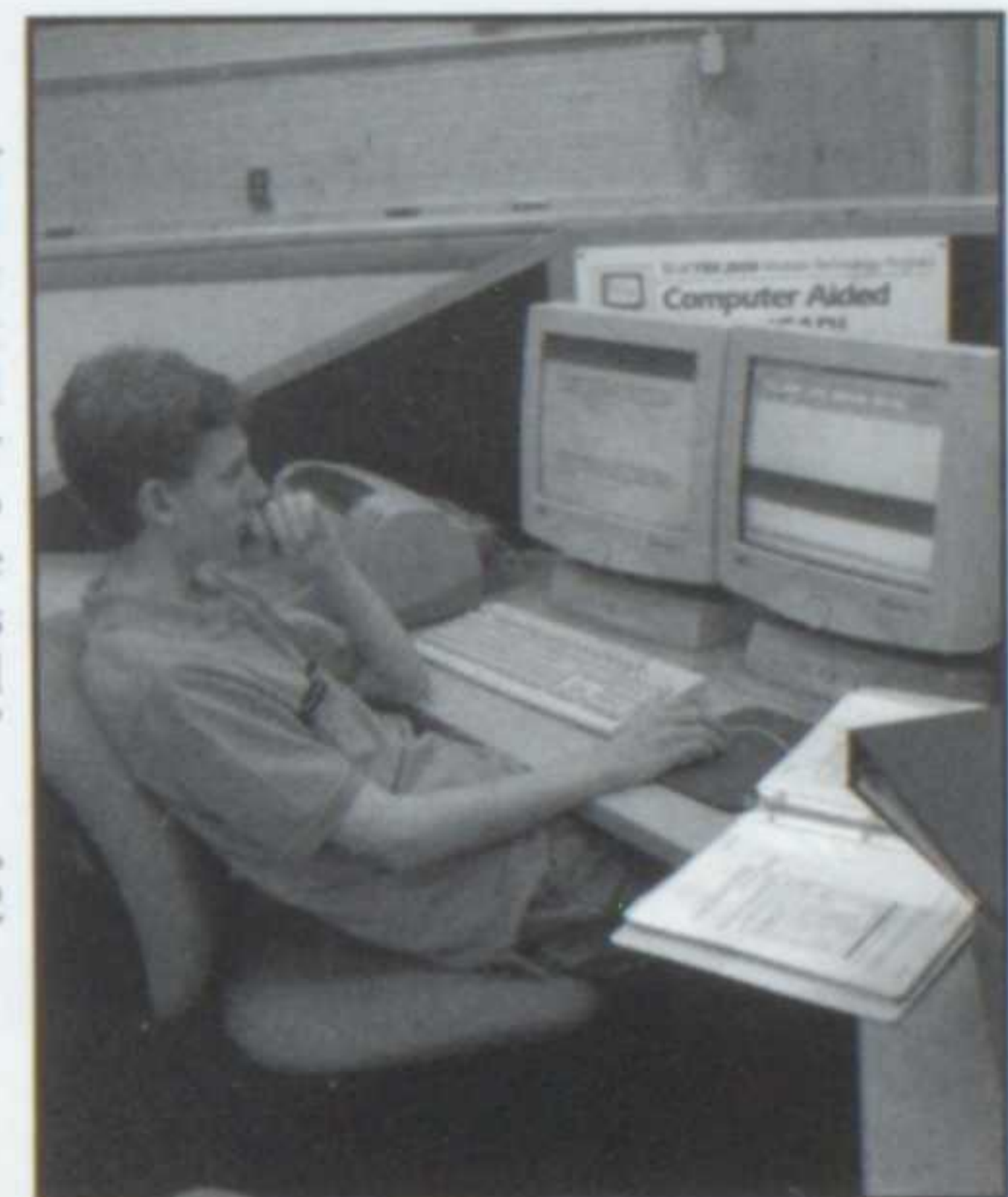

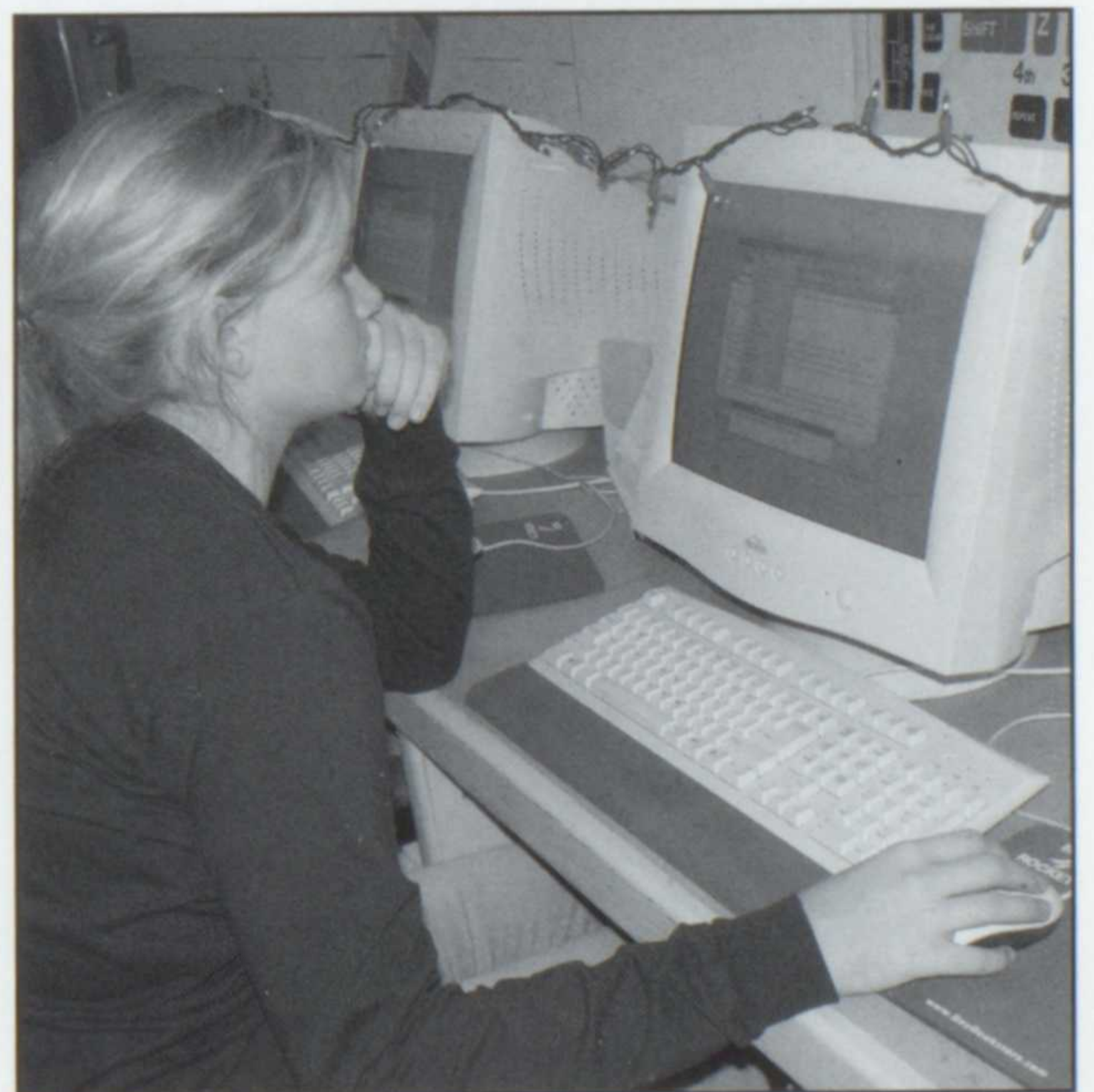

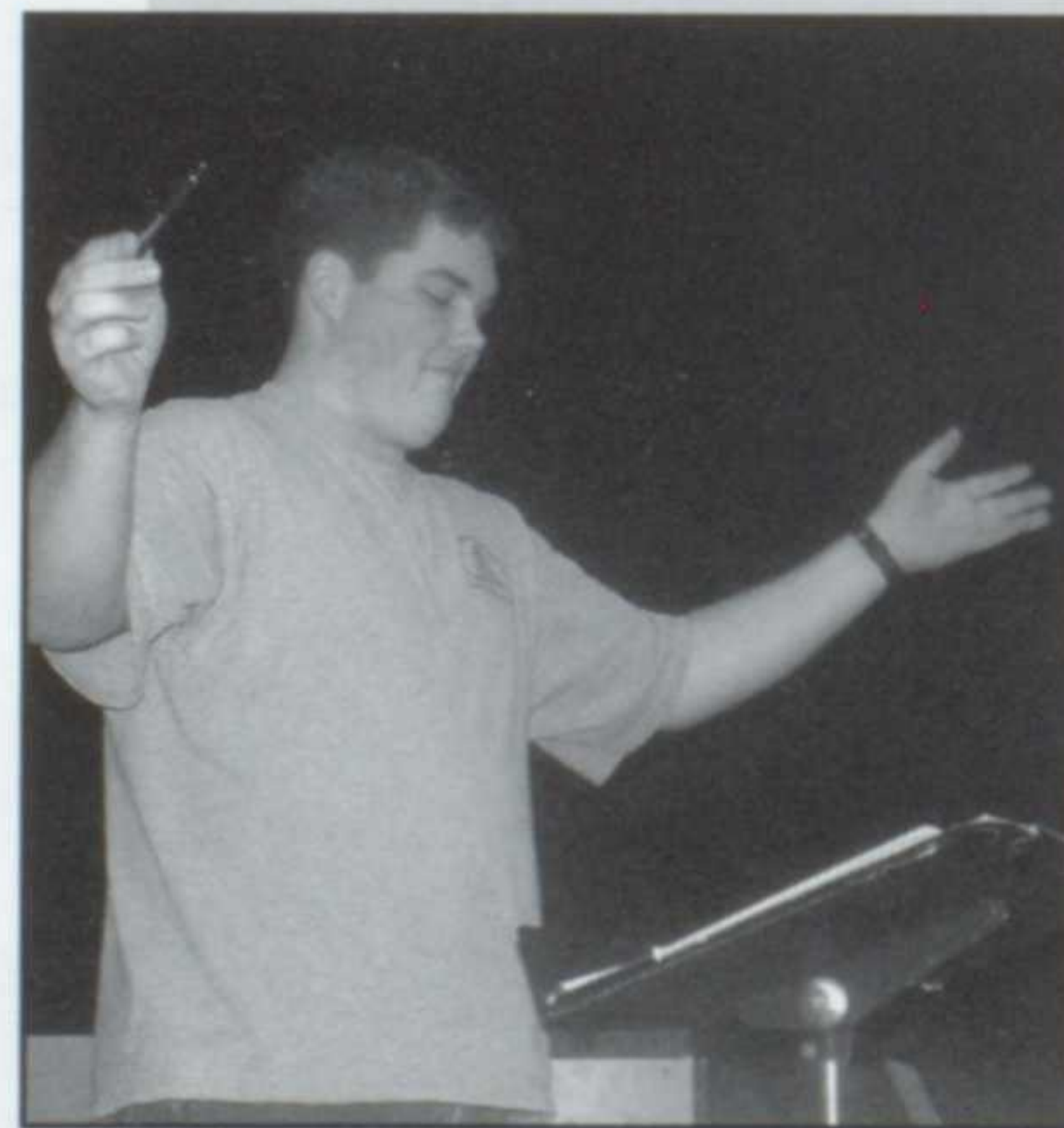

The non-auditioned Concert Band met 3A to perfect the music which they performed at the holiday, and spring concerts, as well as District competition. Symphonic Band's year focused around their January 30th performance at Severance Hall. In order to learn their music, three two-hour evening rehearsals were held in addition to their 3B class time. Following their Severance Hall performance, a decision was made among the musicians in Symphonic Band to determine whether they would conquer Class AA literature, or stay with Class A. By taking a class vote, it was clear that a very small majority, only a 4 vote difference, wanted to go Class AA.

Another new twist was placed on the instrumentalist following their marching band season. Unlike past years, playing for the home basketball games was now a requirement for everyone. A minimum of three games per person created the largest pep band the Friday night crowds had ever seen.

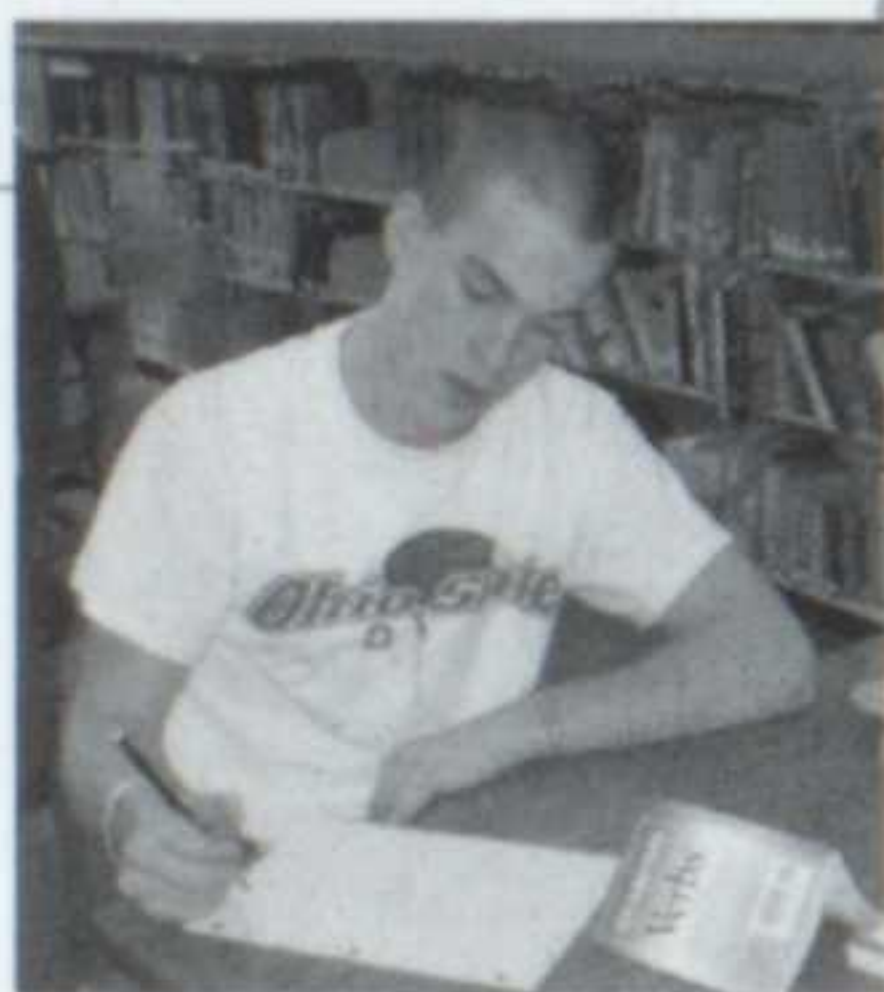

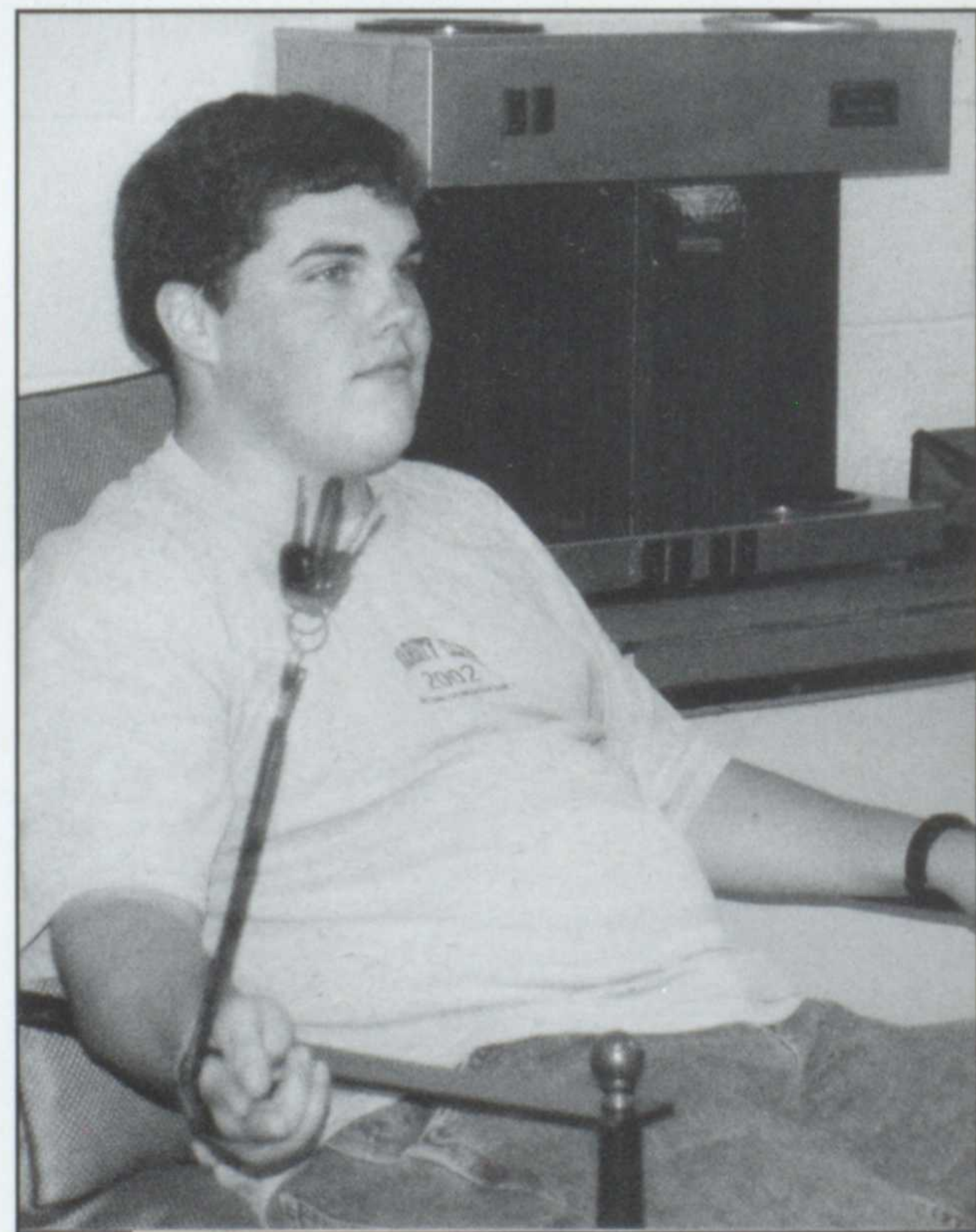

Language: dialect, voice, native tongue, vocabulary, lingo, expression, style, and poetry. However you say it, language is a way to communicate. Language is also the gateway into a culture. Where would we be without our culture? Our voices? Our language? Foreign language was not just a class to take for college; it was a way to learn and to understand people and cultures all over the world. First year classes introduced students to the language and cultures of Spanish and French-speaking countries. By the second year, students became immersed in verb tenses and grammatical structures with some emphasis on short readings. Third and fourth level classes studied more complex grammatical structures and polished pronunciation. French classes read classics such as *The Little Prince* (French 4) and *Candide* (French 5/A.P. French). Upper level French students also saw movies such as *Jean de Florette*, *Triplets of Belleville* and *Indochine* and wrote essays about them. Spanish 5/A.P. saw *Abuelo* based on a book by Benito Perez Galdos, and read and discussed selected passages from it.

If students wanted more language, more culture, and more involvement, they joined French Club, Spanish Club or Culture Club. "Even though I take Spanish, I enjoy being in French Club; we had a great time at *Phantom of the Opera*," freshman Kayla McDonald said.



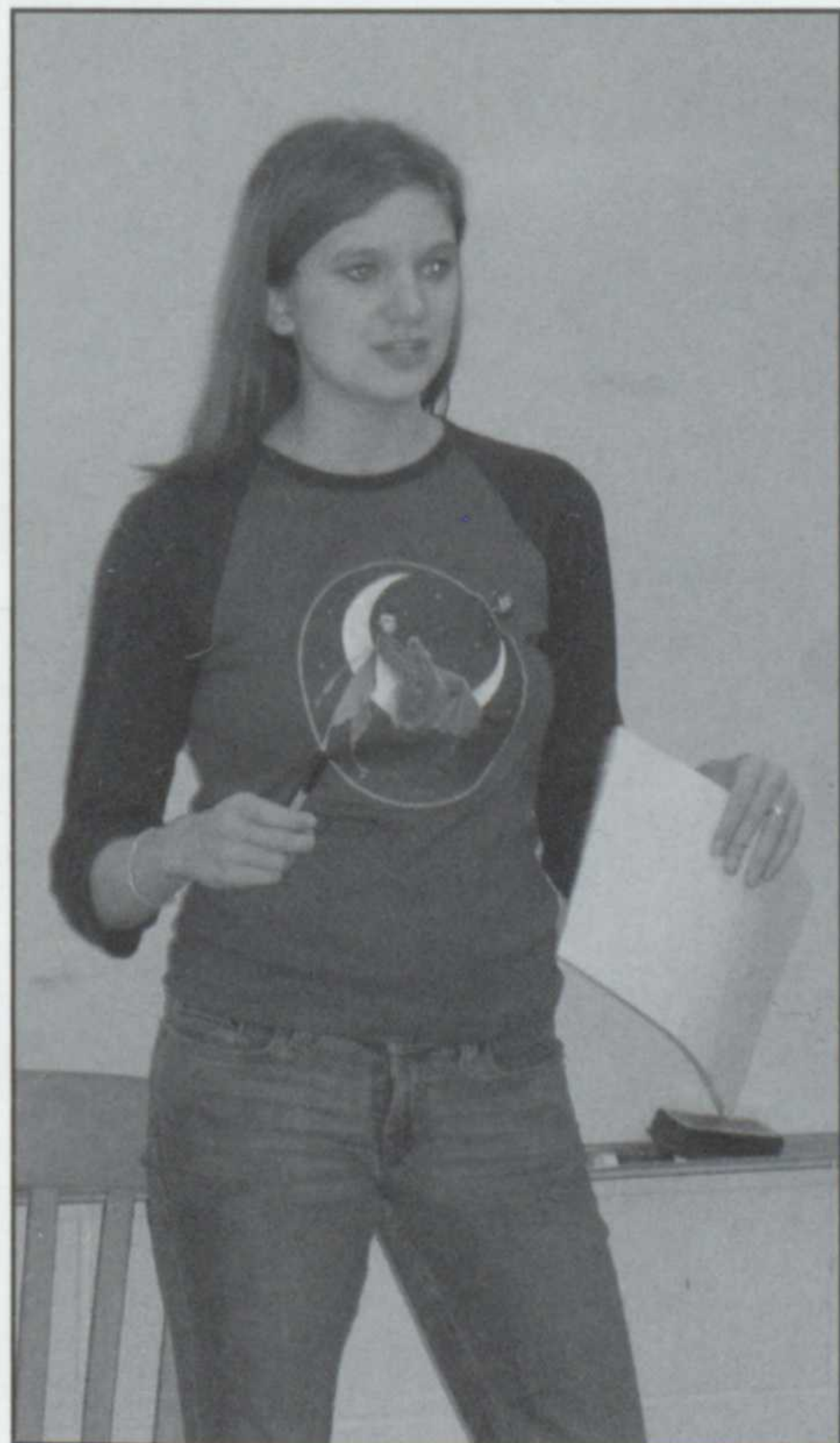
- The Culture Club sponsored culture activities such as Tolerance Week.

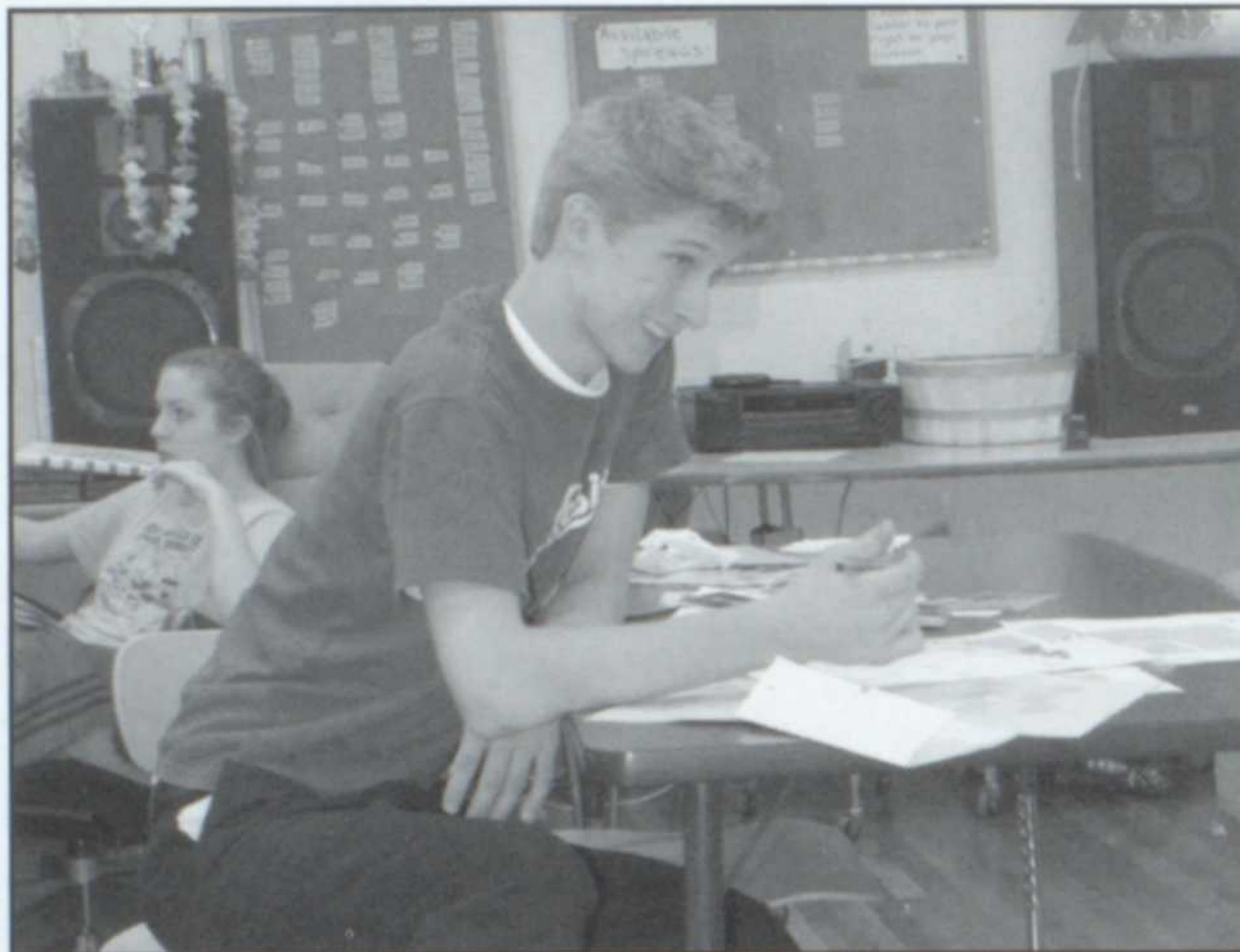

Fed up with prior years of inefficiency, The Bay Window revolutionized its organization, splitting up the editorial positions between four people, with one chief editor. Drawing more participants than last year, the staff numbers hovered around 10 people. After the first issue, Mark Boyd, the chief editor, left because of personal issues. The paper continued regardless, publishing a few issues in print and on-line. During the election season, politically charged editorials littered its pages, countered by rebuttals and alternate viewpoints.

