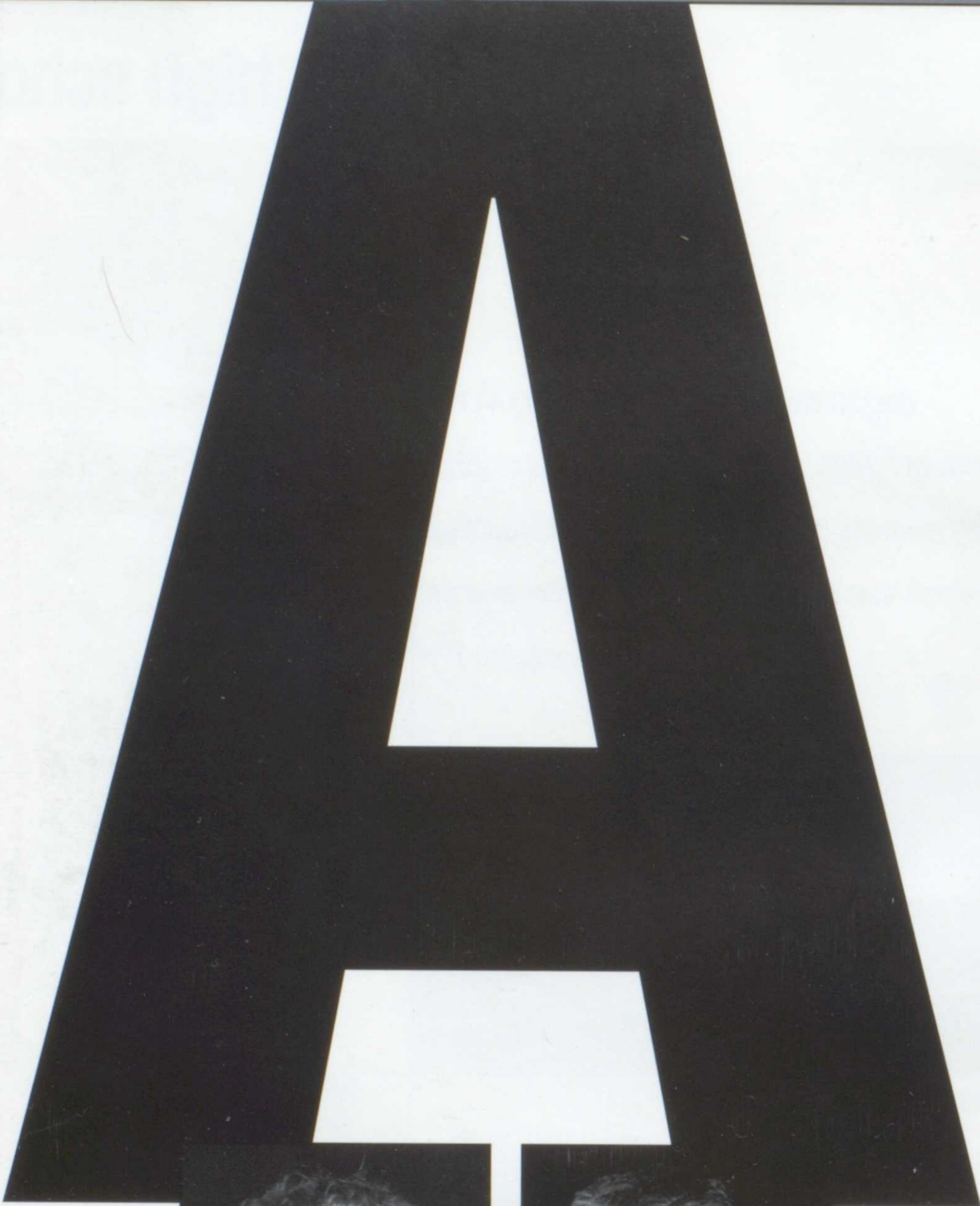

First, there was Plan A. You had expectations. You based your plans on those expectations. When things went smoothly, exactly as planned, Plan A prevailed and the Plan A coverage area is quite large.

Then there were times when everything was unexpected. Subtle, sudden, or spectacular changes resulted in stops and starts. Adjustments were made; plans were altered. Enter plan B. When plan B was the name of the game, the plan B part of the page is larger than A.

How did you see it? Everyone's expectations were different and each individual had a unique response to met or unmet expectations: *** GREAT! ** OK. *NOT GOOD.

Since Coolidge started as assistant adviser in 1972-73, the book has been printed by Interstate (Paul Retrum), Intercollegiate (John Brandt & John Fowley), Taylor (Cindy Carty), Hunter and Jostens (Judy Allen). There have been five senior photographers, (Speigel, Reinker, Briggs, Schultz and Thomas) and six photography advisers, Tim Wagner, Lynn Mead, Jennifer Schwelik, Sarah Perrier, Karen DiBenedetto and Kathy Hitesman.

The 1974 *Bluebook* received a 4th class rating from CSPA. **Laura McCarthy** and the 1975 staff captured a first place in state competition at BGSU. In 1976, **Joe Patton's** book received the first of 28 Buckeye awards. The 1977 *Whole Bay Catalog* captured the first of 27 Medalist ratings. The natural gas shortage caused schools to close their doors at 4:00 P.M., forcing production to editors' basements. (The book lost the *Bluebook* name that year, also.) Editors **Susan Fain, John Davis, Martha Raymond, and Rhonda Clark** received an All-American rating. There would be 26 more. **John Davis' 1979 book *Now Look What You've Done!*** received a Trendsetter from CSPA during the spring convention. **Nancy Coffin** was the editor of *What's the Catch?* (Gold Crown) and *Small Change* (Pacemaker).

In 1982 **Beth Abdalla, Beth Chapman, Lisa Huhndorff, Tricia Keane and Tim Marsden's *Laying it on the Line*** was the first book to receive both a Pacemaker and a Gold Crown. Other books which received the dual distinction were **Cindy Westervelt's 1987 *Look Who's Talking*, Sarah Perrier's 1992**

Would We Lie to You?; **Mike Fujka's and Marcy Conklin's 2001 *Make Fun of Bay*, Ali Tramba and Lauren Knisely's' 2003 *Little Things*.** Bay's yearbooks racked up 28 *Buckeye* awards, 27 *All-Americans*, 26 *Gold Medalists*, 7 *Silver Crowns*, 9 *Gold Crowns*, 13 *Pacemaker Finalists*, 7 *Pacemakers*, one *Trendsetter* and one *Publisher's Industry Award*.

Only six editors besides **Nancy Coffin** actually edited two books: **John Davis, Mike Fujka, Ali Tramba, Lauren Knisely, Michelle Bauknecht.** There were four sets of sibs who were editors-in-chief: **Amy Minardo ('95 *Do We Have to Spell it Out for You?*) Kathryn Minardo ('97 'Year'book), Erika Lindgren ('96 *Pay/Bay*) Gwen Lindgren ('00 *Sounds Like Bay*) Jeff Vlasek (*block book*) and Emily Vlasek ('02 *In an Instant*).** In 1983 (*Just Goes to Show You*) the **Matzinger twins, Lynn and Diane**, edited the book. Believe it or not, in 1988 (*Some Things Never Change*) there was no editor-in-chief! **Michelle Bauknecht ('05 *be Yourself*)** has the distinction of being the only editor in Coolidge's 34-year advising career to make all her deadlines

Marcy Conklin and Mike Fujka (2001) traveled more than any other editors: San Diego, CA; Visalia, CA; Las Vegas, NV; Muncie, Indiana!

Judi Coolidge was honored with CSPA's Gold Key, NSPA's Pioneer Award, GLIPA's Hall of Fame, and OIPA's Scholastic Journalism Hall of Fame. She was also named Bay Teacher of the Year (1991) and a Martha Holden Jennings Scholar. She was named National Yearbook Adviser of the Year in 2002 by JEA.

Academic Basis is what school is all about. These blocks cover classes offered in every department and during every block. Every day, students spent 366 minutes in class, 46 minutes in lunch. They also spent between 25 and 29 minutes in the halls between classes, depending on their schedules. Every Tuesday and Thursday a Quality Resource Period, QRP, allowed students 40 minutes to meet with teachers, counselors, project groups, etc.

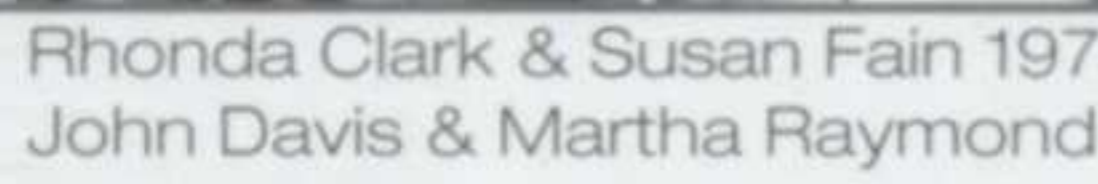

Because of the extracurricular nature of yearbook production, staff members learned the nuances of page design, copy writing, and graphics from each other. Holding a meeting when all staff members were able to attend was nearly impossible. As a result, production was a catch-as-catch-can affair with editors and staff putting in hours after school, in the evenings and on Saturday and Sunday mornings.

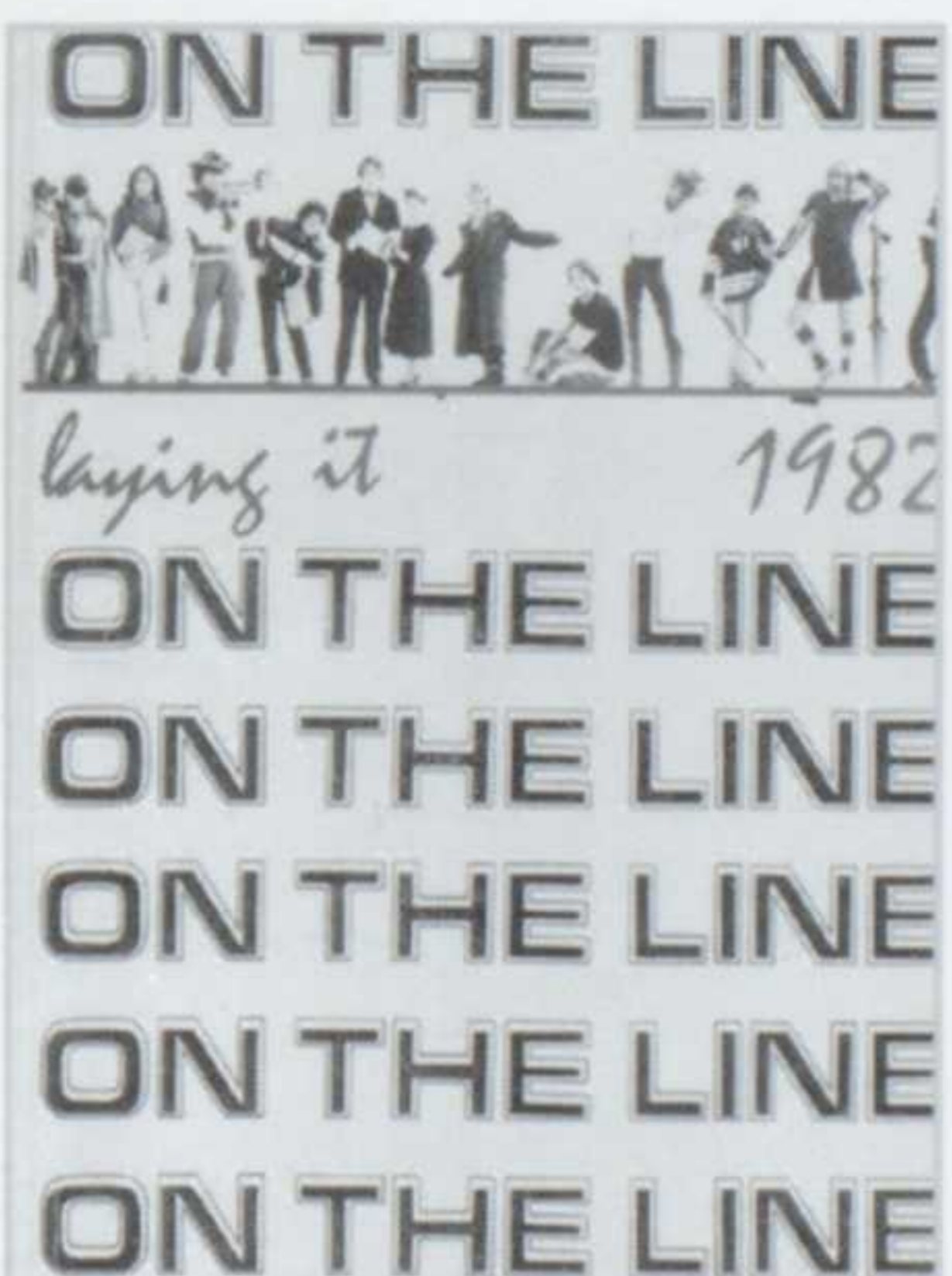
Few teachers, parents, employers, or love interests understood the hours logged in the "pub" or someone's basement. Staff members had lock-in weekends when they never left school. They shifted to earlier church services to maximize Sunday morning work hours. Thousands of lunches and dinners were consumed while creating spreads. The staffs fueled-up on junk food: chips, candy, pop, popcorn, bagels, cookies.

