President's Message

We have had an amazing summer with numerous projects progressing.

Holly Tramba has graciously accepted the position of Vice-President and we are excited to have her as part of the team. Having worked with Holly previously on projects, I know she will do an excellent job.

Michelle Yamamoto has been diligently coordinating the "Glimpse of the Past" articles that have been well received. I hope you are enjoying them when they arrive in your email and going to our website to read the expanded version. This gives you a 'glimpse' of our collection and the hidden treasures we are uncovering.

We were anxiously awaiting to see if a grant was approved to use one of Henry Wischmeyer's boat blueprints. The design will be used to build a boat that would be used at the North Coast Harbor downtown to clear debris. Ed Neal notified us that the grant was approved and will be moving forward. Excited is an understatement to see one of Henry's designs recreated. Be sure to read Ed's article for the particulars.

Attendance has been up at Rose Hill. We have been thrilled to sponsor a number of special tours including the Bay High classes of "56, "57, "70 and the class of "77 coming in October. Other organizations are also putting us on their schedule for us to open our doors. We are in need of volunteers to help accommodate our guests. If you are willing to assist in the Gift Shop on a Sunday and greet our guest that would be appreciated. Those comfortable providing tours, we can really use you! Marie Albano has taken over the job of coordinating volunteers and has some great ideas. She is enthusiastic and has been committed to Rose Hill. I appreciate her insight.

The Portrait Gallery is nearing completion and the originals are being stored appropriately. Once we were able to remove the portraits from the frames, we encountered a number of surprises with some of them. Nine of the portraits were chalk drawings, four of these were on wooden stretcher frames and all of these were paper on silk. This created a drastic change of plans regarding the suitable methods of preservation. Due to the instability of chalk drawings, it is inappropriate to have any layer touching the chalk directly. Storage considerations therefore needed to be restructured into a variety of methods incorporating individual boxes and 'sandwich' portfolios for some to protect the portraits. We are fortunate to have had this project addressed due to the condition of the items and are grateful to the Cahoon Memorial Park Trustees and the Village Foundation for their financial support. Pamela Ebert has extended her artistic talent touching up the frames so the portraits look their best.

We are anxiously awaiting the return of the pastural scene hooked rug displayed in the Country Kitchen which is being restored by ICA-Art Conservation. The Aldrich hair wreath is another restoration project being addressed by them which we hope to have back at Rose Hill in the next month. Be sure to stop by the see the transformations.

The loom in the Country Kitchen is being put to good use creating beautiful rag rugs. Three rugs have sold in the last month or so and Janet Verdier has been hard at work on Sundays to replenish our stock. Knowing they have been made on this historic loom that dates back c1830 truly adds to the significance of each piece. They make a unique gift and support our mission, so stop by and view the loom in action when you take a tour.

By-Law Changes Eric Eakin

Note the names of the levels, changed to reflect the order of arrival in Bay Village.

The Executive Board voted unanimously on Aug. 1, 2022, to amend the bylaws of the Bay Village Historical Society, Article III, Section 2, to change the dues levels. The amended section will now read: Section 2. The annual dues, payable on June 1, shall be:

- a) Student membership \$10.00
- b) Individual membership \$30.00
- c) Family membership \$40.00
- d) Patron \$100.00
- e) Foote level \$150.00
- f) Saddler level \$250.00
- g) Bassett level \$500.00
- h) Osborn level \$1,000.00
- i) Cahoon level \$2,500.00

Those members paying dues of \$150.00 or more per year shall be recognized in the society's quarterly newsletter.

Voting members must be 18 years of age or older.

An audit of the 2021 financial books and records of the Bay Village Historical Society has been performed. The audit report was issued and dated May 12, 2021. No matters were identified to indicate that cash transactions and assets of the historical society have not been fully accounted for. The report makes several financial recommendations which will be taken into consideration.

Congratulations to the Herb Guild

The guild, formed in 1978, is responsible for the establishment and maintenance of the public herb garden at Rosehill and also maintains the flowers at the Osborn Learning Center. Their dedication is unsurpassed and truly adds to the ambiance of our historic buildings.

The Herb Guild received 7 awards at the Cleveland District Spring Meeting. Their competition included 221 garden clubs in the Ohio district. Awards are based on a point system and the competition is challenging! Among the awards they received:

- First Place Historic Preservation Redesigning the culinary gardens at Rose Hill with landscape beams and layout of plants
- First Place Civic Beautification Hand painted slates recognizing the loss of those who passed of COVID
- Third Place Horticulture or Environmental Education Award Laminated plant identification sheets available to use when browsing (They also purchased an additional holder for us to place promotional brochures in.)

Additionally, if you check out the lending library you will find they are a regular contributor of herb books.

We are so appreciative of their dedication over the years. Congratulations to the Guild.




A Wischmeyer Boat Comes To Life

One boat in the Bay Village Historical Society's collection of boat designs by hobbyist naval architect Henry Wischmeyer will soon be built. The Cleveland Amateur Boatbuilding and Boating Society (CABBS) recently won a grant from the Traditional Small Craft Association to build a Wischmeyer designed pram. The small boat will be used to keep North Coast Harbor adjoining the Rock-n-Roll Hall of Fame free of floating debris.

Henry Wischmeyer, who died in 1958, left a considerable portfolio of small sailboat and rowing craft designs. One rowing boat in particular caught the eye of volunteer Ed Neal. It was just the size and type needed for a project he was working on with boatbuilding club students at Davis Aerospace and Maritime High School in downtown Cleveland.



Two Davis students had suggested building a boat that could clear floating mats of debris trapped in a section of North Coast Harbor. One particular channel along a pedestrian walkway is very difficult to keep clean and is often unsightly since no boat can navigate its narrow width and right-angle turn.

Ed felt a boat the size and shape of the Wischmeyer pram could navigate the channel and would be the right tool for the job. As the Executive Director of CABBS he applied for and won a grant to build the Wischmeyer pram using Davis boatbuilding club students. The boat will be built at the CABBS boatbuilding workspace at E 36th and Perkins Ave, one block north of Chester.

Anyone interested in this project is welcome to join in. No boating or boatbuilding experience is necessary. Your curiosity and enthusiasm is your entrance ticket. You can come for a day or come for the project. CABBS wants to involve the BVHS in this effort and will regularly update the organization on developments.