The 2004 yearbook, *So Anyway*, earned the yearbook's 26th All-American, and 25th Gold Medalist. In addition, it was named a Gold Crown finalist and a Pacemaker finalist. Michelle Baukrecht and Ms. Coolidge traveled to New York where they received the Crown Award at Columbia University on March 18, 2005. Building off last year's success, yearbook grew to 30 staff members with five photographers. Some attended a fall workshop at the beginning of the year where Josiens Senior Marketing Director Gary Lundgren and sales representative Judy Allen helped staffers create plans for *Be Yourself*. Mrs. Kathy Hitesman, the returning photography adviser, served as quality control, pushing staffers to take better and better pictures.

Sadly, because of the resignation of the adviser, the Literary Magazine had difficulty getting off the ground. Ms. Bishop stepped in as adviser in February to try to salvage the year.

Some teenagers got involved in younger kids lives by baby-sitting, but others helped and influenced young children in a different way. HUDDLE and Elementary Aides were a popular activity and a class. For the most part, freshman, sophomores, and juniors were confined inside the walls of the high school. Seniors, on the other hand, got the option of taking part in Elementary Aide. As teacher aides, they got to spend a full block at Glenview, Normandy, Westerly, or Bay Middle School. The seniors graded papers, played games, read stories and helped the children with activities. After being in Elementary Aide, several seniors were inspired to go into education after college.

Another program that provided students with contact with younger kids was *Helping Us Develop Dedication Leadership Enthusiasm* (HUDDLE). To be apart of HUDDLE, students had to be a sophomore, junior, or senior. They also had to fill out an application and go through an interview with Mr. Cahoon. Once a month during QRP, the HUDDLE participants went to a 4th or 6th grade class and taught lessons about positive choices in the areas of hygiene, manners, peer pressure, etc. About 52 students participated in HUDDLE. Groups of two or three were formed at the beginning of the year and then these groups were assigned a class to work with throughout the year. Although HUDDLE and Elementary Aide were two different activities, students saw both as opportunities to be role models for younger kids.

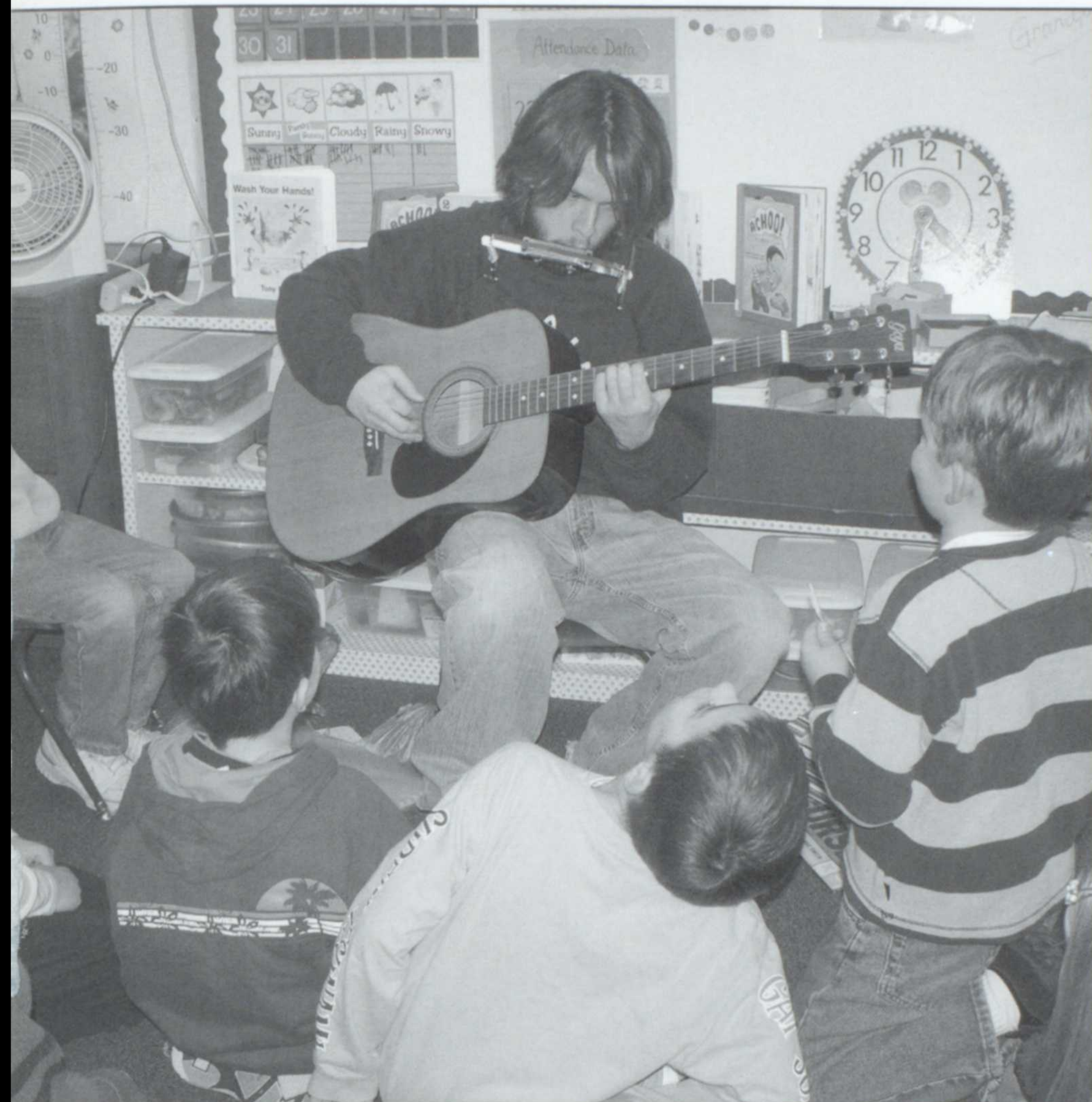

From August 26 to Nov. 2, the history department buzzed with talk of the presidential campaign, senior projects, and mock elections. The seniors in *AP Government* kept up to date with weekly current event assignments while still focusing on the science of politics. Through in-depth studies of the workings of government, students strove to answer the question that the course was based on: "Who governs and to what extent?" AP students were held to a standard of excellence by the stipulation that if they did not achieve a C+ or better in the first quarter of the class, they would have to complete the class while also doing a Senior Project, which is usually exclusive to the Senior Government class. In addition to doing a Senior Project relating a topic of particular interest to the student to government, Senior Government students also participated in a mock election which ran a candidate from each of the two classes against each other to better understand the workings of government.

The most extensive study of history covered the Renaissance to modern times in the sophomore and senior *AP European History* class. Juniors studied American literature a.k.a. *Honors American Literary Experience* combined with *AP United States History*. Juniors not in APUSH chose from specified classes ranging from *Comparative Religions* to *Ancient Civilizations* Freshman in *Human History II* studied world history up to the roaring twenties, and sophomores in *Human History III* picked up where they left off and studied up to the present.

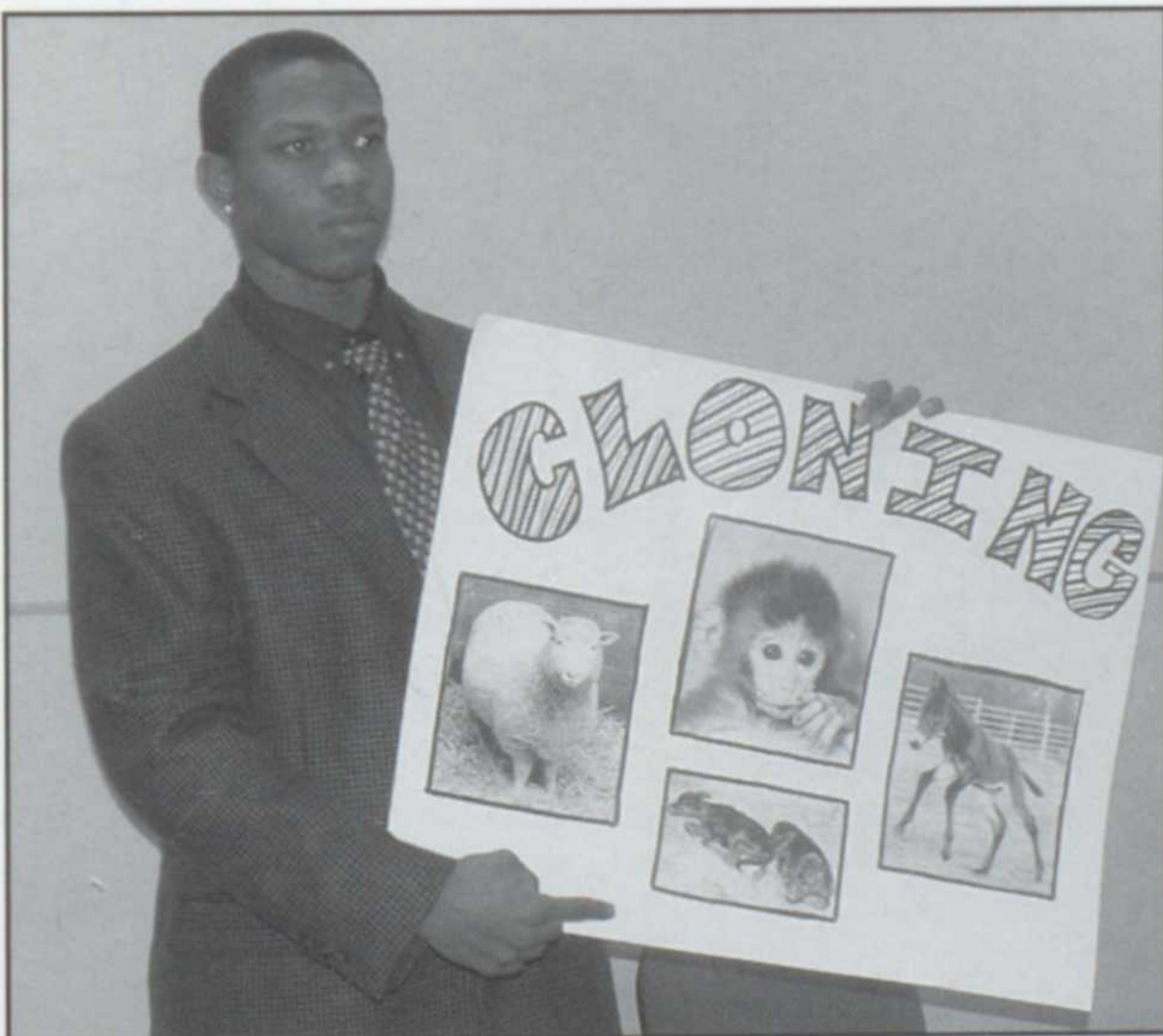

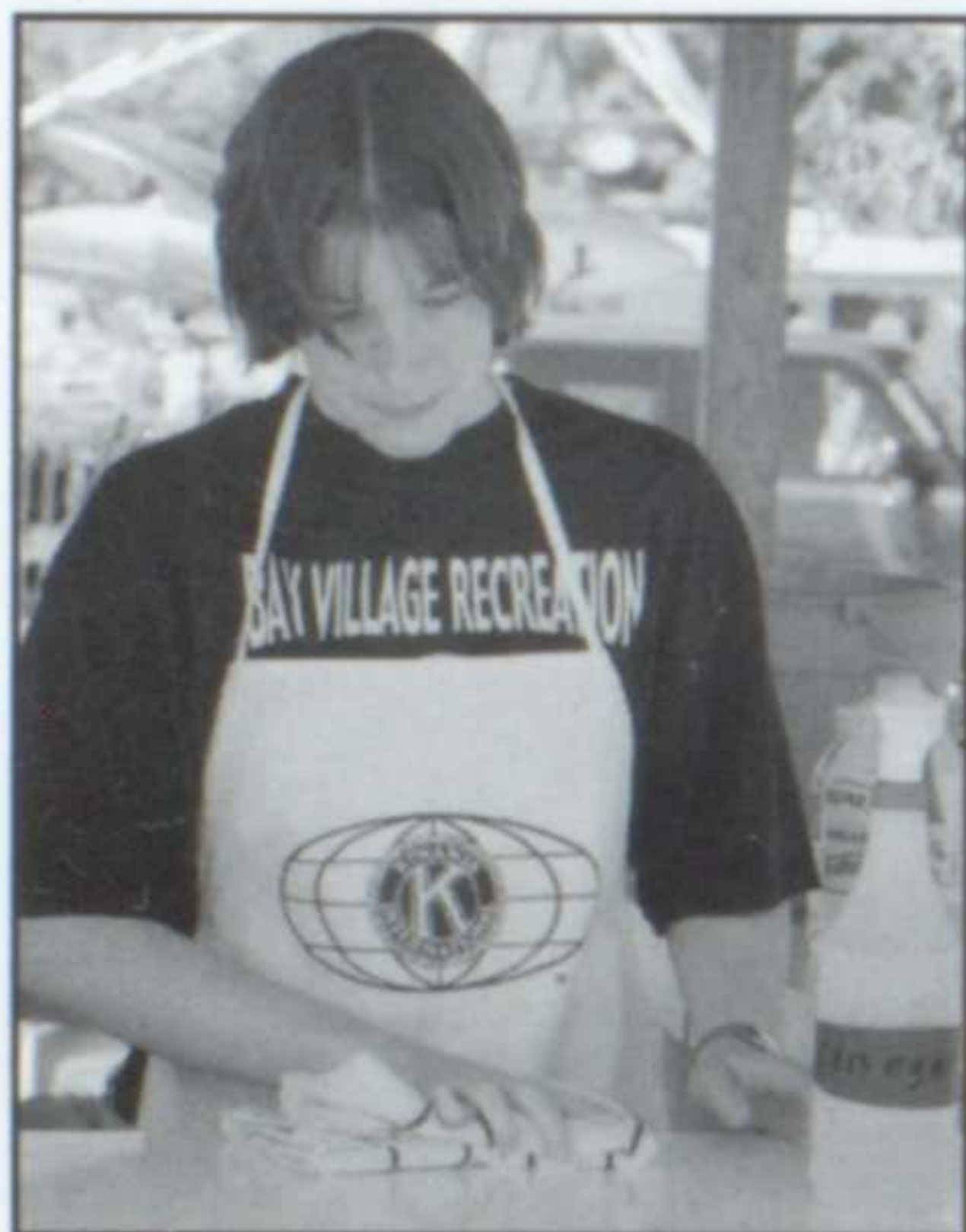

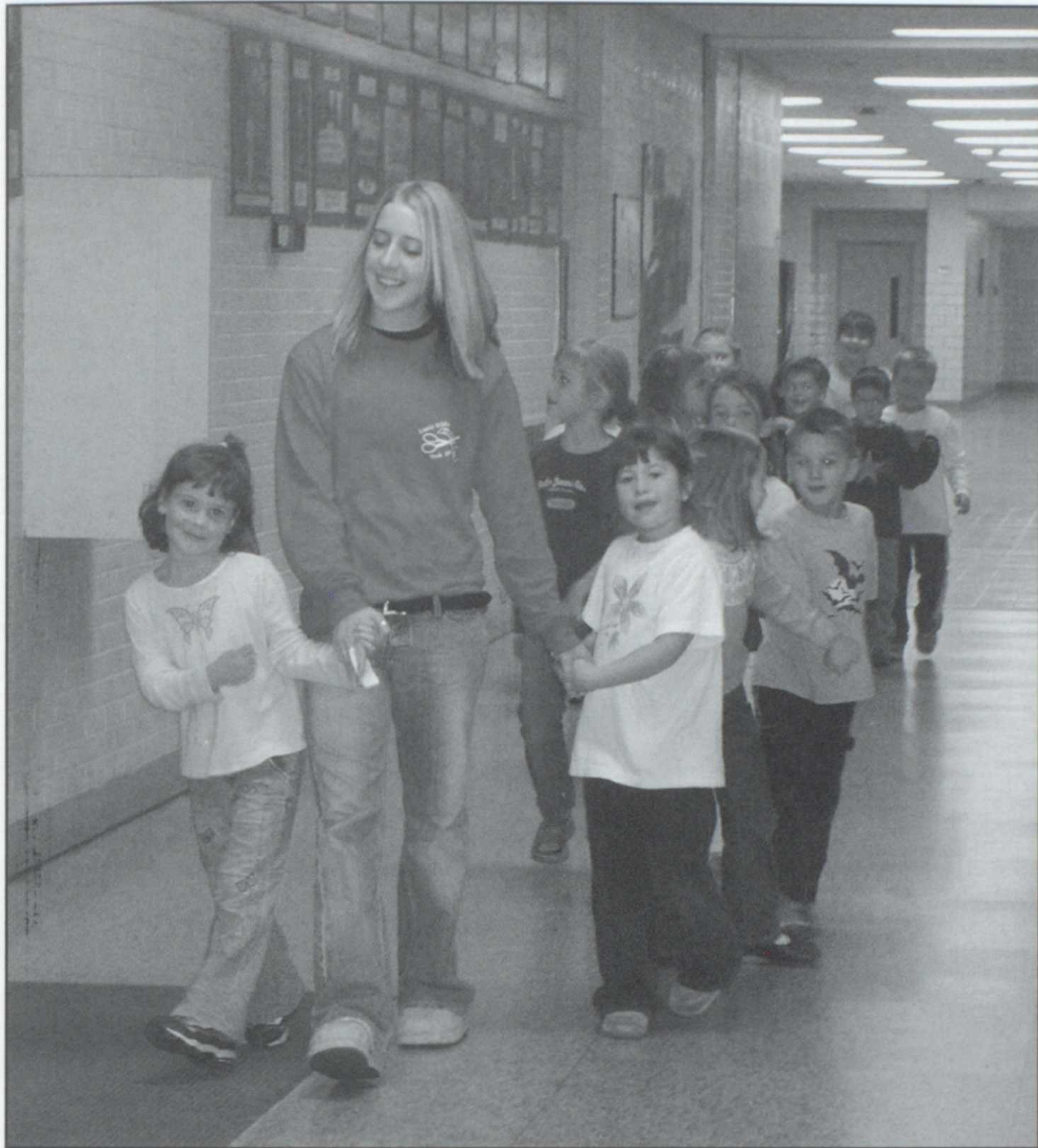

Meeting every first Tuesday of the month at 7:15 in the school library, *Students Against Destructive Decisions*, went out into the day hoping to make a difference in someone's life. 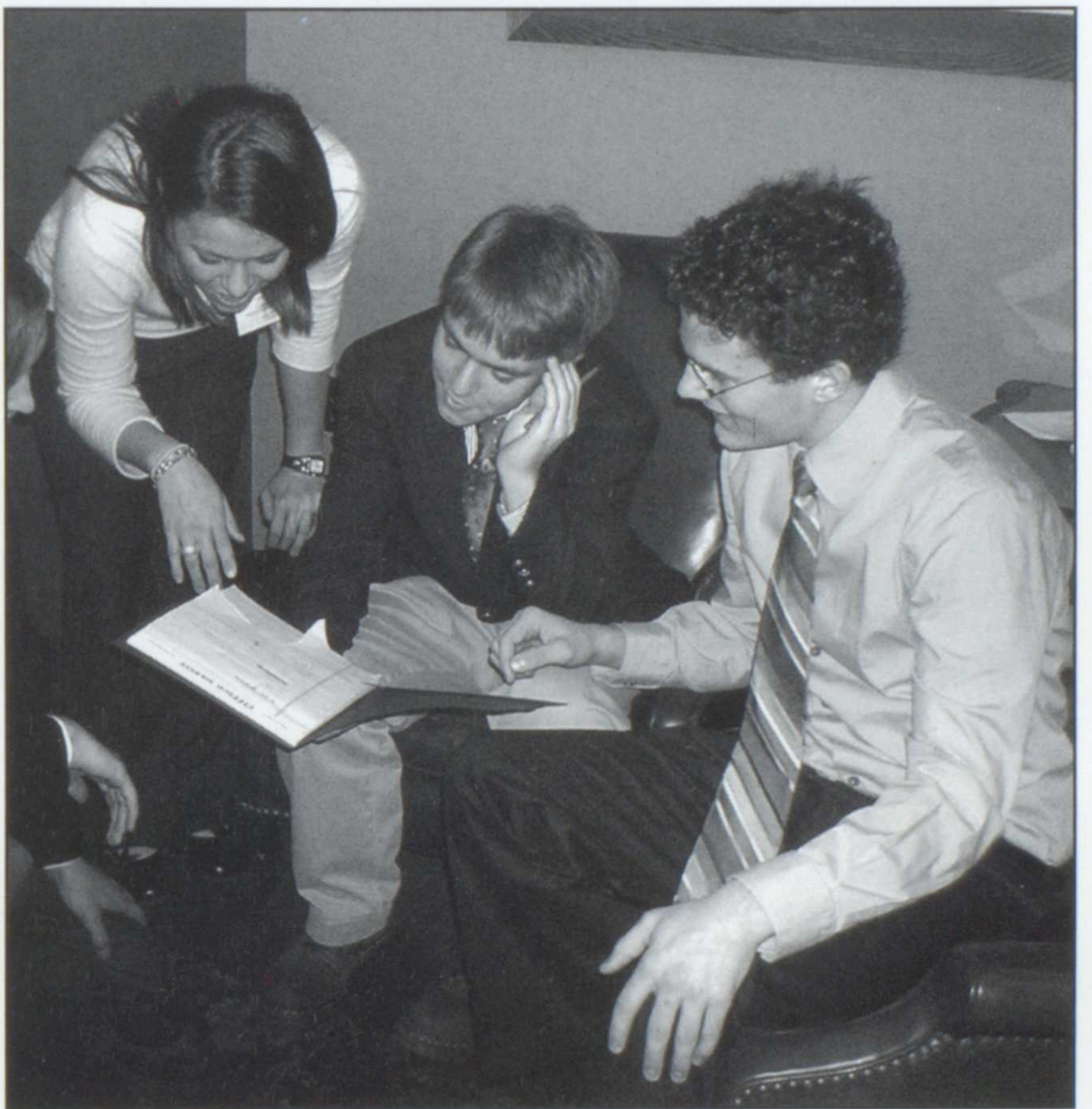