Yet, yearbook editors and staff were involved in music, sports, art, almost every extracurricular activity.

A teachers' strike in February, 1992 made *Would We Lie to You?* a prophetic theme. Editors were not allowed to meet with striking adviser Judi Coolidge. As a result, Jostens rep. Judy Allen relayed messages to the staff from Coolidge. For his inflammatory underground newspaper, editor Chad Mercer was the only student expelled during the strike.



1978 (4), 1982(5) & 2006 (3) marked years with more than two editors in chief. At times the system didn't work. In 1978 the editors met with Counselor Dale Shelby to try to iron out their difficulties. (A father accused Coolidge of creating a cult.) At the other extreme, two 1982 editors dated, a first. The 2006 editors, the sole collection of juniors editing a book, sang *I'm a Nut* and danced the *Microwave* to survive.



The 1988 yearbook staff was arrested after the final deadline. As yearbook rep. Cindy Carty kept Coolidge occupied, the editors and staff adorned her house & yard with "lawn art": stoves, refrigerators, couches, carpeting, signs, toilet paper, etc. When the Avon Lake police arrived, only the sports staff escaped. Twenty-two staff members had to do 32 hours of community service over spring break.

Already Been there



After graduating from Michigan with a degree in engineering, **Captain Lisa Huhndorff**, 1982 editor in chief, had a distinguished career in the Air Force, flying missions around the world. In 1997 she joined Northwest Airlines and flew Boeing 727s. She was promoted to first officer in 1998. A scholarship at the high school was created in her honor.