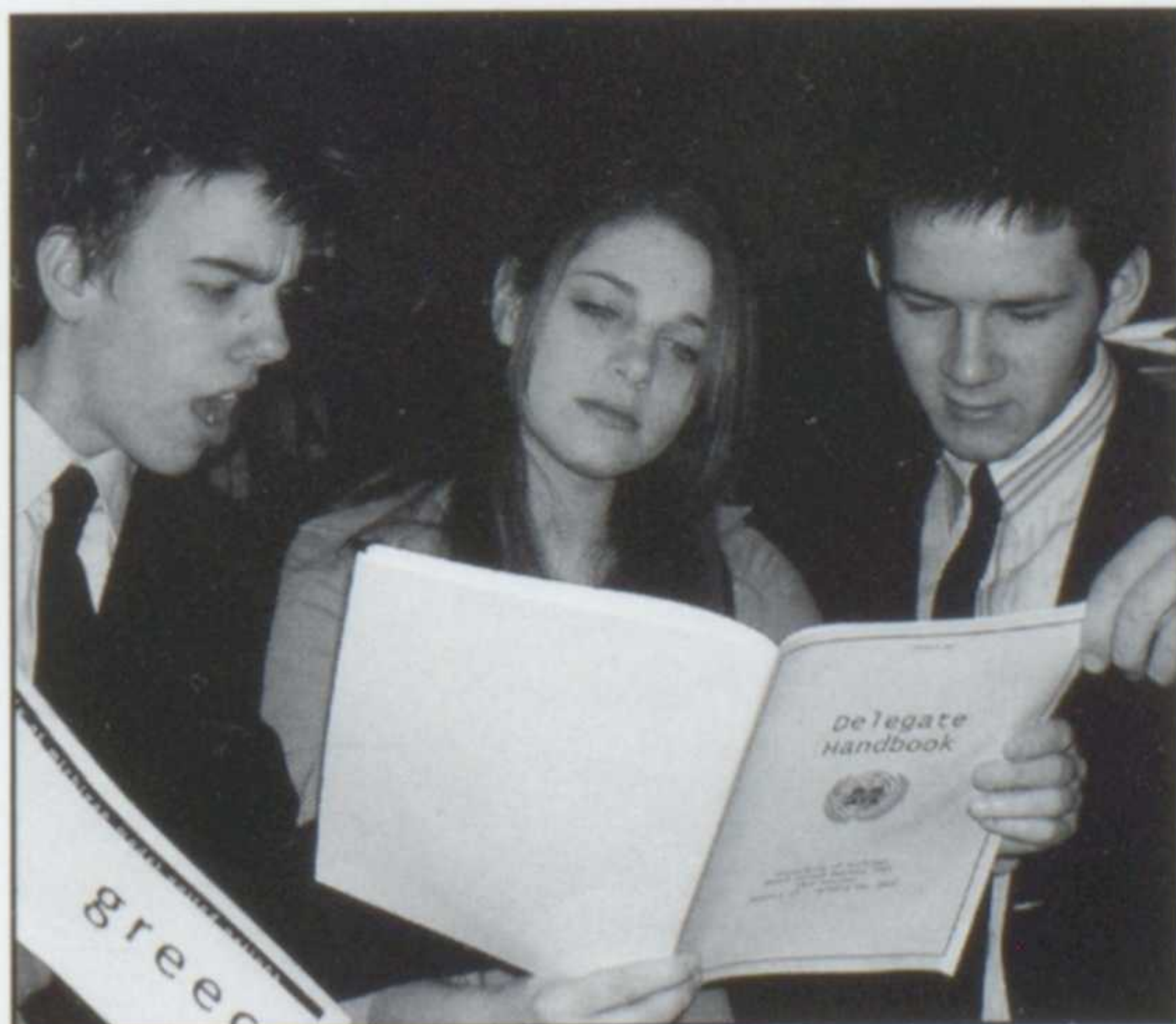

Getting into National Honor Society wasn't as easy as just maintaining a high GPA. Applicants first had to be invited. After completing a lengthy application, students solicited recommendations, then faced a review committee chaired by teachers. 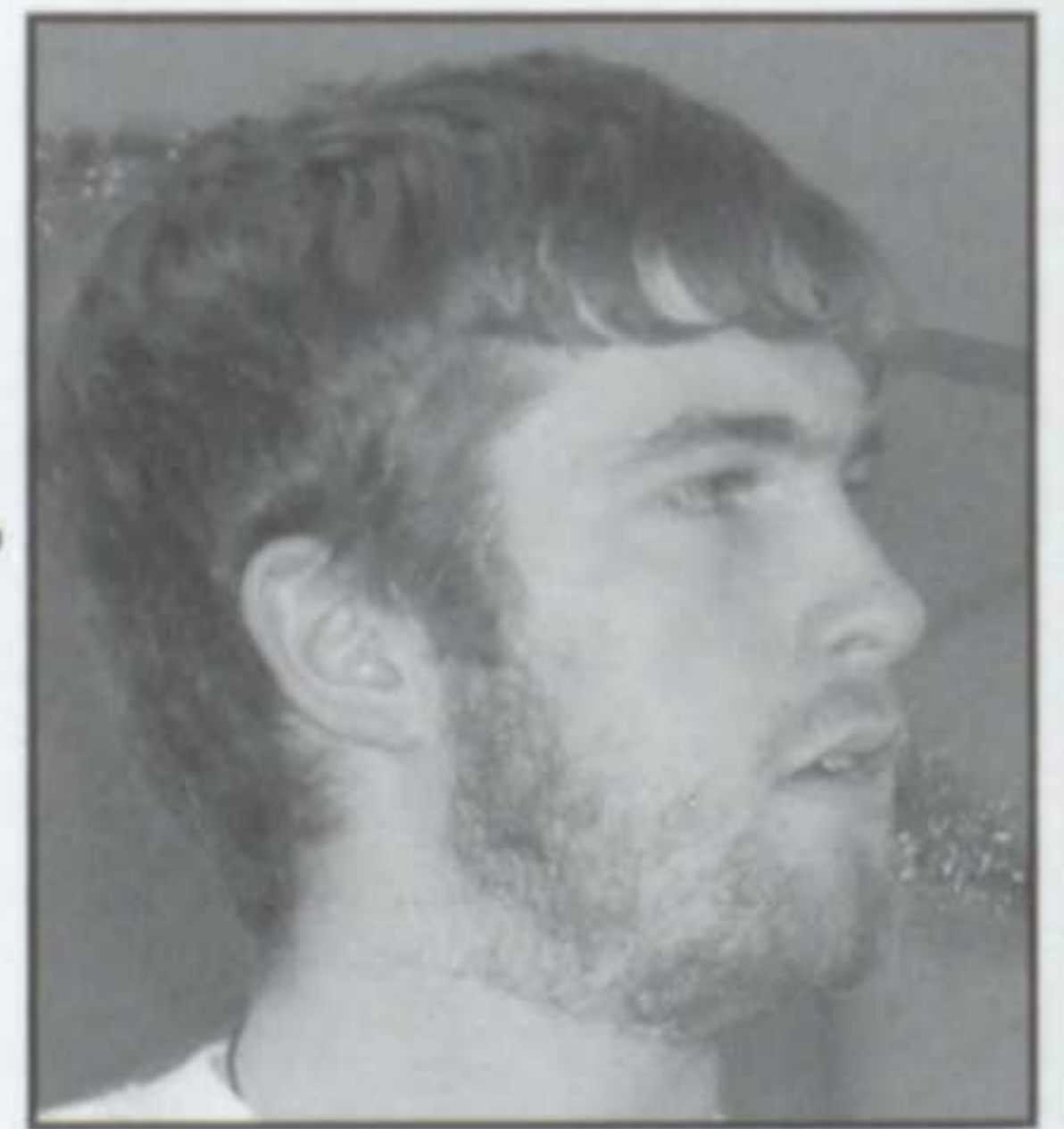

Creative Writing gave over 100 students (9-12) an opportunity to express themselves in words. Assignments that helped them grow in their writing skills and learn new techniques for expressing themselves made the class exciting and fast paced. Poetry, short stories, monologues, and plays were just a few of the writing formats that were explored in the class. Students also experimented with different genres of literature including autobiography, science fiction, fantasy, and supernatural. In *Advanced Creative Writing*, which met at the same time *Creative Writing* met, students who had already created a foundation for themselves in *Creative Writing* went more in-depth with their writings and worked on more open-ended assignments.

Although students were not permitted to have cameras in school or take pictures without consent, in *Photography and Computer Graphics* students were able to have full access to all the film and digital cameras they wanted. Unlike other art forms, students expressed their creative side, but instead of writing, it was through visual arts. Armed with cameras and film, they took black and white photographs, which they then developed themselves. Some photos were edited and enhanced on the computer using photo editing software. The software was also used to do some computer paintings, which resulted in a combine piece that mixed classic photography and painting.

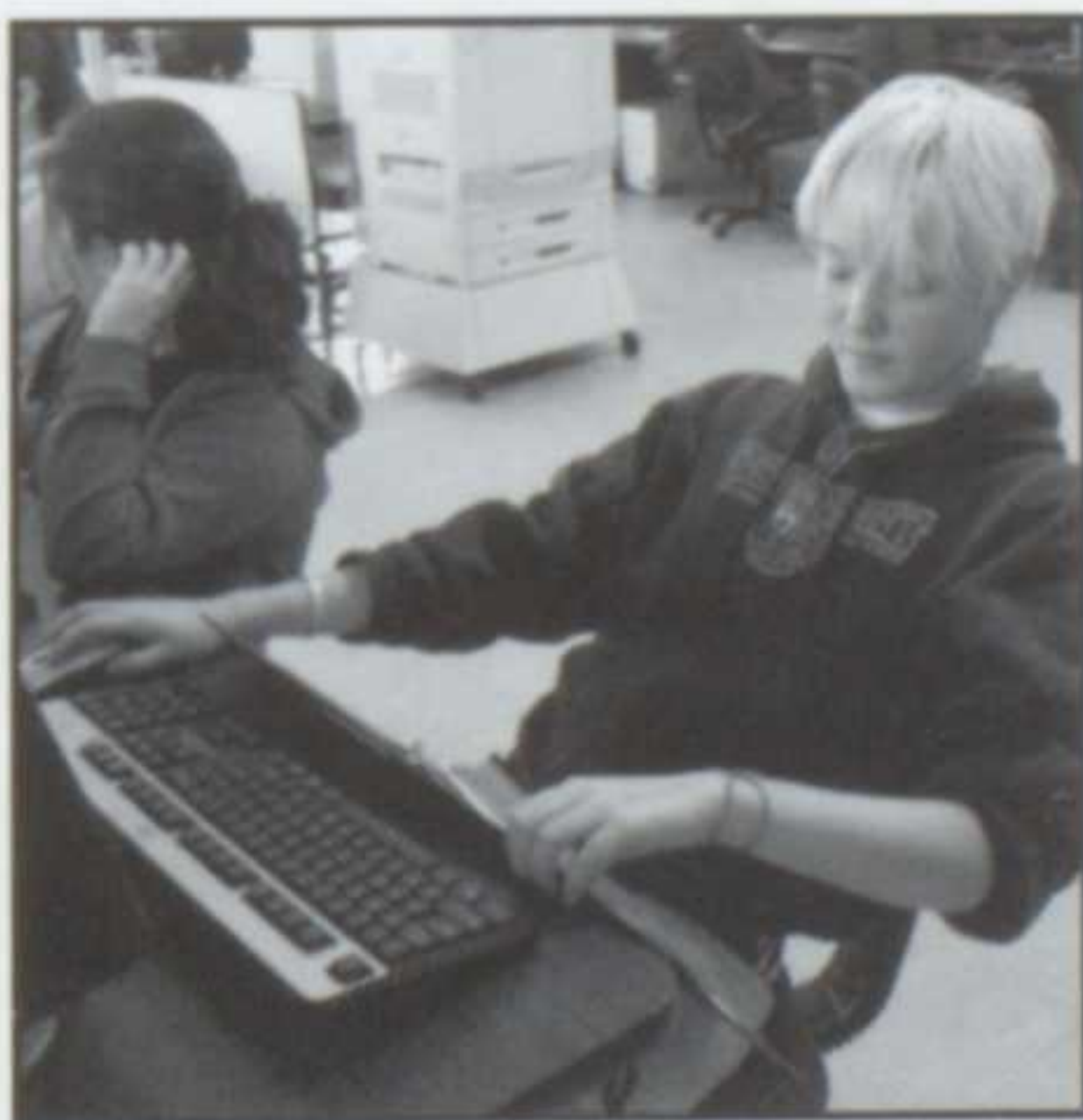

Although summer was considered a break for students, there was no escape from English. Freshman were hit the hardest out of all the English classes, except for AP English, with a total of 570 pages between their two books, To Kill a Mockingbird and I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings. Honors American Literary Experience was next in the running with 516 pages. Senior English read 483 pages over the two-month period. Juniors read The Great Gatsby and Huckleberry Finn which totaled 470 pages. Sophomores were let off the easiest with only 202 pages to complete. The winning class, with 1911 pages to complete in a 78-day period, was AP senior English.

The freshman started off their academic year with the infamous poetry project. While freshmen were scattering to collect poems with specific figurative devices, combined with a little of their own creativity, sophomores were busy writing everything from research papers to short stories, tenth graders spent most of their class time in the computer labs. After being holed up their sophomore year, juniors took time to appreciate nature. Based on essays by Emerson and Thoreau, they were assigned to spend an hour outside and observe life around them, and then write an essay about their experience. All these years of writing prepared students for the final paper in Senior English. Issued a theme to study, the students were required to find two poems, two short stories, a book, and incorporate them all into an eight-page paper. It was not a job for a procrastinator.

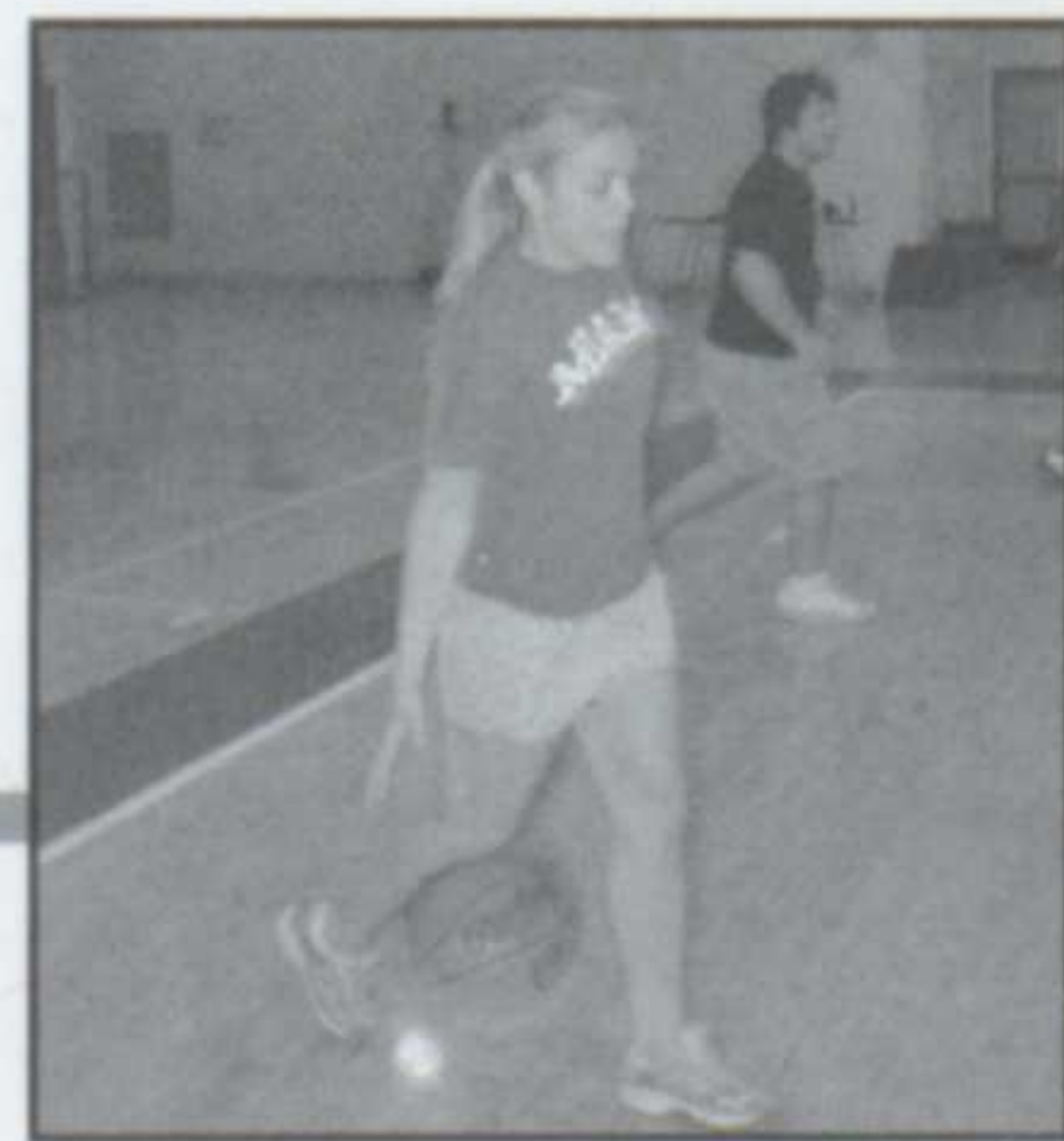

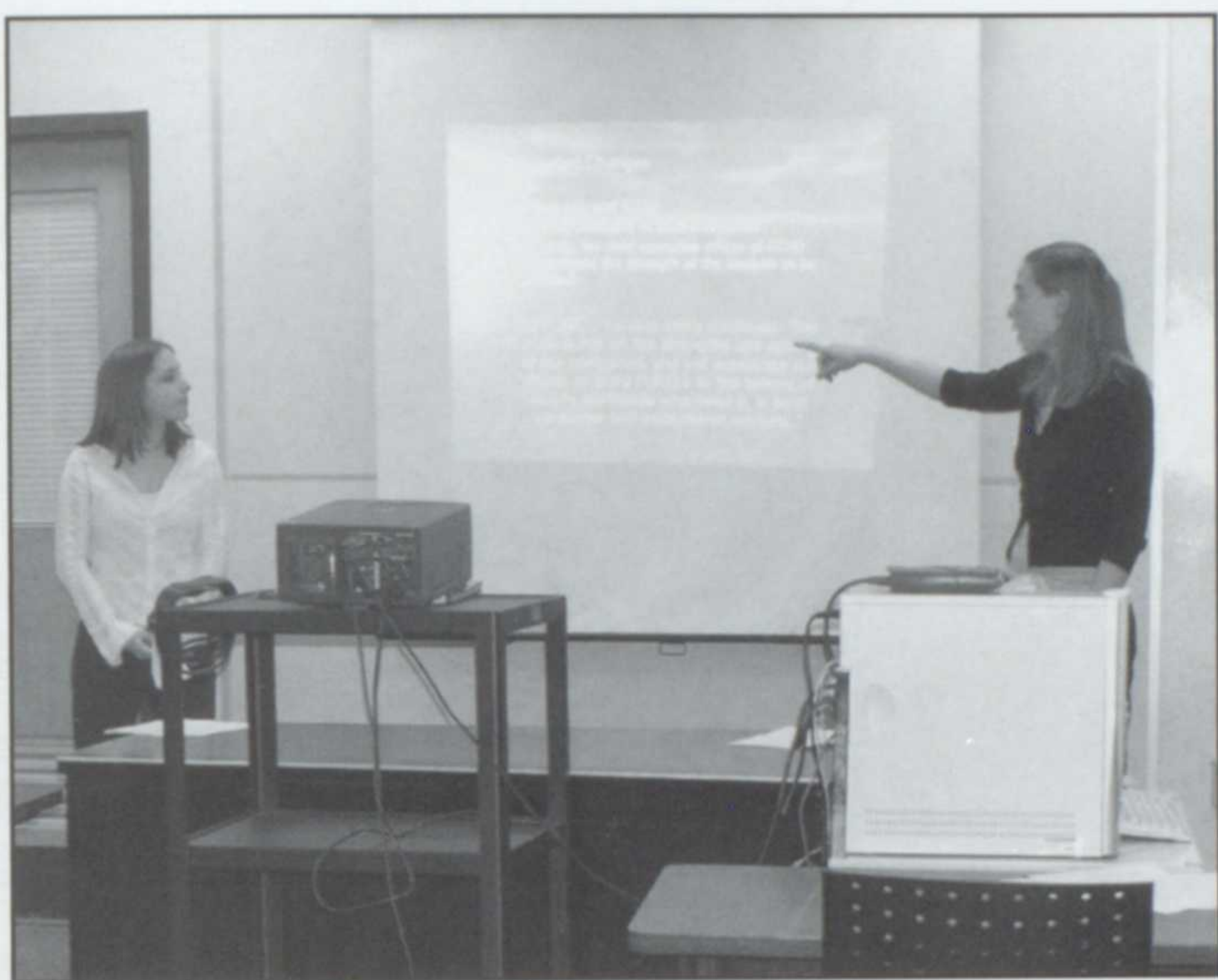

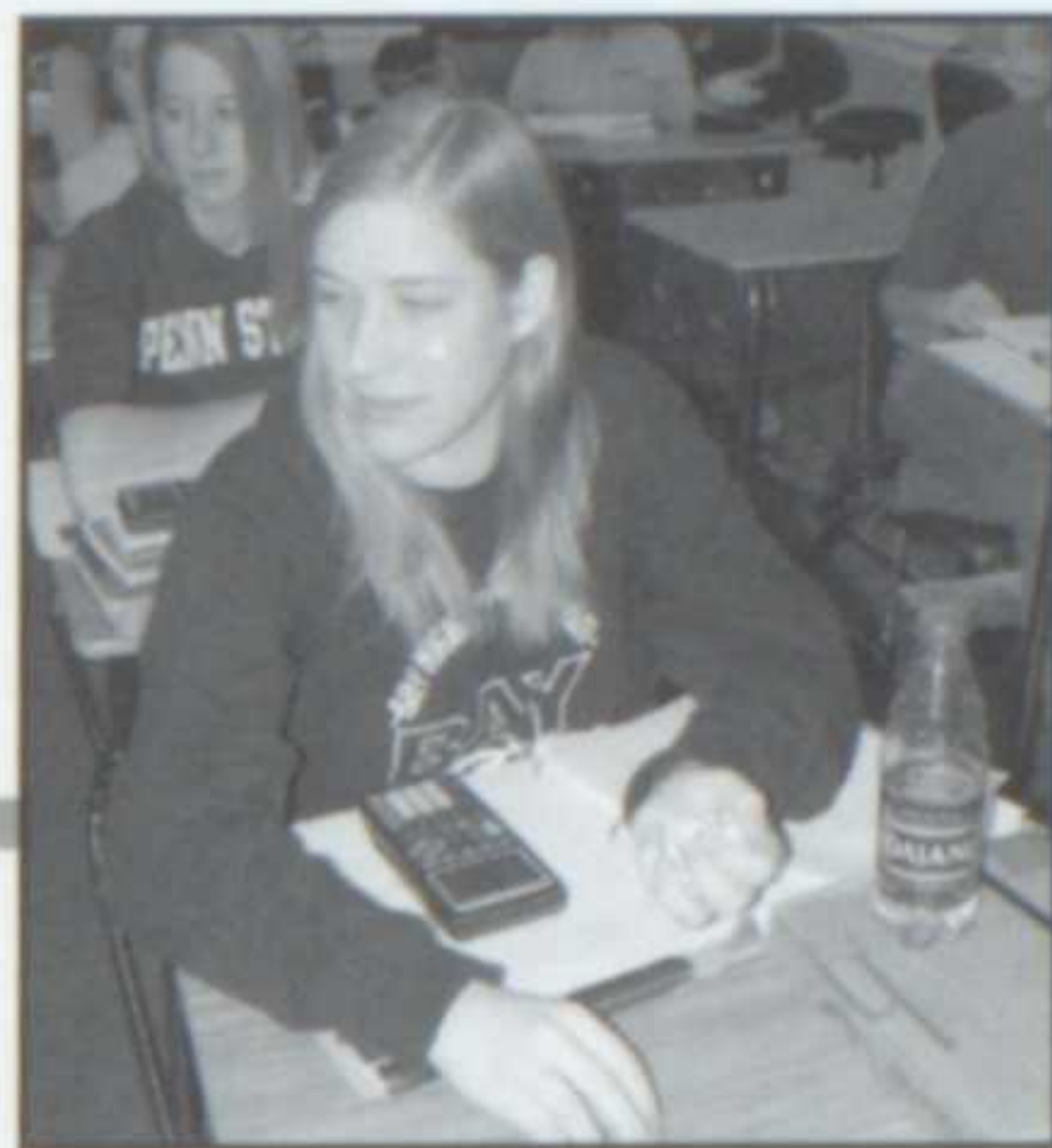

Add it, subtract it, solve it, predict it: The math courses available to students ranged from basic Algebra to college level Calculus. In order to graduate, each student had to have earned at least three math credits in high school. While classes such *Introduction to Mathematics, Integrated Geometry and Algebra, and Functions, Statistics, and Trigonometry (FST)*, more advanced students had the option to take *AP Statistics, Calculus AB and Calculus BC*.

In all Algebra classes, students used an investigative, problem-solving approach to learn how to represent patterns algebraically, and use functions and other solving various equations. Though many mathematical areas are touched on in the Algebra courses, students were introduced to the major concepts and tools for collecting and analyzing data, advanced topics from Algebra and Trigonometry, and probability in the *Statistics, FST, and Pre-Calculus* classes. Aside from required permission from a mathematics teacher, challenging courses such as *AP Statistics and Calculus* required strong organizational and analytical study skills. Advanced Placement courses stretched through 36 weeks with the first semester stressing skills, while the second semester focused on projects and tests in a seminar setting. All of the math courses offered have an emphasis on theory and application and prepare students for future math classes.

STATISTICAL

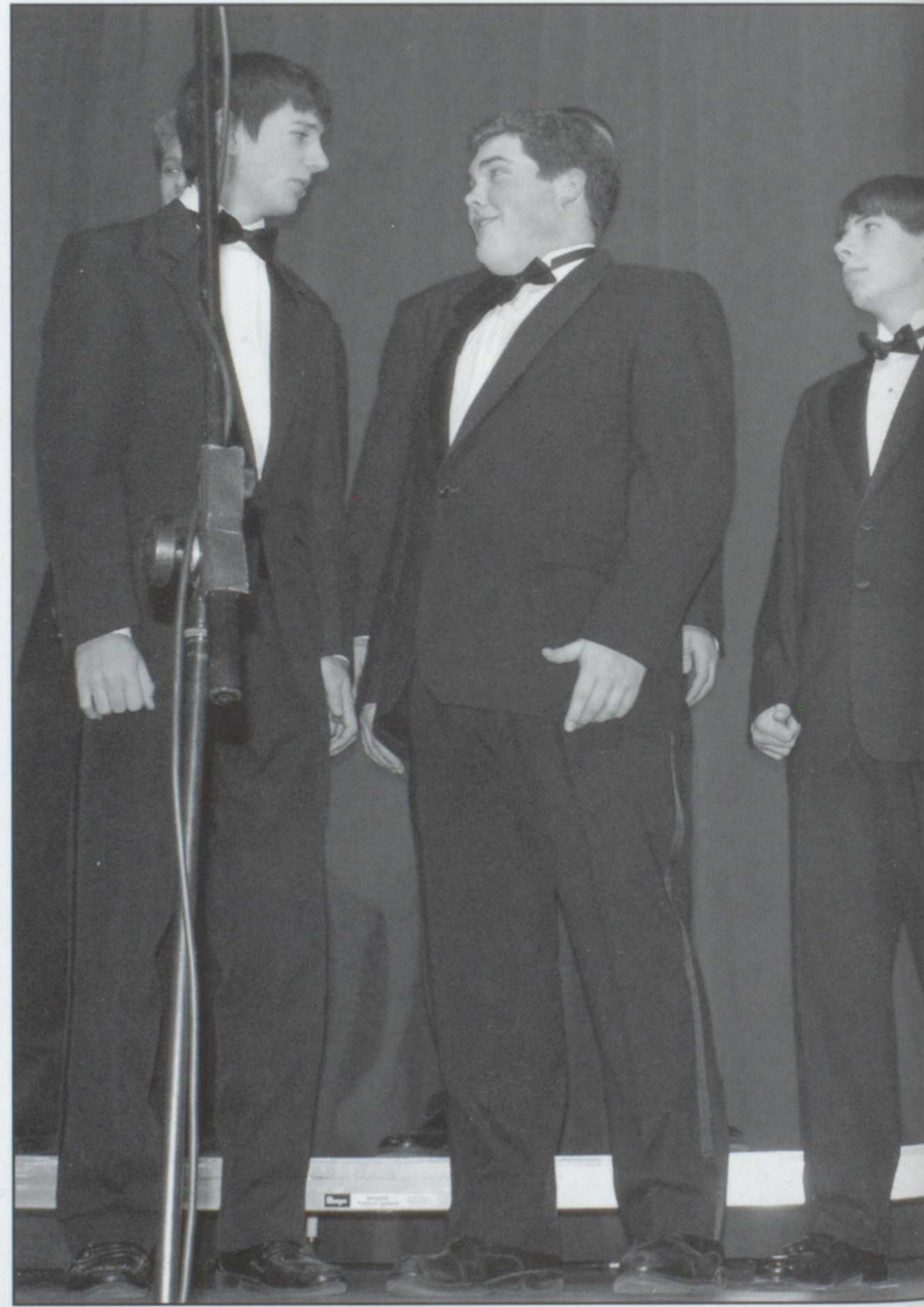
Since Mrs. Devon Gess took over the choral program from Mrs. Elaine Dwyer three years ago, it has always been something: a rehearsal, a concert, a contest. The program included the A Capella Choir, Treble Choir, Freshman Choir, and the Ladies Show Choir, as well as the Men's Choir, and Choraleers. These six groups, totalling 288 members, put on a fall concert, two winter concerts, and a spring concert. 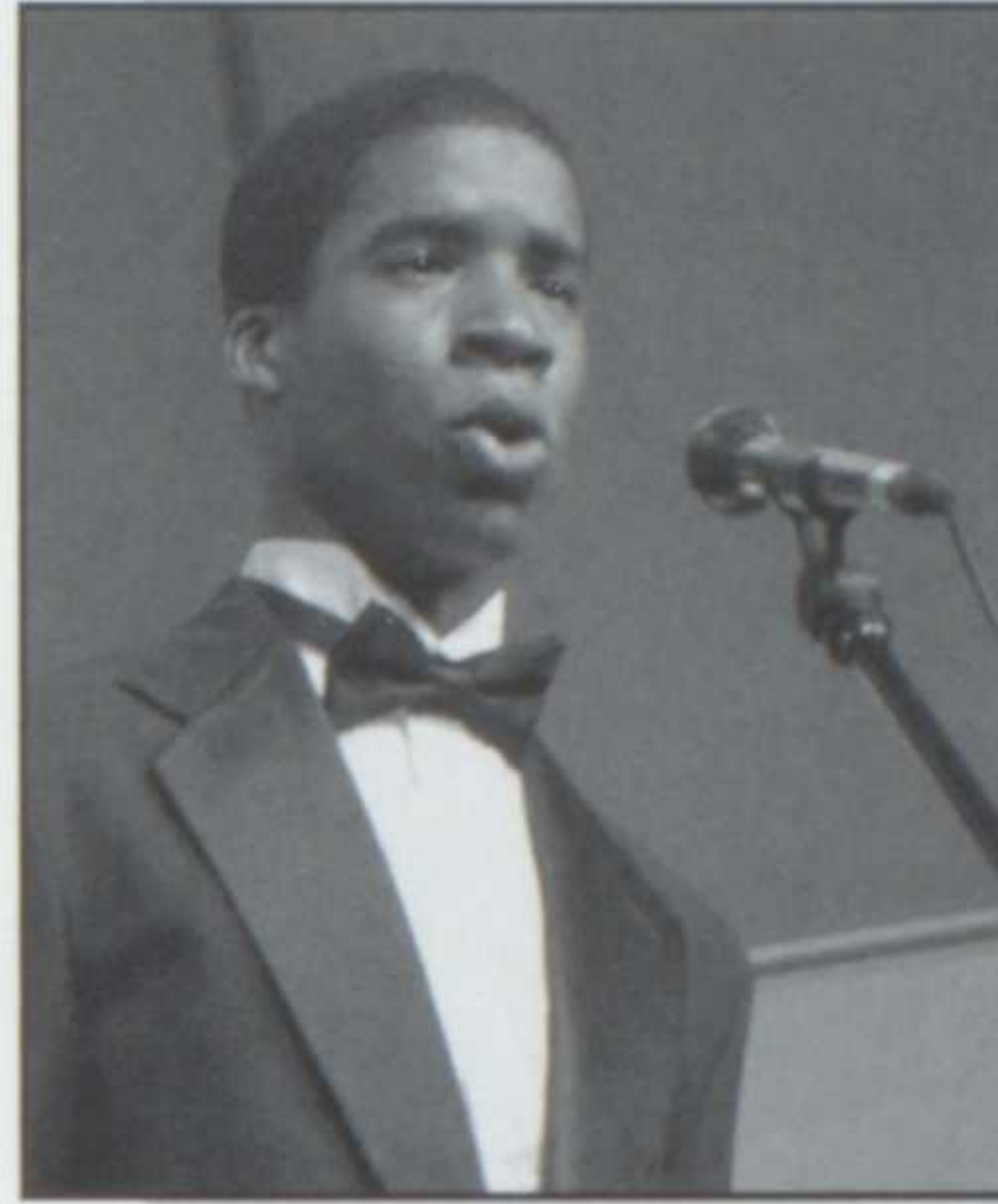

With so many mediums to choose from, the number of art classes offered could dazzle an incoming freshman. After completing an introductory *Drawing and Design* or *Art Survey* course, a wide array of options was opened. *Painting* delved into medium that the introductory courses only skimmed over. Stressing color and composition, *Painting* forced students to change the way they perceived the world around them, to see things in terms of tints, shades, and hues instead of simply forms.

Photography and *Computer Graphics* focused on design and photo manipulation. Students spent much of their time at the computers using Photoshop to enhance, cut, and combine their pictures. After working with two-dimensional figures, *Sculpture* offered the relief of a new perspective. With wood, stone, clay, and glass, students composed elegant and thought-provoking forms. Focusing knowledge gained in *Sculpture*, students worked mainly with clay and glazes in *Ceramics*. They learned how to throw pottery and how to combine different glazes to achieve specific effects.

Applied Art offered a wider range of materials than previous courses, expanding into metals and sometimes plastics. Prompts gave incredible artistic breathing room, asking the student to fulfill only a few requirements. Students in *AP Art History*, who met in the Distance Learning Lab in a skinny block all year long, learned how to identify important artists and historical movements in preparation for the AP test in May.

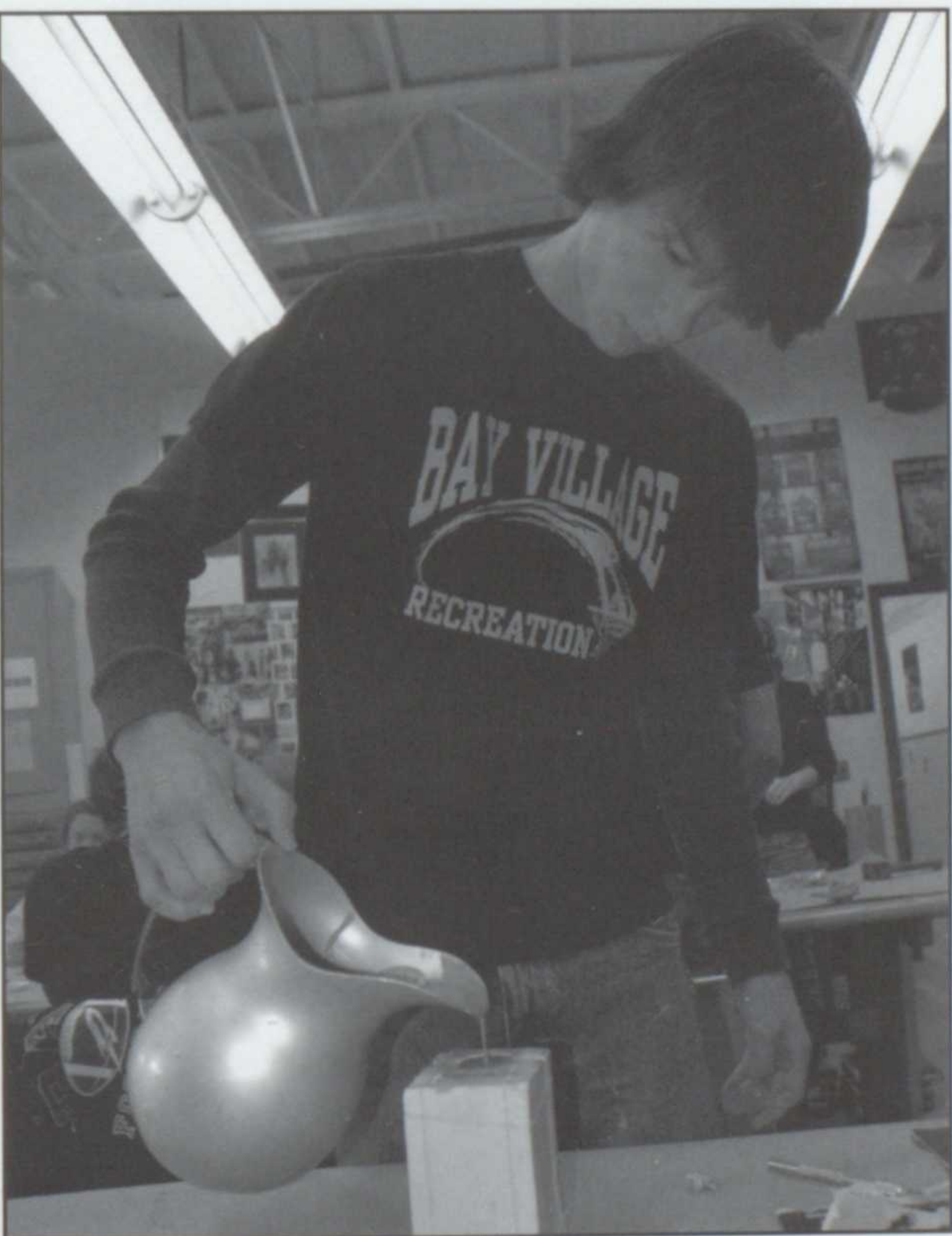

Why do things fall at the same rate, regardless of their weight? How fast does a rocket have to travel to escape Earth's pull? These and other questions were explored, experimented, and explained in *Physics*. Centered on engrossing labs, *Physics* analyzed acceleration with K*NEX roller coasters and light diffraction with a unique holography lab.

Until *Chemistry*, students thought a mole was just a blind rodent that dug tunnels in the ground. Chemistry revealed the world of the atom and the nature of reactions. Some were actually interested in pursuing a career in the atomic world while others signed up simply to see stuff explode.

The macro version of *Chemistry*, *Biology* concentrated on the development of cell structures and the history of evolution. Students were introduced to dissection, having the chance to examine a sheep's brain. An enlightening introductory course, *Biology* made the theories and principles students see today in papers and journals understandable.

For those with a little more than average nerd blood running through their veins, Science Club offered after-school time to conduct experiments and demonstrations for pleasure. Participants attended lectures, visited the planetarium, and built fantastic contraptions.