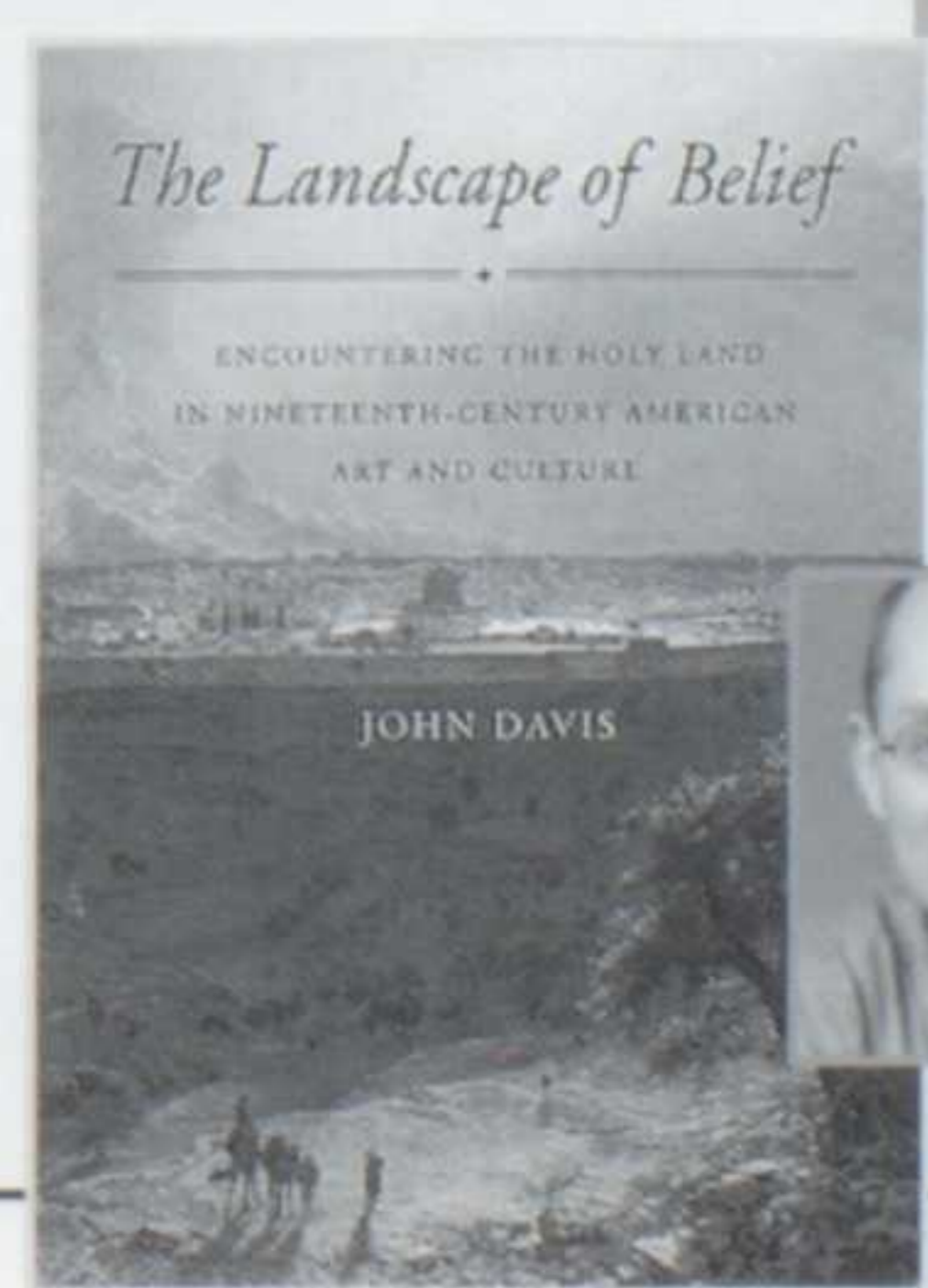

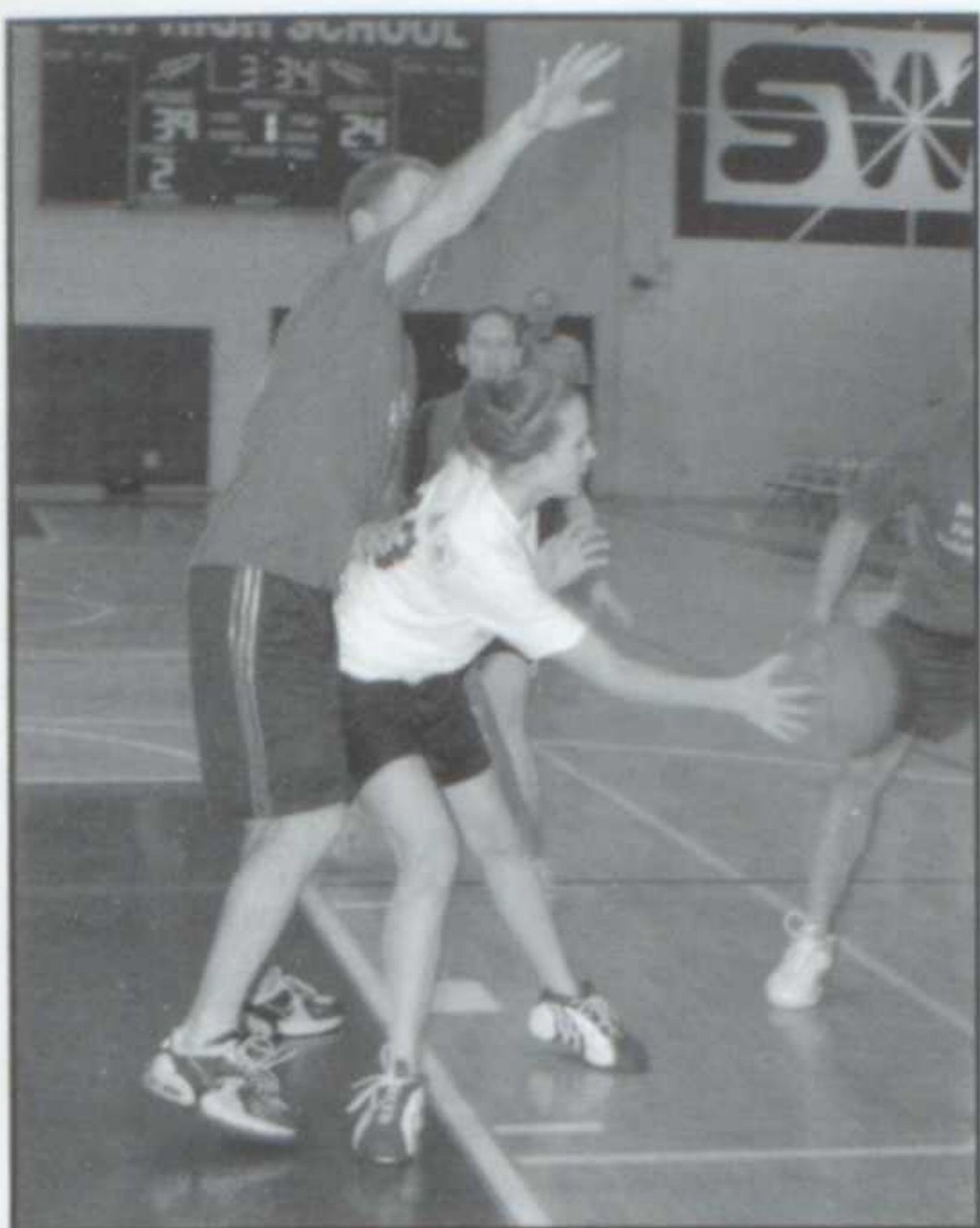

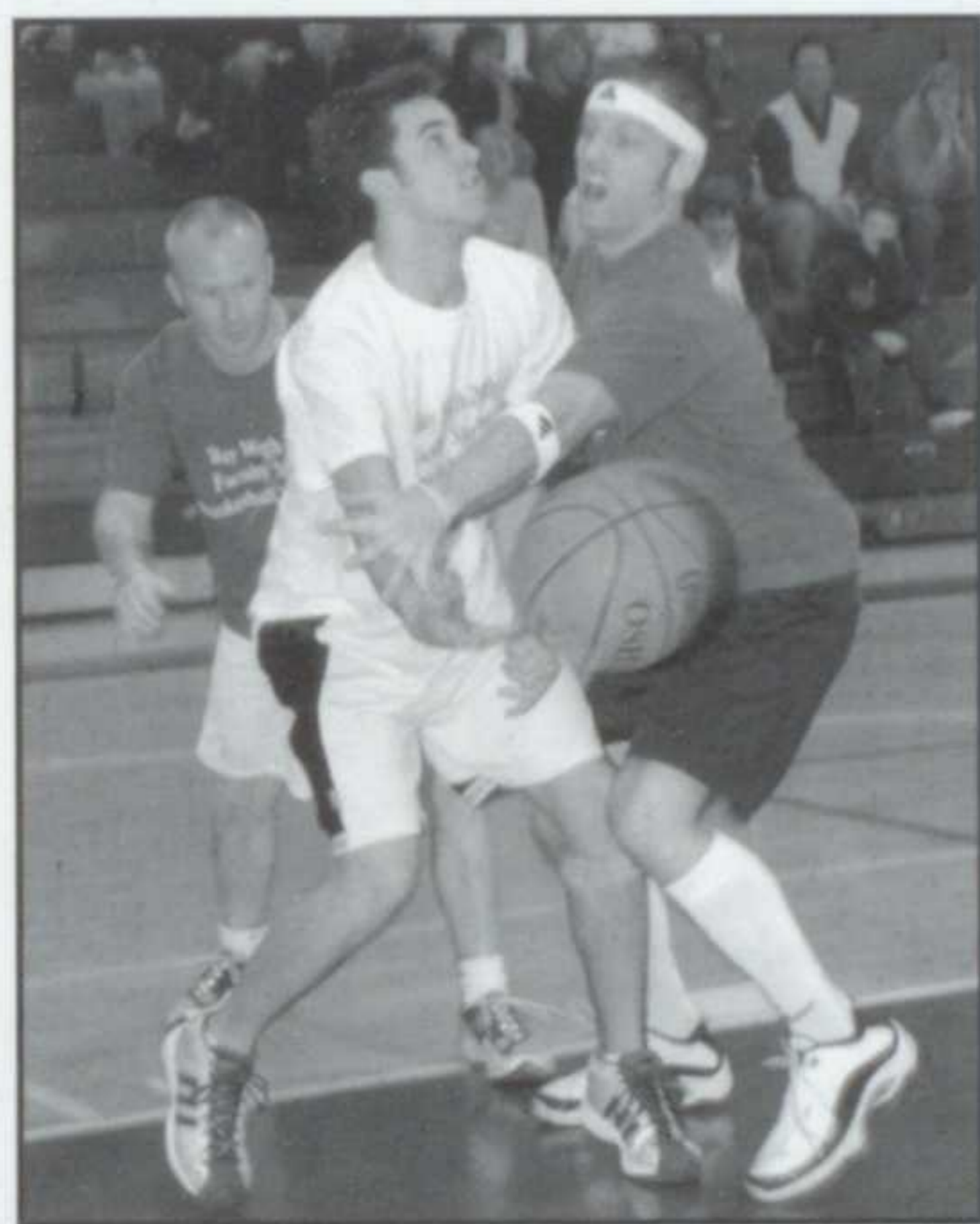

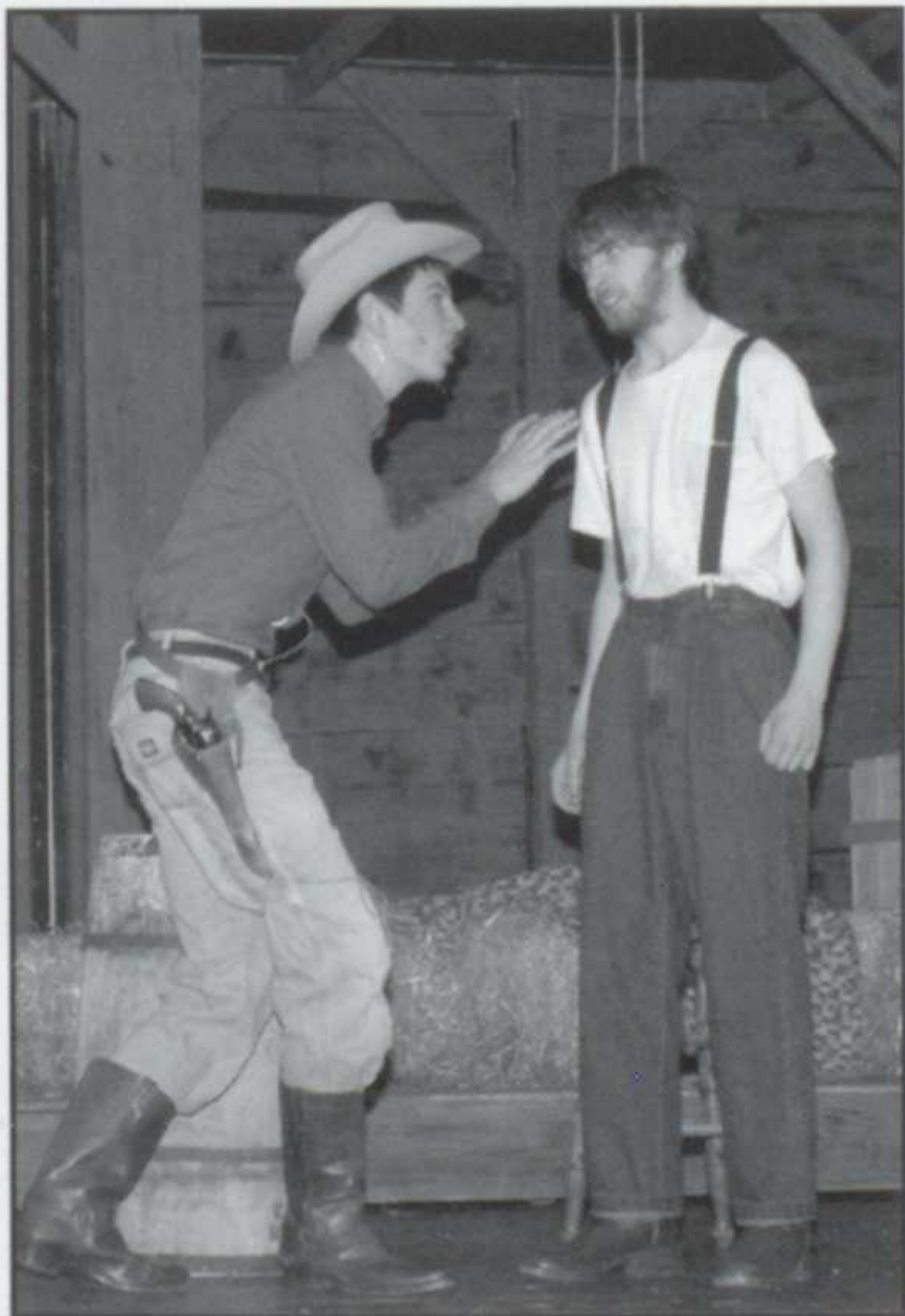

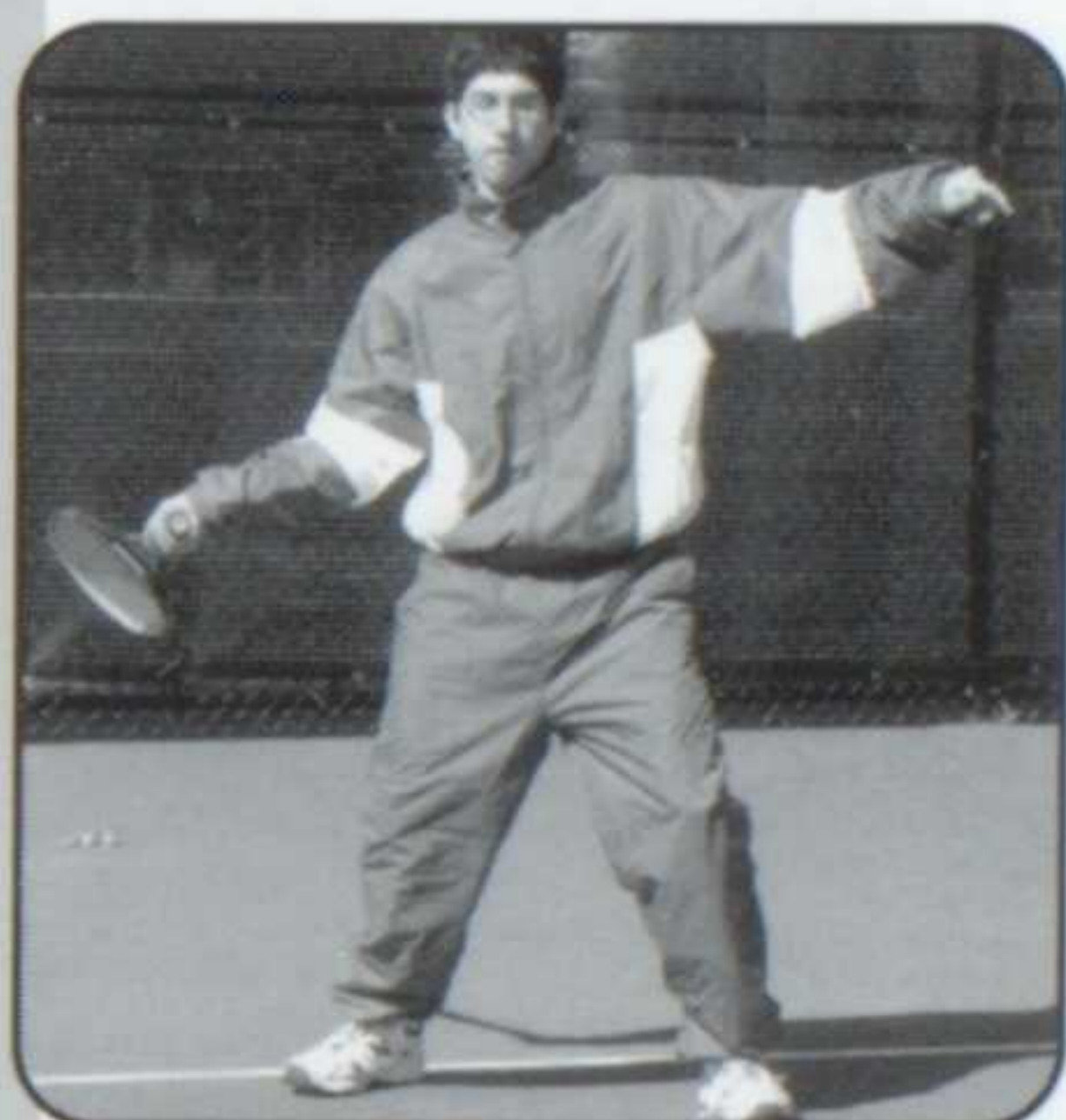