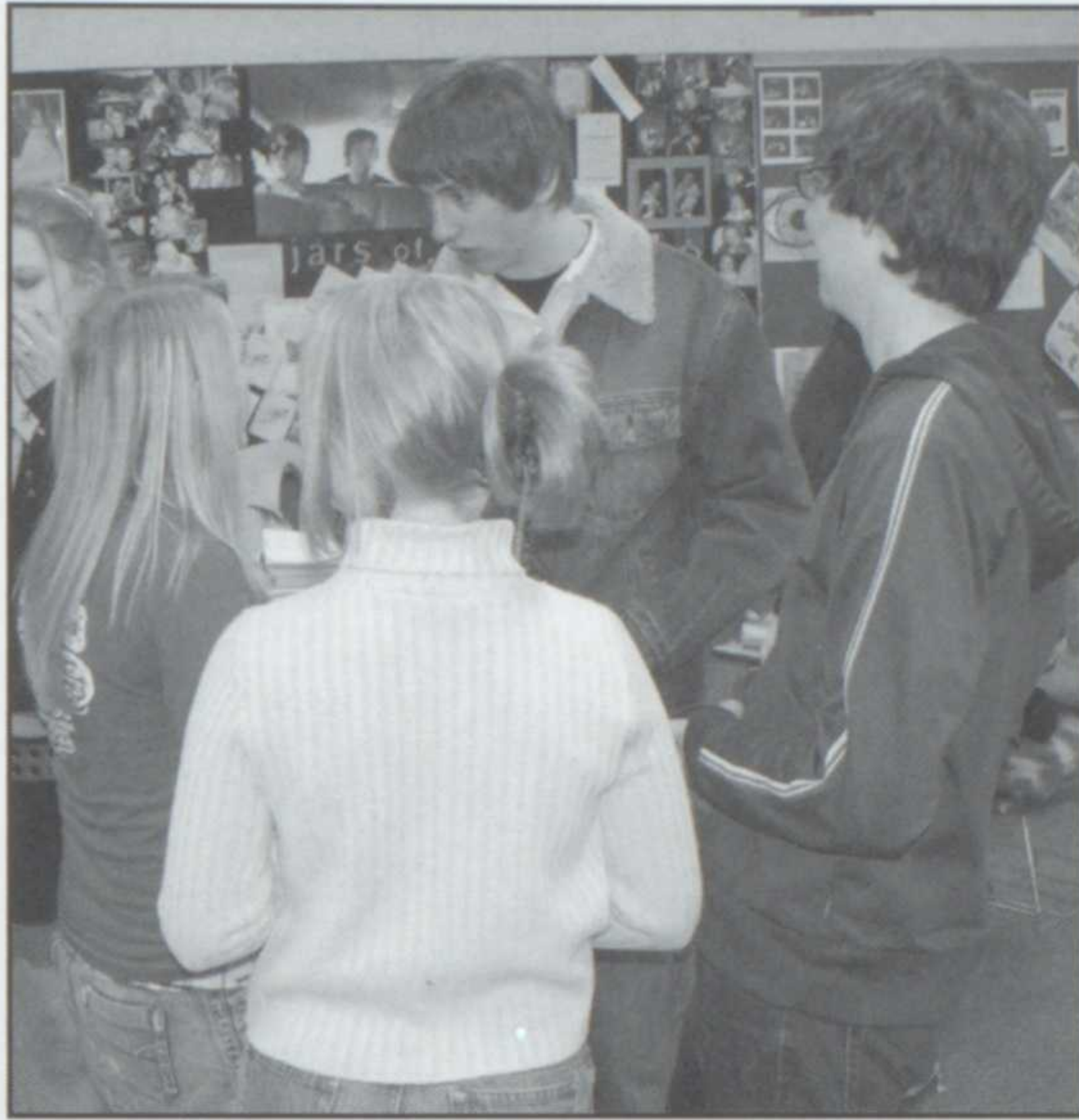

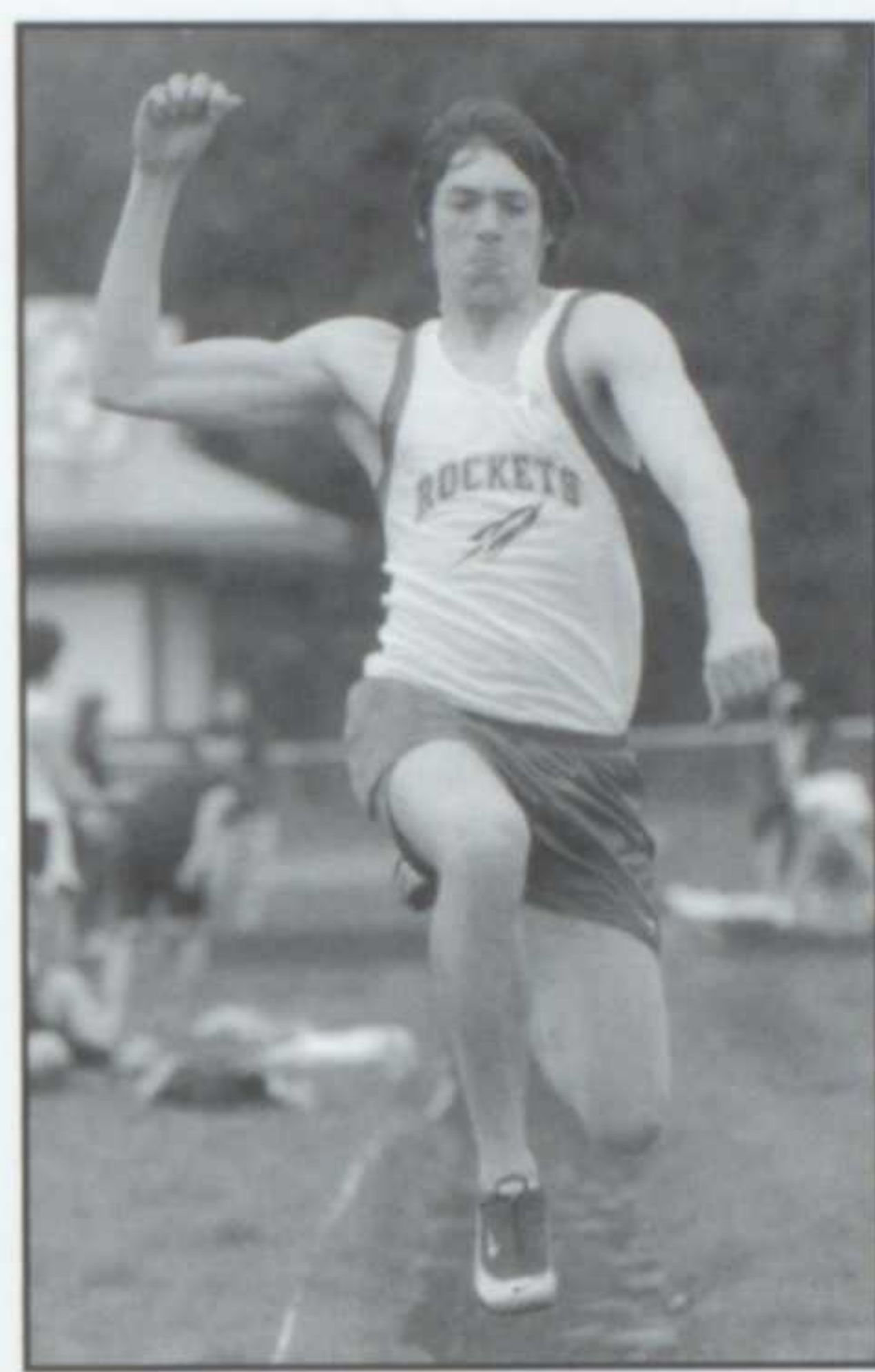

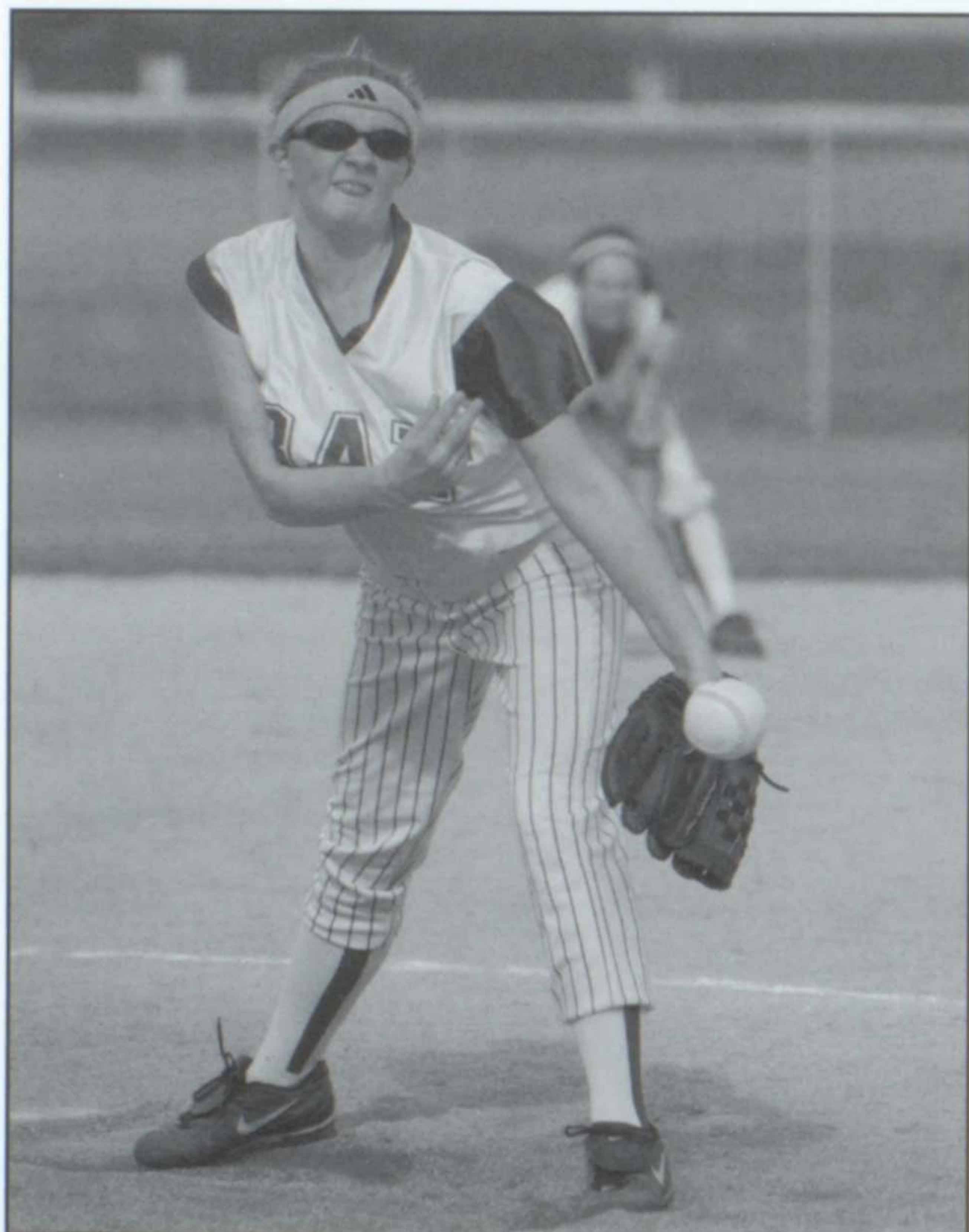

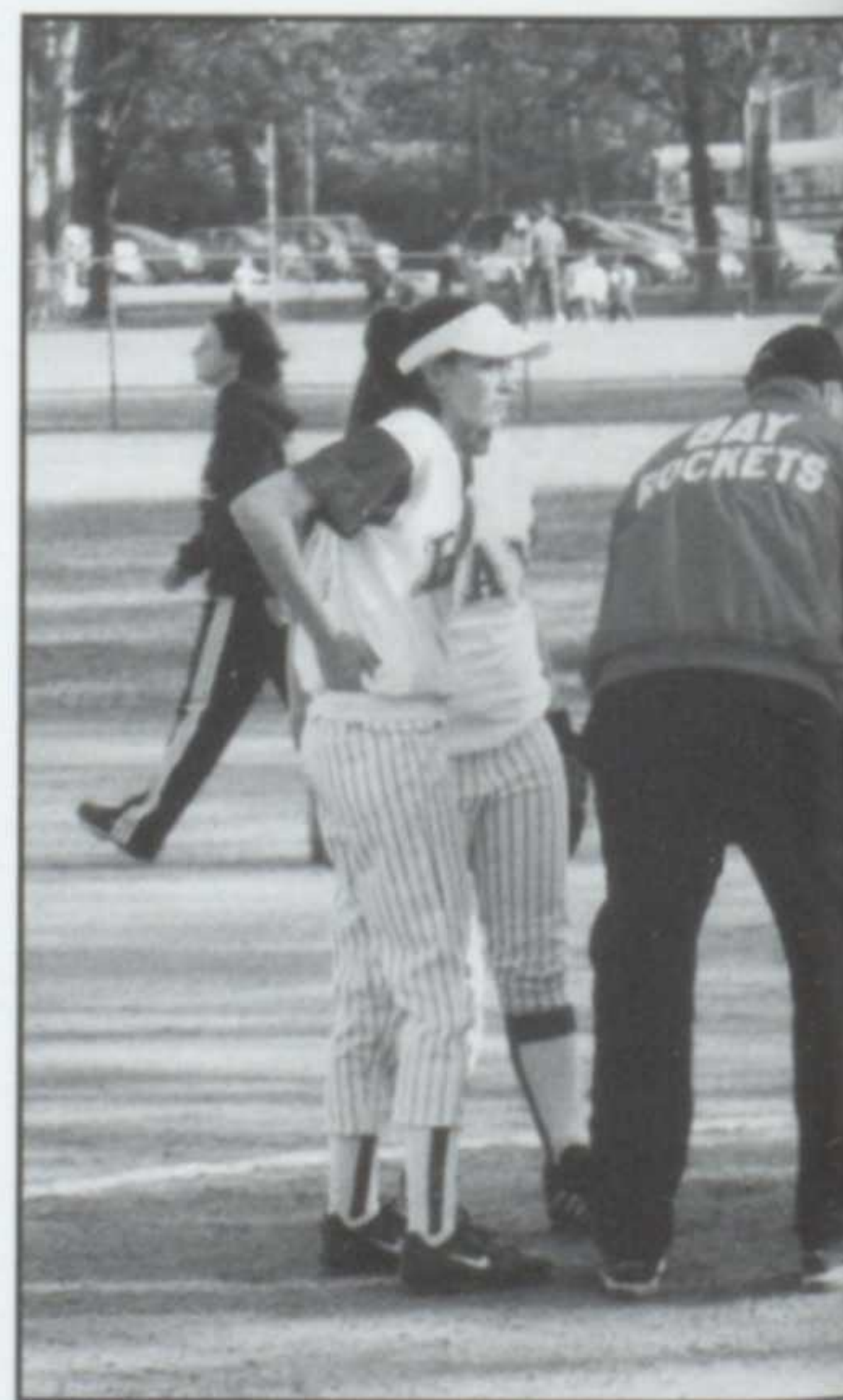

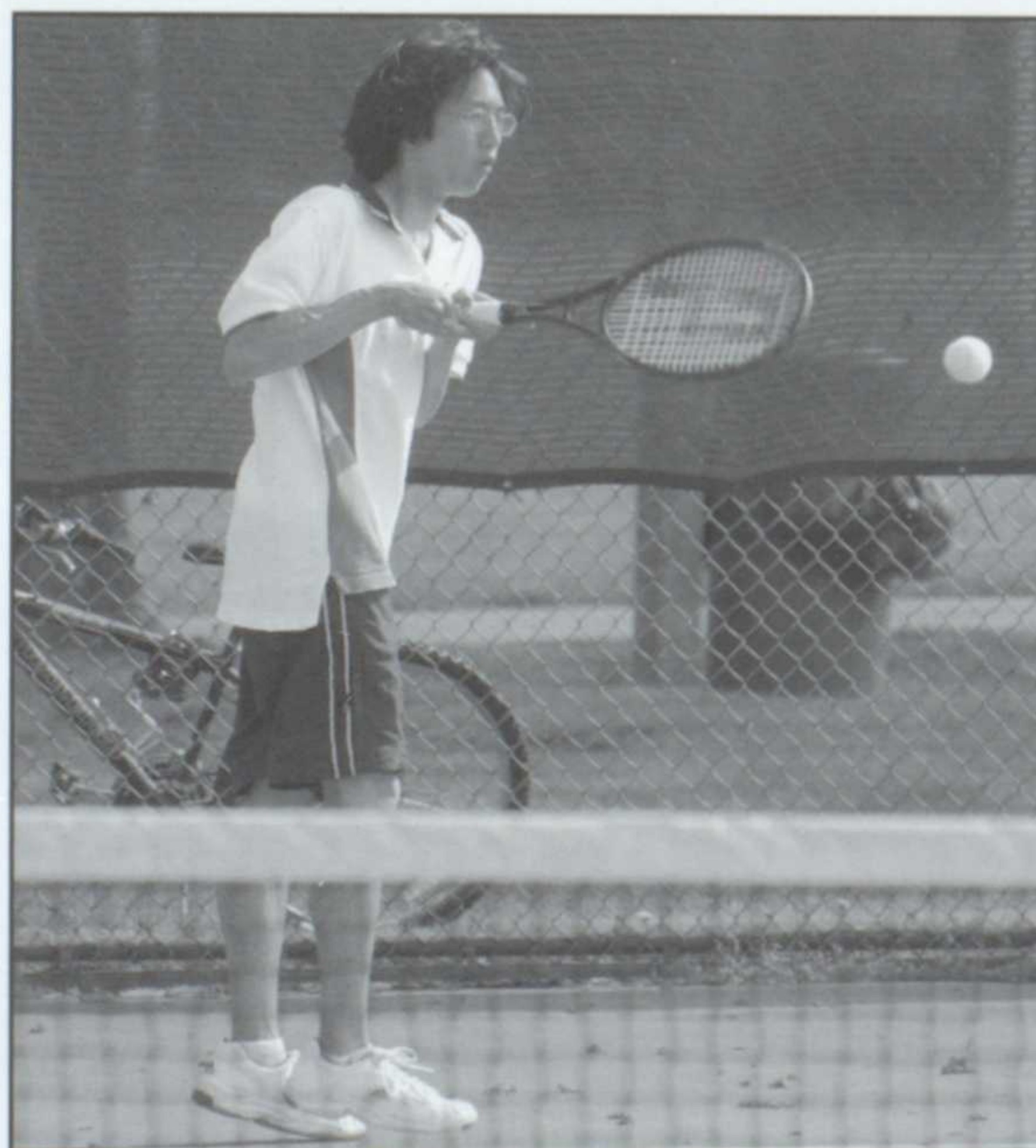

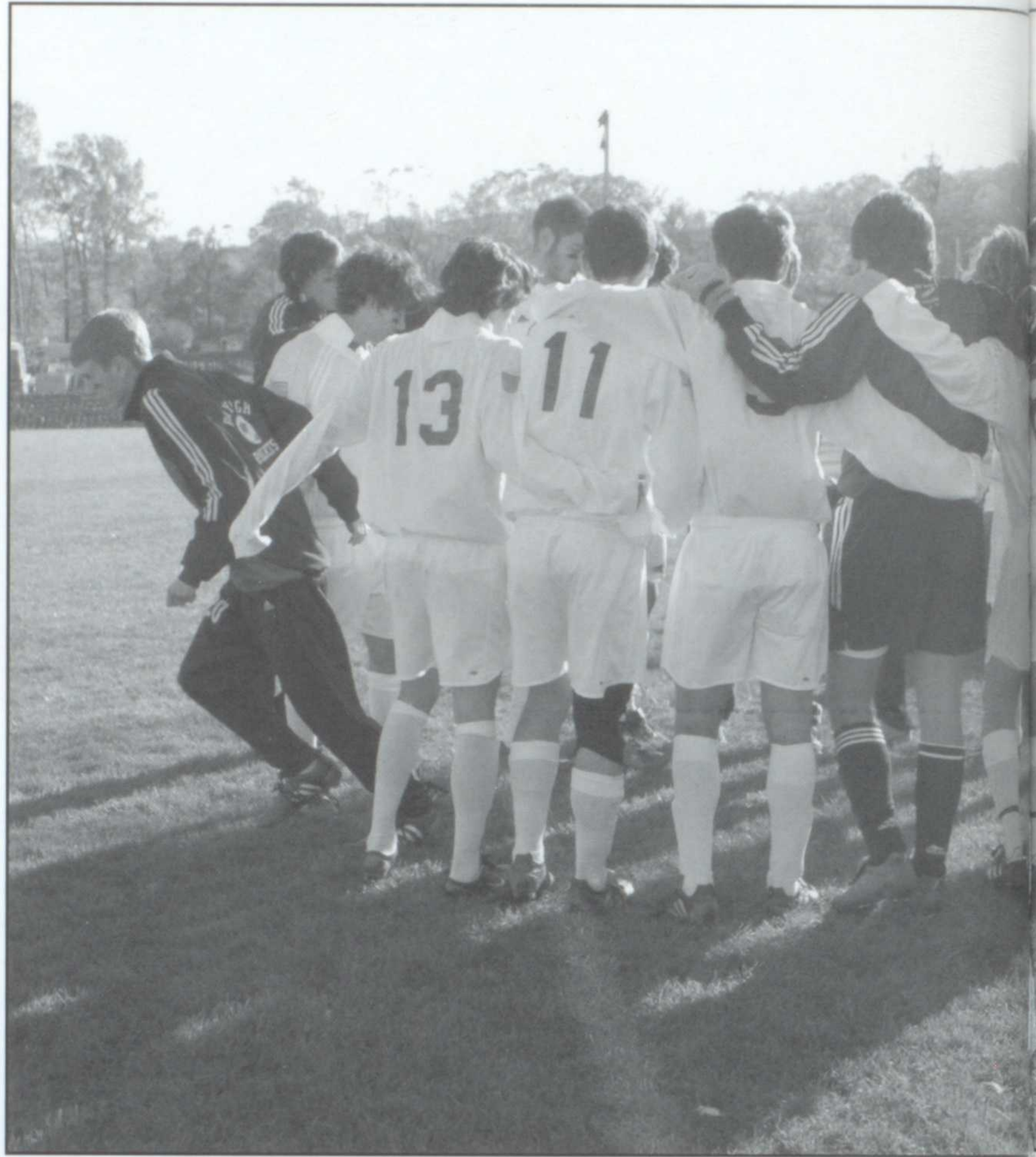

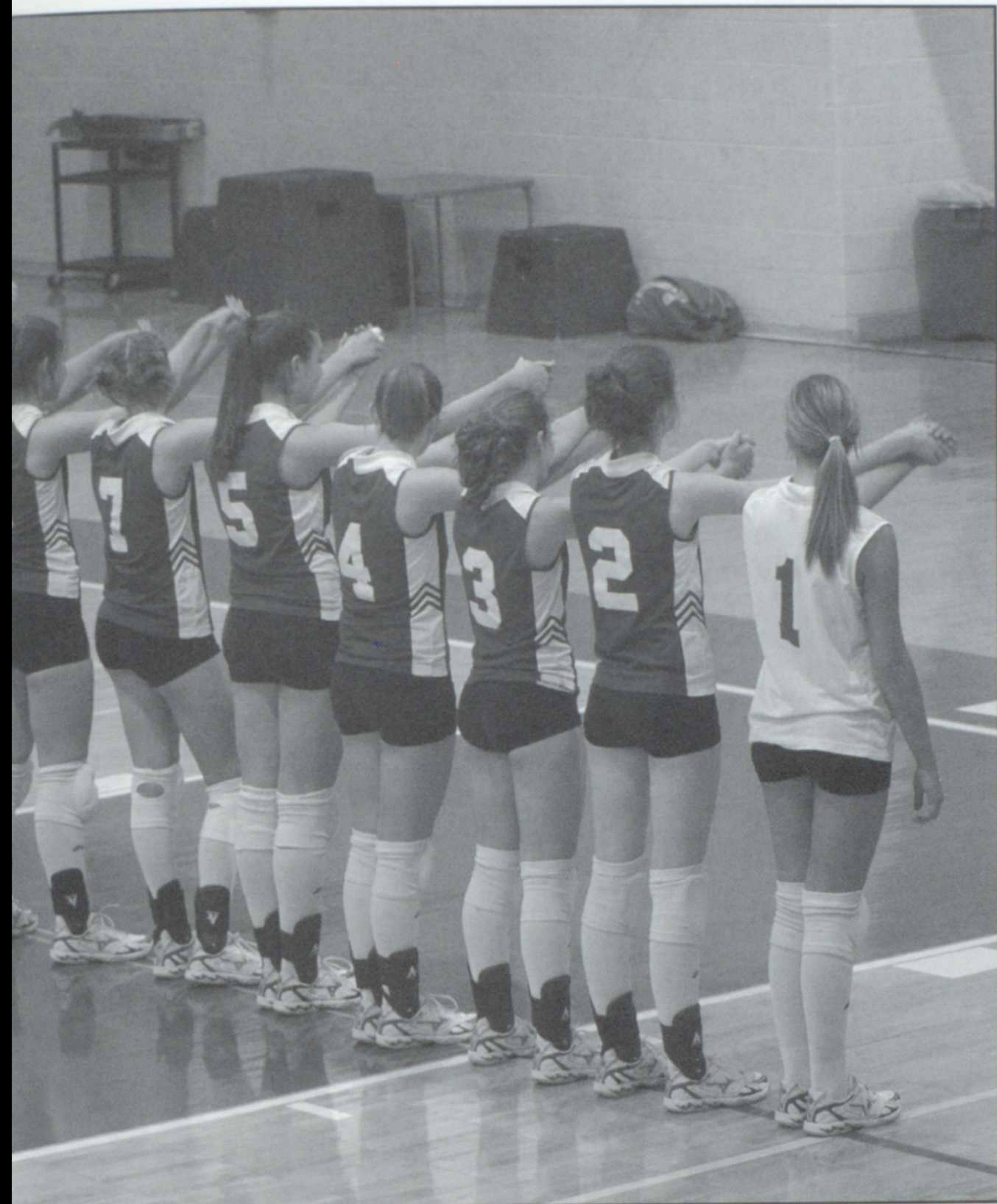

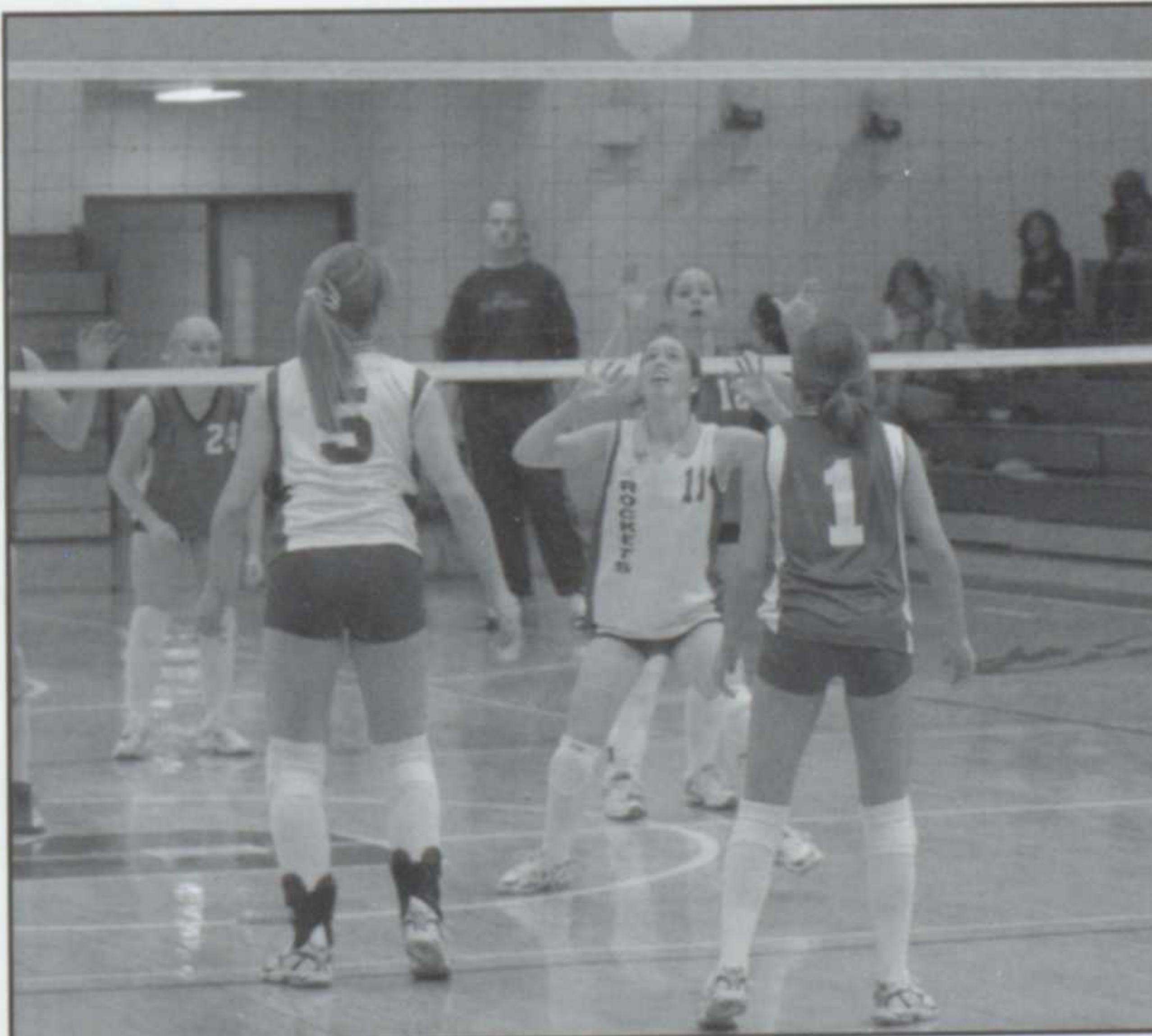

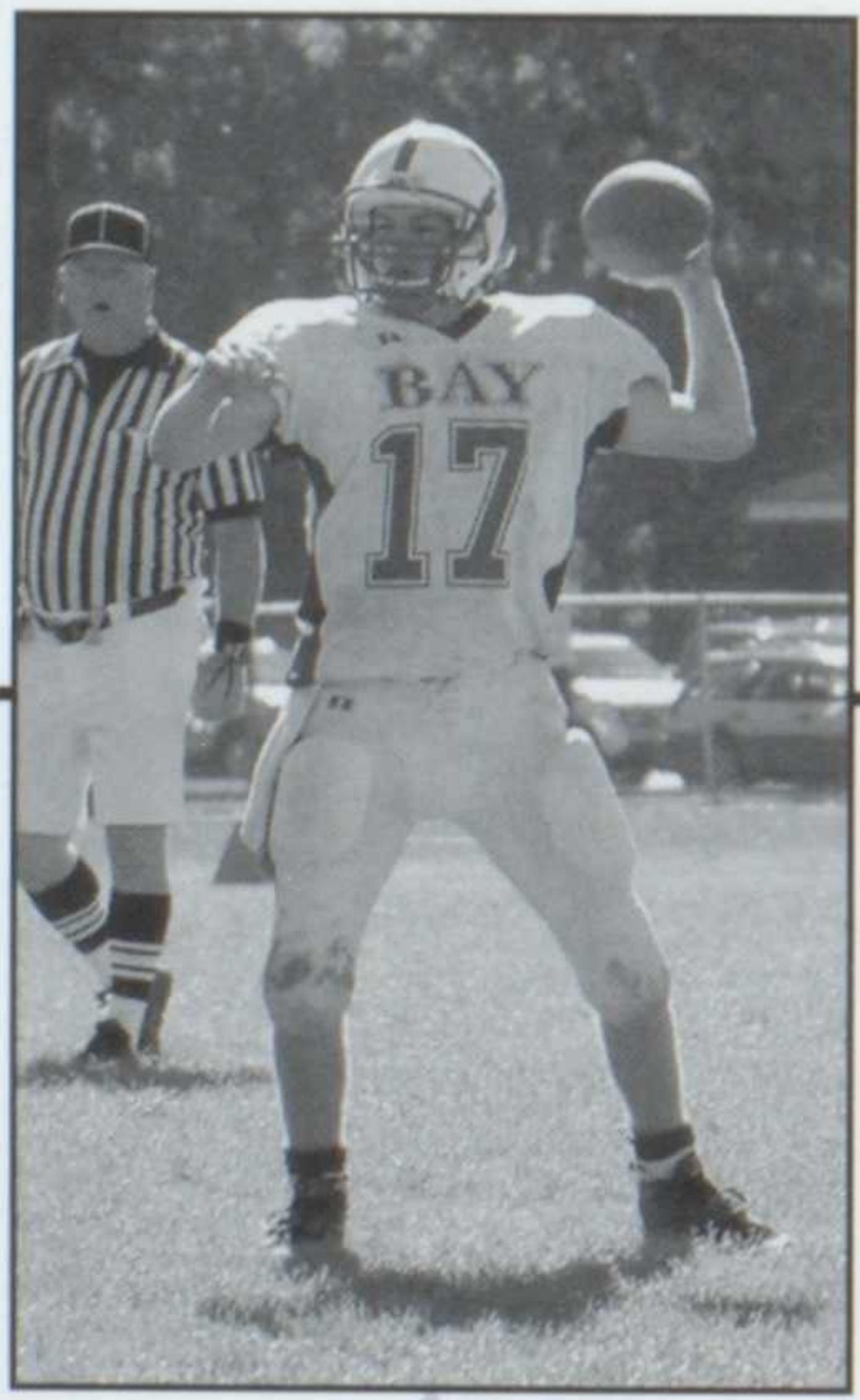

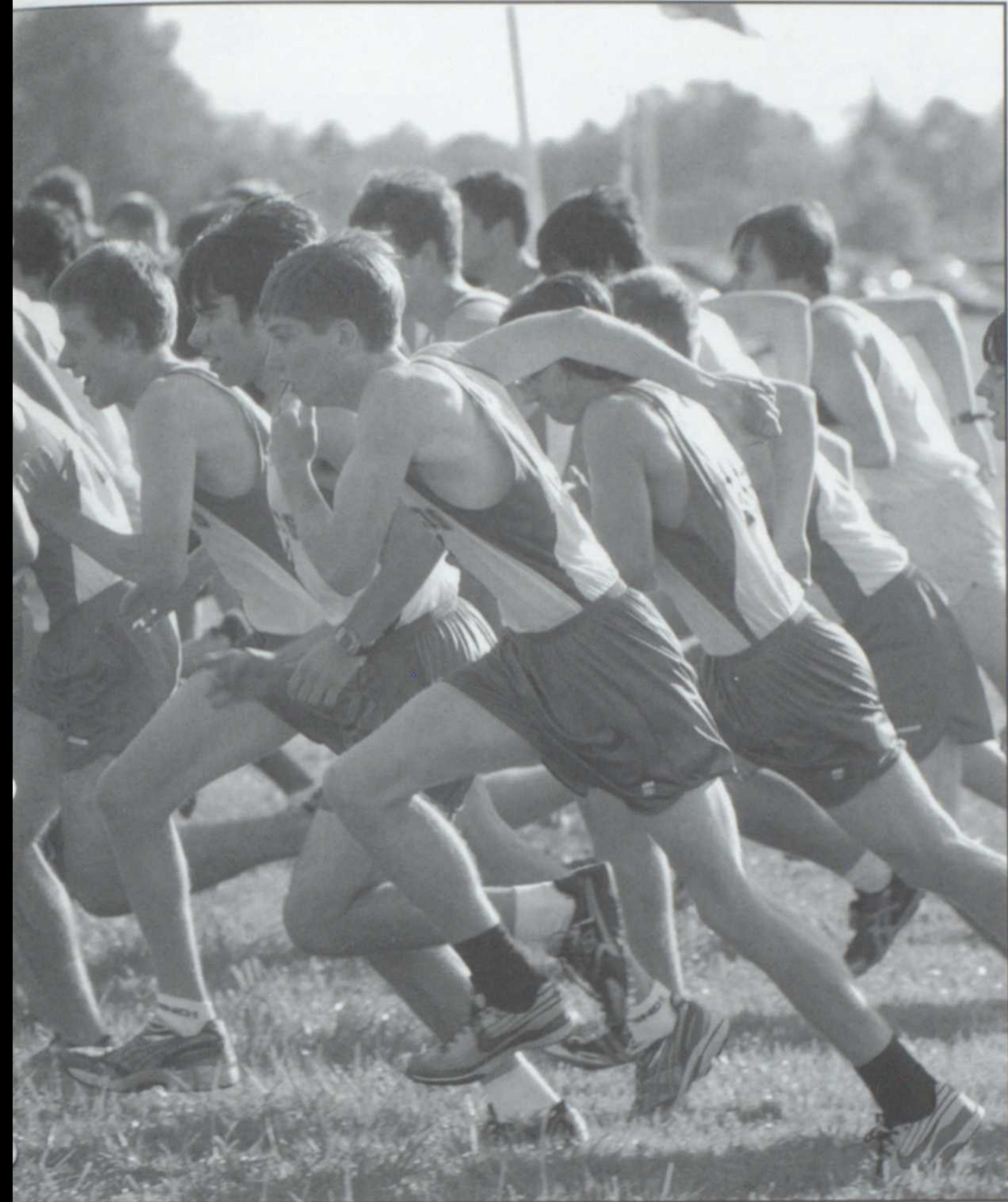

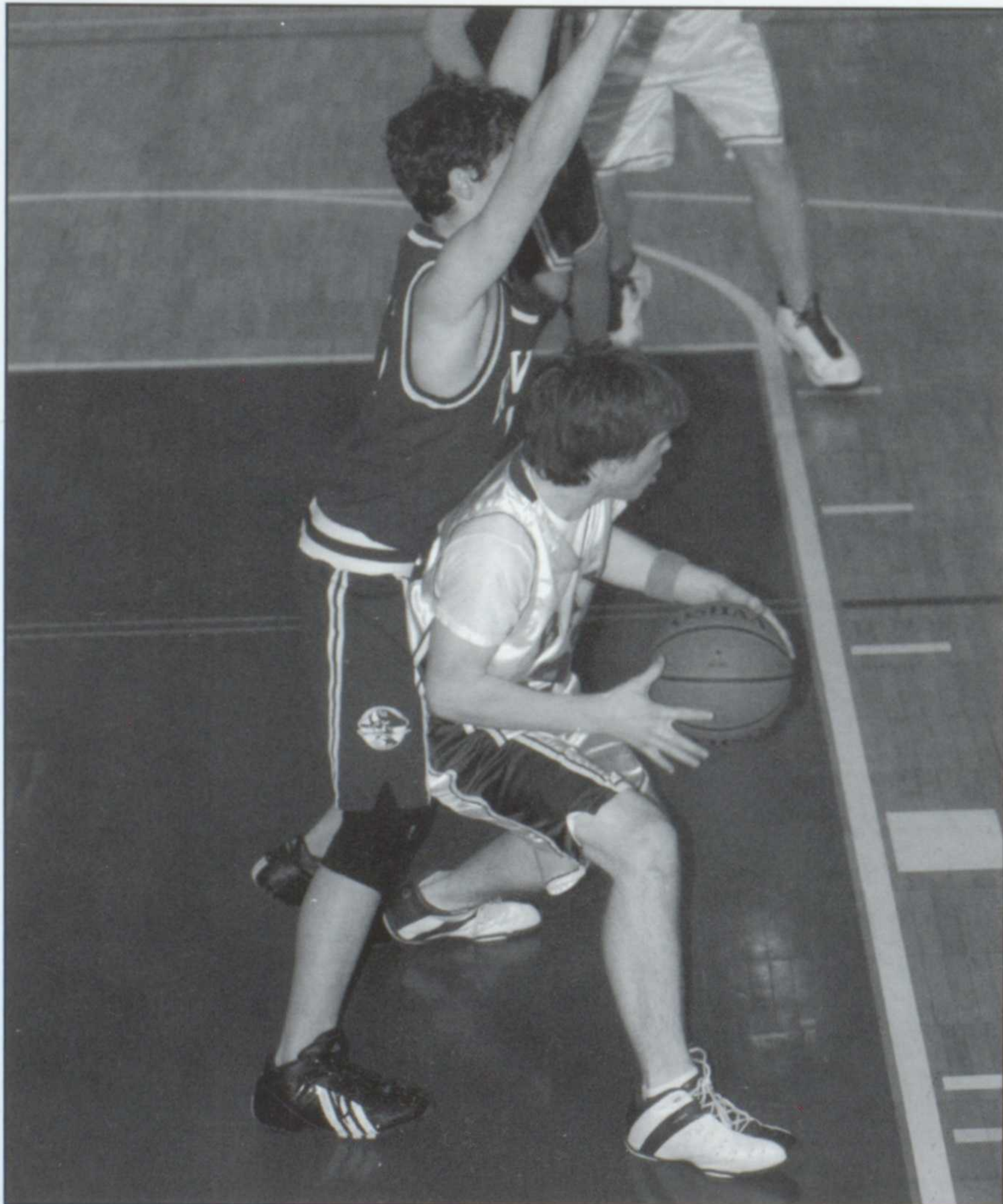

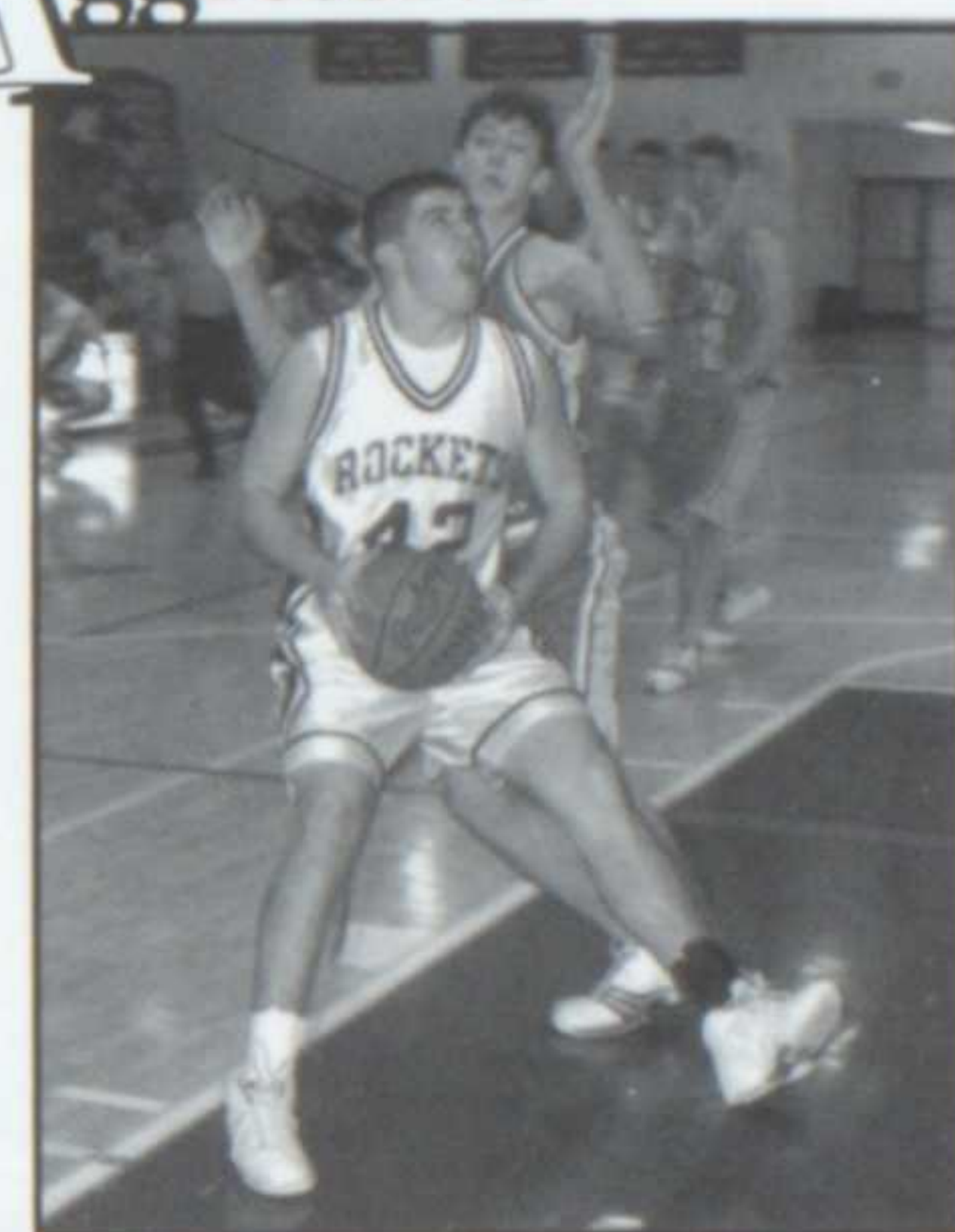

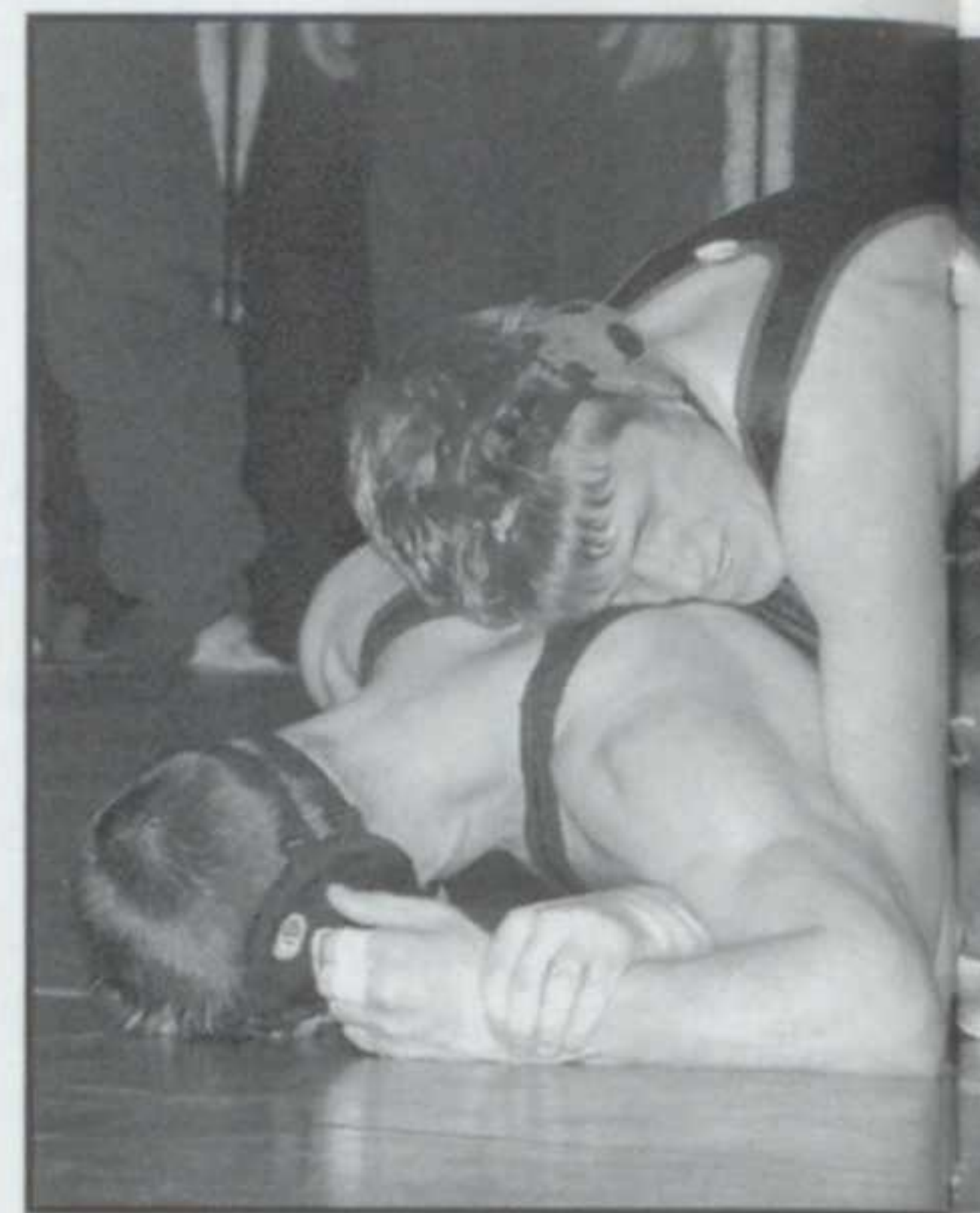

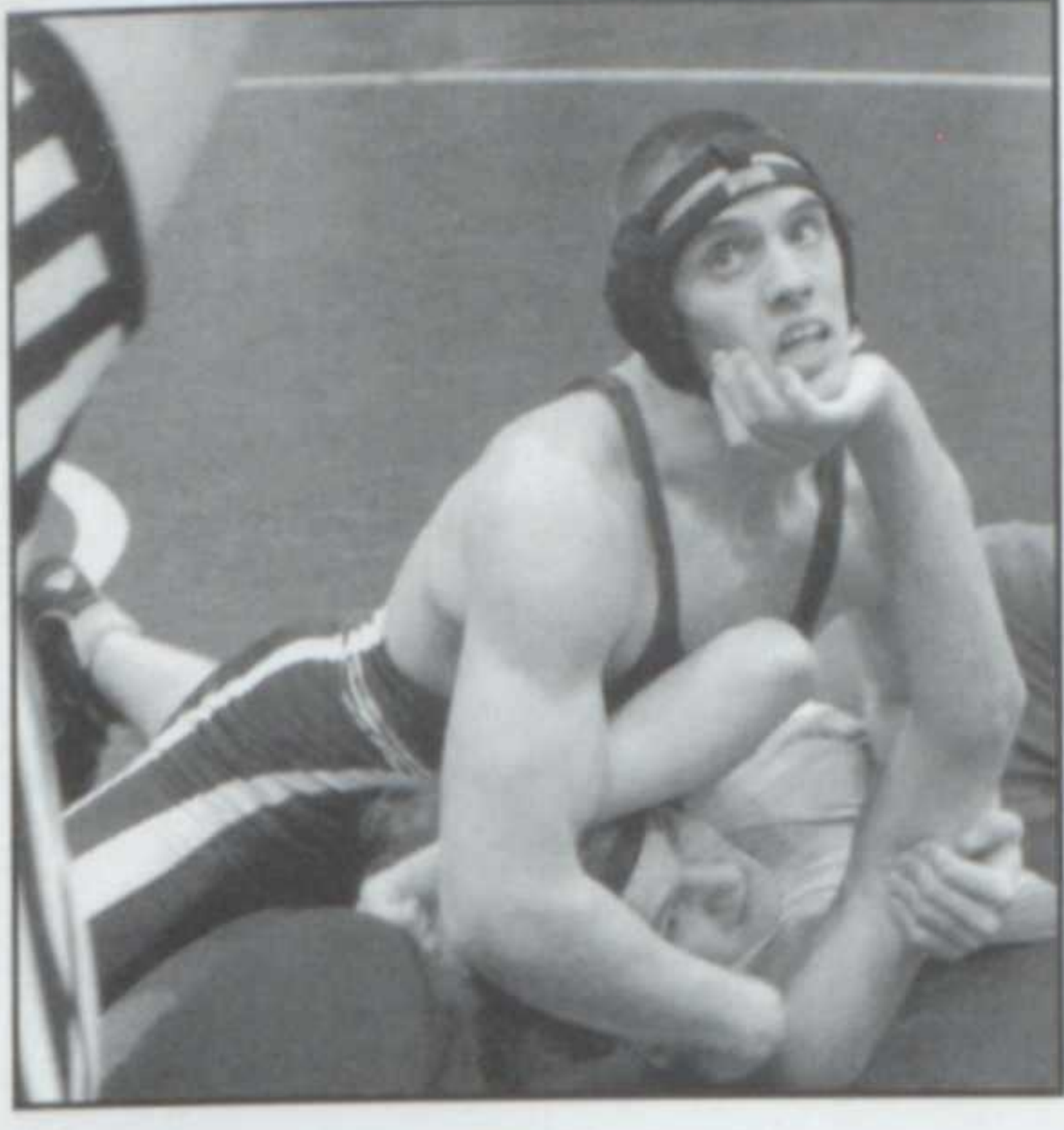

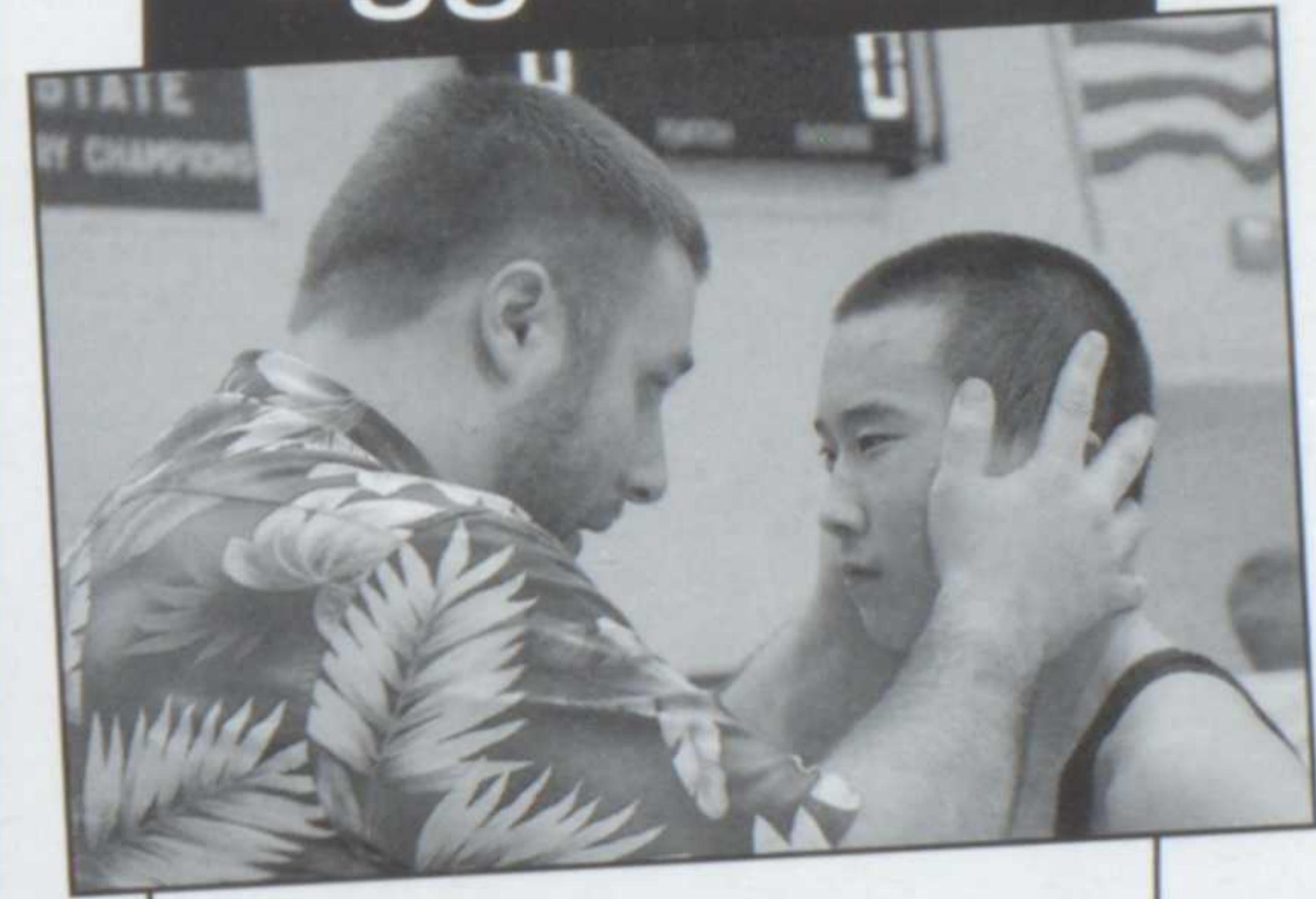

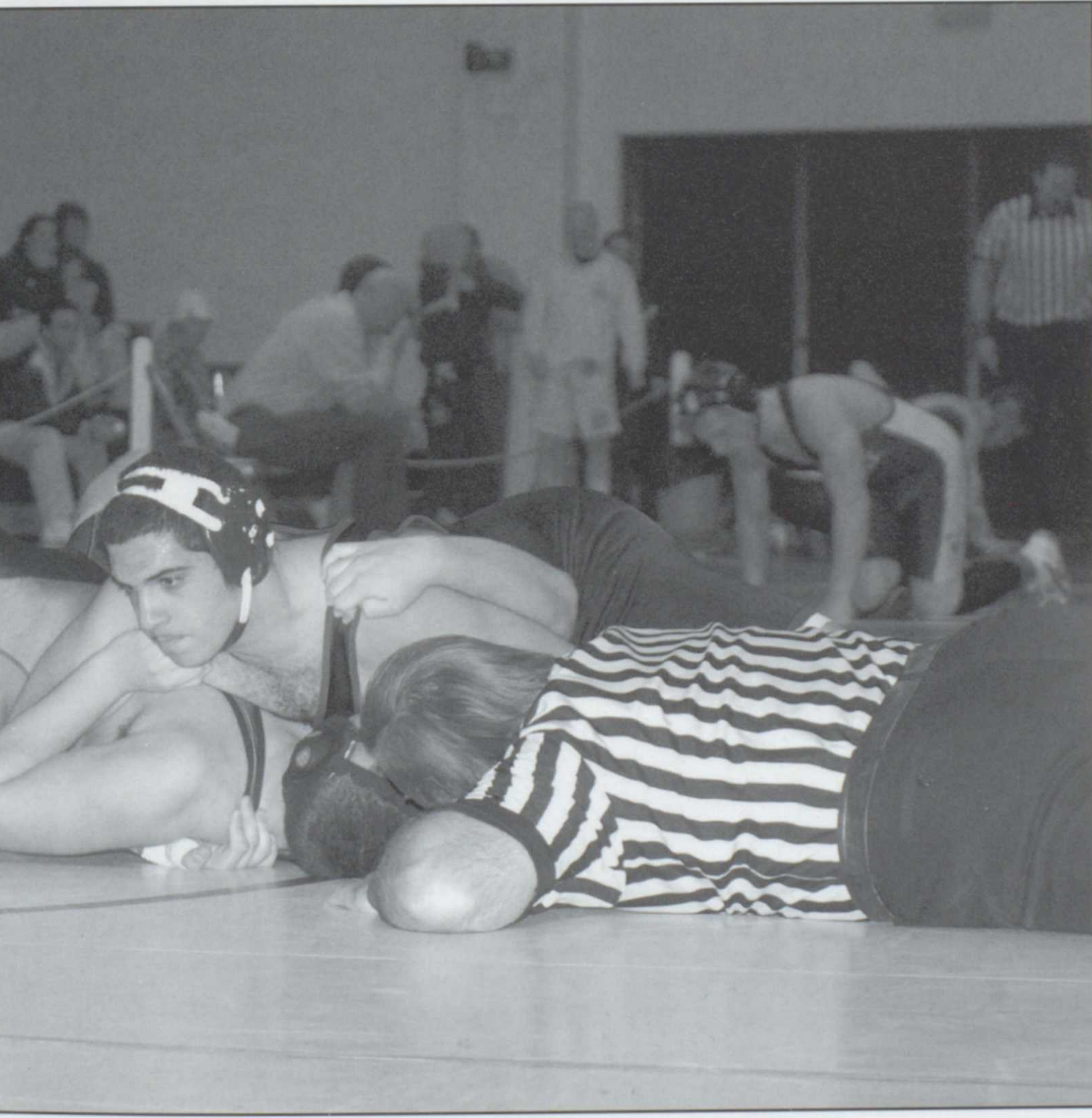

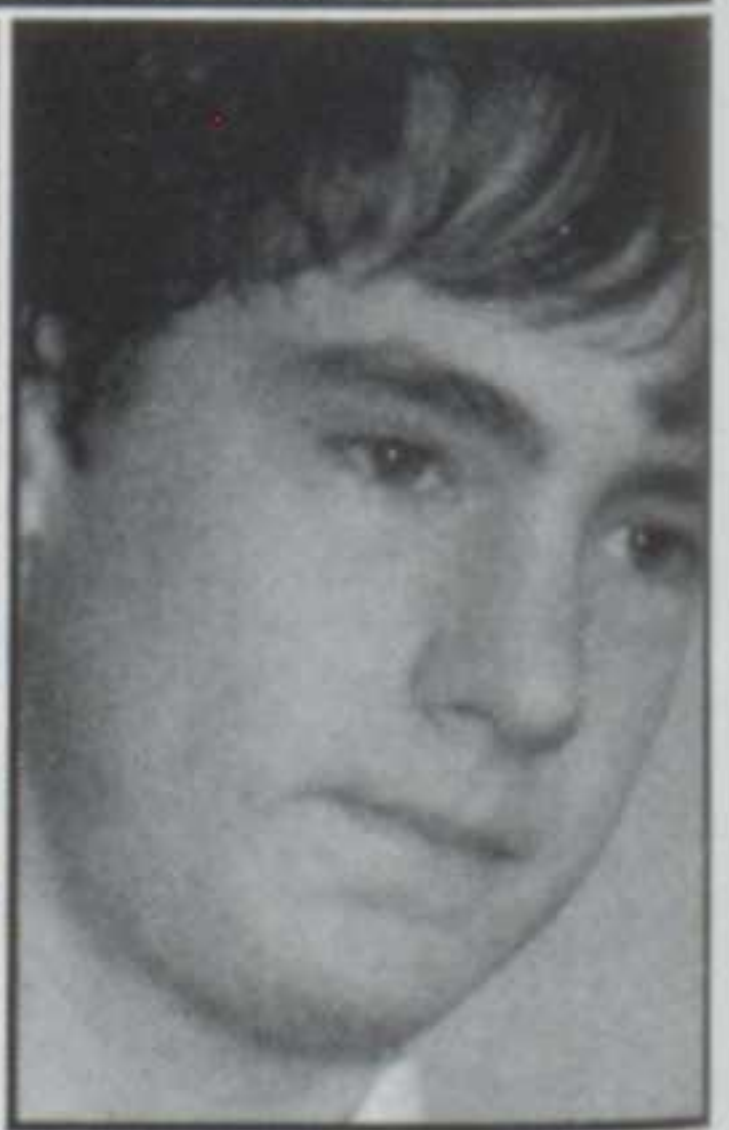

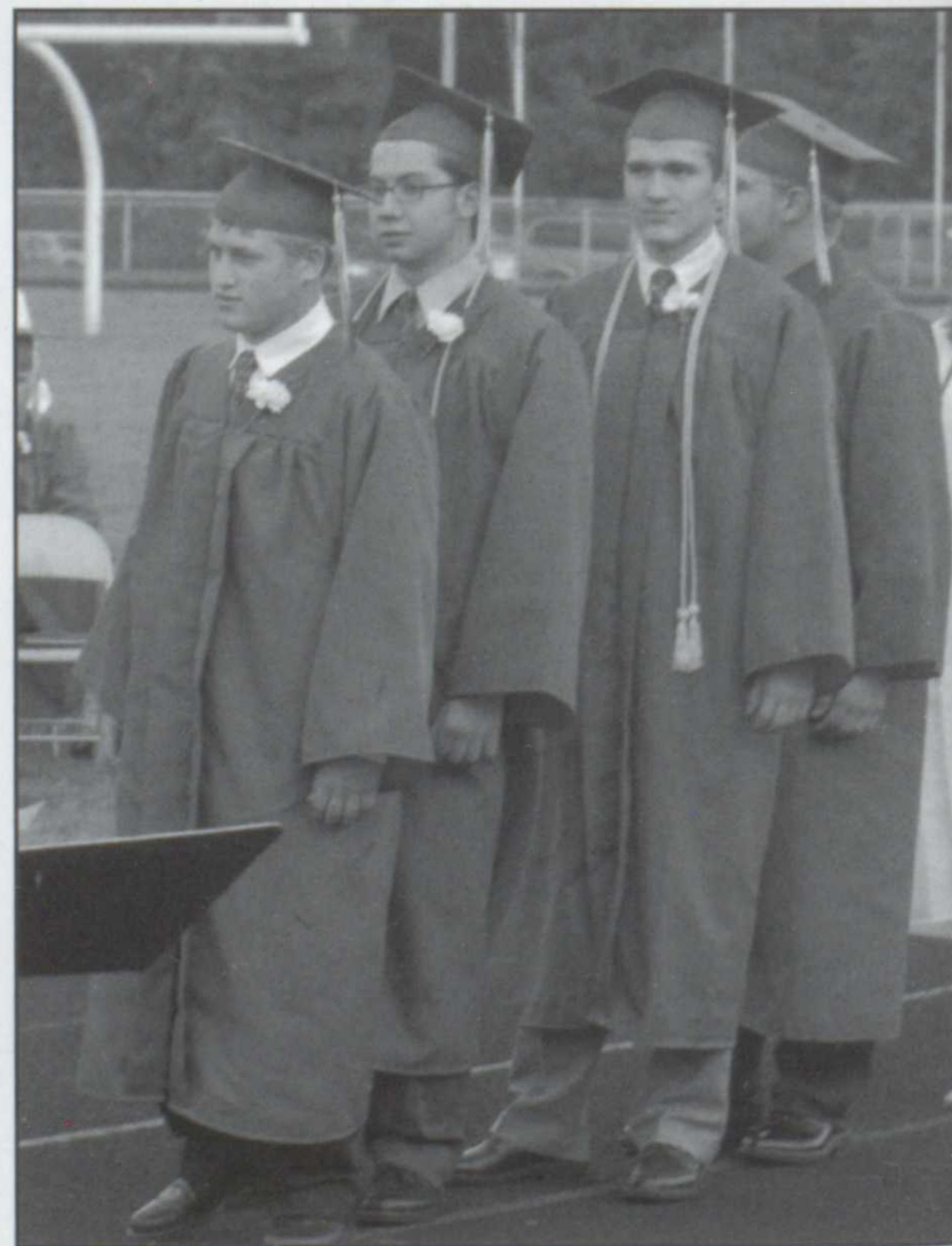

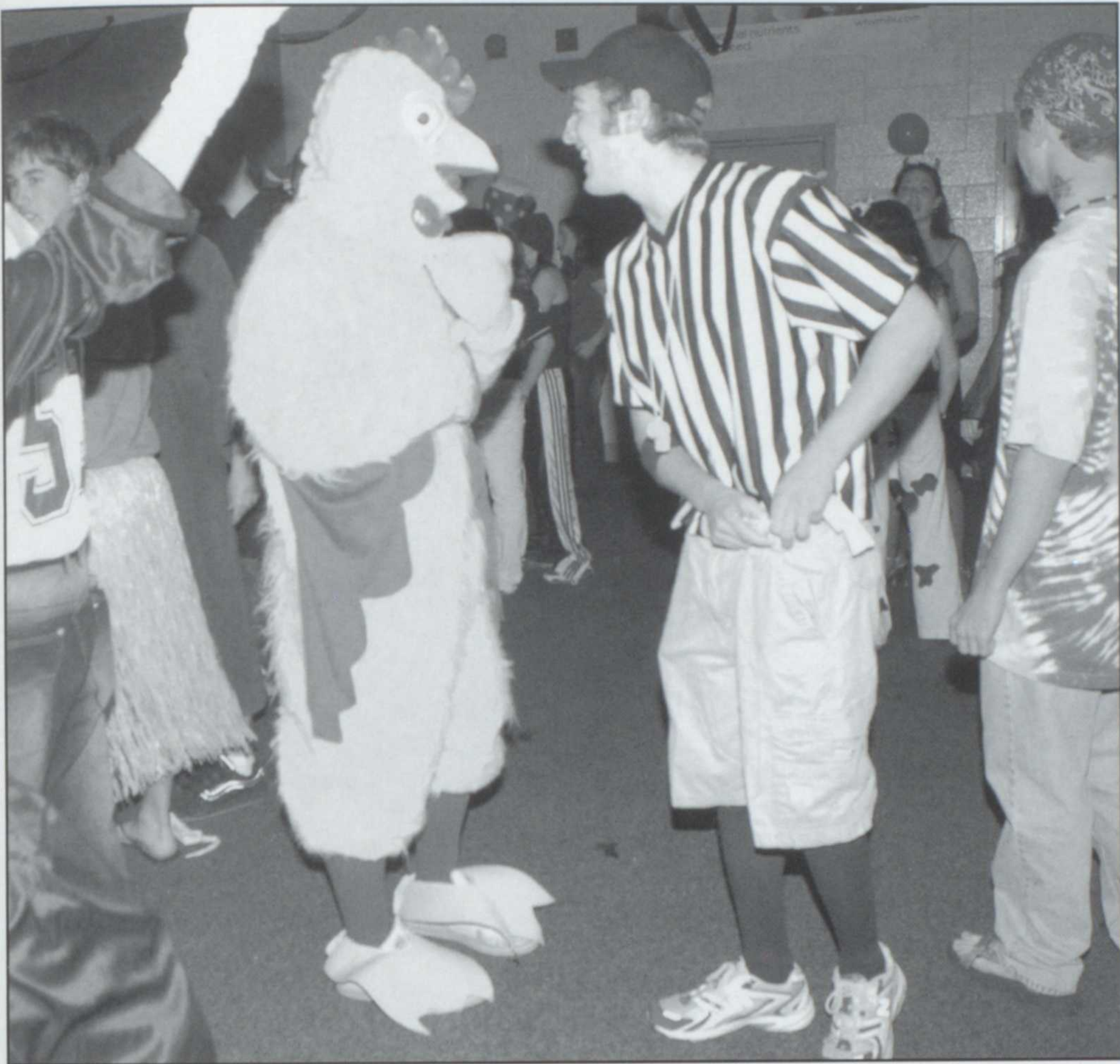

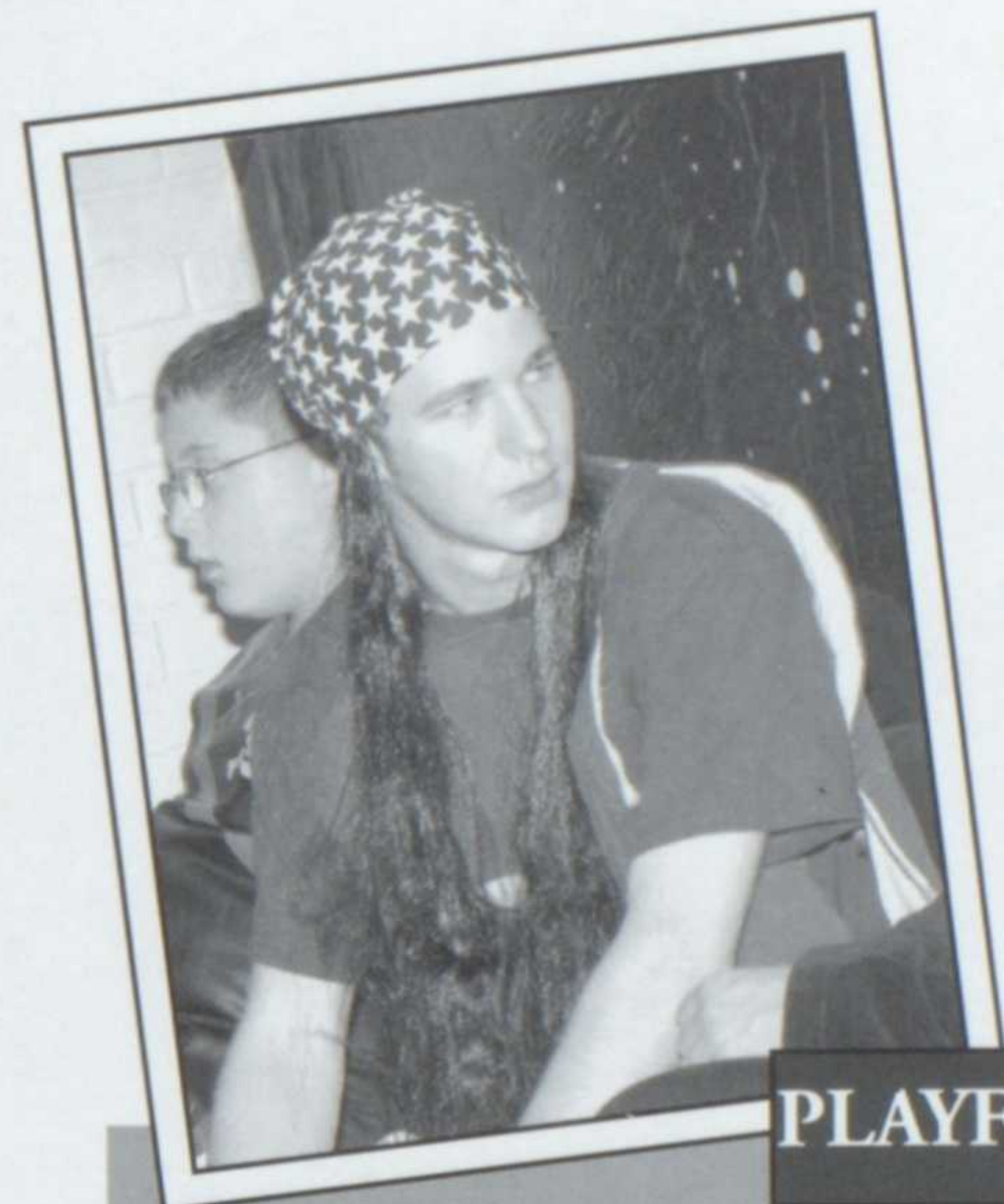

excited for the football game against Rocky River on Friday night. The burning pile of cardboard combined with the loud music provided by the marching band created a energetic atmosphere in the stadium.

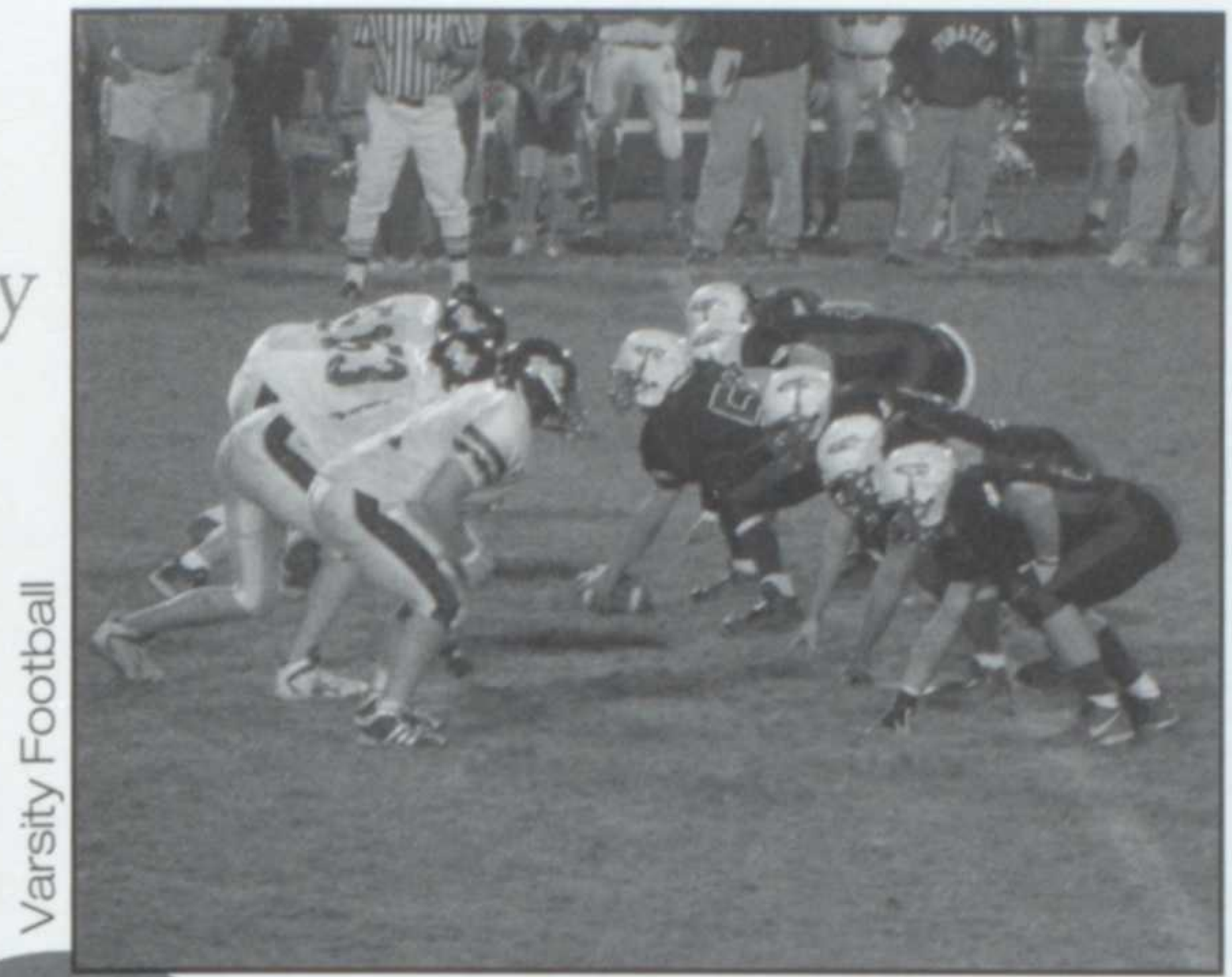

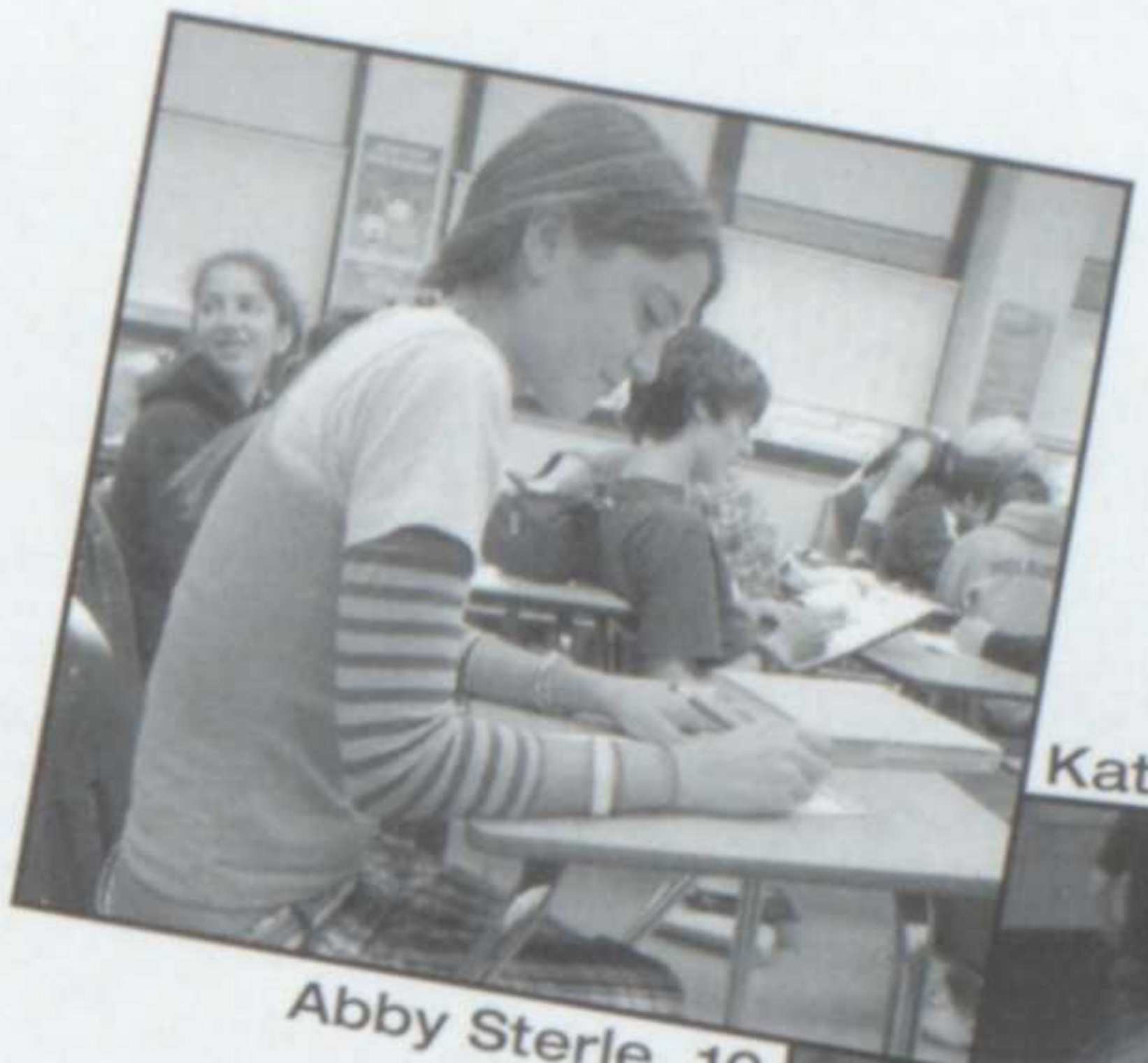
"For someone who is not in the parade, it is exciting to see the floats and the band dances," junior Viorica McLaughlin said.