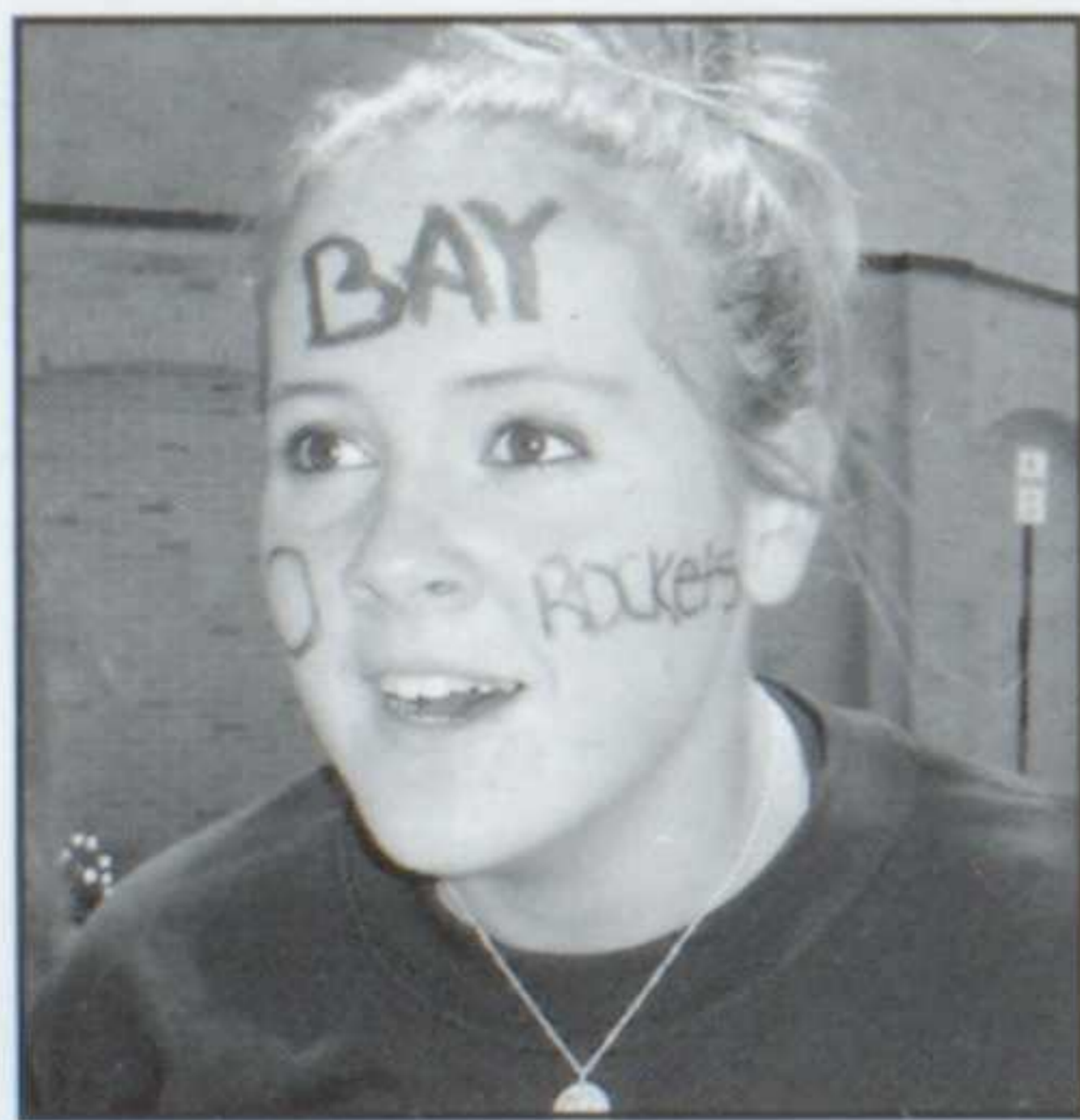

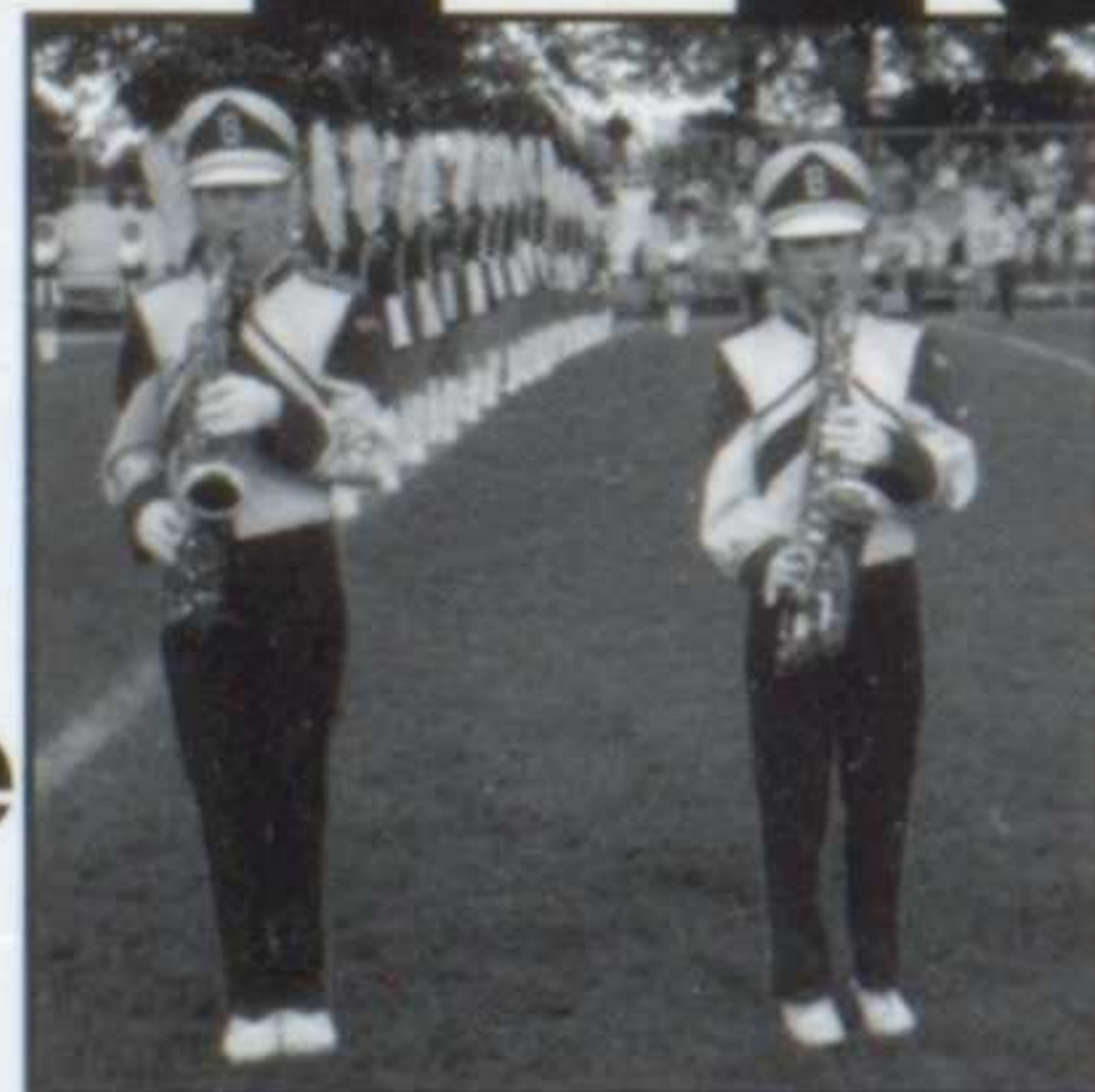

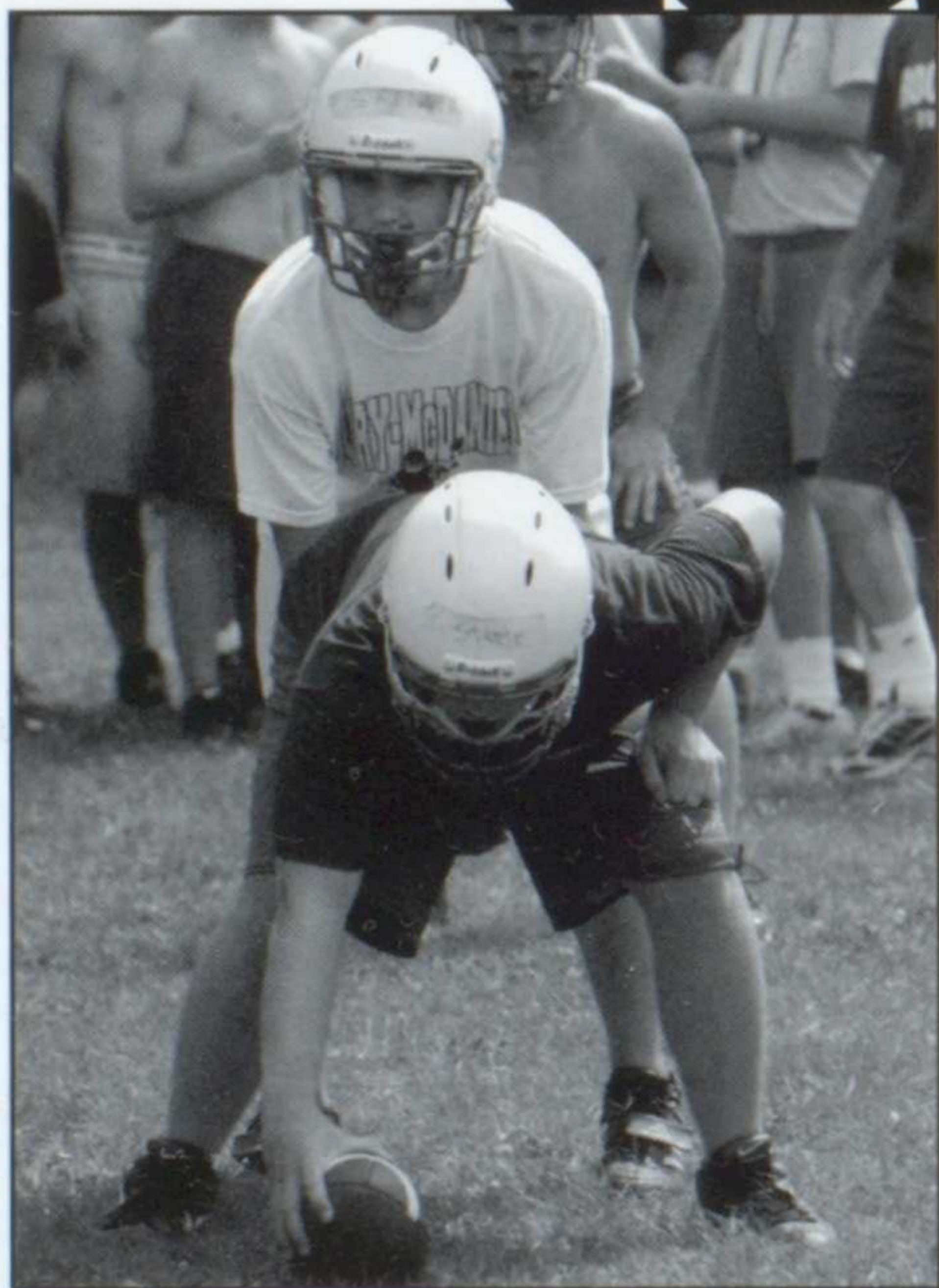

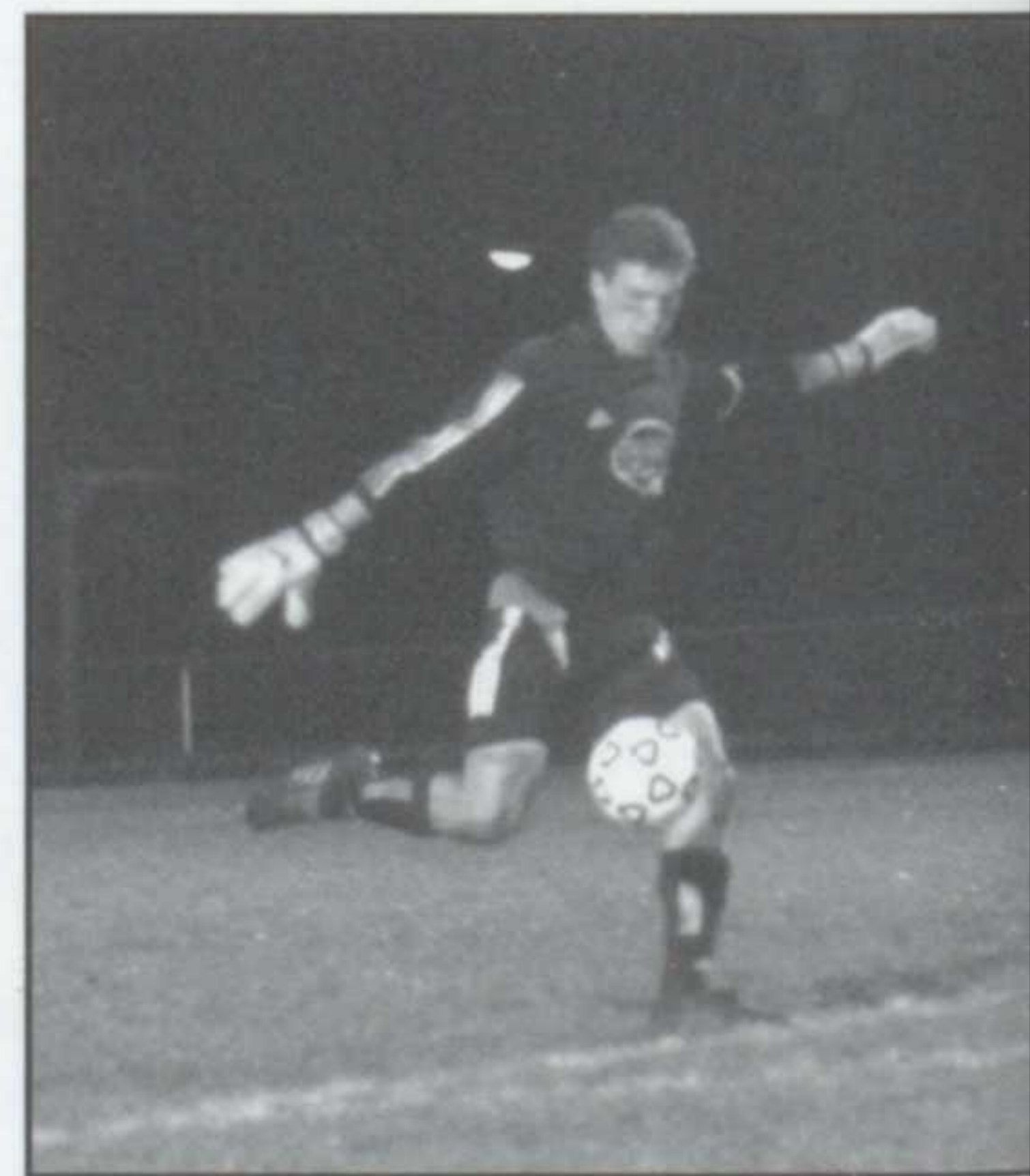

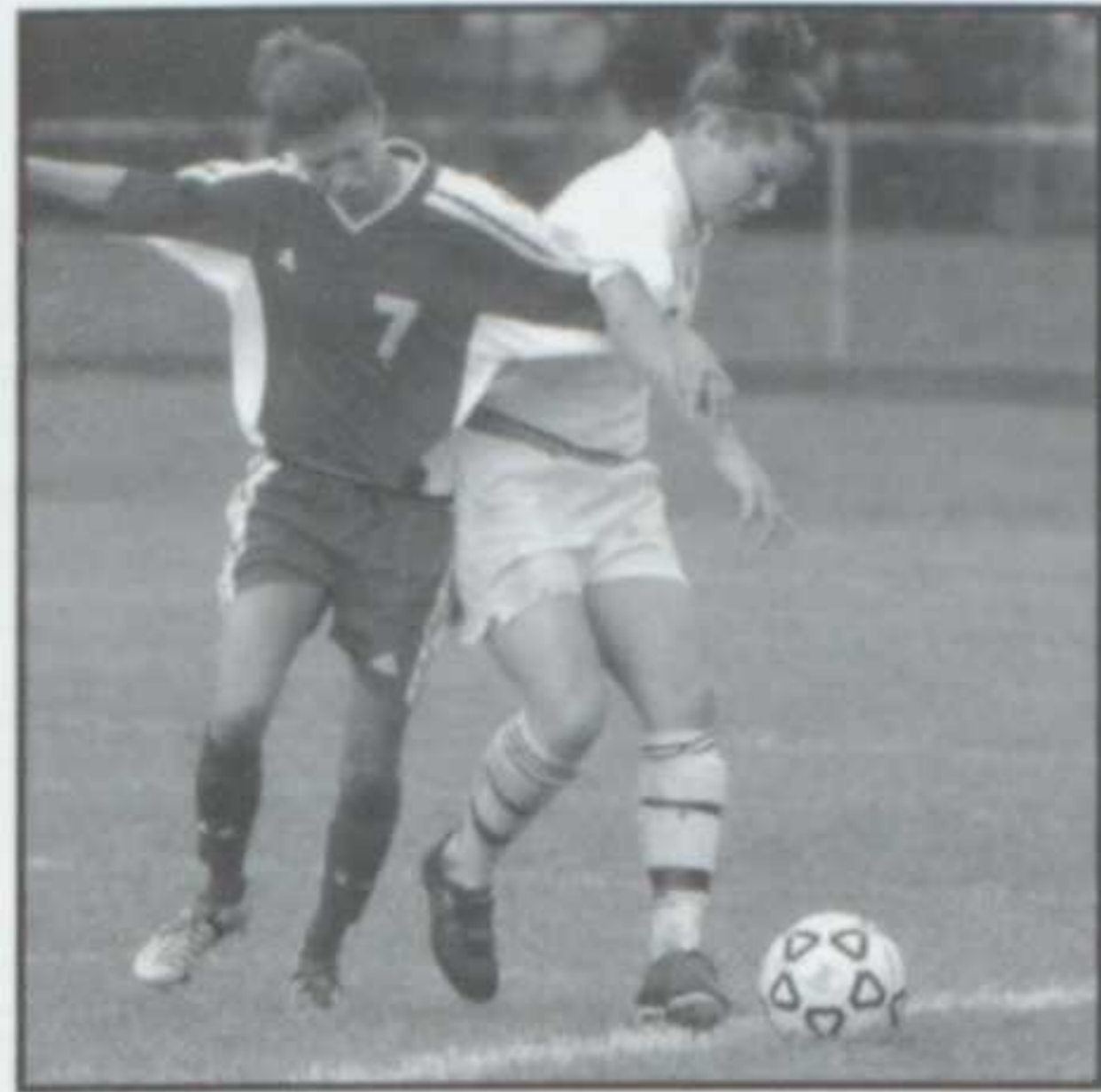