It seems that no matter how busy students said they were, most found some time for religious practice. Although the majority of the students were Christians, the Shaheens, freshman Enas and senior Adeeb, represented a minority, Muslims.

"Some of the customs which I follow include praying five times a day. Even though I do not do it five times, I try and acknowledge that if I do it once or twice, I can build up on it. I do not consume anything that involves or has any pork or bacon in it. When I have to, I fast during Ramadon every year for at least 30 days. 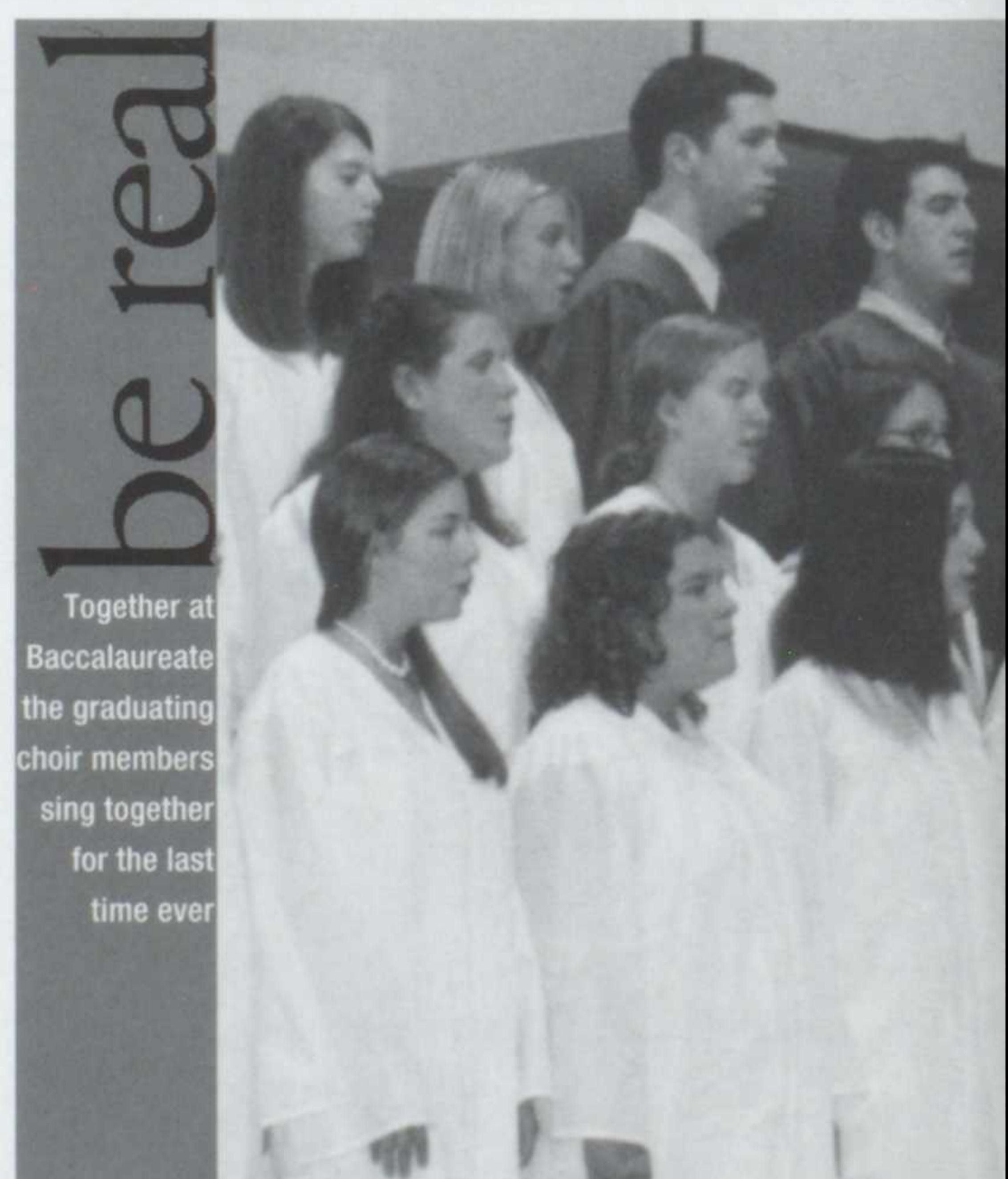
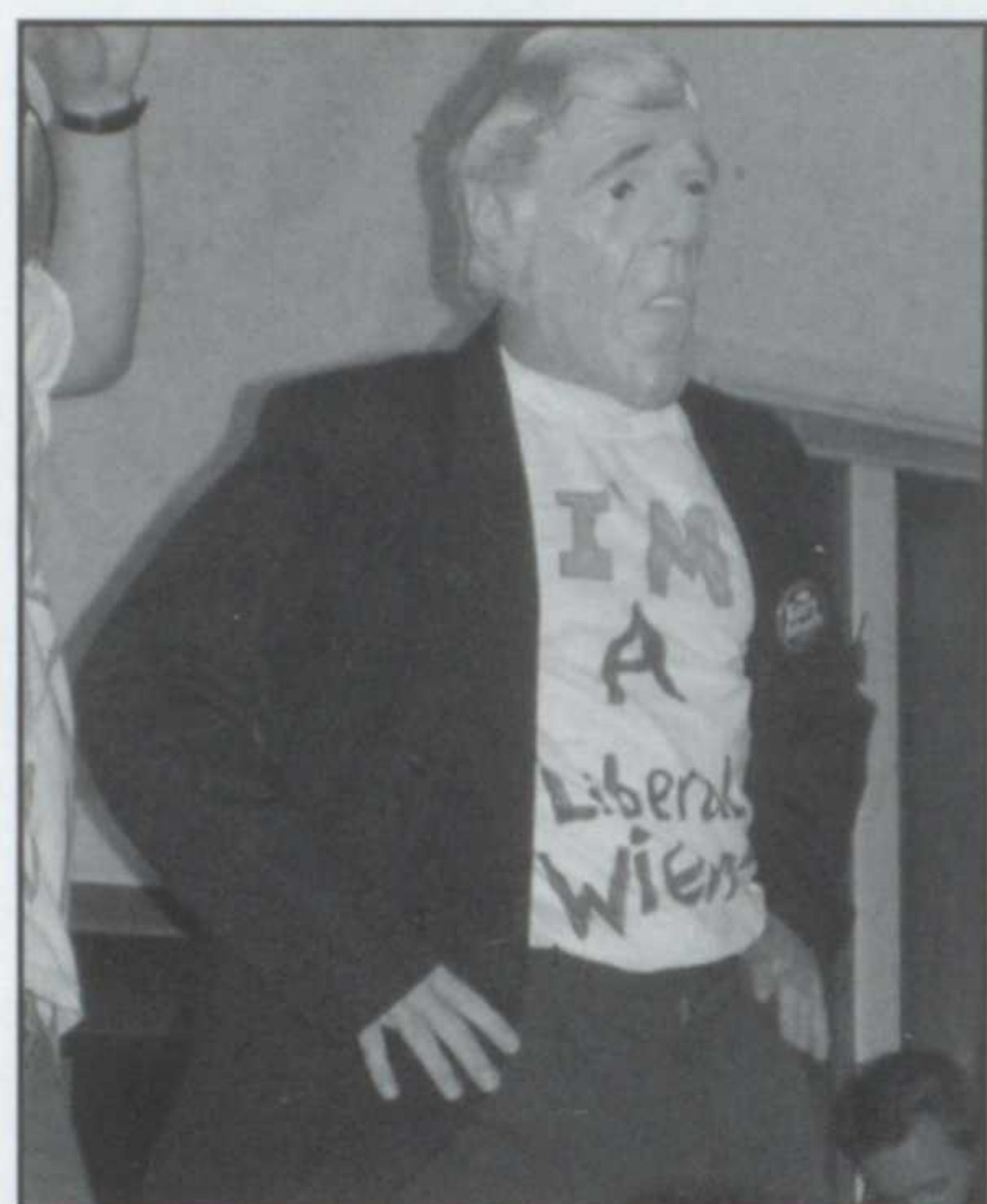

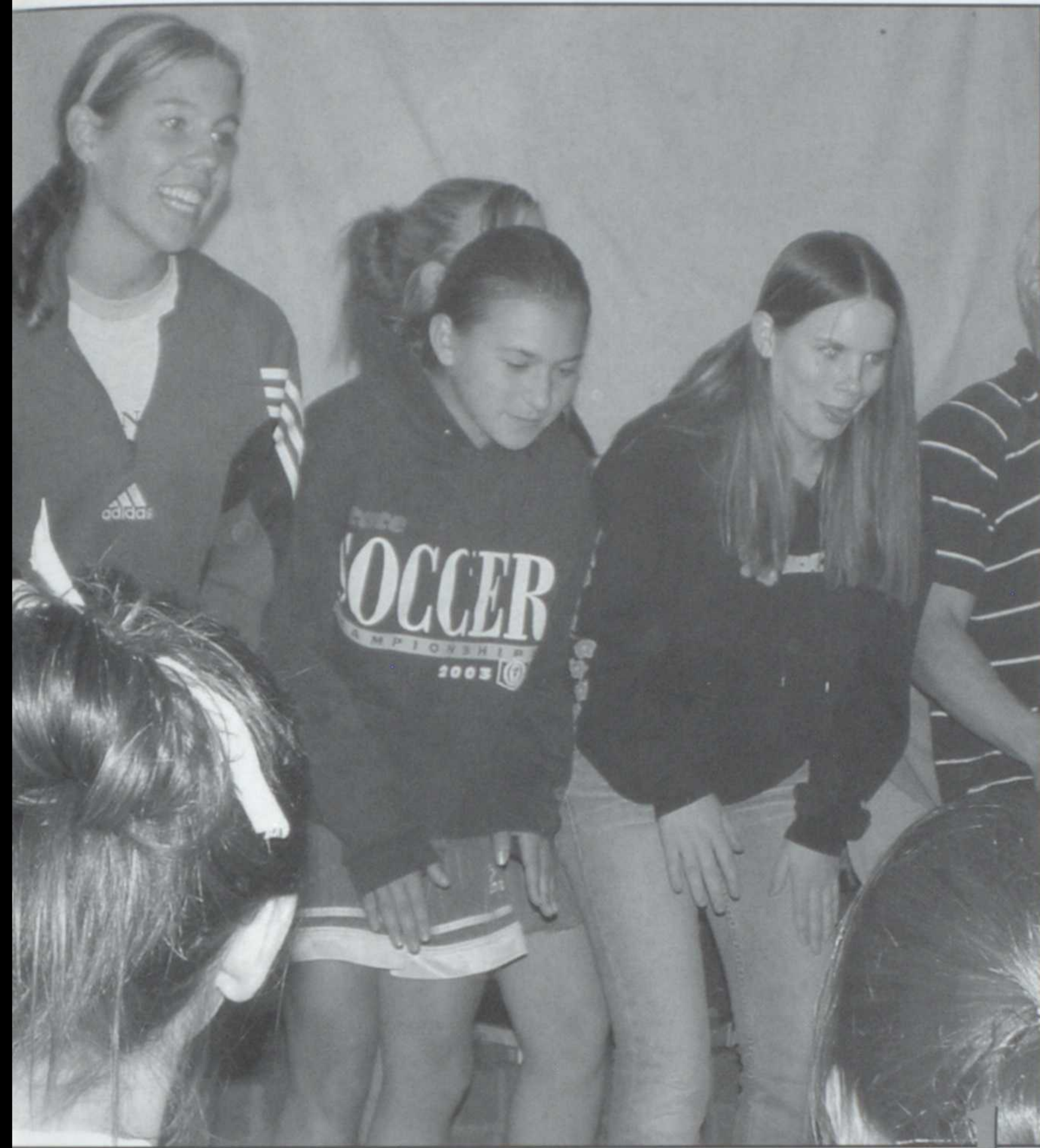

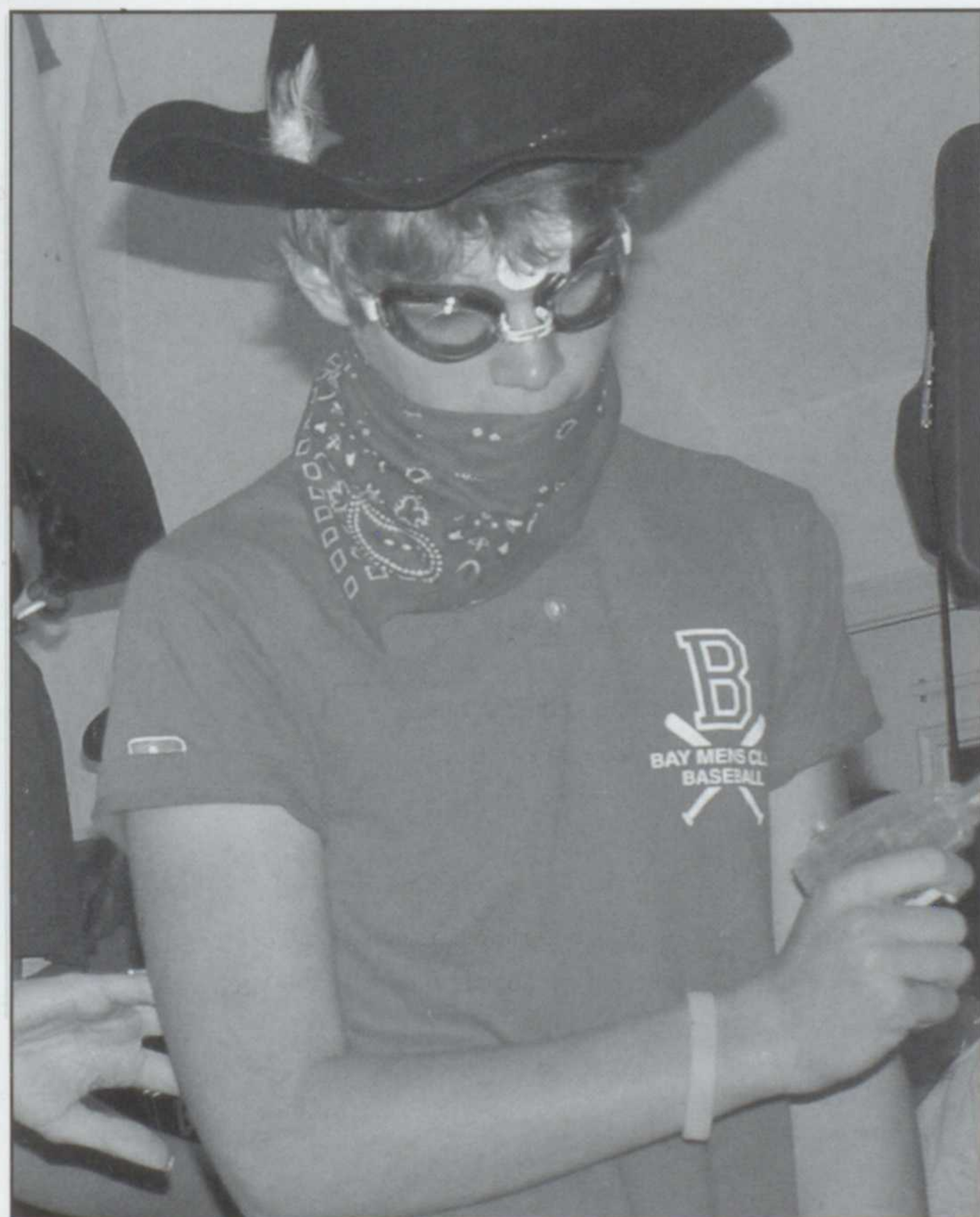

In addition to nuns, Nazis, and Austrian foothills, was the story of Captain Von Trapp,

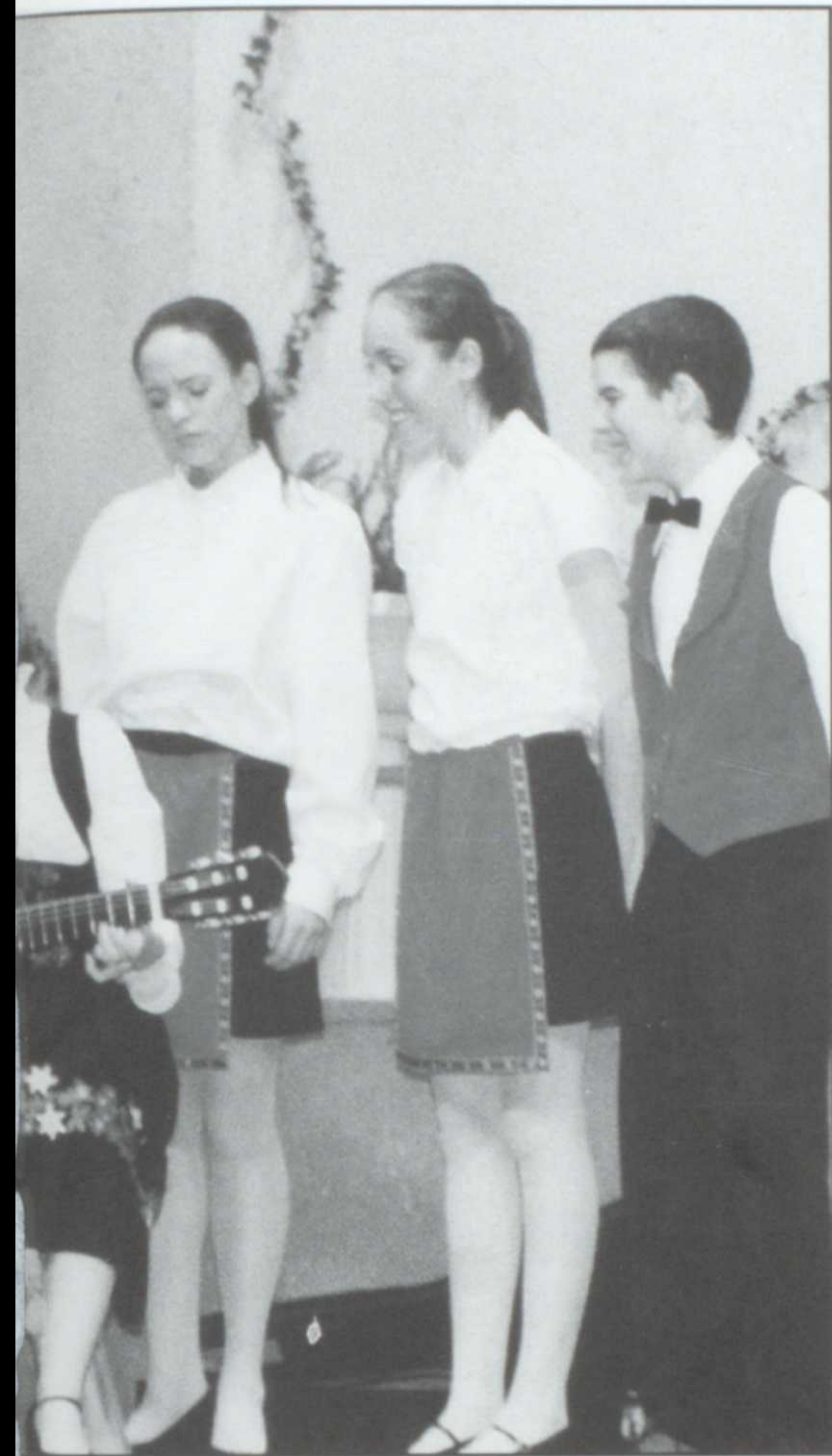

made a lot of friends, but I got in trouble because I didn't know what I was doing."

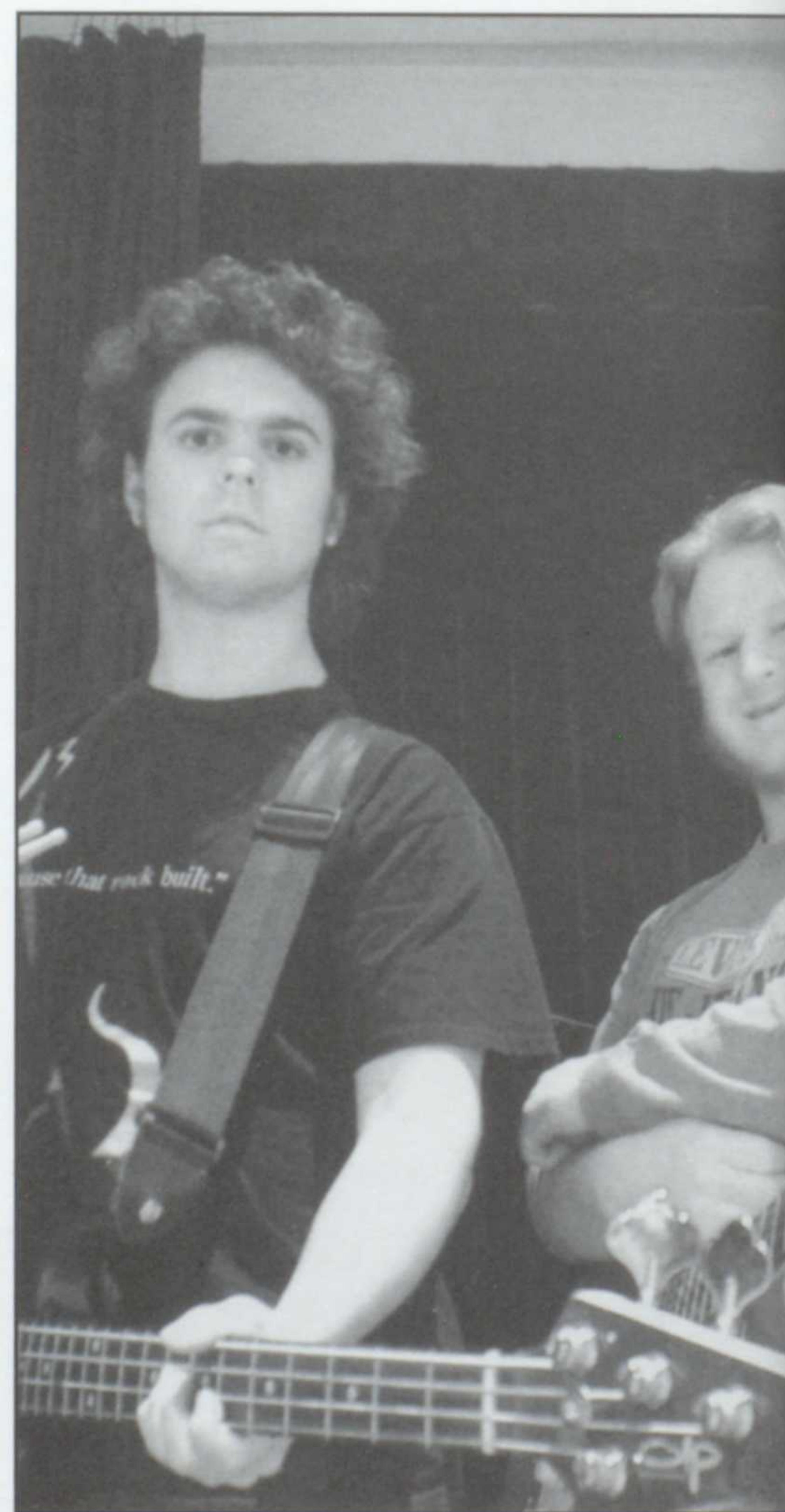
On November 13, the Thespian-sponsored Talent Show rocked the auditorium with 15 song and dance acts.

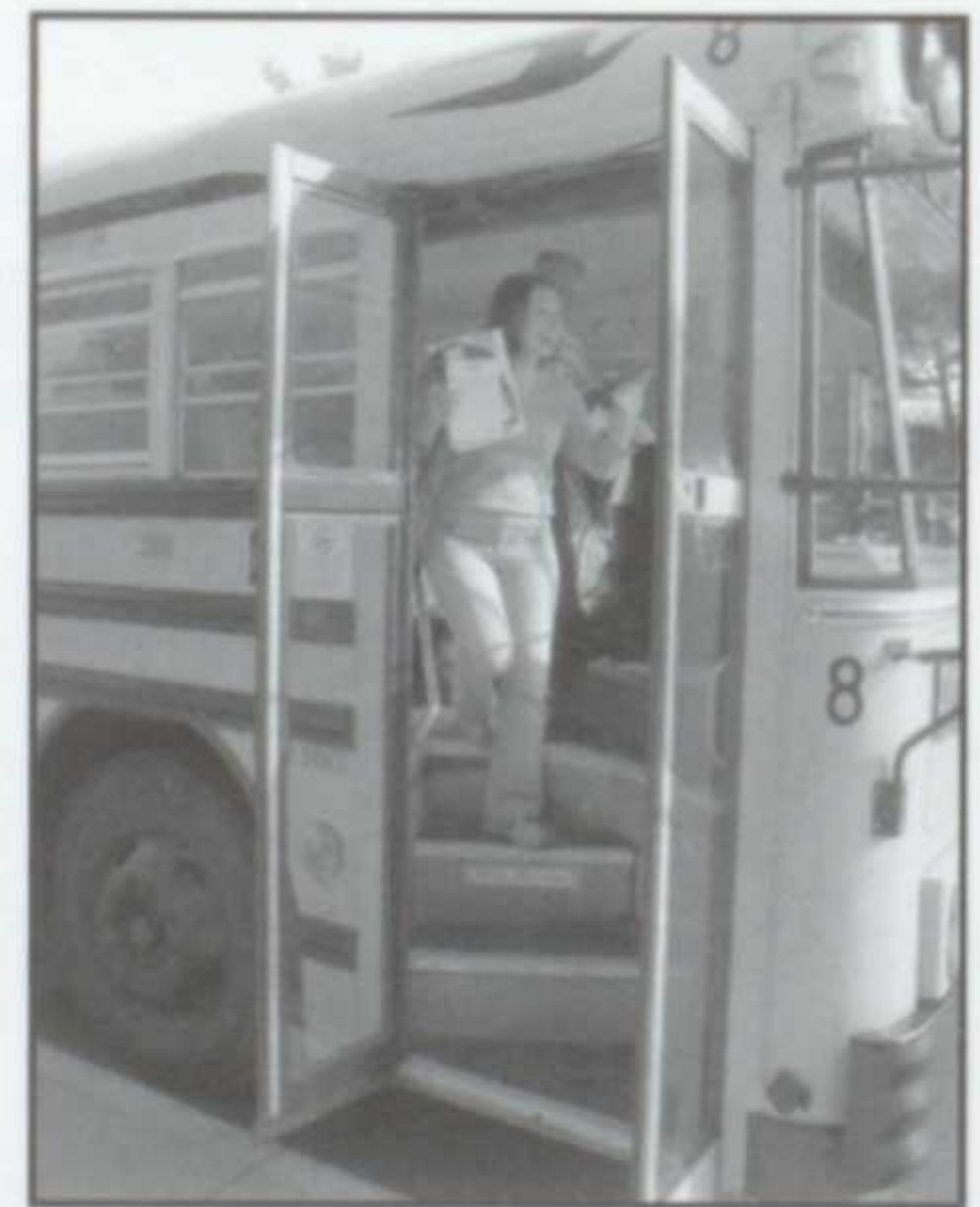
Every Tuesday and Thursday, the entire student body broke from their regular schedule after 3C for the Quality Resource Period (QRP). During QRP, students have the opportunity to

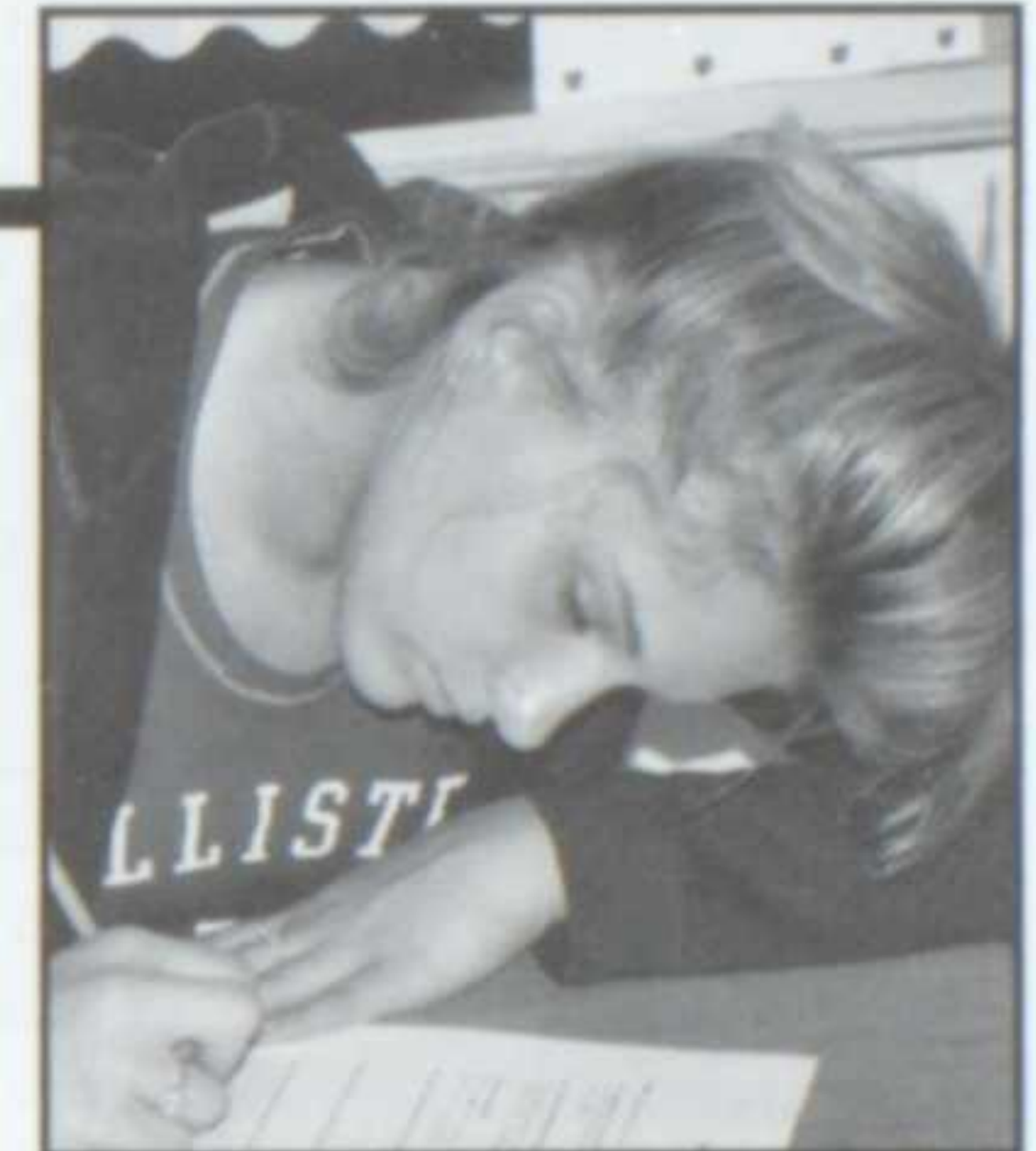

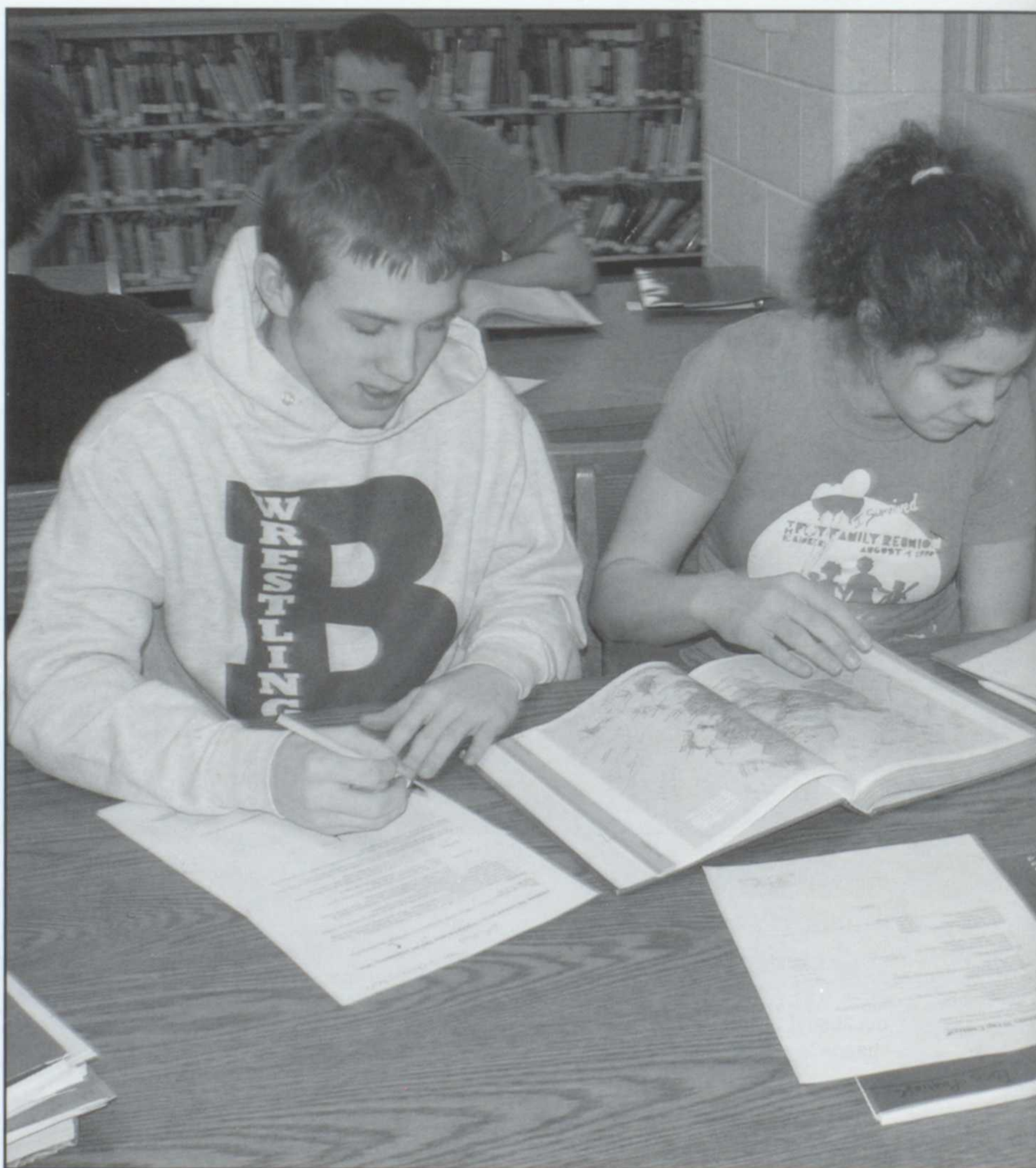