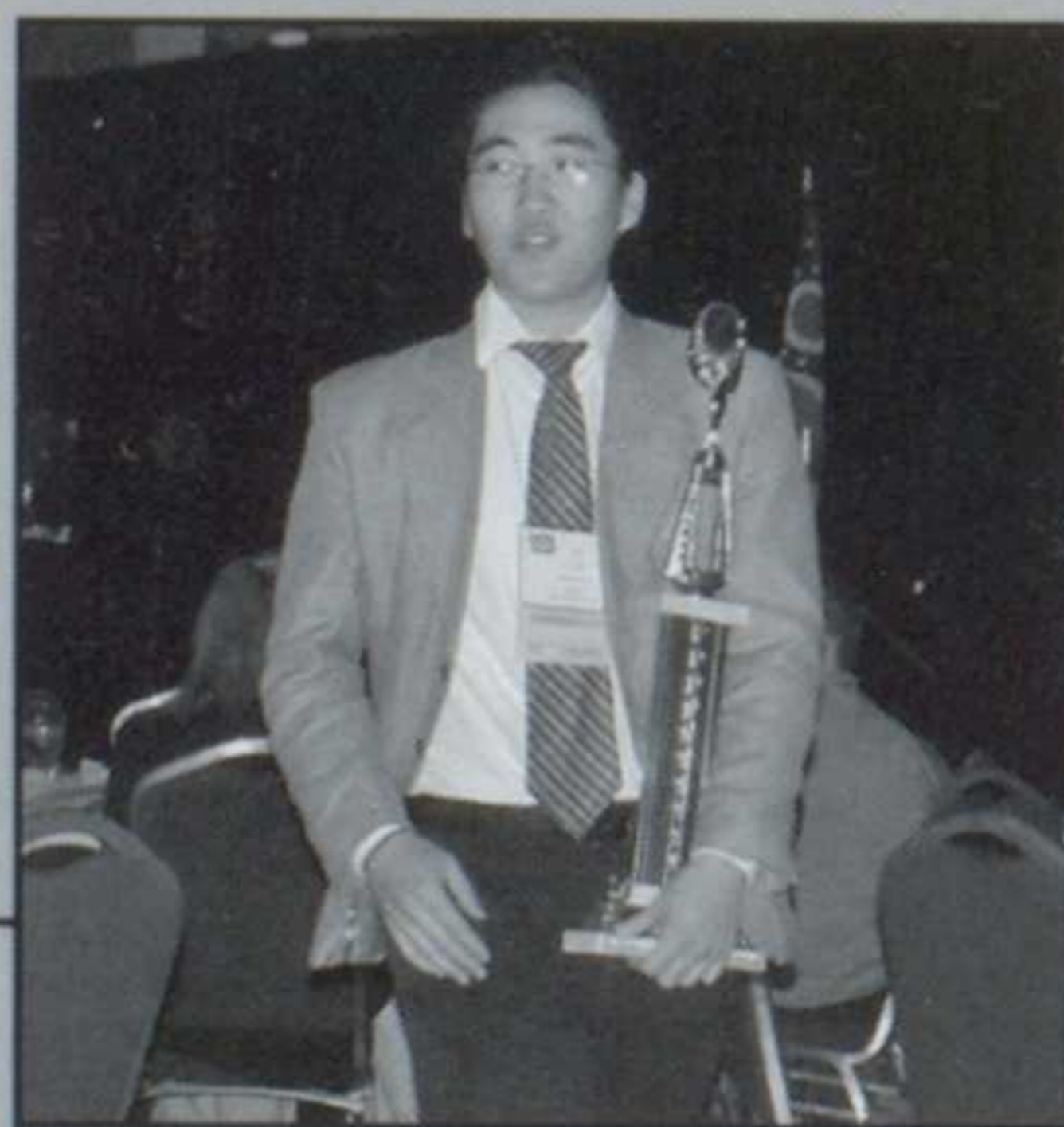

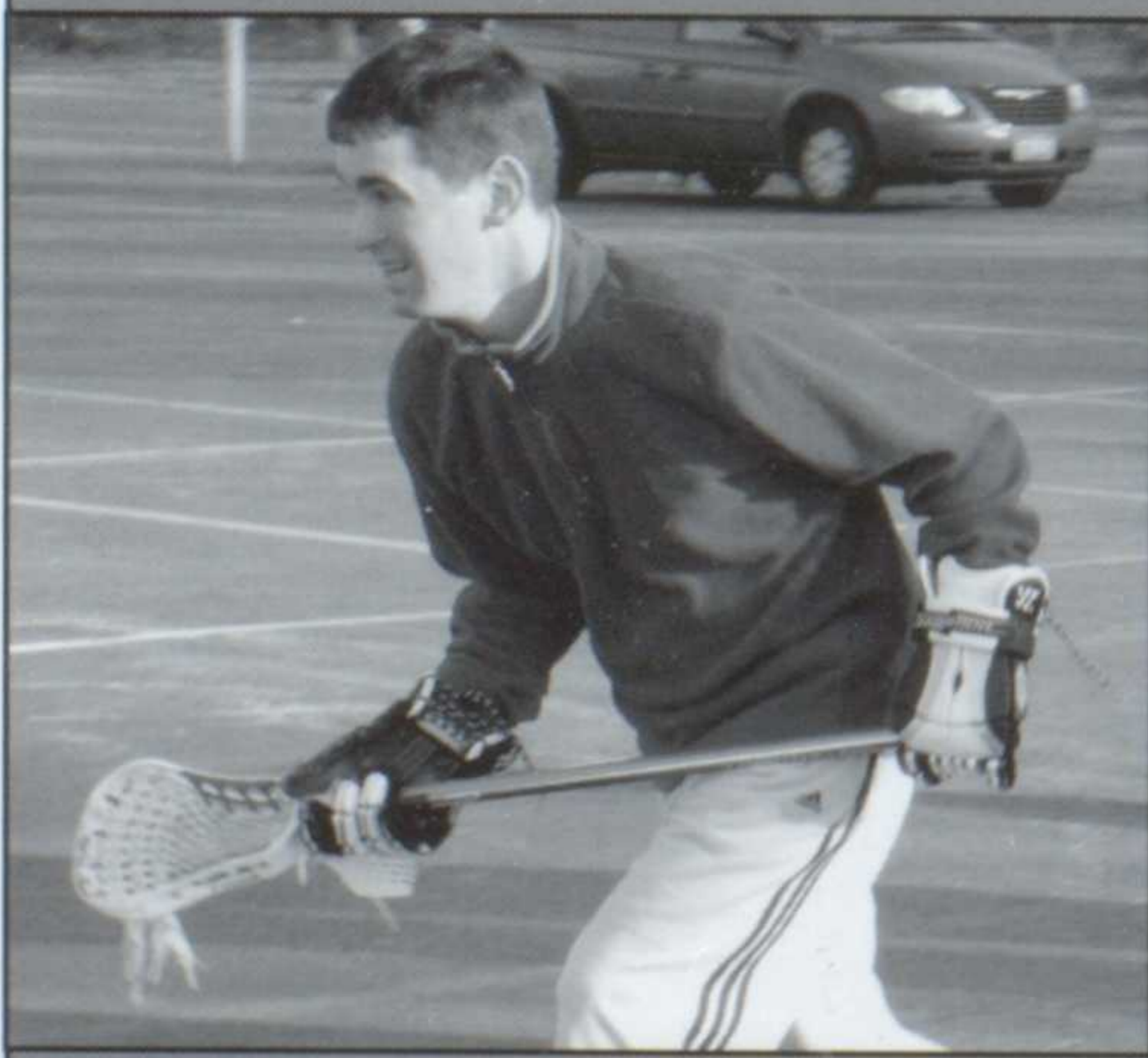

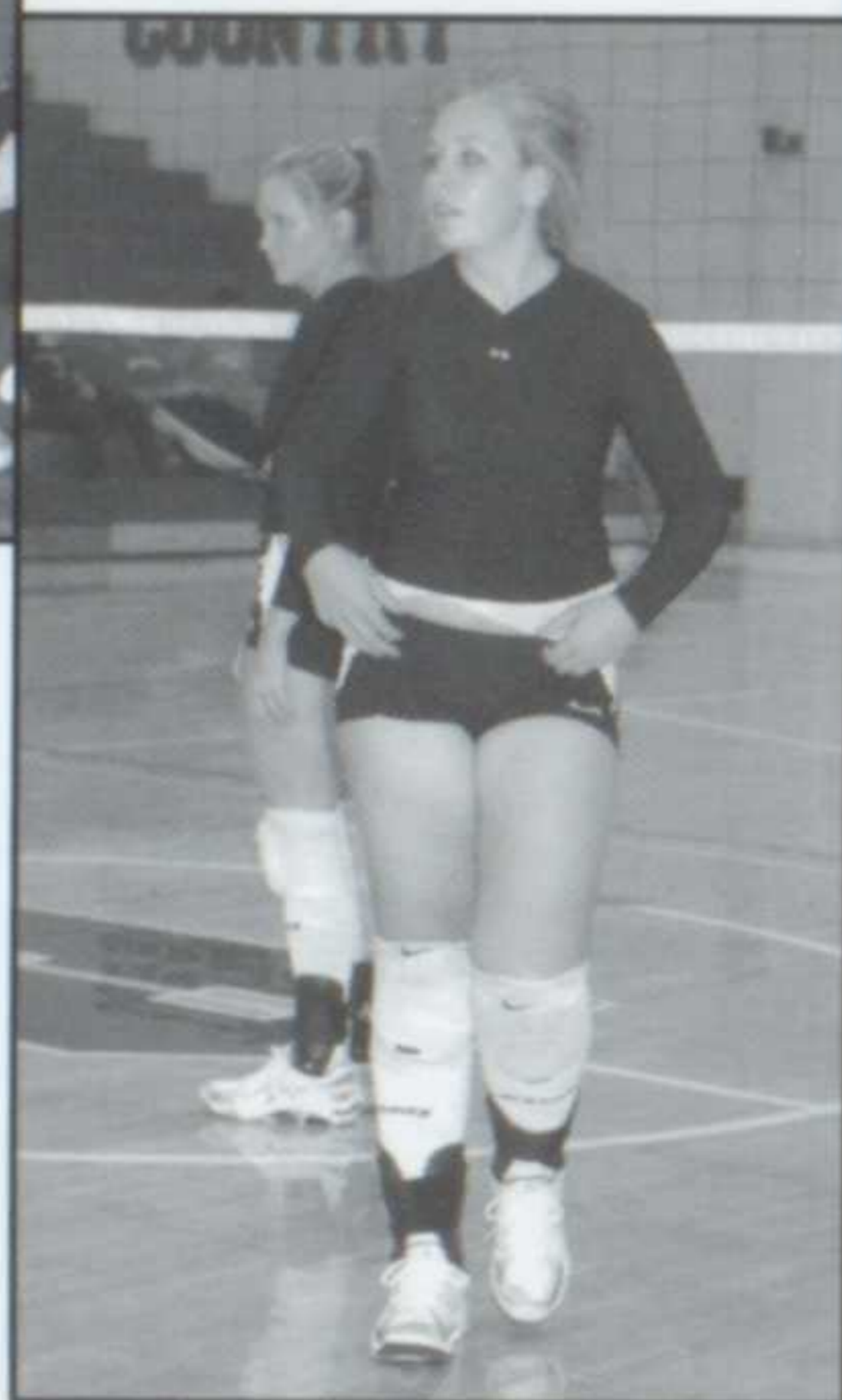

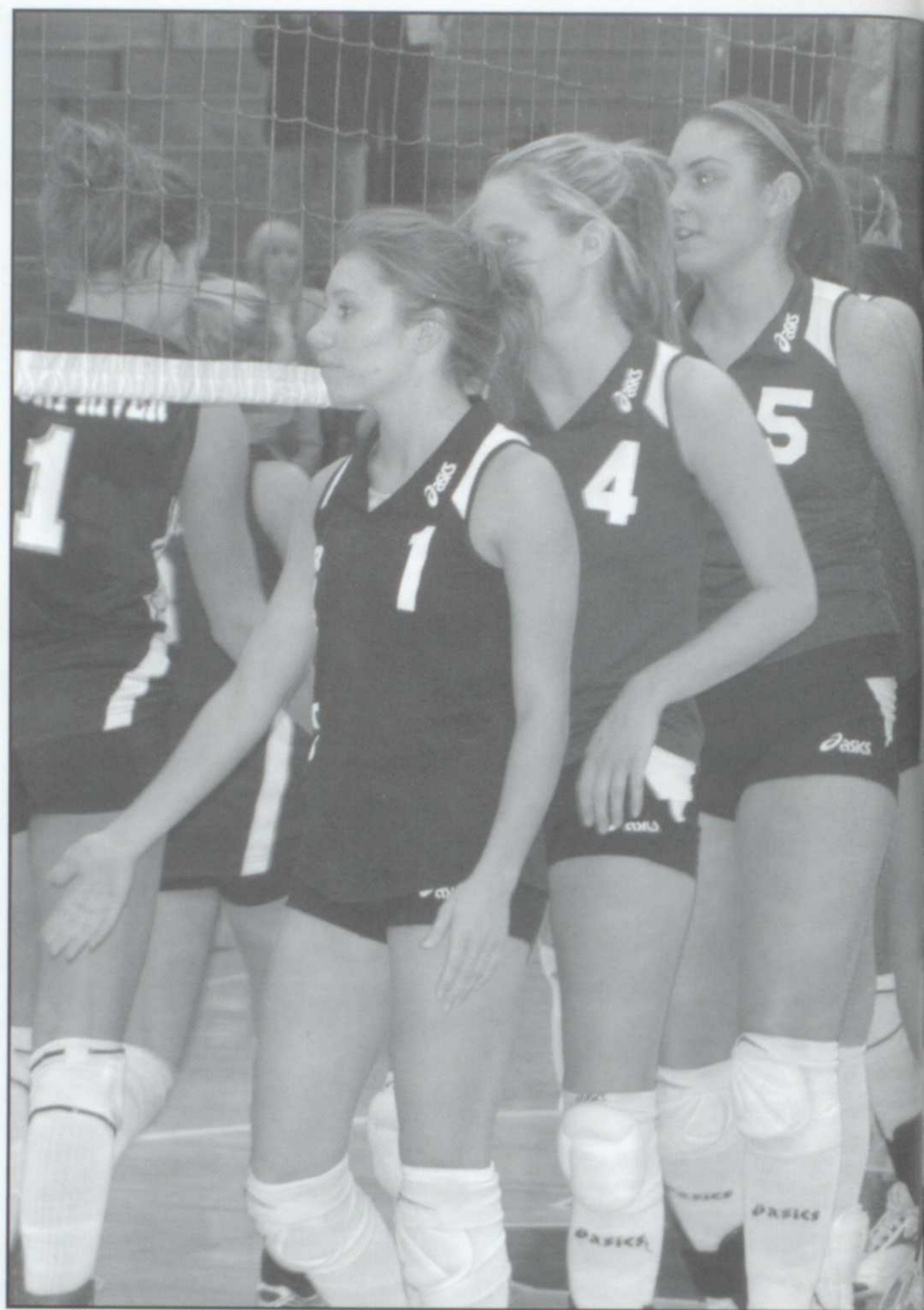

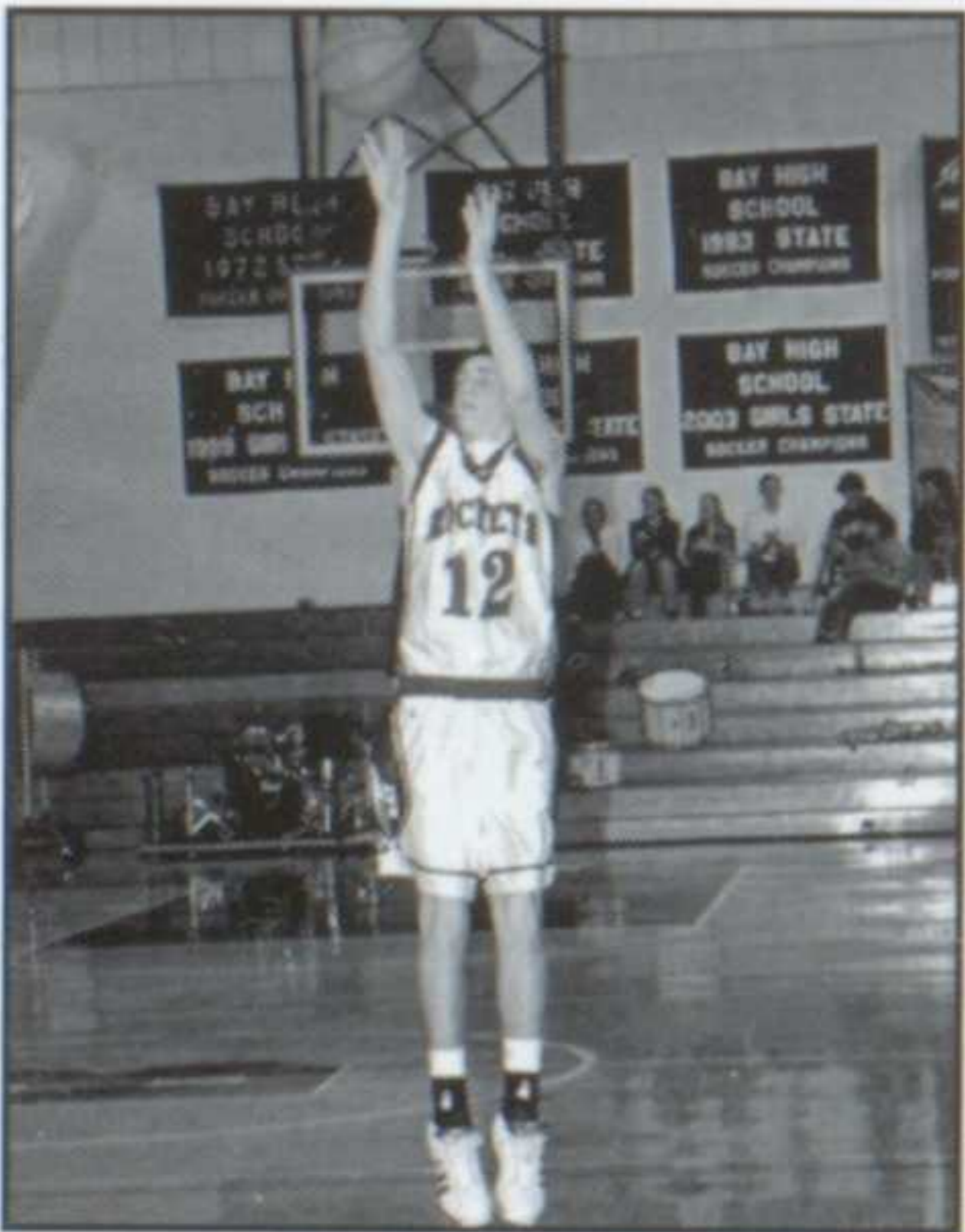

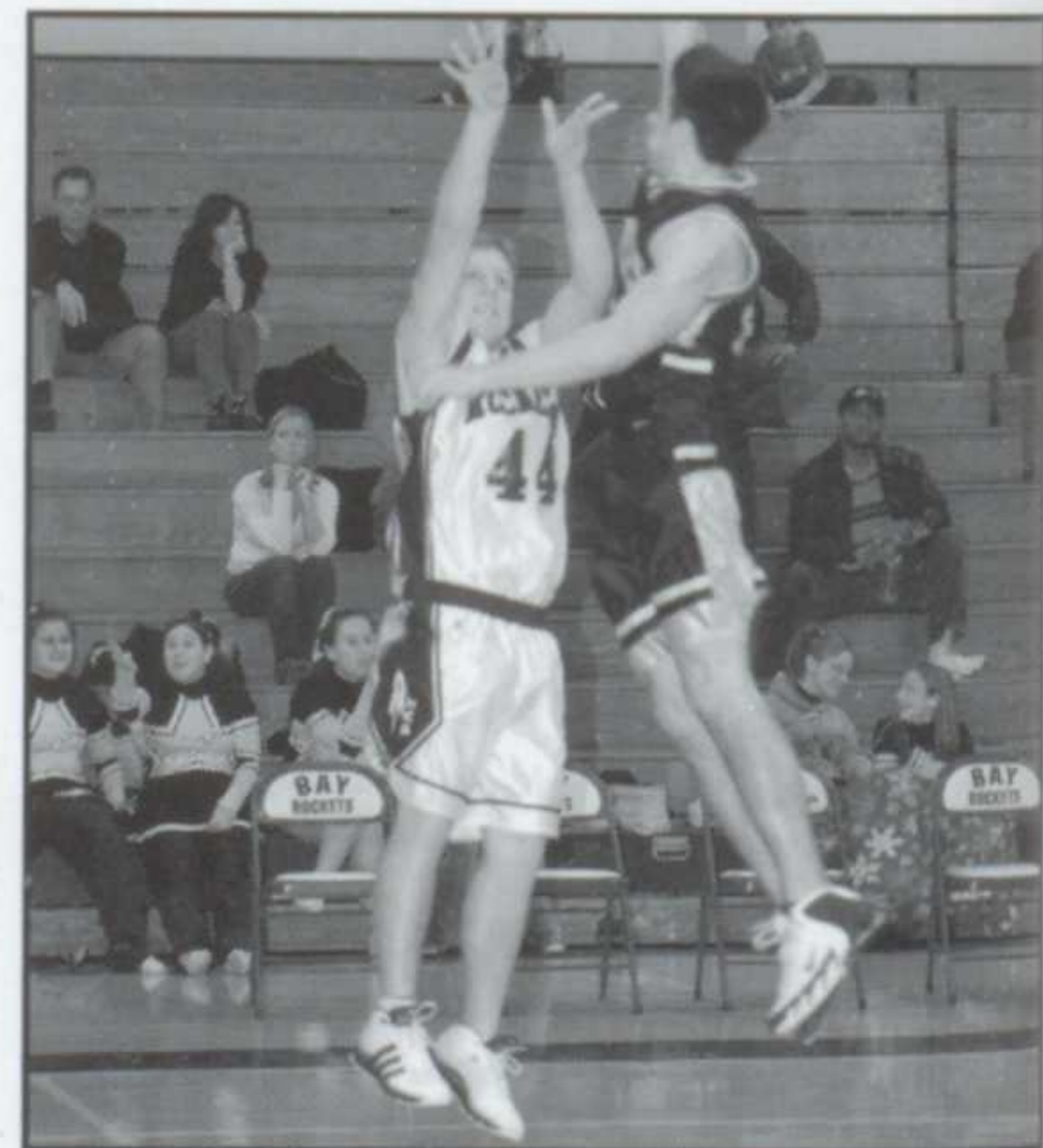

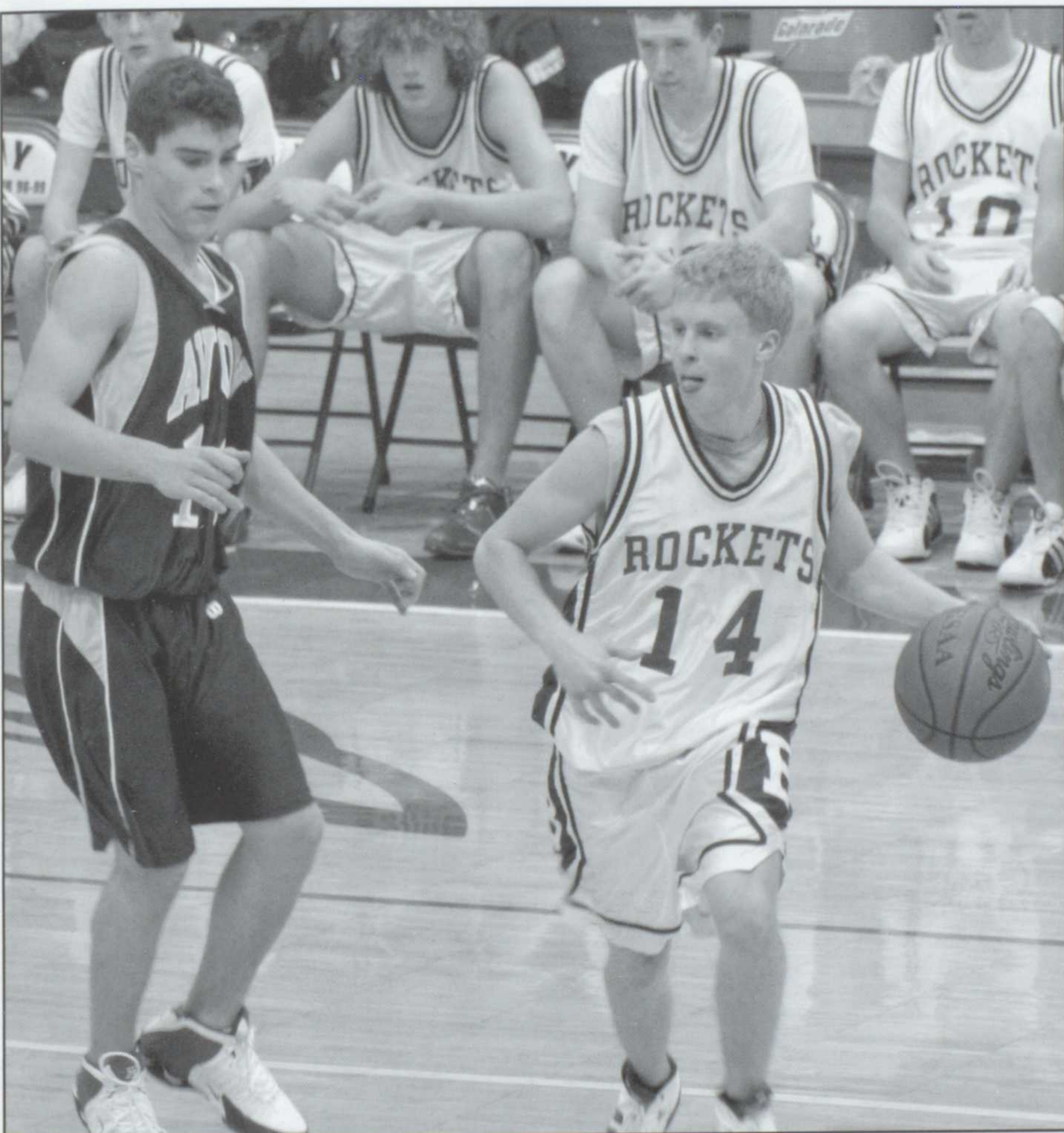

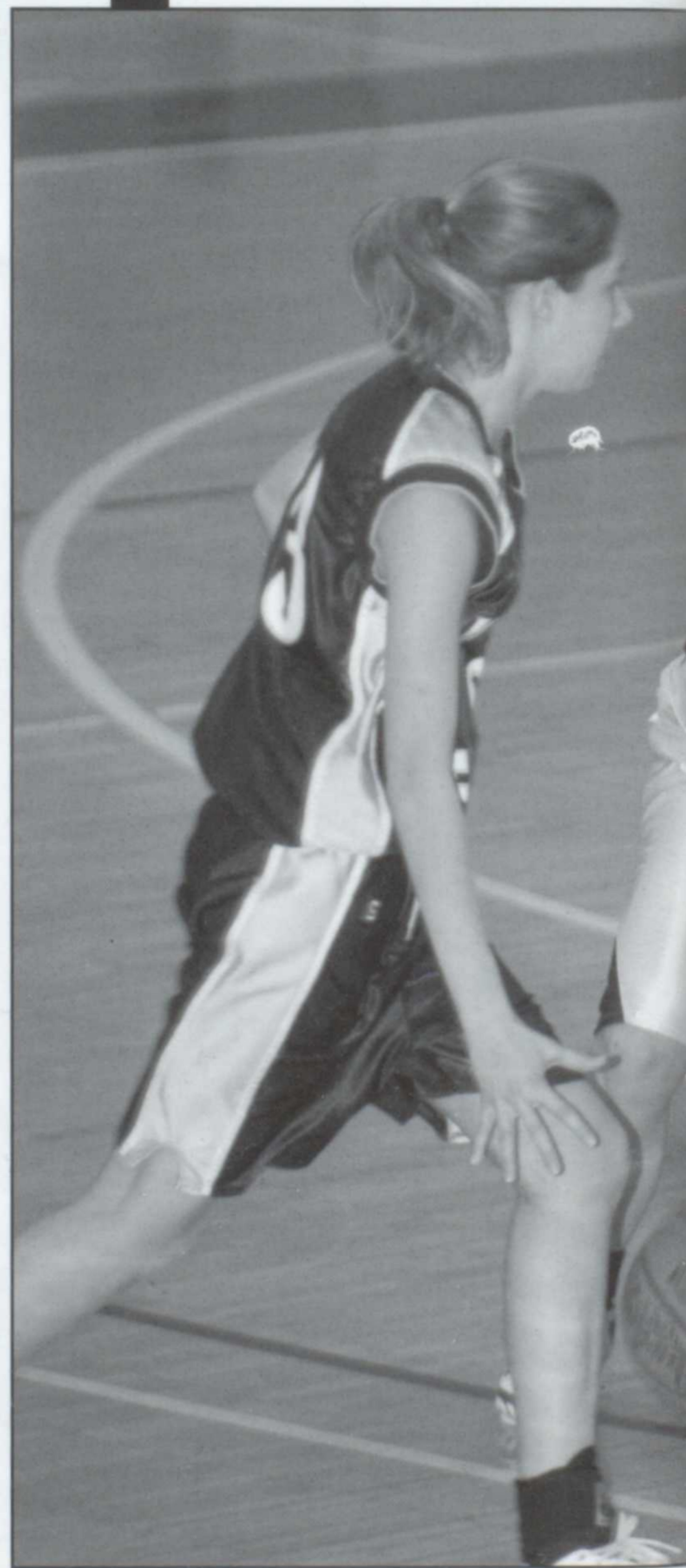

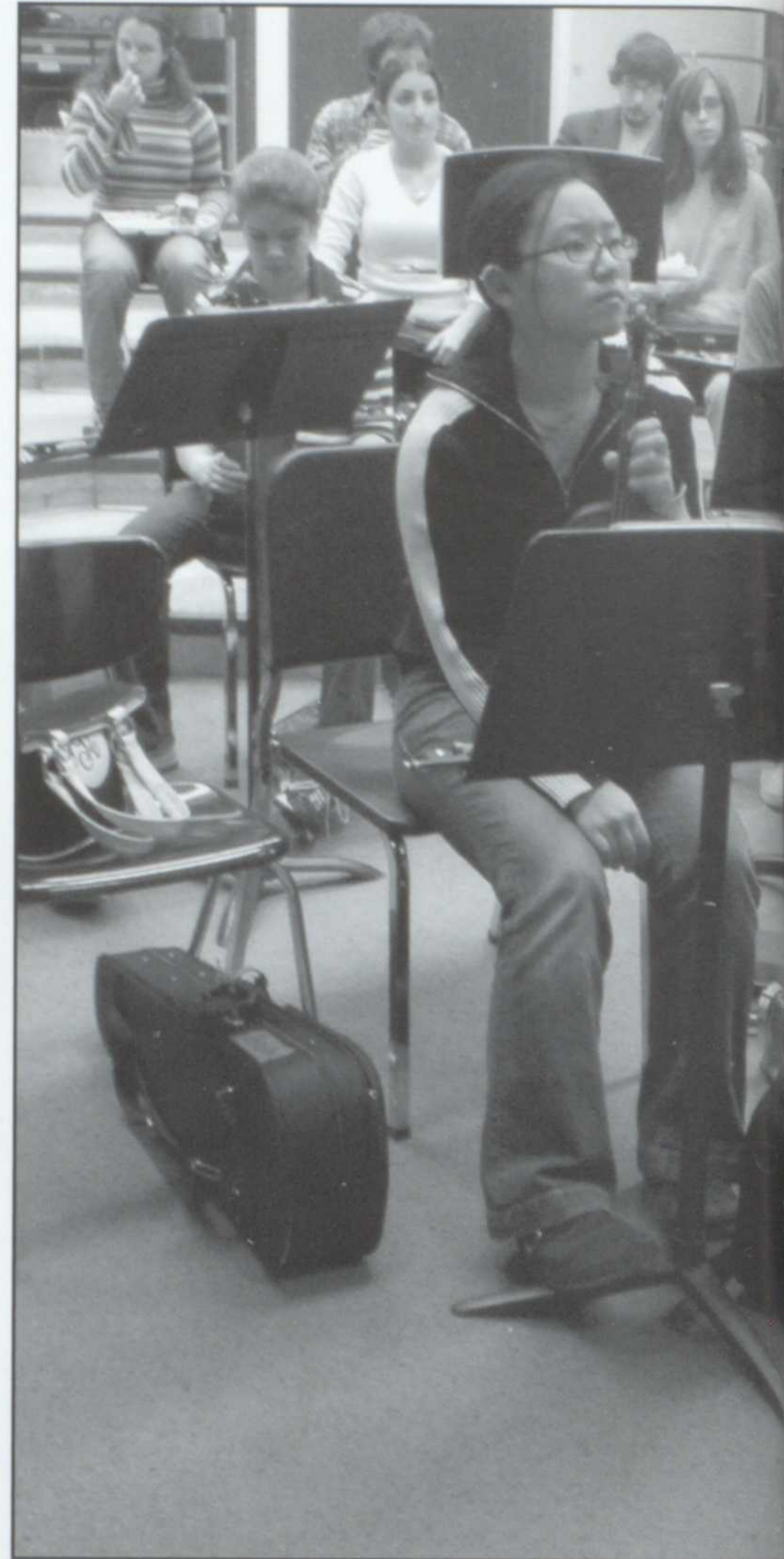

Ms. Coolidge is a member of the Journalism Education Association. The 750 copies of Plan B were published in Visalia, California by Jostens. The paper is 100 pound Karisma Gloss. The staff completed the 208-page volume on March 13, 2006. Plan B covers March 1, 2005 to March 1, 2006.

Bay High School's 76th volume, *be yourself*, received the book's 27th Gold Medalist rating. In Columbia Scholastic Press Association competition. The book received its 26th All-American from the National Scholastic Press Association. It was our 15th year of using Yeartech Software. Plan B was produced with Adobe PageMaker 7.0 and Yeartech Last Name First 1.2. It was created on 6 iMacs, 5 eMacs and 2 iBook G4 laptops, backed up on nine iomega ZipDrives. Seventy-five percent layouts were printed on an Apple Laserwriter 4/600PS and a Hewlett Packard Laser Jet 6MP. Pictures were stored on Lacie harddrive.

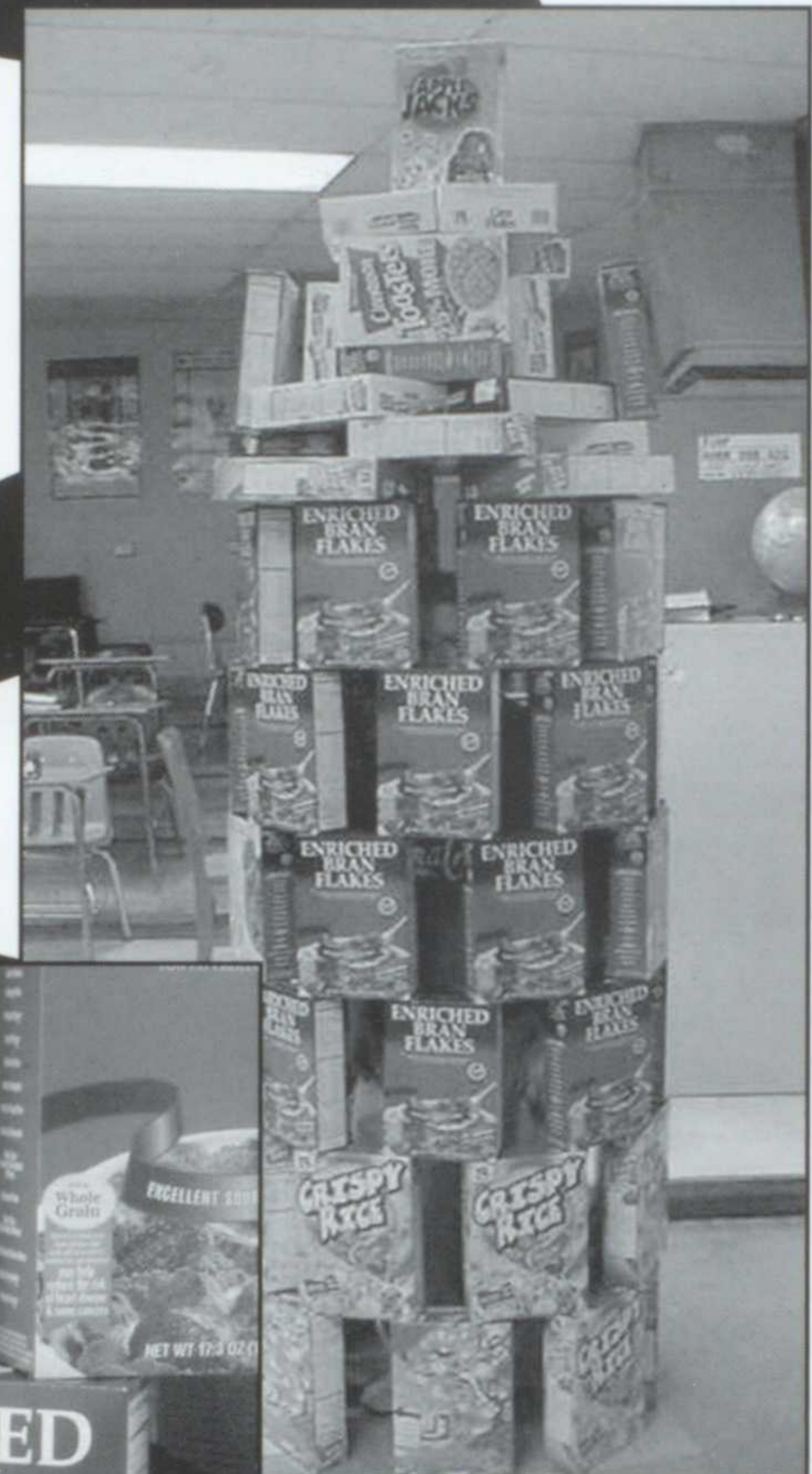

Regardless of hours upon hours of careful planning, students faced several disappointing, surprising, and sometimes entertaining changes in their agendas.

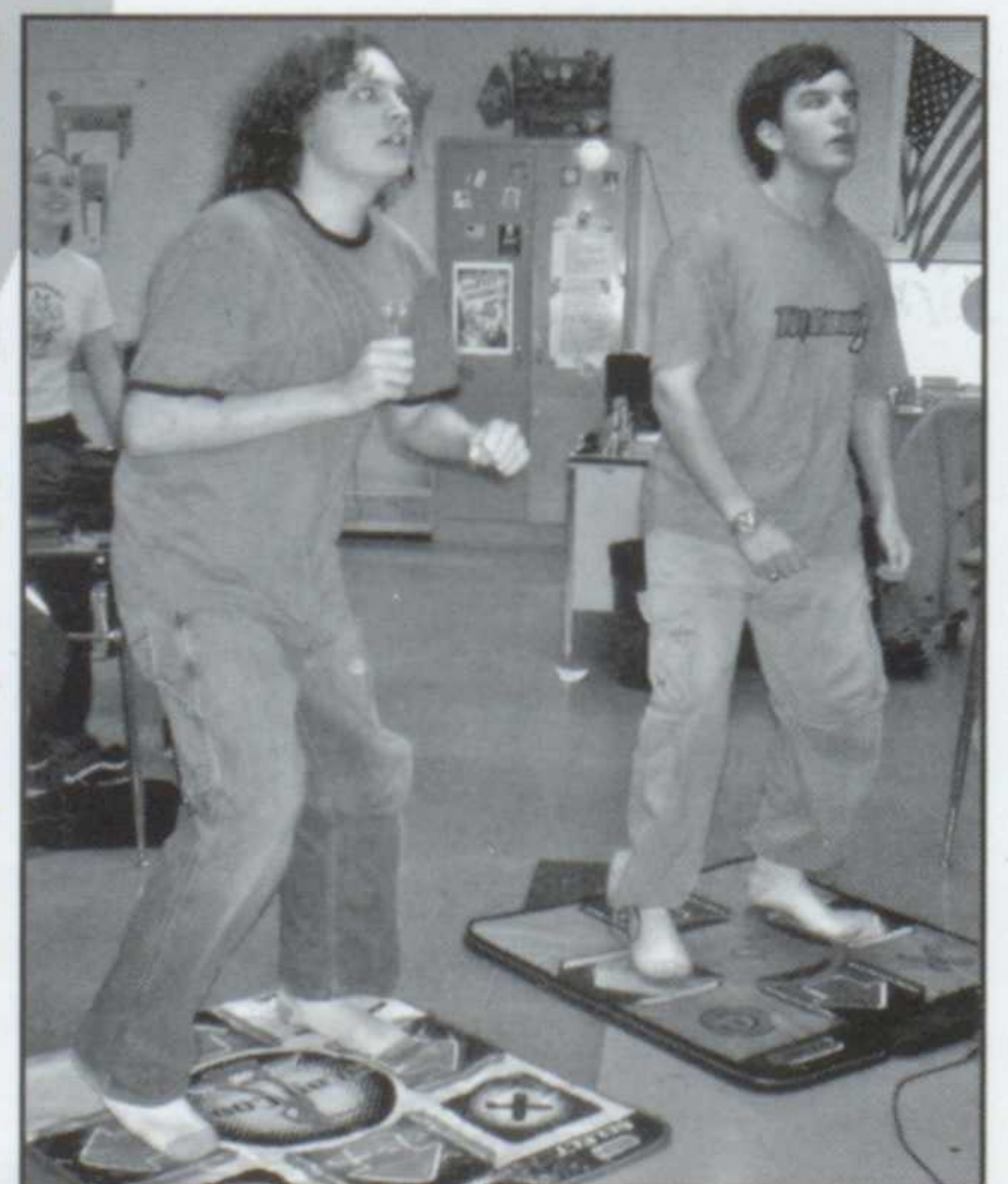
Publications lacked support from the student body. The newspaper, lit mag, and yearbook staff all suffered from severe staff shortages, making it difficult to meet deadlines.

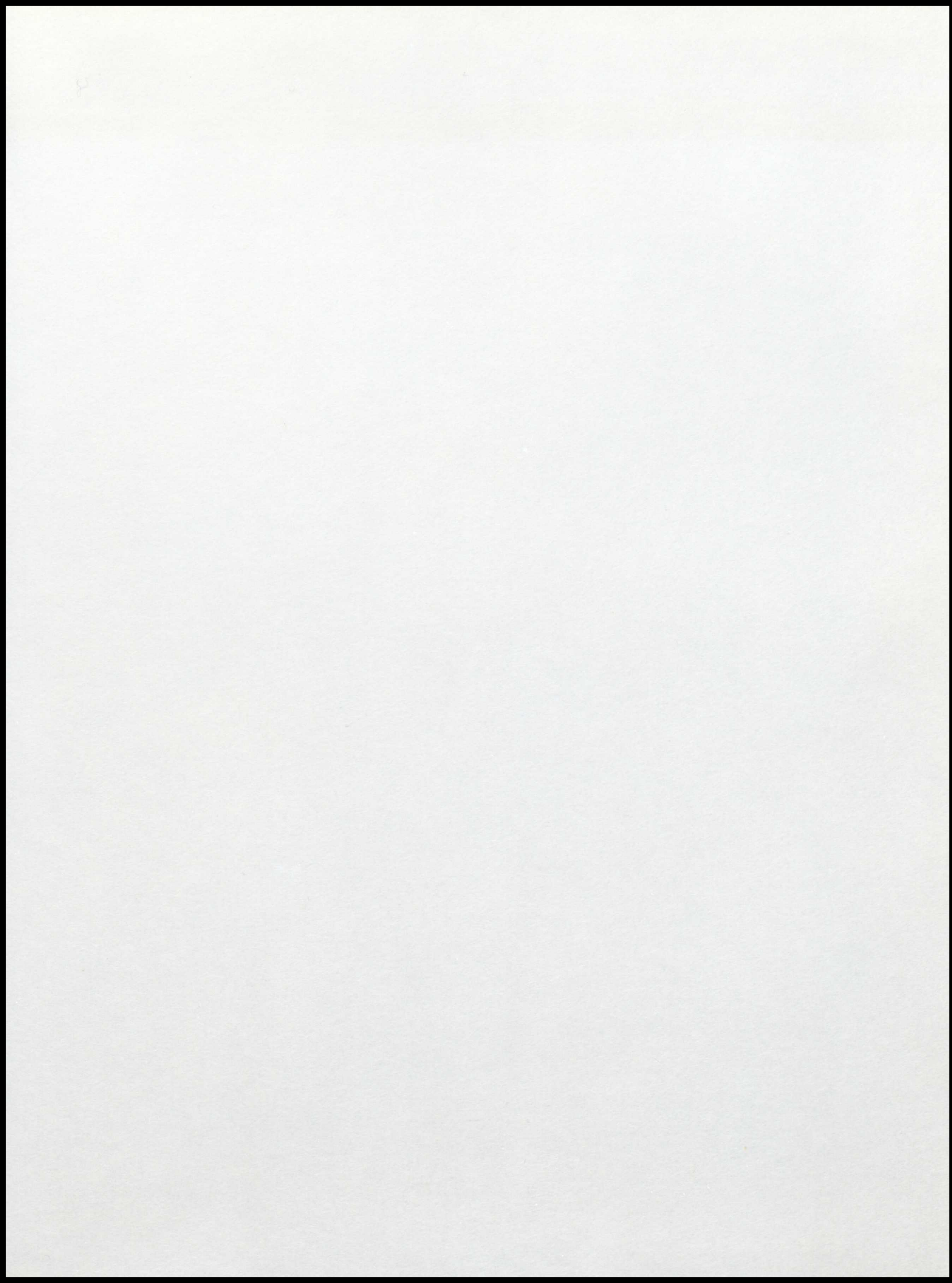
Breaking the tradition their own class started, the senior AP Calculus students were not able to market their idea for an "AP shirt." Every student who paid for one got his or her ten dollars back.
